Tri-State Network Demonstration Project To Be Explained At Town Meeting


The Tri-State Network Demonstration Project invites everyone in Tishomingo County and the surrounding area to a Town Meting, planned for Tuesday evening, February 20, 1996, at the Iuka Public Library at 7:00 p.m. A demonstration of the communityased telecommunication network will be provided for all those interested in the advancement of Tishomingo County.

The Tri-State Network Demonstration Project headquartered at Mississippi State University is supporting economic development n Tishomingo County. Funds that support the project are provided by the U. S. Department of Commerce and the Mississippi Department of Economic and Community Development. The Tri-State Network Project is a union of technology, telecommunications, and the public sector. These efforts are possible through organizations that care about the community, such as: Mississippi State University, NASA, Smithsonian Museum of Natural History, and U. S. Naval Meteorology and Oceanography Command.

The project goal is to implement a community-based advanced telecommunications framework, to support economic development efforts focusing upon Tishomingo County. These efforts will enhance the process of community and economic development within the entire Tri-State region. The physical network will be a telecommunications system that provides the general public two-way interactive video communications, two-way interactive data communications, Internet connectivity through local dial-in access, and a gateway to existing Mississippi networks. A prototype for a broad educational network for schools and the community will be established beginning with a direct connection to the Smithsonian National Museum of Natural History in Washington, D.C.

The education and business/industry communities, in addition to the general public of Tishomingo County will be provided with specific training on the use of the network. Training sessions will focus upon uses of videoconferencing, the Internet; and various uses of

Best Time To Spay A Kitten faster than males. A female kitten is capable of becoming pregnant during her first heat period which may occur as early as five months of age. If you wish to mate your kitten, you should wait until she is at least one year old.

When a kitten is in heat, she becomes restless and nervous. She may roll around on the floor alot. Her voice can also change, becoming more piercing and demanding. Though her behavior can be unnerving, these changes are quite normal.

Unlike dogs that normally come into heat every six months, a sexually mature cat can go in and out of heat repeatedly over a period of weeks or

There is no reason to postpone having your kitten spayed unless you do plan to mate her. The best time to spay a kitten is at four to five months, before she has her first heat period. Young kittens heal very rapidly.

Once your kitten has been spayed, her disposition will not change except for the better. She may become less nervous, less noisy and more relaxed, playful and affectionate.

(Contrary to the old wives tale, neither cats nor dogs need to "have a litter" to be well adjusted pets. Spay and neuter your pet so that you do not contribute to the millions of unwanted pets that are destroyed in this country every year.)

Safety Tips For Automatic Dishwashers

Load sharp items last, placing them so points or sharp edges are not in a position to injure the user or damage the dishwasher. Use only detergents and rinse additives recommended for dishwasher use. After a cycle, wait until the heating element has cooled for at least 20 minutes before reaching into the area below the bottom rack.

Take special precautions with young children. Do not store dishwasher detergent within their reach. Do not let them operate or play with a dishwasher or leave them unattended near an operating





Iuka Students To Participate In "TIP"

Kevin Goss (center), Mollie Jourdan (right), and Lily McBride (left) will participate in the Talent Identification Program (TIP) sponsored by Duke University representing Iuka Middle School. To qualify the students must be in the seventh grade and must have scored at the 97th percentile or above on the national norms of the Iowa Test of Basic Skills on one or more of a mathematics subtest, a verbal subtest, or the total composite score.

The objectives of the program are to identify the very bright among our youngsters at an early age; to facilitate the education of these students; to follow and nurture their talent through the critical middle and high school years; and to develop an effective research effort to help understand the nature of academically talented adolescents.

The aim of TIP is to assist youths who have excellent mathematical, verbal, or general intellectual ability by providing them with information about their ability and about educational options that may be beneficial to them. These students must take the American College Test (ACT). Our students took the ACT in February. The results of the ACT will be received by Iuka Middle School and by Duke University. Winners will be announced.

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

At a meeting of the National mors Association last week, a mous agreement was reached a plan to address the critical issues of welfare reform and icaid. This development is a or breakthrough in the effort to h a balanced budget.

I believe this bi-partisan ment from the governors can wide the momentum needed to the liberal welfare state once for all and give states the ribility to meet the diverse

health care needs of their citizens. It is significant that this plan was supported by Republican and Democrat governors alike.

the Medicaid Under provisions of the proposal, the governors agreed to unburden states from many federal mandates, allowing them to design health care programs that meet the needs of individual states. The governors plan also allocates funds to states based on state spending, population growth, and other factors and includes a special "umbrella fund" for states which

have unexpected growth in the number of needy and vulnerable

While the plan the governors laid out is only a framework, the principles it contains are remarkably similar to the basic of structure of the MediGrant proposal passed by Congress late last year. Under that legislation, Mississippi's annual Medicaid funding allotment would have increased from \$2,064 per beneficiary to \$3,450 over seven years. The plan also attacks fraud and abuse, which waste up to 10%

of every Medicaid dollar and eliminates the "one-size-fits-all"

The governors used many Responsibility Act (H.R. 4) already adopted by the House and Senate as the basis of their proposal to

work programs and combat rising priority was given to maintaining child protection

Emphasizing work over welfare was another major element of the governors plan. Under their agreement, parents who are eligible for AFDC (Aid to Families Dependent Children) payments must accept employment within a two-year period. Also, states that exceed targets for work participation will receive an additional 5% in block grant

The governor's agreement promotes personal responsibility by giving states the freedom to pursue several options. States will be allowed to stop additional cash benefits to women who have more children while on welfare, deny welfare to unwed teenagers, and prohibit welfare payments to parents who do not cooperate in establishing the father of their

support of the nation's governors, legislation to address the critical issues of welfare and Medicaid can finally move forward and be signed into law. I applaud the bi-partisan spirit of America's governors in coming to this unanimous agreement. I hope that Congress and the President will adopt the principles outlined in the governors' plan and act upon them


Mr. Mills said this authority is pursuant to Secretary Glickman's declaration on November 9, 1995, of a major

As a result of this major disaster, Tishomingo County, as a primary county in Mississippi, is named as an area eligible for Federal disaster assistance pursuant to Section 321 (a) of the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act.

Applications for assistance in the disaster-stricken county will be accepted by FSA through July 9, 1996, for physical and/or production losses.

Farmers qualifying for emergency loans many borrow up to 80 percent of their actual production loss, not to exceed a maximum of \$500,000 or that actually needed, whichever is less.

FSA Emergency Loans cover losses from designated disaster and are made to qualified farmers who cannot obtain necessary credit from other lenders in the local area.



NARFE Celebrates 75th Anniversary

News

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What is Past is Prologue: A Brief History of NARFE By: James Timothy Ryan

NARFE is nearly as old as he challenge to federal retirees to val At protect their hardearned rights. Actually, one could trace the

pirit of NARFE back to 1829

Andrew Jackson institutionalized the "spoils stem' of political appointments on Des federal offices. President James p.m. Harfield's assassination in 1881, s. and way a disappointed office seeker who made it clear that neglecting omed he spoils system could spell death, and Ambarked the enactment of the andmark 1883 civil service nnesse reform bill. This bill provided for Civil Service Commission, again competitive examinations open to all citizens, and, most importantly, ntection for career civil service from smissal. This act laid the undations for the modern civil ervice system, with its hybrid between an ongoing corps of

> olitical appointees. However, Congress didn't ouch the issue of federal tirement until 1920, when the irst civil service retirement law

In February 1921, fourteen ired federal workers met and med a new association for "the tterment of the status of retired ederal employees." Jacob Starr, a eteran of four years of Civil War nd over four decades of Civil ervice, was chosen as the first

From the get-go, NARFE vas an active, vigorous bunch, eeting weekly, drafting bylaws, nd creating its own publication, The Annuitant - - originally a earbook, later a periodical which ectric would ultimately morph into today's Retirement Life.

By 1923, membership had blossomed from 14 to 6,500 in just two years. In 1924 the association adopted its present name - - the National Association of Retired

Federal Employees — although the name has been changed back and forth a few times since then.

The new association pushed for a bill in Congress to increase the annuity maximum and to make sure those already retired would be included under the legislation - - it was NARFE which made Congress aware of the need for that amendment. Signed by President Coolidge in 1926, this was NARFE's first legislative

The next challenge on NARFE's agenda was the protection of federal workers' widows. John Montgomery Kline, NARFE's second president made this goal the centerpiece of his 14year tenure, and his persistence was finally rewarded in 1939 with the enactment of surviving spouse

New legislation in 1942 extended retirement coverage to nearly all federal government employees and instituted a new method for computing annuities.

At the suggestion of the association's general counsel Lewis Fisher, NARFE was incorporated with the District of Columbia as a fraternal, non-profit organization in 1947.

Most importantly, NARFE began a healthy growth spurt - from 8,000 in 1945 to over 65,000 by 1952. By 1953, NARFE had grown so much that it needed to purchase its own building large enough to house the new workers needed to handle the swelling membership - - a nice problem to

The main reason for the membership surge was success, finally, in causing chapters to sprout. In March 1947 an article was added to the Constitution and Bylaws allowing for a greater

degree of organizational and financial freedom for chapters, and this apparently did the trick.

The midcentury mark, 1950, was also the birth year of NARFE's first state federation, with California leading the way. By the end of the '50's NARFE boasted 26 state federations, over 750

chapters and over 100,000

The mid-'90's find NARFE, under President Charles Jackson, 450,000 members strong and raring to grow bigger - - the halfmillion mark is the next goal. Our legislative program continues apace, and a vigorous public relations program ensures that NARFE's message is continually heard by politicians, press and public.

Just in case the NARFErs of the '90s might be tempted to forget the perpetual nature of our struggle, in late 1995 federal workers and their dependents became the first in line to suffer as Congress and the White House squabbled over the budget. And again that became the cue for knee-jerk bashers of federal workers to prattle their malicious nonsense about "government drones". As it says in front of the National Archives building in Washington, what is past is prologue.

NARFE has flown a long way since 1921 when Lt. Coney winged his way across the continent and NARFE began life with 14 members. Now, in 1996, we celebrate our anniversary year resolved to overcome all obstacles as we soar off into the future.

Reviewing NARFE's history is indeed like going "back to the future" - - we learn that we've always had to fight for just treatment, that such grappling has usually paid off, and that we'll always have to do so. That's what we're here for.

County Agents Notes By: Danny Owen Sunny Day Vegetable **Garden Projects**

Planting time is still several weeks away for most vegetable gardeners. However, if you're really dedicated and ready for a few sunny day gardening projects, consider some of the following. They'll really pay-off in terms of fewer disease and other pest problems after your garden is up and going next spring. Chore number one should be destruction and burial of last season's crop debris. Since many disease and insect pests live through the winter in old plants, cull piles, or plant stubble left in the garden, destruction of crop debris should

be an annual project.

This is a great way to cut down on early season disease pressure and you'll have less blight in your cabbage, broccoli, green beans, tomatoes, and other crops. Debris from diseased plants should not be added to compost piles, since temperatures reached are not always sufficient to kill nematode eggs and other plant disease microbes. Remaining stubble and surface litter should be plowed under at least six inches before planting. This is effective because as debris decays, the disease eventually microorganisms deteriorate, and reduce the amount of fungus and bacterial inoculum that could cause problems in future crops. How about those tomato stakes and bean support poles lying over in a corner in the garden? Before reusing, it's a good idea to disinfect them, since the off-season on stakes, poles, cages, and other plant support structures. To reduce the risk of disease, tomato stakes and cages can be disinfected by washing to remove soil, followed by dipping or spraying with a 10% bleach solution (one gallon of household bleach in nine gallons of water works great) prior to reuse.

If you haven't already done so, collect soil samples to determine fertility needs. Plants which are according fertilized recommendations based on a soil test are not as likely to have disease problems as plants which are low in nutrition or receive an imbalance of nutrients. While collecting a soil sample for fertility analysis, why not collect a duplicate sample to check for the presence of parasitic nematodes which feed on the roots of many garden plants.
