

Weight-Off-Wisely Classes Are you interested in losing one to two pounds of weight per week for 10 weeks? If so, you will want to join the Weight-Off-Wisely classes, which will be taught on Monday evenings at p.m. at the North 5:00 Crossroads Fire Department, beginning Monday, March 13, 5:00 p.m.

Weight-Off-Wisely is a ten week program designed to help men and women lose weight through diet and nutrition plansensible ning, eating, modification of existing undesirable behavior, and exercise. This program should be used as a tool or stepping stone for individuals to attain successful weight loss. Successful weight loss means losing any weight (two pounds or 20 pounds) and keeping it off. Success is not losing ten pounds during a program and then gaining that weight back within a year.

The first session requires about two hours of time, while the other sessions last somewhere between 1 and 2 hours. At each session there will be group interaction, a nutrition lesson and exercise. There will be a fee of \$5.00 to cover the cost of equipment for the ten weeks. These sessions will be offered through the Tishomingo County Cooperative Extension Service.

#### The Proper Way To **Plant A Tree....**

I would like to mention a few things that may be important to you when planting. It is good to know the area you want to plant, and the size of the tree that would be proper for that area. Some trees have a tremendous root system, and should be planted in an area which will allow the roots to support the tree. A healthy tree depends on the soil in its root zone. The roots spread to a surprisingly large but shallow area, with most roots being less than 12 inches deep. The outer area of roots extend to a distance from 1-2 times the height of the tree. This may give you an idea as to how close to plant the tree from your house or driveway. Some of the problems caused by improper planting are lifting sidewalks, entering or moving water lines, and tangling with wires and power lines. You may want to plant smaller trees such as dogwoods, plums, and red buds in more confined areas and larger trees such as greenash, oaks, and sycamores in more open areas. When planting the tree you need to remember that tree roots have to have oxygen, and if planted in a heavily traveled area a newly planted tree may suffer from lack of oxygen in the soil pores, causing it to suffocate. This often happens when concrete or dirt has been placed around a tree within the drip line.

Cats can have a lot of different urinary tract problems. If a cat suddenly begins to urinate someplace other than the litterbox, he (or she) needs to be checked by a veterinarian to make sure that he does not have a medical problem. Most often, clearing up or controlling the urinary tract infection will stop the problem of inappropriate elimination.

A change in the type or brand of cat litter used can often be the onset of elimination problems. A cat may not like the new type of litter and will choose other spots to eliminate. Changing back to the old litter usually solves this problem.

Keeping the litterbox clean solves many problems, and even daily cleaning may be necessary. Some cats are so particular about their litterbox that they will not urinate and defecate in their own box, but require two separate boxes. Multiple cat households encounter this same problem, except on a larger scale - some cats will not use a box soiled by another cat. The solution to this problem is multiple litterboxes.

These suggestions are just a few of the possible answers to litterbox woes. We would be glad to discuss your individual situation and try to help you find a solution.

"THIRD EYE" THEME We assume that "What we see is what we get", but that's not true. The eye has other functions besides perception. Did you know that approximately 20% of the information from the retina never goes to the visual cortex to be used for sight? Instead, it travels to other brain centers to be integrated with more data about the body's awareness. The retina uses light to stimulate the pineal and pituitary glands, the master glands of the body which regulate our entire system. This function appears to be a much older system than perception of objects.

Some animals, such as iguanas, retain a vestigal "third eye" on top of their heads which is thought to have been used to note the degree of heat of the sun, ergo, the season. This light stimulation seems related to fertility and may be the reason the seasons are related to the mating of animals. In man, it is believed that this remnant of our evolutionary past dropped inside our skull and became the pineal gland. A tumor here can cause highly erratic sexual development.

The final night of the conference was spent in downtown Toronto where the delegates went to the Hard Rock cafe in the Skydome and visited the CN Tower which is the tallest observation point in the world. While in Toronto, the delegates took in a performance of "Phantom of the Opera'' in the prestigious Pantages theater--one of three theaters in the world where the set is specifically designed for "Phantom's" breathtaking special effects.

Of course, the conference was not all work. New friendships were formed as countries were forced to work with their allied states. After long days of debating, delegates were able to unwind at various entertainment spots. At the close of the conference, the General Assembly met to vote on resolutions passed in committee. After closing ceremonies, delegates exchanged E-mail addresses and fond farewells.

The delegates stayed an extra day and toured the Niagara Falls area. The tour began with viewing the sites of the Falls itself, several greenhouses, the Skylon tower overlooking the Falls, and ended at Brights' Winery (one of Ontario's oldest and most prestigious wineries). Meeting with German representatives and tasting the famous Ice Wine of Ontario were highlights of the winery tour. An early Sunday morning fire, March 5, completely destroyed a Tishomingo business, but caused only minimal damage to a building next door.





Clothing storage areas are needed in at least three areas of your home: Near the front door for guests' and family's coats, near the back door for work and play wraps, and in each bedroom.



She is married to Robert Lane and has two married daughters, Carol Clark of Dallas and Kay Parker of Ridgland, Miss.


> Letter To The Editor

The Machine Shop at the Northeast Extension Center has openings for youth and adults ages 18 and up.

The program provides quality training for participants who desire to work in the machinist field. Students will learn precision measuring tools, operation of lathes, vertical milling machines, grinders, basic blueprint reading and computer numerical control.
