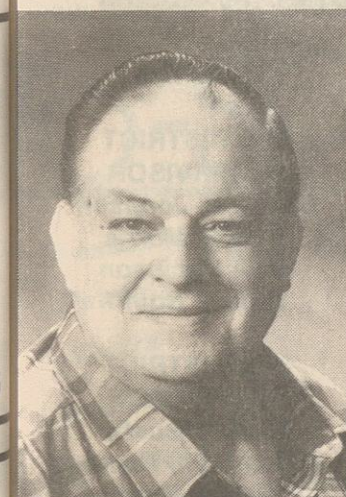

If I do not get to contact you personally, I want to take this opportunity to ask for your support in electing a hard working individual who will work for the people and make decisions to the best of my ability based on your input.

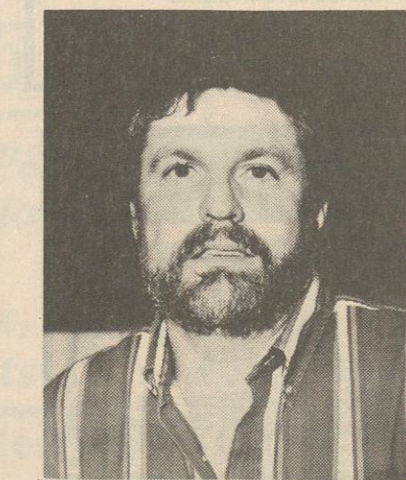

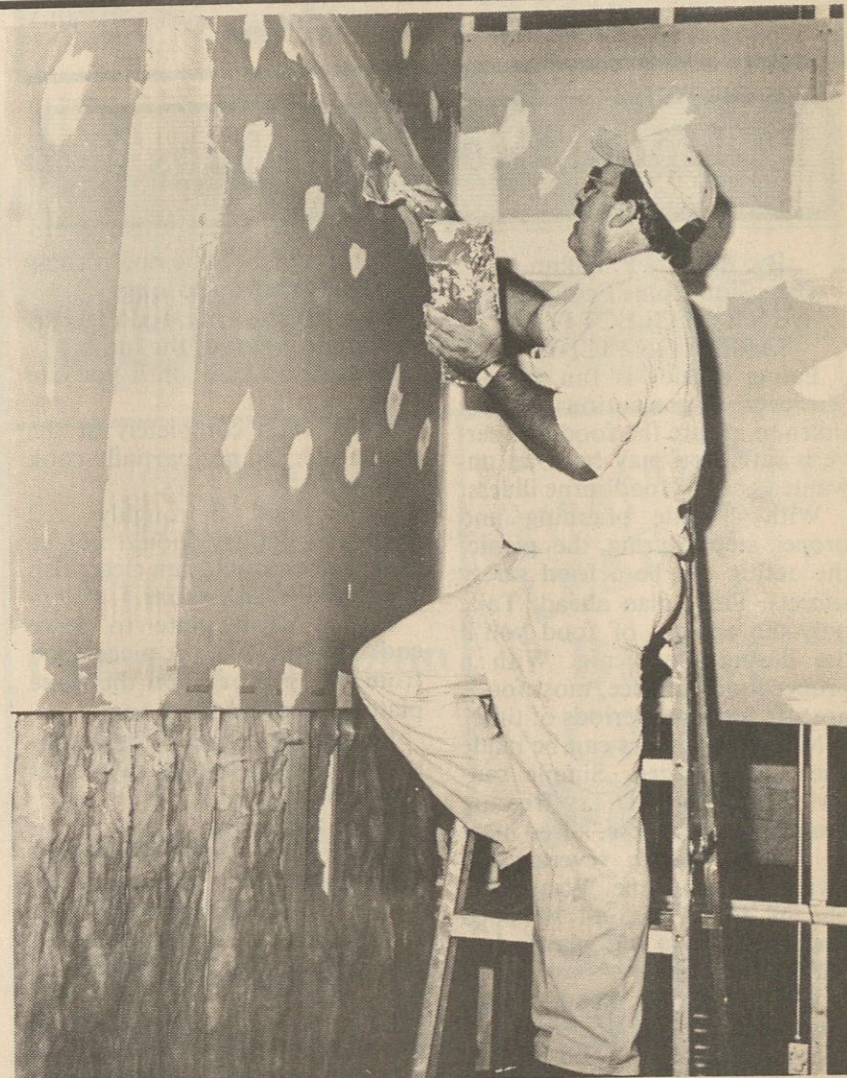
Political Rally At Tishomingo - July 29th

Academic & Vocational Studies Unite In Schools

Renovations at Burnsville, Tishomingo and Iuka Middle Schools and Tishomingo County High School this summer are in preparation for eight Tech-Prep Discovery Labs which are part of a statewide initiative to integrate academic and vocational education for grades 7, 8 & 9.

According to Gary Taylor, director of the Tishomingo County Vo-Tech Center and coordinator of the project locally, this "school to work" program will use the labs for a relevant teaching concept.

"All students in the 7th grade will go into the 'Career Discovery' lab one period a day," Taylor explained. "In this class they will get 'hand's on' experience with different career choices." Taylor went on to explain that all 8th grade students will be involved in "Computer Discovery." Students will use the state-of-the-art computers and will be able to gain valuable experience with a variety of computer programs. This experience will enhance any career they choose, Taylor emphasized.

All 9th grade students will be able to choose from a variety of options in the "Technology Discovery" labs at Tishomingo County High. There will be programs for students to work in such as-robotics, audio-visual communication, environmental technology, aerospace technology, biotechnology, lasers and much more.

The computers and other equipment used to furnish the labs are being provided by the state. However, Taylor stated that as a condition of receiving the equipment, the school district had to provide a nice, renovated area in which to put it.

"The State Department will be investing approximately half a million dollars in equipment for our county. They wanted to ensure that it was put in an appropriate environment; not stuck in the corner some where," Taylor said. These renovations are costing the county between \$35,000 & \$45,000, Taylor estimated.

The largest renovation is at Burnsville where the school's auditorium is being converted into two labs - Career Discovery and Computer Discovery.

Iuka and Tishomingo Middle Schools had classrooms which they were able to convert without much expense.

Probably the least expensive was the conversion of a portion of the Tri-State Education Initiative Consortium building into two labs for use by 9th grade students at TCHS.

Taylor emphasized that Belmont School's application for the project was not initially approved by the state; however, there has been another attempt for application and hopefully they will have the program in place for next year.

Home Economics Tips

**DON'T NEGLECT FOOD
SAFETY ON PICNICS**

Eating outside is fun for all! However, if precautions are not taken to ensure the food you serve is safe, you may have an unwanted guest -- foodborne illness.

With a little planning and proper steps during the picnic, the outing can be a food safety success. First, plan ahead. Take only the amount of food you'll use during the picnic. With a proper cooler and ice, most foods are safe for short periods of time.

Many sandwiches can be made ahead and frozen. Simple sandwiches freeze best. Try freezing peanut butter, cheese, sliced meat or poultry. Make several sandwiches at one time. Wrap each one by itself. Put all wrapped sandwiches in a big plastic bag and freeze them.

When packing food follow these pointers:

Start with cold food - pack right from the refrigerator or freezer. This includes foods such as cold fresh fruits, frozen meat patties and frozen lunch meats.

Pack all food in clean plastic wrap or sandwich bags.

Use an insulated cooler.

Include a cold source in the cooler or picnic basket such as a commercial ice pack or make your own by placing ice cubes in a plastic bag and then wrapping the bag in foil, freeze small cans or boxes of juice, yogurt or applesauce, they will thaw by lunch.

Pack cold infant formula in an insulated cooler with a source to keep it cold.

Keep hot foods hot with a thermos or insulated dish.

Once the picnic has begun:

Keep the cooler in the shade -- don't leave it in the direct sun light or in the trunk of the car.

Keep the lid on the cooler and avoid frequent openings.

Add more ice if it begins to melt.

In hot weather, food should not sit out for more than one hour, serve food quickly from the cooler and take out small portions so that the food doesn't stay out of the cooler too long.

If preparing the food at the picnic site is part of the fun;

Keep food cold until you are ready to grill it.

Cook food completely at the picnic site. Do not partially cook it ahead.

Cook food thoroughly, red meat and poultry should not be pink; juices should run clear; fish should flake with a fork.

Use a clean plate to serve cooked food. Do not place food from the grill back on the same plate the raw food was on.

Be careful to avoid cross contamination by letting raw meat juices touch other foods.

After the picnic:

Discard any potentially hazardous food, such as meat, fish, poultry eggs, dairy products or any food that contains one of these foods, that has been out of the cooler. If the ice source was used up during the picnic, check the temperature of the foods in the cooler and discard if the temperature is higher than 40 degrees F. Fresh fruits and vegetables may be refrigerated and used in a day or so.

Discard infant formula that has been warmed, removed from the cooler or warmed to a temperature higher than 40 degrees F.

Following these few food safety tips can eliminate any unwanted visitors and provide for a good time for all.

**THE RIGHT WAY TO ROTATE
VEGETABLE CROPS**

Rotation is one of the best ways to control many vegetable diseases caused by fungi, bacteria, and nematodes. However, for rotation to work effectively, the right type of crop rotation sequence should be followed. Gardeners who plan to produce a fall vegetable crop should think about using rotation to reduce diseases. The secret to rotation lies in the fact that some disease causing microbes affect one vegetable crop or group of vegetables but may not affect another. Rotation provides a host-free period which, if long enough, reduces high populations of fungi, bacteria, and nematodes to non-damaging levels so that the host crop may again be planted in the area with less danger of being attacked by diseases. Several vegetables of the same family such as squash, cucumber, and cantaloupes may be affected by the same disease. Therefore it is not a good practice

to grown plants of the same family in the same area of the garden for consecutive years. Avoid planting the area to these crops for at least three years. Call me at the Extension office at 423-7016 and I can send you a list of groups of vegetables that you can use to start a rotation program.

Picnic Shelters To Be Made Available For Reservation

The Corps of Engineers would like to announce that effective 1 August 1995 additional picnic shelters will be made available for reservations on Pool A near Amory, MS and at Bay Springs Lake. Additional Small shelters will be available for reservations at Paden Day Use Area, Piney Grove Picnic Area, West Damsite Picnic Area and Piney Grove Beach. All these areas are located on Bay Springs Lake. Additional Large Shelters will be available

at Amory Access Area on Pool A and at Old Bridge Beach on Bay Springs Lake. Piney Grove Beach and Old Bridge Beach are day use fee areas and persons entering the areas to use a reserved picnic shelters will be required to pay the fee in addition to the amount that has been paid to reserve the shelter, or will be required to have a valid annual day user pass.

The fee for reservations are \$25 for a small shelter and \$35 for a large shelter. Reservations for shelters at Bay Springs Lake may be made by calling the Bay Springs Resource Office at (601)454-3481. Reservations for the shelter at the Amory Access Area can be made by calling the Jamie L. Whitten Historical Center at (601)862-5414. Individuals should arrange for the reservations two weeks prior to the actual date of the picnic shelter being needed. As in the past, picnic shelters that are not reserved are available to the general public on a first come, first serve basis at no charge.

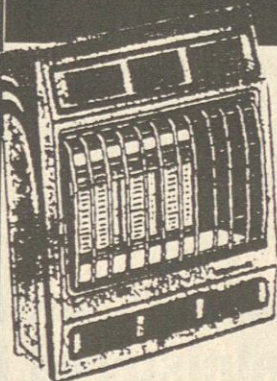

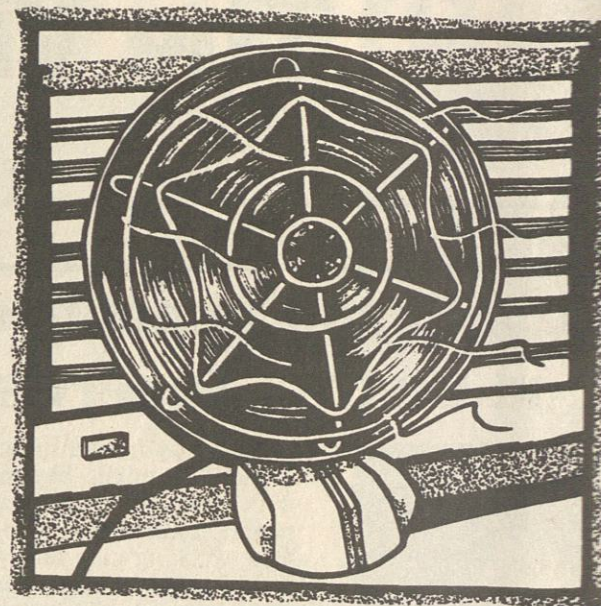

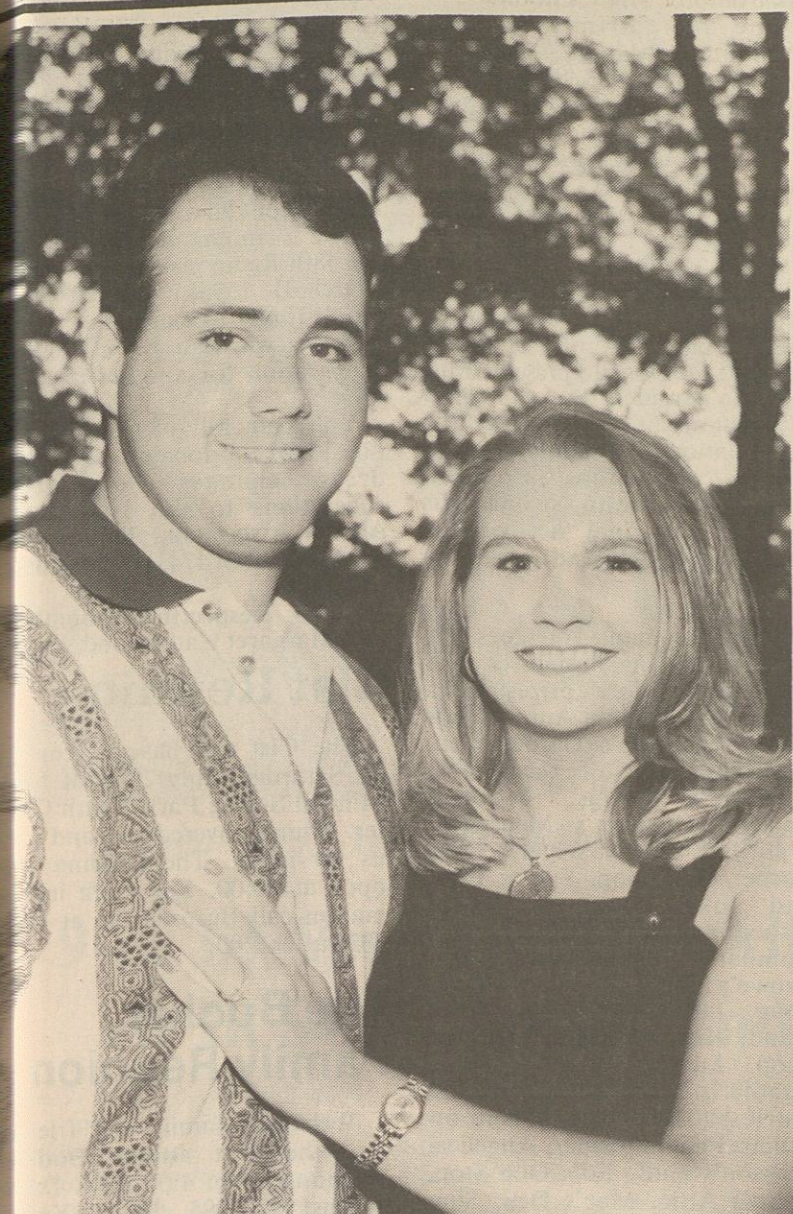

CATARACTS CAN BE SUBTLE
It may surprise you to learn that someone can have a cataract in one eye and not even know it. Cataracts can be subtle, and they can be there a long time without causing any serious problems.

In simple terms, a cataract is any imperfection in the clarity of the lens of the eye for whatever reason. The lens must be clear to allow light to pass through to the retina in the back of the eye. It's the retina that sends the images you see to your brain. With cataract, there's a clouding of the lens. Sometimes it's like a speck of dust that can be ignored. However, when vision is seriously impaired, the only recourse is surgery.

Sometimes a person with a cataract in one eye will see his eye specialist to get a new prescription to improve his vision. Perhaps he'll become more dependent on his good eye and let it do most of the seeing.

Cataracts are usually not painful and come on gradually, most often when people are older. If you're concerned about this problem, call for an eye check up.

Mr. Colvin and Mrs. Nixon are donating 10 sets of books for the new students. Donations for additional books (\$5.00) will be appreciated.

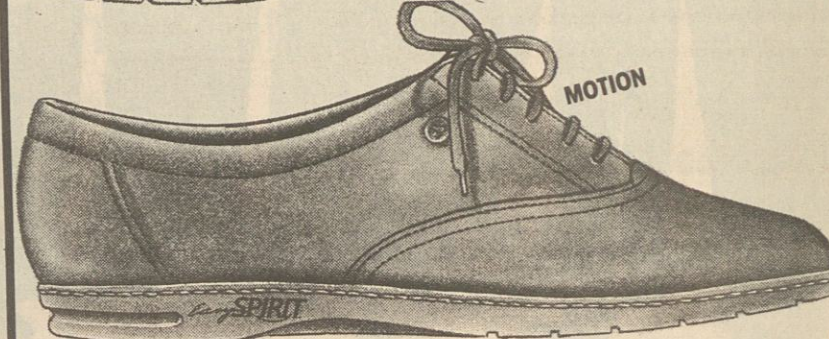
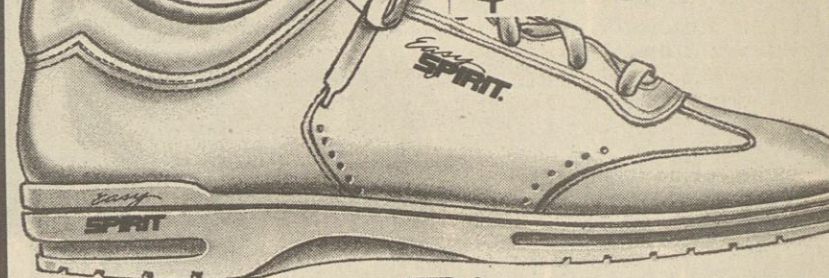
Mr. Colvin is furnishing the meeting place. Mrs. Nixon will be

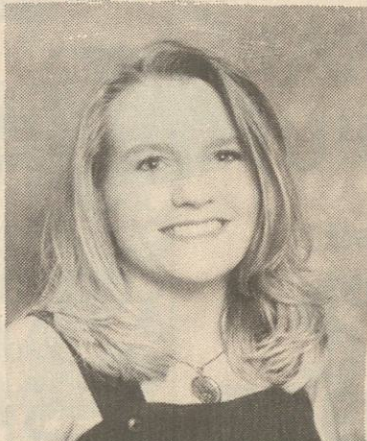
Lions Club News

The reason for my mentioning the history of our county is to point out that this county has

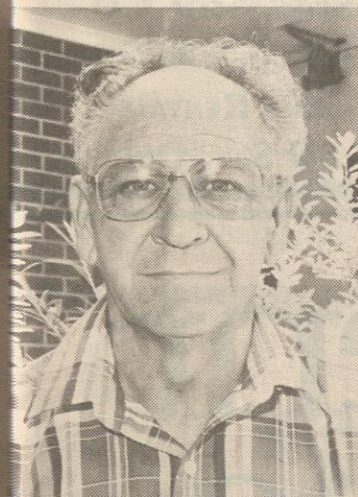

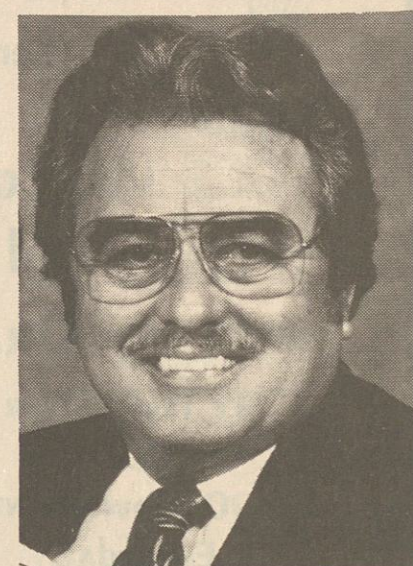

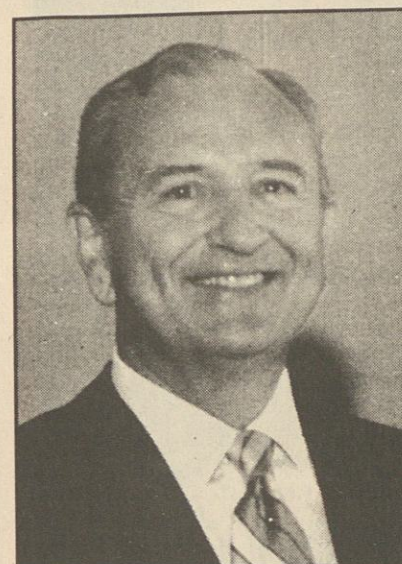

Dedication Ceremonies To Honor Roy C. Adams

According to Transportation Commissioner Zack Stewart, Ceremonies for the dedication of the Northern District Transportation Office Building to the late Roy C. Adams, a native of Tishomingo County, are scheduled for Monday, July 31, 1995, at 2 p.m.

The ceremony site is the District Office at 1909 North Gloster Street, in Tupelo, Miss., and the public is invited to attend.

According to Stewart, Adams faithfully served the people of this state as northern district highway commissioner from 1948 to 1968. During its regular session in 1995, the Mississippi Legislature passed House Bill 570 officially designating the Northern District Office as the "Roy Clark Adams District Office," in recognition of his dedication, vision and outstanding contributions to the welfare and economic future of North Mississippi.

In the early years of his service, no major legislative appropriations for primary and in-

terstate highways were in existence. However, the visionary Adams built secondary roads that enables the people of North Mississippi to "come out of the mud" with a highway system known as "farm-to-market roads." There were 55 such highways that were either partially or completely hard surfaced during his administration. Adams is credited with envisioning a scenic highway along the Mississippi River from Memphis to New Orleans. Today, his vision is a reality, and Highway 1 is known as The Great River Road.

Throughout his service, Adams worked tirelessly to educate people about the importance of highways to Mississippi's economic future. He was successful in bringing the Interstate Program, including Interstate 55, to the Northern District, and was in fact instrumental in developing and passing the major highway plan for the state.

As a Democrat, Adams made a bid for Governor in 1971, thus realizing a childhood dream. Even though unsuccessful in his bid, he received strong support from the people of the Northern District who he served.

From 1972 to 1977, Adams served as director of the Tombigbee River Valley Water Management District under Gov. Bill Waller. During this time, Adams made a major contribution to the completion of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway by spearheading the funding and planning for the bridges across the waterway.

In 1980, he moved to Itawamba County and assumed the presidency of Pine Trees partnership.

Adams lived a full and productive life until his death on January 21, 1994.

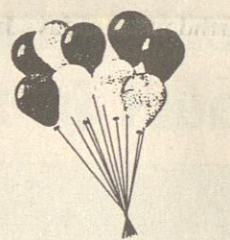
I can't vote in Tishomingo County but I assume that Mr. Ryan can't either, according to the news.

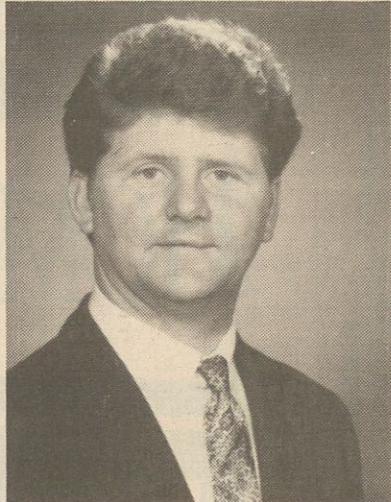

Waste Pesticide Program Scheduled For August 10

By: Danny Owen, County Agent
Farmers in Tishomingo County are encouraged to take part in

a waste pesticide collection program August 10 at the North Mississippi Research and Extension Center in Verona.

The program gives farmers who have waste pesticides a no cost, environmentally safe way to dispose of these products through a licensed contractor, according to Tishomingo County Agent, Danny Owen, who is working with the program locally.

To take part, farmers with waste pesticides should bring their products directly to the collection site in Verona. Collection times are 7 a.m. to 2 p.m. Waste oil, batteries, and tires used for agricultural purposes also will be accepted.

Owen said there is no charge to take part in the program, but farmers are responsible for safely transporting waste pesticides to the collection site.

A licensed hazardous waste contractor at the collection site will collect, analyze, and dispose of the products out of state according to environmental laws.

Waste pesticides include leftover, cancelled, suspended, or otherwise unusable pesticide products. Pesticides include in-

secticides, herbicides, fungicides and plant growth regulators.

The collection program coordinated at the state level by the Mississippi Department of Agriculture and Commerce funds from pesticide registration fees paid by pesticide manufacturers.

According to Owen, counties in northeast Mississippi are taking part in the collection program. Similar programs scheduled in other areas of the state as funds are available.

Owen said all farmers with waste pesticides should take advantage of the free program because it will not be repeated in the state of Mississippi and farmers' only opportunity to take part in such a program.

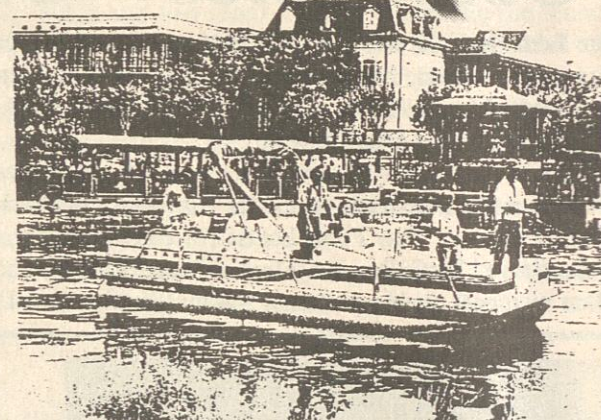

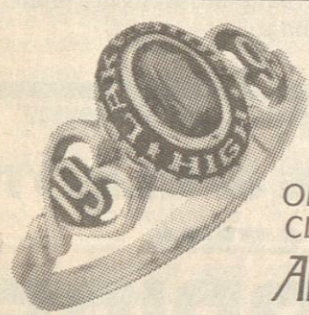

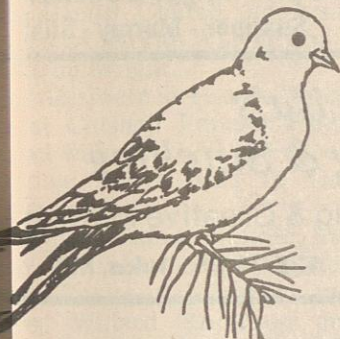

Soil Conservation News



Dove hunting has become one of the most controversial sports around. In recent times it seems everyone has their own idea about what is a legal field and what is not. Some people feel, that in a Federal Agent's eyes, there is no such thing as a legal field. Now everyone is afraid to plant a dove field in fear of being ticketed. This has not only taken away a primary source of food for the doves, but has caused

many of us to stop hunting. One of the primary problems in dove hunting, particularly in the southeastern U.S., is baiting and the apparent misunderstanding of what constitutes a baited field. The code of Federal Regulations which carries the legal language for dove baiting states, that no person shall take migratory birds "by the aid of baiting, or on or over any baited area."

However, if you still want to have a great dove hunting field without the fear of being illegal, now is the time to start. I suggest planting sunflowers or brown-top millet. These easy-growing, inexpensive seeds can pull in just as many doves as crushed corn. It has been found that these fields work best on hill tops that have a primary source of water near by. The book suggests to plant sunflowers from April 15 to June 15 at a rate of 10 to 15 lbs. per acres. Plant in 36-42 inch rows with a corn planter 8 inches apart, 2 inches deep. For brown top millet it suggests to plant 60 to 80 days before season, at 8-15 lbs./acre in rows, for best results. However, it should be noted that you do not have to have a planter for this. Seeds may be broadcast by hand after disking, since they are covered either by lightly disking or by using a harrow. After the
