### Stolen Four-Wheelers Recovered by Sheriff's Department March 14th

The Sheriff's department recovered three stolen 4-wheel all-terrain vehicles and arrested Mark Loveless for grand larceny last Thursday.

Loveless, of Tishomingo, was charged with three counts of grand larceny. The charges were filed in Tishomingo and Prentiss Counties, Mississippi and Hardin County, Tennessee, since the four-

wheelers were stolen from residents in those counties. One vehicle was found at the Loveless residence on County Road 101 (Old Highway 25) in Tishomingo and two others were found at different locations. All the vehicles will soon be returned to the owners.

One of the four-wheelers was stolen as late as March 13th, and

another was stolen March 2, 1996.

One was stolen from Steve Starkey of Prentiss county, who was thankful to have his child's Christmas present back.

Sheriff's department personnel believe this crime is related to the arrest of three other Tishomingo residents last week that involved drug possession.

### First District Could Get New Circuit Court Judge

The First Circuit Court District could get an additional judge if funding is appropriated for a bill that passed the state House and Senate last week.

The bill authorizes the election of a new judge for the First District which includes Alcorn, Hawamba, Lee, Monroe, Pontotoc, Prentiss and Tishomingo counties. Three additional prosecuting attorneys will also go to the First District under companion legislation approved earlier that authorized 31 new prosecutors statewide. The new

judge and prosecutors are dependent on funding being appropriated before the end of the legislative session, which is scheduled for early April.

County Attorney Nick Phillips said that it would be good to have another judge, since the courts are so busy.

An election could be held as soon as this fall for the judgeship.

The Eighth District and Sixteenth District each also receive an additional judge under this legislation.

### Sons of Confederate Veterans Organize

There will be an organizational meeting for a local camp of the Sons of Confederate Veterans Thursday, March 21st, at 7 p.m., at the Old Tishomingo County Courthouse.

One of the group's projects will be to improve a site in Shady Grove Cemetery where 263 of General Sterling Price's men were buried in a mass grave the day after the Battle of Iuka during the Civil War, according to S.L. Umphress, one of the organizers. They will be installing a fence and planting flowers.

## Iuka Hospital Plans March 22 Health Fair

Iuka Hospital will sponsor a health fair on March 22 as a community service for the residents of Tishomingo County and the surrounding area. The public is invited to attend the health fair, which will take place from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. March 22 at Iuka Hospital, 1777 Curtis Drive.

"Iuka Hospital along with area service organizations will be providing free and low-cost health screenings and presenting health information. The goal of our health fair is to help the participants improve or maintain their health status," said Robert Northern, Iuka Hospital Administrator.

Participants will have the opportunity to participate in the following free health screenings: blood pressure, body composition, depression, foot, and glaucoma. Tupelo Eye Center, will be offering the free glaucoma screenings.

Cholesterol and glucose screenings will be provided for \$8. The results of the lab tests will be mailed to the participants.

will have exhibits and booths. United Blood Services will be conducting a blood drive during the health fair.

The event also coincides with the mammography screenings provided by NMMC's Mobile Mammography Unit. The cost of the screening mammogram is \$65, and appointments are available by calling (601)841-4158.

### Homestead Exemption Must be Filed by April 1, 1996

The deadline for filing is April 1st. Tishomingo County is under the one-time filing system, according to the tax assessor's office, which means you need only come to the office if you have 1) purchased more land, 2) if you turned 65 years of age in 1995 (husband or wife), 3) if you became disabled (husband or wife), 4) if your marital status has changed, or 5) if you have purchased or built a new home.

County Tax Assessor Jimmy Trussell and Diana Hester, appraiser, are busy appraising more than 60 new homes in the county. They will be checking maps for any properties that may have been overlooked in the past for assessment to be included in the county landroll. ### Black American History National Peanut Month George Washington Carver 1864 - 1943

George Washington Carver pioneer in the field of Chemistry. Carver was born of slave parents on the plantation of Moses & Susan Carver near Diamond, MO. roughly around the years of 1861 - 1864? During the last years of the Civil War several nightriders kidnapped him & his mother, carrying them into Arkansas after which his mother was never heard of again. Moses Carver sent searchers after them he was able to secure the child (there are two different version) Booker T. Washington stated that, "Moses Carver sent his slaves into Arkansas that they might escape being kidnapped." When the danger was over Moses went to Arkansas.

At the time of Carver's rescue he was seriously ill with Whooping Cough. This illness was the beginning of a long siege of poor health-which troubled him for many years. Therefore, Carver was eliminated from Manual

Labor. He learned to cook, sew, minimal house tasks. In leisure time he spent hours in the woods, "talking with the flowers". Carver once wrote, "From a Child I had an inordinate desire for knowledge and especially music, painting, flowers, and the sciences. Day after day I spent in the woods alone in order to collect my floral beauties, and put them in my little garden I had hidden in the bush not far from the house as it was considered foolishness in that neighborhood to waste time on flowers. . . . When just a mere tot my very soul thirsted for an education. I wanted to know every strange stone, flower, insect, bird or beast. No one could tell me. Here are listed products made by George W. ### McCoy Pottery On Display At The Iuka Library

Mrs. Carolyn Hamm's collection of McCoy pottery is on display at the Iuka Public Library throughout the month of March.

The Nelson McCoy Sanitary Stoneware Company was established in 1910 by Nelson McCoy in Roseville, Ohio. They manufactured churns, jars, jugs, poultry fountains, and foot warmers. By 1925, they had expanded their wares to include pedestals, umbrella stands, and a line of embossed vases. From the late twenties through the mid-forties, a utilitarian stoneware was produced some of which was glazed in the soft blue and white so popular with collectors today. In 1933, the firm became known as the Nelson McCoy Pottery Company. They expanded their facilities in 1940 and began to make the novelty artware, cookie jars and dinnerware that today are synonymous with "McCoy".

Mrs. Carolyn Hamm (pictured) acquired her first piece in 1966. Carolyn's collection which is made up of vases, cookie jars, and bowls has been acquired as gifts.

#### PERIODIC CHECKUPS INSURE PET'S HEALTH

Periodic health examinations will help determine the general well-being of your family pet, and identify potential problems.

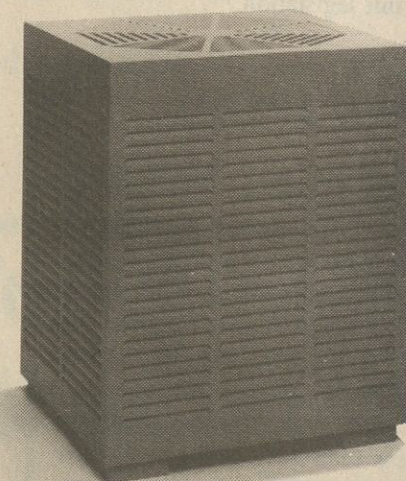

The bride-elect is a 1994 graduate of Tishomingo County High School and is currently employed at Bre's Playschool in Red Bay, Alabama.

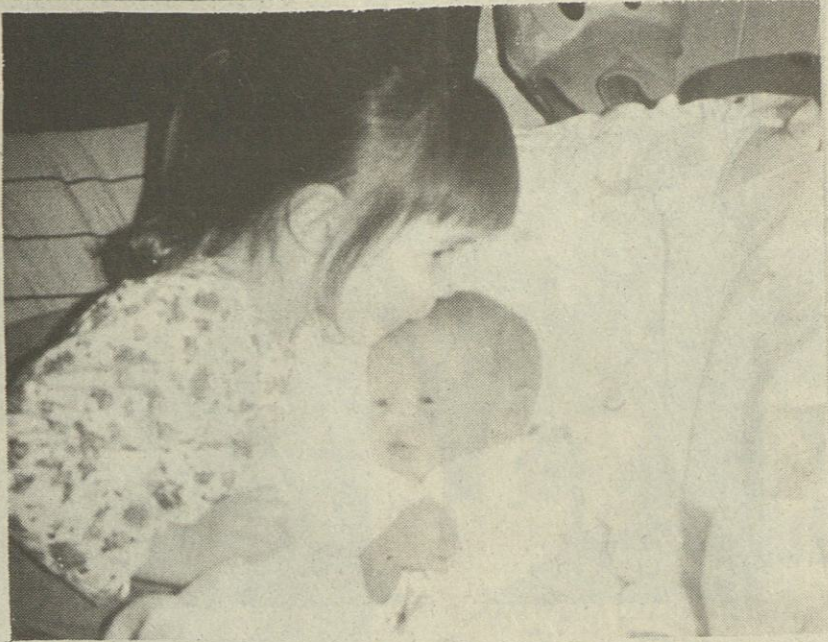

Iuka Hospital has expanded its scope of Rehabilitation Services by adding speech therapy.

"The hospital's physicians and staff recognized the need for this new service because many Tishomingo County residents have had to travel elsewhere for this type of treatment. We are delighted to be able to provide this service locally," said Robert Northern, Iuka Hospital administrator.

Amy Gurley Tomlin of Corinth is providing in-patient and outpatient speech therapy Tuesday and Thursday afternoons between the hours of 3 and 9. "We selected these hours because parents won't have to leave work to take their children to speech therapy services. Speech therapy services now available through Iuka Hospital include therapies for articulation, language, motor speech disorders such as apraxia and dysarthria, swallowing, fluency and voice.

Tomlin, who attended Northeast Mississippi Community College, holds a bachelor's degree from Mississippi University for Women and a master's degree from the University of Mississippi in speech-language pathology. She holds professional membership in the Mississippi Speech-Language-Hearing Association.

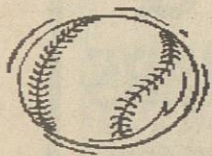




### James "Sparky" Rucker To Visit

whatever the community needed, she said.

Now her community is the world and the fax machine in her home office is as likely to crank out a message from Japan as from Florence.

As president of Pilot International, Horton's responsibilities include hundreds of global clubs with thousands of projects focusing on brain-related disorders and disabilities. The new executive will work with organizations that support this focus, including the National Alliance for the Mentally Ill and the Alzheimer's Association.

Pilot also includes 10,000 worldwide members of the Anchor Clubs, volunteer service for young people.

It did not take long for the Pilot Club to recognize a leader. One year after joining, she was elected vice-president of the chapter, the following year, president. Then she served on the district level, moving through the offices to national president. After that, the world: international cabinet, elected director... This summer she will be installed as president of Pilot International and president of the Pilot International Foundation.

How does Horton explain this rapid ascent through those offices?

"I'm a good organizer and I enjoy getting things done," she said. "I've always planned in advance. I like to know what is coming and plan for it."

Organization is the side of Horton that allows her to lead. It is her wide vein of caring that inspires her to lead.

"Just knowing we can help somebody else means a lot to me. I'm a strong believer in volunteerism and I see that many clubs can do what one small group cannot do alone."

This caring shows up in her career and in her family. She came out of the classroom in 1987 to initiate an elementary counseling program at L. E. Wilson Elementary School in Sheffield.

She oversees group guidance and individual counseling for 474 children in third through sixth grades. Dealing with today's children, often overwhelmed by dysfunctional home life and exposed to drugs and violence, is a draining job.

After school hours she has another mission of caring. Some years ago her mother was stricken with Alzheimer's disease. Horton was her primary caregiver at home and when that became impossible, moved her mother to a nursing home. Dealing with this disease has given her a personal link with Pilot's focus on related disorders.

She grew up in Iuka, Miss., the middle child with an older brother and a younger sister.

"All three of us are overachievers," she said laughing. Her school teacher mother gave her a love for the classroom. Since graduating

from the University of Mississippi, she has earned three graduate degrees.

"Joanne has been in school ever since I've been married to her," said her husband David, assistant manager of the Listerhill Employees Credit Union, who is also active in civic affairs.

### Home Economics Tips

**Look Before You Leap Into Weight Loss Programs**

Losing weight is a national obsession. Surveys have shown that more than 60 million Americans are 20 percent or more over their desirable weight and that at any given time about 40 percent of adult women and 20 percent of adult men are trying to lose weight.

Once the decision to lose weight has been made, most individuals want a miracle cure or "the magic pill" to get the weight off overnight. Some will try to lose it on their own while others like the support and structure of a weight loss program.

Before you decide to take on any weight loss program be sure and consult your physician. Once given the go ahead, and if joining a structured weight loss program is for you, ask yourself the following simple questions to see if the program you are considering is right for you.

\*Is the diet proposed by the program safe?

A safe weight control diet should be low in calories but still provide all the necessary nutrients needed to stay healthy. The diet should help you lose weight slowly and steadily. No matter how much weight you want to lose, a modest goal of about one-half to one pound per week will

increase your chance of success.

\*Are the food choices flexible and suitable?

The program should consider your food likes and dislikes and your lifestyle when your goals are planned.

Total exclusion of a food group or a very rigid eating schedule should be considered a tip off that the diet may not be right for you or may not be nutritionally sound.

\*Does the program provide counseling to help you change your eating, activity, and personal habits?

A successful weight loss program should teach you how to permanently change some of those habits and behaviors that have been developed over a lifetime, such as lack of physical activity and poor eating habits.

\*Is the staff made up of a variety of qualified counselors and health professionals such as nutritionists, registered dietitians, doctors, nurses, psychologists and exercise physiologists?

Programs should not misrepresent sales persons as counselors or technicians. Even if adequately trained, such "counselors" should still be objectionable because of the obvious conflict of interest that exists when providers profit directly from products they recommend and sell.

\*Is attention paid to keeping the weight off? How long is the phase?

Choose a program that teaches skills and techniques to make permanent changes in eating habits and levels of activity to prevent regaining of the lost weight.

\*Does the program require large sums of money at the start or require that clients sign contracts for expensive, long-term programs?

Some practices often result in the program focusing attention on signing people up, rather than on the service and support they provide.

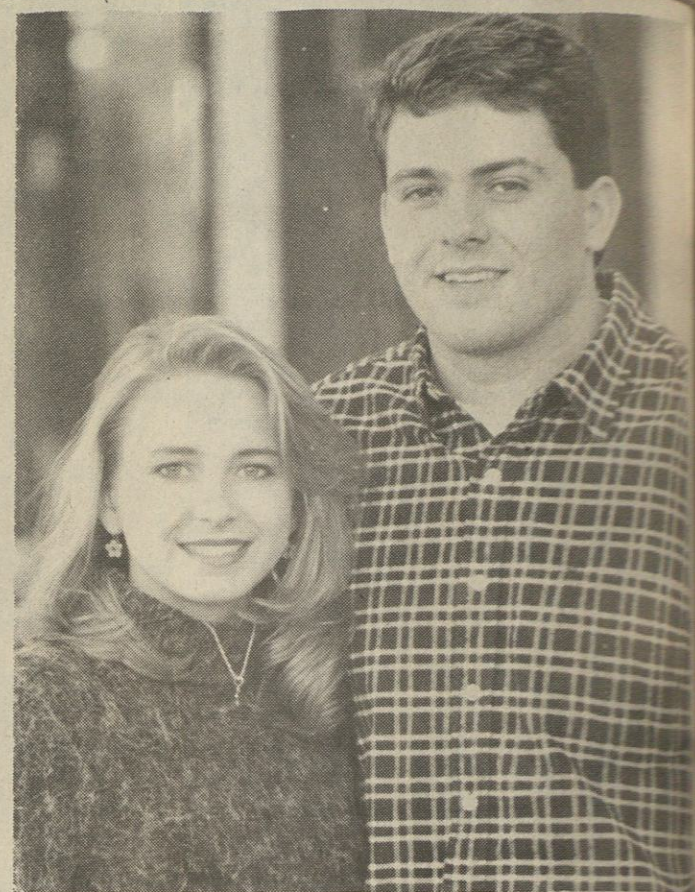
Remember, diets that promise quick weight loss are potentially unhealthy and do not provide lasting results. Weight loss methods that rely on diet aids like beverages, prepackaged foods, or diet pills don't work in the long run.

Whether you are trying to lose weight on your own or with a group, the most important changes are those that you can make long term. Modest goals and a slow course will increase your chances of both losing the weight and keeping it off.
