For the second time this year, the Tishomingo area was struck by destructive high winds and thunderstorms Monday afternoon.

High winds thought to

be a tornado knocked down trees near several residences in the Carter's Branch Community, along County Road 958.

The roof of the Bobby Brock home at 364 CR 958 was extensively damaged

when a tree fell on it. Mr. Brock was inside at the time but no one was injured. The tree was removed before dark with the help of neighbors and fourth District Supervisor

David Sanders and his crews and equipment.

At the Michael Lee Hardin home at 16 CR 421, a newly completed shed was blown away while Mr. Hardin was in it, finding shelter from the sudden storm.

"One minute I was finding shelter from the rain, and the next minute I was in the rain again," said Hardin. About 5 large poles supporting one side of the shed were torn out of the ground.

At the Ila and Ben Powell, Jr. home many large trees were knocked down, but their new home was spared.

Shingles were blown off many buildings, including the Carter's Branch Baptist Church.

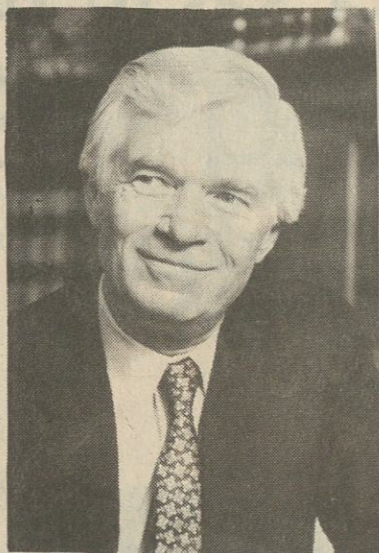
Supervisor David Sanders and his crews were busy all afternoon clearing trees and helping people with his crews and equipment.

Belmont Man Killed Monday Morning In One- Car Accident

William Lee Rogers of Belmont was killed in a one-car accident on Redbud Road Monday morning, April 29, 1996, according to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith.

Rogers, 21, died about 9:30 a.m. at Red Bay, Alabama Hospital, where he was taken soon after the 7:40 a.m. accident.

The sheriff department reports that Rogers apparently lost control of his 1990 Mitsubishi while traveling west on Redbud Road (County Road 864). Exact cause of the accident was not known. No other vehicles or persons were involved.

William Lee Rogers was a native of Tulsa, Oklahoma, a factory worker and a member of Life Unlimited Church of Golden, Mississippi.

Services were at 4 p.m. Wednesday, May 1, 1996 at Life Unlimited Church.

He is survived by his mother and stepfather Debi and John Pruitt of Huntsville, AL, his father, Jimmy Ray Rogers of Donaldsonville, Ga.; five brothers, Jimmy Rogers, and Daniel Ivey of Huntsville, Jeremy and Michael Baker of Fulton, Ms., and Jason Baker of Maui, Hawaii; one sister Kathryn Pruitt of Yuba City, Ca.; grandparents Rev. and Mrs. Doc Agan of Augusta, Ga., Martha Rogers of Eupora, Ms., and Erna Pruitt of Golden, Ms.

Saturday Night Shooting In Belmont Injures Three

Two persons were injured during a shooting incident Saturday night at the Bear Creek Apartments in Belmont.

Larry Joe West, 34, of Belmont, was arrested and charged with two counts of aggravated assault, one count of firing into an occupied dwelling and one count of felony possession of a firearm.

West is being held in the Tishomingo County Jail on \$150,000 bond set in his initial justice court hearing Tuesday.

West is accused of firing a 12-gauge, double-barreled shotgun into an apartment occupied by several people about 9:15

Saturday night, according to Smith. Three people were hit; Shirley Gober, Hazel Spees and her son Joey Spees were shot and hospitalized with injuries that were not life threatening. Hazel Spees was released from Red Bay Hospital later that night, according to Chief Deputy Neil Edmondson.

After the shooting, the suspect ran, and was apprehended with the help of the Belmont Police Department's K-9 Unit on the apartment grounds.

Smith said the motive for the shooting was still under investigation, but domestic trouble was suspected.

SUMMER HEALTH PROBLEMS

Summertime can be a fun time for you and your pet. Unfortunately warm weather also increases the chances for certain health problems. Ask your veterinarian what you can do to reduce the risk of summer accidents and disease.

HEAT STROKE Each summer many pets die of heat stroke. Never leave your pet in the car. Even with the windows cracked, an automobile can heat up to over 100 degrees in a matter of minutes!

INSECTS, SNAKES AND TOADS Dogs and cats are naturally curious creatures, so they tend to provoke defensive attacks from insects, snakes and other outdoor pests. The best way to avoid problems is to supervise your pet's outdoor activities. However, if your pet is stung by an insect, give the area a gentle cleaning, remove the stinger and apply ice. DO NOT give your pet aspirin, Tylenol, or any other pain killer intended for use by humans! A pet that is fed aspirin or Tylenol may suffer permanent liver damage, even death.

To avoid snakes, stay away from swamps and rocky areas. If your pet is bitten, identify the snake if possible and see your veterinarian immediately. Toads release a poison that can make your pet ill. If your pet licks or bites a toad, wash out his mouth with a large amount of water.

PARASITES Warm weather brings with it an increased risk of internal and external parasites. To avoid hookworms, roundworms, and whipworms, remove feces from your yard weekly or the litter box daily. Try to prevent your pet from eating small rodents and insects which may transmit worms. Bring a sample of your pet's stool to the veterinarian at least once a year. If your pet has a chronic problem with internal parasites, your veterinarian can prescribe preventive medication. To help avoid fleas and ticks, keep the yard vegetation trimmed and mow the lawn often. By preventing exposure to fleas, you reduce the chance of tapeworms. Ask your veterinarian about a complete flea control program. Your veterinarian can recommend sprays, collars, and dips that are toxic to fleas, but non-toxic to you, your family and your pet.

TRAUMA Because pets tend to roam more in the summer, their chance of being involved in an accident or coming into contact with animals, people or automobiles also increases. Many cats are killed or injured each summer because windows are left open and screens are not secure.

Glickman Pledges Swift Implementation Of New Farm Law

Dan Glickman today pledged that the U.S. Department of Agriculture would work quickly to implement the farm bill passed by congress last week and signed

today by President Clinton.

"Now that the farm bill is law, the next critical round of work begins --- implementation," Glickman said. "Congress left us in a very tight time crunch. Producers have been patiently waiting for information about how these new programs will work. I pledge that this department will do everything in its power to disseminate information to the public as quickly as possible. "I remain concerned that this bill fails to provide an adequate safety net for family farmers," Glickman said. "While we implement the new farm bill we also will continue to seek innovative ways to improve the farm safety net and help producers manage risk."

"While commodity programs remain central to any farm bill, much of the future of agriculture and rural America will be determined by other factors," Glickman said. "This bill recognizes the Administration's policy priorities -- to make sure we put enough resources into conservation practices, rural success in the changing world market. As agriculture continues to move away from restrictive government programs to more market-oriented ones, what government does outside the traditional commodity programs will become increasingly important."

"The Clinton Administration wholeheartedly support the bill's conservation provisions," Glickman said. "Congress has responded to our proposal that conservation and environmental programs be extended, made simpler, and made more workable for agriculture. We have made tremendous gains in conserving highly erodible cropland and stemming wetland loss. This bill helps safeguard those gains."

Congress has accepted the Administration's principle that we must put enough resources into rural development to enable rural areas to participate in the growing world market. Two persons have been arrested and charged in the theft of some recreational equipment stolen from a cabin at Eastport April 19, 1996.

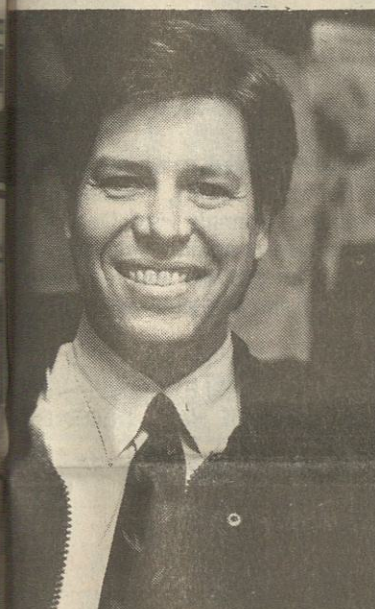

The five-bedroom house was built around the turn of the century and was renovated in 1940. McClung said they would just have to see what insurance would pay for when asked what future plans for the damaged home were.

Speed Limit On Highway 72 Raised To 65 mph

The speed limit on Highway 72 in Tishomingo County was raised to 65 miles per hour as of April 24, 1996, when Mississippi Department of Transportation (MDOT) workers changed the signs.

According to the department, all four-lane divided highways will increase to 65 mph except in those areas considered "buffer zones," such as within city limits or where the highway changes to a two lane. Speed limits will be posted 55 mph or slower, depending on various factors within each location.

One such buffer zone will be where Highway 72 goes through Burnsville, where the speed limit is 55 mph.

Ray Epps, of the Mississippi DOT, urges motorists to use caution on the flat-grade crossings on Highway 72. These crossings, where vehicles cross the center median of a four lane divided highway can be especially dangerous at the new speed limit.

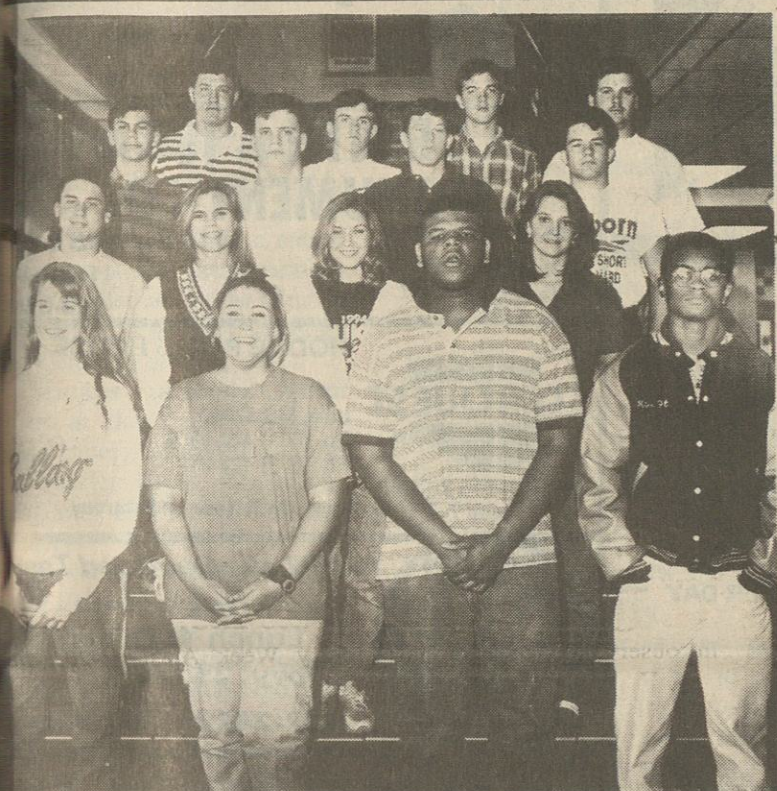

Blue Thumbs Save Water

Don't just go with the flow.

Even though there's a tendency to use water as if our supplies are limitless, the truth is that there's a limit to this precious natural resource. The amount of water available for drinking, cooking and a million other uses remains the same as it was when the Earth was formed. Yet today we have more people demanding more goods and services that use water. It just makes good sense, therefore, to take better care of our water supplies. That's where a Blue Thumb comes in handy.

A Blue Thumb is to water what a green thumb is to plants. Both are about having a hand in making something better. At home, at work and in between, there are many opportunities to exercise care for water by using your Blue Thumb.

While an old-fashioned toilet uses between 3.5 and 7 U.S. gallons or 13-26 liters per flush, the newer water-efficient models use as little 1.5 U.S. gallons or 6 liters.

Put a shut-off nozzle on your hose. Water your lawn before 10 a.m. and never when it's windy. Landscape with grasses, shrubs and plants that require little water. Typically, 50 to 70 percent of household water is used on lawns and gardens.

At work, use recycled paper products, always use both sides of the paper, and participate in recycling programs. *Paper manufacturing is one of the top five water consuming industries.*
