

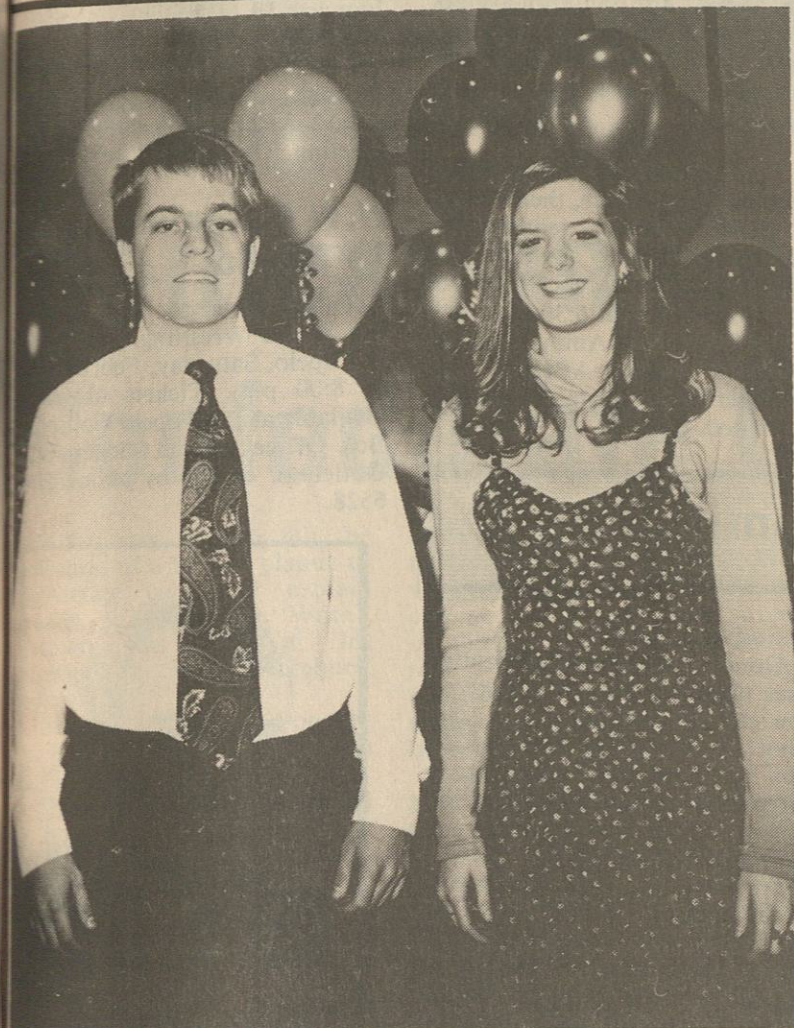

County Deputy Pleads Guilty In Bribery Case

A Tishomingo County ex-deputy has pleaded guilty in federal court Friday, January 6, to concealing bribery information concerning former Sheriff Johnny Nunley.

Benny Parrish, 35, of Tishomingo pleaded guilty to one count of misprision of a felony in Oxford in connection with the bribery case which has already resulted in guilty pleas from former auxiliary deputy Larry Wilson and former Sheriff Johnny Nunley. Apparently Parrish had knowledge of the bribery plot going on between Wilson and a government informant, which also included the former Sheriff, and he did not report this when questioned by federal investigators, reports indicated.

The crime carries a maximum sentence of three years and a \$500 fine, Asst. U.S. Attorney John Hailman stated. Sentencing will take place at a later date by U.S.

District Judge Neal Biggers.

As a part of a plea-bargain agreement with federal authorities, Parrish has agreed to cooperate with investigators and take a polygraph test and testify against anyone else involved in the bribery case or in other federal offenses, Hailman said.

Hailman stated the investigation into the case is ongoing.

RECD Solicits Applications

George E. Irvin, Sr., State Director of the Rural Economic and Community Development Service, announces that the agency is soliciting competitive applications under its Housing Preservation Grant (HPG) program. Eligible entities for the competitively awarded grants include state and local governments, nonprofit corporations, federally recognized Indian Tribes and consortia of eligible entities. This program is only for the eligible entities listed and individuals need not apply.

The HPG program will be available to provide repair and rehabilitation assistance to owner(s) of single or multi-unit rental properties and cooperative housing projects, as well as, homeowners. This is the first time the HPG program will be available to provide repair and rehabilitation assistance to owners of rental properties.

The pre-application should state whether the proposal is to assist individual homeowners, rental property or cooperative housing projects. The pre-application may not combine proposals. The fiscal year 1995 allocation is \$561,100.00 and no more than 50% of Mississippi's allocation may be awarded to a single entity.

Irvin said that the agency began receiving pre-applications on November 22, 1994, and the closing date for acceptance is February 21, 1995. This period will be the only time during the current fiscal year that RECD accepts pre-applications for the HPG program. Pre-applications must be received by or postmarked on or before this date.

SENSITIVITY TO LIGHT

If you're bothered by a sensitivity to light, whether the source is a brightly lighted room or the rays of the sun, you may want to consider tinted glasses or contact lenses.

Sensitivity to light is a common problem among people who have had cataract surgery, though there may be other causes as well. In cataract surgery, a portion of the iris may be removed along with the clouded lens that made the surgery necessary. This is a light filtering source and so is the lens, though to a lesser degree.

Sometimes tinted glasses or contact lenses are needed to compensate for light sensitivity when you're indoors but they don't give you the help you need when you're outside. If this is the case you may want to consider getting prescription sunglasses.

Whatever the cause, whatever the reason, you want to be able to see in comfort. Help is available from your eye specialist.

DORMANT SPRAYS FOR FRUIT DISEASE CONTROL

It appears "Old Man Winter" has arrived and will allow fruit trees in the county to reach a full stage of dormancy. This means that a dormant spray can safely be applied as an important first step in the 1995 fruit disease control program for home orchardists. Peach leaf curl is a good example of a disease where a single application of lime-sulfur applied during the dormant season provides excellent control. A related disease on plums, referred to as plum pockets, is also reduced by lime-sulfur application. In addition lime-sulfur dormant sprays are also effective for most scale insects which attack peaches and plum. Fireblight of apple and pear is a highly damaging bacterial disease that kills blossoms, fruiting spurs, and entire branches, limbs, and trees when severe. The bacteria which cause the disease overwinter in fire blight cankers

and spread to healthy tissues in the spring. Therefore, a dormant spray application of a copper fungicide (available under trade names such as Kocide, Bordeaux Mixture, and others) will help control this disease. Make sure that the brand of copper you purchase is cleared for use on apple and pear trees. Dormant fungicide application is an important part of a control program for other fruit diseases. Visit your local garden supply store, read labels for lime-sulfur and other fungicides for additional application information, and visit us at the County Extension Service Office if you need assistance.

CHECK OUT CHARITIES BEFORE GIVING

Most charities are honest and put their charitable dollars to good use. However, Americans lose millions of dollars to fraudulent charitable groups each year. Before you donate, get some information on how contributions are used.

Any legitimate charity is willing to provide you with a statement of purpose. It will tell you how much of the money they collect actually is used for charity and how much goes for salaries

and administration.

Don't give to any organization that pressures you to donate on the spot. Be wary of groups sending you free gifts in order to get you to donate. Chances are a large part of your donation will go to cover the expense and promotion of the gift.

Avoid giving to charities or organizations which use excessively tearful or emotional appeals. Some solicitors send what appear to be personally written pleas for specific individuals or needy children. Once you contribute, you may receive a letter of thanks that includes an ad-

ditional appeal.

Before you donate:

- *Make sure the charity is registered with the Mississippi Secretary of State Office.
- *Ask if the solicitor is paid a volunteer.
- *Find out exactly how money will be used.
- *Write your check to the organization, not to an individual.
- *Never contribute cash or cash through the mail.

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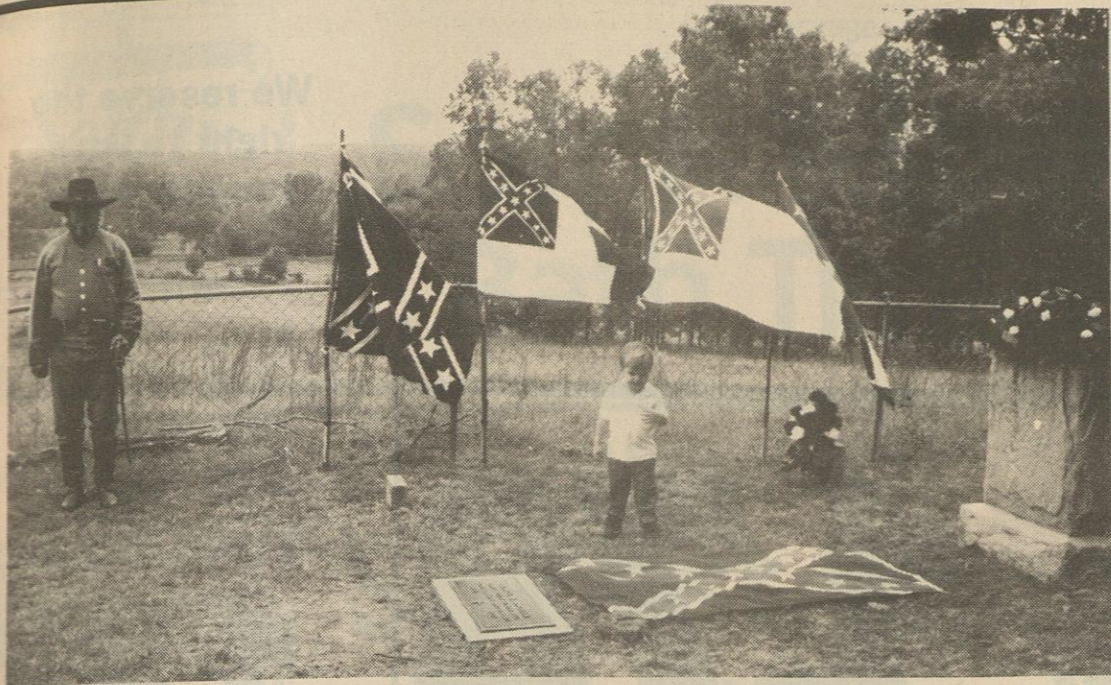

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Confederate Captain Bingham Honored — Pictured at Wash Bingham's gravesite are his great-great-grandson Tyler Thomas and a civil war reenactor from Alabama. Bingham was honored with a dedication ceremony recently in which a bronze plaque was placed at his grave.

Dedication Held For Confederate Captain

On Saturday, October 8th, the dedication of a bronze plaque to Confederate civil war captain George Washington "Wash" Bingham was held at his gravesite in the Whitehurst Cemetery.

The cemetery is located on Co. Rd. 292 (the old Iuka to Glen Rd.) in West Tishomingo County. The ceremony was conducted by Sons of Confederate units from Russellville, AL and Corinth, MS.

"Wash" Bingham enlisted in the Confederate Army as a private on September 1, 1861 in Iuka, MS. He was assigned to the 2nd Corps, Co. F, 26th Regiment, MS Volunteers (Ann Terry Guards). According to military records, Capt. Bingham was engaged in 26 different battles during the war. Private Bingham was wounded during his unit's first few minutes of fighting at Fort Donaldson, TN, on Feb. 13, 1862. The following article written by a soldier in the MS 26th was published in the Confederate Veteran Magazine in 1907 gives some detail of the MS unit during the war.

(Published In The Confederate Veteran, (not sure which month) 1907)

In my feeble way I will write something of the 26th Mississippi Regiment. Every company of the regiment was made up in Tishomingo County, mostly farmers, their ages ranging from eighteen to twenty-five. Many of them could shoot off a squirrel's head in the top of a tree with an old-fashioned rifle. The regiment was organized at Iuka, Miss. Arthur E. Reynolds, of Corinth, was colonel and F. Marion Boone was lieutenant colonel. He was as brave as man as every went to war. About November we were sent to Union City, from there to Bowling Green, Ky., and thence to Fort Donelson, where we received our "baptism of fire" by being marched right up to a line

of battle in file of fours, and were fired on while in this shape. We were on the slant of a little hill, else we would have been swept off the face of the earth. Of course this threw us into temporary confusion, but we soon got straightened out and went at them like veterans.

Right here I saw a case of as pure "grit" as was ever displayed on any battlefield. I saw Comrade Wash Bingham (afterwards captain of the company) shot in the center of the forehead, with blood running down all over his face and in his eyes, support his gun by the side of a tree, squirrel fashion, and fire. We were captured with the rest of the garrison and sent to Camp Morton, Ind. We fared splendidly as long as Colonel Owens was commander of the post. Colonel Owens was colonel of the 60th Indiana Regiment, and a perfect gentleman. He would go to the barracks very often and call the roll himself, and would listen to every request a prisoner had to make. I heard that he said he could pick one hundred men out of that prison and whip his whole regiment.

We were sent to Vicksburg and exchanged in September, and were in many marches and countermarches around Jackson and Vicksburg. We were at Baker's Creek, got out with Loring by marching clear around the Yankee army, and returned to Jackson by way of Crystal Springs. We were with Gen. J.E. Johnstone in the rear of Grant, and later were in the siege of Jackson. In April 1864, after the retreat to Demopolis, Ala., we were sent to Virginia and put into General Davis's brigade. We were called "new issue" by the balance of the brigade. I suppose it was because we had come from the West - the Army of Tennessee.

When the battle of the Wilderness came on, Davis's Brigade was formed just to the left of the Orange plank road. The position

of my regiment was several hundred yards from the road. The fighting commenced near the plank road first, and had been going on for some time. I presume the troops engaged had exhausted their ammunition. The 26th was detached and marched back up the line to take their places. I shall never forget the scene that met our eyes as we marched up to that line - some dead, some lying flat on the ground, still others squatting had been firing at close range on level ground until they had nearly exhausted their ammunition. We had been on the firing line but a short time when Colonel Boone touched the writer on the shoulder and said: "Go tell Captain Gallagher to move forward."

Captain Gallagher was a Mexican War veteran, tall and straight, and as brave as ever drew a sword. When I reached him, he was standing just behind his company, looking straight through toward the front. Just as I was in the act of speaking to him a bullet struck him (I think in the forehead) and he fell dead. I have the order to Lieutenant Luther, and by the time I got back to my company the regiment was on the move. The enemy had a battery a short distance up the road; and when we commenced crossing that road, they began to pour grape into us, which swept a space about thirty yards wide. I don't know whether any other troops charged at the same time or not. We soon came to their line of battle. We halted then, and some other troops camp up and took our places. I saw another officer killed. Just as we commenced to fall back a ball struck Lieutenant Roberts, of Company A, in the back of the head, and he fell dead. We lay on our arms that night in rear of the line of battle.

The firing commenced early the next morning, and we witnessed one of the worst stampedes I ever saw. Davis formed line; and when the stampeded men had all passed, we had orders to fire and fall back, which we did and in good order. It looked as though all was lost, but Longstreet's men came in just at this time and saved the day. We were in reserve until late in the evening, when an Alabama brigade gave way and Davis's Brigade was called on to check the enemy. We met our men just as the top of a hill coming pellmell, the Yanks right after

them with their little "huzzaw". As soon as we passed our men we raised the Rebel yell, and they turned back as suddenly as if they had struck a stone wall. We hadn't gone far when we were ordered to halt, and we threw up together some old logs for breastworks, and the enemy charged us repeatedly the rest of the evening. It was here that we lost our brave and beloved Lieutenant Colonel Boone. We went to Spotsylvania Sunday evening, and were in an engagement about May 10 on our left flank at some mills (I don't remember the name). We were not attacked on the day of the great fight of the 12th, but were in breast-works on the right flank.

The 26th was at Cold Harbor and several smaller engagements around Petersburg and one on the Weldon Railroad, where we lost half of the company engaged in killed and wounded, among whom was our highly esteemed Capt. Phil Hay. He was as kind and smooth in his manners as a woman. I never heard a rough word escape his lips. Davis's Brigade was captured on the 2nd of April, 1865, while holding the right of the works and we were sent to Fort Delaware. We had to live on six crackers and about three or four ounces of meat a day. We left Fort Delaware on June 11, 1865, to return to our devastated homes.

Wash Bingham returned from the war and married Elzora Whitehurst on January 5, 1867. They had seven children: Frances Bingham Gaines, William Walter Bingham, Samuel Russell Bingham, Melvinie Bingham Long, Amanda Bingham Beal, Virginia Bingham Williams and George Taylor Bingham. Elzora Whitehurst Bingham died in 1881. He later married Sarah E. McDonald. George Washington Bingham died in 1927 at the age of 89. There are several descendants of "Wash" Bingham in this area: Great Granddaughter Montez Bingham, Great Grandsons, Gerald Hodge, Bingham Wade and Bob Hodge. Great, Great, Granddaughter Sarah Hodge Thomas. Great, Great, Grandsons Reid Hodge, Blane Hodge, Glenn Hodge and Steve Hodge and Great, great, great grandsons Tyler Thomas, Hoyt Hodge, Dexter Hodge and Ethan Hodge.

Haines Retires After 54 Years With The Postal Service.....

Old habits are hard to break, but as of January 2, 1995, a 54-year tradition in Iuka ended. Gene Haines, a mail carrier for the Iuka Post Office, retired after 54 years of service to the area.

Mr. Haines started working for the postal system in Sheffield, Alabama, on December 13, 1941. After working there seventeen years, he transferred to Iuka. He began delivering the mail on Route 3 on September 6, 1958, where he continued until January of this year.

While with the Post Office, Mr. Haines received the Safe Driving Award and was in the One Million Mile Club. Other accomplishments during his service were the Superior Accomplishment Award; the 50 Year Service Award; the Safe Driver of the Year, Tupelo District in 1974; a

service pin for 3500 hours sick leave accumulation; and the respect and goodwill of his patrons.

Mr. Haines believes that when you meet someone, you should give them a word of encouragement and cause them to smile--you may not have that chance again. This personal philosophy has been apparent in his 54 years of work with both his

patrons and his co-workers. He says, "My fellow employees were always cooperative and understanding. They even laughed at my jokes!" But what he remembers most fondly is the people he has met over the years on his route. These people weren't just boxes on the road; each person on his route was an individual to him. He knew and cared for all his patrons. "The best people in the world live on Route 3, Iuka." These people will find it hard to replace such a dedicated and caring mailman.

"In the beginning was matter, which begat the amoeba, which begat the worm, which begat the fish, which begat the amphibian, which begat the monkey, which begat man, who imagined God. On the other hand, if there is a God, and if the Bible is His inspired word to man as Christians claim it to be, then we are faced with an entirely different situation. Suddenly we come face-to-face with the stark realization that mankind was created with a purpose--and a lifetime to fulfill that purpose. To succeed means joy forever with God in eternity; to fail is to fail throughout all eternity.

Housekeeping

The 1995 legislative session has gotten off to a swift start with money matters, prison needs, and education issues attracting a lot of early attention in the House of Representatives.

Copies of the Joint Legislative Budget Committee's recommendations were placed on legislators' desks shortly before the opening gavels were rapped Tuesday, January 3, in the House of Senate. The 693-page volume also includes the Governor's budget proposals for the fiscal year starting in July 1, along with a new section providing detailed facts and figures from departments and agencies to assist lawmakers in measuring actual performance in various programs.

In addition to financial matters, top issues in 1995 are expected to include crime and corrections, economic development, education, Medicaid funding, possible tax cuts, and a proposed constitutional amendment to limit the terms of state and local officials, both elected and appointed. A total of 507 bills and resolutions were dropped in the

House hopper on the opening day and the number continues to grow. More than 3,000 bills and resolutions are expected to be introduced in both House and Senate before the 90-day session comes to an end in early April.

The Governor was expected to go before a joint session of the House and Senate on Tuesday, January 10, to give his State-of-the-State address and present his 1995 legislative agenda.

Education is expected to be a top legislative priority as it has been in past years. Dr. Tom Burnham, the State Superintendent of Education, met with the Education Committee to discuss teachers salaries, the new Tech-Prep program, and other education matters. The Legislature has approved back-to-back pay raises for teachers the past two sessions, but educators says Mississippi still ranks 50th in the nation in average salaries for teachers and Burnham said a teacher shortage exists in many parts of the state. He said higher salaries would encourage experienced teachers to remain in the classroom and help attract new teachers into the profession. An increase in teachers' salaries is among the main recommendations by the State Board of Education for the 1995 session.

Interim Corrections Commission Stu Murphy and other state prison officials went before the House Penitentiary Committee to submit legislative proposals and review the status of various prison construction projects approved during the special session in August. New housing facilities for more than 4,000 inmates were authorized by lawmakers under a tough-on-crime constructions program last year. By the end of the year, corrections officials said the state is expected to have an authorized capacity for a total of 12,430 prisoners, but Murphy cautioned the prison population continues to increase. He added the state needs immediate space for about 1,000 inmates still being held in county jails.

In other developments during the past week, a Constitution subcommittee approved a proposed constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to pass a law permitting the use of caning and other forms of corporal punishment in criminal cases. If the proposal gains final legislative approval, it would give the voters an opportunity to decide this fall if they want to authorize caning or other types of corporal punishment.

A report on long-term growth and investment in the tourism industry was presented to a joint meeting of the House Ways and Means Committee and Senate Finance Committee; a critical evaluation of Mississippi's assistant reading instructor program was released by the legislative PEER Committee; and an update was given to the House, Insurance Committee regarding dramatic improvements in the workers' compensation program since passage of a far-reaching workers' compensation reform act in the 1992 legislative session.

Legislatures received a detailed presentation on the state's financial outlook for the coming year from fiscal specialists. Generally, state revenues are exceeding revised projections for the present fiscal year and the economy remains strong, but economists said the rate of growth may be somewhat slower in 1995 than last year.

Mrs. Hodge's lecture will expose the true nature of education reform - the takeover of the American education system by politicians, educators and the shift to academics to modification. Her research and comprehensive knowledge has earned her appearances before legislative town meetings and television radio talk shows. Her story has been told in the book, Education for the New World Order by Eakman.
