Two County Men Killed In Separate Tractor Accidents

A Dennis man, Garry Wayne Smith, 34, was killed Wednesday morning, November 29th, when the tractor he was using while logging flipped on top of him.

The incident occurred about 11 a.m. on a logging trail about a mile off County Road 32, eight miles northwest of Belmont.

Tishomingo County Sheriff's deputy Bob McCarley said Smith and another man were in the woods pulling logs when the tractor Smith was driving struck something, possibly a stump. The tractor flipped backward onto Smith. A load that was too heavy could have contributed to the old, wide-front, Farm-All tractor flipping, McCarley said.

Emergency personnel worked for about two hours freeing Smith from the wreckage.

Mr. Smith was a self-employed logger and a member of the Palestine Nondenominational Church.

Services were at 2 p.m. Friday at Salts Funeral Home Chapel. Burial was in the Palestine Nondenominational Church Cemetery.

Survivors include one daughter, Sabrina Smith of Red Bay, Ala.; three sons, Jeffrey Smith of Red Bay, Dustin Smith of Banner and Cary Smith of Belmont; his mother, Freeda Gann Smith of Belmont; two brothers, Jerry Smith of Tishomingo and Greg Smith of Belmont.

He was preceded in death by his father, Marlin Monroe Smith.

RITCHIE A. PUTNAM

Ritchie Putnam, 31, of the Holcut-Cairo Community was killed instantly Sunday morning, December 3, when the tractor he was using to pull a tree down turned over on top of him.

According to M. B. Phifer, who lived a short distance from the accident site, Ritchie was trying to pull out a tree with an older model Case tractor, when the tree lodged causing the tractor to flip over backwards. Ritchie was working with his father, Morris Putnam at the time. Mr. Putnam and his wife, Seretha were visiting with their son and family from Mishawaka, Indiana.

The accident occurred around 12 noon. Phifer said he, his son, and some deer hunters responded to a call for help from Mrs. Putnam, calling an ambulance, and assisting at the scene. Ritchie's wife, Melissa, who is expecting their child in April was at church at the time.

Ritchie Putnam was a musician, a welder, and attended the Church of God of Prophecy in Mishawaka, Indiana.

Funeral services were held at 11:00 a.m. Wednesday, at Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel, with Rev. Neal Ramage officiating. Burial was in New Lebanon Cemetery.

He leaves his wife, Melissa Lofton Putnam of Burnsville; his parents, Morris and Seretha Putnam of Mishawaka, Indiana; his grandmother, Lillie Mae Wright of Burnsville; one son, Ritchie "Bud" Putnam, II, of Hampton, Tennessee; one stepdaughter, Skye Coleman of Burnsville; and two brothers, Mark Putnam of Mishawaka, IN and Jeff Putnam of Niles, Michigan.

Are Plants Safe For Your Pets?

Cats, dogs and Birds are incorrigible plant chowers, and this can be hard not only on your plants, but also on your pets-if they happen to chew the wrong plants. Most plants are lovely additions to home or garden, but some hide deadly poisons in their leaves, seeds, flowers or berries. These poisons can affect to gastrointestinal system, cardiovascular system or nervous system, and may even cause death. It's important to know what plants are in your home and yard, and what symptoms poisonous plants can cause.

Plants containing saps or resins may irritate a pet's mouth, pharynx or esophagus, causing excessive salivation, edema, vomiting, abnormal heart rhythms, labored breathing, collapse, gastroenteritis, skin rashes and itching.

Some plants can cause blood abnormalities, such as anemia or jaundice, urinary tract disorders and kidney damage. Signs to look for are pale gums, yellow eye whites or bloody urine.

Other signs of poisoning include depression, aberrant behavior or shaking. If your pet shows any of these symptoms, take note of the plants it may have had access to and call us immediately. It would be impossible to list all the plants that may be dangerous to pets, but the chart below lists some common plants that are considered poisonous to cats, dogs, and birds. Items starred (*) are safe for birds.

Azalea, Boxwood, Bulb Flowers*
Amaryllis, Daffodil, Hyacinth, Iris, Caladium, Chrysanthemum, Creeping Charlie/Pilea, Dieffenbachia (dumb crane), Elephant Ears/Taro, Foxglove, Fruit pits: Almond, Apples, Apricot, Cherry, Peach, Pear, Plum, Hemlock, Holly, Hydrangea, Ivy (all varieties), Jerusalem cherry Jimson weed/Thorn apple, Lantana, Larkspur/Delphinium, Lily of the valley, Marigold, Marijuana, Mistletoe, Monkshood, Morning glory, Nightshade (all varieties), Oleander, Philodendron, Poinsettia, Pothos, Privet, Rhododendron, Spider Mum, Weeping fig (ficus benjamina), Wisteria, Yew.

You don't have to give up your plants to protect your pets, though. There are plenty of safe, beautiful live plants that both you and your pet can enjoy. If you are in doubt about any plant, check with the local poison hotline. The chart below lists some common plants that are safe for pets.

African violet, Aloe, Baby tears, Bamboo, Begonia, Bougainvillea, Coleus, Jade plant, Kalanchoe, Norfolk Island pine, Palms, Peperomia, Prayer plant, Petunia, Wandering jew, Zebra plant.

County Agents Notes

Wait Until The Proper Time To Prune Fruit Trees.

Generally speaking, the earlier in the dormant season you prune, the earlier the tree tends to flower. Prune blocks that you've had frost problems with last. You may even wait until early bloom to start. Wounds actually heal faster and reduce the chance for pest entrance into the trees. Growers with a small number of trees may want to wait until the threat of frost is over before pruning. Brush removal is important in insect and disease control. Remove the brush and burn it immediately.

Livestock Chores.

During this time of year, some of the work includes feeding hay and tending fences. Hopefully our producers have enough hay for this winter. When feeding, buying or selling, it is a good idea to know the quality of the hay. The only way is to take a sample and have it analyzed. Call our office for more information about getting your hay tested. Most cattlemen want a good outside fence to hold their livestock from the public, but many are choosing to use electric fences to separate cattle inside the main fence. Check with your local Coop or Ag supply dealer for a good electric fence system.

Lady Beetle Infestations.

Every year we receive calls concerning massive numbers of lady beetles in and around homes. This problem will probably occur again so I wanted to give information about some control measures. They are not harmful but large numbers can be a severe nuisance. They are only looking for overwintering sites and if the temperature remains below the mid 50's, they will remain inactive. Prevention is the best method of control. Caulk around windows; doors and along the bottom of fascia board. Make sure ventilation areas are screened. Any aerosol listed for

flying insect control that has pyrethrin plus a synergist can be used for those flying inside the home. For outside the home, diazinon can be used to spray on doors and window frames. Don't be surprised if insecticide sprays fail to work well. I received some reports last year that these insects were becoming difficult to kill.

Soil Sampling.

Don't forget that this is the time to soil sample for lawns, gardens, and agricultural crops. Results will be received with sufficient time to add lime, if necessary. Phosphorus and potash can also be applied. Now is also the time for soybean producers to take nematode samples. Soybean fields need to be monitored periodically to make sure that your crop or variety rotation system is working properly. We have information and materials needed to take a proper soil sample to be tested for nematodes.

Mail Early

By the day after Thanksgiving, the Christmas season is already in full swing. Retail stores are jammed. Mail parking is impossible, and the Postal Service begins its annual Holiday Mailing Season Operations.

This year our projections look like this: Because Christmas falls on a Monday, we will have two "busiest mail days": Monday, December 11 and Monday, December 18, when mail comes into the post office. (The busiest delivery day will be the Wednesday following the busy Mondays.) We expect to cancel approximately 250 million cards and letters on each day.

On an average day from October-December, the Postal Service receives 588 million pieces of mail. During the Christmas holiday season, the number rises to 622 million pieces a day (or 34 million more a day). The reason

in December the catalog and third class volumes drop off.

On an average day, the Postal Service cancels about 88 million letters and cards nationwide. This number increases 50 percent more or 139 million a day during the Christmas mailing season. (Nov. 25-Dec.31)

In order to handle this kind of volume, we must ask our customers to Mail Early. So this year, we are

asking that you help us do your part to get your holiday mail ready to be deposited during the week of December 4-9, 1995.

Who Need Stronger UV Protection

Most sunglasses block some amount of the sun's ultra violet (UV) radiation. However, some people require the maximum blockage available (99%). You could require such lenses if you spend long hours in the sun, particularly in the water or snow. These reflect about 85% of UV radiation, compared to less than 5% for ground or grass.

You'll need them if you spend extended leisure time at high altitudes. The thinner air at high elevations allow more UV rays to reach your eyes.

You'll need the strongest UV protection if you have had cataract surgery. Normally, the lens in your eye absorbs 95% of all UV radiation so that very little reaches your retina. Removing the lens in cataract surgery exposes the retina to toxic levels of UV radiation. Artificial eye implants only partially block UV rays. The quality of the protection also varies with the manufacturer.

maritime force so that it can be ready to assist our national defense in times of crisis. For example, trained U.S. mariners were called to action during the Desert Storm operation to man the Ready Reserve Fleet. In addition, the Maritime Security Act will provide these resources for a small fraction of the cost which the government would require to maintain the same capability. At the same time, this investment will return tax revenues to the Treasury and jobs to our economy.

New dentist opens practice in Montrose

Ever since having a fear of going to the dentist as a child, Tracy Northcutt could not wait until she could build the dental office of her dreams.

"I wanted to make it like a new dentist on the Eastern Shore said, while giving a tour of her new Creole designed office building on U.S. 98 in Montrose. "I wanted to make it like a house to reduce dental fears in children and adults. It is the Creole house I've seen that is a dental office."

Upon entering the front door, steps into a living room with sofas and chairs - not quite your usual dentist office waiting room. There is even a pot of coffee on the table.

Patients presently have their choice of three examination rooms. The fishing lodge room, the safari room and the 50's room, stocked with Elvis and Coca Cola memorabilia.

Each room comes complete with an interactive CD Rom that shows the dentist and patient a number of options. In addition to patients being able to watch a procedure on the monitor, Dr. Northcutt uses the intraoral camera to educate patients by allowing them to see inside their mouths and see exactly what needs to be done. Patients can also take a picture so the dentist can explain to their husband or wife about their dental needs.

If the name Northcutt is familiar, yes she is married to the other Northcutt who practices in Daphne with Dr. Richie Parsons. "I met my husband in our freshman year of dental school at UAB (University of Alabama-Birmingham) and we were married after our junior year."

The two may have ended up practicing together in Daphne but she was accepted for an extra year of advance training following graduation. "I commuted on weekends for a year," she said. "He's been here a year longer than I have."

Following her advance training, she joined a practice in Tusculum but decided to open her

own practice here. "We traveled everywhere looking at different dental practices so we could know exactly what we wanted."

A native of Iuka, Mississippi, and a graduate of the University of Mississippi, Northcutt said she had wanted to be a dentist since she was eight years old. "I would go to the dentist to ask all kinds of questions," she said. "I know they hated to see me coming."

She was in such a hurry to get on with her life's work that she finished her undergraduate degree in three years.

Her new staff includes receptionist Doris Tigert and hygienist Michele Snider, who has been in pediatric practice for the past ten years.

The Northcutt family tradition may continue on the Eastern Shore when her brother-in-law joins the practice after finishing dental school at UAB in two years.

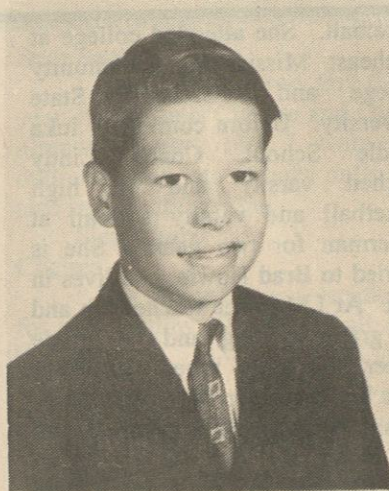
Bro. Milton and Corrine Phifer will be celebrating their 50th wedding anniversary December 23, 1995. Let's all wish them many more.

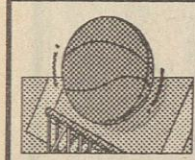

Ground Troops in Bosnia A Mistake

President Clinton made a serious mistake two years ago when he committed the United States to contributing as many as 25,000 troops on the ground in Bosnia as a fighting force to enable the withdrawal of United Nations peacekeepers.

Since that time the U.S. played a lead role in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) bombing of Serb targets in that country. We have taken sides militarily in a centuries old ethnic civil war when we first should have lifted the unfair arms embargo which prevented one side in the war -- the Bosnian Muslims -- from buying and acquiring the arms they needed to defend themselves in their conflict with the Serbs. That action alone likely would have prevented the situation we are facing today with the President's decision to deploy 20,000 ground troops to a country still in battle.

The President tells us this is a peacekeeping operation, but he is sending a full, U.S. armored division for that job. If as he says, the troops are going in only after the Dayton peace agreement is signed and there are no organized armies at war in Bosnia, why do we need to send in a full armored division?

We could instead provide ample support activities for the "peacekeeping" operation from the sea and the air. My fear is that U.S. troops on the ground in Bosnia, far from playing the role of peacekeepers, will become targets of unprincipled Serbians or Croats. Remember, we bombed the Serbs earlier this year. Do you really believe they're going to forget that?

The duties of our troops once in Bosnia, as proposed to the President by NATO, range from house-to-house fighting in order to disarm Bosnians to forcing Bosnian citizens from their homes to be relocated to another part of their country. This is an uncertain mission in very bad terrain during the worst winter weather imaginable.

I have a lot of questions I am continuing to ask, as a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee, in hearings and discussions with representatives of NATO and European countries. But, at this point, I see no evidence that there is a peace in Bosnia to keep and no instance where U.S. vital national security interests have been established or exist to justify risking our troops in this situation.

I respect the authority of the President as the Commander-in-Chief of our military, and I am attuned to the gravity of American credibility and the importance of our leadership role in world peace efforts. But I do not think we should take this particular role in Bosnia.

The United States should not commit its military to a situation unless America's vital national security interests are imperiled. When we do so, we must have public support. We must have Congressional involvement. We must have a clear objective, and we must have a plan for exiting the fight. In the matter of Bosnia, we have none of the above, and that putting U.S. military men and women on the ground in this situation is a mistake. (12/4/95)

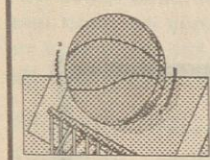
