Unemployment At 7.8%

According to Jimmy Rowland, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, unemployment in Tishomingo County rose to 7.8 percent in mid-April. This compares to 6.8 percent in March and 6.3 percent in April, 1995.

The civilian labor force for the county numbered 10,600, 80 more than March and 630 more

than April of last year. Approximately 10,600 Tishomingo County residents held jobs in mid-April while 830 were unemployed.

Manufacturing jobs in the county numbered 3,870, 10 less than March but 270 more than April, 1995. Nonmanufacturing jobs numbered 3,320, 20 more than March but 20 less than April one year ago.

Northeast Mississippi Community College will conduct registration for first term day and evening summer classes on Thursday, May 30 from 8 a.m. until 6 p.m. in Waller and Stringer Halls on the Booneville campus.

Celebrate Family! is the theme for the 1996 Iuka Heritage Days Festival, and this weekend there are endless opportunities for you to bring your family out to Mineral Springs Park and celebrate family and our local heritage.

Starting with a Friday night street dance on May 31st and going through the gospel singing Sunday afternoon there are all kinds of fun games, exhibits, music and displays planned for the tenth annual celebration of Iuka's rich history and cultural heritage.

Friday Night Street Dance

Friday night the celebration begins with a street dance in Mineral Springs Park from 7 to 10 o'clock. Music will be of a country flavor and provided by David Duncan. There will be a line dance group there to lead everyone in fun line dances, according to festival organizer Judy Walker.

Saturday Events

Saturday morning the arts and craft displays will be set up all over the park, along with games for all ages. Arts and crafts will range from wood crafts, dolls, and dried flower wreaths to a special exhibit this year where a computer will produce personalized children's books. Games will include a moon walk, a dunking booth and a speed gun to measure pitching speed.

The Harmony Volunteer Fire Department will be operating a children's carnival in the big gazebo in the park.

Music by local talent will fill the air all day long. Featured performers are local favorites Tim Flanagan, Ronnie Ryan, Mary Bonds, Gail Hudson and many others.

Since the first Heritage Day festivals, the Civil War reenactors

have been a big part, since the Civil War figured so prominently in the history of Iuka. They will be at the park in full force, educating visitors about that part of Iuka's heritage.

The wagon train will travel in parade fashion from the Tishomingo County Fairgrounds to the park and is planned to arrive at 11 a.m.

In celebration of Iuka's Heritage Days, there will be a community noontime service at the historic Episcopal Church of Our Savior on Eastport Street at 12:15 p.m. Casual attire is welcome, so festival goers can go and enjoy a service in this lovely old church.

The Tishomingo County Historical and Genealogical Society will have a booth at the park, and their newly opened library in the old Tishomingo County Courthouse will be open all day for everyone to visit.

Other Saturday events at the park include face painting, and clowns to make balloon animals for children, \$50 shopping spree giveaway by First American National Bank, a giveaway of a new \$100 bill by Iuka Guaranty Bank, and a puppet show sponsored by the People's Bank & Trust. Also, the Cotton Patch Cloggers will be performing at 1 p.m.

All events will be announced from the main stage throughout the day, said Walker.

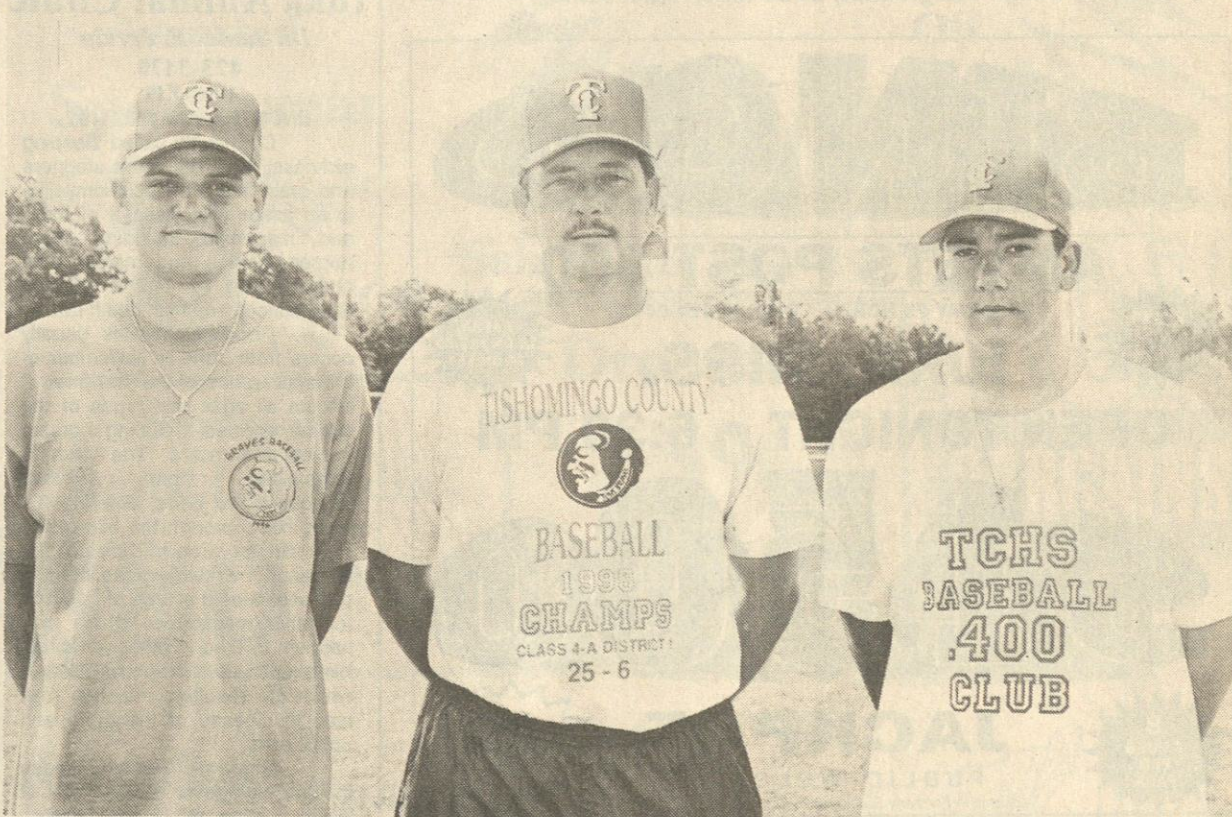

County Agents Notes

WATER QUALITY
IN FISH PONDS

Many times we recommend adding fertilizer and/or lime to farm ponds in order

to improve productivity in the pond. What are we really doing here? We are not fertilizing the fish directly as we would our garden. Fertilize causes microscopic plants called algae to

grow in the water. This causes the water to turn green. Microscopic animals called zooplankton feed on the algae. Small fish and insects feed on the zooplankton and then the larger fish feed on them. Everything is healthy. Green water helps also in shading the bottom of the pond. If sunlight hits the bottom then troublesome weeds will start appearing and could overtake the pond. So green water is good up to a point. If the water gets too green then all of the algae could start dying and this would cause oxygen depletion. A good rule of thumb is, if you can hold a quarter six inches under the surface and still see it, then the algae is not too thick yet. Adding lime does several things. One, it allows better use of the fertilizer by the algae. Second, it will raise the alkalinity of the water. This is important because it acts as a buffer to prevent drastic changes in pH (how acid or basic the water is). pH changes drastically over a 24-hour period in a low alkaline water and this puts stress on the fish. Third, if you have an algae problem and need to kill some of it, copper sulfate is a common treatment, but you can't use it in a low alkaline water. PESTICIDE RECORD KEEPING

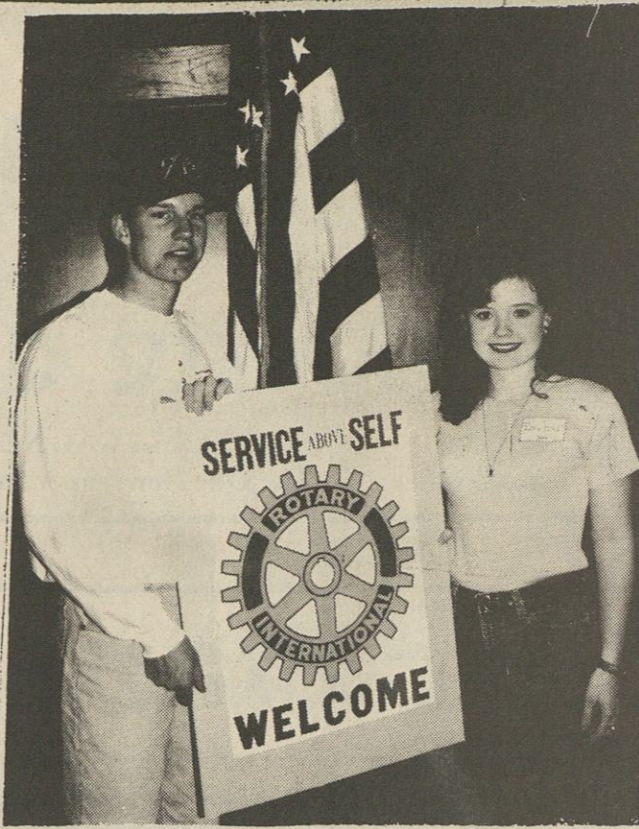
Pesticide record keeping

is now the LAW. This only applies

to RESTRICTED USE PESTICIDES. The information certified private applicators will be required to maintain on a restricted use pesticide (RUP) includes:

1. The brand or product name and the EPA registration number of the RUP that was applied;
2. The total amount of the RUP applied;
3. The location of the application, the size of area treated and the crop, commodity, stored product, or site to which a RUP was applied;
4. The month, day and year when the RUP application occurred; and
5. The name and certification number (if applicable) of the certified applicator who applied or who supervised the application of the RUP.

Records of restricted use pesticide applications must be maintained for 2 year from the date of application. There will not

CROSSED-EYES IN CHILDREN

Crossed-eyes, or strabismus, is a vision condition in which the two eyes are not properly aligned. In some cases, one eye looks directly forward, while the other is either turned away from the nose (wall-eyed) or turned higher or lower (vertical misalignment).

Since alignment of the eyes usually develops in the first five or six months of life, occasional misalignment during that time may be normal. If misalignment seems to be frequent or long-lasting, or always with the same eye, the child should be examined immediately.

A child does not usually outgrow crossed-eyes. In many cases, however, eye muscles can be coordinated and crossed-eyes can be straightened through a program of vision therapy. In such a program, the optometrist will prescribe specific visual tasks to be done under controlled conditions. These tasks are used to coordinate eye muscles, straighten the eyes and help to improve or develop other vision skills, which will make the results more permanent.

WHAT IS

ENCEPHALOMYELITIS?

Commonly called sleeping sickness, staggers, blind staggers and brain fever, encephalomyelitis is an acute viral disease of birds and mammals including man, horses, ponies and mules. It is characterized by central nervous disturbances and high death rate.

Encephalomyelitis usually occurs from June to November or the appearance of the first frost. It affects all ages and types of the equine species including horses, ponies and mules. The virus is transmitted from infected mosquitoes to birds, entering the bird's body through the bite of the mosquito the virus multiplies in the bird and for a few days the infected bird serves as a source of infection for other mosquitoes which may happen to feed to other vertebrate hosts such as man and horses in which the resulting infection may lead to disease of the brain and spinal cord.

Signs of this disease include high fever, partial loss of vision, reeling gait, incoordination, yawning, grinding of teeth, drowsiness, sagging lower lip and inability to swallow. In later stages horses are unable to rise, become paralyzed and die. Death usually occurs in about 50% of the cases. Those that do not die may be permanently affected due to nerve damage.

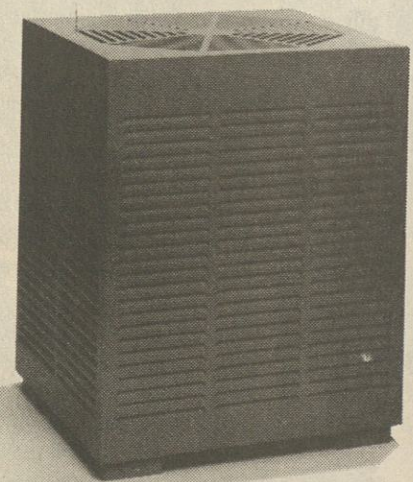
Since this disease may be easily confused with rabies, moldy-corn poisoning and various heavy-metal poisonings, it is imperative that you should consult a veterinarian for a positive diagnosis.

It is important that horses be vaccinated with bivalent vaccines which protect against both strains of virus types.

All horses, ponies and mules should be vaccinated annually and at least 15 to 30 days before the time that past losses occurred in your area.

See your veterinarian about vaccinations for encephalitis.

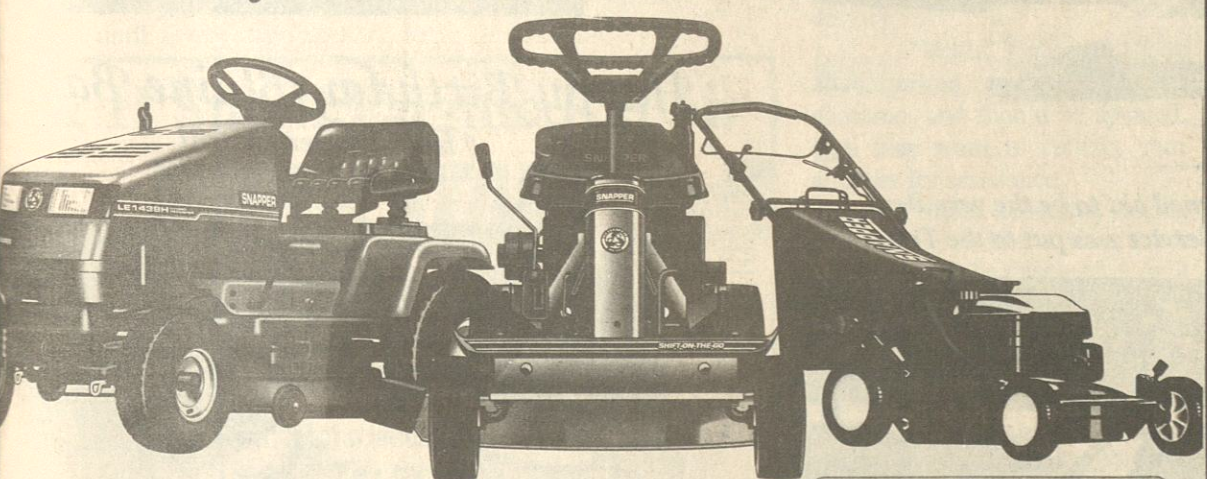

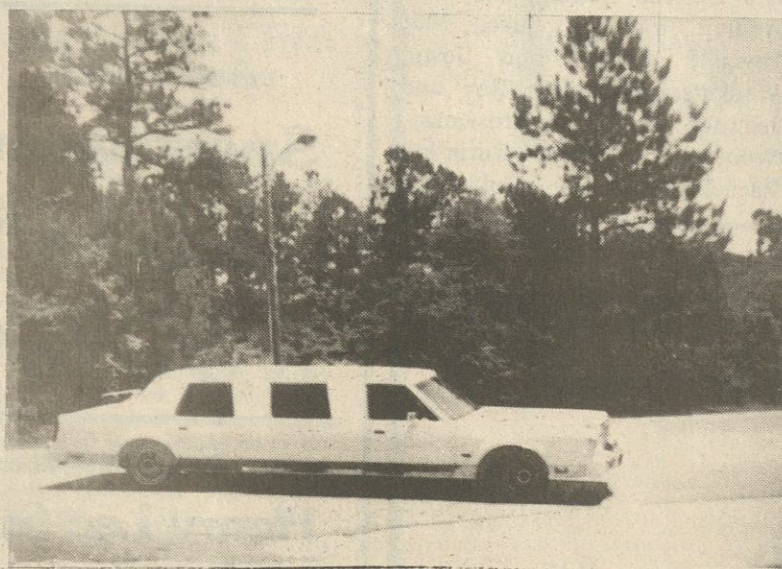

Additional Funds Authorized For Local Livestock Facilities

Representative Jamie Franks was among a group of state legislators and other officials on hand for the recent signing of a new legislation to authorize funding for local livestock facilities in Tishomingo County and other areas.

"Agriculture is vital to our people. This legislation can be very important for Tishomingo county, especially the many young people who would benefit," said Franks, who worked to gain approval of the bill during the 1996 legislative session. Franks, a member of the House Agriculture Committee, represents House District 19 in Lee, Itawamba and Tishomingo counties.

The bill authorizes another \$5 million in bonds for a program originally approved in 1995 to assist counties and municipalities in the construction, renovation or expansion of local livestock facilities. Franks said the new legislation is aimed primarily at helping any county or municipality which either failed to receive a grand last year or got only a portion of the amount requested.

Tishomingo County is expected to receive \$50,000 under the measure.

Home Economics Tips

**CHANGING OWNERSHIP
WHEN DEATH OCCURS**

The death of a loved one or spouse is a very difficult time. Yet, even during this period of grief and emotional readjustments, important financial arrangements must be made. You may need to transfer ownership, change titles of property, or revise documents after a death. Some items to check include:

***Insurance policies.** For policies held by the spouse of the deceased, beneficiaries may need to be changed. Especially for life insurance, you may decide that you no longer need to have the same amount of coverage if you do not have dependents. Automobile insurance and home insurance may also need revision. In the case of a spouse, the deceased may have covered your medical insurance through work. Under federal law, you and any dependent children may be entitled to continue under your spouse's work-related medical insurance plan for up to 36 months, providing you pay the premiums. Or, you may need to purchase your own medical insurance.

***Automobile.** the title of a car owned by the deceased may need to be changed. Contact the State Department of Motor Vehicles to see what you need to do.

***Will.** Your will may have passed property to the deceased, and should be updated. You may want to contact your attorney for assistance.

***Bank accounts, stocks, bonds.** If you had a joint bank account with the deceased, it will automatically pass to you. You should check with the bank representative to change the title and signature card on the account. To change stock or bond titles, check with your stockbroker. If the bank account was held only in the name of the deceased, those assets may have to go through probate.

***Safe deposit box.** In most situations, if the box was rented in only the name of the deceased, it will require a court order to open the box. Only the will or any other materials pertaining to the death can be removed before the will has been probated.

A Class Act At Corinth High



Retiring - After 34 years of teaching at Corinth High School, Dean and Jenny Pearce are calling it quits so they can spend more time with their family - particularly new grandbabies.

Note: this article was written by Jane Clark Summers of the Daily Journal Corinth Bureau and is being shared with our readers.

After more than 34 years in the same school system, educators Dean and Jenny Pearce have a lot to learn about retirement.

Both began working at Corinth High School in 1962 after graduating from Mississippi State University. The popular educators, who will retire at the end of this semester, have left their mark on the school district and on thousands of students who came their way.

Born in adjacent counties in Tishomingo, the daughter of Ledge and Katie Mae Grisham, and he in Itawamba - their lives began paralleling on their first night on campus at Mississippi State University. They met on a blind date. Jenny and her roommate went out with Dean and his roommate. It was a good mix. Both couples ended up marrying.

Dean began teaching in Corinth in January 1962, running the gauntlet of math, physical science and geometry before settling down to physics, chemistry and advanced chemistry.

He and Jenny married in June that year, and Jenny joined the administration in August as the first full-time secretary at Corinth High School. After taking the required number of education courses, she, too, joined the faculty.

Teaching careers

Business education has come a long way in the last 34 years. Jenny began teaching typing on manual typewriters, taught dinosaurs to today's students, who learn keyboarding on computers. But it wasn't technology that convinced Jenny it was time to retire. It was the birth of their daughter Pam and

in-law Scott's child, Henry Groot - the first grandbaby - 10 months ago. The Pearces' son, Stan, and his wife, Melonie, are expecting their first child this summer.

Although they are making a big hit in the bookend, the Pearces are accustomed to living modestly and believe they can make it on their retirement income. Part-time work may have to fill in the gaps.

"I have seen so many

people wait to retire and then don't live long enough to enjoy it," Dean said. They plan to take off at least a year to travel, play with grandbabies and follow Stan's sports career in Corinth.

For the Pearces, life has always centered around church, family and school. "We never had time for much else," he said. That's why, though Dean was tempted to take higher-paying jobs in his field, Jenny convinced him that they could spend more time with their family if they stuck with teaching. "I have no regret and no apologies," he said.

Outstanding teachers

Both teachers have been recognized as outstanding educators. Both have received past Rotary Teacher of the Year awards. Dean will receive his 12th Mississippi Economic Council Star Teacher award this year and is a past recipient of the Jaycees Outstanding Young Educator award.

Perhaps his biggest admirer, Jenny said her husband is a natural born teacher. "Some people are just born to teach and other people work hard and enjoy it and do a reasonable job. This is me," she said.

On the other hand, Jenny applies the gentle touch. She notices the excess baggage that a student brings into the classroom from home and tries to give personal attention to their needs.

Dean enjoys going to school each day, still gets excited and acts like a nut in class, but, he said, it's time to leave. He feels the pull of grandbabies needing to be cuddled, a lawn that has never had any landscaping and a number of "honey-do" projects beckoning.

The paperwork and tasks that go home with teachers probably contributed to Jenny's decision to retire, but the grandchildren were the main reason.

"My mother (Katie Mae Grisham of Iuka) was an elementary teacher for 34 years, and she always said you will know when it's time to get out," Jenny said. "This year it just sort of clicked."

Thousands of students have been impacted by these two Corinth educators, who are teaching their second generation of pupils.

Corinth Superintendent

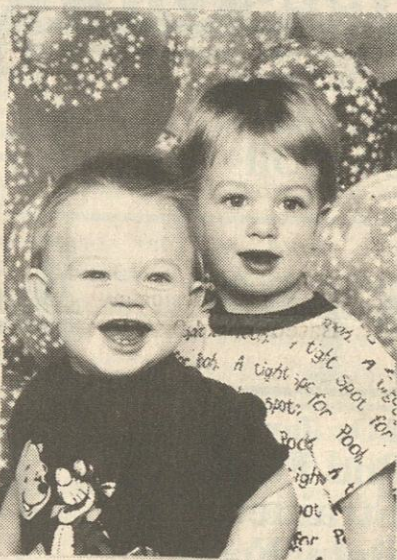
of Education Dr. Wayne Gann said, "I think I have often referred to Dean Pearce as the Bear Bryant of the Corinth school system. Both (Pearces) are legends and have been very effective and heavily involved in all student activities. They will be missed a great deal."

The Pearces are leaving another legacy in the teaching field. Their son is teaching science at Corinth Junior High School in the same room his dad spent some 25 years of his career in. Stan will be head baseball coach next year. Their daughter, Pam, who lives with her family in Wisconsin, is also a teacher.

Lee Spry Marine, 312 Watson Street, Savannah, Tennessee 38372 has submitted an application to the Mississippi Environmental Quality Permit Board for the issuance of a National pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit at its proposed site at 89 County Road 35 in Iuka, Mississippi 38852. The Permit Board will hold a public hearing in this matter Tuesday, July 2, 1996 at 7:00 P.M. in the Crow's Neck Environmental Education Center located at 281 County Road 115, Tishomingo, Mississippi 38873.

The NPDES permit would authorize the discharge of treated stormwater runoff and process wastewater from the washing of boats into Yellow Creek. The applicant's operation is the repairing of boats including hull, electrical, and mechanical repair. The facility site is located in Section 27, Township 1S., Range 10E., Yellow Creek, Tishomingo County. One proposed outfall is described in the application. Outfall 001 is composed of stormwater and boat washing wastewater.

The staff of the Permit Board has evaluated the permit application and believes that, with proper constraints and limitations within the proposed permit, this project will operate within all State and Federal laws and regulations and will protect the public health and the environment. Therefore, the staff of the Board has made a preliminary decision, based on available information, to recommend to the Board that the permit be issued containing numerous regulatory constraints specifically stated in the draft permit. However, before proceeding further, public comments are being solicited. The staff's final recommendations to the Board, as well as the Board's decision, will be made only after a thorough consideration of all public comments.

Persons wishing to make written comments on the staff's preliminary decision are invited to submit their comments to the Office of Pollution Control Industrial Wastewater Control Branch, at the above address no later than close of business on July 2, 1996. All comments received by that date will be part of the official hearing record and considered in the formulation of a final decision in this matter.

The Permit Board is created by Mississippi law for the purpose of issuing or denying, under such conditions and limitations as it may prescribe, environmental protection permits to control or prevent the release of contaminants into the air and water of the State. By law, the Board is composed of the Chief of the Bureau of Environmental Health of the State Department of Health; the Director of the Bureau of Fisheries and Wildlife of the Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks; the Director of the Office of Land and Water Resources of the Department of Environment Quality; the Supervisor of the State Oil and Gas Board; the Director of the Department of Marine Resources; the Director of the Office of Geology of the Department of Environmental Quality; and the Commissioner of Agriculture and Commerce.

The purpose of this hearing is to explain the proposed project and to receive comments from the public regarding the project and particularly the draft permit. Upon arrival at the public hearing, everyone will be asked to register and note if they expect to make a statement. Statements will be received in the order of registration (i.e., first to register will be first to give public comment). However, everyone will be given an opportunity to comment including those who indicated during registration that they did not expect to comment.

Persons commenting will not be limited to any specific time so long as the comments are reasonably concise and relate, at least generally, to the responsibility of the Permit Board. However, because a large number of people often wish to speak, comments should be as brief as possible and can be presented in writing if preferred. In order to help facilitate understanding between citizens and the Permit Board staff, the staff will attempt to answer questions at the hearing. However, such interchanges should be as brief as possible so that everyone who wants to speak has that opportunity as promptly as possible.

All comments made during this public hearing will be transcribed and made a part of the Permit Board file in this matter. Before making any decision, the Board will consider all issues and concerns raised regarding environmental protection. Any interested party aggrieved by the decision of the Permit Board may file a written request for a formal hearing before the Board. The Board will then hold a formal hearing, after which the Permit board will make its final decision in the matter and any person aggrieved by that decision may appeal to the Chancery Court in the county of the proposed project.

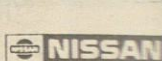
