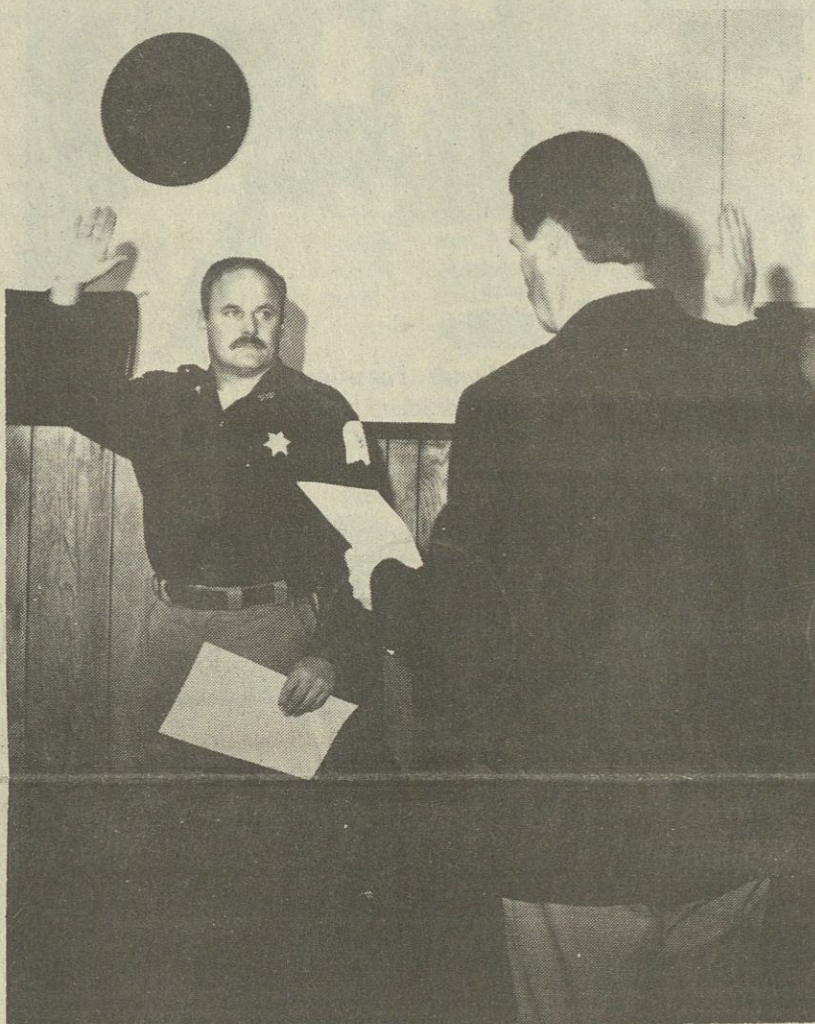

David Smith Appointed As Tishomingo County Sheriff



Sheriff David Smith Takes Oath of Office

The Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors appointed David Smith, a deputy with the Sheriff's Department, as the county's new sheriff on Thursday, December 22, 1994 by a unanimous vote.

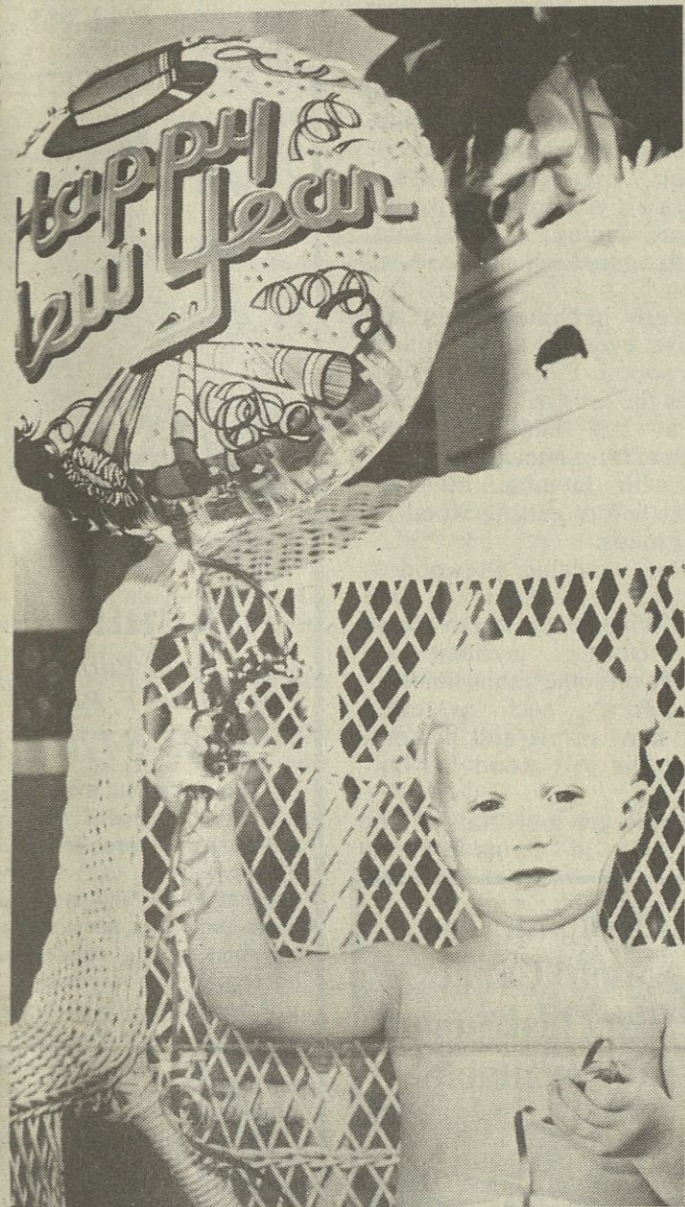
Smith's appointment came after the resignation from the office on Tuesday of former Sheriff Johnny Nunley.

Chancery Clerk Hayden Ables swore Smith into office at 3:30 p.m. Thursday. At that time, Smith began drawing the Sheriff's salary of \$44,800 per year. Smith was chosen by the Board of Supervisors from a field of 12-15 candidates. According to Board President Ricky Cummings, most all of the candidates were well qualified for the position and could have done a good job, but after careful consideration, the Board chose David Smith because of his record in law enforcement and also based on the fact that he had been in-house and knew the things going on in the county.

Smith, 39, is a native of Tishomingo County and has served as a deputy at the Sheriff's Department for the past three years. He is a graduate of the North Mississippi Law Enforcement Training Center in Tupelo. Previous occupations include positions as a respiratory therapist and as a fireman. He is married to Grettis Smith and they have two children, April, age 10, and a one-year-old foster child.

A staff of nine full and part-time deputies and five dispatchers will work along with Smith. He has named deputy Glen Whitlock as Investigator and Neal Edmondson as Chief Deputy. "We'd just like to ask the people to bear with us—it may be rocky at first, but we will do our best to see that the needs of the public are handled in the best possible way. Just let us know your needs or concerns and we'll take care of them as soon as we can," Smith stated.

Smith's term of appointment in this position will be until the regular election is held next year.

New County Office To Be Created: Tax Assessor/Collector Office To Split

If approval is given by the U.S. Justice Department, the county office of tax assessor/collector may soon be two separate elected offices.

According to Tishomingo County Board of Supervisor's President Ricky Cummings, on December 12, 1994, the Board of Supervisors passed a resolution to divide the office of tax assessor/collector into two offices. The Board took this action under a state law that says that any county in the state that has property values in excess of \$65 million may pass a resolution in which the office of tax assessor/collector may be made into the two separate elected positions, that of tax assessor and of tax collector.

The resolution must gain approval by the U.S. Justice Department in Washington by February 1, 1995 in order for the office to be divided in time for next year's election, Cummings said. If it does not get approved by February 1, then the office will remain as it is presently—as one position—on the 1995 ballot.

professionally choreographed fast-paced frolic of hot blues music.

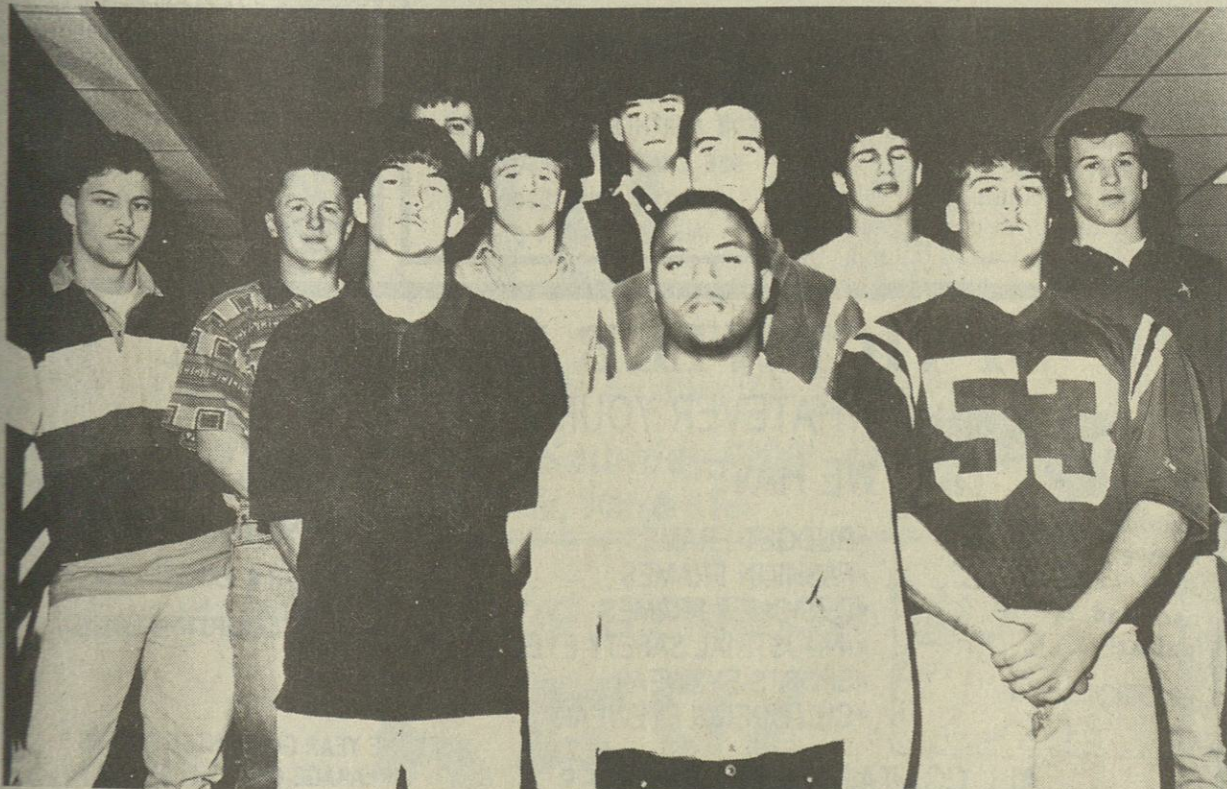

minutes of the half-time show. Check local listings for air time.

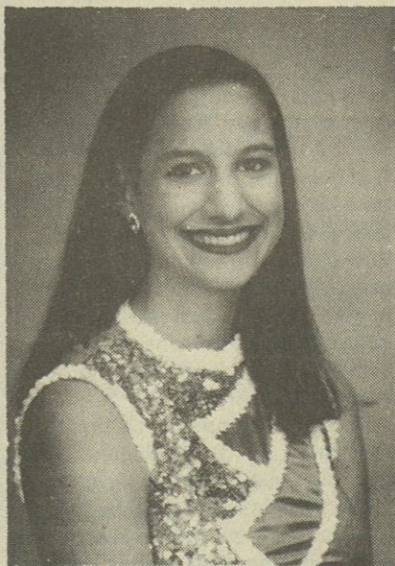

Home Economics Tips

PREDICTING EATING DISORDER VICTIMS
Eating disorders -- anorexia nervosa and bulimia -- continue to be major health problems in this country.

Now, research from Stanford University shows that girls as young as 11 or 12 years old engage in behavior that could lead to bulimia nervosa if steps aren't taken to prevent the disorder.

Researchers discovered that out of 900 sixth and seventh grade girls in four middle schools, more than 4 percent of the girls reported symptoms of bulimia nervosa, although they

could not yet be categorized as having the disease as yet.

Bulimia is characterized by recurrent binge eating episodes, using laxatives, diuretics or vomiting to prevent weight gain, feeling a lack of control over eating during a binge. Bulimics experience persistent overconcern with weight and body shape.

Full-blown bulimia is diagnosed when someone has these characteristics and engages in episodes of binge eating at least twice a week for three months or longer.

Young girls in this study relied more on vomiting than laxatives or diuretics as a way to control their weight.

The researchers also discovered that girls with symptoms of bulimia nervosa differed from their non-bulimic peers in a number of ways. For example, the former group weighed more than a higher proportion of their body weight was from fat.

These girls also were more concerned about body image, preoccupied with their weight, had excessive concern with dieting, and reported feeling fat even though they were not fat by objective standards.

They also scored higher on a depression scale -- even though their eating disorder had not matured into full-blown bulimia. Depression is common among adult bulimics.

Interest in conducting this research was to discover what risk factors might lead to bulimia

RITE OF PASSAGE

Reading glasses are a rite of passage for most people. Starting around age 40, we find ourselves holding restaurant menus at arm's length and complaining about poor lighting. Over time, it becomes more and more difficult to read the newspaper, or phone book.

The problem - presbyopia - is universal. It happens to everyone with age. The curved, transparent lens of the eye focuses what we see by tightening or relaxing the eye muscles, thereby altering the amount of the curvature. This process is called accommodation. The amount of accommodation is greatest during childhood and begins to decrease after adolescence. The lens gradually becomes less elastic and the eye muscles weaken.

When this happens, it's time to schedule a professional eye examination. Once you have new corrective glasses, it will be such a pleasure to be able to read the paper and dimly lit menus again with ease.

and how it can be prevented. Research has shown that the single greatest predictor in whether girls will develop bulimic symptoms is an overconcern with body weight and image.

Teaching young girls to accept the fact that some weight gain at puberty is normal, helping them develop healthy eating habits, and encouraging regular exercise may prevent the occurrence of bulimia.

Fires Provide Comfort During Winter Weather

With a nip in the air, many people turn to fireplaces for comfort and warmth. Proper selection and storage of firewood will help keep those winter fires burning brightly.

Before building a fire, adequate sources of wood must be cut and dried. Firewood needs six to eight weeks to dry before it will burn well.

"Wood cut now will be available to use in January or February," said Dr. Andy Ezell, extension forestry specialist at Mississippi State University. "Someone needing wood now should look in areas where trees already are cut."

If a chain saw will be used to cut wood, the user should become familiar with the equipment before operating it.

"Don't even start to use a chain saw if you don't know what you are doing," Ezell said. "Anything that will cut wood will cut you."

Recently harvested forest and provides excellent opportunities for firewood. Pieces left behind, such as the tops of trees, already are cut and have dried out enough to burn immediately.

As with hunting, ask permission before cutting wood on private lands.

"Most available firewood is on private landholdings," Ezell said. "If someone doesn't own land, cutting permits are available on some public lands."

Hardwoods, such as oaks, ashes, hard maple and hickory, provide the best wood for burning.

"People get more out of the hardwoods in terms of the

amount of heat produced compared to the effort required to harvest the wood," Ezell said.

Several types of wood should be avoided as sources of firewood.

"Pine wood causes chimney build-ups while sweetgums takes a year or more to dry," Ezell said. "Sycamore wood is a bad choice because it doesn't split well."

Proper storage of firewood is the key to building a successful fire.

"The best place to store wood is in a well-drained or elevated spot," Ezell said. "The wood also should be off of the ground, such as stacked on poles, because moisture in the wood keeps from burning well."

Store firewood in a well-ventilated area where it is exposed to sunshine and placed in long, linear stacks with a cover over it.

"To receive the maximum heat from the wood, the main thing to remember is to keep the wood as dry as possible," Ezell said. "Moisture in the wood requires extra heat to burn off the water."

WATCH THE EYES

Of all the organs that our pet's can have problems with, eye problems can be the scariest to us. The eyes bear close watching because eye problems can occur and become serious very quickly.

If your pet rubs at his/her eyes, or there is any sign of redness, swelling or squinting, the animal should be seen by a veterinarian.

Check your pet's eyes frequently for any change in color. If one or both eyes suddenly change color, it may indicate a serious disease -- not necessarily an eye disease.

Pets can have many of the same eye troubles as their owners -- cataracts, glaucoma and conjunctivitis. Corneal ulcers or lacerations are a common problem in pets. Avoid situations that can lead to corneal injuries such as encounters with cats or your dog riding with its head hanging out of the window while riding in a car.

The eyes of puppies and kittens usually open at about 10 days of age. If they are not open by that time, or you notice any discharge from the unopened eyes, have them checked. Most delays in opening are due to infection which may cause permanent damage if not controlled.

While it is true your pet cannot be fitted for glasses, there are many things that can be done to treat eye problems. Veterinary ophthalmologists (eye specialists) are available in most areas to assist your veterinarian in diagnosing and treating animal eye problems.

Watch closely for problems in your pet's eyes -- they are the only ones they have.

Letter To The Editor

I read the two letters previously in this newspaper concerning the Iuka Hospital. The letter from the family who was upset because a family member was not receiving the proper care seemed to have a couple of discrepancies. If the doctor was insistent the patient was not having heart problems why was he ordering infusions of nitroglycerin and heparine which are cardiac drugs? The letter did not say what changes in treatment the patient received on arrival at ECM. The second letter was very gung-ho written by somebody who thinks Iuka is the best hospital possible in the world. My own experience at Iuka where

I worked as an RN for five years was between these two.

I saw family members very dissatisfied with the care patients were receiving at Iuka and insisted on transfers to other hospitals where the patient would get the same diagnosis, the same lab work, the same medicines in the same dosages and there the family would be highly satisfied with the care. This is an inherent problem all community hospitals have. People are simply more impressed if they are further away or are in bigger buildings. Small local hospitals, including Iuka, really can't do much about this. There is also a misunderstanding that because a hospital does not do advanced treatments it is because the people there don't know how to do them. That's not exactly the way it works. A hospital's scope of care is defined by Certificates of Need and if there is a hospital in the area like the Medical Center which provides a service then other hospitals are prohibited from competing by the state for financial reasons rather than ignorance of the staff. Iuka Hospital is not supposed to be all things to all patients. It's not supposed to be the Medical Center or Baptist Memorial. All the time I worked there I never saw a patient being kept when his or her condition exceeded that hospital's ability to care for them.

Having said this it is also true I saw things at Iuka Hospital that simply do not happen elsewhere. I primarily worked the Critical Care Unit and there I was paired with an aide that took six to eight hour breaks in a 12 hour shift visiting her friends in the nursing home section. I reported this to the nurse manager of the unit. She took no action. I then documented the amount of time this aide was spending away from her work place as well as leaving the hospital to go to Fast Lane for snacks when she thought I did not know it. This was at the time for job evaluations. The nurse manager threw away the documentation and gave this per-

son a "Commendable" job performance. A Commendable evaluation is the highest evaluation an employee can receive without having to fill out paperwork justifying a higher one. Then a few weeks later I had a 43 years old female with an unstable blood pressure and I instructed this aide to take the BP every half hour. She refused and went to visit her friends for an hour. This I reported to the nurse manager. She said there was nothing she could do. Well yes there was something she could do. She could have done her job. I went to the Director of Nursing with an ultimatum that I would not work at Iuka Hospital with this degree of unprofessional care. The DON agreed to place her on report but after two weeks she had not, so I quit. At no other hospital I have worked would this be tolerated. At other hospitals nursing managers hold themselves up to a highly professional degree of competence. But at Iuka this is the status quo. There are people there who don't work, and you can't make

them. But you don't have to read letters in a newspaper for this to be known. All you have to do is listen at beauty shops or grocery stores or restaurants, where people gather to talk about the concerns of this community. I know the bad publicity that Iuka Hospital occasionally gets is occasionally deserved.

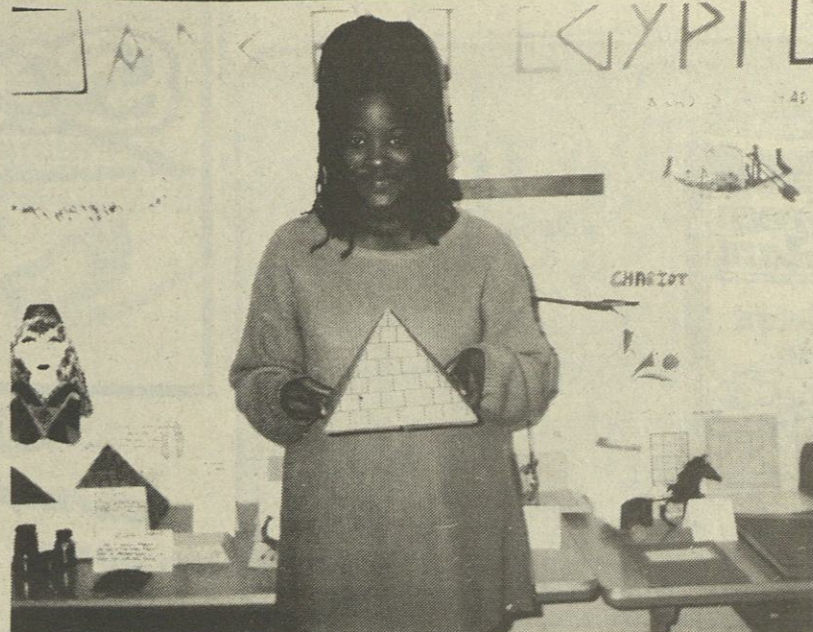





PECAN DISEASE HITS HARD

Growing pecans in Mississippi was a tough job this season. Homeowners in north Mississippi were hit hard by the February ice storm, and most ice-damaged trees are several years away from returning to normal levels of nut production. In addition, we've had an extremely wet summer.

This presented an ideal environment for the development of a common disease of pecans called "scab". Scab isn't a new problem for pecan production. It's been around for years and is considered - to be the most destructive disease of pecans in the South. Some of the more susceptible varieties include Desirable, Schley, Success, and Stuart. Infected leaves frequently fall in late summer, and this premature leaf shed deprives trees of a food supply needed for continued nut development.

Heavily infected nuts take on a blackened appearance and drop prematurely. If you aren't sure whether you have a scab problem on your trees, bring several nut specimens by the Tishomingo County Extension Office for examination and disease identification. For control many homeowners want to spray their trees as a means of preventing disease and insect problems. This is a difficult task since highly specialized application equipment is necessary to cover large trees. Also, several applications of fungicide are needed each season. If you plan to install new trees this winter or spring, it's important to realize that the easiest and least expensive route to scab control is through planting recommended scab-resistant pecan varieties. For a listing, see MCES publication 966 "Fruit and Nut Recommendations for Mississippi," available through our Office. Some of these varieties include Forkert, Pawnee, and Owens. Additionally, the following cultural practices should be part of a production program since vigorous growing trees are much less susceptible to scab and other diseases and insects: (1) Collect a soil sample for nutrient analysis and apply recommended amounts of fertilizer before next season. (2) Carry out sanitary measures

to reduce the amount of scab fungus carryover into next year. Sanitation practices include removing old shucks and plant debris from around trees this fall and winter. (3) Cut low hanging limbs. This will be important next season as a way of improving air circulation to speed drying of foliage and nuts following rainfall.

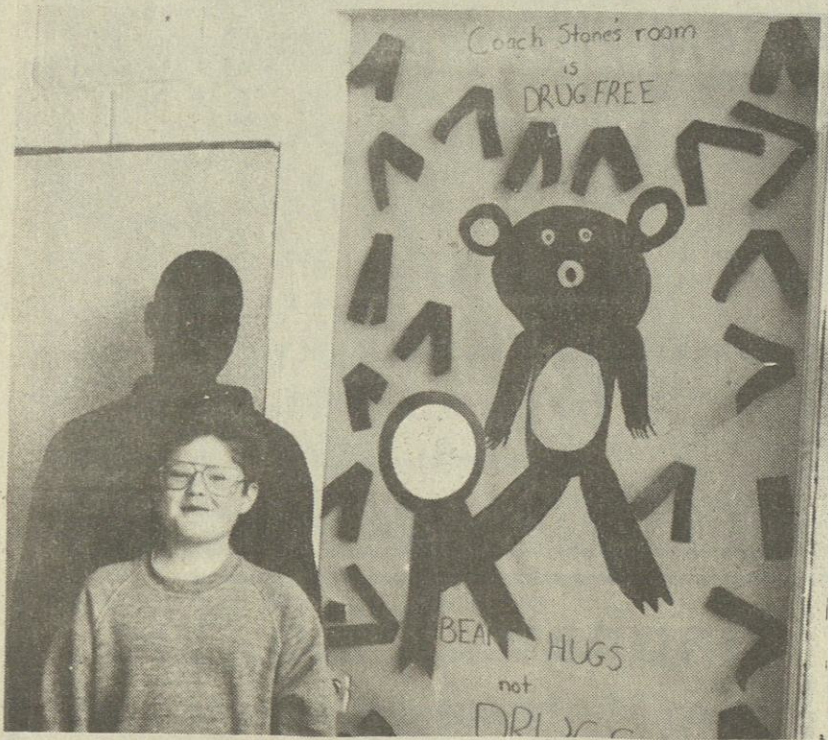
