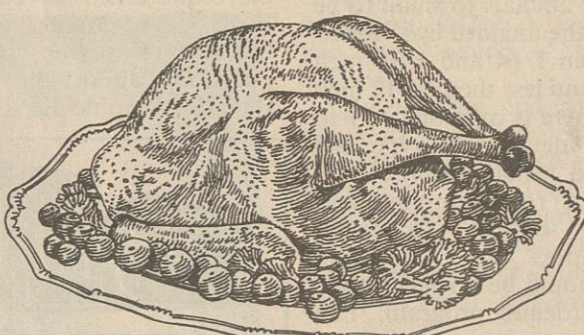

## Chancery Judge Sets Aside PSC Order

In an opinion rendered October 19, 1995, Chancery Judge Timothy E. Ervin held that the Mississippi Public Service Commission had improperly ordered the Tishomingo County Water District to run a water line to property owned by Al Shadburn on Indian Creek. Judge Ervin set aside the PSC order, holding that there was no evidence to support such an action. In fact, in his ruling the chancellor noted that the evidence showed that the Water District "made every effort to secure funding that might include Mr. Shadburn and his neighbors." The judge additionally found that the Water District had not acted improperly in extending a line into a portion of Alabama that is situated on the western side of Bear Creek, noting that the district was working within the guidelines of the agencies through which the funding was obtained. Judge Ervin observed that "the Commission's decision was more predicated on the politics of the situation, as opposed to the facts that exist in the case."

Nick Phillips, attorney for the Water District, said that the board of commissioners was pleased with the ruling. "The board has always worked to provide the best service to the customers in the District in the most efficient and economical manner. I am glad that their effort has been affirmed by this ruling," he said.

## Scores On Iowa Test Improve For County Students

Tishomingo County School officials have received score reports for the multiple-choice portion of the Iowa Test for basic skills in grades 4-9. Stanley Magill, Test Coordinator for Tishomingo School District, says "We're delighted with these results. There has been a lot of hard work put in by District staff, principals, teachers, school test coordinators, students and parents. That effort shows in these results. We are anxious to see the remaining results."

Results of the second portion of the test which is made up entirely of open ended student response questions are expected to be released in January. Individual and school test score reports will be available at a later date. Parents will receive detailed reports showing how their child performed on specific objectives.

The test results will enable our staff and faculty to plan, revise curriculum and present daily activities that will meet the needs of all students.

This is the second year Mississippi students have taken this test, which is designed to measure student's ability to apply knowledge to real-life situations.

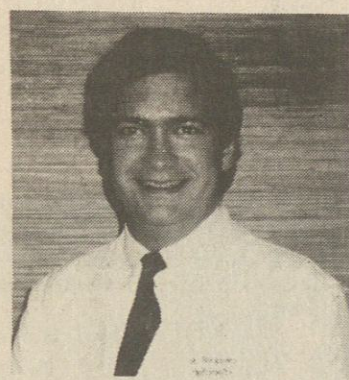

## County Agents Notes

What soil-borne nematodes lack in size, they make up for in numbers and capacity to damage many crops grown in our gardens. Your garden could have been a victim this season, and now's the time to find out for sure! Nematodes are slender, worm-like animals too small to be seen with the unaided eye. Most are between 1/64 and 1/16 inch in length and less than 1/512 inch wide. There is only one way to positively identify the type and extent of a nematode problem: soil and/or root sampling and laboratory testing. Collecting soil samples for nematode analysis should be a routine part of your gardening program. For information on how to take and handle nematode samples call me at the Extension Office at 423-7016. There is no charge for analysis of the sample for nematodes.

### FROSTED GRASS:

Many cattlemen depend on an excess of frosted grass to carry their cattle well into the winter. Some also let their cattle glean row crop fields to utilize crop residues and frosted grass left in these fields. Where this is done, caution should be taken with cattle grazing plants of the sorghum family which have been frozen by frost. These include johnsongrass, sudangrass, sorghum-sudangrass hybrids, grain sorghum, silage sorghum, and sweet sorghum for syrup. When the cells of these plants are ruptured by frost, prussic acid may be released, which can be very toxic to cattle. After the plants are cured out, they can be safely consumed by cattle.

#### INFLAMMATORY BOWEL DISEASE

There are few problems more frustrating than having a cat that is suffering chronic bouts of vomiting and diarrhea. Vomiting and diarrhea cause dehydration, and if left untreated, can become a life-threatening situation. Therefore, any cat displaying those signs should be examined by a veterinarian.

There are many possible causes of vomiting and diarrhea, but Inflammatory Bowel Disease (IBD) is one of the most common causes in cats. The cause of this disease is unknown, but microscopic changes that occur in the gastrointestinal tissues imply that immunologic factors play an important role. Dietary factors, such as food hypersensitivity, may also contribute to the development of Inflammatory Bowel Disease.

Treatment will include dietary management if food hypersensitivity is aggravating the gastrointestinal system. Your veterinarian may recommend a dietary trial of three to six weeks to determine if a food antigen is responsible; if so, then a simple change may provide symptomatic relief.

Because IBD is an inflammatory disease, corticosteroids are usually used to treat cats with IBD. These drugs have potent anti-inflammatory and immunosuppressive properties with relatively few side effects. Relapses occur if the treatment regime is not followed.

**FALL JOBS FOR ROW CROPS**  
Sandy soil should be subsoiled when compaction problems are shallow enough to shatter. This operation is more effective when the soil is dry. Leave subsoiled fields rough and rowed up until spring. For heavy textured soils (clay), fall hipping is the best option if you want to be able to plant early next spring. Using a burndown chemical and planting in a stale seedbed works fine. Make sure that you remain in compliance with any NRCS requirements.

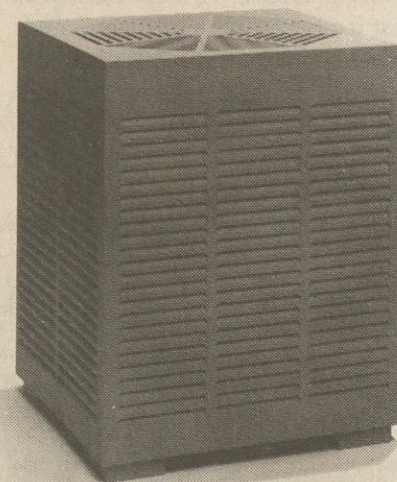

No invitations are being sent locally, however all friends and relatives are cordially invited to join in the celebration in the beginning of Julie and Donny's life together.

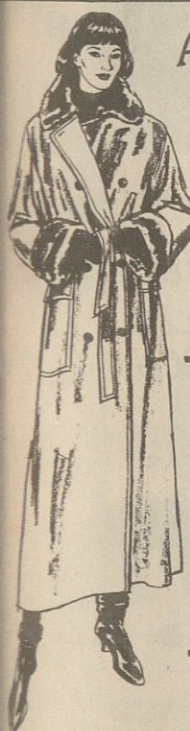

When you go shopping, buy cold foods last and take them straight home to the refrigerator. When you prepare food, keep everything clean. When you cook, make sure you thoroughly cook food enough to kill harmful bacteria. When you serve food, never leave it out over two hours. When in doubt if you have kept something too long, throw it out.

Shirley gave an informative report on "Purchasing and Cooking The Turkey and What To Do With Leftovers". Plan on about one pound of turkey for each guest. Make sure package is tightly sealed. Allow five hours of thawing time for each pound of turkey. If stuffing, plan on 3/4 cup per pound of turkey. Oven roasting is the most common method of cooking. The turkey is fully cooked when the juices run clear. Stuffing should be removed immediately. Leftover turkey can be kept in the refrigerator, covered, up to 4 days.

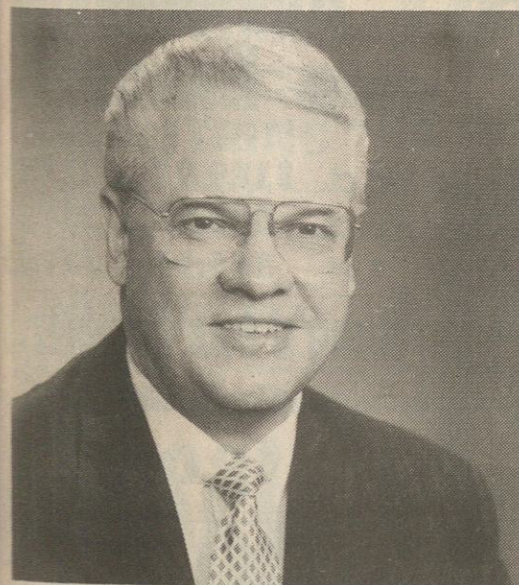

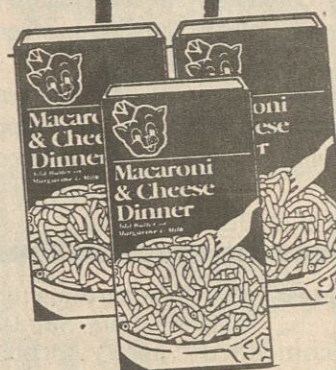

### Report From Congress

As families gather this week to celebrate Thanksgiving, our nation can also give thanks that the longest federal government shutdown in history is finally over.

The impasse, which forced all but the most essential government services to cease, came as a result of conflict between the

President and Congress over national priorities.

The Republican controlled Congress offered legislation to keep the federal government running, provided the President would commit to a balanced budget in seven years based on legitimate economic forecasts.

President Clinton vetoed that legislation -- called a continuing resolution -- claiming his spending priorities were endangered

by agreeing to a balanced budget.

Late Sunday evening, a temporary spending agreement was reached whereby the President committed to work with Congress on enacting a balance budget in seven years using the bipartisan economic projections of the Congressional Budget Office (CBO). Also included in the continuing resolution is language specifying that programs such as Medicare, education, agriculture and veterans must be protected.

In an open letter to President Clinton last week, I joined more than 60 of my freshmen colleagues in describing why we were insisting on these key principles.

In that letter, we stated, "It is unfortunate that 800,000 non-essential federal employees were furloughed. But we believe very strongly that it would be a tragedy of historic proportions if we were to back down now on our commitment to balance the federal budget in seven years."

The letter goes on to conclude, "This is a moment of truth. This is when 'We the People' show whether we have the courage and moral character to stop stealing from our children and grandchildren.

Future generations are counting on us to show some us to show some leadership and courage. Let us agree on the destination. We can then have a

healthy debate about the road map."

This letter to President Clinton sums up the true sentiment of this new Congress -- that unless we seize this opportunity to preserve the future of our country, we may never have another chance.

Although an agreement has been reached, there is still much work left to be done. In the coming weeks, we must continue our efforts to pass the remaining appropriations bills. We must work out substantial differences between the President and Congress over provisions contained in the Balanced Budget Act of 1995. The temporary of spending agreement will allow us to get the government running again while a good faith effort is made to resolve those differences.

I must caution against too much optimism that this impasse is totally over. The temporary spending agreement runs out on December 15, 1995. Unless all appropriations bills are signed into law by President Clinton on that date, another partial shut down could result.

I will be making every effort to work with President Clinton and our Congressional colleagues on both sides of the aisle to avert any further shutdown. While this debate continues, I urge everyone to recognize that the very future of our country is at stake.

I hope every family, as they gather around the table Thursday to give thanks, will remember America's political leaders and pray that they keep the interests of our republic above personal or political considerations.

## Home Economics Tips

An investment advisor can play a large role in helping you design an investment plan for your future financial security. Whether you should use an advisor depends on the size of your investment portfolio, whether you feel you can rely on your own research, and the amount of time you can devote to your investment.

One type of investment advisor is called a broker, who usually works within a brokerage firm. Brokers can be designated a being either "full-service" or "discount".

A full-service broker is a broker who provides investment advice, research reports, and investments ideas. A full-service broker may also make suggestions on how to arrange your portfolio to reach your goals.

Full-service brokers are paid by receiving a commission on the trades they make. More often than not, the large more active accounts receive the most attention from a full-service broker. However, good brokers will want to develop future business, so you may get more service if you intend to build a steady investment program.

A discount broker, unlike a full-service broker, does not offer investment advice. Instead, discount brokers earn a straight salary by placing your order. This saves you from having to pay a commission. If you buy only a few shares or deal in low-priced stocks, however, you probably will not save anything because of the minimum fees discount brokers charge.

If you are an inexperienced investor and feel you need advice, you may wish to stick with a full-service broker. Another alternative would be to subscribe to an investment advisory newsletter for your investment ideas and then place your order with a discount broker.

Whether you select a full-service or discount broker, choose an advisor who shares your investment philosophy in terms of goals and risk tolerance. Compare fees and also consider the type of clientele the broker currently has. Finally, consider whether the broker has considerable investing experience.

## MY STORY

### APRIL CHRISTINE HODGES

Hello! My name is April Christine Hodges. My parents are Brad and Beth Hodges. I was born at 11:22 p.m. on August 6, 1995 at North Mississippi Regional Medical Center Woman's Clinic in Tupelo Mississippi. I weighed 4 pounds 2.8 ounces and was 16 inches long. Here's the story of my life.

A short time after I was conceived, I got my wires crossed through no fault of my mommy and daddy. It just happened. I must have really wanted to be born because I arrived seven weeks early. My mommy tried to have me naturally, but it was too dangerous, so they took me out the side door called a Caesarean Section.

I had a big coming out reception. Doctors and Nurses everywhere. After they stabilized me, they wheeled me in a safe place, so they could look after me real good. Then my Daddy, Grandma and Granddaddy Cox, Granny and Granddaddy Hodges, Uncle Jim, Aunt Toni, even my half sister Jana was there. I was real fortunate to even have great grandparents, Mammaw and Granddaddy Castle to greet me.

The doctors and nurses knew I was in trouble, so they called Children's Hospital of Alabama and they sent down a team in a jet to get me. After they rolled me to see my mommy, they took me for my first airplane ride. They watched me real close so I wouldn't be scared. You see, my daddy couldn't ride with me and my mommy was real tired and sore from them opening her side door. Daddy and Granddaddy Hodges met me at Children's Hospital of Alabama.

When I was 4 days old, Dr. Cain opened me up and found my trouble and fixed it. I still have some big problems, but I'm a good fighter. They were scared I was going to give up, but I didn't cause everybody was pulling for me and talking to God about me. I had no idea so many people know God. I know God, because He made me and He loves me and Mommy and Daddy and the whole wide world.

I was hooked up to machines and wires and tubes. I'm glad they didn't get those wires crossed.

I'm going to sleep and get some rest. I've had a hard day. I know the nurses will take good care of me.

On Saturday, August 12, 1995, I opened my eyes because my Mommy was coming to see me. I haven't seen her since they brought me up here on the jet. As soon as Mommy got here they brought her to see me. She still hurt real bad, but she doesn't care because she wanted to see me. I'm so happy she came to see me. I held onto her little finger while she talked to me and told me how much she loved me.

I must have been a celebrity because everybody was looking at me and taking my picture all wired up.

Everybody kept coming to see me and talking to me. A friend gave me a teddy bear and balloon. Another friend gave me a dog mobile, and another friend gave me a pretty outfit to wear. A whole lot of people sent cards and called to check on me. I didn't know I had so many friends.

I got good news today, August 28, 1995. They took the ventilator away from me. They let me keep a little oxygen though. See my lungs are still small and weak.

I'm glad my Social Worker found my Daddy and Mommy a place to stay at the Ronald McDonald House, so they could rest near me. It was real nice and comfortable.

They removed my feeding tube and started feeding me with a bottle. I must have been hungry because I took the bottle the first time and ate more and more each day. I began to grow and get better.

On Tuesday, September 25, 1995, I got good news. They said I could go home, but I had to take my oxygen with me. They moved me from the Unit to another room in the hospital. I stayed there two nights so Mommy and Daddy could learn how to operate my monitor and oxygen so they could take care of me.

On Wednesday, September 27, Mommy and Daddy packed me and my oxygen and we told the nurses goodbye and off to Iuka we went. I was so excited, I was going home.

About a week after I was home, I began to have seizures. The doctor is trying to control them with medicine. I hope this works.

I still have big problems, but I'm a fighter. I'm not giving up because everybody is pulling for me and talking to God about me. It's wonderful so many people know God. I know God, because He made me and loves me. I'll keep fighting and you keep talking to God about me.

We, the Hodges Family, want to say thank you to the people of Tishomingo County for your love and kindness, and especially for your prayers on behalf of our little Angel, April Christine. Please continue to remember us in your prayers.

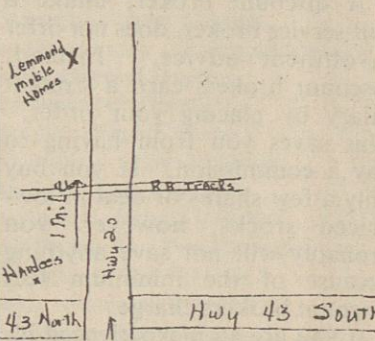

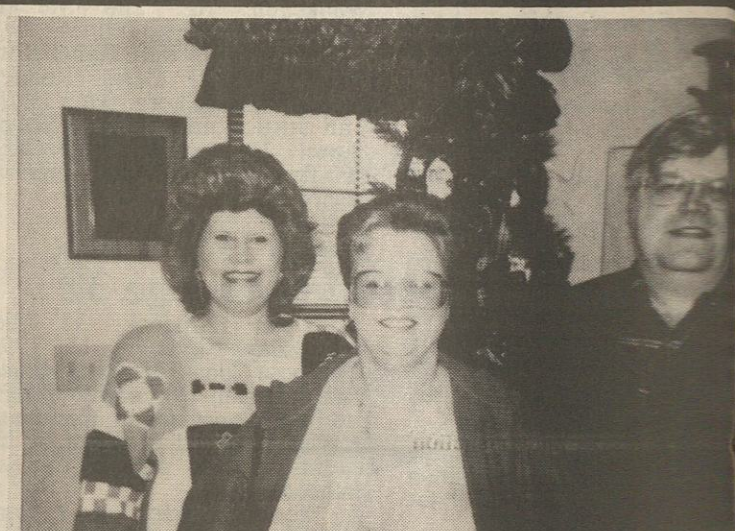

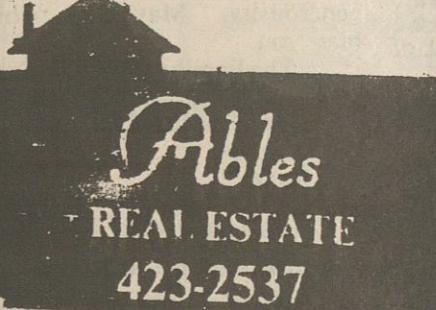

## Troopers Receive Cameras For Thanksgiving From MIC

State troopers will be armed with three new Sony 8mm video

cameras to use as enforcement tools during the Thanksgiving Holidays, gifts from the Mississippi Insurance Council (MIC).

Commissioner of Public Safety Jim Ingram applauded the

donation during a news conference at the Department of Public Safety Headquarters Building in Jackson. "We appreciate the Mississippi Insurance Council's support of public safety. Private support of public agencies is necessary to enhance police work," Ingram said.

"Video cameras are considered vital enforcement tools because they allow officers to capture a drunken or hostile driver on tape, making it impossible for the violator to deny his or her level of impairment or behavior in court," said Col. Jimmy Stringer, Highway Patrol Director.

"A gift of cameras to the Highway Patrol is like gold because of our need to document unsafe drivers. We want violators to know we mean business," Stringer added. The cameras are activated when the blue lights are turned on, allowing taping to begin when the trooper first encounters a violator.

Stringer said there is a 96 percent conviction when DUI offenders are captured on tape.

MIC Chairman Robert Moseley of Allstate Insurance, in making the presentation, stated the insurance industry is committed to rewarding safe, law-abiding drivers by aiding in the removal of drunken or reckless drivers from the highways.

"Giving cameras to the Highway Patrol is investing in highway safety," Moseley said. "Members of the Insurance Council understand the need to support officers in their enforcement efforts."

Col. Stringer said the Highway Patrol currently has 36 camcorders being used by troopers. MIC has donated 17 video cameras to the agency since 1989, at a cost of more than \$32,000.

The Mississippi Insurance Council represents insurance companies, independent and professional agents, underwriting groups and claim associates.

To support the ground units during the 102-hour Thanksgiving Holiday observance, Stringer said the agency will have two Jet Ranger helicopters flying peak travel times. He said the trooper-pilots will be searching for stranded motorists and drinking, reckless and erratic drivers. Forty-five troopers will be paid through a federal grant to work on what would ordinarily be their day off. They will augment the regular force with 360 extra manhours.

"Drivers can be cited and fined if all front-seat passengers are not wearing seat belts. Mississippi law also requires that all children under four years of age be in child safety seats," Stringer said. "Only rarely do properly restrained adults and children receive fatal injuries in motor vehicles crashes."

Motorists with cellular telephones can report emergency road conditions, motor vehicle crashes or unsafe drivers to their nearest Highway Patrol substation by dialing ★HP (★47). This statewide reporting service is a toll-free call.

Stringer said five people were killed during the 1994

Thanksgiving Holiday period and troopers arrested 116 drivers under the influence of drugs or alcohol and issued 6,282 speeding

citations.

The holiday gets underway at 6 p.m., Wednesday, Nov. 22 and ends at midnight on Sunday, Nov. 26, 1995.

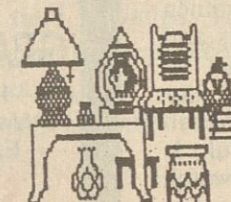

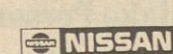

Long-time Northeast Mississippi Community College athletic director, William B. Ward, has announced his retirement effective June 30, 1996.

Ward was instrumental in reactivating the football program at Northeast in 1968. He is a well-known sports figure on the local, state and national levels. He served as President of the Mississippi Community College Athletic Association for 10 years and is currently serving as Regional Director for the National Junior College Athletic Association, representing Mississippi and Louisiana. He is a member of the Mississippi Coaches Hall of

Fame. One of Ward's greatest honors was being inducted into the Mississippi Coaches Hall of Fame. Coach Ward also has served as Director of the Mississippi Community College All-Star game for the past 10 years and is a strong supporter of this concept which has provided and opportunity for many outstanding athletes to continue their education and football careers past the community college level.

Northeast President Joe M. Childers had only positive comments about Coach Ward's tenure of service. Childers stated that he has enjoyed working with Ward both in the New Albany School system for five years and at Northeast for the past 28 years. Childers commended the AD on his strong commitment and dedication to athletics and to Northeast.

"I consider Coach Ward my personal friend and my valued colleague, and I will miss him," said Childers.

Coach Ward had touched the lives of many student athletes at Northeast. The retiring AD said, "It has been gratifying to have been a small part of working with the fine young men and women who have been our students and to watch the achievements of these athletes who have made our athletic program and overall educational system successful. It has been rewarding to watch these young people become productive citizens. I know of many cases where if it had not been for the athletic program at Northeast, many of these students would not have had an educational opportunity."

In announcing his retirement from a forty-plus year career in education, Coach Ward indicated that the one thing he is proudest of is the fact that in his coaching years since 1954, he has never missed a football game of his team at home or on the road.

Coach Ward and his family will continue to reside in Booneville, and he has indicated that his love and support for Northeast will continue in every positive way.

### Northeast Athletic Staff Make Personnel Shifts

Northeast Community College President Joe M. Childers announced today a major change in the athletic staff.

Childers indicated that "the institution is now at the point to give new direction to the football program due to imminent retirement of existing personnel."

New head football coach Gunter Brewer will be taking applications this spring for two coaching assistants in anticipation of the 1996 football season. Childers stated, "we will have a completely different look on the coaching staff for the 1996 season." The new coaching assistants will come on board August 1.

Current assistant coaches, David Carnell and Billy Southward, will assume other positions at Northeast. Southward will have teaching assignments in physical education plus administrative responsibilities in the Division of Student Affairs. Coach Carnell will assume the position of athletic director for

all sports. This position is open due to the recent announcement that William B. Ward is retiring effective June 30, after over 40 years in education.

Childers was positive in his comments about all of the athletic personnel. He indicated that they have all shown their strong support and commitment to the institution and to the total athletic program.

Coach Ward has been at Northeast for 28 years and was instrumental in reinstating the football program in 1968. He is a well-known figure in athletics on the local, state and national levels. Ward serves as Regional Director for the National Junior College Athletic Association, representing Mississippi and Louisiana. He is a member of the Mississippi Coaches Hall of

Fame and served as President of the Mississippi Community College Athletic Association for 10 years.

Carnell, a native of New Albany, has been on the Northeast coaching staff for 22 years. He has served as head football coach, assistant football coach and softball coach, as well as an instructor of physical education. Southward, originally from Tishomingo County, came to Northeast in 1974 as assistant football coach and physical education instructor.

Childers also had praise for first year coach, Gunter Brewer, and the positive attitude he has about moving the Northeast football program forward. Childers indicated the personnel changes "will allow the head

coach to have a staff of his own choosing and will bring new energies and efforts to the program. We know that the overall athletic program at Northeast will continue to grow and succeed under the direction of Coach Carnell and with the leadership of our entire coaching staff," Childers stated.

### Wicker Praises Vote on Appropriation Bill

In a major victory for economic development in Mississippi, the House of Representatives today approved the Energy & Water Appropriations conference report by a vote of 402-24.

The bill includes funding for the Appalachian Regional Com-

mission (ARC) and the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) which have been the driving force behind many economic opportunities in North Mississippi.

"I am thrilled that we have saved these two important programs at funding levels which will help communities and businesses throughout North Mississippi," Congressman Roger Wicker said. "Passage of the Energy & Water appropriations bill is great news for the continued economic growth of our region."

Under the original House-passed bill, ARC was funded at \$142 million for fiscal year 1996. During the conference to reconcile differences between the House and Senate versions of the spending bill, ARC's funding level was increased to \$170

million for next year. Funding for TVA was also increased to \$103.4 million to \$109.2 million.

"These funding represent the new majority party's commitment to support programs which create sector jobs. ARC and TVA have certainly proven their importance in that area," Wicker stated.

After several controversial provisions in the bill were removed during the House-Senate conference, the Clinton administration had indicated the President will likely sign the bill. The Senate is expected to take action on the measure quickly.
