## Purchase Of Red Bay -Corinth Railroad Finalized

Negotiations to purchase a 41-mile section of railway between Red Bay, Alabama and Corinth, slated for closure by Norfolk Southern Company, were finalized Wednesday, February 15, by a group of industrial and community leaders from Mississippi and Alabama.

Only two customers used the mil line, Sunshine Mills, a pet food producing company in Red Bay, Ala. and Westvaco, a timber buying company in Belmont. Norfolk Southern senior general attorney Robert Cooney said that the short line had been targeted for closure because of economic reasons. He credited the saving of the line to Belmont Mayor Bob Yarber and his committee to save the railway.

The purchase price of the railway was \$1.1 million. Funding for the purchase of the light density railroad line came from various sources including

\$550,000 from an Appalachian Regional Commission grant through The Tennessee Valley Authority, \$175,000 from Sunshine Mills, \$50,000 from Westvaco with the remaining amount contributed by Norfolk Southern.

The ARC Funding came from both Mississippi (\$300,000) and Alabama (\$250,000) so the legislatures from both states passed laws creating a two-state authority to oversee the railway's operation.

Included in the authority are Belmont Mayor Bob Yarber; Red Bay Mayor Billy Bolton; Tom Wood, Belmont; Eucellis Underwood, Red Bay; Leon Cook, Belmont & Allen Bostick, Red Bay.

Columbus and Greenville Railway has been contracted by the authority to operate the line. The line will be called the Redmont Railway Company.

## **Work Continues At Site**

As of press time Wednesday, February 22, it is "business as usual" at the Thiokol plant at Yellow Creek near Iuka.

Despite rumors that are circulating concerning the termination of the Thiokol project, no evidence or comments to confirm this were found.

A spokesman for the company said that business operations and construction at the site are continuing as usual.

There is an audit being done by NASA concerning the transfer of nozzle manufacturing activity from Utah to Yellow Creek. A Thiokol official said that this is not unusual for NASA to conduct an audit of this type on highly visible new program initiatives.

# **County Jail Escapee Recaptured Friday**

A prisoner, who escaped from the Tishomingo County Jail Thursday, February 16, was taken into custody Friday night from his residence.

Jim Ed Blunt, 28, of Route 1, Box 8M, Tishomingo, was picked up at about 8 p.m. Friday, Feb. 17, at his home without incident, according to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith.

Blunt apparently escaped through a cell door that was not fully locked when he was put inside.

Smith said that the jail cells are checked hourly by a sheriff's department employee. When the cells were checked Thursday morning, Blunt was apparently hiding in the day room area and ran out, he explained.

Blunt was in jail on suspicion of breaking and entering, but had not been convicted on the charge, Smith reported.

# Wreck Near Miss./Ala. Line Claims Life Of Teenager

A Cherokee, Ala. teenage driver was killed Friday night, February 17, and a passenger was critically injured as the result of a two-vehicle wreck near the Mississippi/Alabama State line.

Billy W. Smith, 16, of Cherokee, Ala. was killed when the 1986 Chevrolet he was driving collided with a 1979 GMC lowboy truck, driven by James Alford of Carthage about 5 miles west of Cherokee on Hwy. 72.

A passenger in Smith's vehicle, Karl J. Hester, 29, of Tuscumbia, Ala. was critically injured. He was taken to Iuka Hospital.

The driver of the low-boy was not injured, according to Alabama State Trooper reports.

The accident occurred at about 6:25 p.m. Both Smith and Hester were wearing seat belts at the time of the wreck.

Authorities from Tishomingo County assisted at the scene, Alabama Troopers said. They commented that the assistance was greatly appreciated.

Investigations into the details of the accident are ongoing, Troopers stated.

Services for Billy Smith were Monday, February 20, at Bethsaida Baptist Church. Burial was in the church cemetery. The Reverends Bobby Sibley and Benjamin South officiated.

## Soil Conservation News

Winter pastures are finally beginning to grow in spite of the recent very heavy rain and cold weather. Plan spring management programs to get full use of these very expensive crops as grazing or stored feed.

1. Cattle can be removed from ryegrass not needed for spring grazing by April 1 and still produce a good hay or haylage crop if adequately fertilized. Fields not yet topdressed can have 50 + lbs. of nitrogen applied by late March and still produce a good yield. Ryegrass produces highest quality if harvested when first seedheads appear, but should certainly be harvested by the time oldest seedheads are in the dough stage.

2. Late March to mid-April is

an ideal time to fertilize bermudagrass and bahiagrass hay fields. Fertilize according to soil test recommendations. Where high rates of potash are needed, partcularly on sandy soils, split applications should be made. Since potash does leach badly on many soils, the closer the potash can be applied to the time the plant needs it, the more efficiently it is used. This is very important on high producing hay fields as each ton of hay harvested removes about 30 lbs. of actual potash. (Apply 1/2 to 2/3 of the needed potash in the spring and the balance with the mid-summer top-dressing). Where high rates of nitrogen are applied and several hay harvests are made, these grasses need 1/2 to 3/4 lb. of actual potash for each 1 lb. actual nitrogen applied depending on soil type. Suggested fertilizer ratios are 4-1-2 or 3-1-3 or N-P-K. Where four cuttings are made and about 5 tons of hay is harvested, fields need 200 + 1bs. actual nitrogen, 50-60 lbs. actual phosphate and 100-500 lbs. actual potash per acre over the growing season. Low potash, high nitrogen fertilization can cause stand reduction plus loss of vigor and yield on hay fields.

3. Fields coming out of row crops are ideal for establishing Tifton 44, Alicia or Coastal bermudagrass. Check to be sure

there are no perennial grasses (common bermuda or bahia) present before planting. The hybrid bermudagrasses have the genetic ability to produce a large tonnage of high quality forage.

4. Timely Tips: A. Keep grazing pressure on clover fields as lush spring growth occurs. B. Spread manure to allow more uniform grass growth and grazing pattern. C. Graze overseeded pastures heavily to fully utilize ryegrass. D. Leave borders, drains and adjustments strips in sod on spring crops. E. Weed control may substitute for fertilizer on very weedy fields. F. Keep close watch on grain wheat for leaf disease and aphids. G. Clean and recalibrate sprayers before applying all herbicides.

#### Home Economics Tips

ADJUSTING TO A LOWER
FAT DIET

It takes one or two months for a person to adjust to eating less salt. In the beginning, the person misses the salty taste of food and thinks that the food tastes "too bland." After some weeks, the person will begin to prefer this "blander" taste of food and will find salted foods are too salty.

Researchers are investigating how long it takes for people to adjust to eating foods that are lower in fat. It appears that our preference for high-fat foods is learned in childhood. Researchers want to know if we are capable of unlearning it, just as we can unlearn our preference for salty foods.

There is evidence to support the fact that motivated adults can decrease the fat content of the diet on a long term basis. In one major study, a significant number of women reduced their fat intake to 20 percent or less of

calories from fat.

Some of these women reported that they developed a dislike for fat and felt physically ill aftereating high-fat foods. It isn't known if the adverse reaction to fat is a result of the women's negative attitudes towards fat as a food component, or is actually the result of a physiological response to a high fat intake after being on a low fat diet for a long time.

It might take as long as three months for an individual to adapt to a lower fat intake. This is a fairly long time, and it may mean that people will need to be patient and persistent in their attempts to become accustomed to eating less fat.

## County Agents Notes

By: Danny Owen, County Agent FREEZE PROTECTION

Managing the orchard floor in the early spring for freeze protection can be beneficial. This involves keeping the ground under the trees clean and weed-free during the danger period. Sod middles should be mowed as close to the ground as possible. On windy nights it won't make much difference. However, on nights when there is no wind and a clear sky, the temperature may range from 2-4 degrees warmer in clean orchards. This is because heat will be able to rise more from a firm, weed-free, and wet soil. If you suspect a freeze possibility, it would help to irrigate a couple of days prior to the freeze. Many peach crops could have been saved in the last few years if the temperature had been a couple of degrees warmer. GROWERS MUST MEET FEB. 28TH CROP INSURANCE DEADLINE

Producers and landowners in Tishomingo County planning to participate in any government farm program in 1995 must meet the Feb. 28th deadline to purchase crop insurance.

Recently passed legislation means that buying crop insurance is no longer optional for most farmers. You must have coverage if you plan to participate in any USDA program, including price support or production adjustment programs; the conservation reserve program; or any Farmers Home Administration ownership, operating or emergency loans. To be eligible for any of these programs, you must purhcase at least the minimum catastrophic coverage. For more information don't hesitate to contact the CFSA office (old ASCS) or the Extension Office. SPRING LIME

Some producers in the county have recently received soil test results that call for applications of lime to correct soil pH. They have asked if they could apply lime this close to planting. Once applied, lime requires several months to react with the soil. Some of the finely-ground lime particles will quickly neutralize soil acidity when lime is applied. The treatment will immediately help; the full benefits won't be apparent until the next growing season. Lime is more effective in neutralizing soil pH when applied in the fall, but it can and should be applied as soon as possible if pH needs correcting.

After the hostess, Willard, served refreshments to everyone, Valentine cards were passed out, and the remainder of the meeting was spent with everyone addressing cards to all the nursing



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

LOOKING BEHIND YOUR EYES

An examination on the back portion of your eyes can reveal a good deal about your health. Disorders that have nothing directly to do with eyesight often can be identified by this means. A hand-held instruments called an opthalmoscope (a maginfier aided by a built-in bright light) is used in this painless test.

The backs of your eyes provide many clues. For example, if you have high blood pressure, changes noted in viewable vessels often can determine the severity of the problem.

Clues to circulatory disturbances (including arteriosclerosis) can be revealed from the appearance of cholesterol-containing particles in the vessels. There are characteristic changes in blood vessels which may point to complications of diabetes. Examination of the optic nerve can detect possible evidence of brain tumor.

If you are an adult, you should have the exam, especially if you have high blood pressure, diabetes, or suffer from headaches.

BLOOD PROVIDES CLUES TO DISEASES

In medieval days it was believed that if a portion of blood was removed from a sick person, their health would be restored. Within the last can tury it was discovered that blood can provide important in formation about an animal's health. Today "blood letting takes the form of taking a small amount of blood to b analyzed. Because blood bathes the cells of all tissues it is useful in the diagnosis of infections, metabolic diseases bleeding disorders, inflam matory diseases, some parasitic infections, and numerous organ diseases.

Blood can be tested as whole blood or just a component such as serum (the liquid portion of the blood or platelets (used in clotting the blood). Many laboratories offer automated serum chemistry profiles that are capable of doing 20 different tests within one hour.

The next time your veterinarian takes a blood sample from your cat or dog, be thankful that medicine has progressed to the point that the blood is not discarded but is used in diagnosing diseases.

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

Are you interested in losing one to two pounds of weight per week for 10 weeks? If so, you will want to join the Weight-Off-Wisely classes, which will be taught on Monday evenings at 5:00 p.m. at the North Crossroads Fire Department, beginning Monday, March 13, 5:00 p.m.

Weight-Off-Wisely is a ten week program designed to help men and women lose weight through diet and nutrition planeating, sensible modification of existing undesirable behavior, and exercise. This program should be used as a tool or stepping stone for individuals to attain successful weight loss. Successful weight loss means losing any weight (two

pounds or 20 pounds) and keeping it off. Success is not losing ten pounds during a program and then gaining that weight back within a year.

The first session requires about two hours of time, while the other sessions last somewhere between 1 and 2 hours. At each session there will be group interaction, a nutrition lesson and exercise. Announcements - Group activities often require a letter or statement announcing what is going to happen and where. This announcement must include the purpose of the occasion and a request that the reader participate

Welcome Addresses - When you take a leadership role, often you may be called upon to welcome guests and members to various organizations or to gatherings of all kinds. You should make the greeting on behalf of everyone involved and make the person feel warmly welcomed. Examples include:

"As student council president, I know I speak for the entire student body when I welcome you to Eastern High School. Your reputation as a community leader has made you a respected and often quoted speaker. It is a great honor to meet you and we are all looking forward to learning more about you."

Introductions - Sometimes you will be asked to introduce a speaker. You should be brief, giving only the speaker's background, qualifications and his or her name. Your purpose is to introduce the speaker in such a way that the audience is interested in hearing him or her. For example:

"Through dedication and perseverance, Pamela Groober fought for recognition as a local government reformer. Her recent acceptance of the Governor's Award has not tempered her efforts to cause changes for community members."

Thanking Your Speaker - At the conclusion of a speech given by a guest speaker, you may be called on to thank the speaker. An example of this is:

"I'm sure I speak for everyone here when I express our deepest appreciation for your talking to us today. Thank you.'

Closing Remarks - When adjourning a meeting, you should thank the participants or audience for their cooperation and interest. Be sure to keep these remarks short as people will be ready to leave.

Congratulatory Messages - A congratulatory message has three elements. It offers congratulations to the person or persons while giving praise and best wishes for success. An example is:

"Please accept my warmest congratulations on your recent promotion. Your accomplishments have made a tremendous difference to us and we know you will continue to succeed.'

These are just some of the type of speeches you may be asked to present in a public situation. Some of these can be used in more private situations such as when your friend wins an award, or when you receive a gift from a friend.

The 4-H Public Speaking Project gives 4-H members the chance to learn more about making these types of presentations. Local 4-H members will be showing off their speaking






