### Changes in Iuka Fire Dept. Being Made to Improve Rating for Fire Insurance

The Iuka Fire Department is leading a campaign to reduce the insurance fire rating from 8 to 7 for residents in the city and the surrounding area by the first of next year.

The changes could result in as much as a 23 percent savings in insurance rates for homes in the city, or within a 5-mile radius of the city, according to Iuka Fire Department spokesmen.

To the public, the most notable change (besides the potential cost savings) will be the transfer of fire and police emergency dispatching responsibilities to the central 911 dispatching center at the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department.

The regular Iuka Police and Iuka Fire Department numbers will still ring into the station, for non-emergency calls, said fire fighter Brian Grissom, but if all police officers or fire fighters are out on duty, the calls will automatically roll over to central dispatching.

"It's important to know that now you need to call 911 to report emergencies," said Grissom, who has been with the department four years. Grissom said that many emergency calls do come directly to the fire department or police department, but that it will be much more efficient and quicker for 911 to do the job of getting the information from the caller, and giving the units directions as they go to an emergency.

The insurance rates will change when the Mississippi Insurance Rating Bureau conducts its rating check in the next two to three months, said Fire Chief Travis South. January 1, 1997 is the date set for rates to change.

#### Other Changes Necessary

The rating bureau has stipulations for reducing the ratings, and the dedication of fire fighters to solely fire fighter duties is one of the changes they require, according to fire fighter Thomas Walker. Previously the firemen who were at the station were handling phone-answering and dispatch duties for the city police department, as well as the fire department. Grissom said that the ratings bureau requires fire fighters to be away from dispatching radio duties for 4-6 months.

Other changes being made to gain the rating change are city water distribution upgrades, including additional fire hydrants, that are almost complete, according to Mayor David Nichols.

Academy certification for all fire fighters within one year after they begin work is also required

## New OSHA Training Center to be Located at Yellow Creek Site; Estimated \$410,000 Annual Local Economic Impact State Reports

A new operation at Yellow Creek will offer training and certification for construction and industrial workers, Jimmy Heidel, executive director of the Mississippi Department of Economic and Community Development (MDECD) announced today.

Southern Apprenticeship and Training (SAT) is having an open house Thursday to announce the location of their new Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) training facility at the Yellow Creek Site.

Two hundred people are expected at the ribbon cutting, according to Yellow Creek personnel. SAT will display and demonstrate some of the latest technology in construction equipment, which will be used to train construction and industrial workers. They will also offer a hazardous material handling

demonstration.

"While SAT will occupy only a small portion of the Yellow Creek site, they will greatly enhance the efforts to develop the site and help generate the higher paying jobs that we are working towards," said Jimmy Marlin, Yellow Creek Regional Project Board chairman. "It will also benefit the local economy and northeast Mississippi."

The estimated annual economic impact of the training facility on the local economy is approximately \$410,000, according to the MDECD press release.

About 100 construction and industrial personnel will be trained every month, according to Yellow Creek personnel. They will stay about one week at a time and will be trained on equipment at the Yellow Creek Site. In the training, the trainees will actually perform work with the equipment, making improvements to the

Yellow Creek site infrastructure at the same time.

"We have recently also entered into agreements with state and local government agencies to provide additional community services for non-profit organizations," said Randy Norris, SAT training administrator.

"We look at this venture as a cost savings measure for the industries that will locate at the Yellow Creek facility. We will be able to offer the training services here onsite rather than at remote locations," he said.

SAT is a non-profit organization, according to site personnel, and the training is offered through a grant from the National Institute of Environmental Health and Science, and the U.S. Department of Energy.

Safety and health training will include such courses as hazardous materials training, asbestos, and lead abatement,

radiation, and OSHA 5500 (construction) and OSHA 5501 (industrial). While providing training and operator certification, SAT will also work cooperatively with the State of Mississippi and assist with the enhancement of the roads, grounds and topography at the Yellow Creek site, said a press release from MDECD.

"We were glad to work with SAT in locating this training facility," said Heidel, executive director at MDECD. "We continue to work on long-range plans for the property, which I believe will develop into a prime location for industry."

Regarding the long-range plans, MDECD personnel said that negotiations are ongoing with a consulting firm that will develop the long-term industrial plans for the site. Identification of the scope is one of the issues still being discussed.

### Infrastructure Improvements, Fire Department Changes are Highlights of New City Budget

The City of Iuka 1996-97 proposed budget is set to be formally approved this week, after review by the board of aldermen and public hearings, according to Mayor David Nichols.

The Iuka Board of Aldermen and the public were invited to comment on the budget for the fiscal year that will start October 1, 1996 at a meeting last Tuesday night.

Nichols said that the aldermen were generally supportive and that there was no public comment on the proposed budget.

Highlights of the budget, according to the mayor, include:

- No tax increase.
- Upgrading the fire department to a more professional level, allowing the fire insurance rating to be reduced from 8 to 7 by the Mississippi Rating Bureau. This will mean an \$1,800 per month transfer from the police department budget to pay the county for dispatching.
- Phase II of a capital improvement program for city streets. Phase I began in April 1996 for a total cost of \$500,000. Phase II will add an additional

\$300,000 in improvements that the city hopes to complete by December 1996, weather permitting. Work cannot begin until October, when the new budget goes into effect, said Nichols.

•Funds for site improvements at Iuka Industrial Park for an amount of \$60,000 to prepare for a proposed industry, said Nichols. This provides a local match to other grant funds for a total expenditure at the industrial park of \$250,000.

•No personnel changes.

•Nominal capital outlay in utility department work.

•Addition of two tennis courts to Mineral Springs Park.

Nichols said the controversial basketball goals that were taken down in the past year will be replaced elsewhere, as soon as a suitable location is found. He said that Mineral Springs Park and the surrounding neighborhood is seen as a serene, quiet place for family outings. The activities taking place at the goals risked the integrity and peace of the area.

The budget is balanced, as is required according to Mississippi state law, said Nichols.

generous to share their recipe, which I am passing along to you.

Called the Council House Cafe Broccoli Salad, the recipe uses:

½ cup sweet onion, chopped  
½ lb. bacon, fried and crumbled  
½ cup pecan pieces  
1 cup mayonnaise  
½ cup sugar  
1 Tbsp. apple cider vinegar  
2 bunches fresh broccoli, finely cut or divided into florets

Mix the first six ingredients thoroughly and pour over the broccoli.

Simple, easy, and healthy - excepting that you should be aware of the fat content of the bacon, nuts and mayonnaise and plan your other fat intake accordingly. Personally, I would reduce that sugar somewhat, according to taste and to reduce calories.

FIRST AID FOR EYE INJURY

Anyone suffering from a blow to the eye should apply a cold compress at once for fifteen minutes and then replace it each hour until the pain and swelling are reduced. If the eye becomes black due to some possible internal damage, see a doctor.

Those whose eyes suffer a chemical burn from caustic acids or alkalis, which can be extremely serious or less severe damage from chemical irritants, should flush the eye with water at once. Gentle flushing should continue for fifteen minutes with the head kept under a faucet or with water pouring into the eye from a clean container. Don't use an eye-cup, don't bandage the eye, but do see a doctor.

If an eye or eyelid is punctured, bandage it lightly and get medical attention at once. In this case, it would not be wise to flood the eye with water or attempt to remove the object prior to seeking professional assistance.

### SARCOPTIC MANGE

This disease is caused by a microscopic spiderlike insect called a mite. The diagnosis must be made by examining skin scrapings under a microscope, or in difficult cases by a skin biopsy.

Probably no other skin disease will cause your dog to scratch and bite at himself with such intensity. The intense itching is caused by the female mites tunneling a few millimeters under the skin to lay their eggs. Mite eggs hatch in three to ten days. The immature mites develop into adults and begin to lay eggs of their own. This whole cycle takes seventeen to twenty-one days.

Signs: These mites prefer the skin of the ears, elbows, hocks and face. Early hair loss and crusts are often seen in these areas. You may also see small red bumps that itch. Crusty ear tips, along with an intense itching, make the diagnosis almost certain. If you rub the edge of your dog's ear between your fingers, the dog will begin to scratch on that side.

Later, because of the scratching, rubbing and biting at the itch, the skin begins to break down, allowing serum to seep out. One sees scabs, crusts and even patches of hair loss. In the final stages, the skin becomes thick and darkly pigmented.

If your dog has scabies, you may notice itching of your skin at the belt line. The mites have transferred to you. However mites do not live over three weeks on human skin. The problem is self limited if the dog is treated.

Treatment: Clipping scabie-affected areas may be necessary. Bathe the animal thoroughly and dip in an insecticide recommended by your veterinarian. At least three dips are required at intervals of a week to ten days each.

### YOU CAN HELP DETERMINE THE FUTURE OF TVA'S LAKESHORE MANAGEMENT

TVA is requesting comments on the Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) for the Shoreline Management Initiative (SMI), which will result in new shoreline development standards for residential access along the shoreline of agency lakes. Based on earlier public participation, TVA has developed six potential shoreline management alternatives and analyzed impacts of each in the DEIS. In the DEIS, the agency has identified its preferred alternative, which would provide new standards for the size of docks and type of vegetation management permitted by TVA. Regardless of the alternative chosen, existing approved shoreline uses will be allowed to remain in place.

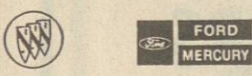
The preferred alternative would also allow new shoreline areas to be developed. The DEIS examines proposed cost-recovery charges associated with management activities. Although TVA has identified a preferred alternative, a final decision will not be made without a thorough public review. TVA extends an invitation to property owners, lake users, and anyone else interested in the management of TVA lakes to comment on

this document at the time and location listed below. The key questions TVA is asking the public to consider are: What do you want the shorelines to look like 25 years from now? How can TVA best manage future development? What standards should be used in the construction of docks and other shoreline structures? What vegetation management practices are appropriate in areas where future development may occur? Should TVA limit future residential development to areas that now have access, or should additional public lands be opened for access and development? How should TVA pay for future shoreline management activities, such as dock and permit inspections, and

erosion control? Written comments may be mailed to the same address. Deadline for all comments is October 15, 1996. ## Cyclists Invited To Join 5th Annual Tour De Trace

Cyclists of all ages and abilities are preparing to pedal the Natchez Trace Parkway from Jackson to Tupelo to benefit the Mississippi Chapter of the National Multiple Sclerosis society (NMSS). Tour de Trace 1996, a three-day bicycle odyssey up the 600-year old road that was carved out by foot-traffic, is set for October 18, 19 and 20. Established in 1992 as a fundraising event that generates in excess of \$35,000 annually, the fall weekend ride on the scenic federal parkway attracts riders from around Mississippi and

across the United States.

This year's route begins early Friday morning when riders depart the Reservoir area on a 75-mile course to Kosciusko. Saturday, tour riders are challenged by the trek to Tupelo - a Century, or 100-mile, ride. On Sunday cyclists make a half day roundtrip from Tupelo to the 2,000-year-old Native American cemetery at Pharr Mounds. The Tour schedule includes overnight stops at Kosciusko and Tupelo motels.

Tour de Trace riders are fully-supported along the way by dozens of volunteers with special skills. Motorcycle escorts from the Mississippi Highway Patrol maintain safety, HAM radio operators ensure constant communication along the route, mechanics from the Bike Rack in Jackson travel with the riders to provide on the spot assistance and massage therapists await weary riders, at the end of each day. In addition, other dedicated volunteers staff regular rest stops, dispensing power beverages and snacks as well as encouragement to keep on pedaling.

for the rating change. All Iuka fire fighters are now certified as required, except for one who is scheduled to attend in January, said Grissom, who was the first Iuka fire fighter to be academy certified in November 1992.

Grissom also said that Iuka fire fighters switched to 24-hour shifts starting September 8, as is the practice in larger cities' fire departments. They now work for 24 hours straight, and are then off for 48 hours, according to Grissom.

### Costs for the Changes

The transfer of dispatching duties to the county-run 911 system will cost the City of Iuka about \$1,800 a month, according to Mayor Nichols.

"This additional cost will be offset by cost savings through the police department," said Nichols.

When asked if this meant possible layoffs in the police department, Nichols said that would be an internal police department decision, left up to Police Chief Amos Bates. Bates said that he doesn't have the new fiscal year budget yet, so could not comment.

### Report From Congress

House Bill Makes It More Difficult To Place U.S. Peacekeeping Troops Under U.N. Control

American military forces have assumed a greater role in peacekeeping missions around the world in the 1990s. Unfortunately, those deployments have sometimes put U.S. troops under the command and control of United Nations personnel. The House of Representatives has passed legislation to curtail this practice and reassess our involvement in peacekeeping activities where there is no compelling U.S. national security interest.

These common-sense changes will prohibit Department of Defense funds from being obligated for any activity that places U.S. troops under United Nations control except in the most extraordinary circumstances.

Before allowing U.S. personnel to serve under United Nations commanders, the President must meet several requirements, including a certification that the mission is in the national interest of the United States. He must also provide information relating to the size of the military force involved, the command and control structure under which the personnel will operate, and the exit strategy for withdrawing U.S. forces.

The legislation also focuses more attention on the larger question of U.S. involvement in United Nations peacekeeping and "peace enforcement" missions, given the cost and the questionable effectiveness of many of these operations. United Nations presence in Somalia and Bosnia, for example, did little to stop the fighting. The warring factions were not deterred

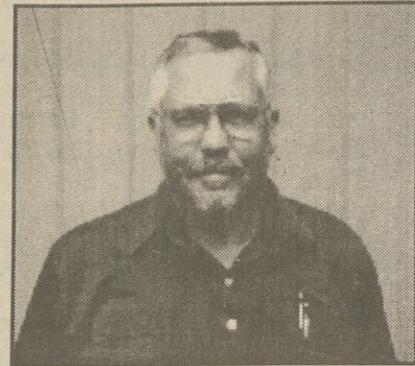
by United Nations peacekeepers. Instead, they harassed United Nations forces and even held them hostage for a short time in Bosnia.

Besides the danger to American military men and women, these missions have a high price tag. Much of the money for peacekeeping operations has come out of the existing Department of Defense budget, taking funds away from other functions important to the readiness and war-fighting capability of our armed forces.

Around the world today, thousands of U.S. military personnel are involved in a wide range of peacekeeping missions. In seven of

those operations - - involving troops - - United Nations commands are in charge. I have concerns any mission that requires U.S. forces to answer to United Nations commanders instead of our military leaders. I also question need to risk American lives in operations such as these where security interests are not significantly threatened.

These new conditions force the White House to consider the implications of U.S. military personnel to peacekeeping missions.



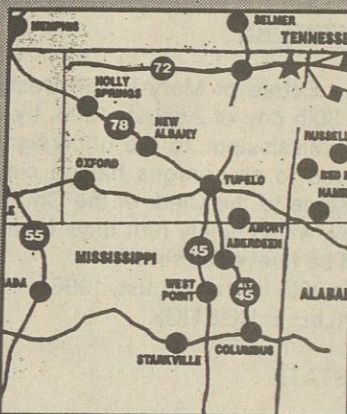
