Candidates Qualify As Deadline Nears

There is less than four weeks left for those wishing to run for public office within Tishomingo County in 1995 to qualify as candidates.

March 1, 1995 is the deadline to qualify this year, according to Mississippi Secretary of State Dick Molpus. This is much earlier than in previous years when candidates had until June to qualify to run.

The First Primary has been set for August 8, to be followed by a run-off primary slated for August 29, if needed. The 1995 General Election will be November 7.

Anyone who is not registered to vote and would like to vote in the August primaries needs to go to the Circuit Court Office by July 8 and register, according to Circuit Court Clerk Gerald Parsons.

City of Iuka Receives \$400,000 Block Grant

The City of Iuka has been awarded a \$400,000 Public Improvements grant, Governor Fordice announced today.

The Iuka grant, on behalf of Tishomingo Health Services, Inc., will be used to provide water and fire protection at the site of its new health care facility. Tishomingo Health Services, Inc., a not-for-profit, non-stock membership corporation, will oversee the hospital and invest \$2.1 million in equipment purchases. The hospital will create 50 jobs.

"I am delighted that the State of Mississippi can help Iuka establish this new health care facility," Gov. Fordice said. "The hospital will serve several counties in the northeast area and create new job opportunities for Mississippians."

Of the 50 jobs created, at least 51 percent will be for low-and moderate-income persons. The

grant is issued through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program by the Mississippi Department of Economic and Community Development (MDECD).

"We are very pleased to assist Iuka with this new hospital which also brings with it new job opportunities for citizens in the area," said Jimmy Heidel, MDECD executive director. "This hospital will enhance the health care services Tishomingo Health Services, Inc. is currently providing to the people in the Iuka area."

"I want to thank Mayor David Nichols and others at the local level who provide the leadership to make this project a success."

The 1994 CDBG program provides funding to localities with populations of 50,000 or less for economic development, housing, public facilities and demonstration projects.

Home Economics Tips

10 STEPS TO HEALTHY EATING AT SCHOOL

Do you know if your kids are eating healthy school meals? The only real way to be sure is to get involved. Show you care. Show the school that what your kids eat matters a lot -- because it does. Here's a checklist of what you can do to get results:

1. Do Lunch with the Kids. Eat breakfast or lunch at school with your kids. See what the meals are like. Notice the atmosphere. If you don't like what you see, do

something.

Talk Out of School. Make your opinions heard. Talk to other parents. Work with your PTA and school board to support healthy school meals.

3. Discuss Your Principles. Go to the principal. Discuss the importance of good nutrition and physical activity. Suggest programs. Ask for cooperation. Follow through.

Know What's For Lunch. Get a weekly menu of school meals. Ask for the nutrition facts so you can be sure the menu meets the official Dietary Guidelines for Americans. Keep in magnetized to your refrigerator. Discuss all the healthy choices with your kids.

5. Team Up with Food Service Staff. Visit the school cafeteria. Get to know the staff. Let them know you value their services and appreciate good daily nutrition for your child.

6. Plant a Seed. Show your kids and their friends where healthy food comes from. Help start an edible landscape with a garden of goodies, like fruits, vegetables and herbs.

7. Throw a Tasting Party. Volunteer to organize a classroom tasting party to introduce and encourage nutritious new foods the kids may never have tried.

8. Set Up a Group. Get involved. Form a parent advisory committee for school meals. Recruit enthusiastic, "can-do" people to work with you.

9. Serve Your Kids Food for Thought. Make sure kids appreciate how healthy breakfasts and lunches serve their minds as well as their bodies.

10. Listen. If you listen to what your kids are learning at school about good nutrition, you can help them put their knowledge to work at home too.

HOW MUCH STRESS IS TOO MUCH STRESS?

Recently, the Tishomingo County 4-H Volunteer Leader Association and the Tishomingo County Cooperative Extension Service sponsored a stress management seminar. Ms. Susan Mullikin, Director of Nursing and Patient Care Services at Parkwood Hospital presented the program. The following are some tips and suggestions she gave the audience for managing the stress in their lives.

Ms. Mullikin gave us these general principles of stress management: 1) Stress is inevitable. There is no way to completely rid one's life of stress; 2) Stress, in and of itself, is positive. Without appropriate levels of stress we would function below our ultimate capabilities; 3) Each of us experiences stress in a unique fashion; 4) Stress management represents a system of restoring balance to our physical and psychological subsystems; and 5) Is stress the problem? NO! It is our tendency as individuals to use ineffective means of restoring balance (i.e. poor stress management) that creates problems. How we choose to handle the situation makes the difference between feeling overwhelmed and finding solution to

the problem.

Five techniques for short circuiting stress were presented in the video "Short Circuiting Stress" by Audiovision. These techniques are: 1) Try to find the positive, even in problem situations; 2) Try to use helpful "self-talk." This is the "conversation" you carry on with yourself when working through the problem; 3) Try to avoid the blame game. Take responsibility for how you manage the stress in your life. Others may create the situations, but you are responsible for how you react to it; 4) Try to shift your focus forward. Remember, this too shall pass; 5) Try to keep problems in perspective. As someone once said, "Don't sweat the small stuff, and it's all small stuff."

Finally, here is a message on Attitude by Charles Swindoll. "The longer I live, the more I realize the impact of attitude on life. Attitude, to me is more important than facts. It is more important than the past, than education, than money, than circumstances, than failures, than successes, than what other people think or say or do. It is more important than appearance, giftedness or skill. It will make or break a company...a church...a home. The remarkable thing is we have

a choice every day regarding the attitude we will embrace for that day. We cannot change our past...we cannot change the fact that people will act in a certain way. We cannot change the inevitable. The only thing we can do is play on the one string we have, and that is our attitude...I am convinced that life is 10% what happens to me and 90% how I react to it. And so it is with you...we are in charge of our Attitudes."

GLAUCOMA WITHOUT SYMPTOMS

If you have a family history of glaucoma or are past the age of forty, your eye specialist probably test for glaucoma as part of a regular examination. Glaucoma is one of the most common causes of blindness, diagnosed early enough it can be effectively controlled. Glaucoma, the fluid pressure inside the eye is greater than normal. Unrelieved, the pressure build until it destroys the optic nerve, resulting in blindness. One of the alarming things about this disease is that it can be controlled WITHOUT ANY NOTICEABLE SYMPTOMS.

In chronic simple glaucoma, example, the pressure builds very gradually. The cause is an imbalance in the eye's drainage system. When aqueous fluid secreted by the lens is blocked or restricted, there is abnormal intraocular pressure. This buildup of pressure has been treated and controlled to prevent serious problems.

About one in 25 people past the age of forty develops chronic glaucoma.

CFSA Farm News

ASCS NAME CHANGED TO CFSA. The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) name has been changed to the Consolidated Farm Service Agency. The new agency will encompass all of the commodity support and basic conservation programs of the former Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), all of the risk management programs of the federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC), and the farm lending activities of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA).

1995 ARP SIGNUP. The signup period for 1995 Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) will be from January 30 through February 10, 1995. Those interested in carrying out a practice should consider the practices needed and the priority or cost-sharing assigned to the different practices before filing a request. No request will be approved until after the signup period and requests are not approved on a first come basis. Select the practice you feel is the most needed on your farm prior to visiting the county office to request cost-sharing. In doing so we hope you will make full use of any conservation play you have developed for your farm. A list of the practices in the county, along with rates of cost-share for performing them is listed below:

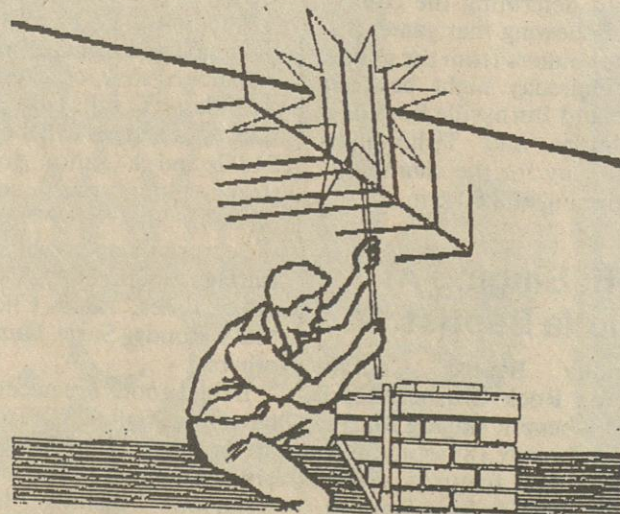
SAFETY FIRST

Many antennas were victims of the recent ice storm. When reinstalling these, be sure to practice good safety measures. Antennas can be hard to handle, so be careful. If an antenna you're installing comes into contact with an electrical line overhead, you'll be off the air, permanently. Make certain that your antenna can't contact any lines nearby; or to be really safe, get professional assistance.

As you go about your task of cleaning-up after the storm, please observe safety. Remember, all lines should be respected and treated as if hot. Do not assume that any electrical wire is without power.

CAUTION WITH MEDICATIONS

Within the last couple of weeks I have talked with a few cat owners that did not know that you NEVER give Tylenol (acetaminophen) to cats. These conversations prompt me to remind all pet owners to use extreme caution in medicating your pet yourself. If you wish to give your pet some type of over-the-counter medication please call us first to check the dosage or even whether it should be given to your pet at all.

Here are some examples of medications to avoid for your pets:
-Again, NEVER give a cat even one dose of Tylenol (acetaminophen). One dose can kill a cat, and treatment for acetaminophen poisoning is expensive and often unsuccessful.

-NEVER give a cat aspirin (ibuprofen) unless directed by your veterinarian. It takes a cat one week to clear one dose of aspirin from its body, so toxic levels are reached quickly.

-NEVER give a dog ibuprofen (Advil) or naproxen (Aleve). Both can cause gastrointestinal bleeding and ulceration.

These are just a few of the medications which can be harmful to pets, so the best rule of thumb is to check with a veterinarian before given a pet any type of medication.

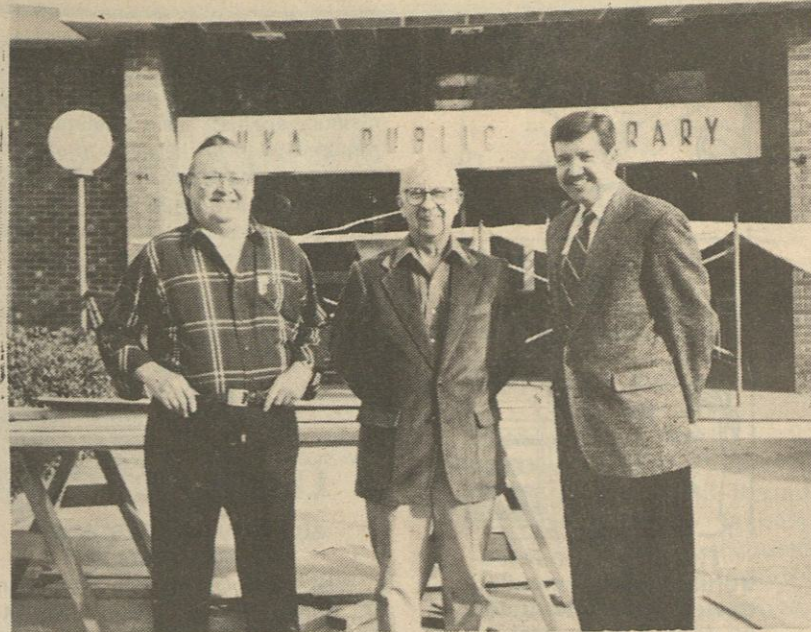
Burnsville Elementary Receives Accreditation

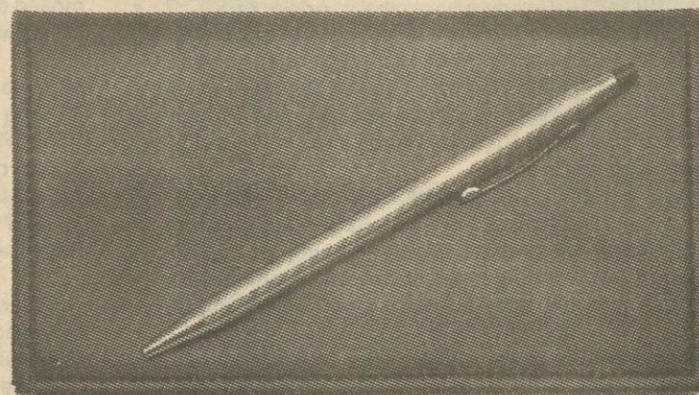

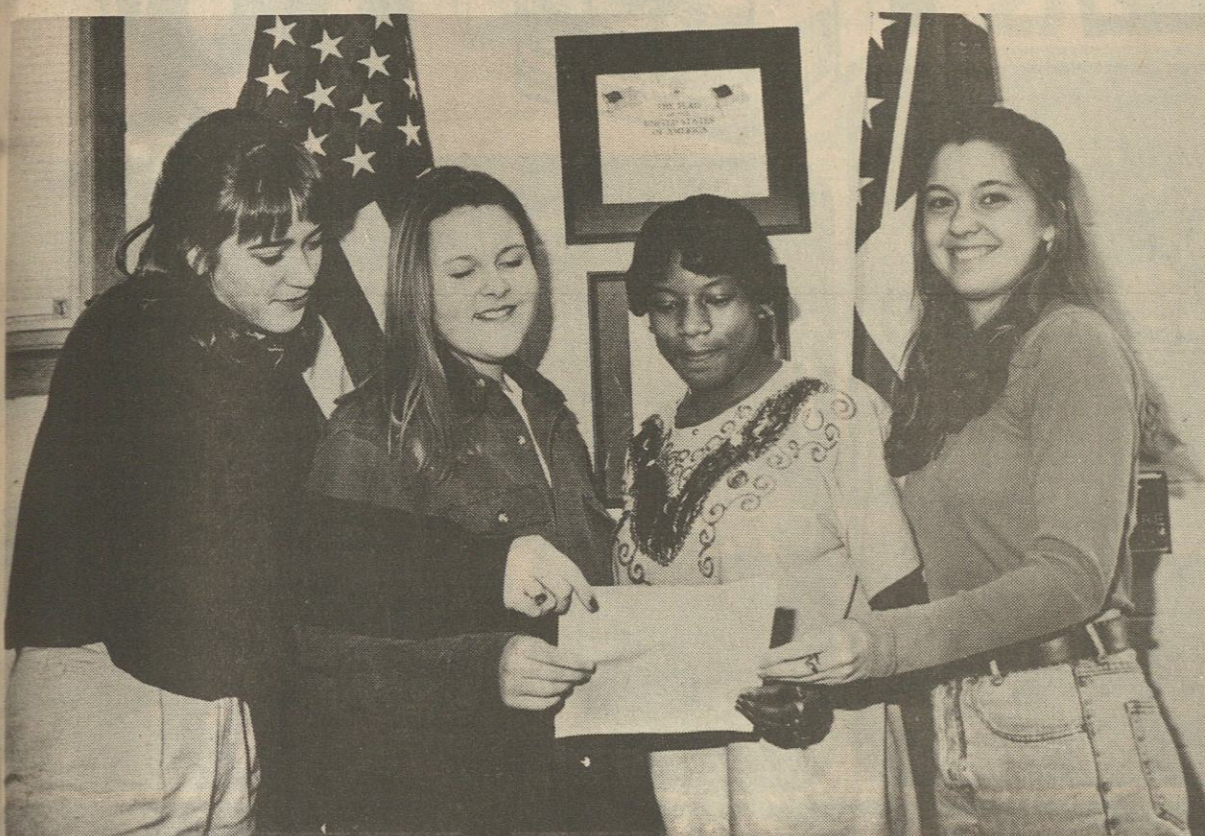

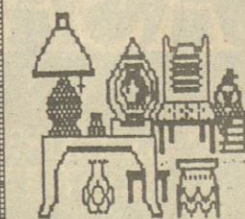

PUBLIC HEARING NOTICE

CLEAN-UP TO CUT-BACK
ON DISEASES

Fungi, bacteria, nematodes, and other microorganisms which cause plant disease problems survive winter conditions with little difficulty on infected plants and debris. Experienced gardeners have learned, however, that a winter or early spring clean-up will help reduce disease carryover. For example, diseases such as black spot of rose, iris leaf spot, and photinia leaf spot can be reduced next season by removing fallen leaves. Early blight and Septoria blight tomato, as well as anthracnose of lima and green beans, are less severe when plants remaining from last season are removed from the garden area and destroyed. Remaining leaf and stem debris should be turned under several weeks in advance of the garden season. Removal of diseased leaves from beneath bunch and muscadine grapes is recommended for reducing black and bitter rot. Leaf removal, along with pruning of diseased and dead canes, cuts down on fungus spore production in the early spring. When these techniques are used along with a season-long fungicide spray program, diseases are much easier to control.

CATTLE LICE

Cattle lice are cool weather insects and prefer to feed on cattle in late winter and early spring. They can be hard on cattle this time of year when cattle are stressed from winter weather. At this time of year, sprays, dusts or pour-on would be preferred. Sprays are more effective than dusts and should be used in the absence of cold weather. Suggest that you not use systemics this time of year to kill cattle grubs. Heavy deaths of large grubs may result in death of some cattle. Applications of malathion, fenvalerate (Ectrin), permethrin (Atroban, Ectiban), or fenthion (Lysoff) may be used for lice control. Read labels carefully.

PESTICIDE CERTIFICATION TRAINING

There will be a Pesticide Applicators Certification Training held Thursday night, February 16, 1995 starting at 6:30 p.m. and ending at 8:30 p.m. at the Tishomingo County Vo-Tech Building. This training is for private applicators who need to be able to purchase Restricted Use Pesticides for their personal use. A private applicator is defined as anyone who applies pesticides on his own AGRICULTURE COMMODITY. If you apply the pesticide on anything other than an Ag Product then it is technically a commercial application. (This is a new definition.) First time certification requires viewing a 2-hour video. Anyone re-certifying is required to view a 1-hour video. Re-certifiers may attend at 7:30 to view their part of the video. Call our office at 423-7016 if you have questions.

New Prisons Aren't Enough To Solve Crime Problem

In an August 1994 special session of the Legislature, \$17 million was allocated for new prisons in an effort to fight the state's growing crime problem.

Most Mississippians agree that more prison space is badly needed; but now that the money to "lock'em up and throw away the key" has been allocated, it's time for the Legislature to look for other measures that would bolster Mississippi's fight against crime.

Research by the Mississippi Economic Council has revealed major problems in the enforcement and administration of juvenile matters.

In Mississippi, law enforcement officials believe that at least half the crime are committed by juveniles. That percentage rises in Hinds County to an estimated two thirds of all crimes being committed by juveniles. Yet, even with these statistics, Mississippi has no statewide uniform juvenile court system.

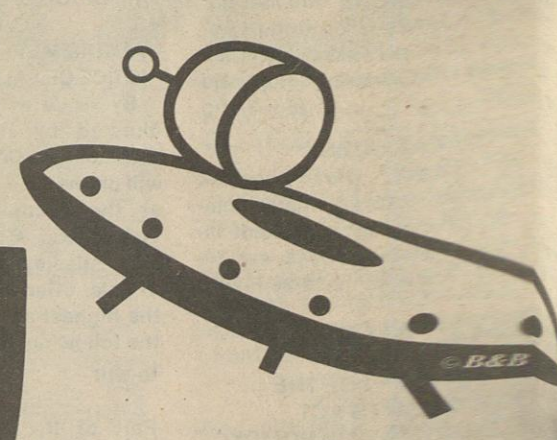
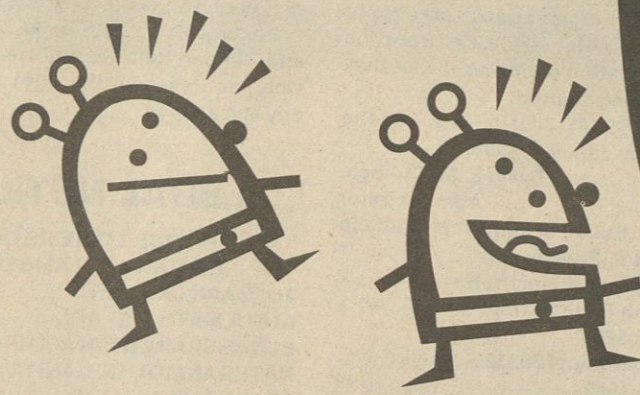
Currently, youth court matters in Mississippi are administered by a diverse collection of presiding officers who hold office under various standards of experience and ability. Such a system is inefficient, inconsistent, and ineffective.

Now that the Legislature has taken the first stab at the crime problem by increasing prison capacity, it's time for another legislative step.

The Legislature should create a standard uniform family/juvenile court system.
