Superintendent Responds To Questions **Concerning The 1995-1996 Budget For Tishomingo County School District**

THURSDAY, JULY 20, 1995 NO. 7

Dr. Carl L. Weeden, Superintendent of the Tishomingo County School District, has responded to some questions concerning the school budget. First of all, Dr. Weeden pointed out that the ad that was run in the local paper is a requirement by law. He agreed that the title of the ad, "Notice of Tax Increase", was misleading and suggested that the State Department should allow for a different title when there is no real tax increase [increase in millage rate].

The superintendent explained that some school districts did request the three mills increase of millage rate [a mill is .1 of 1 cent] as allowed by law, due to their 1995-96 budgets increasing significantly over the 1994-95 budgets. However, this school district only requested \$12,274 increase in ad valorem tax effort, which is less than 1 percent. Also, the overall increase of \$526,234 in the 1995-96 budget does not require an increase of millage rate.

Dr. Weeden stated that he was pleased that the district did not have to ask for the three mills increase of millage rate for the 1995-96 school year. The superintendent did, however, express some concern about the cost of the renovations that were necessary in order to implement the Tech Prep Programs at four of the school sites this fall. The good news was that the funds for this work were available in the 1994-95 school district budget.

Dr. Weeden emphasized that the 1996-97 budget would possibly have to include the cost of major roof repairs at some of the school sites. Some new roofing was done during the summer at Tishomingo Elementary School. Two other smaller projects are now being considered, but the next major roofing project will probably be at Iuka Middle School. This roof is getting rather old and at some point will need to be replaced.

The superintendent said he was pleased with the work that had taken place this summer, and although a few vacancies still exist and work continues at some sites for Tech Prep Labs, that the district will be ready to welcome teachers and staffs on Tuesday, August 8, 1995. Students will begin their new school year on Thursday, August 10, 1995.

FITTING THE HARD CONTACT LENS

If you're being fitted for hard contact lenses, the first thing the eye specialist will do is determine the optical correction needed to help you see clearly again. He will also want the contact lenses to conform to the size and shape of your cornea, the clear part of the eye or "window" through which you see. This is where the contact lens will rest when you're wearing it. The cornea is measured by a special instrument called a keratometer. For a comfortable fit, the lens must conform as exactly as possible to the shape of your cornea.

Once the lenses have been made to his specifications, the eye specialist will ask you to return for a fitting. With the contact lenses in place, he'll check the vision correction and fit.

Along with instructions on how to insert and remove the contacts, he'll give you tips on home care. He may ask you to wear them for two hours the first day and then gradually increase the wearing time until you can wear them comfortable all day long. In time you'll hardly realize they're there.



Three Little Indians... And Now There Is One

Visitors to Tishomingo State Park may ride past him without paying much attention, but he stands there faithfully pointing the way for any who might seek him out.

Originally there were three of the metal Indians, designed and constructed in 1939 by members of the Civilian Conservation Camp, who

One of the metal figures was placed at the entrance to the park on old Mississippi 25 in 1939. This one was apparently stolen sometime in the 1960's.

The other two figures were erected in Corinth-one at the intersection of Polk and Main Streets and one at the intersection of Highways 45 and 72. The one at the Polk/Main intersection was hit by a truck. The one remaining figure, along with its rock pedestal, was moved back to the park a couple of years ago.

The figures were originally drawn by Irby Buntin and were handmade by Ernest Clausel, Chief blacksmith at the CCC, using grinders, chisels and hacksaws.

The picture above, made in the 1960's, is of Sue Gist, along side the Hwy. 25 Indian. Sue and her husband Joseph, who lived out of state for many years, have retired and moved back to the Tishomingo area. They found this picture and had it enlarged so that they could donate it to the Tishomingo State Park Museum. The Gists are interested in finding out if anyone might know what became of the figure that is pictured here and was taken so long ago.

Rites Held For Charles R. Stephens Jr.

Charles R. Stephens Jr., a former director of chemical research at Pfizer, Inc., who was among world leaders in tetracycline antibiotic research, died Friday, June 30 at this home in Niantic, Conn. after being ill for about a year. He was 72.

Mr. Stephens, a resident of East Lyme for many years, went to Pfizer's Groton plant in 1950 as the first researh chemist assigned there after it opened. He retired in 1983 from Pfizer Central Research.

In the 1950s and early '60s, he led the team of scientists that discovered and patented the andoxycycline tibiotic (Vibromycin), which has had extensive worldwide use and is regarded as one of the most effective treatments for Lyme disease. Mr. Stephens was assigned in

1962 to Pfizer Chemical Research where projects under his direction resulted in several currently marketed food additive products including flavoring agents, lowcalorie bulking agents and a highintensity sweetner.

Mr. Stephens worked in both the pharmaceutical and chemical research divisions and was the author and co-author of many scientific publication. He joined the company on October 17, 1949 as a chemist. He became a group supervisor a short time later.

During World War II, Mr. Stephens worked at the Oak Ridge National Laboratory in Oak Ridge, Tenn. which produced material for the first atomic bomb. He was also in the Navy during the war, serving as lieutenant j.g. on an anti-submarine vessel in the Pacific Theater.

He was born December 30, 1922 in Burnsville, Miss., the son of Charles R. and Rhoda Haney Stephens. His maternal grandparents were Dr. T.P. Haney and Martha Gist Haney of Iuka. He was the great grandson of W.M. Gist who served as the mayor of Iuka in the late nineteenth century. He graduated in 1943 from Mississippi State College with a bachelor's degree in chemistry and physics. After the war, he attended the University of Minnesota where he obtained his doctorate in organic chemistry in 1949.

Mr. Stephens took an active interest in his community. He was a member for more than 20 years of the East Lyme Zoning Commission, serving as chairman and secretary. He also served for decades on the finance committee of Flanders Baptist and Community Church, of which he was a member





By: Danny Owen, County Agent PINE BEETLES MAY GET **TOUGH THIS YEAR**

I was talking with the County Forester recently and he stated that southern pine beetle activity has increased drastically in the county. Reports for the U.S. Forest Service show that numbers have increased in most southern states. Control measures are limited but keep an eye on your timber land. If you have questions, contact the County Forester or the Extension Office. PASTURES

Now is a good time to soil sample your pastures and apply needed lime. You may think that this is an odd time of the year but lime can be applied without fear of burning plants. If heavy rates of nitrogen were used during spring and summer months then the added lime will offset the increased soil acidity caused by the nitrogen.

CONTROL OF BLACK SPOT **ON ROSES**

The most important disease of roses, wherever they are grown, is black spot, a fungus disease favored by periods of warm, wet weather. These type conditions commonly occur each gardening season in the mid-South, and gardeners who wish to keep their rose garden the envy of the neighborhood will need to keep black spot under control. Symptoms of black spot begin on leaves as small (about the size of a pinhead), black or dark brown spots whick are circular in shape. Larger spots often have a "fringed" or "feathery" margins. Infected areas enlarge over a period of several weeks and may reach one-fourth to onehalf inch in diameter. In most cases, however, spots never reach this size, since infected leaflets turn yellow and fall prematurely. Black spot usually occurs on the lower portion of the rose bush first and moves upward as the season progresses. Leaves are most susceptible to infection when young but can be invaded at any point of development during periods when showers are numerous. Control of black spot begins with a year around program of disease prevention: *When watering overhead, do so early in the day so that plants have a chance to thoroughly dry before nightfall. Since moisture on leaves is necessary for infection to take place, this cultural procedure is very important in cutting down on foliage infection. *A regular fungicide spray program throughout the growing season is generally necessary to control blackspot. Any of several fungicides, including maneb, Daconil 2787 (or any fungicide containing chlorothalonil), will provide acceptable black spot control when used according to label instructions. *If only a few leaves show symptoms of black spot, remove and burn them. Remove all diseased leaves from around the plants in the fall and prune out all canes showing black spot lesions before growth begins in the spring. *Next winter, consider use of a dormant fungicide such as lime sulfur to reduce overwintering black spot inoculum which could cause problems the following spring. *New plantings should be in areas with good air circulation to promote rapid drying of leaves. Also, avoid shady areas and dense plantings where high humidity problems are most likey to occur.
