### Hunting Accident Fatal To Young Iuka Boy

An Iuka youth died Tuesday morning from injuries suffered in a hunting accident.

Jay Darwin, 9, of Iuka died at about 8:30 a.m. Tuesday, January 3, 1995 at Le Bonheur Children's Hospital in Memphis

from a gunshot wound suffered during a hunting accident on Monday morning. According to reports Jay Darwin and his father, Sammy Darwin, were hunting on a relative's land, just off Highway 25 North of Iuka when the youngster apparently

tripped and fell while holding a .22 caliber rifle. The gun discharged and the boy was struck in the throat.

Jay was taken to Iuka Hospital and then airlifted to Le Bonheur Hospital.

The holiday season has been saddened by this tragic death of Jay. He was loved by his classmates and teachers at Iuka Elementary School and was a favorite fan to the students at Iuka Middle School and Tishomingo County High School.

James Samuel (Jay) Darwin, III died January 3, 1995 at Le Bonheur Children's Hospital in Memphis.

Services will be at 1:00 p.m. Thursday, January 5, at Iuka United Methodist Church. The Revs. Bud Gordon and Frank Burton will officiate. Burial will be in Oak Grove Cemetery in Iuka. Cutshall Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

Survivors include his parents Sammy and Teresa Darwin of Iuka; three sisters, Nikki, Beth and Kinsley Darwin, all of the home; Grandparents, Burnette and Jackie Bryant of Iuka and Mollie Darwin and the late Jimmy Darwin of Corinth.

Jay was a third grade student at Iuka Elementary School, a member of Iuka United Methodist Church, Pep Club, active in Little League Baseball, soccer and basketball. He wanted to be a jet ski racer.

Those planning to run in this year's Tishomingo County elections have until March 1, 1995 at 5 p.m. to qualify.

Some candidates have thrown their hats into the ring this week. These early qualifiers are as follows:

For the office of SHERIFF, three have qualified so far. They are David Smith, Donald Deaton, and Amos Bates. For the office of CIRCUIT CLERK, four have qualified including Lynn McBride, Donna Dill, Horace Ledgewood, and Mack Wilemon. For the office of CHANCERY CLERK, only Hayden Ables has qualified at this time. For the office of TAX ASSESSOR/COLLECTOR, Gaylon Lovelace has qualified. For the office of JUSTICE COURT JUDGE- North Half, only J.R. Blakney has qualified. For JUSTICE COURT JUDGE-South Half, Willie Joe Sparks is the only qualifier so far. In the race for SUPERVISOR of the third district, Danny Ryan and Michael Busby both have qualified. In the race for CONSTABLE-North Half, Tim Bivins is the only qualifier at this time.



**Railroad Trestle Now In Use** — This newly completed trestle over Indian Creek in Iuka was built by Norfolk Southern Railway at a cost of about \$500,000. A culvert system, used for many years, is believed to have aided in the flooding of Mineral Spring Park and the surrounding area.

### New Railroad Trestle Near Iuka Spring Park Should Ease Flooding

A new railroad trestle, built to relieve flooding problems of Indian Creek, has been completed in Iuka by Norfolk Southern Railway.

Norfolk Southern Trainmaster Kenny Barnes of Corinth said that after the Memorial Day flooding of three years ago in Mineral Springs Park and surrounding areas, a study was done by his company, the Army Corps of Engineers and the City of Iuka to determine the best way to prevent this flooding from occurring in the future.

"Although the results of the study were inconclusive, it was believed that replacing the culvert system with a trestle might alleviate the problem," Barnes said. "So Norfolk Southern agreed to do this."

The approximate cost of the project was \$500,000.00, Barnes confirmed. In exchange for building the trestle, which is located between the McKinney and Iuka railroad crossings, the City of Iuka agreed to close two grade crossings. The two crossings which will be closed include the Main Street crossing in town Iuka and a crossing West of town near the Industrial Park, according to Barnes. The railroad company also agreed to donate a piece of property near the downtown crossings to the City of Iuka as a part of the cooperative effort between the two entities.

Although the trestle is in use now, a few finishing touches to the area are still underway. "We still have to remove an old culvert that the trestle was constructed over," Barnes said. "I am very happy about the completion of the project, which has been going on for about 2 1/2 years." Barnes stated. "This is the first time we've worked together with the City of Iuka on a project and we feel it has been a successful effort."



**Crossing To Close** — The Main Street railroad crossing is one of the crossings scheduled to be closed by the City of Iuka in exchange for the construction of the new trestle and the donation of a portion of land to the city in the downtown area. The other crossing to be closed is west of Iuka near the Industrial Park.

perpetual energy and competitive nature carried over to friends, teammates and teachers but never suppressed his sportsmanship or good attitude.

An honor student at Iuka Elementary, Jay was a member of the gifted program, class officer, class favorite and was a friend to all. He was a striking example of a Cub Scout: honest, loyal, trustworthy, with a special love of God, family, community and country.

Most recently, he made us all giggle and grin with the simple line, "Oh yeah," in his performance as Tambourine in The Mission's Children's Theatre Production of Snow White.

Although he was only with us 9 short years, he gave his family and friends a lifetime of joy and happy memories, "Oh yeah."

### Out of Court Settlement Reached In Suit Against County Officials

An out of court settlement has been reached in the wrongful death lawsuit filed by the family of Sharon Duckett against former Sheriff Johnny Nunley and the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors.

According to the attorney for Nunley and the Board, Lawson Hester of Jackson, the case was recently resolved, but he declined to release any details of the case including the amount of any monetary settlement that was

reached.

The original suit, for a total of \$9 million, was filed by the father of Sharon Duckett, Walter Williams and her two sons, Walter James Williams Jr. and Albert Jermaine Duckett after her April 3, 1993 death at the hand of Tishomingo County Jail trusty Leon Powell, 52. Powell, who was serving a 20 year sentence on a manslaughter conviction, drove to the Iuka Hospital in a van owned by the Sheriff's department to pick up the prisoners' meals. While there Powell shot Williams, a dietary worker at the facility, then drove a short distance away and shot himself.

Another defendant in the case was former commissioner of the Mississippi Department of Corrections Eddie Lucas. Lucas was included because Powell was committed to the custody of the state prison system after being convicted of manslaughter. Since Lucas was in charge of overseeing prisoners assignments to facilities, the suit alleged that Lucas breached his duties. He was later dropped from the suit.

## Home Economics Tips

**TIPS FOR BUILDING CHILDREN'S SELF-ESTEEM**  
How can parents and professionals help ensure that children will be responsible for their education, leisure time use and overall well-being?

Dr. Robert B. Brooks, Assistant professor of psychology at Harvard Medical School, believes that adults can help by fostering children's self-esteem. He says children will have greater self-esteem if they feel a sense of ownership and responsibility for their experiences.

Many children don't have that feeling. They think in terms of "I have to go there. I have to do this. I have to do homework." It is important to their success and self-esteem that they feel they have a personal, vested interest in their activities. Brooks offers three tips for fostering self-esteem.

1. Provide the freedom to make mistakes.  
One roadblock to feeling vested is not having the freedom to make mistakes. Adults should admit they make mistakes and talk about the nature of making

mistakes -- the fear, the intimidation and what it does to people. It is a fear that interferes with emotional development and with trying new things.

Brooks recommends that adults ask children what they think are appropriate actions to take when people make mistakes. "Ask them, should we insult them and make fun of them?" Chances are children will answer no. An open discussion of their fears can teach children that mistakes are normal and a part of learning.

Children with good self-esteem seem to believe that mistakes are experiences to learn from rather than be defeated by. Children who do not perceive mistakes that way feel helpless. Thus, their mistakes really do turn out badly.

Brooks says these children become class clowns, class bullies, they retreat, they use drugs, they become self-destructive...It's learned helplessness—that feeling that regardless of what I do, I cannot bring about positive change.

2. Help them make a contribution.

Self-esteem stems from feeling valued. Finding that island of competency and offering ways for children to contribute can help them build self-esteem. The feeling that you are contributing is very powerful.

"Many children and adolescents are drowning in an ocean of inadequacy. They feel they are not competent," Brooks says. "I believe every child in the world has at least one small island of competency, one area which can serve as a source of pride."

Brooks tells about a little boy who sat in the bushes every day and refused to go into the school. The boy said he like bushes better than he like school. Brooks asked the boy what he enjoyed doing.

The boy said that he really like caring for his pet dog. So the school principal invited the child to care for the school's pet rabbit.

"This kid who thought he had nothing to contribute wrote a manual on taking care of pets," says Brooks. "By the end of the school year this kid had lectured to every class in school, and he told me the bushes were not excited anymore."

3. Give children a choice.  
Children surely will not develop a sense of ownership and responsibility if other people always decide what children will do and when and how they'll do it. Real choices, appropriate to children's ages, also permit them to experiment, make mistakes and learn in nonthreatening situations.

"Anything can be a choice," Brooks points out. "Anything can be a decision. I read one article that said if you give kids a choice of writing in blue ink or black in they'll write more than if you just tell them to write."

## County Agents Notes

**LANDSCAPE PLANTS AND ROOT KNOT NEMATODES**

Root knot nematodes can be a problem in your landscape plants. These microscopic worms attack a wide range of woody landscape plants to include azalea, gardenia, boxwood, flowering dogwood, camellia, Japanese holly, rose, weigela, forsythia, and a good many others. Other hosts include flowering plants such as begonia, chrysanthemum, clematis, dahlia, geranium, and peony. Landscape plants affected by root knot nematodes are likely to be stunted and often show symptoms of nutrient deficiency. During the growing season, wilting may occur even though soil moisture is adequate. Homeowners should suspect root knot nematode problems on landscape plants which still remain unthrifty despite adequate water and fertilization. The root swellings can easily be observed by gently lifting the root system of unthrifty plants from the soil. The usual remedy for root knot affected plants is removal and destruction of both plants and soil and replacement with nematode-free soil and a healthy plant. Nematicides (chemicals applied to the soil to control nematodes) are generally no longer available for use by homeowners, but some nematicide products are still available at many garden supply stores. When applied according to label directions, they may help control root knot nematodes. Homeowners who wish to verify the presence of a root knot nematode infestation may also do so by collecting a soil sample from around the roots of plants. The sample may then be analyzed for root knot and other nematode pests free of charge at the Mississippi State University Nematode Diagnostic Laboratory. Check with the Ex-

tension Office for sample collection instructions and additional information on how to manage pest problems in the home landscape.

**WINTER CARE OF FRUIT TREES**

Insect control on fruit trees is primarily restricted to the control of scale. Using a recommended dormant oil spray twice about seven to ten days apart will work fine. Make sure you get complete coverage on all limbs and trunk. This can be applied anytime after leaves have fallen and before buds begin to swell in the Spring. Always read label precautions. I prefer to wait until February to prune, but if you have broken or dead limbs, it is okay to remove and burn them now.

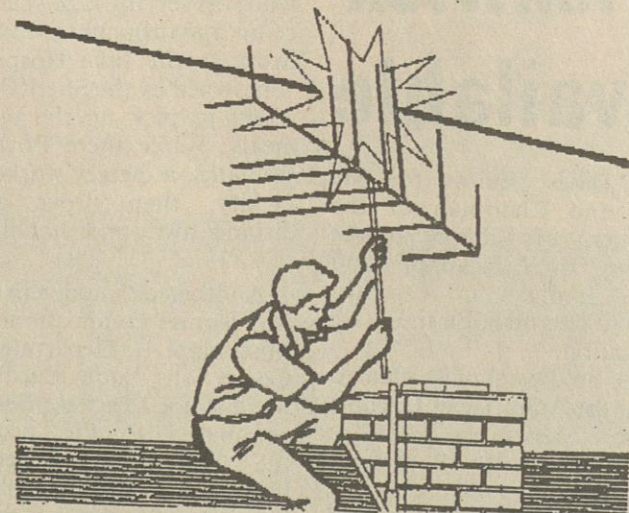
## SAFETY FIRST

**ON "STORE-BOT" GLASSES**  
Reading glasses are sold in drug stores and "five and dime" stores. They are called "magnifying readers." These non-prescription "magnifiers" should not replace an eye examination. Those between the ages of 45 and 65 should have one regularly.

An eye exam can do more than confirm that you may need reading glasses. The eye doctor also checks for glaucoma, which can lead to partial or total blindness. This disease is more common after age 40 and often, there are no warning symptoms. The doctor also looks for the start of cataracts, which can cloud the lens and early signs of retinal disease.

Over-the-counter glasses are not suitable for everyone. Many people need a different corrective lens for each eye, others need a correction for both near and far distance vision. Bottom line: The easy availability of non-prescription glasses should not deprive you of the protection afforded by regular eye examinations.

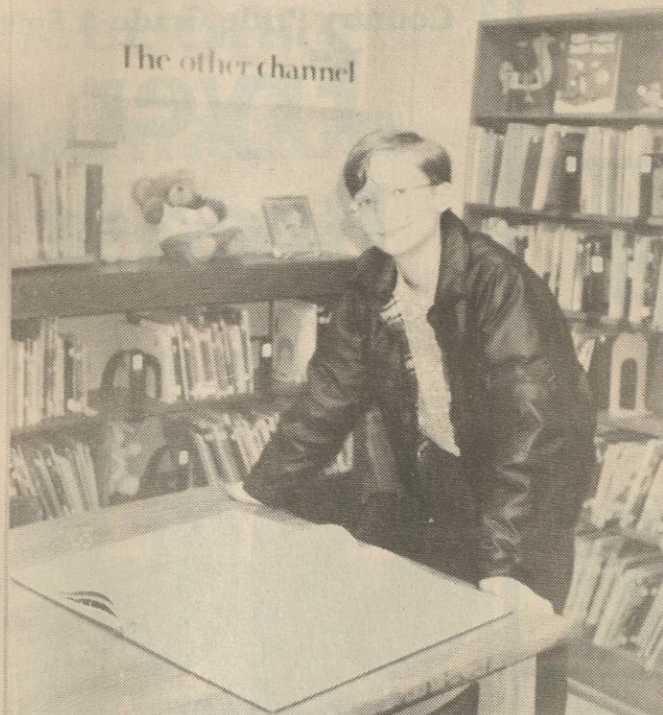

### Steven McCallus Wins Tishomingo Middle School Geography Bee - Moves One Step Closer to Winning \$25,000 Scholarship

Steven McCallus, a seventh grade student at Tishomingo Middle School, won the school-level competition of the National Geography Bee on December 7, 1994, and a chance at a \$25,000 college scholarship. The school-level Bee, at which students answered oral questions on geography, was the first round in the seventh annual National Geography Bee, which is spon-

sored by National Geographic World and Chrysler Corporation.

The kick-off for this year's Bee was the week of December 5, with thousands of schools around the United States, the District of Columbia, and five U.S. Territories participating. The school winners, including Steven, will now take a written test: up to 100 of

the top scorers in each state and territory will be eligible to compete in their state Bee April 7. The students who participated in the finals of the Tishomingo school bee were: T.J. Dunn, Vickie Sullivan, Chris Puckett, Grant Gatlin, Daniel Parrish, Eugenia McKee, Jessica Jordan, Eugenia Long, Jessie Green, and winner, Steven McCallus.

The National Geographic Society will provide an all-expenses-paid trip to Washington, D.C., for state champions and their teacher-escorts to participate in the National Geography Bee national championship on May 30 and 31. The first-place national winner will receive a \$25,000 college scholarship; the second-place winner, \$15,000 scholarship; and the third place winner, a \$10,000 scholarship.

Alex Trebek, host of "Jeopardy!", will moderate the national finals, which will be presented by Maryland Public Television as a prime-time special on most Public Broadcasting Service stations May 31. Check local listings.

The National Geographic Society developed the National Geography Bee in Response to a growing concern about the lack of geographic knowledge among young people in the United States. A 10-country Gallup survey conducted for the Society in 1988 and 1989 found that people in the U.S. ages 18-24--the youngest group surveyed--knew less about geography than young people in any of the other countries in the survey.

The National Geographic Society, with 9.2 million members, has as its mission the "increase and diffusion of geographic knowledge." In addition to the National Geography Bee, the Society sponsors a number of other geography education initiatives, including summer geography institutes for teachers, the National Geographic Society Education Foundation, and the Geographic Alliance Network, which is currently working in every state, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and Canada.

### Health Centers To Conduct Health Status Study

North Mississippi Health Services in cooperation with Magnolia Regional Health Center, is conducting a regional checkup to determine the health status of the people in 27 counties in north Mississippi and north-west Alabama.

"We are conducting a comprehensive community health assessment to determine the health status of area residents in order to identify ways to improve their health," said Shelly Johnstone, North Mississippi Medical Center Marketing Director who is coordinating the implementation of the health assessment.

The assessment, which will be performed by clinical volunteers, will be based upon a random sample survey that will be conducted door-to-door in 27 counties and will reach 2,300 households. The assessment will be conducted from mid-November through April, She said.

"We are pleased to be a part of this comprehensive health assessment because it will benefit all the citizens of this area. Magnolia Regional Health Center will provide assistance in conducting surveys in Alcorn, Prentiss, Tipton and Tishomingo Counties," said Rohn Butterfield, Magnolia Regional Health Center Chief Executive Officer.

The Health Services Research Division at the University of Mississippi developed the survey and will analyze the findings. HSRD has been involved in the

planning, development, implementation and evaluation of preventive health programs for 13 years.

Dr. Dennis Frate, research professor in the Research Institute of Pharmaceutical Sciences and coordinator of the Rural Health Research Program at the University of Mississippi, speculates "based on geographic scope, this project is probably the largest independent, non-federally funded health assessment ever conducted by a private company."

"In addition to identifying the health problems encountered by rural Mississippians, the assessment will provide information on the contributing factors, such as poverty, lack of access and lifestyles, that contribute to or cause health problems," Frate said. "The results will provide a regional and county-by-county look at the health status of residents."

"NMMC will take the findings and develop health profiles for each county and the region as a whole. The health profiles will identify the programs and services needed to help area residents maintain or obtain good health," Johnstone said. A thorough understanding of the health status of our general population is vital for the development of intervention strategies that can prevent disease and trauma. These findings are especially important as the move toward managed care shifts the emphasis from the treatment of illness to prevention and early intervention."

The assessments will be conducted by North Mississippi

Health Services and Magnolia Regional Health Center employees and other interested persons who are volunteering their time. "These dedicated volunteers will be conducting a survey that will help us identify the most common health problems in this 27-county area," Johnstone said.

The 27 counties that will be included in the study are Alcorn, Attala, Benton, Calhoun, Chickasaw, Choctaw, Clay, Grenada, Itawamba, Lafayette, Lee, Lowndes, Marshall, Monroe, Noxubee, Oktibbeha, Pontotoc, Prentiss, Tipton, Tishomingo, Union, Webster, Winston and Yalobusha in Mississippi, and Franklin, Marion and Lamar in Alabama.

The volunteers will ask each participant a series of questions that will provide demographic information, a health history and a profile of their lifestyle and health habits. Each adult member, age 18 or older, of the randomly selected households may participate in the study. In return for their participation, community health assessment participants will receive a packet of information with literature on health matters.

### Government Should Address Known Health Risks

In an ABC news special called *Are We Scaring Ourselves to Death*, John Stossell reported the story of a Colorado ski community's battle with the Environmental Protection Agency.

Robert Hunter, a doctor in the community said, "The government, at this point, has taken a teeny bit of data and exploded it into an \$8 million mistake."

It all started in 1986 when EPA scientists said Smuggler Mountain was "contaminated" with lead left in the soil from silver mining 100 years ago.

Naturally, when the citizens of the community learned about the problem, they were terrified. The EPA had warned the residents that they had likely accumulated dangerous levels of lead in their blood from the "contaminated" soil.

But over time, the citizens of the community became skeptical. Searches of medical records uncovered no cases of lead poisoning in the town's history, and blood tests found the residents' lead levels to be among

the lowest in the country.

Dr. Hunter said, "What I've told the EPA is that if you want to save lives in the valley, build us a new road. Our road is what kills people up here." Over the last five years, there have been thousands of serious injuries and 21 deaths on the road to which Dr. Hunter is referring.

But instead of taking Dr. Hunter's common sense approach, the government continued its push to spend millions of dollars to dig up, and remove, much of Smuggler Mountain. Rather than spending the money on a new road which would make a tangible difference by saving lives, the government would rather spend millions based on a hunch by a few scientists on an environmental crusade.

The government should spend taxpayers' money on "real hazards" rather than hazards conjured up by environmental activists.

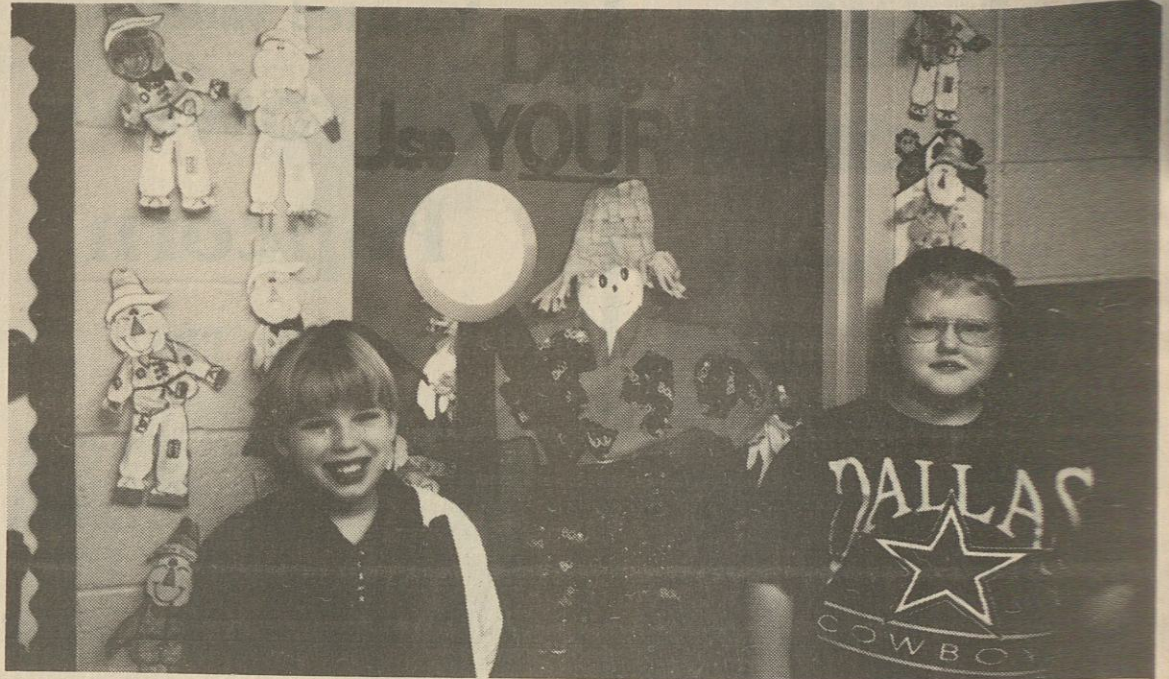

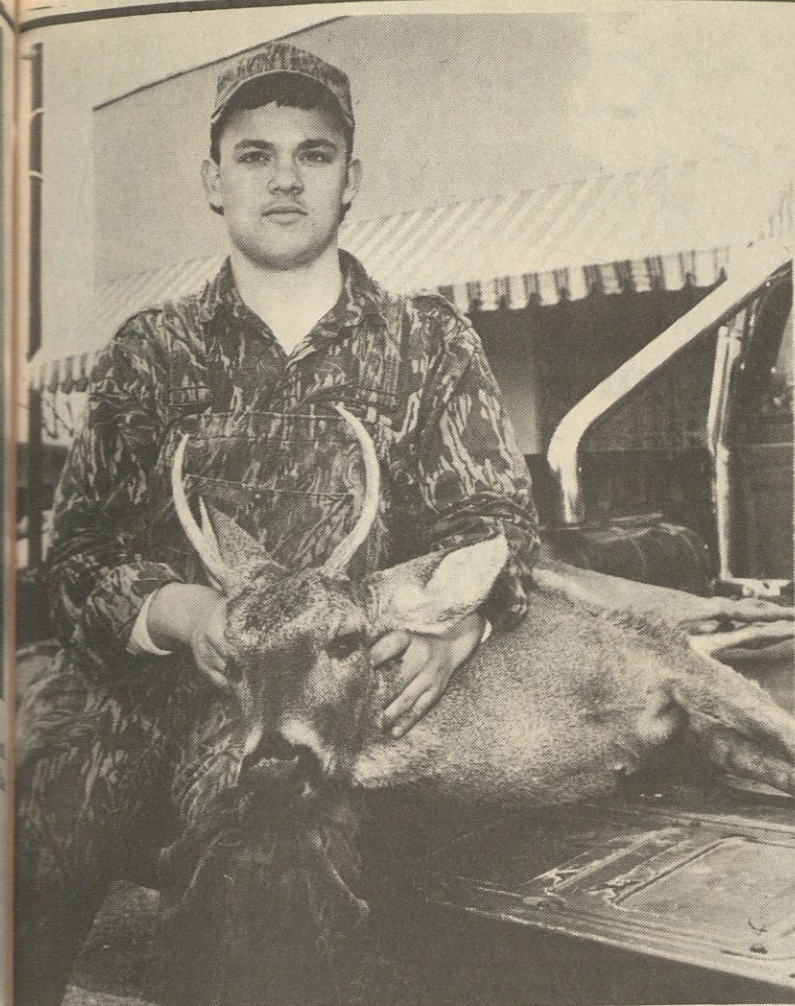

### Dangerous Drugs Under Your Kitchen Sink

Children do not have to go far to find ways to get high on drugs. All they have to do is look under the kitchen sink or open a few closets or cupboards in your home.

Experts have labeled more than 1,000 household products as inhalants -- chemical substances which people can breathe to get a chemical high. Glues, liquid paper, nail polish remover, paints and paint thinners, propane for your barbecue, even some aerosol sprays not only can be used to get high, but are being used this way by a growing number of children and teenagers.

Experts are now calling the widespread use of dangerous inhalants a full-blown epidemic. Around 17% of all American children in the eighth grade have sniffed an inhalant at least once, and about 5% have done this at least once in the last month. In 1975, 10.3% of high school seniors had sniffed. Since then the numbers have steadily risen so that today, 16.6% report having used inhalants.

Keeping kids off dangerous drugs cannot be accomplished by simply cracking down ferociously on drug pushers. Nor does it work to simply tell children to "just say no" to trying a drug. This is something the Narconon Drug Prevention Program has discovered in the last decade through talking about drugs with hundreds of thousands of children in schools.

What does help, however, is effectively educating children on how drugs work and why so many people are attracted to cigarettes, alcohol and other drugs including inhalants.

drop of pure nicotine found in cigarettes--these are also a drug incidentally--would kill one if injected into the blood stream. In more than half of the deaths due to inhalants, users sniff the poison and their heart stops beating within minutes.

Each Drug has its own particular liabilities and inflicts different kinds of physical damage. But the full extent of the harm was only recently realized.

American author and philosopher, L. Ron Hubbard, discovered that a great many drugs are not fully eliminated from the system. Poisonous drug residuals of even organic drugs like marijuana can lodge in the fatty tissue of the body and remain there for years and even decades. expect our children to do what we say and not what we do. What children do though is what they see, not what they hear. So what does work is being a good example as a parent and effectively educating them on what drugs are, how they effect the body and the mind and what the long term effects are. With honest information on all drugs children will be able to see for themselves the inherent dangers that drugs pose, especially inhalants.

If you find that your child is using inhalants or other drugs, this too is not the end of the world. New breakthroughs in the field of drug rehabilitation that were made by L. ### Reorganization Brings New Names For USDA Agencies

Some familiar U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) agencies have new names under the department's reorganization, but the same work continues, according to George E. Irvin, Sr.

George E. Irvin, Sr., who has been serving as the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) state director for Mississippi, is now the acting Rural Economic and Community Development (RECD) state director.

Congress passed a bill authorizing the reorganization late in September, and Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy issued orders making the changes on October 20.

"The entire USDA was reorganized in an effort to provide better service to the public while reducing the number of agencies required to do this," Irvin said.

"Over the next five years, savings to the taxpayers will total \$3.6 billion through the elimination of 14 separate USDA agencies and staff reductions of up to 11,000 nationwide."

Irvin said the FmHA and the Rural Development Administration (RDA) are being abolished and most of their loan and grant programs are being taken over by RECD title.

The farm lending, rural housing, water and waste disposal, community facility, and business and industry programs formerly administered by FmHA or RDA will still be available at the newly named RECD offices. The farm loan programs will become part of a new Farm Service Agency created under reorganization.

"For the time being, people

wanting these important services should go to the local office that probably will still have a Farmers Home sign out front," Irvin said. "As additional changes are made, we will be letting the communities know about them."

Forestry Commission

Receives Federal Funds

The Mississippi Forestry Commission is expecting to receive approximately \$50,000 in Federal funds for sub-granting to rural communities under the Community Fire Protection Program for Fiscal Year 1995, according to William Lambert, Chief, Forest Protection, for the Agency.

Communities or rural fire departments interested in making application for funds are advised to take prompt action to request a grant. Applications are available by writing or calling Al Johnson, Mississippi Forestry Commission, 301 N. Lamar Street, Suite 300, Jackson, MS 39201 (Pho:601-359-2808). Completed applications must be received (attn: Al Johnson) at the above address no later than 5:00 p.m. on February 24, 1995.

Applications must be signed by the Chief Executive Officer (Mayor of City or Town, President of Chartered Rural Fire Department, etc.) of the entity making application. Applications not signed by the Chief Executive Officer will be returned without action.

The completion date for approved projects is August 31, 1995.

Applicants should not call to inquire on the status of their application. All applicants will receive notice of approval or non-approval as quickly as the Federal funds have been finally approved.

Plant A Tree For Fresh Air, Cleaner Water & The Wonders Of Wood

Mississippi's twenty-first (21st) annual "Celebration of Trees" is scheduled for February 10-16, according to Harold Prather of Meadville, 1995 Tree Planting Week (TPW) Chairman.

Mississippi's first statewide Tree Planting Week was held in February, 1975, with the event's enthusiastic founder, the late businessman - tree farmer, L.L.

("Moon") Mullins of Starkville, serving as Chairman.

The annual event includes Arbor Day school programs, planting ceremonies on school grounds, county courthouse lawns, city streets and private homesites. Tree Planting Week - 1995, is being proclaimed as: "Plant a Tree for Fresh Air, Cleaner Water and the Wonders from Wood," by Governor Kirk Fordice.

Tree Planting Week in Mississippi has seen statewide participation grow from 49 counties in its inaugural year to annual tree planting activities being held in virtually all 82 counties over the last decade.

Tree Planting Week Chairman Prather said that an average of 450 schools have been participating each year involving nearly 70,000 children. Since 1975, nearly 20 million tree seedlings have been given away by County Tree Planting Week committees, led by the local Soil and Water Conservation Districts and cooperating volunteers from local forestry and civic organizations.

Free and/or inexpensive seedlings should be available in each county during the week. Watch for details in your local paper and listen for information on local radio or T.V. Local Soil Conservation Service, County Forester, and County Agent offices should also have information on how to obtain a few trees to plant during the special week.

## Produce Section Offers New Convenient Choices

Even though I always encourage growing your own vegetables, it is impossible to grow everything you need. Have you taken a good look at the vegetable display cases in the grocery stores recently? They're changing, not just in shape, color or arrangement, but in what they display.

You still find lettuce, radishes, green onions, peppers and the basics we've all come to expect, but more choices are available than before.

Fresh herbs are a good example of this change. It wasn't so long ago that all you found was parsley, garlic, hot peppers and occasionally ginger. Today you have fresh cilantro, dill, oregano, rosemary, thyme, mints, basil and others. You're no longer restricted to just dried herbs in bottles and cans.

One of the biggest changes in fresh produce in recent years is the appearance and rapid expansion of "fresh cuts." The first fresh cut choices were bagged mixes of fresh chopped green cabbage, carrot scrapings and a little red cabbage for cole slaw. All you had to do was add the dressing.

Today, fresh cuts are taking over an increasing portion of the vegetable display. In addition to cole slaw, fresh celery and carrot sticks, a vast array of prepared salads and salad-based meals are available as refrigerated fresh produce.

Fresh cuts make meals quicker and simpler because less time is spent in preparation. People working away from home now have the opportunity to stop at the grocery store for a prepared salad as a quick meal choice instead of only fast food hamburgers, chicken, tacos or pizza.

Many fast food places now offer their own salads which probably come in as fresh cut products.

A variety of prepared salads such as garden, gourmet, Caesar and spinach can be found in many markets. Their availability

is sure to increase. The washed, chopped and ready-to-munch salad greens often are accompanied by crunchy, seasoned croutons, salad dressing, a fork and napkin to make a complete one-package meal.

Since variety is the name of the game, some of the salad mixes consist of a blend of iceberg, romaine, red cabbage, carrots and radishes. Another may have just butter lettuce and radicchio, while another just fresh spinach or romaine.

You might find a blend of baby lettuces mixed with a variety of other tender greens, a blend of leaf lettuce and endive or a combination of escarole, endive and radicchio for a stronger flavored salad.

While trimmed broccoli and cauliflower florets have been available for quite some time, fresh broccoli florets now are being combined in packaged meals such as cream of broccoli soup, stir fry broccoli, broccoli pasta salad and broccoli pasta with alfredo sauce.

All the cook has to provide is

the pot, liquid, meat when called for and a little time. Even pasta is in the package.

The availability of fresh produce has expanded so rapidly and been so widely accepted it has even moved into children's market.

If your children won't eat salad, maybe they will when packaged just for a young person with ranch dressing, croutons, an appealing and character on the package and "collectible" toy in every bag. And, to appeal to Mom and Dad, a well displayed "no preservatives" label also is on the package.

Fresh produce is changing make choices more appealing easier to use for time-limited hard-working people. Convenience is the name of the game. If these changes result in consumers eating more vegetables, they are not good for you but for the produce industry as well.

## Mysterious Sculpture Amazes Visitors Touring Gatlinburg's Christus Gardens



Visitors young and old are mystified by the seemingly magical ability of this sculptured face of Christ to turn and face the viewer, no matter where the viewer may be standing. Discovered many years ago in a house in Italy, the carving, by an unknown sculptor, is a focal point of interest in Gatlinburg's famed Christus Gardens.

(DM)—Can a sculpture move its eyes and turn its head? If you say no, visitors touring Christus Gardens, in Gatlinburg, Tenn., may argue with you.

Because it mysteriously seems to face the viewer no matter where the viewer stands, the face of Christ carved into a six-ton block of Carrara marble has become the most-photographed single object in this Smoky Mountain vacation city.

But this "magical" carving is only one aspect of a unique visitor attraction which since its founding in 1960 has been toured by millions from all 50 states and six dozen foreign countries.

Christus Gardens is the fulfillment of a promise by a young man stricken with a life-threatening illness

while in college in the 1950's to promise that if he recovered, he would build a unique memorial to Christ.

A tour of the Gardens takes the visitor into a biblical world of 20 years ago to view scenes from the life of Christ, peopled by more than life-size, startlingly lifelike figures.

The newest addition to the Gardens is the Place of the Parables, a gallery of colorful renderings depicting familiar stories told by Christ to illustrate points to his followers.

## CFSA Farm News

The Tishomingo County CFSA Office began taking applications for the Forestry Incentive Program (FIP) January 3, 1993 and will continue until January 11, 1993. The purpose of the practice is to establish a stand of trees for soil protection, ensure an adequate supply of timber of future years and preserve and improve the environment. The program is designed for cut-over timberland, marginal cropland and improving existing stands of timber. The State ASC Committee has established a maximum limit of 80 acres per applicant due to limited funding. Cost-sharing of 50 percent is available to approved applicants for planting (\$28 per acre) including seedlings. Cost-sharing for site preparation in the form of mechanical or chemical is \$16 per acre for light, \$28 per acre for medium, and \$45 per acre for heavy site preparation. A flat rate of \$28 per acre is available for improving an existing stand of trees or releasing desirable seedlings and young trees. Applicants should not begin site preparation, tree planting, or burning until their application is approved.

Policies for this program are as follows: Cost-sharing is authorized for the establishment of trees that will provide both forest products and improved protection from wind and water erosion, clearing land occupied largely by scrubby bushes of no economic value, only where essential to permit planting desirable tree species, planting must be protected from destruction by fire and grazing. This practice will be required to be maintained for a minimum of 10 years following the calendar year of installment or establishment.

Tishomingo County farmers and landowners may contact the CFSA office or their county forester for program details.

## Unemployment In County Rises

According to Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, unemployment in Tishomingo County rose to 5.5 percent in mid-November. This compares to 4.9 percent in October and 5.8 percent in November of last year.

The civilian labor force numbered 11,020, 60 less than October and 40 less than November, 1993. Approximately 10, 410 Tishomingo county residents held jobs in mid-November while 610 were out of work.

Manufacturing jobs in the county numbered 3,710, 30 less than October, but 10 more than November one year ago. Non-manufacturing jobs numbered 3,720, 10 more than October, but 50 less than November, 1993.

## 'Yo-Yo' Dieting Can Be Avoided

A new year has begun, and you're full of good intentions.

One of your resolutions may be to lose weight by going on a diet. While dieting itself is a challenge, so is the effort to keep the weight off.

So-called "yo-yo" dieting is a too-familiar routine for many people concerned about being overweight. They lose pounds by reducing calories. But once the diet is stopped the weight returns.

In addition, yo-yo dieting has drawn attention of some researchers concerned about its safety. Several studies have shown that people who repeatedly lose and gain weight have a higher overall death rate. They also have a greater risk for heart disease and cancer than some people whose weight remains stable. The American Heart Association points out, however, that other studies have not reported such findings and says that additional research is needed.

Even so, the AHA recommends that individuals try to maintain an ideal weight simply because being obese contributes to diabetes and cardiovascular disease.

The answer may be to gradually reduce the amount of food you eat. By not concentrating so much on calories, you begin to develop a diet for life. At

the same time you lose weight.

Combining physical activity with this strategy is also helpful. Exercise is a surefire aid to successful dieting - and to keeping weight off. Exercise also helps build muscle, which burns

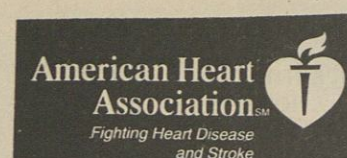
calories more quickly than other tissues.

To sum up, the best advice for a would-be dieter is: Develop healthful eating habits while you are still young, be physically active and reduce fat intake as

much as possible, being certain that the diet is nutritious and balanced.
