New Postal Rates Go Into Effect Jan. 1st

The United States Postal Service has announced the new postal rates that will go into effect on January 1, 1995.

The rate increase for the First Class postage stamp will be from 29 cents to 32 cents. Post cards will now cost 20 cents, up a penny from the present rate.

The postal service's rate for Priority Mail (up to 2 pounds) will be \$3.00, up from \$2.90 and Express mail (from the post office to the Addressee - up to 8 ounces) will be \$10.75, up from \$9.95.

Money orders will now cost 85 cents, up 10 cents from their current price.

These increases are the result of the unanimous vote in their favor Monday, December 12, by the governing board of the U.S. Postal Service. This is the first increase in four years, according to Sam Winters, chairman of the postal board.

International mail charges are scheduled to go up later in 1995, postal workers confirmed.

Until the new 32-cent stamp can be printed, unpriced stamps picturing a flag and the letter G will be sold.

Tishomingo Living Center To Offer New Services & Ideas

Old Tishomingo County Hospital Building To Have Bright Future

The Iuka Nursing Facility is now the Tishomingo Living Center and along with the new name comes new administration, new services and new ideas about geriatric care.

The facility's new administrator Carol Rollins said that the partnership of herself, her husband, Gerry Rollins, and Judith W. Overall took over operation of the Tishomingo Living Center on Dec. 7 after the hospital relocated to its new facility. "We hope to give the people of this area choices for affordable care for their geriatric family member," Mrs. Rollins said. She said that they renamed the facility the Tishomingo Living Center because they want to make it a place where residents can "live" and not just exist.

"We have an 8-acre complex here that has plenty of room for us to have all kinds of activities for the residents including arts and crafts and church services. We want our residents to have an enjoyable life."

Rollins said that along with the nursing home facilities, they are planning to include assisted living for those who can no longer live alone, but who do not need medical care. "We would provide a place for them to live where they would have someone to do their housekeeping, provide meals, and do their laundry, if needed. No medical care would be provided unless needed in some type of emergency situation and this would help keep down the resident's cost," Rollins explained.

Other services in the planning

for the facility in addition to the nursing and assisted living programs are adult day care; outpatient services to include occupational, physical and speech therapy; consultation, where the home of the elderly person would be examined for possible changes that would make it possible for them to remain there and not have to enter the nursing facility; and a wellness center to include places for those elderly persons in the community who might be on a special diet for medical reasons, but who can not prepare the meals themselves or it could be used to provide a place for exercise, etc. Rollins explained that all of these additional services have to be approved by the state Department of Health before they can be undertaken.

"At this particular time, we are licensed for a 40-bed facility. We are meeting with the state Department of Health this week to ask for additional beds so that we may utilize the entire hospital complex here," the administrator said. She went on to say that it is very important to have community support for these programs. "The cost to the taxpayers will be less with the more beds that we have."

One of the goals of Rollins is to see that residents be rehabilitated and ultimately, they be able to return home. "At the last facility that I managed in Muscle Shoals, Ala., I'd estimate that about 78 percent of our people were able to be sent back home. We want to teach people to live and function after they suffer strokes or other disabilities. Everybody wants to be able to stay at home. We want to be able to help them do that," she expressed.

Rollins said that extensive renovations are in the plans for the facility in order to bring it up to their standards. Also an increase in staff will be needed due to the removal of most of the dietary, administrative and housekeeping staff with the move of the hospital. Many of these duties were shared between the hospital and nursing facility, she said. There are presently 35 people on the payroll—approximately one employee per resident. Rollins said that they also will be asking for volunteers from the community to help at the facility.

The company that Rollins and her partners represent, 2008 LLC, has negotiated a 20-year lease/purchase with the county, who is the present owner of the complex. The final cost of the facility is still under negotiations, Rollins explained.

Mrs. Rollins was formerly the administrator of the Muscle Shoals Nursing Home in Alabama. She and her husband have been involved in long-term care since 1963 and have owned and operated eight different facilities at different times. Her husband now does consulting work for nursing homes and also sets up rehab programs. Other partner, Judith Overall, is presently a college professor at Tulane University where she instructs in the area of longtime care to graduate and professional students. She also formerly worked with Mississippi Medicaid in the Fraud and Abuse division.

"We are excited about being in Mississippi and in Iuka," Mrs. Rollins expressed. "Everyone in the area has been very cooperative and we have met a lot of nice people."

She said that they have had a history of running a good facility and have had no problems with inspections in the past. "Nursing homes are the second most regulated industry," she explained. Forty-eight agencies can regulate them. "We hope to set up this facility as a model for geriatric living."

Community Christmas Service Monday Night At Historic Episcopal Church In Iuka

On Monday, December 19, at 5:00 p.m., a special Christmas week service will be held in the historic Episcopal Church of Our Savior on Eastport Street in Iuka. Everyone is invited to attend this community event.

The church is one of the oldest places of worship in Tishomingo County. Although the building is no longer used regularly for

Episcopal services, it represents the early presence of that church in Iuka. A congregation was originally formed in 1866. In 1868, Bishop William Mercer Green visited the town and proposed that a church building be erected. To this end, he donated \$250 as a nucleus for a building fund. Subsequently, Col. R.W. Price, a Methodist,

donated the land for the structure. James B. Cook, a Memphis architect provided the building plans. Upon the completion of the church in 1873, Bishop Green returned to Iuka to consecrate the building.

The structure exemplifies the once-popular Carpenter Gothic style of religious architecture in Mississippi. Displayed above the entrance to the church are two symbols common in Episcopal churches: a Celtic cross and a sign of the Trinity. The chancel railing inside the church was once in the first Episcopal church in Memphis. It was later in St. Mary's of Memphis, and then came to the Iuka church through the efforts of the Brinkley family.

The building has been the home of Episcopal congregations in Iuka continually since its consecration. Beginning with the Rev. Henry C. Harris, twenty-three priests have served the Church of Our Savior. The first marriage that was solemnized in the Iuka church was that of James Mhoon Brinkley and Clara Foote.

In 1984, the building was purchased from the Diocese of Mississippi by Iuka Heritage, Inc., an organization of local citizens dedicated to preserving the historic structure. It was completely renovated in 1991 and is now listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Due to the vision of the Iuka Heritage members, this historic church still stands in Iuka.

CELEBRATE! Pecans

Pecans Add Flavor, Crunch To Holiday Baking

(NAPS)—As the holiday season approaches, home cooks rediscover the joy and satisfaction of turning out batches of sweet-smelling baked goods ranging from classic pies and cakes to decorative cookies and candies.

Few dessert tables are complete without toothsome favorites featuring the distinctive nutty flavor of pecans. Pecans have long been a traditional baking staple, adding rich taste and crunchy texture to an assortment of holiday sweets.

Expand your holiday recipe collection this year with the addition of Honey-Pecan Diamonds. These delicious jewels, featured in *Goody Desserts* by Elaine Corn, are studded with pecans bound in a sweet, chewy filling. A buttery shortbread crust balances the richness of the filling.

HONEY-PECAN DIAMONDS

Shortbread Crust
10 tablespoons (1 1/4 sticks) unsalted butter
1/3 cup solid shortening
1/2 cup sugar
1 egg
1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
2 1/4 cups flour
1 teaspoon baking powder

Honey-Pecan Filling
2 sticks (1/2 pound) unsalted butter
1 1/3 cups brown sugar
1/4 cup white sugar
1/2 cup honey
4 cups (1 pound) good-looking pecans
1/3 cup heavy cream

For crust

Butter a 9- by 13-inch baking pan. Set oven rack in the center of the oven and preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Cream butter, shortening and sugar (with the paddle attachment of an electric mixer, if you have one) until smooth and fluffy. Beat in egg and vanilla. Sift flour and baking powder together,



er, then add, all at once, to butter and mix slowly with mixer first on low speed, then medium, until a meal forms that will hold together if pressed. Don't overmix. Press into bottom of pan, forming a slight rim. Prick many times with a fork. Bake 15 minutes, until baked but still colorless. (Crust will bake a second time with filling.) Cool completely. (If crust has not cooled completely before the hot pecan mixture is added, the heat from the caramel will turn it soggy.)

For honey-pecan filling

In a large heavy saucepan, stir butter, brown sugar, white sugar and honey together over medium-high heat. Bring to a boil and boil exactly 3 minutes (about 254 degrees F). Mixture will foam, but crystals won't form on the sides of the pan. Take off the heat, use a clean wooden spoon to stir in the pecans. Return to heat to soften a bit, then stir in cream until smooth. Pour into prebaked crust, pouring into corners first. Set baking pan on a cookie sheet to keep bottom from overbaking. Bake at 350 degrees F for 25 minutes, rotate pan, and bake 15 to 20 minutes more—a total of 40 to 45 minutes. The middle may jiggle slightly, but will set up when cool. Cool overnight; do not refrigerate. Cut into 1-inch diamonds. Will keep two weeks at room temperature, covered.

Makes about 2 1/2 dozen diamonds.

County Agents Notes

GRAZING SMALL GRAINS

So far this winter, our weather has been mild with plenty of rain, be watchful of nitrogen deficiencies in your winter grass fields. If growth slows down or if plants show a yellow color then you may need more nitrogen. Excess nitrogen may promote winter injury, but seldom does the equivalent of 200 lbs. of ammonium nitrate per acre hurt plants that need nitrogen.

SOIL SAMPLING

Don't forget that this is the time to soil sample for lawns, gardens, and agricultural crops. Results will be received with sufficient time to add lime, if necessary. Phosphorus and potash can also be applied. Call or come by the Extension Office for instructions and soil sample boxes.

Now is also the time for soybean producers to take nematode samples. Soybean fields need to be monitored periodically to make sure that your crop or variety rotation system is working properly. We have information and materials needed to take a proper soil sample to be tested for nematodes.

WHOLE COTTONSEED AS FEED FOR CATTLE

The nutritional value of whole cottonseed make it a very popular feedstuff for beef cattle. Price and availability are the major factors involved in using this feed. It is higher in TDN, fiber, and fat than corn, soybean meal or cottonseed meal. High fat is good within limits. Excess fat can cause diarrhea and reduce overall feed digestion. For this reason it is best to restrict consumption to 1 pound of seed per 200 pounds of body weight. Cottonseed also has a high moisture content which can cause a seed quality problem. It is best not to offer this feed as free-choice but rather hand feed daily. Handling and storing can be a problem because cottonseed does not flow well out of a grain bin. The best way is to use a clean, dry commodity shed. Gossypol poisoning is an occasional problem with young ruminant animals whose stomach has not fully developed and is a common problem with non-ruminant animals and should not be used in this manner. For more detailed information on the value of cottonseed as feed, please contact our office.

Free Electricity/Refrigeration Training

The Northeast Extension Center is offering quality Electrical/Refrigeration training to dislocated workers. Students who are currently receiving unemployment benefits can continue to receive this month while in training. The Pell Grant is available to eligible students. Travel allowance of \$200.00 per month is provided for eligible students.

Upon completing the program the students are certified in electricity and refrigeration. A placement service is provided for students who successfully complete the program.

FEEDING YOUR PET

Feeding your pet properly is the single most important responsibility a pet owner can have. Frequently, however, the diet is incorrect - or not in the dog's or cat's best interest.

Most of the mistakes arise from misinformation or an unintentional. With the correct facts and guidelines, many problems of vomiting and diarrhea, overweight pets, and over supplementation can be prevented.

Generally, good quality commercially available diets are best. Most of these meet or exceed national research council recommendations.

Occasionally, special diets and foods are needed in order to manage certain illnesses. Your veterinarian can advise you in these situations.

The amount of food to be given depends on the animal. Pregnant and lactating animals need more. Active growing dogs need more than their inactive, older counterparts. Overfeeding is most often the cause of dogs being overweight.

Vitamin supplements may be necessary to control certain diseases where the pet has a high loss of a particular vitamin or cannot utilize it properly. Again, your veterinarian can best advise you regarding the need for a supplement. Do not use vitamins indiscriminately since high doses can lead to problems.

The animal's diet should include plenty of clean, fresh water. Some animals have no problems drinking milk, while others develop diarrhea. It is best, therefore, to include only fresh water.

The practice of feeding table food and leftovers often causes bowel problems, vomiting and diarrhea. In addition, this food can add excessive calories, which lead to an overweight pet.

LAZY EYE

If an adult or child becomes lazy, a pep-talk or a spanking may get results. Not so with "Lazy Eye". This condition, called amblyopia, is the unexplained loss or lack of development of vision in one eye. The brain just sends the message to acknowledge images from only one eye instead of both. Amblyopia is usually accompanied by crossed eyes and occurs most often before the age of six.

Normally, images sent by each eye to the brain are identical. When they differ, double vision occurs. Rather than go through life with double vision, the brain simply learns to ignore the image sent by one eye and "sees" only with the good eye. The ignored eye gradually grows weaker from disuse and, if the condition is ignored, the bad eye can become a visual cripple. This condition should be treated early on. It is difficult for a parent to notice its symptoms, that's why it's so important to arrange for a visual examination of your children.

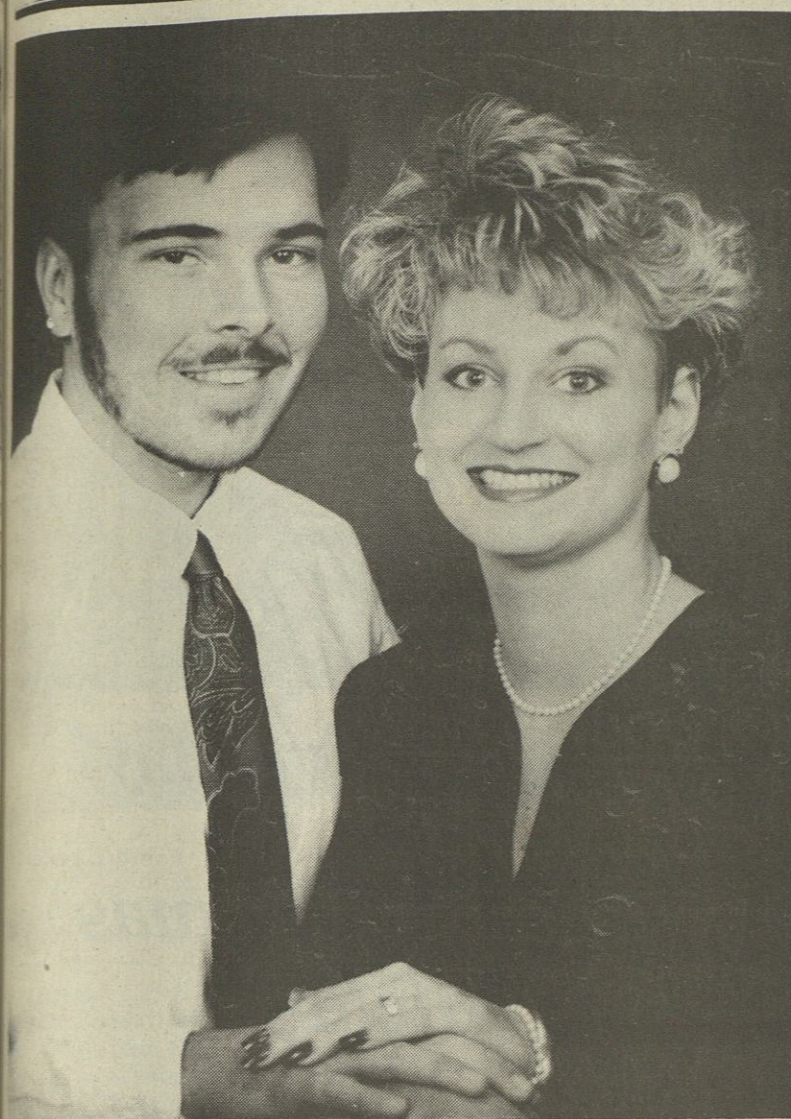

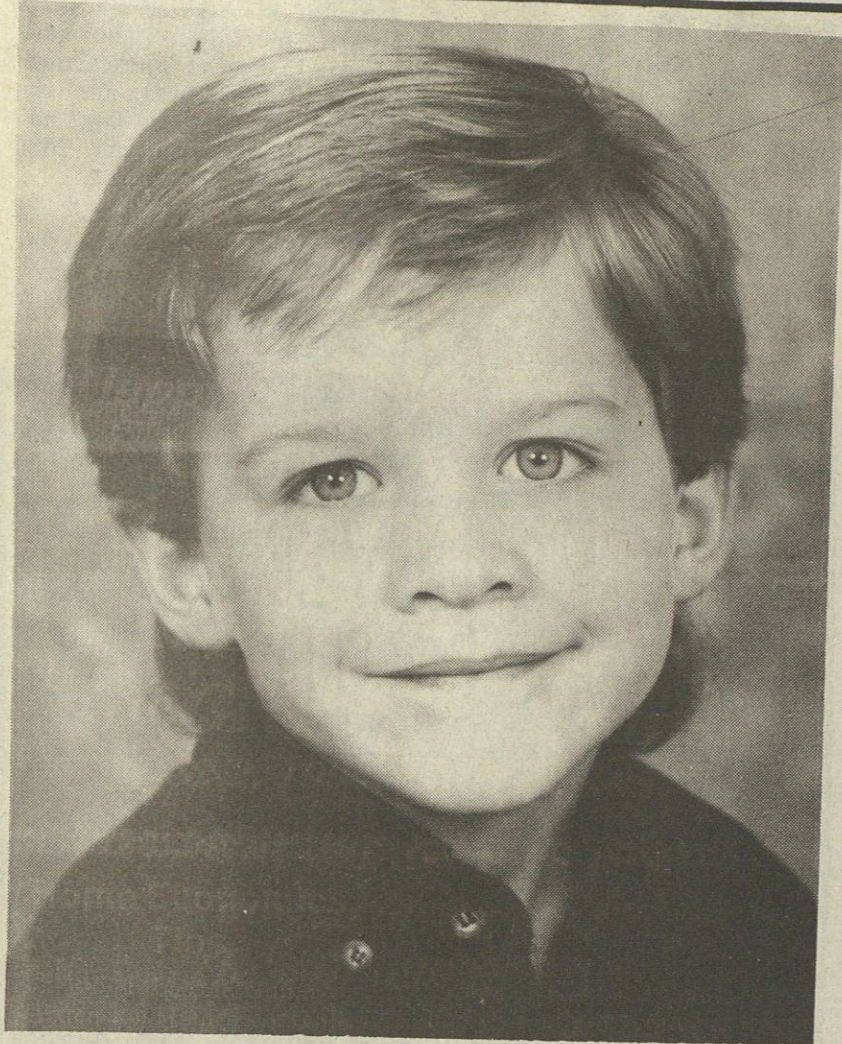

Home Economics Tips

TIME SMART PREPARATION
TIPS THAT REALLY WORK
Looking for ways to save time in the kitchen that doesn't spoil the results? Barbara Guinn, Tishomingo County Extension Home Economist says that these Time Smart Preparation Tips really work.
*Make a quick stock flavoring

for stews by combining onions, garlic and carrots in a blender with a little bit of water.
*For oven-baked potatoes in a hurry, boil the potatoes for 5 minutes before putting them in the oven, or put an aluminum skewer through each potato before baking. Either process reduces baking time by 15 to 20 minutes.
*To cook dense vegetables (potatoes, carrots, squash) quickly without losing flavor or nutrients, cut 1/2 pound into

1/4-inch matchsticks and place in microwavable bowl or pan. Add 2 tablespoons water, cover and microwave on "high" for 5 to 7 minutes, stirring just once.
*Shave off 10 to 15 minutes of meal preparation by using boned chicken breast halves.

*Use your freezer and microwave oven to keep cooked pasta and rice readily available. Place 1/2-cup portions in 6-ounce custard cups, cover with clear plastic wrap and freeze. When firm, remove portions from cups, transfer to freezer bags or containers and return to freezer for storage until needed. To reheat, place portions as needed back into custard cups and microwave on "High" for 1-1/2 to 2 minutes. Do not add water.

Approximately 10,540 Tishomingo County residents held jobs in mid-October while 540 were out of work. Manufacturing jobs in the county number 3,740, 20 more than September and 70 more than October, 1993. Nonmanufacturing jobs numbered 3,710, the same as September, but 90 less than October one year ago.
