Circuit Court Hears One Case - Grand Jury Report Released

One criminal case was heard in the September term of Circuit Court in Tishomingo County last week and two pled guilty and were sentenced.

Only one case came before the jury. It ended in a mistrial with a hung jury.

Pleading guilty and sentenced were: Dolan H. Nunley on possession of marijuana. He was sentenced to a term of 3 years in the MS. Dept. of Corrections. The defendant is to be placed in the Intensive SupervisionProgram/House Arrest Program, per Section 47-5-1001 through 47-5-1015 of the MS Code and the court retains jurisdiction for a period of 6 months per MS Code Section 47-7-47 1972 Annotated. Nunley was further ordered to pay cost of the court lab fee of \$400 and a fine of \$1000 with \$500 of said fine suspended. Jason Driskell-CR-95-013-State of MS for uttering a forgery. He was sentenced to serve a term of ten (10) years in the custody of the MS Dept. of Corrections, said sentence suspended pending the good behavior of the defendant. It was further ordered that the sentence in this cause run consecutively and run concurrently with the sentences in cause No. CR-95-011 and CR-95-012. The defendant was ordered to pay cost of the court in this cause

The results of the Grand Jury were filed on 09-05-95. The jury met 4 days, examined 19 witnesses, and returned 13 true bills. Concerning the jail and courthouse the jury found the jail to need additional cleaning and made the following observations. The ventilation is fair but still needs improvement in the man's and women's cell areas. Some vents need to be replaced. Showers are dirty and need painting and repair. Sheets and blankets need to be furnished and mattresses replaced. The lighting needs improvement, the toilets in the men's and woman's cells need repair. Heater covers, electrical covers and light covers need repair, removal or replacement throughout the jail. Fire extinguishers need checking. Wires and extension cords throughout the jail are exposed and need removing and/or repair. The light bulbs need to have fixtures. The courthouse was found to be in generally good condition but needs additional cleaning. The ceiling tiles throughout the Courthouse need replacing. The floors, walls, and restrooms need extensive cleaning. Fire extinguishers, lights and thermostats need covers. Additional smoke alarms and exit signs are needed. Exhaust vents need cleaning. Custodian storage rooms need to be kept locked, need cleaning, and signs posted on storage doors reflecting "hazardous materials." Thermostats are broken and need repair. Several windows are broken and need to be replaced. Locks need to be repaired on the electrical panel. Additional wallmounted fire extinguishers are needed and workable emergency lighting. Plaster needs replacing on numerous walls. Several exposed wires and extension cords need to be removed. Stall doors in restrooms need repair. Urinals need cleaning and repaired or replaced. Lights in Circuit Clerk's vault need replacing and additional storage sought. The printer in the Chancery Clerk's Office needs relocating. The telephone wires in the Veteran's Office need to be placed in better locations and additional filing cabinets are needed.

Now having submitted this Report, we ask to be discharged subject to recall at a later date as circumstances may be required upon further Order of this Court.

Tobacco Budworm Devastating at To County's Cotton Crop

Pictured above from left are cotton producers Tommy Moody, Joe Bostick, and County Agent Danny Owen holding typical cotton stalks in many of their fields. Mr. Moody works about 260 acres and Mr. Bostick farms about 660 acres of cotton. These plants were taken out of a 30 acre field which will probably not be harvested. In the middle of July, this same field had the potential for a bumper crop (700 lbs/acre plus). With an acre of cotton costing \$300-\$400 to produce, it will be difficult to recover from a zero yield. The county has about 1300 acres with a probable average yield of less than 250 lbs./acre. BREAKEVEN yield is around 500 lbs./acre so, as you can see, the tobacco budworm has been TRULY devastating this year.

Michael Kevin Turner of luka, was captured on September 6, at the bus station in Milesburg, PA by the Pennsylvania State Police. Turner was wanted in Tishomingo County for aggravated assault on a Highway Patrol Officer and various other charges. He is currently being held on \$100,000 bond by the Pennsylvania State Police at Rockview Station, PA awaiting extradition by the State of Mississippi.

TVA Commissions Federal Police Officers

TVA has commissioned 125 federal police officers to carry out law enforcement duties in a sevenstate region after receiving the go-ahead from U.S. Attorney General Janet Reno.

The new officers were formerly TVA Public Safety Officers. The officers were commissioned in a ceremony at Norris Dam on Tuesday, September 12. Officer Larry N. Long and Commander Sidney G. Whitehurst, both of Iuka were among those commissioned.

The officers, who formerly had varying state and local law enforcement authority, now have uniform federal authority to protect and serve the public at TVA land and recreational facilities throughout the Tennessee Valley.

The 1994 Crime Control Bill authorized TVA to designate employees as federal law enforcement officers. Reno approved implementation of the statute last week.

"To select our TVA Police Officers we set high standards for eligibility," TVA Chairman Craven Crowell said. "We set physical requirements equal to any law enforcement organization in the country, and we required professional training that places the TVA Police among the elite of our country's federal lawenforcement officers."

Employees chosen for the TVA Police successfully completed a rigorous selection and training process, which included an 11-week law enforcement course at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center.

In addition to providing for the protection of the public on TVA lands, the TVA Police are responsible for the protection of about 16,500 TVA employees. These employees are located in offices in Knoxville, Chattanooga and Muscle Shoals, Alabama, as well as at TVA recreation facilities, 11 coal plants, three nuclear plants, 29 hydroelectric dams, 13 Customer Service Centers and other locations throughout the Valley.

In addition to the new officers, TVA will continue to have Public Safety Officers to provide industrial security at TVA offices and facilities.

TVA is a federal corporation and one of the nation's largest electric-power producers. Its service area covers 80,000 square miles in Tennessee, and parts of Alabama, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi, North Carolina and Virginia.


By: Barbara F. Guinn, Extension Home Economist COLORS CAN BE USED TO CAMOUFLAGE

If you are self-conscious about your size and weight, you might want to give some thought to the help certain colors can give toward camouflaging size.

Darker shades of color and softened or muted tones tend to recede from the viewer's eye, therefore causing the figure to appear smaller. By contrast, light and bright colors attract the eye of the viewer and therefore increase the apparent size of the wearer.

Cool colors such as blues, greens, teals and purples also tend to decrease the size of the figure. The person wanting to appear smaller and thinner should consider selecting cool colors, darker muted shades and colors with lower intensity.

If you like warm, intense colors you still can use them, just remember they are most becoming when used in small areas to accent or highlight an outfit. Highlight items or areas include scarves, jewelry, hankies,



Help Stop The Spread **Of Hepatitis A**

Restaurants can help prevent a Memphis outbreak of hepatitis A from spilling into northwestern Mississippi by observing proper precautions, Mississippi public health officials encouraged today.

The Mississippi State Department of Health this week will recommend that restaurants in northwestern Mississippi adopt policies to stop bare-hand contact with cooked food. Properly using gloves or tongs can help stop the spread of hepatits A.

PROTECT YOUR CAT **FROM FELINE**

UROLOGICAL SYNDROME If your previously fastidious cat suddently begins urinating in the corner, or seems to be urinating much more frequently than usual, it may be suffering from feline urological syndrome, or FUS. FUS strikes 100,000 cats every year, and cats with the disease show such symptoms as bloody urine, frequent urination, licking at the anal area, straining to urinate and blockage of the urinary tract. Although FUS affects cats of either sex, male cats are more susceptible to blockage.

FUS is caused by the presence of mineral crystals (often called "sand") that irritate the lining of the urinary tract and may plug the urethra or form bladder stones. If the urinary tract is blocked, the kidneys cannot eliminate poisons from the body, and the bladder becomes very full because urine cannot be eliminated. If the cat is treated in time, depression, weakness, loss of appetite, vomiting, pain and eventually death will result. If the urinary tract is blocked, immediate veterinary care is required. We can usually empty the cat's bladder using a small catheter, or tube. In some cases, we may prescribe a special diet of Feline s/d. The nutritional characteristics in s/d help dissolve the crystals in the urinary tract. Sometimes, surgery is necessary to remove the blockage. A short stay in the hospital is usually necessary to make sure the cat is recovering without any problems. Once your cat is home, it will need special care to prevent the recurrence of FUS. Be sure it has free access to clean, fresh water. Protect it from stress, such as extreme exertion or excitement, and hot or cold temperatures. Change the litter box daily. Some cats will not use it or will use it less if it is dirty. If you have more than one cat, you may need an extra litter box. Diet and exercise play a large part in determing whether or not a cat will fall prey to FUS. High levels of magnesium in the diet, little exercise, obesity and low water consumption can all contribute to FUS. A nutritionally complete diet containing a reduced amount of magnesium helps prevent the formation of mineral crystals in the urine. One such diet is Hill's Feline c/d. Its formula helps reduce the amount of magnesium excreted in the urine and provides nutrients needed for tissue repair. If your cat is obese and has already had one bout with FUS, now might be a good time to put it on a weight reduction diet and exercise program. Test for obesity by placing your hands over your cat's rib cage. If the ribs are difficult to feel, or you can't feel the ribs at all, it's time for a diet. We will be happy to help work out a daily exercise plan and weight reduction diet for your cat's needs. With the proper diet and care, recurrence of FUS is preventable in 85 to 100 percent of all cases.

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

CUCUMBERS & TEABAGS? Do you really need eye drops or washes, vitamin supplements, or non-prescription aids to keep your eyes clean and healthy? Nature can usually do this for us without having to resort to artificial

means. The normal tearing and blinking reflex you were born with, for example, will lubricate and clean your eyes constantly. What about red eyes? Sometimes your eyes may seem redder than normal. The membrane that covers the white of our eyes has tiny blood vessels. In some people's, they're more pronounced than in others. this can make the eyes look redder. So can exposure to smoke or air pollutants, drinking too much

alcohol or even straining the eyes. One homemade remedy for red eyes is a compress of wet teabags and cucumber slices. Although this compress probably won't injure your eyes, it has no known benefits. Also, it's a little conspicuous. Good nutrition and regular eye checkups are the best way to keep your eyes healthy.

f you made your living as a lineman, it goes without I saying you'd want your work environment as safe as possible.

You can help make the lineman's job safe by putting a little common sense into action. For example:

- Don't hang birdhouses or basketball goals on electrical poles. The lineman will have great difficulty climbing around them, even though you think they're perfectly placed.
- Don't landscape around poles with flower boxes, birdhouses or anything else that might cause harm if a lineman were to fall.
- Don't hang signs on poles because the nails or staples could cause the lineman to slip if he has to climb.

Use a little common sense around utility poles; show your appreciation for those who work so hard to make sure you have reliable electric service. All it takes is stepping into the other guy's shoes for a few moments!

returned to Iuka after the war and worked at an aluminum plant in Colbert County. When asked, when did you retire? he answers with a smile, "I haven't yet".

The "old soldier" smoked cigarettes for 50 years. He smiles as he says, I've been quit 40 years, and I still have my last pack as a souvenir. He tried chewing tobacco but decided that was a filthy habit and quit it too.

His advice to people is, "keep working and eat anything you like and plenty of it". He reports he doesn't eat much meat, just lots

To Charlie Smith

"I live on work, I wouldn't be here if I didn't keep working," says 99-year-old Charlie Smith who's determination to stay active and eep working is evident in his beautiful flowers and garden at his ome in the Oldham Community near Iuka.

Mr. Charlie celebrated his 99th birthday Tuesday. He was orn September 19, 1896 in the "section" house by the railroad at Oldham just a short distance from the house he shares now with his iece, Aline. His parents, James Thomas and Mary Ann Archer Smith, raised six children: Maude who married Houston Mars; Walter, who married Maude Hampton; Owen, who married Lou Mars; Lucille who married Paul Wadkins; Charlie; and Annie Lee, who married Clarence Haines.

On a recent visit with Mr. Charlie, he talked about his family, which means so much to him, and he also shared some stories from his ervice years - World War I, that is! He told of his enlistment in the Army in 1916, just one month before his 20th birthday. He said he and boy from Corinth (the late John W. McCord) decided they would oin the Army. Charlie Smith was taken in immediately but McCord had trouble entering because he didn't look 18 - his beard wasn't full yet! So the Army contacted McCord's mother, she said her son was 18 but she didn't want him to go. Unfortunately the Army didn't listen to his mother and took him anyway. The two young soldiers were separated, McCord went into the Medical Corp. Mr. Charlie said he ran into McCord 30 years later at an Armistice Day Parade in Corinth. It was a surprise reunion and a great day for the two men.

When the Armistice was signed in 1918, Charlie Smith was in Toul, France. But with an excellent memory he noted that this did not end his military service. He was part of a U.S. Military Mission which went behind the German lines to assist the Red Cross and the Germans with a Russian prisoner of war camp in Germany. There were 40,000 Russian prisoners in the camp. The Germans could not ts feed them and they would not return them to Russia because Communism had started there, so the U.S. military personnel and the Red Cross had to help with the camp. The young soldier from Mississippi was a supply sergeant for the camp. He said many of the Russians were leased out to German farmers.

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
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While with the detachment in Germany, Charlie Smith spent six weeks in a German Hospital. He said he was the only American in the hospital and still remembers his beautiful German nurse and how kind she was. She wanted very much to teach him to speak German but he said he saw no need for him to learn how to speak German! She said she had nursed many British soldiers but the young American was very different from them.

In the fall of 1919 he returned to the U.S. and was stationed in Louisville, Kentucky. He came home to Iuka in 1920.

The thriving gravel pit near Oldham gave him plenty of work until the outbreak of World War II. He was 45 at the time and narrowly missed getting to visit Germany again! During this war he worked in a plant in Memphis making B25 bombers. He later

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Letter To The Editor

Twelve different medications daily? Some of them 3X daily? Even four or five different drugs for most senior citizens if taken month after month is excessive. But pharmaceutical companies compete constantly and mightily to sell preparations like steroids, tranquilizers, "heart pills", muscle relaxers, vasodilators, diurectics, antibiotics, and other expensive anti-this, and for-that medicines.

Frenquently, sickness sideeffects produced by medications add to the woes of growing old. Yet, nursing homes, home health nursing alliances, and many doctors insist on maintaining strict schedules for pill taking. "Utilization review" doctors are hard-pressed to monthly review what is happening to so many "ware-housed" old people.

Are these harsh words?

Perhaps. But the over-sold, managed-competition, privatized, health situation for the aged, in which profit if fore-most rather than care, has to be dealt with by responsible law-makers who can change laws under which Medicare, Medicaid, and veterans' homes operate.

We should cheer the paradoxical when an aged old one gains dignity and life by refusing to continue a pile of pills--or even one--for one's mere survival.

At our age having to die--and sometimes how-to-die--is a central but supressed problem. Or is it not?


Celebrating Constitution Week

In addition, the NOR-AM DCA Fund will make cash supplements amounting to 40% of the amounts scheduled for and paid as compensatory payments pursuant to the *Price* settlement, up to \$179,000, on behalf of a Ciba Exposed Person who, after exposure to Fundal[®] and Galecron® or to Galecron® only, has developed or in the future develops the form of bladder cancer alleged to be associated with Fundal® and Galecron® The NOR-AM DCA Fund will also pay for administrative costs and class counsel's and administra tive class counsel's attorney fees, costs and expenses

V. RIGHTS AND OPTIONS OF WOODWARD SETTLEMENT CLASS MEMBERS

If you are a *Woodward* Settlement Class Member, you have the following options:

(1) You may do nothing and remain a Woodward Settlement Class Member. If you choose to take no action, your interests as a member of the Woodward Settlement Class will be represented by the Class Representatives and Class Counsel at no cost to you.

 You may remain a Woodward Settlement Class Member and either represent yourself or hire your own attorney to represent you at your own cost.
 You may remain a Woodward Settlement Class Member and object to the settlement.

(4) If you choose to remain a Woodward Settlement Class Member (under options 1, 2 or 3 above), you may receive the benefits afforded by this settlement within six months of the Court's Order directing this Notice.

(5) You may request exclusion from this settleent.




