

An out of court settlement has been reached in the wrongful death lawsuit filed by the family of Sharon Duckett against former Sheriff Johnny Nunley and the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors.

According to the attorney for Nunley and the Board, Lawson Hester of Jackson, the case was

\$9 million, was filed by the father of Sharon Duckett, Walter Williams and her two sons, Walter James Williams Jr. and Albert Jermaine Duckett after her April 3, 1993 death at the hand of Tishomingo County Jail trusty Leon Powell, 52. Powell, who was serving a 20 year sentence on a manslaughter conviction, drove to the Iuka Hospital in a van owned by the Sheriff's department to pick up the prisoners' meals. While there Powell shot Williams, a dietary worker at the facility, then drove a short distance away and shot himself.

Another defendant in the case was former commissioner of the Mississippi Department of Corrections Eddie Lucas. Lucas was included because Powell was committed to the custody of the state prison system after being convicted of manslaughter. Since Lucas was in charge of overseeing prisoners assignments to facilities, the suit alleged that Lucas breached his duties. He was later dropped from the suit.

A new railroad trestle, built to relieve flooding problems of Indian Creek, has been completed in Iuka by Norfolk Southern Railway

Norfolk Southern Trainmaster Kenny Barnes of Corinth said that after the Memorial Day flooding of three years ago in Mineral Springs Park and surrounding areas, a study was done by his company, the Army Corps of Engineers and the City of Iuka to determine the best way to prevent this flooding from occurring in the future.

"Although the results of the study were inconclusive, it was believed that replacing the culvert system with a trestle might alleviate the problem," Barnes said. "So Norfolk Southern agreed to do this."

The approximate cost of the project was \$500,000.00, Barnes confirmed. In exchange for building the trestle, which is located between the McKinney and Iuka railroad crossings, the City of Iuka agreed to close two grade crossings. The two crossings which will be closed include the Main Street crossing in town Iuka and a crossing West of town near the Industrial Park, according to Barnes. The railroad company also agreed to donate a piece of property near the downtown crossings to the City of Iuka as a part of the cooperative effort between the two entities.

Although the trestle is in use now, a few finishing touches to the area are still underway. "We still have to remove an old culvert that the trestle was constructed over," Barnes said. "I am very happy about the completion of the project, which has been going on for about 2 1/2 years." Barnes stated. "This is the first time we've worked together with the City of luka on a project and we feel it has been a successful effort."

Home Reonomies Tips

By: Barbara F. Guinn, **Extension Home Economist** TIPS FOR BUILDING CHILDREN'S SELF-ESTEEM


How can parents and professionals help ensure that children will be responsible for their education, leisure time use and overall well-being?

Dr. Robert B. Brooks, professor Assistant of psychology at Harvard Medical School, believes that adults can help by fostering children's selfesteem. He says children will have greater self-esteem if they feel a sense of ownership and responsibility for their experien-

Many children don't have that feeling. They think in terms of "I have to go there. I have to do this. I have to do homework." It is important to their success and self-esteem that they feel they have a personal, vested interest in their activities. Brooks offers three tips for fostering selfesteem.

1. Provide the freedom to make mistakes.

One roadblock to feeling vested is not having the freedom to make mistakes. Adults should admit they make mistakes and talk about the nature of making



mistakes -- the feat, the intimidation and what it does to people. It is a fear that interferes with emotional development and with trying new things.

Brooks recommends that adults ask children what they think are appropriate actions to take when people make mistakes. "Ask them, should we insult them and make fun of them?" Chances are children will answer no. An open discussion of their fears can teach children that mistakes are normal and a part of learning.

Children with good self-esteem seem to believe that mistakes are experiences to learn from rather than be defeated by. Children who do not perceive mistakes that way feel helpless. Thus, their mistakes really do turn out badly.

Brooks says these children become class clowns, class bullies, they retreat, they use drugs, they become selfdestructive...It's learned helplessness-that feeling that regardless of what I do, I cannot bring about positive change.

2. Help them make a contribution.

Self-esteem stems from feeling valued. Finding that island of competency and offering ways for children to contribute can help them build self-esteem. The feeling that you are contributing is very powerful.

"Many children and adolescents are drowning in an ocean of inadequacy. They feel they are not competent," Brooks says. "I believe every child in the world has at least one small island of competency, one area which can serve as a source of pride.

Brooks tells about a little boy who sat in the bushes every day and refused to go into the school. The boy said he like bushes better than he like school. Brooks asked the boy what he enjoyed doing.

The boy said that he really like caring for his pet dog. So the school principal invited the child to care for the schools pet rabbit.

"This kid who thought he had nothing to contribute wrote a manual on taking care of pets," says Brooks. "By the end of the school year this kid had lectured to every class in school, and he told me the bushes were not excited anymore.'

3. Give children a choice.

Children surely will not develop a sense of ownership and responsibility if other people always decide what children will do and when and how they'll do it. Real choices, appropriate to children ages, also permit them to experiment, make mistakes and in nonthreatening learn situations.

"Anything can be a choice," Brooks points out. "Anything can be a decision. I read one ar-



ON "STORE-BOT" GLASSES Reading glasses are sold in drug stores and "five and dime" They are called stores. "magnifying readers." These nonprescription "magnifyers" should not replace an eye examination. Those between the ages of 45 and 65 should have one regularly.

An eye exam can do more than confirm that you may need reading glasses. The eye doctor also checks for glaucoma, which can lead to partial or total blindness. This disease is more common after age 40 and often, there are no warning symptoms. The doctor also looks for the start of cataracts, which can cloud the lens and early signs of retinal disease.

Over-the-counter glasses are not suitable for everyone. Many people need a different corrective lens for each eye, others need a correction for both near and far distance vision. 

STEVEN McCALLUS Steven McCallus Wins Tishomingo Middle School Geography Bee - Moves One Step Closer to Winning \$25,000 Scholarship

Steven McCallus, a seventh ade student at Tishomingo iddle School, won the schoolel competition of the National ography Bee on December 7, 94, and a chance at a \$25,000 lege scholarship. The schoolel Bee, at which students anoral questions on graphy, was the first round in graphy Bee, which is sponsored by National Geographic World and Chrysler Corporation.

The kick-off for this year's Bee was the week of December 5, with thousands of schools around the United States, the District of Columbia, and five U.S. Territories participating. school The winners, seventh annual National including Steven, will now take a written test: up to 100 of

the top scorers in each state and territory will be eligible to compete in their state Bee April 7. The students who participated in the finals of the Tishomingo school bee were: T.J. Dunn, Vickie Sullivan, Chris Puckett, Grant Gatlin, Daniel Parrish, Eugenia McKee, Jessica' Jordan, Eugenia Long, Jessie Green, and winner, Steven McCallus.

The National Geographic Society will provide an allexpenses-paid trip to Washington, D.C., for state champions and their teacherescorts to participate in the Georgraphy National Bee national championship on May 30 and 31. The first-place national winner will receive a \$25,000 college scholarship; the second-place winner, \$15,000 scholarship; and the third place winner, a \$10,000 scholarship.

Alex Trebek, host of "Jeopardy!", will moderate the national finals, which will be presented by Maryland Public Television as a prime-time special on most Public Broadcasting Service stations May 31. Check local listings.

The National Geographic Society developed the National Geography Bee in Response to a growing concern about the lack of geographic knowledge among young people in the United States. A 10-country Gallup survey conducted for the Society in 1988 and 1989 found that people in the U.S. ages 18-24--the youngest group surveyed--knew less about geography than young people in any of the other countries in the survey.

The National Georgraphic Society, with 9.2 million members, has as its mission the "increase and diffustion of geographic knowledge." In addition to the National Geography Bee, the Society sponsors a number of other geography education initiatives, including summer geography institutes for teachers, the National Geographic Society Education Foundation, and the Geographic Alliance Network, which is currently working in every state, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and Canada.





Status Study

North Mississippi Health Services in cooperation with Magnolia Regional Health Center, is conducting a regional checkup to determine the health status of the people in 27 counties in north Mississippi and northwest Alabama.

"We are conducting a comprehensive community health assessment to determine the health status of area residents in order to identify ways to improve their health," said Shelly John-stone, North Mississippi Medical Center Marketing Director who is coordinating the implementation of the health assessment.

The assessment, which will be performed by clinical volunteers, will be based upon a random sample survey that will be conducted door-to-door in 27 counties and will reach 2,300 households. The assessment will be conducted from mid-November through April, She said.

"We are pleased to be a part of this comprehensive health assessment because it will benefit all the citizens of this area. Magnolia Regional Health Center will provide assistance in conducting surveys in Alcorn, Prentiss, Tippah and Tishomingo Counties," said Rohn Butterfield, Magnolia Regional Health Center Chief Executive Officer.

The Health Services Research Division at the University of Mississippi developed the survey and will analyze the findings. Government Should Address Known Health Risks

In an ABC news special called Are We Scaring Ourselves to Death, John Stossell reported the story of a Colorado ski community's battle with the Environmental Protection Agency.

Robert Hunter, a doctor in the community said, "The gover-nment, at this point, has taken a teeny bit of data and exploded it into an \$8 million mistake.'

It all started in 1986 when EPA scientists said Smuggler Mountain was "contaminated" with lead left in the soil from silver mining 100 years ago.

Naturally, when the citizens of the community learned about the problem, they were terrified. The EPA had warned the residents that they had likely accumulated dangerous levels of lead in their blood from the "contaminated" soil.

But over time, the citizens of the community became skeptical. the lowest in the country. Dr. Hunter said, "What I've told the EPA is that if you want to save lives in the valley, build us a new road. Our road is what kills people up here." Over the last five years, there have been thousands of serious injuries and 21 deaths on the road to which Dr. Hunter is referring.

But instead of taking Dr. Hunter's common sense approach, the government continued its push to spend millions of dollars to dig up, and remove, much of Smuggler Mountain. Rather than spending the money on a new road which would make a tangible difference by saving lives, the government would rather spend millions based on a hunch by a few scientists on an environmental crusade.

The government should spend taxpayers' money on "real hazards'' rather than hazards conjured up by environmental activists.



Dangerous Drugs Under Your Kitchen Sink

Children do not have to go far find ways to get high on drugs. It hey have to do is look under e kitchen sink or open a few osets or cupboards in your

Experts have labeled more than ,000 household products as halants -- chemical substances hich people can breath to get a hemical high. Glues, liquid aper, nail polish remover, paints nd paint thinners, propane for our barbecue, even some aerosol prays not only can be used to get igh, but are being used this way va growing number of children nd teenagers.

Experts are now calling the idespread use of dangerous halants a full-blown epidemic. round 17% of all American ildren in the eighth grade have iffed an inhalant at least once, nd about 5% have done this at east once in the last month. In 975, 10.3% of high school miors had sniffed. Since then he numbers have steadily risen

that today, 16.6% report aving used inhalants. Keeping kids off dangerous

lrugs cannot be accomplished by mply cracking down ferociously n drug pushers. Nor does it simply tell children to just say no" to trying a drug. 

If you find that your child is using inhalants or other drugs, this too is not the end of the world. New breakthroughs in the field of drug rehabilitation that were made by L. 





Even though I always encourage growing your own vegetables, it is impossible to grow everything you need. Have you taken a good look at the vegetable display cases in the grocery stores recently? They're changing, not just in shape, color or arrangement, but in what they display.

You still find lettuce, radishes, green onions, peppers and the basics we've all come to expect, but more choices are available than before.

Fresh herbs are a good example of this change. It wasn't so long ago that all you found was parsley, garlic, hot peppers and occasionally ginger. today you have fresh cilantro, dill, oregano, rosemary, thyme, mints, basil and others. You're no longer restricted to just dried herbs in bottles and cans.

One of the biggest changes in fresh produce in recent years is the appearance and rapid expansion of "fresh cuts." the first fresh cut choices were bagged is sure to increase. The washed, chopped and ready-to-munch salad greens often are accompanied by crunchy, seasoned croutons, salad dressing, a fork and napkin to make a complete one-package meal.

Since variety is the name of the game, some of the salad mixes consist of a blend of iceberg, romaine, red cabbage, carrots and radishes. Another may have just butter lettuce and radicchio, while another just fresh spinach or romaine

You might find a blend of baby lettuces mixed with a vareity of other tender greens, a blend of leaf lettuce and endive or a combination of escarole, endive and radicchio for a stronger flavored salad

While trimmed broccoli and cauliflower florets have been available for quite some time, fresh broccoli florets now are being combined in packaged meals such as cream of broccoli soup, stir fry broccoli, broccoli pasta salad and broccoli pasta with alfredo sauce. CFSA Farm News

The Tishomingo County CFSA Office began taking applications for the Forestry Incentive Program (FIP) January 3, 1995 and will continue until January 11, 1995. The purpose of the practice is to establish a stand of trees for soil protection, ensure an adequate supply of timber of future years and preserve and improve the environment. The program is designed for cut-over timberland, marginal cropland and improving existing stands of timber. The State ASC Committe has established a maximum limit of 80 acres per applicant due to limited funding. Cost-sharing of 50 percent is available to approved applicants for planting (\$28 per acre) including seedlings. Cost-sharing for site preparation in the form of mechanical or chemical is \$16 per acre for light, \$28 per acre for medium, and \$45 per acre for heavy site preparation. A flat rate of \$28 per acre is available for improving an existing stand of trees or releasing desirable seedlings and young trees. Applicants should not begin site preparation, tree planting, or burning until their application is approved.

Policies for this program are as follows: Cost-sharing is authorized for the establishment. of trees that will provide both forest products and improved protection from wind and water erosion, clearing land occupied largely by scrubby bushes of no economic value, only where essential to permit planting desirable tree species, planting must be protected from destruction by fire and grazing. This practice will be required to be maintained for a minimum of 10 years following the calendar year of installment or establishment.

Tishomingo County farmers and landowners may contact the CFSA office or their county forester for program details.

ployment in Tishomingo County rose to 5.5 percent in mid-November. This compares to 4.9 percent in October and 5.8 percent in November of last year.

The civilian labor force numbered 11,020, 60 less than October and 40 less than November, 1993. Approximately 10, 410 Tishomingo county residents held jobs in mid-November while 610 were out of work.

Manufacturing jobs in the county numbered 3,710, 30 less than October, but 10 more than November one year ago. Nonmanufacturing jobs numbered 3,720, 10 more than October, but 50 less than November, 1993.

'Yo-Yo' Dieting **Can Be Avoided**

A new year has begun, and you're full of good intentions.

One of your resolutions may be to lose weight by going on a diet. While dieting itself is a challenge, so is the effort to keep the weight off.

So-called "yo-yo" dieting is a too-familiar routine for many people concerned about being overweight. They lose pounds by reducing calories. But once the diet is stopped the weight returns.

In addition, yo-yo dieting has drawn attention of some researchers concerned about its safety. Several studies have shown that people who repeatedly lose and gain weight have a higher overall death rate. They also have a greater risk for heart disease and cancer than some people whose weight remains stable. The American Heart Association points out, however, that other studies have not reported such findings and says that additional research is needed.

Even so, the AHA recommends that individuals try to maintain an ideal weight simply because being obese contributes to diabetes and cardiovascular disease.

The answer may be to gradually reduce the amount of food you eat. By not concentrating so much on calories, you begin to develop a diet for life. At
