Roofing Needs and New Belmont Cafeteria Top List of Planned Improvements for Schools

Long range plans are being made for needed improvements in Tishomingo County school facilities, said Dr. Carl Weeden, superintendent for the district.

More than 3,200 children started school Monday in Tishomingo County Schools, which puts enrollment a bit higher than last year, said Dr. Weeden.

"We got off to a real good start," said Dr. Weeden, "and we are looking forward to a great year."

But the time has come for some repairs and maintenance on our aging school buildings, Weeden reported.

To accomplish that, the district is in the process of applying for funds from the Mississippi State Department of Education and also publishing this week their resolution to raise funds by enacting a millage levy.

The millage levy is projected to raise \$1,105,200 over the next eight years. Weeden estimated that this would cost a \$50,000 property owner about \$15 more a year, or for a \$25,000 property owner about \$7.50 a year.

Along with the millage, they are applying for \$350,000 from the state department of education Public School Building Fund, said Weeden.

Facility problems at almost every campus in the county will take up much of the money. The entire facility at Burnsville School needs a new roof, and Tishomingo Elementary, Belmont, Iuka

Middle School, and the Vo-Tech all need extensive roofing repairs.

An addition to Belmont School (where the elementary, middle school and high school are all together) is another high-dollar item. The school board has

been meeting with an architect on plans for a new cafeteria facility, which is desperately needed for the 904 students plus faculty and staff that eat

there each day, according to Dr. Weeden.

"Each school submitted a prioritized list of needs," said Weeden. "And we are combining them in a long-range plan."

Other projects on the list are:

Tishomingo County High School: Improvements in auditorium floor lighting, finishing the track, and building a canopy down to the student parking lot, which is about 100 yards from the building.

A central office for the school board. Weeden said there is a need for more personnel office space, and storage space, especially a vault for record storage, as is standard in other districts.

Restroom renovations. At Burnsville, Weeden said, the restroom piping is "literally worn out". Iuka Elementary also needs restroom improvements.

Dr. Weeden summed up the situation by saying, "We are trying to tie all the needs into a long range plan that will make sense and be for the good of the children."

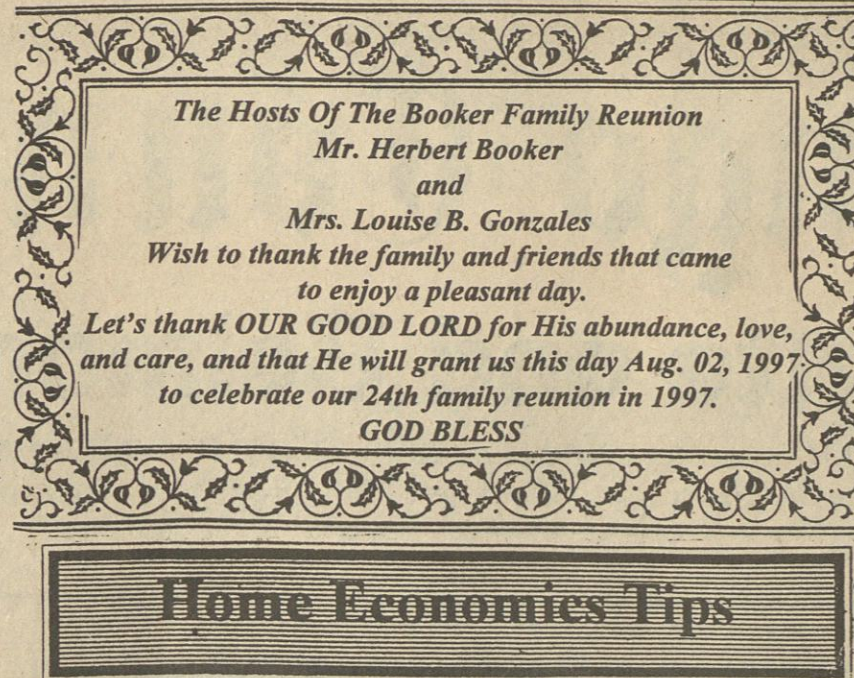

**IMPROVE WATER HABITS:
WASTE NOT, WANT NOT**

Do you ignore dripping faucets, let the water run while you brush your teeth, or run a half-filled dishwasher? Most of us take for granted an abundant supply of good fresh water.

We meet our daily needs when we turn on the faucet and get seemingly unlimited water. However, in recent years, it has become more evident that the situation is changing with constant new demands on our water supply.

In the past 30 years, the United States' demand for water has grown faster than our ability to find new resources. In 1939, the minimum daily amount of water needed per person was 20 gallons. Today, the typical consumer uses 60 to 110 gallons daily.

This increased consumption of water is the result of higher standards of cleanliness and sanitation, labor-saving appliances and equipment, and a greater emphasis on outdoor living. Unfortunately, this lifestyle developed during a time of plentiful, cheap water when the prevention of waste and inefficient use of water was given little thought.

For example, Americans flush more than 5 billion gallons of water down the toilet everyday. That's about 3 1/2 billion gallons more than is actually needed for effective flushing. We use 3 billion gallons per day to shower - about 1 1/2 billion gallons more than is needed.

Until just recently, there was little incentive to change the way we live and use water. Today, things are a bit different. The cost of providing more water and of protecting supplies from pollution is forcing us to examine and adjust

our use of water in the home.

Water conservation in the home provides benefits for the community, the environment and the individual consumer. Conservative use lessens the pressure on existing water systems and waste-water facilities. Water conservation helps control pollution and diminishing water levels.

Water conservation reduces energy, water and sewer bills as well as the need for costly new supply and waste-water facilities. It can extend the useful life of septic systems.

Cool Season Forages

If you get through the summer and you think that you may be short on hay, now would be a good time to start planning on cool season grazing with something like fescue, ryegrass, legumes, or mixtures. The first step is to determine the fertilizer and lime requirements by taking a good random soil sample. Lime

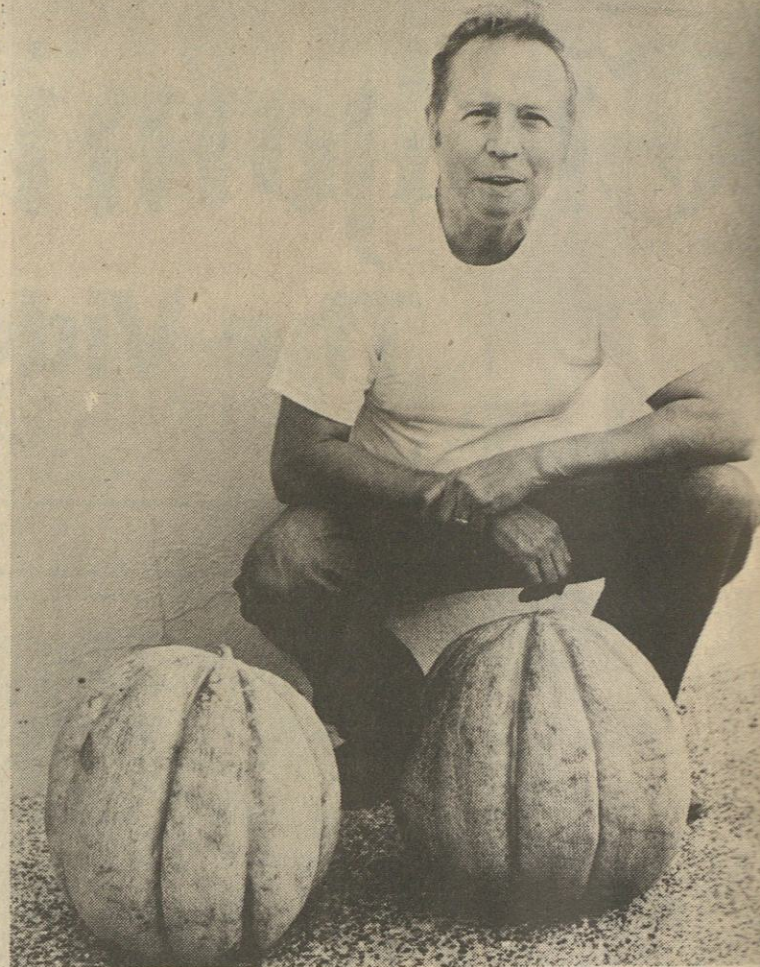

needs to be applied as soon as possible to allow time for the pH to adjust as much as possible before planting this fall. Use quality seed and plant at the proper time. We have an information sheet that shows varieties, planting dates and rates. Call or stop by and pick one up. Tilled seedbeds should be relatively firm after lime and fertilizer is applied especially for small seeded forages like the clovers. If a large amount of weeds have been tilled into the soil, allow enough time for decay since this will harbor insects and can tie up plant nutrients. Fields should be smoothed so that harvest will be more efficient and equipment damage is held to a minimum in future years. For more information contact the Extension Office at 423-7016.

Soybean Diseases

Because of weather conditions, diseases are beginning to show up in some fields. Proper identification of the disease is important. There is no treatment for all diseases. Fungicides are effective against some fungus-borne diseases. These fungicides

are expensive and the decision to use them should be carefully thought about. Specialists at Mississippi State have developed a point system to help determine whether to spray or not. This is based on yield potential, maturity date, rainfall, field history, etc. Consider looking at this point system before making a decision.

DRUGS CAN AFFECT VISION

People who take drugs for common health problems - and that's most everyone - need to be alert for changes in their eyes or vision. Most people don't know that a lot of over-the-counter and prescription drugs we take for common problems for headaches, flu, depression or high blood pressure have eye-related side effects.

Common visual side effects of drugs include blurred or double vision; dry eyes or excessive tearing; poor night vision; light sensitivity; puffy or droopy eyelids; changes in color vision; and enlarged pupils. Types of drugs that produce such side effects are analgesics, antacids, anti-anxiety, antibiotics, anticoagulants, diuretics, corticosteroids and many others.

Let your optometrist know what drugs you are taking. If a drug or a combination of drugs is causing problems with your eyes or vision, he or she can consult with your physician who may be able to relieve the symptoms with a change in dosage or medication.

ought to be stressing that America is one nation, one people, with one official language.

For example, 375 voting districts in 21 states are now required to provide voting ballots and election materials in foreign

languages. Besides federal mandates in election matters, Washington-based policies require bilingual education in some parts in the country. In New York schools, 115 different languages are spoken. As a result of this and other policies, it has been estimated that 20 million Americans well be considered "non-proficient" in the English language by the year 2050.

More than 320 languages are spoken in the United States. By encouraging multi-language policies, the government undercuts in incentive for non-English speaking citizens to learn English. Without English, they can never fully participate in the economic, social and political opportunities that exist in American society.

The bill does not prohibit, or in any way inhibit, the use of foreign languages in any non-official capacity, including homes, churches or neighborhood activities. The bill certainly does not prevent the teaching of foreign languages, and there are common-sense exemptions for public health and safety purposes.

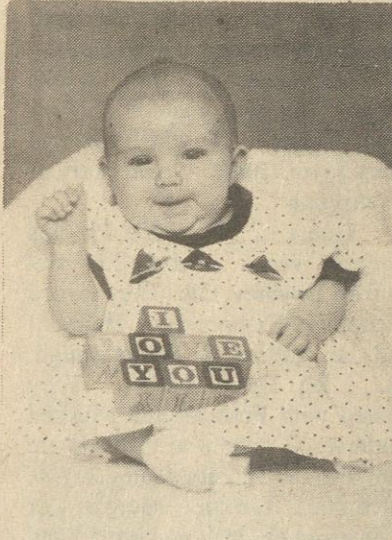
Passage of this bill is important to reaffirm the fact that while America is a nation of immigrants, we should be united by one single language.

House Bill Declares English Official Language; Requires Official Business To Be Conducted Only In English

If you assembled a group of people in any city in Mississippi and asked whether English should be the official language of the United States, the overwhelming response - - perhaps the unanimous response - - would be "yes."

That is also the sentiment of a majority in the House of Representatives, which voted August 1 to declare English our official language and require that the federal government conduct its official business in English.


English is a common thread that allows Americans from all walks of life and all cultures to

communicate. Over the history of our country, immigrants who have quickly mastered English have become productive members of American society. The federal government ought to be reinforcing that fact in the conduct of its official business.

Opponents say this legislation is not necessary and that it is a "Mean-spirited" attempt to deprive millions of people of their cultural heritage. A mastery of English opens the door of economic opportunity and a more prosperous future for non-English speaking citizens and their families.

There is much evidence to suggest a disturbing and growing trend toward multilingualism in many parts of the country today. Federal government actions have encouraged that trend, when we



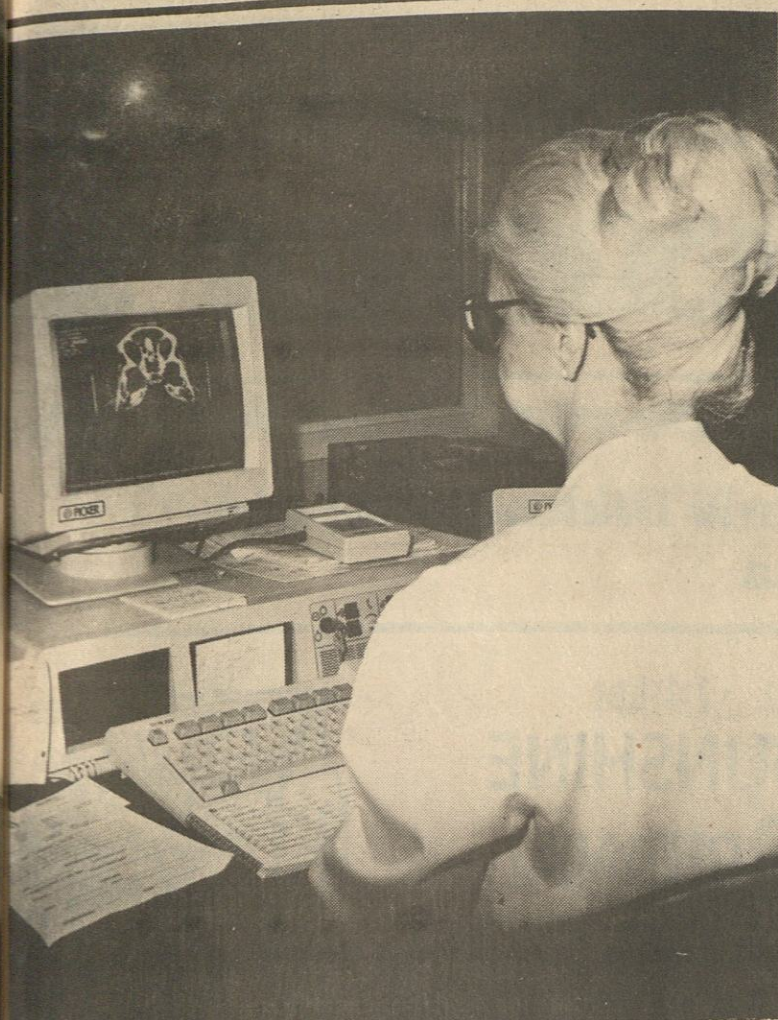

New Technology at Iuka Hospital Allows for On-Site Diagnosis by On-Line Review by Radiologist

The information superhighway has another entrance ramp in Iuka, and this one will allow our local hospital to diagnose and treat patients that previously would have been sent to larger medical centers.

The radiology department at Iuka Hospital has new Image On Call teleradiography equipment that will enable technicians and doctors at Iuka to send, via phone lines, computer images of a CT scan straight to Helen Keller Hospital or a radiologist's home for diagnoses anytime the radiologist is not present at the hospital.

"This gives us the opportunity to treat patients faster, and more efficiently than in the past," said Dr. Merwyn Crandall, the radiologist at Iuka Hospital.

Iuka Hospital's radiology manager Elmer Hunt, R.T., gave an example of how the new computer connection would work.

An accident victim brought to the hospital at 11 p.m. on a Friday night who needs a CT

(CAT) scan of his neck or spine to see what treatment is necessary. They perform a CT scan at Iuka, and the image that the hospital radiologist (who usually works regular business hours at Iuka) would read is sent by a computer modem to the radiologist's home, or the emergency room or radiology department at Helen Keller Hospital in Sheffield, Alabama. In about 25 minutes, Iuka hears by phone from the radiologist on what action is necessary.

"The biggest benefit is in an emergency situation," said Iuka's Chief of Staff Dr. Scott Segars. "We can have an expert read [the scan] and that may allow the patient to stay in Iuka for treatment, rather than spend critical time

traveling to Tupelo or the Shoals to be told that everything is okay."

Hunt said that the images can be sent anywhere, to any neurosurgeon, or specialist in the country or world, who is on the Image On Call system. This is a growing trend in rural hospitals which allows patients in smaller towns and rural areas to be treated with the same expertise as

someone in a city with many specialists.

Eventually, the system will allow for second opinions or diagnoses from specialists anywhere in the world on ultrasounds or nuclear medicine cases, said Hunt.

Iuka Guaranty Bank Offers Child Safety Service

Iuka Guaranty Bank is offering ID Network Safety Service free of charge to it TRADITION members. ID Network Safety Service is a nationwide child identification network that can fax descriptions and high-resolution photos of missing children anywhere in the country within minutes.

"It's designed specifically to save valuable time in a missing-child emergency," explains Betty Young, TRADITION program coordinator at Iuka Guaranty Bank.

Both parent and child receive

photo ID cards. The photo is digitized, loaded into the fast-access network and coded with a member number. In the event a child is missing, the parent can call a toll-free number to have the child's photo and description quickly distributed.

The system is highly secure and totally confidential according to Betty. The photo and description on the cards are embedded in a single sheet before lamination. Only the parent card contains the child's physical description, medical conditions and distinguishing marks. The child's card is a simple ID, with photo, name and birth date. The toll-free network number is printed on the card along with the member number registered to the child.

"Every step of the process is under scrupulous security," says Betty.

"We shoot the ID photos and complete the enrollments here at the bank. Only authorized personnel at the network headquarters have access to the database where images and information are stored."

"And the clarity of the faxed photos is amazing," Betty adds. "Because the photos are digitized,

the faxed image is crystal clear. It can even be photocopied.

Persons interested in the ID Network Safety Service can call Iuka Guaranty Bank at 601-423-7100.

"We're not limiting this benefit to children," Betty says. "Any adult at risk because of mental or physical condition may be registered on the network."

RESOLUTION OF INTENT AND NECESSITY
TISHOMINGO COUNTY SPECIAL MUNICIPAL SEPARATE SCHOOL DISTRICT
The Board of Education of the Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District, Iuka, Mississippi, took up for consideration the matter of the borrowing of money and the issuance of notes therefor in the maximum principal amount of One Million, One Hundred Five Thousand, Two Hundred Dollars (\$1,105,200). After discussion of the subject, Board Member Harold Sparks offered to move the adoption of the following resolution:
RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE TISHOMINGO COUNTY SPECIAL MUNICIPAL SEPARATE SCHOOL DISTRICT DECLARING THE NECESSITY FOR AND ITS INTENTION OF BORROWING MONEY FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING THE COSTS OF ACQUIRING, ERECTING, IMPROVING, CONSTRUCTING, REPAIRING AND EQUIPPING SCHOOL BUILDINGS AND RELATED FACILITIES, AND TO PAY THE COSTS OF SUCH BORROWING; ORDERING SAID RESOLUTION TO BE PUBLISHED; AND SETTING THE DATE UPON WHICH THE BOARD OF EDUCATION IS TO TAKE FINAL ACTION UPON THE QUESTION OF AUTHORIZING THE BORROWING OF SAID MONEY.

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the Tishomingo County Municipal Separate School District, Iuka, Mississippi (the "Board"), acting for and on behalf of the Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District (the "District"), does hereby find, determine, adjudicate and declare that:
1. It is necessary and desirable that a maximum of One Million, one Hundred Five Thousand, Two Hundred Dollars (\$1,105,200) be borrowed for the purposes of acquiring, erecting, improving, constructing, repairing and equipping school buildings and related facilities, and paying the costs of such borrowing (the "Project");
2. The District is planning to apply, to the State Board of Education, for a grant from the state public school building fund to fund some of the construction for the Project; however, at this time no funds are available in the school funds of the District or from any other source with which to pay the costs of the Project;
3. It would be in the best interest and to the advantage of the District that the funds needed for the Project be obtained by the issuance of notes of the District in the maximum principal amount of One Million, One Hundred Five Thousand, Two Hundred Dollars (\$1,105, 200) (the "Notes") in the manner and form provided by Section 37-59-101, et seq. of the Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended (the "Act");
4. An annual levy of a special tax which should not exceed three (3) mills on the dollar of assessed value of taxable property within the District shall be sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the Notes to

be issued hereunder and all other Notes issued and outstanding under the Act, as the same shall respectively mature and accrue. The District currently has no outstanding notes previously issued under the Act;
5. Under the provisions of Section 37-59-115 of the Act, the limitation of Section 37-59-5 of the Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended, on the indebtedness which may be incurred by school districts, is not applicable to the proposed issuance of the Notes;
6. The purpose for which the proposed Notes are to be issued is herein set forth in the Resolution for purposes authorized by the laws of the State of Mississippi, and particularly in Section 37-59-101. et seq. of the Act, and that said Board is authorized and required to declare the necessity and its intention of borrowing money and issuing the Notes of the District as evidence of the same; and
7. Pending the completion of the Project plans and specifications of the issuance of the Notes, the District needs to pay certain expenses incurred in connection with the performance of the Project, with such expenditures to be reimbursed from the proceeds of the Notes, when issued.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Education of the Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District, as follows:
Section 1. The Board does hereby find, determine and adjudicate that the foregoing premises are true and correct.
Section 2. The Board does hereby declare that it is necessary to borrow an amount not exceeding One Million, One Hundred Five Thousand, Two Hundred Dollars (\$1,105,200) for the purpose of paying the costs of the Project, previously described herein, all at a total cost approximately equal to the principal amount of the Notes to be issued hereunder.
Section 3. The Board does hereby further declare that at this time no funds are available in the school funds of the District or from any other source with which to pay the costs of the Project, and that it is necessary that the costs hereof be borrowed in the manner and form provided by Section 37-59-101, et seq., of the Act.
Section 4. The Board hereby declared its intention to borrow such money and to issue the Notes as evidence of the same. The Notes shall bear interest at a rate to be specified by further resolution of the Board, but shall not exceed a greater overall maximum interest rate to maturity than the rates now or hereafter authorized under the provisions of Section 19-9-19 of the Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended. The Notes shall not be sold for less than par and accrued interest. The Note shall be dated September 1, 1996, or such later date as the Board may specify, and shall mature over a period not to exceed ten(10) years, with the first installment of the principal and/or interest thereon to be made within one year from the date thereof.
Section 5. Unless a petition signed by twenty percent (20%) of the qualified electors of said District, requesting that an election be called on the question of incurring said indebtedness, is filed prior to 5:30 p.m. on August 30, 1996, in the office of the Superintendent of the District, located at 507 West Quitman, Iuka, Mississippi, final approval of the borrowing of said money and authority for the issuance of said Notes shall be given by the Board at a special meeting held on such date at 5:30 p.m. at the Board's regular meeting place located at 507 West Quitman, Iuka, Mississippi.
Section 6. The secretary of the Board be and is hereby authorized and directed to cause this Resolution, as adopted, to be published in the Tishomingo County News, a newspaper of general circulation in the District and qualified under the provisions of Section 13-3-31 of the Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended. Said Resolution shall be published once a week for two (2) consecutive weeks, with the first publication thereof to be made not less than fifteen (15) days prior to August 30, 1996, on which date the Board will take final action on the question of authorizing the borrowing of said money.
Section 7. The District may use funds currently available in its general fund to pay initial costs of the acquisition and construction of the Project, as subsequently identified by the Board, with such expenditures to be reimbursed from a portion of the proceeds of the Notes, when issued. The allocation of the Notes proceeds to reimburse the general fund shall be made in writing not later than eighteen (18) months after the later of:
(a) the date the original expenditure is paid or
(b) the date the Project is placed in service or abandoned, but no event more than three (3) years after the original expenditure is paid.

The expenditures to be reimbursed from the Notes proceeds shall be incurred solely to acquire, renovate, construct, or improve property, having a reasonable expected economic life of at least one year and to pay the costs of such acquisition, construction and improvements. The Notes proceeds shall be used to reimburse these expenditures, and not for the reimbursement of operating costs or similar working capital items. This Resolution is the official action of the Board adopted as required by regulations promulgated by the Internal Revenue Service governing the reimbursement of prior expenses from bond proceeds.
Section 8. All orders, resolutions or proceedings of the Board in conflict with the provisions of this Resolution shall be and the same are hereby repealed.

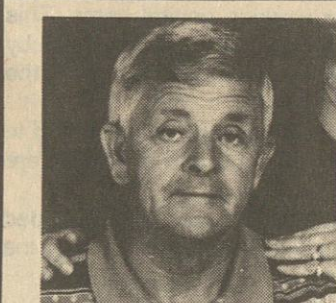

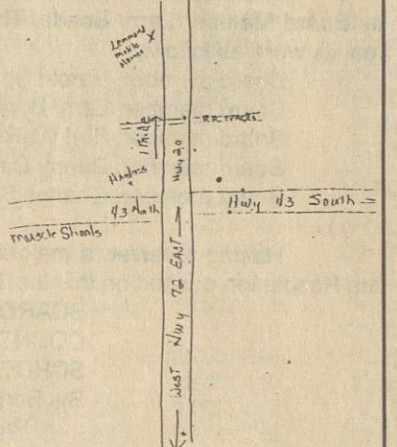

Fall Gardens Can Yield Best Crops

By: Norman Winter

Most Mississippians probably think spring is the best time for gardening. But if you have not tried a fall garden, you probably are missing the best garden you could have.

Fall-grown produce ripens in a cooler, less stressful time of the season and suffers less from sunburn or sunscald. There also are fewer insects and diseases in the fall.

One way to figure out when to plant is to count backwards from the usual first freeze date. Estimate how many days are from planting the seed until first harvest - usually something like 60 days. Plants may produce for 30 to 60 days. So plant crops that can't handle frost now. For crops like broccoli, cauliflower, lettuce and spinach, we can procrastinate a little longer.

One problem faced by many Mississippi gardeners is getting the seed planted during the heat of the summer to come up. This is especially true for cold hardy vegetables. Some of these germinate poorly when the soil temperature is high.

To help seeds germinate, prepare a bed or ridge for planting. After preparing the soil and marking the rows, use a hoe handle or stick to make a seed furrow - usually about 1 inch deep.

Water the seed furrow before planting. Water the loosened soil to a depth of 4 to 6 inches. After the water has soaked in, scatter the seeds evenly in the furrow.

After planting, do not cover the seeds with garden soil. Use a material like compost, potting soil or peat moss for covering. This will provide a better environment for the seeds to germinate and prevent soil crusting.

After the seeds emerge, consider using something like cardboard on the west side of the row to shade the plants from the intense afternoon heat. This is also a good idea for transplants of tomatoes, peppers or cole crops.

Thinning the extra seedlings seems wasteful to many gardeners, especially new gardeners. However, when the majority of seeds germinate and the seedlings survive, the plants become crowded. Leaving the plants spaced to closely reduces the yield, makes the plants more susceptible to disease and generally starves the plants for water and nutrients.

In the thinning process, try to save the strongest seedlings and remove excess plants by hand. where seedlings are close together and pulling would damage the roots of the adjacent plant, pinch out or cut the excess plant.

Seedlings of some vegetables (if carefully removed during thinning) can be transplanted and used to fill in empty spaces, to expand your planting or be shared

with other gardeners.

Cucumbers, beans, broccoli, cauliflower, cabbage and squash are a few of the better choices to plant in August.

Try fall gardening this year. Create seed furrows and cover with compost, and use shading to protect young plants. You will be harvesting some of the tastiest vegetables you will ever eat.

MHP Troopers Help To Ensure School Bus Safety

Mississippi Highway Patrol troopers throughout Mississippi will extend their normal hours until buses deliver children to school and home.

Col. Jimmy Stringer, MHP director said during the school session our troopers have been instructed to remain in their cars from the time they report to duty until 8:00 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. - 4:00 p.m. during peak travel hours. "We believe the visibility of troopers during peak hours will enhance school bus safety. Our troopers will closely watch school bus drivers to make sure that they obey the laws."

According to the Mississippi Department of Education, Hinds county has a total of 376 regular bus routes in service. Statewide there are 5,241 regular bus routes. these routes cover 52,442,357 miles each school year. According to calculations taken from each school district, the 1995-96 Accident Reports show that 16 children received mild to serious injuries as of result of bus accidents and there were 343 statewide bus accidents.

"The MHP will do everything possible to ensure that all safety precautionary measures are taken to protect our children. Drivers with cellular phones who have emergencies may dial *HP*(47) for assistance from the nearest MHP office," Stringer said.

"A child's safety is dependent on the careful driving of the motorists as well as they careful driving of the bus driver. The MHP encourages all motorists to pay close attention to the safety signs and to follow the instructions of the school bus safety patrol when approaching school zones."

Regina Ginn, interim director for the office of school building and transportation said, "Safety is our number one responsibility for children throughout the state. The MDE has conducted training classes throughout the state during the months of June, July, and August. These classes were to train and certify bus drivers.

Ginn said the the MDE trained approximately 4,600 school bus drivers in Mississippi during the 1996 summer months. "There are 5,241 buses on Mississippi's roads and highways. Those buses are responsible for the transportation of 395,110 students to school," she said.
