Southern Apprenticeship & Training Opened Last Thursday; First Class to Come Through Next Week

by Pamela McRae

About one hundred people gathered at Yellow Creek site last Thursday to hear how Southern Apprenticeship and Training's new industrial training facility would benefit the area by training local people to take their place in the workforce.

The new training operation is projected by the state to bring in at least \$410,000 yearly to the area. Businesses such as restaurants and hotels are expected to especially benefit from the 100 or so people per month that will have to stay in the area for days or a week at a time while taking training courses.

The SAT operation will occupy a portion of the administrative building at the site for classroom facilities to train industrial and construction workers in OSHA (Occupational Safety and Health Administration)-approved or required courses such as hazardous material handling, asbestos and lead abatement, and even radiation training. Participants will also be trained to operate the latest construction equipment, which is necessary to keep up with new machines that require more and more technological expertise, said Randy Norris, training administrator for Southern Apprenticeship and Training

Norris said that the training operation will be two-fold. They

The original training operation began in 1978 in Crystal Springs, Mississippi, where it was located until this move to Yellow Creek, which has been in the works for years, said Splain. Funding to operate the operation comes from employers who recognize the need for training, said Splain. He also said that as a nonprofit organization, they apply for and receive different grants for special projects.

Community Contributions

Splain explained that SAT is eager to make a contribution the community.

"This is a lease agreement with the state [to use the Yellow Creek facility]," Splain said. "But we look upon it as a partnership with the state and community."

SAT will be training construction workers to operate machinery in a hands-on fashion, explained Splain. So as they operate machinery, they will be making improvements to not only the Yellow Creek site, but will also be available for work for non-

profit groups. "The law prevents us from doing charitable work for 'forprofit' organizations," Splain said. But he went on to say they could do things like build ball fields, or prepare church parking

Circuit Court Arraignments

Job Service Manager Indicted For Chop Shop Operation

The manager of the Mississippi Employment Security Commission job service office in Iuka was arraigned in circuit court Tuesday on a four-count grand jury indictment, including one charge of running a chop shop in Tishomingo County.

Wilburn "Bud" Young, 52, was arrested late Monday by Mississippi Highway Patrol and Tishomingo County Sheriff Department officers and charged with owning and operating a chop shop, two counts of possession of a motor vehicle with an altered vehicle identification number, and one count of receiving stolen property, according to the indictment passed down by the grand jury on September 10,

Young, an Iuka resident, pled not guilty in Tishomingo County Circuit Court and was released on \$20,000 bond. The case was continued until the January court term at the request of his attorney, Richard Bowen.

Other Circuit Court Action

In other Tuesday circuit court action under the Honorable Barry Ford, Russell Wayne "Candy Man" Malone, 38, of Sheffield, Alabama, was arraigned on a multiple-count indictment including sale of marijuana, sale of cocaine, possession of marijuana with intent to sell, possession of cocaine with intent to sell, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, and two counts of aggravated assault on a police

Malone, indicted as a habitual offender for two prior felony convictions in Alabama according to Assistant District Attorney Jim Pounds, sought to get his bail reduced from \$100,000 to a maximum \$50,000. He had been incarcerated in the Tishomingo County Jail since an incident on May 14, 1996 in which Belmont police officers were fired at during a high speed

officer.

Malone and two others were arrested at the time, and two pounds of marijuana, and 33 rocks of crack cocaine were seized when the suspects were taken into custody. Pounds said that Malone is in parole violation in Alabama, as well.

Last week in Tishomingo County Circuit Court, Matthew Queen, 26, of Haleyville, Alabama pled guilty to fondling a 17-yearold young man and, upon the recommendation of the victim and his mother, the court handed down a five-year sentence, which was suspended, and placed Queen under three years of probation. He is required to pay a \$500 fine, \$750 in attorney fees and court costs. Queen is permitted by the court to reside in Alabama until his probation can be transferred there, according to the September 9, 1996 supervised probation order.

Also on September 9th, Claudia L. Holloway pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance (placidyl) and was

sentenced to one year in the intensive supervision house arrest program, in which she is required to wear an electronic monitoring device 24 hours a day.

Also last week, Jeffery L. Puckett plead guilty to burglary and larceny of an occupied dwelling at night with a deadly weapon and was sentenced to ten years with the Mississippi Department of Corrections, nine of which were suspended. The remaining one is to be served concurrent with a Franklin County, Alabama case, and the defendant was required to pay court cost and a fine, and was remanded to custody of the sheriff until being transported to the Alabama Department Corrections.

Circuit Court continues for the rest of this week, with more arraignments scheduled.

For various reasons, shopping thrift, secondhand or re-use stores is currently a very popular trend. Clothing costs that are skyrocketing, people turning over their wardrobes more often, and concern for the world's ecology all support this popular shopping craze. In addition, most of us love a bargain,

Thrift shops are frequently found under various names in most larger cities and some smaller ones, in both affluent and less-affluent neighborhoods. When I lived near Nashville, I discovered a great one in the Green Hills area. One of the largest thrift sales in Mississippi is held twice each year in Greenville. It's the Steinmart clearance sale, often called the Saks Fifth Avenue

In shopping these stores and sales, it is well to consider that previously used clothes come in several categories with corresponding price tags. Some of the categories you will find are antique clothing

(recently popular among the college crowd), moderately priced (perhaps outgrown or undersize), extremely expensive (same reasons), and designer or designer originals which are still expensive but considerably discounted from the original price.

Much of the more expensive clothing is on consignment, where clothing or merchandise is sold for individuals and both they and the store earn a percentage of the discounted price.

Unlike new merchandise stores, thrift shops may not have

adequate dressing rooms, good lighting or sales people to assist you. Clothing may be stuffed on racks and selections is not always

Successful bargain hunting is an art that can be acquired with great results simply by following a

* Keep up with current styles, prices and colors. Just because an item is cheap, the value may be even less than marked if it is not considered fashionable. Classic styles that bridge over several seasons are usually the best deals.

* A good quality, tightly constructed fabric that doesn't have a worn surface or obvious pilling will be your best choice. Watch corduroy, velvet and other pile fabrics for crushed or flattened naps that are sometimes impossible to

Wool, linen, cotton and silk are excellent secondhand choices if they have been well cared for by previous owners. Avoid dated polyesters, fabric designs and

* Look past the junk and spot the truly valuable or functional pieces of clothing. Consider your findings valuable only if they work for your wardrobe needs. Shop with a purpose or a specific item in

* Take time to check the jammed racks and stacks for buried treasures. Also, take time to check garments carefully for stains, tears or missing pieces.

* Keep in mind that the turnover is usually rapid in thrift shops and there is no guarantee for selection or replacement, so check the stock frequently.

Remember, too that one of the thrills in secondhand shopping is knowing you can dicker on price. Often the ticket price can be questioned for an even better bargain, whether shopping one of the upscale shops or a neighborhood garage sale.

down the center of the back with a brown and yellow stripe down each side. The common name for this is the variable oakleaf caterpillar (scientific name - Heterocampa manteo) I have also gotten descriptions of what appears to be gypsy moth caterpillars. They are brownish gray with tufts of hair on each segment and a double row of five pairs of blue spots followed by six pairs of red spots. In many cases these caterpillars completely pests may or may not be easy. and predators or harsh weather usually gives good enough control. This year was not the case. Chemical control can be used but you must be able to get the chemical on the insect and many times we're talking about a large oak tree. The good thing is that trees can tolerate a lot of defoliation and still survive. If we see major defoliation next spring and following fall, then we need to be concerned about the health of the tree and take protective steps.

Unemployment Rises to 10.8%

According to Jimmy Rowland, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, unemployment in Tishomingo county rose to 10.8 percent in mid-July. This compares to 8.7 percent in June and 6.2 percent in July, 1995.

The civilian labor force for the county numbered 10,880, 360 more than June and 380 more than July, 1995. Approximately 9,710 Tishomingo county residents held jobs in mid-July while 1,170 were unemployed.

Manufacturing jobs in the county numbered 3,790, 20 less than June but 30 more than July one year ago. Nonmanufacturing jobs numbered 3,240, 20 less than June and 80 less than June, 1995.
