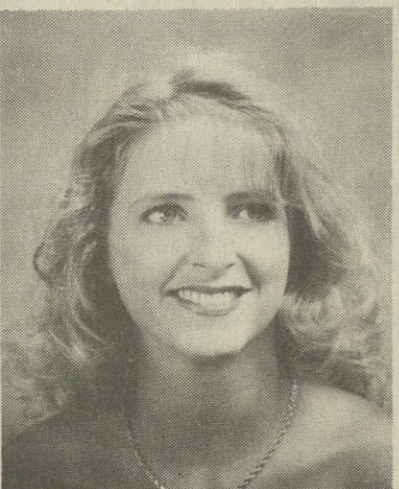

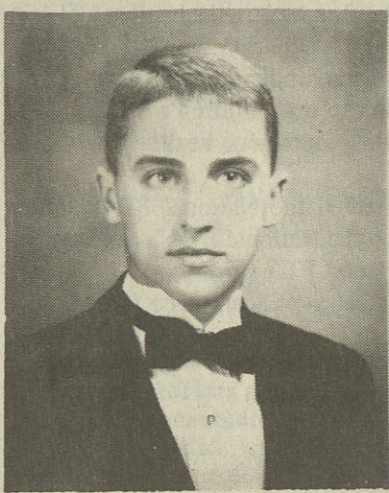
1995 Belmont High Valedictorian

Andrea plans to attend Northeast MS Community College and MS State University majoring in Mathematics.



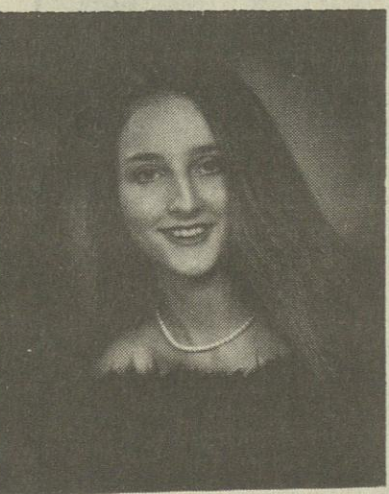

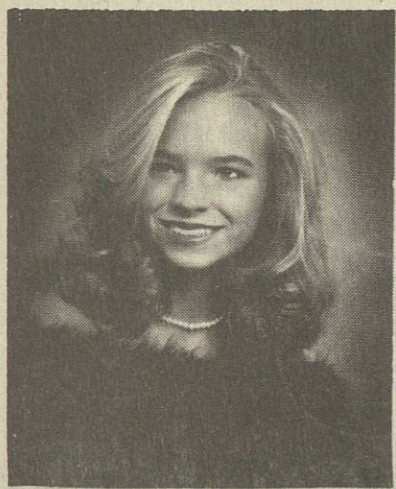

Pamela D. South Coaches Winning Mock Trial Team



Pamela D. South, daughter of Herbert and Lela South of Iuka, was one of four attorney coaches for a Georgia high school team which won the National High School Mock Trial Competition held May 12th and 13th in Denver, Colorado.

South Gwinnett High School, located in Snellville, Georgia, won the Georgia's High School Mock Trial Competition in February, 1995. After winning

the state championship, the school sent a student team, teachers, and attorney coaches to Denver for the national competition. In Denver, the student team performed as attorneys and witnesses in a mock trial, using rules of evidence and Colorado statutes. The students argued a death penalty sentencing case before judges and attorneys in the national competition. The Georgia team beat the team from Delaware in the final round of the competition, arguing before seven judges in the Colorado Supreme Court. The national championship round was filmed by Court TV and is set to air in June of this year.

South is a Senior Assistant District Attorney for the Gwinnett County District Attorney's Office, located in Lawrenceville, Georgia. She is currently head of the office's Child Protection Team, which specializes in child molestation and abuse cases.

Evans Awarded Lifetime Membership

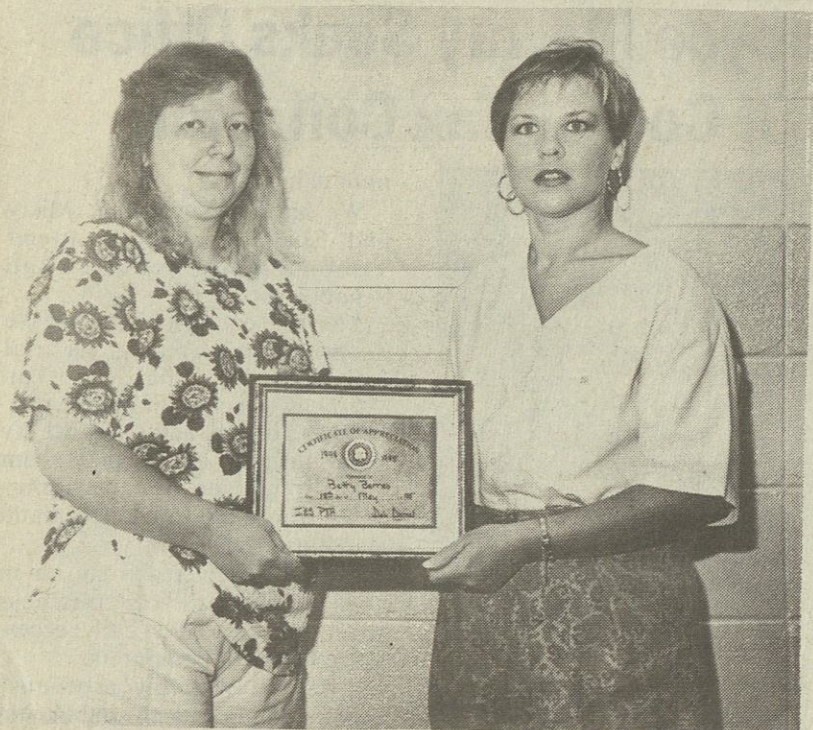

Home Economics Tips

POST-WEDDING WEIGHT GAIN

We are fast approaching the most popular time of year for weddings. June has long been the traditional wedding month, but August is actually the busiest month for weddings.

Many new couples find themselves gaining weight after the wedding when efforts to please their new spouse overrule their better judgment at the table.

Trying to please each other, either by cooking a lot or by eating all that is set before them, often results in weight gain. It is important that couples be aware that can happen.

The problems can begin in several different ways. If the wife does most of the cooking and was involved in family meal preparation prior to marriage, she may be inclined to cook food in larger than necessary quantities.

If she has little experience cooking, she may lean on a cookbook with new recipes to impress her husband, which is good unless it causes them to eat too much. The other extreme is that the couple may eat too many fast foods.

Couples can avoid most weight gain by developing some basically good nutritional habits:

*Avoid too many fried foods,

sweet desserts and fast foods.

*Try to include more fruits and vegetables (a habit few single people maintain).

*Limit the consumption of alcohol, which is high in calories.

*Grill, bake, broil and boil meats instead of frying them.

*Experiment with herbs and spices for seasoning instead of butter, margarine or bacon drippings.

*Try to use portion control. Cook or provide only enough for two people.

*Do not keep junk food around the house.

*Increase the amount of exercise.

*Shop carefully. Use a list and do not shop on an empty stomach. This also will help the family budget.

The bottom line is to eat a wide variety of foods for a more nutritious diet. It is better to avoid putting the weight on in the first place than to have to take it off later.

CHECKING BEHIND THE EYES

The backs of your eyes provide many clues to your general health. This region is unique in that tiny blood vessels of the retina can be seen directly. The condition of these vessels often tell the tale. For example, if you have high blood pressure, changes noted in these vessels often can determine the severity of your problem.

A hand-held instrument called an ophthalmoscope is used in conducting this test. Your eye doctor may put a drop or two of medicine into your eyes to widen (dilate) your pupils. The lights will be dimmed and the exam begins. Darkening the room causes your pupils to enlarge, expanding the area to be examined. You will be asked to sit upright and look at a spot on the other side of the room.

Aided by a bright light from the instrument, your doctor will carefully evaluate the back portion (fundus) of your eyes, primarily the retina (which receives images and transmits them to your brain). The examination is painless.

CARE FOR THE OLDER DOG

Dogs, like humans, have a longer life expectancy today than ever before. Veterinary care is more sophisticated, vaccines have been discovered and improved, the standards of diet are higher, and pet owners are generally taking better care of their "best friends".

When a dog reaches an older age, from 10 to 12 years, his body begins to undergo a number of changes. In order to keep him as healthy and happy as possible, a number of adjustments should be made by the dog owner.

The older dog is more sensitive to heat and cold. He should be kept out of drafts in the winter, not given too much exercise in the heat of summer, and dried off when wet. His diet should also be modified to keep up with his changing metabolism. He may also require the addition of vitamin supplements and hormones.

Since an older dog is also more susceptible to various ailments and diseases, it is especially important that he visit the veterinarian for frequent regular check-ups.

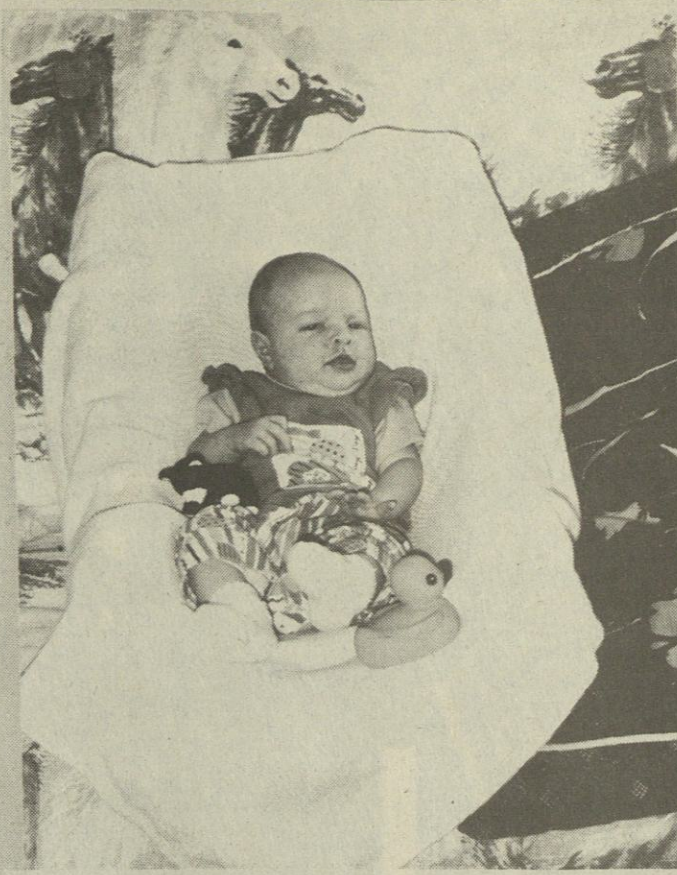
Lawanda is a 1995 graduate of the University of Central Arkansas, with a Bachelor of Science in Education. She is currently employed with the Oden School

Natural Resources Conservation Service

Many farmers are double
cropping wheat and soybeans to
increase income, improve cash
flow, spread risk and get better
land use. Double cropping can
also reduce soil erosion if crop
residues from both the soybeans
and wheat are managed properly.
There are two primary
methods of planting soybeans after
wheat. The first is to burn the
wheat straw and prepare a seed-
bed. Burning wheat straw has
several disadvantages. First, burn-
ing straw can cause hazards
from smoke and danger to
surrounding property. Burning
also increases soil erosion. Seed-
bed preparation after straw
removal usually results in loss of
soil moisture which creates
problems with getting a stand.
The other planting method for
soybeans after wheat is to plant
the soybeans no-till into the
wheat residue. There are several

advantages to this method.
Valuable time is saved by
eliminating two to three tillage
trips, soil moisture is saved,
hazards from smoke and fire are
eliminated and soil conservation
is greatly improved.

If you choose to plant your
soybeans after wheat no-till, you
will need a no-till planter or drill
that is capable of cutting through
the wheat straw and covering the
seed. You will also need to apply
a good burndown herbicide at
planting that will kill the growing
vegetation. This is one of the
most important steps in planting
no-till soybeans. A grass pre-
emergence herbicide will also be
needed at planting. Post-
emergence weed control in no-till
soybeans will be the same as for
conventional till soybeans.

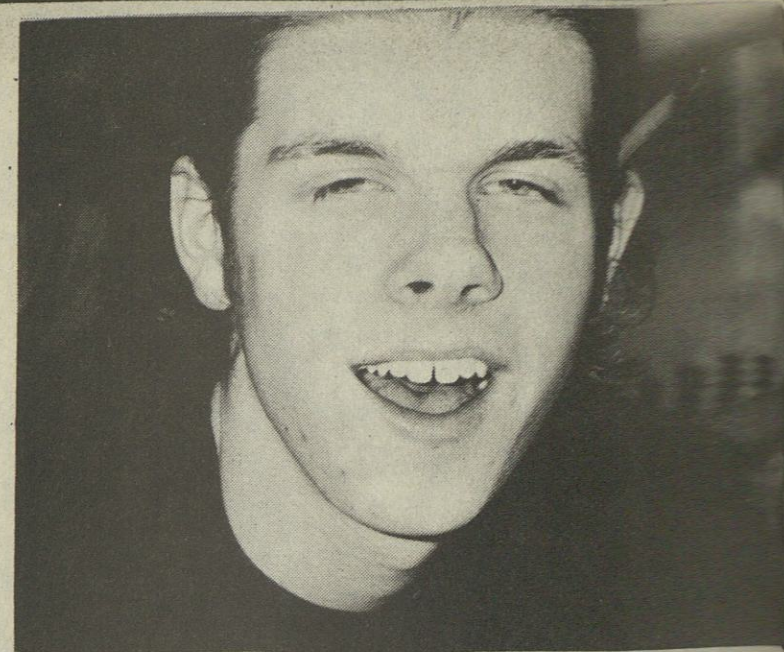

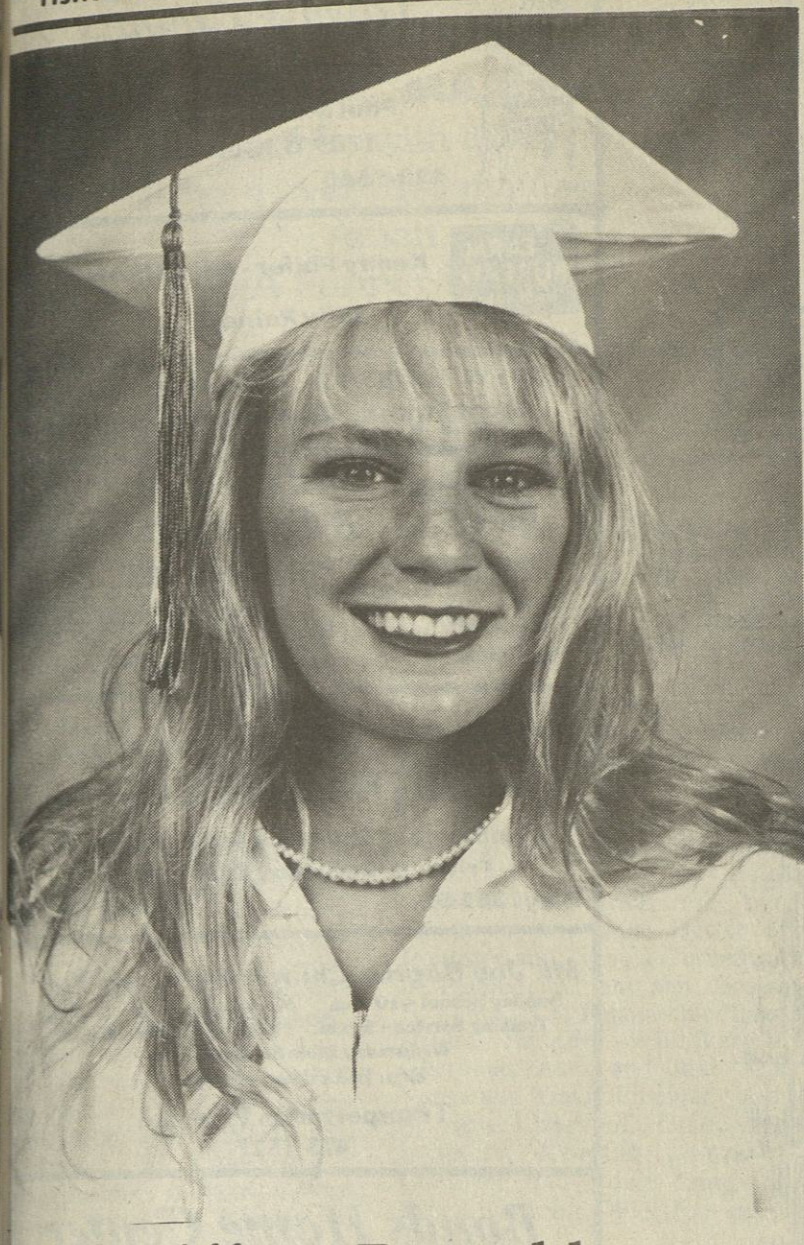

Enjoy Honeysuckle's Different Varieties

Ride anywhere in Mississippi in May and you are likely to see or smell honeysuckle. The air is rich with the sweet smell, and it makes sitting on the porch swing in the evening more inviting in May. During the day, fat black and yellow bumblebees work the flowers, collecting nectar. And who hasn't as a child picked honeysuckle flowers to suck out the sweet nectar drops? Honeysuckle is everywhere. It is praised by those who see beauty in the white and yellow blankets of flowers draped across tree limbs like quilts out for an airing. It is cursed by those fighting to keep plants and land free of the relentlessly spreading vine. Even if you hate

honeysuckle for all the trouble it causes, you've got to admit, it does smell good. Japanese honeysuckles (Lonicera japonica) is the invasive type of honeysuckle. It was introduced into the United States in 1806 and has essentially taken over wherever it was planted. As an escape to the wild it now covers roadsides and trees with a tangled mass of plant-smothering vines. Many people consider it to be a noxious weed. Honeysuckle flowers open white and turn yellow. The fragrance is delightful, but the vine is so rampant that once it gains a foothold, controlling it in the yard becomes a full-time job. It seems no matter how much of it you cut and tear up, it just keeps on coming. Honeysuckle vines rapidly cover hollies, azaleas, camellias and other lan-

dscape shrubs. Once it's in the shrubs, the only way to remove it is to cut it out. Ground level runners rapidly snake unseen under layers of mulch through flower beds. When you spy a sprig and try to pull it up, you find the runner has roots and side branches that have spread everywhere. Fortunately, some non-selective herbicides provide some control in open areas, but cutting and pulling is frequently the only way to get honeysuckle out of shrub beds and borders. So you don't get the idea that

all honeysuckle is bad, there are several close relatives of Japanese honeysuckle that make excellent landscape plants. One example is Trumpet honeysuckle (L. sempervirens), which is native to the United States. The flowers have no fragrance and some might consider this a drawback. The vine is easy to control -- a definite plan for this plant. Flower color is variable, but the most widely available flower color is red with a yellowish interior. The cultivar Sulphurea has pure yellow flowers. Other named

cultivars are Magnifica (bright red) and Superba (orange-scarlet to bright scarlet). Trumpet honeysuckle is a great plant to train to a lattice fence or to train on a post. The heaviest bloom is in spring, but the plant continues to produce flowers throughout the summer. Hummingbirds are frequent visitors to trumpet honeysuckle flowers. Look for this plant in local garden centers and nurseries. Winter honeysuckle is another honeysuckle found in southern landscapes. This plant makes a large shrub that requires a good

amount of garden space. It can be pruned, but heavy pruning destroys the natural form of the plant. The flowers are white, quite small, and appear in late winter and early spring. The botanical name for winter honeysuckle is L. fragrantissima, which is definitely appropriate. Though small, the flowers are big on fragrance and have a strong lemony-sweet scent. The earliest known zoo belonged to Queen Hatshepsut of Egypt about 1500 BC.

1994 Deadliest Holiday: Memorial Day

The Memorial Day holiday, considered the beginning of summer, also marked the end of 15 lives in Mississippi traffic crashes during the 1994 78-hour period.

According to Col. Jimmy Stringer, Mississippi Highway Patrol director, this was the deadliest holiday of 1994. "These deaths are a grim reminder that driving is serious business," Stringer said. "It is not enough to start the engine. People should be conscious of what they are doing behind the wheel. Fastening a safety belt or being a designated driver can mean the difference in life or death."

He said the state troopers commissioned in February recently completed their field training program and are in their own enforcement vehicles. "We are realizing the additional manpower of the 29 who graduated in Cadet Class 50," Stringer said. "On May 1 they finished a 14-week evaluation process where they performed their duties with a monitoring officer. Their addition to the ranks gives us a total of 297 enforcement troopers." Stringer said that special roadblocks and radar details are scheduled throughout the state

for Memorial Day weekend. "We are going to strictly enforce the law and do whatever is necessary to save lives," he said. "If we can save a life by giving a driver a ticket or taking a drunk to jail, we would have accomplished our mission."

Of the 15 people who died during the 1994 Memorial Day holiday, 11 were killed in one-vehicle crashes, three in two-vehicle crashes and one in a three-vehicle crash. Five were killed on Highway patrol roads, three on city streets and seven on county roads. The Highway Patrol arrested 146 drivers under the influence of drugs or alcohol and issued 3,045 citations for speed law violations during the 1994 observance.

The Memorial Day holiday begins at 6 p.m. on Friday, May 26 and ends at midnight Monday, May 29.

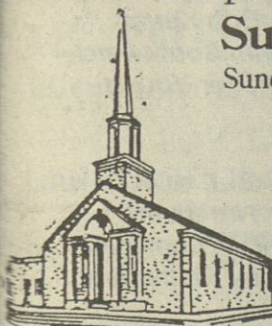

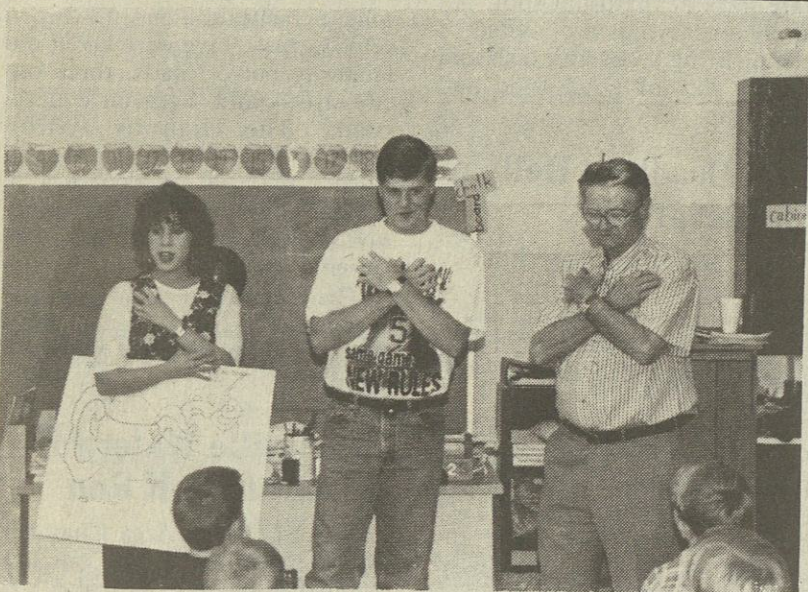

County Agents Notes

PRUNING TIPS FOR FIRE BLIGHT CONTROL

Fire blight has been a widespread disease on susceptible varieties of apples and pears in home orchards in the county this spring. Apples, pears, flowering crabapple, and other common landscape plants such as flowering quince, hawthorn, and pyracantha are susceptible. Ornamental pears haven't escaped damage, and some varieties of Bradford pears have been affected by this disease. Crowns of diseased trees have a "scorched" appearance as a result of bacterial infections which cause extensive dieback of branches and new shoots. Tree mortality as a result of fire blight isn't common, but can occur from damage which results from disease buildup over several seasons. Consecutive wet, cool springs are ideal conditions for fire blight development. Control at this point in the season is limited. However, for badly diseased plants, the following practices could help reduce the impact of this troublesome disease. (1) While it's not a good idea to prune fire blight diseased branches or twigs after active growth has started, it can be done, provided EXTREME sanitation is practiced. (2) Pruning tools MUST BE DISINFECTED between each cut. Tools should be dipped in or swabbed with a denatured 75% methyl alcohol solution. A 75% solution can be prepared by mixing three volumes of denatured alcohol with one volume of water. A 10% bleach solution (nine volumes of liquid bleach to one volume of water) can also be used. This preparation is the most effective but is corrosive to most pruning tools. If it is used, the tools should be thoroughly rinsed, dried, and oiled following completion of pruning. (3) All pruning should be made several inches below the point of visible infection. (4) DO NOT prune during periods of rainy weather. (5) To prevent cankers on large limbs and trunks, "rub off"

water-sprouts during the spring and summer. (6) Avoid excessive nitrogen fertilization at any point in the season, since this promotes succulent growth highly susceptible to fire blight infection. (7) Ideally, fire blight pruning should be carried out as a summer activity during drier periods when bacterial spread is less likely to occur as a result of pruning. (8) Spray application of bactericides to fire blight infected trees serves little value at this time of year. This practice is most effective during the dormant season and later in the season at blossom time. For additional information on fire blight and other fruit diseases, drop by the County Extension Office.

BUYING TREATED LUMBER
There has been an explosion of Southern "do-it-yourself" pine products available to homeowners for outdoor building projects. You can buy pressure-treated lumber, posts, landscaping logs, trellises, patio blocks and tomato stakes made of pine. In Tishomingo County, more homeowners than ever are interested in improving their homes. Patio decks and privacy fences are increasingly popular here, and many of you are building them. When buying treated wood, look for a quality mark stamp on each piece. This mark is your guarantee of quality. It should give the name of the company treating the wood, type of preservative used and designated use of the wood (ground contact or above ground). The mark should also carry the letters AWPB (American Wood Preservers Bureau) or SPIB (Southern Pine Inspection Bureau). These organizations monitor the treating companies for use of quality control standards. If you need more information on pressure-treated pine, please come by the office.

THREE CHANGES FOR CRP
"The Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) under which producers retired production from over 36.4 million acres of cropland under 10 to 15 year contracts, has three significant changes in it this year," said Phillip Horn, County Executive Director.

Producers with CRP contracts expiring September 30, 1995 can extend the maturity dates for one year for part or all of the land. No new land can be added. Rental rates remain unchanged and crop insurance requirements will not apply to 1-year extensions.

CRP participants have a one-time chance to withdraw part or all of their land from the program. Not all CRP acreage is eligible for removal. CRP acreage with cover such as filterstrips, waterways, strips along riparian areas, windbreaks, shelter belts, shallow water wildlife areas, certain timber establishments or wetlands and acreage subject to wildlife easements will be required to remain in CRP.

"Sign-up for 1-year extensions and early releases from contracts will be announced later," said Horn.

Concerning the third change Horn said that there will be modified program requirements covering CRP land preparation for fall seeding for producers whose contracts expire this year and who wish to plant CRP acres this fall. Under current

requirements, CRP cover may be destroyed without penalty during the last 90 days of the contract, but not earlier than July 1, to prepare a seed bed for fall-planted crops only. In summer fallow and certain other arid areas, producers may apply for an earlier date than July 1 to conserve moisture.

The only reason a producer may apply for the earlier date is for the preparation of a seedbed for fall planting. In some areas, maintaining crop cover till July could effectively prevent the planting of a fall crop.

"Producers wishing to begin land preparation before July 1 must obtain approval from the county committee, and the CRP rental payment will be reduced," said Horn.

May - Better Hearing And Speech Month

Speech Therapy In The School
May is Better Hearing and Speech Month. Many schools in Mississippi have Speech-Language Pathologists providing therapy to children everyday. Therapy is provided for children who have articulation disorders (they may say "pish" instead of "fish") and for stuttering problems. They also work with children who have voice problems. Their voices may be too nasal, too loud, too soft or too hoarse. Many children with language disorders are also being worked with. These children have trouble following instructions, making sense or written materials and expressing their ideas. These children may also be having difficulty communicating with their peers as well as their teachers and families.

Speech-language pathologists work with children individually, in small groups and in classrooms. Children with communication disorders need treatment as early as possible. For more information on better hearing and speech, call your local school board office to find out what assistance is available in your area. 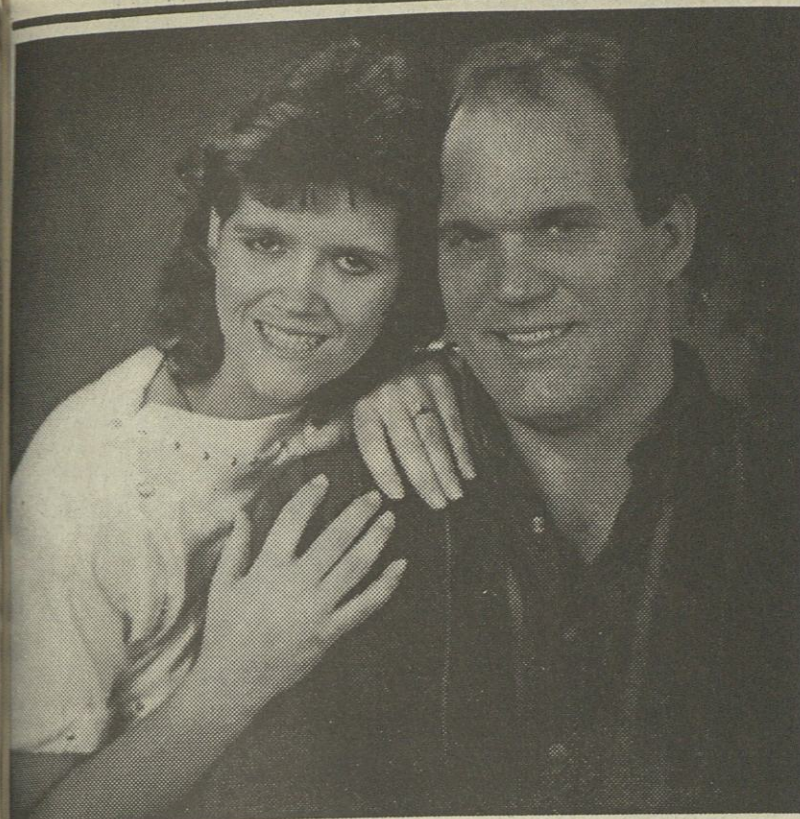

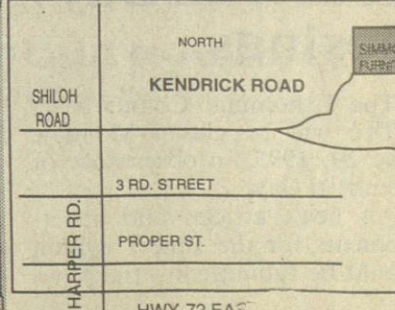

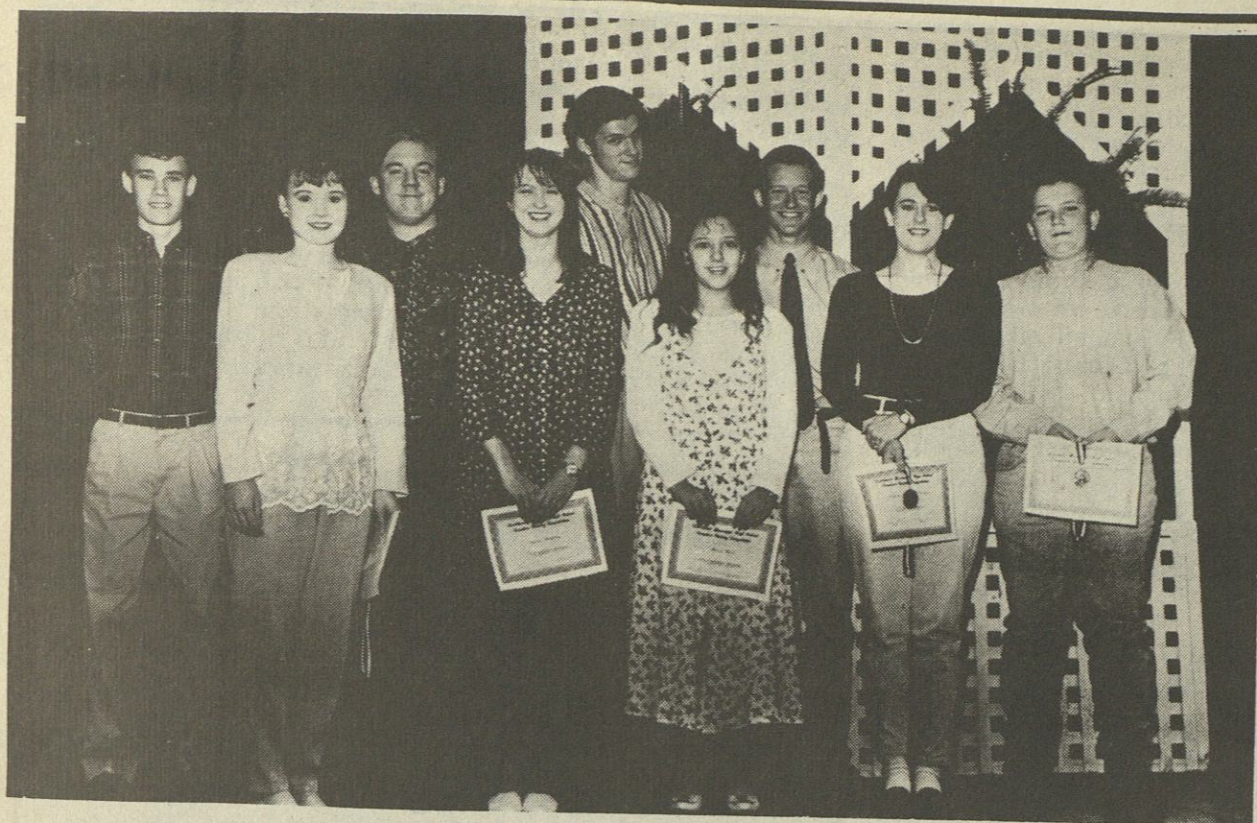

U.S. Court Of Appeals Upholds Former Principal's Settlement

A federal court jury verdict that awarded former Iuka High School's principal Aubrey Ray \$32,000 in a 1993 civil rights lawsuit has been upheld by the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

Tupelo attorney Jim Waide, who represented Ray, said that the Court of Appeals upheld not only the judgement, but also the

Federal District Judge's order that Ray could be paid "front pay" instead of reinstatement. The total awarded to Ray was \$38,000 with \$6,600 being "front pay".

Ray filed the suit against the now resolved Iuka Separate Municipal School District and the new consolidated Tishomingo County School District after he was passed over for a promotion and a younger man was hired as principal. Ray won the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission age discrimination case

against the district.

Ray is now employed as superintendent of education in Coffeeville.

Miss Tishomingo County Addresses Critical Issue

Miss Tishomingo County, Christe Harris, spoke to the faculty of Tishomingo County High School Monday about a concern she feels called to address during her reign as the county's representative to the Miss Mississippi pageant.

Christe chose as her platform vision education. Statistically speaking, of the approximately 60 million individuals living in the United States today, 90 million suffer from some form of undiagnosed eye disorder. She personally recognizes a specific need for creating an awareness of vision care.

Christe shared with the faculty the experience that lead her to choose this platform. At the age of four, Miss Harris was diagnosed with an eye disorder known as amblyopia. She experienced outwardly what appeared to be the turning in of her right eye. At times, the disorder manifested itself only slightly

while at other times, its appearance was unpredictable and severe. Inwardly, Christe experienced double vision, loss of depth perception, and extreme frustration as she struggled to perform routine tasks.

Harris is quick to say, "Most persons take the seemingly endless gift of sight for granted. They expect to wake up every morning and see all the things they are accustomed to seeing every day."

Having been treated by leading ophthalmologists for fifteen years, Christe grew compelled to find a source of hope believing that something could be done to help her lead a life of uninhibited sight.

This experience and all that it brought to Christe is as she says, "the reason I stand before you now as Miss Tishomingo County. I believe it was because God has given me a miracle, and He wanted me to use my experience to

help others. I believe I simply have a message to be heard."

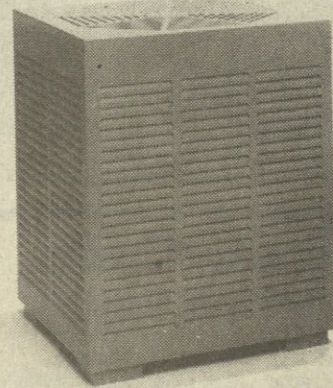

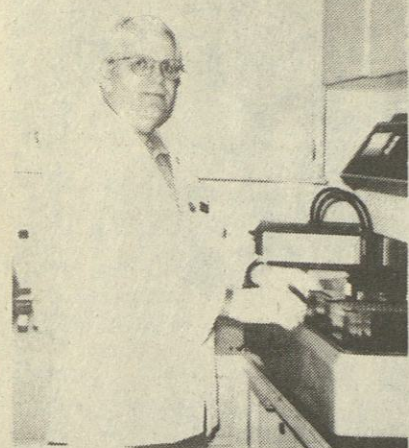

AND THUS ENHANCING ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT THROUGH THE CREATION OF JOBS.

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi (the "Governing Body" of the "County"), does hereby find, determine, adjudicate and declare as follows:

1. The Mississippi Business Investment Act, constituting Sections 57-61-1 et. seq. Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended (the "Act"), was enacted for the purpose of promoting business and economic development in the State of Mississippi (the "State") through investment by private companies locating in the State.

2. Pursuant to Section 57-61-36 (1) and (3) of the Act, the Department is authorized to make grants to coun-

ties to complete infrastructure related to new or expanded industry for the purpose of enhancing economic development through the creation of jobs.

The County will agree to furnish land improvements with related infrastructure and will request the Department to finance a portion of the cost associated with the development of these improvements (the "Project").

5. The County will enter into a Grant Agreement (the "Agreement") with the Department wherein the County agrees to accept the proceeds of the Grant subject to and upon the terms and conditions of the Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE COUNTY, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Governing Body of the County, does hereby declare its intention to authorize and approve a Grant from the Department in the principal amount not to exceed Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000) for the purpose of completing infrastructure related to Designer Homes, Inc. and thus enhancing economic development through the creation of jobs.

Section 2. The Governing Body proposes to authorize and approve the Grant from the Department in the amount and for the aforesaid purposes at a meeting of the Governing Body to be held at its regular meeting place at the County Courthouse in Iuka, Tishomingo County, Mississippi at 10:00 a.m. on the 15th day of May, 1995, or at some meeting held subsequent thereto.

Section 3. This Resolution shall be published once a week for at least four (4) consecutive weeks in the Tishomingo County News, a newspaper published in the City of Iuka, Tishomingo County, Mississippi and having a general circulation in the County and qualified under the provisions of Section 13-3-31, Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended. The first publication of the Resolution shall be made not less than twenty-one (21) days prior to May 15, 1995, and the last publication shall be made not more than seven (7) days prior to such date, said Resolution to be published on Thursday, May 25, June 1 and June 8 and June 15, 1995.

Section 4. The Clerk of the County shall be and is hereby directed to procure from the publisher of the aforesaid newspaper the customary proof of said publication of this Resolution and have the same before the Governing Body on the date and hour specified in Section 2 hereof.
