

Additional Sentencing In Circuit Court Cases

In addition to the four persons who pled guilty Monday January 8th, four others have been sentenced before Circuit Court Judge Thomas Gardner as the January term of Circuit Court continues.

Defendants sentenced by the judge were:

Jason Cooper entered a plea of guilty to a charge of Burglary of a Dwelling. He was sentenced to serve a term of 10 (ten) years in the custody of the Mississippi Department of Corrections. However, the Court determined that the ends of justice and the interests of the public and the defendant will be best served by a suspension of the execution of said sentence, the Court suspended the execution of the above sentence. The defendant was placed on probation under the supervision of said Department for 3 (three) years or until the Court in term time or the Judge in vacation shall alter, extend, terminate, or direct the execution of the above sentence.

John Sutherland entered a plea of guilty to False Pretense - a misdemeanor. He was sentenced to 6 (six) months suspended, pending payment of restitution to Gene Owens within one (1) week from the date of this order (1-19-96) plus court cost due also, on 1-19-96, and suspended pending future good behavior and no violation of any Federal or U.S. laws, laws of any state, city or county.

Donna Price entered a plea of guilty to Uttering a Forgery, in two separate cases (CR96-015 - CR96-016). She was sentenced to serve a term of 15 years in custody of Mississippi Department of Corrections with 10 years suspended on the condition that she exhibit future good behavior, that she violate no laws of the United States or any of the States, and that she give truthful testimony in any later trial regarding jail escape charges. She was ordered to pay court costs. She is banished from the First Judicial District upon completion of sentence for a period of 5 years.

Donna Price entered a plea guilty to Jail Escape. She was sentenced to serve a term of 5 years in custody of Mississippi Department of Corrections. She was ordered to pay all court cost. She was banished from First Judicial District upon completion of sentence for a period of 5 years. This sentence will run concurrent with sentences in CR96-015 and CR96-016.

Steve W. Hanson adjudicated guilty of the crime of Possession of Cocaine. He was sentenced to a term of 3 (three) years in the Mississippi Department of Corrections. He was placed in the Intensive Supervision Program/House Arrest Program, per Section 47-5-1001 through 47-5-1015 of the Mississippi Code and the Court retains jurisdiction for a period of six (6) months per Mississippi Code Section 47-7-47, 1972 Annotated. It was further ordered that he pay \$238.00 in court cost and \$100.00 to the Tupelo crime lab with in 180 days of sentencing date also pay a fine of \$1,000.00.

Forestry Shortcourse Offered



Home Economics Tips

**Human Safety Labeling
Understanding Precautionary
Statements**

A product's label supplies a great deal of important information, such as use instructions. But, in terms of human safety, nothing is more important than the information that appears in the precautionary statement. To ensure accurate safety information, these precautionary statements are used on household cleaning product labels.

Consumers are strongly advised to examine the labels on all household cleaning products and to pay careful attention to precautionary statements.

Fortunately, most household cleaning products are not dangerous. If exposure in small amounts or swallowing small amounts would not cause major harm, then the product is not required to give any precautionary statement. Many window cleaners, fabric softeners and some hand dishwashing detergents fall into this category.

The "signal word" is the first, and largest, word in the precautionary statement. **CAUTION** or **WARNING** is the mildest warning. These two interchangeable words are the ones most commonly used for household cleaning products. When they appear in the statement, it means that the product is not likely to produce permanent

damage as a result of exposure, if appropriate first aid is administered. For example, the eye or skin could become inflamed or, if the product is swallowed, dizziness or upset stomach might occur. Many laundry detergents, automatic dishwashing detergents, disinfectants and all-purpose cleaners fall into this category. If certain food chemicals, such as vinegar, were sold as cleaning products, they, too, would fall into this category and require human safety labels.

DANGER indicates that greater precaution should be taken and often appears on specialty products intended for tough jobs, such as cleaning the oven or unclogging drains. For example, with accidental exposure of the eye or skin to the undiluted product, tissue damage could occur. Should the undiluted product be swallowed, the mouth, throat or stomach might be damaged. If the product were exposed to an open flame, the material could ignite.

Although **POISON** is not classified as a signal word under the Act, it is the strongest indication of hazard. It is rarely used on household cleaning products. However, it may be found on household lye, on some care care items, such as antifreeze, and on insecticides and rodenticides.

Specific phrases, such as "eye or skin irritant," "harmful if swallowed" and "flammable" are included in the precautionary statement. These explain the possible consequences that could occur if the product is misused.

Precautionary measures are also included. These describe actions to be taken or avoided. For example, the label might instruct consumers to wear rubber gloves for protection, to avoid product vapors and/or to use the product in a well-ventilated area. If flammability is a concern, a phrase such as "Do Not Use Near Open Flame or in Areas Where Sparks May Be Generated" may appear. Consumers may also be advised against mixing a product with anything that might cause a dangerous reaction. If this precaution appears, the label will be specific about which combinations to avoid.

When necessary or where appropriate, first aid instruction are also included in the precautionary statement. For example, the label might state "If Swallowed, Drink a Glassful of Water. Call a Physician." or "In Case of Eye Contact, Flush Eyes with Water for 15 Minutes."

If they are relevant to the hazard, the precautionary statement will also include handling, storage and disposal instructions. Examples include "Do Not Reuse Container," "Store

Away From Heat or Out of Direct Light," and "Store Out of the Reach of Children."

As an added safeguard, keep products in their original containers with product labels intact. Instructions, precautionary statements and first aid instructions vary according to a product's ingredients. It can be dangerous to use a product incorrectly or to follow with wrong emergency treatment guidelines. Take advantage of all the information on labels to get the best and safest use from cleaning products.

STEP INTO THE LINEMAN'S SHOES!



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If you made your living as a lineman, it goes without saying you'd want your work environment as safe as possible.

You can help make the lineman's job safe by putting a little common sense into action. For example:

- Don't hang birdhouses or basketball goals on electrical poles. The lineman will have great difficulty climbing around them, even though you think they're perfectly placed.
- Don't landscape around poles with flower boxes, birdhouses or anything else that might cause harm if a lineman were to fall.
- Don't hang signs on poles because the nails or staples could cause the lineman to slip if he has to climb.

Use a little common sense around utility poles; show your appreciation for those who work so hard to make sure you have reliable electric service. All it takes is stepping into the other guy's shoes for a few moments!

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

Time For Basic Training

When your dog is well-trained, it makes a world of difference for you and your pet. A dog is more secure and confident when taught to understand and obey simple commands. As a general rule, the younger the pet, the better. So start early while your puppy is most impressionable.

Basic Commands

Learning the meaning of commands like "sit," "down," "stay," "come" and "heel" is not difficult for most puppies. Training may begin when a puppy is between 8 to 10 weeks old. Puppies tire easily, so training sessions should be short—once or twice a day for 15 to 30 minutes. Remember that dogs have short memories, so be patient. Repetition is necessary. It's also important to lavish praise on your friend when she obeys the command.

Just Say "NO"

Be consistent and confident when training your puppy. Your new pet needs to know who's in charge. Remember to correct your puppy when she is wrong and praise your pet when she is right.

Use your voice to do this and never resort to physical punishment. This is unkind and confuses your puppy. Saying "NO" in a commanding, authoritative voice is the proper means of correction. After your puppy has responded to your correction, praise her immediately.

Enforce The Rules

If you expect your puppy to sleep in a dog bed, make sure you enforce that behavior from day one. Your puppy might cry in response to separation from mother or littermates. A hot water bottle and a loud ticking alarm clock may provide comfort. Be sure the bed is big enough, and is located in an area free from drafts.

Decide now what your household policy will be; if yours will be a "no couch privileges" house, be sure and enforce this from the start. The same hold true for begging at the table, jumping on people and other objectionable behaviors.

If you don't want your puppy to learn any of these habits, make sure your rules are obeyed from the beginning.

Ask Your Veterinarian

Please consult with your veterinarian about dog training classes. Many people enroll in these classes with their puppy before they ever begin the training process, to ensure that their puppy's training is accomplished effectively.

Sometimes a dog will present more difficult behavior problems such as excessive barking, digging in the yard, or chewing up your possessions, furniture, or carpet. These are behaviors that can be remedied most easily with the help of a respected professional dog trainer in your area. Ask your veterinarian for a recommendation.

supported by 47 House Democrats, moving from a saving of \$270 billion in the original House budget to \$168 billion in savings over a seven year period.

On Medicaid, Republicans adopted the budget figure proposed by members of the conservative Democrat Coalition. This new proposal brings the level of seven-year budget savings down from \$150 billion in the original House budget to \$85 billion.

In the area of welfare, Republicans proposed a level of \$60 billion in savings, down from the \$85 billion included in the original House budget. This last figure is one which was included in the U.S. Senate welfare reform bill and which received the support of 35 Senate Democrats as well as 53 Senate Republicans.

Additionally, the new budget proposal offered by congressional Republicans includes a modest level of tax relief for families and small businesses. Republicans have taken a significant step toward reaching an agreement by reducing the amount of tax relief down from \$354 billion in the original House version to \$177 billion in this latest proposal.

This last good faith effort incorporates savings levels on Medicare, Medicaid and welfare that have been endorsed not only by a majority of Republicans but by many of my Democrat colleagues. I have worked with many Democrats in an effort to forge a budget solution which can receive wide-spread support from Republicans and Democrats alike. Unfortunately we have been

opposed by President Clinton every step of the way. From a constitutional amendment requiring a balanced budget -- which the President lobbied vigorously against -- to our latest bi-partisan budget proposal, President Clinton has consistently opposed Congressional efforts to restore financial responsibility to our nation's government.

As the liberal *Washington Post* stated just last week, "The balanced budget plan that President Clinton submitted Saturday night would achieve all kinds of things, but a balanced budget is likely not among them." The editorial goes on to say the President's budget plan "...relies on gimmicks that almost no one believes would survive and produce the deficit reduction claimed for them."

Adopting a balanced budget is not simply about federal programs, spending levels and taxes. Enacting a balanced budget is about ensuring the very future of our country. Although it has not been easy, I remain committed to working diligently for a balanced budget and meeting the obligation we have to today's citizens and to future generations.

Christmas At The White House

Ms. Sandra Storment of Little Rock, AR accepted an invitation to the White House for a Christmas party on Saturday, December 16th.

The beauty and wonder of the White House at Christmas time is very nostalgic. In honor of families everywhere the 1995 holiday decorations at the White House celebrated Christmas with the beloved poem and story "Twas the Night Before Christmas" with all its humor and warmth.

To celebrate the season the first family invited three distinct groups of artisans to create ornaments for the White House trees. The American Institute of Architects and architecture students designed ornaments representing the house that is the scene of Santa's visit. Culinary schools sent ornaments of confectionery delights, inspired by "visions of sugar plums," while the American Needlepoint Guild and the Embroiderers Guild of America created the traditional holiday stockings. Each ornament was a delightful reminder of American talent and imagination.

The East Garden Room, the East Colonnade and the East Foyer were decorated with trees of handmade ornaments used at the White House during 1993 and 1994. These were created by American artists and designers as well as the National Society of Tole and Decorative Painters. The East Foyer also held the exhibit of past White House Christmas cards dating back to the Eisenhower administration. The official card for 1995 depicted the recently refurbished Blue Room, and the original painting by Thomas McKnight entitled "White House Blue Room."

The guests were served in the elegant State Dining Room where heads of state, foreign dignitaries and guests from around the United States are entertained. The showcase piece in the State Dining Room was the gingerbread house created by the White House pastry chef. This year, the house was a sentimental favorite of the First Lady, as it was a replica of her girlhood home on Wisner Street in Park Ridge, Illinois. The gingerbread house took nearly five months to create and the entire creation was edible.

In the East Room, the traditional White House creche was the focal point. The exquisite antique creche was made in Naples, Italy in the late eighteenth century, and featured 47 carved wood and terra cotta figures. Six lofty trees, ranging from 12 feet to 20 feet ornamented with burgundy and gold ribbons were stationed throughout the room. Guests were served desserts while listening and dancing to the Marine Corp Symphony band., Santa was present as well to wish everyone a happy holiday season.

The official White House tree stood in the Blue Room as is the customary tradition. The 18 1/2 foot Fraser fir from West Jefferson, North Carolina was decorated by the American Institute of Architects and architecture students. The green velvet handmade skirt was designed by individual artisans from each of the 50 states, territories and the District of Columbia, to celebrate the first Clinton holiday at the White House.

The trip to Washington for Ms. Storment included a jazz concert in Georgetown by renowned jazz artist Alex Bugnon, a tour of the U. S. Department of Agriculture and a play at the Kennedy Center. Shopping, historical sights, and catching up with friends was also a part of the four day agenda. In addition, Ms. Storment received a gift of Al Gore Vice Presidential cuff links and a Bill Clinton engraved day planner.

Ms. Storment was the weekend guest of attorney and Mrs. Carol Willis of Silver Spring, Maryland. She plans to return to D.C. for additional functions later this year.

Ms. Storment is Senior Vice President and Director of Human Resources for First Commercial Corporation of Little Rock, Arkansas. First Commercial Corporation is a five billion dollar bank holding company which has 3,000 employees with banks and subsidiary companies in seven states.



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

Adult Basic Education Classes/GED Testing

In cooperation with the State Board for Community and Junior Colleges, the Tishomingo County Vocational Technical Center offers an Adult Basic Education Program for adults who are functioning below the 8th grade level.

The criteria of the program is to enable participants to acquire the basic skills necessary for literate functioning; providing participants with efficient basic education such as reading, language, math and social studies, to enable them to obtain jobs or gain a better position in the work force. There are those who will wish to obtain the level of completion of secondary school or its equivalency (GED). Some times adults wish to just do something for their self esteem - this is one way of doing it - get an education. It is free to everyone. No cost for books, pencils, paper or any other supplies. The only cost involved is when you take your GED test (\$20.00).

The classes are offered two nights a week on campus at the Vo-Tech Center. The participants may enroll at any time. Four instructors who have degrees are available to teach and assist you in your studies. A short test will be given at time of enrollment to provide the instructors with your grade level. You will be free to work at your own pace, attend when you can, etc. When you have achieved the desired level - at your request - the GED test will be given at the Vo-Tech Center on given date.

Extension Service To Offer Weight-Off-Wisely Classes

Are you interested in losing one to two pounds of weight per week for 10 weeks? If so, you will want to join the Weight-Off-Wisely classes, which will be taught on Monday evenings at 4:00 p.m. at the Iuka Library, beginning Monday, January 29, at 4:00 p.m.

Weight-Off-Wisely is a ten week program designed to help men and women lose weight through diet and nutrition planning, sensible eating, modification of existing undesirable behavior, and exercise. This program should be used as a tool or stepping stone for individuals to attain successful weight loss. Successful weight loss means losing any weight (two pounds to 20 pounds) and keeping it off. Success is not losing ten pounds during a program and then gaining that weight back within a year.

The first session requires about two hours of time, while the other sessions last somewhere between 1 and 2 hours. At each session there will be a group interaction, a nutrition lesson and exercise. There will be a fee of \$5.00 to cover the cost of equipment for the ten weeks. These sessions will be offered through the Tishomingo County Cooperative Extension Service.

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

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

Housekeeping

Business has started to pick up in the Mississippi House of Representatives following the appointment of committees, gubernatorial inauguration, and adoption of a resolution to trim the 1996 legislative session in a move to expedite handling of bills and save taxpayer's money.

The first session of a new legislative term is usually 125 days as authorized by the State Constitution, while remaining sessions are each limited to 90 days unless extended. This year's session would be shortened to 97 days, rather than the customary 125 days, under a legislative timetable approved during the past week by the House. An alternative proposal was approved in the Senate at the close of the week, but differences between the two chambers must be resolved before the resolution takes effect.

The resolution, as adopted by the House, called for the session to end by Easter Sunday, April 7, although the official adjournment would be set for a week later, April 14. The additional seven days would give legislators an opportunity to return - - if necessary - - to consider any late-

arriving gubernatorial vetoes that might come down in the closing days of the session. It also would help avoid problems that have arisen on occasion in past sessions involving what's commonly known as the "five-day rule." This is an old constitutional provision that prohibits passage of appropriations or revenue bills in the last five days. It has not been unusual in the past for a session to be extended for a few days, at least on paper, to comply with the five-day restriction.

The initial session of a new four-year term is normally longer than the other three sessions to

allow more time for organizational chores, introduction of bills, and appointment of committees, and to provide for a smoother transition between gubernatorial administrations. Since Governor Kirk Fordice is the state's first chief executive to succeed himself in modern times, it was felt the longer session would not be

required in 1996. The shortened session, which has the Governor's support, is expected to save more than \$380,000 in legislative costs.

Other highlights of the past week included a sharp increase in committee work, the introduction

of hundreds of bills and resolutions, and passage of a bill designating January 26 as the qualifying deadline for candidates to enter this year's congressional primaries. It was the first measure to clear both chambers.

The proposal, recommended by the apportionment and Elections Committee, was aimed at clearing up some questions that arose following approval of new qualifying deadlines in 1994 for various offices. Under the 1994 act, this year's qualifying deadline would have fallen on March 1 or only 12 days before the "Super Tuesday" presidential preference

primary and congressional primaries, causing problems in making ballots available to absentee voters. The bill provides about 45 days between the qualifying cutoff and the primaries this year, and sets the qualifying at 60 days before the presidential preference primaries in future election years.
