A former Iuka woman was dilled Sunday night when the notorcycle on which she was a assenger collided with a car on a ural highway in Arkansas.

According to the Arkansas state Police, at approximately 30 Sunday night, July 21, 1996, motorcycle driven by Clarence Ray Heavener, Jr. of Memphis, was attempting to make a left turn nto Highway 147 near Horseshoe lake, in Crittenben County, Arkansas when a 1990 Cadillac collided with the motorcycle. Tina Hardwick, formerly of Iuka, was a passenger on the motorcycle and was pronounced dead on the scene to by Crittenben County Deputy Coroner Joe Wilson.

Heavener, also formerly of he area, was taken by airlift to the Vhy Ivis Presley Trauma Center in lemphis with serious injuries, ccording to the Arkansas State olice.

Shoals Man Leads Deputy On High Speed Chase On Natchez Trace by Pamela McRae

A Muscle Shoals man is in custody in the Tishomingo County Jail after leading the Chief Deputy and a Natchez Trace Park Ranger on a high speed chase on the Trace and Highway 25 Monday afternoon.

Tishomingo County Chief Deputy Neil Edmondson said Mark Renegar, 41, of Muscle Shoals was pursued by a Natchez Trace Park Ranger when seen driving on the Trace. Florence The Police Department had issued a lookout for the car because they had charges on Renegar for prescription drug forgery.

Renegar failed to stop for the ranger, and led him down the Trace into Tishomingo County.

"That was where he went wrong, he never should have come into Tishomingo County," said Edmondson.

Edmondson joined the pursuit and attempted to bring Renegar to a "rolling stop" by blocking one lane of traffic, but on two attempts Renegar tried to run Edmondson off the road and eluded capture.

The chase continued off the Trace onto Highway 25, where he was eventually stopped just north of Belmont.

Edmondson said the chase reached speeds of 120 mph in a 50 mph zone at some points.

Prosser Company Celebrates Grand Opening of New Assembly Facility at Yellow Creek Port

The Prosser Company, an international modular construction company, celebrated the grand opening of its new modular assembly facility at Yellow Creek Port last Friday.


A crowd of more than 70 attended the reception at the newly completed facility at the port on the Tennessee-Tombigbee

Waterway north of Iuka, and were then treated to an afternoon cruise on the river to tour the scenic area.

Local businessmen and government leaders toured the facility, which consists of a large assembly area with ceilings of more than 40 feet, and several offices for engineering, administrative and management personnel.

At the facility, the crowd was treated to snacks and heard from Joe Prosser, one of two secondgeneration Prosser brothers that run the company their father and uncle formed in 1960. Both founders, as well as several other family members were present.

Joe Prosser explained that Prosser builds modular chemical plants, and went on to explain that modular construction is simply building a process plant somewhere other than its final destination. He explained that they use an indoor assembly-line type concept and erect the various components of a process plant for on-site testing, then take it back apart, and ship the components to the final destination for permanent installation on a site that has been prepared at the same time the plant is being constructed, which greatly reduces the whole construction schedule. By building indoors, the company is able to eliminate many variables, like weather delays, which traditionally add risk and uncertainty to construction projects. The benefits of having this site, second brother Jim Prosser said in his address, is that they can utilize both barges on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway and railcars on the rail spur that comes into the port area to transport the large components. "The people here have a good work ethic and are good at working," Jim Prosser said of the local workforce, which played a big part in the location choice. A prepared release said that during the balance of 1996 Prosser expects to employ more than 50 workers continuously. The nature of modular plant construction is one of variable demand, which means that sometimes the shop will be very busy and sometimes the shop will be slow. State Representative Ricky Cummings was on hand to welcome the new company, and the Prossers said that he and several others had been helpful in getting the Prosser Company located here. Prosser literature states that they have more than 3,500 installations in 19 different countries, from a \$10,000 fertilizer blender in New Jersey to a \$40 million, five-plant complex in South America.

Report From Congress By: U.S. Rep. Roger F. Wicker **House Passes Historic Welfare Reform Package: Bill Places Emphasis On Work, Personal** Responsibility

The house of Representatives has passed historic legislation that replaces the federal government's failed welfare system with a program that stresses the work ethic and encourages personal responsibility.

The original purpose of welfare was to provide a temporary helping hand to individuals and families experiencing financial hard times. But over the past 30 years, the program has evolved into a way of life for millions, trapping them in a system that offers little hope for escape or opportunity to share in the American dream.

This welfare reform bill is built on five strong pillars, but the centerpiece of the plan is a solid emphasis on work. For the first time ever, able-bodied welfare recipients will be required to work for their benefits. Adults receiving welfare must work within two years or lose benefits, and lifetime benefits will be limited to five vears

States would be required to have at least 50 percent of their welfare recipients working by the year 2002. According to the Congressional Budget Office, 1.3 million people would be moved onto the tax rolls and off the

What You Need To Know About...Canine Cough

Canine cough is a highly contagious infectious disease of the upper respiratory tract of the dog. Also termed infectious canine tracheobronchitis, this disease is caused primarily by the bacterium, Bordetella bronchiseptica, and the canine parainfluenza virus. Like the common cold in humans, the organisms that cause canine cough are spread through coughing and sneezing. Your dog can catch the disease simply by being in close proximity to an infected dog. Training kennels, humane societies, pet shops, boarding kennels, dog shows, veterinary hospitals, grooming salons or your local park are just some of the places where your dog may come in contact with this debilitating disease.


Initially the infective organisms colonize and irritate the lining of the upper respiratory tract. Coughing, sneezing and retching, often accompanied by a nasal discharge are the common clinical signs of canine cough. The cough is usually described as a deep, hacking cough and can be quite persistent, many times keeping both you and your dog awake all night. In some cases, dogs may run a fever, have a decreased appetite, and demonstrate signs of depression. Slats and Sissy

A statement last summer by my late uncle, Fletcher Oaks, kindled a desire for me to learn more about former Olympic hurdler Glen "Slats" Hardin.

You wouldn't have any trouble finding out about him. He was one beautiful athlete," my uncle said of Hardin.

The quote came when I interviewed my uncle about the Mississippi high school state track meet in 1930, a year when my father had run in the meet for Tishomingo Agricultural High School.

Although I did not know about Hardin before talking with Uncle Fletcher, I have learned a lot since

Hardin, from the heart of the Delta, was a junior at Greenwood High School in 1930 when he entered three individual events at the state meet, the quarter-mile, half-mile and 220-yard hurdles.

He won them all.

"Slats Hardin, Greenwood, broke three records and was high point man," the Jackson Daily Clarion-Ledger reported on May 4, 1930. "The tall blonde boy ran the 220-yard hurdles in 25 flat. The old record was 25.6. He stepped the quarter-mile in 50 and the halfmile in 1:59, clipping 5 seconds off the latter record.

The two-day state meet was held on the A & M College (Mississippi State) track. My uncle was a student at State that year, but had missed the first day of competition, a day when Dad had been among those handily beaten by Hardin in the half-mile, but a very close second to another Delta area runner, Mony Helms, in his mile race.

Uncle Fletcher witnessed the second day of competition, the day Hardin won his third race, the quarter-mile.

"He (Hardin) was a tall,

lanky, long-legged boy," Uncle Fletcher said.

"There was a boy I went to school with at Progress (a high school in south Mississippi), Jack Burnett. Jack had won the 100yard and the 220. Hardin had won the hurdles and the half-mile. So these two men were both running the quarter on the second day.

"When they got on the line, Jack had to make a "to-do" about it. He had to turn around and shake hands with Hardin before the race because of his long legs."

"He wasn't just good in track. He was a half-back on our 1930 state championship football team. I saw every game that year. Once Slats turned the corner around the end, there was no stopping him. We won every game that year and only had six points scored on us.

"Two players from that team had outstanding college careers. One was Riley Smith who became an All-American at Alabama, and the other was George Pillow, one of the few men to letter in four

sports at Mississippi State.

"Slats went to LSU thinking he would run track and play football, but when they saw how good he was in track, they made him stick to that."

In the late '20s and early '30s, LSU dominated the old Southern Conference in track, so it was a logical choice of shcools for Hardin

"I only saw Slats one time after he left Grrenwood for LSU," Paul Thomas, another member of the Greenwood High's undefeated '30 football team said. "He tried to help me get a football scholarship to LSU, but I was just too small for college ball.

"I sure remember some good times with him when he was in high school. He was two years ahead of me, but I ran on our mile relay team with him. His senior year we were the best in the state, and made a trip to Atlanta to run in the Southern Relays.

"There are not many of us left from that 1930 team," the 84-yearold pulling guard concluded.

While Hardin was at LSU he won four NCAA individual titles, the 440 yards in '33 and '34 and the 220-yards low hurdles in the same two years. His senior year at LSU, '35, he finished second in the hurdles at the NCAA championships to an Ohio State runner who was one year away from everlasting fame. That runner was Jesse Owens.

Perhaps the most memorable college year for Hardin was 1933. After winning the first SEC meet by a wide margin, LSU coach Bernie Moore took five men to the NCAA meet where they proceeded to upset heavily-favored Southern California for the team title. In addition to Hardin'stwo wins, Jack Torrance won the shot put and was third in the discus; Matt Gordy won the pole vault; Al Moreau took second in the 120-yard high hurdles; and Buddy Blair placed

doubtful that even his most optimistic supporters expected that in less than a year he would set a world record for the 400 meter hurdles.

Even though Hardin could have contributed significantly to the Tiger's track team in the spring of '32 college freshmen were not eligible in those days. Not that LSU needed any help. They won the last Southern conference meet in Atlanta that year by a confortable margin.

But with the Olympics in Los Angeles that summer, Hardin had another goal that did not exclude freshmen.

In high school his best events had been the quarter-mile and the 220-yard hurdles. Although he had never competed in the 400 meter hurdles until the summer of '32, he began a series of races to attempt to qualify for the U.S. Olympic team in that event. He was a natural for

hurdle race in 54.0 in New Orleans on June 4. Next, at the Central semi-final tryout in Chicago, he improved to 53.4. After reaching

the finals through two heat races in the Olympic Trials at Stanford on July 15-16, he won to make the U.S. Olympic team in only his fifth hurdle race at this distance. The Olympics followed in Los Angeles in two weeks.

There were two major obstacles to the success of the 1932 Olympics: the Depression and the geographic isolation of California. This was the first time since 1904 that the Olympics were held outside of Europe. The participation by European teams was low. To try to cut team cost, the Olympic Village concept was first used.

One positive factor was the new track in the Los Angeles Coliseum. It was fast. By then, Hardin was comfortable with the longer hurdle event. He advanced through the heats to the final, a race noted for it unusual results.

Robert Tisdall of Ireland won the race with Hardin second, and both runners bettered the world record. However, Tisdall knocked down the last hurdle and the rules at that time did not allow his time to be official. Therefore, Hardin's second place time of 52.0 was accepted as the new world record.

The LSU freshman, less than a year off the Mississippi cotton fields, went back to Baton Rouge that summer with an Olympic silver medal and a world record.

In the next four years he never lost another 400 meter hurdle race. In addition to helping LSU

staggered start. In the third 100 meters, Hardin surged and passed the fading Patterson and entered the final straight one meter ahead of John Loaring of Canada. Hardin held his lead over the final hurdles to add a gold medal to his Olympic collection.

Between the silver and gold medals -- specifically, in the fall of '35 -- Hardin discovered a more precious treasure.

Charles Riddle, a state legislator from Marksville, brought his daughter Margaret, then a student at Louisianna Tech, to Baton Rouge to attend summer school at LSU during a summer legislative session.

Margaret had so much fun that summer that she decided to finish college at LSU. That fall she and Hardin met at a fraternity dance. He, the tall Olympic medalist in a white suit, and she, the LSU beauty on campus for her He won his first 400 meter senior year, made a story-book. couple. He asked her to dance, and.

"Slats didn't finish college at LSU," Mrs. Hardin said from her home in Baton Rouge. "That was during the depression and I guess he wanted to make some money so we could get married."

Remember that Olympic running meant pure amateurism in those days, so even with a gold medal there wasn't any income or support associated with running track after college.

Hardin and some other stars from the '36 Olympics stayed in

New York after returning from the Games and a tour of Europe. They tried to organize a professional track circuit, but it didn't prosper.

"He tried a few other things while he lived in New York that winter," his daughter said. "We have a picture of him on a billboard on Broadway advertising, of all things, Camel cigarettes. He also auditioned for the part of Ashley Wilkes for the movie of Gone With The Wind. They told him that he had too much of a southern accent."

In February, 1937, Margaret took a train to Washinton and Slats came down from New York. They married at a chapel in D.C. It was a simple wedding, but one that would last.

Later the couple settled in Baton Rouge where Hardin worked for the Ethel Corporation and his wife taught high school history. In the late '60s he began to travel for the State, overseeing voting machines. This job allowed him to visit throughout Louisianna and see people who knew him from his

"Now Jack ran a good race, but he was no match for Glenn Hardin. He (Burnett) had to run hard. Glenn Hardin was just loping out there - that was the easiest looking stride - just like a deer running."

Since learning about Hardin from my uncle, I had been curious about the origin of the nickname, "Slats". This week I learned the answer from one of Hardin's school mates, Tabb Johnston, who still lives in Greenwood. Johnston was two years behind Hardin at Greenwood High, and fondly recalls his affable schoolmate.

"Slats' Daddy was a farmer, so they lived out of town," the 82year-old retired Coca Cola manager said. "They were not poor, but they had to work hard for a living.'

"He had the nickname "Slats' before he came to high school in Greenwood. They called him that

fourth in the javelin.

Neither Mississippi State nor Ole Miss was happy when Hardin chose LSU over the two state schools.

"Daddy once told me about the steak dinner the LSU coaches bought him when they visited Greenwood," Hardin's daughter Linda Caston said. "He said he knew after that meal that he was going to LSU, and he was determined to run hard once he got there. He said he didn't want to ever pick cotton again."

When Hardin left his father's farm outside Greenwood in the fall of 1931 to join Bernie Moore's LSU Tiger thinly clads, he had become one of Mississippi's greatest high school track performers in state history. But as wide as this 21-year-old's rnning reputation was in the South, it is win the NCAA track title in '33, and SEC crowns in '33, '34, and '35, he lowered his world record to 50.6 at a meet in Stockholm in the summer of 1934. (That record stood for 19 years before it was lowered to 50.4 by Yuri Lituyev of Russia in 1953.)

After practically laying out of hurdles a year, he qualified for his second Olympic team at the trials in Randall's Island, N.Y., in 1936.

If Jesse Owens was a "resonable bet" to win his three individual events, the 100, 200 and

long jump, at the '36 Olympics in Berlin, Slats Hardin was close to a "sure thing" for a gold in the 400 hurdles.

He did not disappoint.

In the 400 hurdle final of six runners, Hardin drew the outside lane. U.S. teammate Joe Patterson, running from the inside lane, went out so fast that he was actually ahead of Hardin by the half-way point despite the difference in the

running days at LSU.

"Daddy really loved that job," his daughter said. "He was a 'people person', and it suited his personality completely."

Hardin died from a massive heart attack in 1975, just months before his planned retirement.

His second oldest son, Billy, was also a NCAA champion hurdler for LSU in the early '60s and made the U.S. Olympic team in '64 in his Dad's event, the 400 meter hurdles.

"Slats was so proud of Billy when he ran in the Olympics in Tokyo that year," Mrs. Hardin said. "Even though he lives in Dallas now, Billy was selected as one of the torch bearers here a few weeks ago when it came through Baton Rouge.

"Slats's Olympic medals are on display in the Louisiana Archives here in Baton Rouge.

"By the way, if you use my name, nobody will know me as. Margaret," Mrs. Hardin cautioned. "Most people call me Sis."

Then she spoke quitely,

almost as if whispering a secret. "But Slats always called me. Sissy."
