Additional Candidates Qualify For County Sheriff's Office

Four new candidates for the office of Tishomingo County Sheriff have qualified since February 1. These additional candidates include Tommy Timms, Millard Myron Broadway, Steve Rye and Hubert C. Lambert.

No other new candidates have entered the race at this time. The deadline for all candidates to qualify to run for any of the positions to be included on this year's ballot is March 1 at 5 p.m., according to Tishomingo County Circuit Court Clerk Gerald Parsons.

County Students Score Above The U.S. Average

Tishomingo County students scored above the national average on the test they took for the first time in October of the current school year, stated Interim Superintendent Stanley Magill. The scores are compared to a National Norm which is a result of a sample group who took the test in 1992. The sample is chosen to represent the nation in terms of sex, race, and other demographic factors. The National Norm is 50.

On the multiple-choice part of the test, the percentile rank of Tishomingo County scores were:

5	52
6	58
7	54
8	60
9	52

A percentile rank of 54 means 53 percent of the students taking the test nationally scored below that score. This section of the test included reading, language, and math.

On the performance part of the test students had to draw charts, write a paragraph or write out math problems to show they could use the knowledge they had gained. The report also gave teachers information on student performance in different areas, such as summarizing the main idea of a story, distinguishing between fact and opinion, or using an average.

The scores are reported as below average, low average, high average, or above average on the language and math performance

parts. Tishomingo County students scored at high average in grades 4-8, which means a score is in the third quarter of scores nationally; low average in 9th grade language, which means a score is in the second quarter of the scores nationally; and above average in 6th and 9th grade math, which means a score is in the top scores nationally.

Tishomingo County is the only system in the Daily Journal reading area that demonstrated above average in two performance areas, 6th and 9th grade math.

We will utilize this data, school by school, to improve our methods and delivery of instruction and to assess our curriculum. Teachers will meet on February 20th to get the data for children in their classes.

Boyd Rigsby To Hand Over Plant Keys To Thomas Hollon

Rigsby Retires & Hollon Steps Up As Genesco Mgr.

After 44 years of service, Mr. Boyd Rigsby, present plant manager of the Iuka Genesco Plant (Shoe Factory) is retiring and stepping into the head position in his place is Mr. Thomas Hollon. The transition will take place March 3.

Rigsby, who started with General Shoe Company in McMinnville, Tenn. in 1951, said that he had held various positions with the company over the years in locations such as Cowan, Tenn., Frankfort, Ky., Fulton, Miss. and Nashville, Tenn. He came to Iuka in June of 1980. "I have really enjoyed my tenure here in Iuka," Rigsby expressed. "I have had a good workforce and I've come to know a lot of nice people since I've been here. I'm leaving a really good plant." He continued saying that it had been a real pleasure working with the company.

Fishing and traveling are in his plans for retirement, Rigsby said. He will be living in Murfreesboro, Tenn.

New plant manager Tom Hollon has been at the Iuka Genesco Plant since 1981. "Since Tom is familiar with the plant and personnel, the transition should be a smooth one," Rigsby said.

Hollon, originally from Danville, Ky., has been with Genesco for 28 years. He and his wife, Kathy and his children Brad, age 14 and Shea, age 10, live in Iuka. "Operation of the plant will be as usual," Hollon stated.

The shoe plant has been in operation in Iuka for 40 years and presently employs about 300 people. "We plan to make the next 40 years just as successful as the past 40," Hollon said concerning his plans for the future of Genesco.

Cutshall Named Region's 1994 Outstanding Logger

Doug Cutshall of D.L. Cutshall and Sons Logging Co., Inc. in Iuka, Mississippi, accepted the American Pulpwood Association's 1994 Southcentral Region Outstanding Logger Award today at APA's Southcentral Technical Division fall meeting in Jackson, Mississippi. Division Vice Chairman Joe Twardy congratulated Cutshall for leading the professional timber harvesting enterprise judged to exemplify the most progressive practices in forest harvesting in the Southcentral U.S. Stihl Incorporated also honored the winner and presented him with a Stihl model 044 professional chainsaw.

Cutshall began his timber harvesting career over 20 years ago in Tishomingo County, Mississippi, with one truck and a mule. Since then, his operation has grown to include three grapple skidders, a large knuckleboom loader with a delimber, a small knuckleboom for loading delimbed and topped trees, a feller-buncher with a high speed saw, and a bulldozer for road building and reclamation. In addition, he uses three highway trucks, five trailers, and two heavy-duty trucks with all-wheel drive in transport loaded trailers from the woods to the highway, thereby minimizing the impact of logging roads and loading areas, as well as reducing the maintenance on his highway trucks. Such a diverse array of equipment allows his crew to harvest many different types of timber

tracts.

Employee training and experience play important roles in Cutshall's award-winning safety program. His philosophy of thoroughly training each crew member on the safe operation of equipment has kept both his employee turnover rate and his insurance costs remarkably low. Crew members also wear personal protective equipment: hard hats, steel-toed boots, ear plugs, eye protection, high visibility vests, and saw chaps. This attention to safety and training has improved productivity; Cutshall's one crew can produce up to 25 loads per day.

Another reason for Cutshall's success as a professional logger is planning. He takes the time to consider all the factors that must be balanced to maximize production while providing a safe working environment for his employees and protection of the landowner's property and of the environment. As a result, Cutshall has earned the praise of his associates. Don Thompson, district manager for Packaging Corporation of America, states, "His roads, loading areas, and skid trails don't just happen; they are well planned to obtain the maximum efficiency from his men and equipment...He is truly a logger's logger." Besides planning for maximum logging production, Cutshall also plans for the completion of a harvesting operation. He was the first logger in the area to maintain roads with a motorgrader and the first to use Best Management Practices. He and his entire crew have attended a BMP workshop to hone their environmental protection skills.

While setting the standard for

other loggers in his area, Cutshall has improved the public perception of timber harvesting. He and his wife, Irene, Manager of Daily Operations for the family business, are active in community affairs in northeast Mississippi. Charter members of the Tishomingo County Forestry Association, they are deeply involved in educating landowners, foresters, and loggers in the proper ways to manage and harvest timber. Irene Cutshall currently serves as treasurer of the Tishomingo County Forestry Association and Doug, vice president of the Mississippi Loggers Association's Northern District. He was also named Mississippi's Outstanding Logger of the Year for 1994.

Speaking for Stihl Incorporated, James Malone, Territorial Manager of Stihl Southwest, Inc., expressed Stihl's pleasure in being able to honor APA's Outstanding Logger Award winners over the past eight years. Malone stated, "Stihl is proud to recognize excellence in professional timber harvesting."

The American Pulpwood Association's Outstanding Logger Award program is designed to:

- 1) recognize outstanding logging contractor performance;
- 2) raise the visibility of professional independent logging contractors in the forestry community;
- 3) encourage other independent logging contractors to emulate the outstanding performance of the award winners; and
- 4) publicly recognize outstanding logging performance as an essential element of every planned timber harvest.

The American Pulpwood Association Inc. is a nationwide nonprofit trade association responsible for issues that surround the safe and efficient harvest and transportation of forest products from the woods to the mill. APA members include the nation's pulp and paper mills, wood dealers, independent logging contractors who harvest and transport pulpwood and timber, and equipment companies that manufacture pulpwood and timber harvesting and processing equipment.

Home Economics Tips

SILK GARMENTS NEED TLC
If you have a silk garment that is washable, the first step -- before washing it -- should be to pretest the fabric to determine if any changes may occur with washing. Simply wet a small area of a seam or hem, blot with a white paper towel or cloth and evaluate to determine the following:

What happened to the color? It is not unusual for some color loss to occur. You should not allow a washable silk garment to set in water. Wash and rinse quickly. Bright and deep colors will show more color in the water than light or dull colors.

If the garment has more than once piece, wash all of them together. Check printed colors carefully to be sure that the colors did not bleed.

What happened to the look?

Some silks will lose some of their shine or luster and become a little duller after washing.

What happened to the texture? It is not unusual for there to be a change in the texture after washing. Some may be softer, some may be rougher.

What happened to the size? This should not be a problem on garments that are labeled washable -- after all that is your guarantee that the garment is washable. When the care label is followed and the garment fails, you can expect a full refund if the garment is returned. If you used a cleaning method not listed on the care label, there usually is no recourse.

Wash your silks in a water temperature suggested on your label. If there is heavy soil at the neckline or a stain, put the soap directly on the area. Use a mild soap and swish the suds through the silk -- NEVER RUB the area as this will weaken the delicate fibers. Do not wring or cause stress on the wet fibers.

Rinse thoroughly in cool water. Pull stopper and let drain. Place on towels or other absorbent materials to reduce moisture content, turning in about 15 minute intervals. Press while still damp.

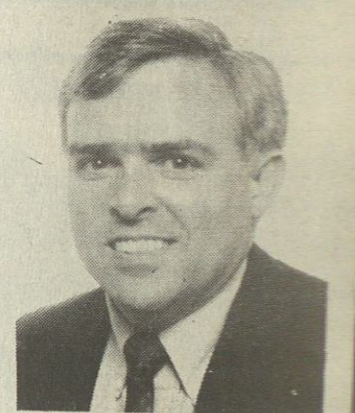

FLASHES = WARNING

The retina is a thin, transparent membrane in the back portion of your eye. Behind the retina is a layer of tiny blood vessels. Retinal detachment occurs if your retina separates from this layer. Each year about one in 10,000 persons in the U.S. suffers a retinal detachment. If this happens, serious - sometimes total loss of vision in the affected eye could result.

Retinal detachment is painless. However, visual symptoms almost always appear before the retina detaches. The sudden onset of flashing light associated with the appearance of new "floaters" (dark of light spots or specks in the field of vision) is a warning symptom of retinal detachment. If you experience these symptoms, seek emergency medical attention.

Surgery is the only effective therapy. If a tear or hold is treated before detachment develops, your vision probably can be spared.

MORE MISCELLANEOUS FACTS

Early diagnosis of an illness - when it is easier and less costly to cure - is a major step in preventing a serious health problem. Become a training observer. If there's a change in your animal's disposition, weight, eating habits or appearance, contact your veterinarian.

A recent study by the American Animal Hospital Association indicates that most dogs have a better than 95 percent chance of surviving heartworm disease if treated. Of course, the earlier the treatment begins, the better the dog's chances of survival.

A dog needs to be clean, but the best way to keep him clean is by frequent brushing - not frequent bathing. Bathing too often or with harsh detergents or shampoos will remove much of the oil in the animal's skin and create problems.

All warm-blooded mammals - including humans - can be infected by and spread rabies. Once symptoms of rabies appear, there is no known cure. The disease is almost always fatal.

Due to certain ecological factors, certain species of animals rarely have rabies. This group includes commercially-raised pets, such as hamsters, gerbils and ferrets, as well as certain wildlife, such as squirrels, rabbits, chipmunks, opossums, rats and mice.

Tishomingo Elementary Receives Accreditation

The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, through its Commission on Elementary and Middle Schools, has awarded accreditation to Tishomingo. The announcement was made during the Association's 99th Annual Meeting in San Antonio Decem-

ber 11-14, 1994.

Accreditations is based upon an evaluation of each school to determine if the needs of the students and community as well as the standards of the Commission on Elementary and Middle Schools are being met. The evaluation process includes a self-study by each school's faculty and a review by a visiting com-

mittee of professional educators representing the Association.

Founded in 1895, the Southern Association is a voluntary, nongovernmental agency composed of more than 12,000 accredited colleges and universities, occupational institutions, secondary, middle, and elementary schools. Headquartered in Decatur, Georgia, it is one of six regional accrediting associations in the United States and serves 11 southern states - Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, and Virginia as well as Mexico, Central and South America, and islands of the Caribbean.

The purpose of regional accreditation is school improvement. To maintain accreditation, each accredited school must conduct a continuing program of educational improvement, meet standards of accreditation, submit annual reports which include plans for educational improvement as well as assessment of the school's

ability to meet standards, and undergo periodic reevaluation by outside teams of professional educators at five-year intervals.

Through regional accreditation, faculty, students, and parents benefit by knowing that teaching conditions in accredited schools meet necessary requirements and that efforts are continuously made for school improvement.

"Citizens are assured of accountability and of value for their tax dollars because SACS member schools meet standards and undergo regular reevaluations. Communities with accredited schools can be confident that their institutions compare favorably with other schools not only within the region but throughout the nation," said Dr. John M. Davis, Executive Director of the Commission on Elementary and Middle Schools.

Accredited schools are a "plus" for the community and for those who are interested in relocating their families and businesses in Tishomingo.

PUBLIC HEARING NOTICE

The County of Tishomingo, Mississippi, is considering applying to the Mississippi Department of Economic and Community Development, Division of Community Services, for a Small Cities Community Development Block Grant of up to \$500,000. To be considered for this position, your boss wants you to give a presentation on using the newest ditch digging equipment. With some public speaking experience, you may have an advantage over the next person in line for the job.

Even though this example may seem far-fetched, there are many times throughout your life when you may need to present information, defend your position on an issue, or persuade someone to take action. Developing public speaking skills early in your life will make it easier later on.

Many people get butterflies in their stomachs and their knees knock together when they stand in front of a group of people. This includes students giving a report to their class or someone being interviewed for a job.

The best way to overcome the nervousness is through practice. Practice doesn't always make the nervousness go away, but it does help to keep your knees from knocking.

4-H members in Tishomingo County have many opportunities to practice their speaking skills. They learn to give oral reasons during judging contests, and make visual presentations as well as giving speeches for competition.

Taking these opportunities to improve their public speaking skills also help 4-H members develop more self-confidence in many situations. This confidence shows itself in all areas of a 4-H members life and for a lifetime.

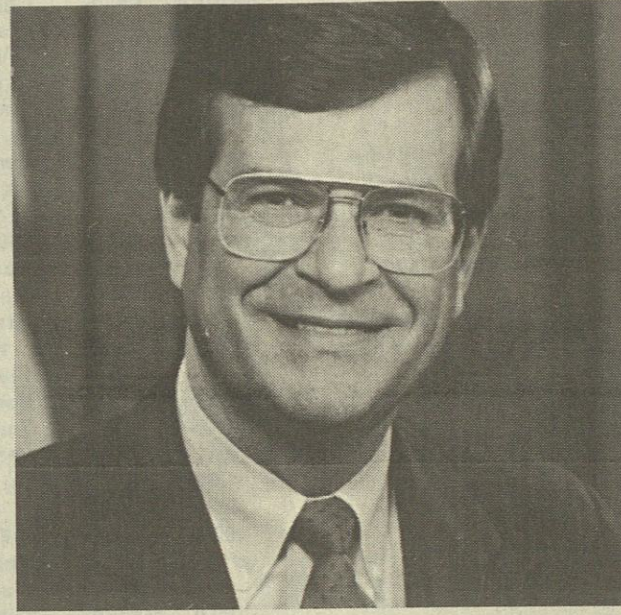
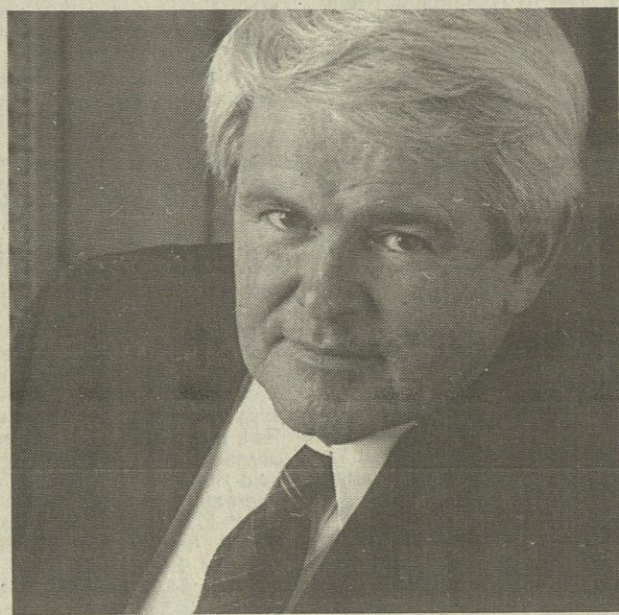
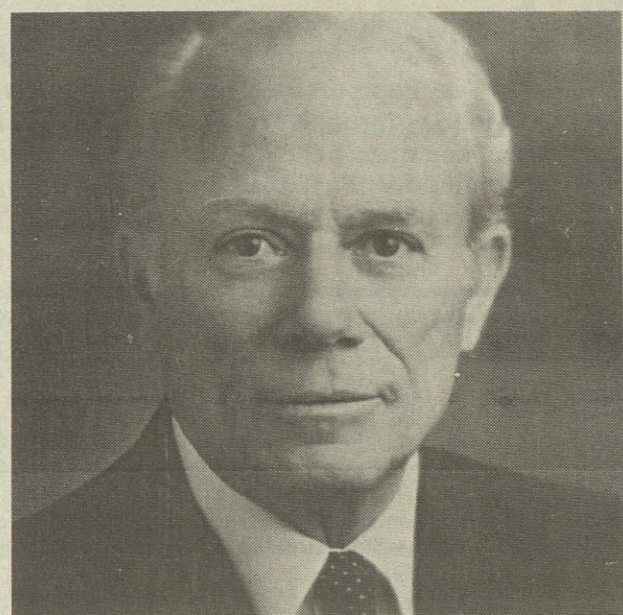

It has always been left up to the voters to vote on the wet or dry issue. I don't think the elected officials to decide on something that has always been left up to the voters.

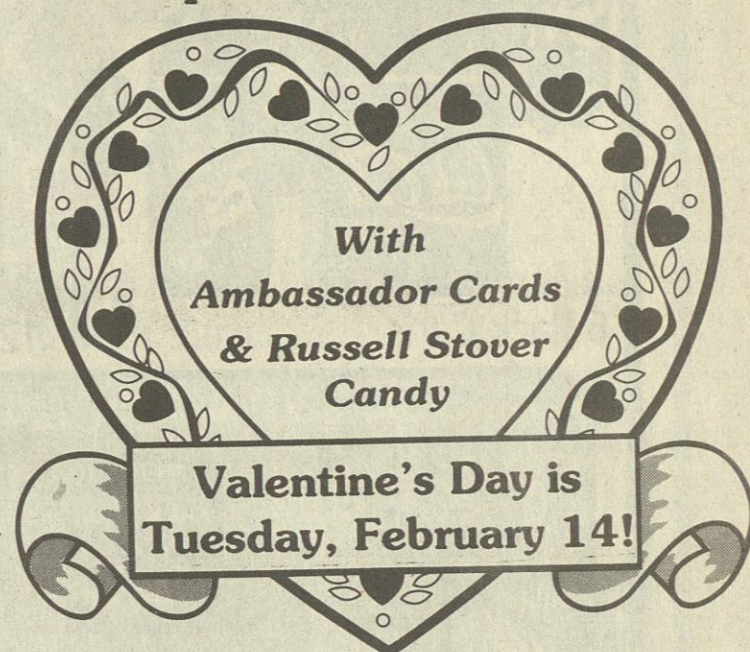
Alcohol, drugs in whatever form are habit forming and along with gambling so, what ever form

GROWERS MUST MEET FEB. 28TH CROP INSURANCE DEADLINE

Producers and landowners in Tishomingo County planning to participate in any government farm program in 1995 must meet the Feb. 28th deadline to purchase crop insurance.

Recently passed legislation means that buying crop insurance is no longer optional for most farmers. You must have coverage if you plan to participate in any USDA program, including price support or production adjustment programs; the conservation reserve program; or any Farmers Home Administration ownership, operating or emergency loans. To be eligible for any of these programs, you must purchase at least the minimum catastrophic coverage for ALL PLANTED CROPS.

Mr. Phillip Horn, Consolidated Farm Service Agency (formerly ASCS), will be on hand to answer questions during the pesticide certification training to be held on the 16th of Feb. at the Vo-Tech Bldg. For more information don't hesitate to contact Mr. Horn or myself. PESTICIDE CERTIFICATION TRAINING.

There will be a Pesticide Applicators Certification Training held Thursday night, February 16, 1995 starting at 6:30 p.m. and ending at 8:30 p.m. at the Tishomingo County Vo-Tech Building. This training is for private applicators who need to be able to purchase Restricted Use Pesticides for their personal use. A private applicator is defined as anyone who applies pesticides on his own AGRICULTURE COMMODITY. If you apply the pesticide on anything other than an Ag Product then it is technically a commercial application. (This is a new definition.) First time certification requires viewing a 2-hour video. Anyone re-certifying is required to view a 1-hour video. Re-certifiers may attend at 7:30 to view their part of the video. Call our office at 423-7016 if you have questions.
