Rally & Motorcade Sunday Afternoon To Welcome Girls Back From State

The Tishomingo County High School Lady Braves will be welcomed back from the State championships in Jackson by a motorcade including cars from the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department, Iuka, Tishomingo, Burnsville, and Belmont Police Departments and also some local volunteer fire departments. They will meet the bus when it exits the Natchez Trace onto Highway 25, south of Tishomingo.

The bus carrying the girls will be arriving at the Tishomingo County High School gym at approximately 2:30 Sunday afternoon, March 10th. There will then be a rally in the gym so that the fans can talk to and congratulate the coaches and girls.

Local business people have contributed money to allow the team and coaches to stay until the end of the tournament and watch all the other contests.

County Fairgrounds to Receive Improvements

A bill that passed the state House this week included an amendment that would provide for improvements to the Tishomingo County Fairgrounds, according to Representative Ricky Cummings.

Cummings was one of the authors on the amendment that passed on House Bill 1084. It will allow for \$50 thousand state bond money that must be matched by the Fair Board and the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors.

That makes \$100 thousand that could go toward improvements to barns and buildings at the fairgrounds.

"There was a bill last year that a lot of counties were left out of," said Cummings, "This just gets Tishomingo County back in [the funding]."

House Bill 1084 still must pass the Senate.

Tishomingo Living Center Gets New Beds In Critical Care Unit

Tishomingo Living Center recently received approval for an application for capital expenditure of \$178,841.40 from the Mississippi Department of Health.

This will increase the number of beds in the short term stay-critical care unit from 6 to 16 beds, according to Administrator Carol Rollins.

"This is a Medicare-only unit," said Rollins. "The unit is open for occupancy. Already 28 people have benefited from this unit and have been able to return home and live independently," she said.

Rollins said that representatives John White, Harvey Benderman and Ricky Cummings and the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors were instrumental in getting legislation passed that provided funding for this improvement.

State Health Officer Ed Thompson, MD, MPH, approved the cost overrun on a previously submitted certificate of need for the Iuka nursing home facility at the monthly CON (certificate of need) review meeting.

2. If you became 65 years of age in 1995 (husband or wife)
3. If you became disabled (husband or wife)
4. If your marital status changed
5. If you have purchased or built a new home, you

Vote Tuesday in Primary Election

Donna Henry Dill, Circuit Clerk, encourages everyone to vote for the candidate of their choice on election day, Tuesday, March 12th.

"Any time voters are choosing a candidate for our country's highest office, it's historic," said Secretary of State Eric Clark, the state's chief election officer. "We've been working hard with local election officials to make sure things go smoothly."

Mississippi is one of seven states participating in the "Super Tuesday" primary, begun in 1988. Political parties will use March 12 vote totals for President as part of their delegate selection process.

Absentee ballots are available at the circuit court clerk's office and may be cast until 12:00 noon on Saturday, March 9. Polls will be open election day from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

As in any primary election, citizens may vote in the party election of their choice. Mississippi law, however, does not allow a voter to switch parties and vote in a different party's runoff election. Runoff elections for Senator and Congressman are slated for April 2 if necessary.


Tishomingo Dixie Youth Baseball

Since 1986, the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service - Department of Home Economics has been addressing this need by providing educational support and training to entrepreneurs. These entrepreneurs are involved in a variety of home-based businesses through extension's home-based and entrepreneurial business program.

Training concentrates on the development of business, marketing, and management skills and the application of these skills to all specialty areas of home economics. Examples of entrepreneurial ventures include apparel design and production, child care, food products and more. Ventures range in size from home-based sole proprietorships to small wholesale manufacturing firms.

Examples of programming efforts include the implementation of the first Child Care As A Business workshop. To date, more than 100 entrepreneurs have been trained in the business, marketing and management aspects of owning and operating a child care business.

Another program effort addressed the needs of limited resource women. Low-income women were taught technical and job skills through the "Entrepreneurial and Technical Skills Development of Welfare Recipients" pilot program.

In addition, the relationship of the family to the home-based business is critical to the success of the business. Integrating home-based work with family responsibilities, which includes time management, coping with stress and family support, is essential especially in home-based businesses where the roles of family and business can easily become intermingled.

Home economics programming in the area of home-based and entrepreneurial business specifically addresses and supports

economic development in Mississippi. By developing the skills of small business owners, extension home economics can continue to impact the financial stability of rural communities and households by helping families become more self-sufficient.



Iuka Girls Placed Third in 1959 State Tournament Much Has Changed Since then, but Local Pride in Our Team Still The Same

Thirty-seven years ago 13 Iuka girls made us proud by going to the Mississippi State Girls Basketball Tournament and making it to the semi-finals. They were the Tishomingo County girls and they have the chance to do in the Finals of this year's State Tournament scheduled for Friday night.

The 1958-59 Iuka High School Chieftainettes beat the Cannon Raiderettes for the Class A-AA North Half Title and placed third in the 1959 State Tournament played in Pearl, Mississippi after a 65-59 upset by the Forest Hill Rebelettes.

Two girls from the Iuka team made the A-AA All-State team. Ora Lee (Davis) McManus, a

forward, and guard Barbara (Flynt) Allen were selected on the final night of the 1959 State tournament. Ora Lee Davis scored a tournament total of 113 points for an average of 37.7 per game. As a sophomore forward, she poured in 745 points that season with an average of 24 points per game. Barbara Flynt held three girls to 58 points in the tourney and of those 58, 42 were scored by one girl, 20 of which were free throws.

Back then girls basketball was different, according to Mrs. McManus. I asked her to explain for us young folks. They played half-court then, with the guards playing defense only on their half of the court and the forwards doing all the offensive play on their side of the court. You

couldn't cross over the center line without a penalty.

She went on to say that Burnsville High School was their biggest rival then and told me about many a tough game between Burnsville and Iuka. She said that,

similar to this year's tourney, the Chieftainettes traveled to Pearl, near Jackson and stayed in a hotel, with parents and supporters following behind, but that it was a longer trip without the Natchez Trace.

"We also just went down there and stayed a few days until our part in the tournament was done,"

1959 Girls Honored by School & Local Businesses

Tishomingo County fans have a hard act to follow when we welcome our Lady Braves home from the final State game. After their great showing at the State Tournament and North Half Championship, the Chieftainettes were honored with a town welcome, a special program at the school and many gifts from local businesses.

The March 12, 1959 edition of The Vidette showed the streets of downtown Iuka filled with people and cars as fans welcomed the Chieftainettes home. The caption read, "A large majority of citizens of the town motored to Tishomingo on Sunday afternoon and formed a motorcade to escort the players back to town."

According to a newspaper account, Superintendent H.L. Shook presided at the student body assembly and said that he was the happiest man in the world, as it was the first time for a school of his to attain such an honor. He named tournament victories over Fulton, Kossuth, Aberdeen, Amory, Cleveland, East Tallahatchie and Shannon as instrumental in the team's progress toward State. These were A-AA school teams, who came from high schools with enrollments of at least 180.

At the assembly, Iuka Mayor John Allen, and President Luther Kinard of the Lions Club also spoke. Each of the girls was presented an orchid corsage by the business and professional people of Iuka. Mrs. Lucille Vickers performed the honor of pinning the corsages on the young ladies.

The newspaper article goes on to mention the generosity of area businesses: The Iuka Shirt Company presented "gifts of shirts" and the Tishomingo Shoe Company, through the courtesy of Plant Superintendent Lester Harper, made and presented a pair of shoes to each of the players. The shoes were made in the oxford style in school's colors of black and gold leather. Fifty-five local businesses contributed to a full-page advertisement in the Vidette that proclaimed them the "greatest A-AA Girls' Basketball Team in all North Mississippi".

Special arrangements were made for those who could not go to the tournament games in Pearl. According to the newspaper, a direct wire from Jackson was leased for the event and anyone who wanted to hear the game could go to the high school auditorium to listen, for a small admission to help defray costs.

Tishomingo Elementary Fourth Grade Ranked Fourth in State Test Scores

Tishomingo Elementary fourth grade 1995 Riverside Integrated Assessment Program scores were the fourth highest in the state, according to an analysis performed by the Clarion-Ledger.

The analysis done by the Jackson paper was based on information provided by the State Department of Education for students in grades 4-9.

Students took three multiple-choice sections in reading, language and math, and two performance sections in integrated language and math. In the performance sections, students had to write out answers instead of filling in circles on a multiple-choice answer sheet.

The Clarion-Ledger ranked each of the schools by its total normal curve equivalent scores, which is a combination of the three multiple-choice sections. The performance sections were not used in this ranking.





Dinner begins promptly 6:30. Bring a dish and contribute to the festivities. Nonmembers and older, are welcome.


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Tishomingo County High School FBLA Wins Big! At District



Report From Congress

Charting an electronic course for the 21st Century, Congress earlier this month passed the Telecommunications Competition and Deregulation Act of 1995, which the President quickly signed into law. I believe this new law is one of the most sweeping pieces of legislation to come out of Congress in more than a decade.

This legislation represents the culmination of years of debate, negotiations and compromise, and replaces communications laws which date back to 1934. Mississippians will see positive effects from this new law in job creation, improved cable and phone service, parental control over television shows, and enforcement of anti-pornography regulations.

Advancements in telecommunications and information technology have increased dramatically during the last few years. Unfortunately, consumers have been prevented from reaping the benefits of this information revolution because antiquated regulations and unnecessary red tape have denied full access to new products and services.

Under the provisions of the new law, consumer choices will be

greatly expanded. For example, individuals will no longer be limited to a single company for delivery of local telephone service. At the same time, companies which in the past provided only local phone service will be allowed to compete in the interstate market. Consumers can also expect cable companies to begin offering telephone service.

Freeing the communications industry from outdated regulations benefits not only individual consumers - it gives a boost to the American economy as well. According to the Council of

Economic Advisors, increased competition resulting from this law will create more than 500,000 new jobs during the first two years. Additional job gains will occur as a result of lower phone bills and increased productivity. In fact, the widely respected Wharton Economic Forecasting Associates has stated that Mississippi should expect to gain 17,123 new, high-paying jobs over the next five years as a direct result of this legislation.

The bill also removes many obstacles companies had previously faced in offering service variety. This means that cable, phone and other technology companies will be free to offer more of the services the public wants. Perhaps the most important

effect of the bill will be increased competition, which means lower rates and wider choices for the public.

This law includes the so-called "V-Chip" protection to allow parents to block unwanted or inappropriate television programming. It also imposes criminal penalties for the transmission of pornographic and obscene material over the Internet.

I supported this legislation because it is good for Mississippi and good for the economy - creating new jobs, bringing consumers lower prices, greater choices, and better service.
