Dr. Carl L. Weeden Assumes Role Of Superintendent of Education For County



The Tishomingo County Board of Education recently appointed Dr. Carl L. Weeden to serve as Superintendent of Education for the County School System.

Dr. Weeden filled the vacancy left by Dr. Bob Ferguson who resigned from the office of Superintendent early in the 1994-95 school year.

A reception has been planned for Dr. Weeden this Sunday, March 26, 1995, from 2-4 p.m. at the Tishomingo County Vocational Center. Everyone is invited.

Before coming to Tishomingo County, Dr. Weeden served as Superintendent of Education of the Clarksdale Separate School District. He holds a B.A. and a M.Ed. in Secondary Education and also a Ed.D. in School Administration, all from the University of Mississippi. In addition to his position in Clarksdale, Dr. Weeden worked as Superintendent from 1988-1992 in the Union County Public School system and from 1973-1987 as principal at New Albany Middle School. He

has served also as a science teacher, chairman of the Science Department at W.P. Daniel High School, biology, chemistry and physics teacher, and director of the Title III Early Childhood Education Project of the New Albany School District.

He has been involved with the tech prep program in the Clarksdale Public Schools - a program to prepare students to meet the increasing demands that the technological world is placing on them - and plans to help implement the program into Tishomingo County Schools.

Dr. Weeden's wife, Glynda holds a M.Ed. in secondary education and is a math and spanish teacher. The Weedens have three children a son, Mike, who is an optometrist in Corinth; a son, Ken, who is an attorney with T.K. Moffett and Associates in Tupelo; and a daughter, Carla, who is a Junior at the University of Mississippi.

Concerning his appointment as Tishomingo County Superintendent, Dr. Weeden said that he felt honored to be selected by the Board to serve as superintendent for this fine school district. He said he desires to work with all the people in this county as he leads the "team effort" toward achieving "excellence in education" for all the children in the Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District.

"I hope to be known as the 'leader of the team' rather than just the 'boss'," Dr. Weeden said. He stressed "expectation & motivation" as key ingredients for achieving the desired goals of "excellence" in education."

Dr. and Mrs. Weeden have purchased a home in Iuka.

A 19-year-old Burnsville woman died Thursday, March 16, following a one-vehicle accident on Mississippi Hwy. 365.

Reva Chatham was killed as a result of the wreck in which the vehicle she was driving left the road near the junction of Hwy. 365 and Hwy. 364 outside of Burnsville, near Prentiss County, according to a report from Mississippi Highway Patrolman Craig Bishop.

No other details of the accident were available at press time.

Reva attended Iuka High School and was employed at Toltec in Burnsville.

Services were at 3 p.m. Friday at Harmony Hill Baptist Church in Burnsville with Bro. Danny Lovelace officiating. Burial was in the church cemetery. Cutshall Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

County's Largest Employer Announces Addition Of 150 Jobs

Belmont Homes, now Tishomingo County's largest single employer, opened up a new 108,000 square-foot addition to its company Friday, March 17, 1995.

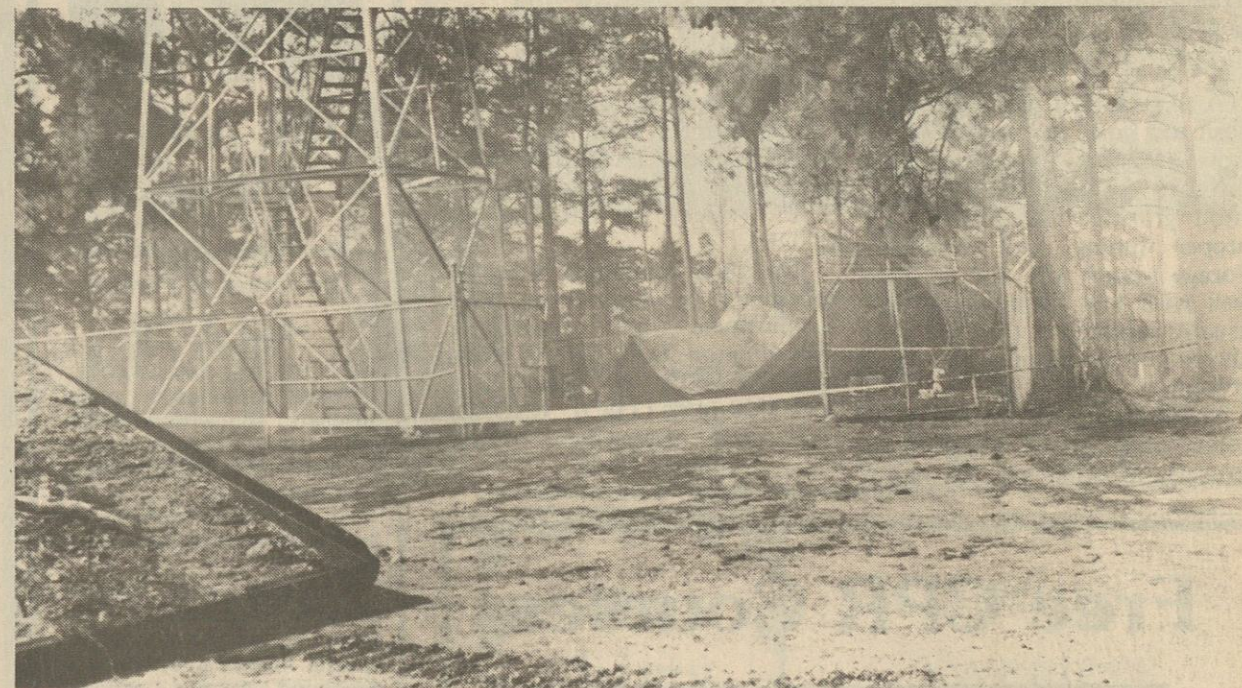
On hand to join in the celebration were several local and state officials including Mississippi Governor Kirk Fordice.

The new addition will be used to separate the production lines and to produce 16-foot-wide mobile homes, according to plant manager, Jimmy Raper of Red Bay. A 14-foot model, double-wide units and special units that have vinyl siding and shingle roofs are produced at three other plants already on the site, Raper stated. He explained that with the additional space, approximately 150 new jobs will open up over the next six months, bringing the total work force to 850 employees.

Belmont Homes began seven years ago with a work force of about 70 employees who hand-assembled mobile homes for a first partial year's sales of \$8 million. Now, four additions later, the total gross annual income of the facility is around \$108 million (based on 1994 figures).

Belmont Homes builds two models of homes—a Premier model and a Glenwood model—both of which are mainly furnished with fiberglass fixtures, dinette sets and upholstered furniture from other local industries.

Directors of Belmont Homes include Doug Jumper, Don Murphy, J.M. Page, Roger Moore, Aubry Patterson, Thomas Keenum and Jerold Kennedy.



Fire Destroys Building On Woodall Mountain—

The cause of a Saturday evening fire, which destroyed a Mississippi Forestry Commission owned building, on Woodall Mountain is under investigation by local and state authorities.

According to Tishomingo County Arson Investigator Trip Lomenick, the Tishomingo County Emergency 911 operator received a call at approximately 7:43 p.m. Saturday reporting that a building on top of Woodall Mountain was on fire. Firefighters from Midway and Burnsville Volunteer Fire Departments were dispatched to the scene, Lomenick said.

The 25 x 50 ft. structure, known as a Quonset hut, was constructed around 1965 or 1966, according to County Forester Brendix Glasgow. He said that the building was primarily used as a workshop and maintenance facility for members of the Mississippi Forestry Commission.

The State Fire Marshall's office was called by Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith to aid in the investigation. Arson is suspected in the fire and the state fire marshal's office is offering a \$1,000 reward to anyone having information leading to the arrest and conviction of any person or persons involved, Glasgow confirmed. "If anyone saw a person or persons on Woodall Mountain Road on Saturday around 5 p.m. or after, please contact us," Glasgow said.

Lomenick said that any information in this case can be reported to the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department at [601]423-7000, the State Fire Marshall's office at [601]354-7011 or the Mississippi Forestry Commission at [601]423-9070.

Wildfires Present Problems In Local Area...

Wildfires have burned 118 acres of pine plantations in Tishomingo County, causing an estimated \$41,300 worth of damage since July 1994, according to Tishomingo County Forester, Brendix Glasgow.

For the entire northeast district, of which Tishomingo County is a part, 1010 acres of plantation have burned, causing an estimated \$250,000 worth of damage. Statewide figures are not available.

"This year's fire season has not been especially bad so far, but the potential is still there; historically, March is the most dangerous time for wildfires. We urge the public to be especially careful with outdoor burning until spring is well underway and the woods green up," the forester says.

To report a wildfire or request a permit for agricultural or forestry burning, call 424-9803.

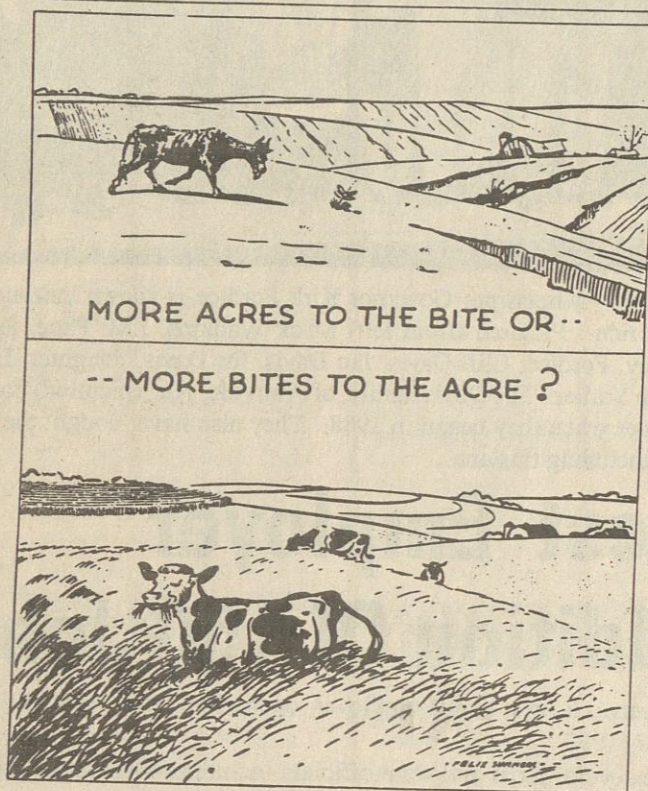

Weeds in pasture contribute as much or more to low-quality forage production than anything else. Weeds require as much nutrients and moisture to grow as forage plants. Broadleaf weeds cause the most problems in pasture. Weeds that give the most trouble in late winter or early spring are mayweed, dock, buttercup and thistle. The most troublesome summer weeds are horsebettle, dogfennel (cypressweed), and bitterweed.

A thick sod of pasture grass is basic to a good pasture weed control program. Weed control through competition involves good grazing management and proper liming and fertilizer. Forage plants will not produce well with low fertility and will usually result in a thin sod that allows weed germination and growth.

Mechanical weed control involves the use of clippers or mowers. Mowing will kill many

annual weeds but usually will not kill perennial weeds. Chemical weed control will usually kill both annual and perennial weeds if the proper chemical and rates are used. Often times a combination of mechanical and chemical weed control will be the most effective.

Home Economics Tips

IT'S IN THE WASH
Tips For Successful Laundering

Sorting by color is only the first step in keeping laundry white and bright. Once whites have been separated from colors and darks from pastels, it's time for other considerations, such as garment construction, amount of soil and the affinity for lint. Delicate fabrics which require a gentle cycle should be separated from other items. Heavily soiled items should be isolated from lightly soiled ones. Soils can travel from one garment to another in the laundry, causing whites to slowly get grayer or yellowed and colors to become duller and duller. Lint producers, including fuzzy sweatshirts, chenille robes, flannels and new towels, should be washed in a load by themselves. Do not wash them with corduroys and permanent press fabrics which attract lint easily.

While sorting, check the severity of soils and stains. Small spots can be pretreated with un-

diluted liquid laundry detergent, a paste of granular detergent and water, or a prewash stain remover. Launder immediately. Then check freshly washed clothes. If stains remain, pretreat and wash again before the fabric has a chance to dry, thus setting the stain.

presoaking helps remove deep-set soils, old stains and protein stains, such as blood, grass and body soils. Soak items, using a presoak product (follow package directions) or in a solution of detergent and water. If stains remain, launder with detergent and a bleach that is safe for the fabric.

Prewashing helps remove heavy soil from garments such as work clothes, play clothes and gardening clothes. Run them through the prewash cycle with the recommended amount of detergent. When the wash cycle is complete, drain the prewash solution and launder in the hottest water safe for the fabric.

Because detergents do not clean well at water temperatures below 60 degrees F, wash temperature plays an important role in getting clothes clean. Note, however, that cold water is excellent for rinsing all loads, regardless of washing temperature.

To determine the proper wash temperature, check the garment care labels for guidelines. Use hot water for sturdy whites, heavily soiled work and play clothes, and soiled baby items, including diapers. Warm water cleans while minimizing dye loss, removes wear wrinkles and helps reduce wrinkling in the washer. It is the best choice for permanent press items, all colorfast darks or brights, washable woollens and synthetics containing nylon,

polyester and acrylic. While cold water minimizes wrinkling, protects sensitive dyes and conserves hot water, it doesn't remove wear wrinkles or clean as well as warmer temperatures. Save this choice for brightly colored garments that may not be colorfast, for lightly soiled fabrics, and for removing some protein stains, such as blood.

When using a detergent, read and follow the package directions carefully. Manufacturers have developed these instructions to cover average washing conditions. This means a five to seven pound load of clothes, average soil, medium water hardness (3.6 to 7.0 grains per gallon), average water volume (17 gallons for a top loading washer, eight gallons for a front-loading washer) and regular agitation. If clothes are heavily soiled, the load is large, the water is very hard, the washer is set for a short or gentle cycle or cold water is being used for the wash cycle, more detergent may be required. If clothes are lightly soiled, the load is small, the water is soft or a partial water fill is used, it may be desirable to use less detergent than recommended. No matter how much is called for, measuring is the best way to gauge the correct amount.

Another key to satisfactory cleaning results is to add the detergent at the right time. Begin filling the machine with water, measure and add detergent as the machine fills, then add the clothing. This insures that the detergent is completely dissolved and properly distributed in the wash water.

A FLEXIBLE FIT

Many patients ask me, "should I get a frame with those little nose pinchers, or one that just sits on my nose?" The answer depends on your facial anatomy. Is the bridge of your nose narrow, medium, or wide? Does it protrude, or is it flat? Are the cheeks full? Is the brow prominent or recessed? What about the prescription? the lens material? Will they make the glasses heavy or light?

After taking these factors into consideration, your optometrist will usually select three or four frames that he knows will allow an optimum fit. Then it's strictly personal preference.

Many patients with regular features opt for the set bridge. This is OK provided the glasses aren't too close to the face, in which case facial heat will cause lens fogging. Adjustable pads, on the other hand, allow for raising or lowering the frame, or moving it toward or away from the face.

So -- which should you choose? You should not! Let your optometrist select a frame which will assure a comfortable fit.

We send get well wishes to Gary Walker a patient at Iuka Hospital. In hope he'll soon be better and home.

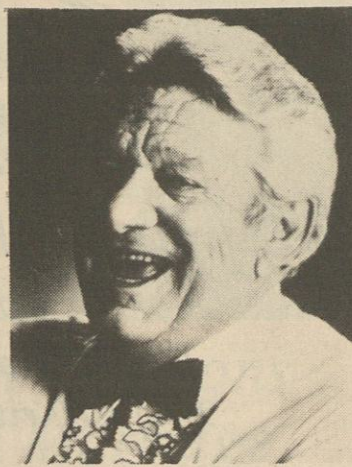
Mr. and Mrs. Warren Kennedy visited in Savannah, Tenn. over the weekend and attended church there.

Clower To Appear At NEMCC....

Jerry Clower, humorist, television and radio star, guest speaker and professional entertainer, will be the guest speaker at Northeast Mississippi Community College's annual creative writing workshop scheduled for April 5.

Most of Clower's stories that tickle the nation's funnybone are about life in Amite County, Mississippi, where Jerry was born and reared.

As a youngster he loved to talk and he loved people and he had a unique ability to remember dates, times and places. This talent helped him as an adult to remember his childhood very vividly. The basic part of most of his stories are "something real that has happened to me, or almost happened!"

Clower finished high school one night and joined the Navy the next day. After his duty ended with the Navy, he continued his education at Southwest Mississippi Junior College, where he says he was "rehabilitated." He says he experienced the best two years of his life at Southwest. As with most junior/community colleges, he says, "I knew everybody and everybody knew me."

Because of his experiences at Southwest Clower emphasizes the importance of junior/community

colleges.

"The fact that we started a junior college system in Mississippi is impressive," Clower says. "Our junior and community colleges have turned out some really good graduates."

Clower completed a degree in agriculture at Mississippi State University. One of his first jobs after graduation was selling fertilizer to farmers. To enhance the sale of his products, he began telling humorous stories. This led to a whole new career.

Clower's first album "Jerry Clower from Yazoo City, Mississippi, Talkin'" was soon followed by a second album. Today, he is one of the leading album sellers for MCA Records. He has been named "Country Comic of the Year" for nine consecutive years by the major Country Music trade and fan publications. He has co-hosted the nationally syndicated TV show "Nashville on the Road." He has written three top-selling books, "Ain't God Good!", "Let the Hammer Down," and "Life Ever Laughter." He currently ap-

pears in radio and television commercials.

His greatest honor was his induction into the Grand Ole Opry Hall of Fame, the highest honor bestowed on any country artist, according to Clower.

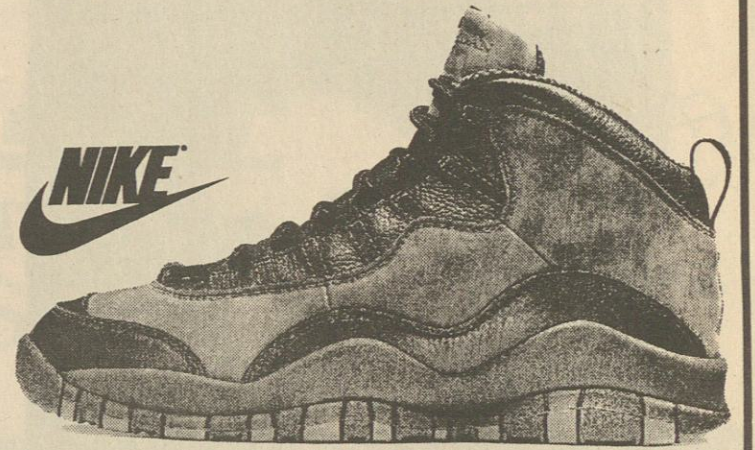
The first time he saw the Grand Ole Opry Stage was the first time he performed on it.

4-H Communicates

THE MONEY MANAGEMENT MAZE

Recently, some 4-H members attended a financial management seminar. Setting goals and developing a "spending plan" were the main topics for discussion.

One of the things goal setting helps us discover is how we feel about money. Some people think all they need is more money. To them, money is always a problem.

Others think of money as a way to get the things they want and need. A few people may really believe that money is the most important thing in life.

"Where did all my money go?" If you often ask yourself this question, you probably do not have any clearly defined goals for your money.

On the other hand, there are people who set very rigid goals. These people are generally miserable with money plan.

You should let your goals serve as a guide to help you. Your spending plan should have some flexibility to it.

Goals fall under three basic categories: 1) basic living expenses, 2) short-range goals and 3) long-range goals.

Expenses - these are the things that you spend money for regularly. Examples are daily lunch money and monthly club

dues.

Short range goals - these are things you want to buy in the near future. Examples are a new coat, concert tickets, etc. These may be changed to fit your income.

Long-range goals - there are usually fewer of these goals. Some things that may be included are future education, a 4-H trip, or buying a car.

Before you can set realistic goals, you need to find out where your money is going. To do this, you should record your spending. Keep a record of your expenditures for one week. Your chart should show each day of the week and categories for spending such as food, clothing, recreation, etc.

After one week, evaluate your expenditures. Look at where you spent your money. Decide how you feel about where your money went. Do you feel good about everything you spent money on? Is there some things you do not want to repeat? Did you buy anything that will last longer than a month?

Once you know where your money goes, you will be able to set realistic goals for future spending. List the goals you have for your money. Identify your fixed expenses, short-range goals and long-range goals.

You should be able to meet your goals with your income. Does your income come from an allowance, gifts, or a job? Estimating your income is easy if you have a steady job or get an allowance.

If you have an irregular income, you will have to estimate. Be careful not to over-estimate. It is easier to make adjustments when your estimated income is too low!

Once you have an estimate of your income, you check the income against the goals. Subtract the total of fixed expenses from the total income. The amount you have left is what you have to work with toward your goals.

Next you need to figure how much money you will need each month to meet your goals. To do this, divide the amount of money needed by the number of months before you need it.

For example, if you need \$15 for Mom's birthday present in two months, you divide \$15 by 2 to get \$7.50 per month. Figure savings for your long-term goals the same way.

If your monthly cost for goals is more than the amount you have to apply to them, check

your list again. Make sure you really need the item or look for less expensive ways to achieve the goal, such as making the item yourself.

There are many ways to spend money and many ways to save money. Your goals reflect the things that are important to you.

The 4-H Consumer Education project helps young people learn to manage the money they have.

African American History

Who was the first African-American Director of the New York Stock Exchange?

Jerome Holland was born in Auburn, New York, in 1916 and earned bachelor's and Master's degrees from Cornell University. Holland made a reputation as a star athlete on Cornell's football team; he was named as All-American for two seasons and he eventually was added to the roster of College Football's Hall of Fame.

After receiving a Ph.D from the University of Pennsylvania, Holland was appointed President of Delaware State College; in 1960 he took over the presidency of Hampton Institute. Ten years later Holland was made ambassador to Sweden, a position he held until 1972 when he returned to the United States to become the first African-American named to the Board of Directors of the New York Stock Exchange.

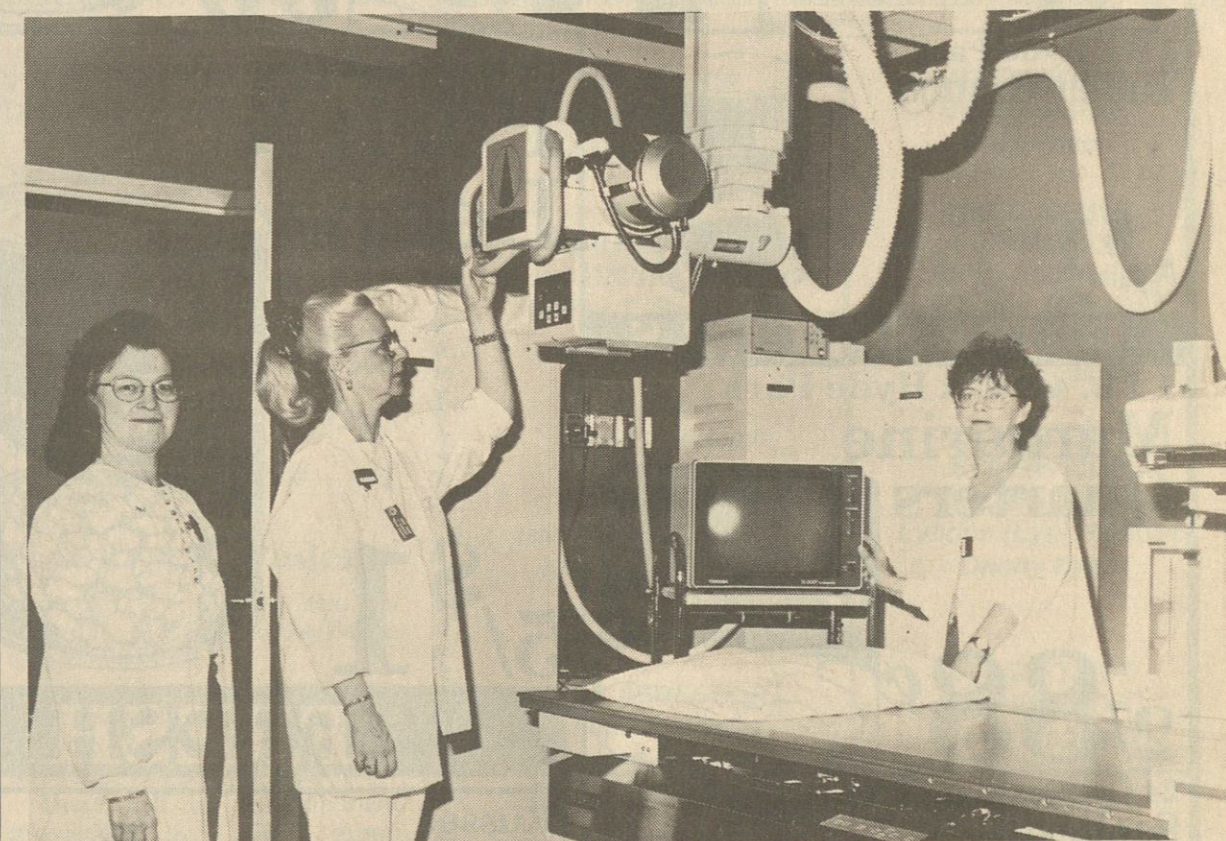

THE 8 MOST COMMON INVESTING MISTAKES YOU CAN AVOID

Many investors feel a bit nervous following the recent volatility in financial markets. While there are many differing views of the economy and the long-term effects, most all agree that there are common investing mistakes you can avoid in any market.

1. Investing without consideration to goals and time. Some investments are more appropriate for such short-term goals as a vacation, while others are better suited for such long-term goals as a child's college education. Aggressive growth funds are better suited for long-term return potential, while a 12-month certificate is more appropriate for short-term goals. Always consider the timing of each goal and match that to the investment.

2. Investing in the "hot" product of the day. Too often people base decisions on advice from friends and relatives or newspaper clippings. Given current market volatility, an investment that looks like a winner today could be out of favor by month end. Always consider an investment in light of your personal financial goals and objectives.

3. Investing everything you have in one product. When you put 100% of your money in one investment, you concentrate 100% of your risk as well. There is no one perfect product, so diversity is critical. Allocate a percentage of dollars in different investments and keep your money there. The actual percentage you allocate depends again on your personal financial goals.

4. Ignoring the product prospectus. When you consider investing in a new product, take the time to read the prospectus. Find out the objective of the investment. Will the money be managed for income, growth, capital appreciation, etc.? The investment objective should match your own. Also, look at who is managing the money. Does the money manager have several years of experience and a proven record of success?

5. Investing solely on past performance. While it's an important factor, return isn't the only criteria on which to base your investment decision. You should consider the investment's objectives (growth, income, capital appreciation, etc.) performance consistency and volatility before choosing an investment.

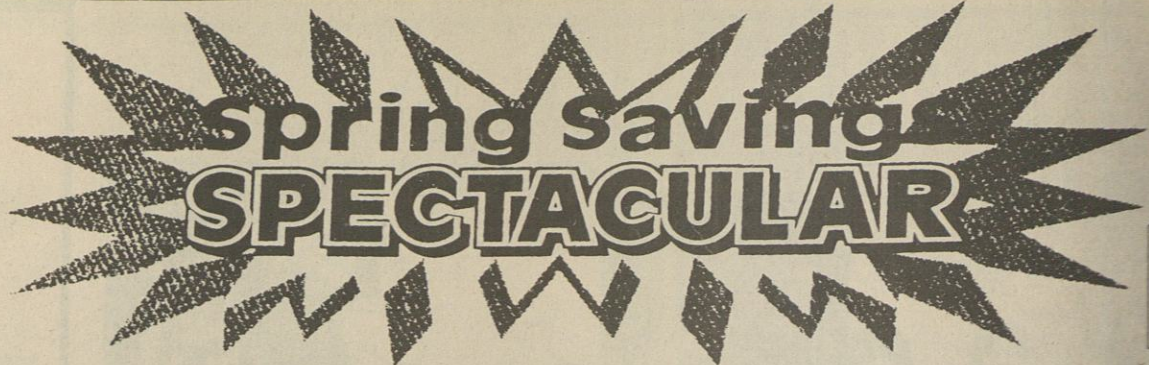
6. Putting off investing. There's never a bad time to make a good investment. In the current financial environment, the financial markets are so dynamic that waiting simply means that you may let a good opportunity pass you by.

7. Ignoring the effect of inflation and taxes. At first glance, a high interest rate may have a lot of appeal, but consider the effects of inflation and taxes on that high return. Here's a simple formula to guide you: inflation + complement of your tax rate = your break-even point. For example, if inflation is 4% and you are in the 28% tax bracket, you need a minimum return of 5.5% in a taxable investment to break even with current inflation and taxes (.04 + .72 = 5.5).

8. Failing to monitor your investment(s). Ultimately, you are responsible for the investments you make. Review your account statements at least quarterly and determine the value of your accounts. Then periodically sit down to determine whether or not you are still on target to meet your financial goal. No one can say for sure that the market will recover but, if history is any indication, it will. Your best strategy is to stay the course and avoid unnecessary investing mistakes.



Five Injured In Two-Car Accident

A Monday evening two-vehicle accident on Mississippi Highway 30, near the entrance to the Natchez Trace Parkway, left all five persons involved injured - one critically.

According to Mississippi Highway Patrolman Ricky Marlar, at about 6:30 p.m. Monday, a 1992 Pontiac Sunbird, owned and driven by Michael T. Hodgkin, 25, of Belmont, rear-ended the 1979 American Motors Spirit, driven by 18-year-old Stormy Petty of Tishomingo as she was attempting to turn left on to County Road 421, off of Highway 30.

Two passengers were in the car with Hodgkin at the time of the accident, David McGee, 30, of Tishomingo was on the passenger side of the vehicle, while Paul Ray Taylor, 37, of Tishomingo was in the back seat, Marlar explained.

Taylor was critically injured and remains in intensive care in North Mississippi Medical Center in Tupelo. Both McGee and Hodgkin were hospitalized with injuries following the accident. McGee in Magnolia Hospital in Corinth and Hodgkin at NMMC. Petty and a passenger, James M. Wilson, 20, of Dennis, were taken to Iuka Hospital where they were treated and released, reports stated.

Marlar said that none of the victims were wearing seat belts at the time of the accident. He went on to say that alcohol and marijuana were found in the possession of passengers of the Hodgkin vehicle following the wreck; however, no charges had been filed at press time pending further investigation. Marlar also said that there were three other witnesses to the accident, in addition to the victims, who were able to aid in the investigation.

In addition to Officer Marlar, several others assisted at the scene of the accident. They included the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department, Valley Grove Volunteer Fire Department, Tishomingo Volunteer Fire Department, Mississippi Game and Fish Commission (who volunteered to direct traffic) and the Iuka Ambulance Service. Marlar said their fast response and efficient help was greatly appreciated.

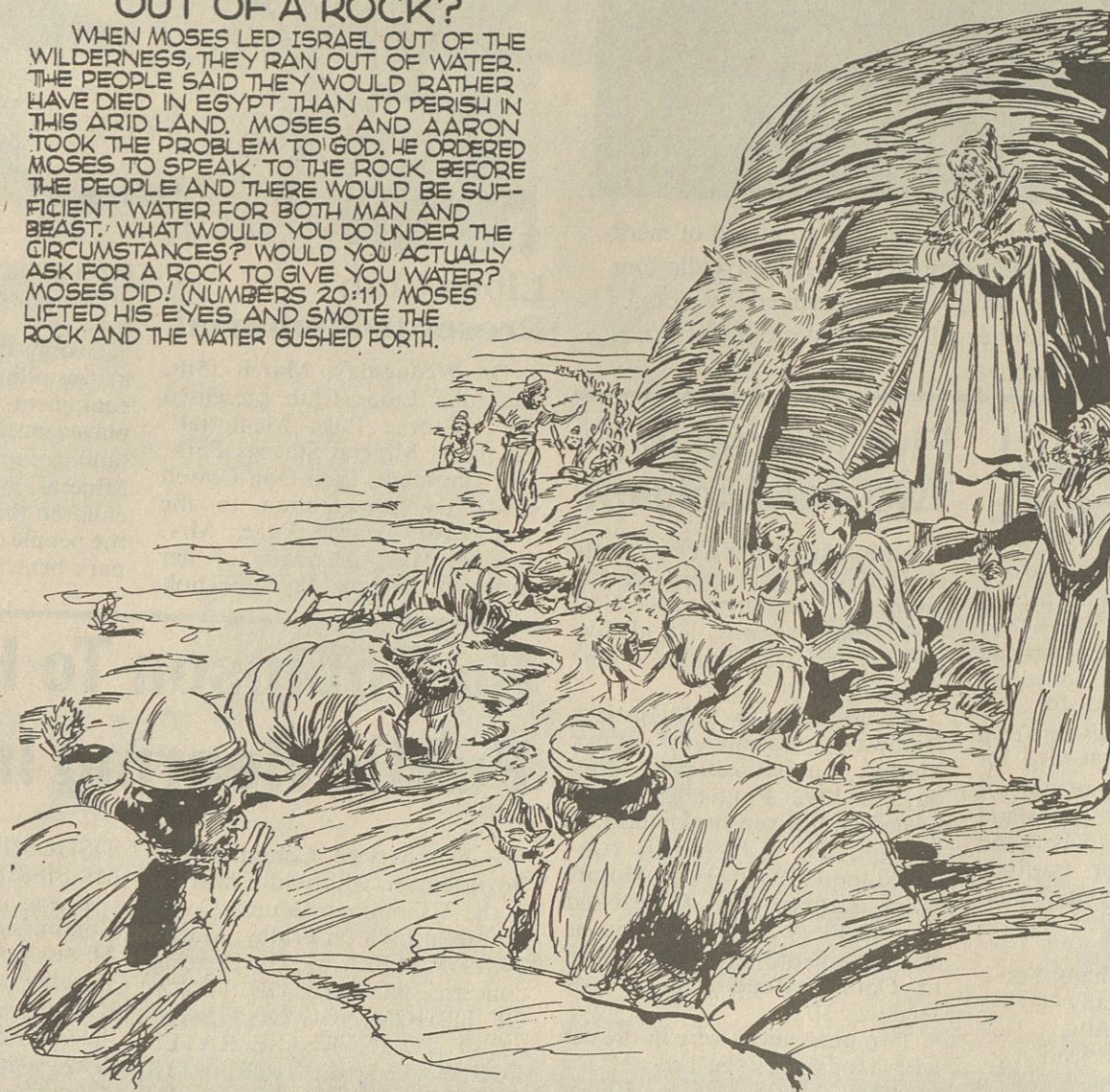

Pete Pyle Dies In Nashville Hospital

One of the pioneers of country music, Raymond H. "Pete" Pyle, formerly of Burnsville, Miss., died Saturday, March 11, 1995 at a Nashville, Tenn. hospital after struggling for the last few years with health problems. He was 74. He was preceded in death by his wife, Naomi Coulter Pyle, in 1976.

Pete was a song writer and singer who appeared on the Grand Old Opry beginning in the early 1940's. He also had his own radio shows on such well known stations as WHBQ, WMPB, WSIX and WMC. He was recruited to record with RCA on the Bluebird label. During this time he recorded one of his first hits, "Little Blue-Eyed Blond, Goodbye."

Pete was on the Grand Old Opry during the heyday of such greats as Roy Acuff, Zeke Clements, and Bill Monroe. He was one of the first country artists to perform as a solo act on the Opry, singing and playing his guitar.

After returning from the Army, Pete went on the road with Pee Wee King and the Golden West Cowboys and was the featured lead singer of the trio. He then formed his own group, "Pete Pyle and the Mississippi Valley Boys" which traveled around the country with a big tent and four trucks. Later he also sang with Bill Monroe, who remained a faithful friend throughout the years.

After the death of his wife, Naomi, Pete began singing and writing gospel music. He and his youngest daughter (one of ten children), began doing personal appearances, T.V. and radio shows to perform the gospel songs. He also appeared with Bill Monroe and Ernest Tubbs some during this time.

Until his death, Pete still attended the Opry when able and was also an active member of the Retired Opry Performers Organization.

Although Pete is no longer here, his legacy lives on in the words of the many songs that he wrote over the years including "Highway of Sorrow," "True Life Blues," and others recorded by Bill Monroe; as well as "Lovin' Lies," recorded by Little Jimmy Dickens, Porter Wagner, George Jones, Willie Nelson, and many others over the years.

Another part of his legacy lives on in his large family, several of whom continue to work in the music field today.

He had a unique style, a talent for song writing and a passion for music that set him apart from the performers of his time. From the beginning when he fashioned his first guitar using wire from his mother's screen door, to the times later in life when he was performing gospel songs, Pete never lost that love and passion for music. With him, died a small part of the beginning history of country music as we know it.

Pete leaves behind 10 children; Jimmy Pyle of Burnsville, Miss., Haroldine Atchley, Dwanna Pyle and Sherry Cooke, all of Nashville, Tenn., Tommy Pyle of Franklin, Tenn., Jackie Pyle of Broken Arrow, Okla., Johnny Pyle and Linda Pierce, both of Owassa, Okla., Paul Glen Pyle and Ricky Pyle, both of Tulsa, Okla., 23 grandchildren (locally, Angela Pyle-Lambert and Regina Pyle, both of Iuka, Miss.), seven great grandchildren (locally, Logan and Sierra Lambert of Iuka, Miss.), and one sister, Thelma Chester of Nashville, Tenn.

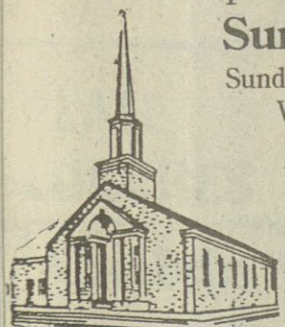

Crappie Anglers Chasing Johnson Reels

County Agents Notes

ITS TIME TO START PHOTINIA LEAF SPOT CONTROL

Keep your photinias from "blighting-out" this year by starting a disease control program early in the season. Photinias are susceptible to a disease known as Entomosporium leaf spot, but the condition is more often referred to as simply photinia leaf spot. Photinia leaf spot is caused by a fungus which starts its disease cycle early in the year. So practicing preventive medicine before new growth becomes infected is the way to handle this problem. Don't wait until next June after photinias have become heavily blighted before beginning a control program! To start your photinia leaf spot control program, rake and destroy foliage from beneath plants. This practice is an essential part of the control program since it removes one of the main sources of fungus inoculum. Preventive sprays timed from bud break and applied every ten to fourteen days until all foliage has matured and is no longer susceptible to infection will break the disease cycle. Fungicides that will do a good job of handling photinia leaf spot include formulations of chlorothalonil such as Daconil 2787, Bravo, Funginex, and fungicides containing Bayleton. Refer to product labels for dilution rates and other information regarding application.

WHEAT DISEASE

Scouting wheat for septoria disease in late March and April could keep Tishomingo County

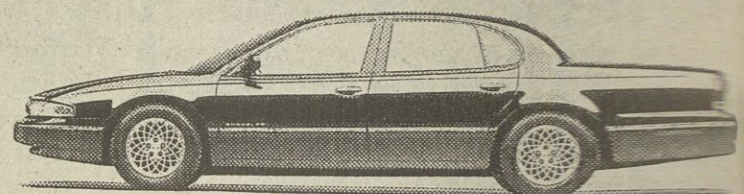
producers from losing money. This group of diseases can cause severe damage to wheat fields. Know the signs of these diseases which attack wheat leaves and head. If wheat heads are afflicted, kernels often become shriveled and light-weighted. Several methods of disease control are available to producers. Genetic control is a good and economical choice. This means using disease-resistant or disease-tolerant varieties at planting time. Cultural control includes soil sampling, planting dates/rates recommendations and proper nitrogen levels. Chemical control is the last line of defense against septoria.

Carefully scout fields to mine extent of damage applying chemicals. Also consider yield and cropping of the field, severity of and weather conditions starting treatments. If a disease goes unchecked wheat crop may be in profits could be reduced.

Letter To
The Editor

Dear Editor:

The Mississippi Farm Bureau is proud of its position as a "private property rights advocate," on the state and national level.

As to the charges leveled by Ms. Becky Gillette in a letter to papers across the state, Farm Bureau's agenda in this issue isn't to "increase membership". However, I would point out if there are people joining Farm Bureau as a result of its position on the property rights issue, maybe Ms. Gillette should listen to what those people are saying through joining Farm Bureau. Also, this effort is taking place all across the country and in the halls of the United States Congress. It isn't just a "Farm Bureau" movement.

Like so many others who identify themselves as "environmentalist" and who call themselves "spokesperson for the public", Ms. Gillette clearly indicates a gross misunderstanding of what property rights legislation is all about. Yes, we have Fifth Amendment protection which provides that private property will not be "taken" for public use without the owner being paid "just compensation" for that property. However, government agencies have developed a tendency to bypass the "just compensation" clause by not taking physical possession of the property. Instead, they simply restrict the use

of such property, leaving owner with all obligations related to owning the property.

Ms. Gillette and other detractors of property owners' rights toss around examples of what this legislation would create, such as landfills in the middle of residential areas or topless next to schools. The Fifth Amendment protects only reasonable uses of property. It does not "all uses," and it is unreasonable for such fear tactics to be cited as a consequence.

Private property rights legislation will not place public health and well-being in jeopardy. Laws, along with Supreme Court decisions, clearly indicate that property owners do not have the right to use their property in a manner harmful or noxious to the public. Government has an obligation to protect public welfare from unreasonable use of property without paying affected property owners compensation.

At the same time, government is expected to apply regulation and rules in a reasonable manner, taking into consideration the rights of property owners.

As a farmer, a property owner and a taxpayer, I am proud to have an organization to which I belong fighting for my interests. Farm Bureau's positions on property rights and other issues come from Farm Bureau members representing our 82 county Farm Bureaus. I do not hesitate to say that Farm Bureau represents the feelings and desires of a large number of people on property rights and many other issues. However, the strength of Farm Bureau's efforts come from those people and their personal contacts with legislators and other government officials. 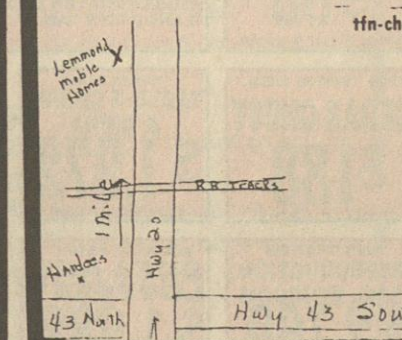

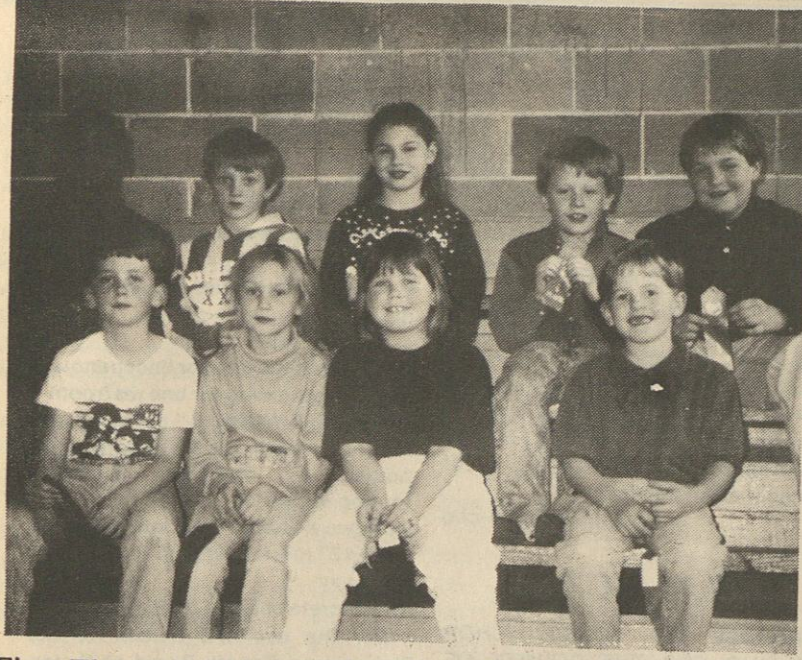

Housekeeping Weekly Summary

The 1995 legislative session is moving into its final stages following approval of a series of bond measures and more than 90 appropriation bills in the past week by the House of Representatives, including proposed increases in funding for mental health programs, the state's correctional system and other priority needs.

Most budget bills have been referred to House-Senate conference committees to thrash out differences between the two chambers and ensure that total expenditures do not exceed anticipated revenues in the fiscal year starting July 1. This is part of the usual legislative process in the 90-day session is due to end by April 2.

Among measures winning final legislative approval were bills to authorize \$2.5 million bonds for an Armed Forces Museum at Camp Shelby; \$2,005,000 in bonds for a proposed Eudora Welty Writers Center in Jackson; \$11.1 million for construction and equipping a new building to house the Mississippi Museum of Natural Science; \$800,000 in revenue bonds for a seed testing

laboratory at Mississippi State University; and increase the bonds that may be issued for the state port from \$50 million to \$80 million.

Budget bills passed by the House include provisions to authorize a proposed annual salary increase of \$1,200 for state employees and personnel at the state's universities, and a six percent pay raise to go to faculty and staff members at the community colleges. A General Fund appropriation totaling \$227.9 million was approved for support of the universities; more than \$91 million was allocated for community colleges; and \$94 million was authorized for the University of Mississippi Medical Center and its related programs.

Other key appropriations winning House approval included \$152.9 million in General Fund money for mental health institutions and programs, an increase of about \$15 million over this year's budget. The consolidated budget proposed includes more than \$61 million in general funds for the State Hospital at Whitfield, \$27 million for East Mississippi State Hospital, \$14.7 million for Ellisville State School, and varying amounts for other facilities. In addition, the bill would help finance 10 additional group homes for former psychiatric patients, six additional group homes for the mentally retarded, three therapeutic group homes for children, and provide \$200,000 to be used for crisis intervention services for children and youth.

The House voted to allocate

\$25 million in state funds for repair and rehabilitation of rural bridges, the second \$25 million outlay under a five-year bridge program initially approved during the 1994 session.

The House voted to authorize \$46 million from the General Fund for the Department of Public Safety; \$89 million for payment of the state's bonded debt; \$44 million for the state Tax Commission; and \$15 million for repair and renovation of state-owned buildings. Final legislative approval was given to \$69 million for homestead reimbursement payments.

The House approved \$9 million in start-up funds for a tuition assistance grants program to help students attending Mississippi Universities, colleges and community colleges, although the amount is short of an estimated \$28 million needed to fully fund the program under earlier enabling legislation.

An amendment was adopted by the House to provide \$1 million for the Mississippi Fire Fighters Memorial Burn Center in Greenville, primarily for new

or replacement equipment. The money would come from some unused funds allocated in disaster relief purposes.

Several supplemental expenditures were approved including additional funds for holding state inmates in county jails, provide for construction of national guard armories at Winona and Crystal Springs, and enable the Highway Patrol to establish an automated Fingerprint Identification System and uniform communications system to aid in the fight against crime.

The House agreed to accept Senate amendments to several bills, including proposals to strengthen child pornography laws, create a Mississippi Professional Corporation Act, require state agencies to prepare an economic impact statement when adopting rules and regulations, establish a Liquified Compressed Gas Board, revise state litter laws, and authorize an advisory panel to study laws and regulations dealing with management and preservation of local governmental records. These now go to the Governor.

And a resolution was adopted to ratify the 13th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution which abolished slavery in the nation. The state's 1890 Constitution already contains a similar provision.

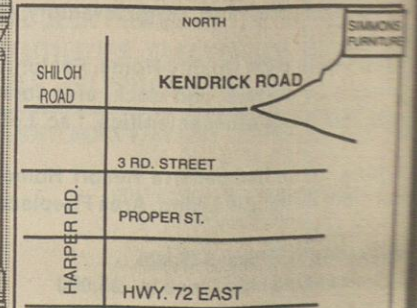

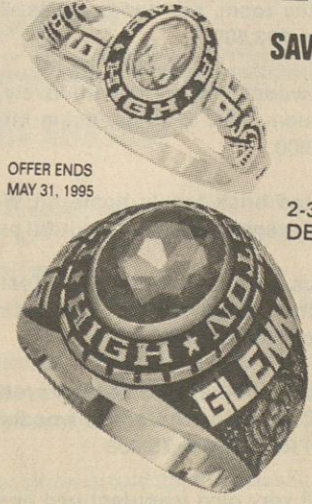
