Rep. Roger Wicker Addresses Tishomingo Chamber of Commerce

Congressman visits with Tishomingo Countians before Nov. 5th election

More than 70 Tishomingo County citizens turned out at the Tishomingo Chamber of Commerce meeting last Monday night to hear guest speaker Congressman Roger Wicker.

Since it was not officially a campaign event, Wicker spoke on the changes he has observed in our capital since he was elected two years ago to one of the largest freshman classes in the history of the House of Representatives.

Eighty-seven representatives were elected to their first term in 1994, 74 of which were Republicans, Wicker said. He served as president of that freshman class. Additionally, 60 representatives were in only their second term, making about half the House pretty new to the Washington game.

On November 5th, there will additionally be 53 more House seats and 13 Senate seats to fill, and the turnover of all these new lawmakers is pivotal in the changes that are happening in the capital and the country.

Wicker also said the mindset of Washington D.C. is changing in respect to what the federal government's responsibilities are.

Those who signed the Contract With America back in 1994 led this trend, and then did something unusual.

"We did what we said we were going to do," he said.

Nine of the ten points on the Contract With America were passed by the House and went on to the Senate who passed everything but two constitutional amendments, including the proposed balanced budget amendment which fell one vote short of getting passed.

"The President ended up signing into law 65 percent of the Contract, and we are better off for it," Wicker said.

These accomplishments have helped counter the cynicism about government that is rampant in our country, according to the congressman.

Legislative accomplishments marked one of the biggest changes in Washington, Wicker con-

cluded.

The first day of his term, the House voted that Congress has to live by the same laws they pass on everyone else.

"I think you'll have better laws and better oversight over the agencies that enforce the laws if Congress has to live by them like everyone else," Wicker said.

Other accomplishments passed this term were telecommunication reform, which Wicker said would create 17,000 new jobs in Mississippi alone by providing competition in a formerly monopolized industry.

Welfare reform, health care reform and budget cuts that will lead to a balanced budget in five more years were also cited as accomplishments.

Wicker also answered questions from the audience about education and capital gain taxes.

He said that he believes that education ought to be left up to the local entities and supported the current move toward abolishing the U.S. Department of Education. He also voiced his support for the eventual abolishment of income tax and the IRS.

A tractor stolen in 1991 from a D.B. Johnson Construction site in Corinth has been recovered by the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department, according to Sheriff David Smith.

One arrest has been made in the case, said Smith.

Gerald Henley, 49, of Belmont, was charged Monday with possession of a stolen

vehicle, said Smith. Henley received his initial hearing and was released on \$5,000 bond from the Tishomingo County Jail, according to Smith.

An anonymous tip resulted in the recovery of the Case farm tractor from a site in the Belmont Area.

More arrests in the case are expected, pending further investigation.

Auction Saturday Night to Benefit Burnsville Chamber of Commerce



Tishomingo County Free Clinic Nets \$2,000 In Grand Ole Opry Production

The Tishomingo County Free Clinic Grand Ole Opry Production last Saturday night earned them about \$2,000, according to clinic organizers.

The show went well, according to Dr. Tom Goyer, medical director of the clinic. He said highlights of the show included a "cherry pop-tart skit" by Pat Cooksey, who also directed the show. Berlon Durham was master of ceremonies for the event that was produced to raise money for the free clinic, which organizers hope to open in early 1997.

The clinic will provide primary health care for those who work in Tishomingo county, but cannot afford health insurance, or

whose employers don't provide it, according to Dr. Goyer. The facility will be for those who are working, which makes them ineligible for Medicaid.

Local doctors, including Dr. Margaret Glynn, Dr. Scott Segars, Dr. Mounzer Soued, Dr. Don Ratliff, Dr. Tom Goyer and Dr. Adel Abdel-Hafiz, will provide services for the all-volunteer staffed clinic that will be in the old home economics building at Burnsville school.

They still have a lot of fund-raising to go, according to Dr. Goyer, before their planned opening. Renovation of the facility is also on a volunteer, often after-hours basis.

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

Home Economics Tips

Getting Older But Eating Well

Whether you are 35 or 85, eating well is still important. This fact was underscored for me recently through meetings at the Washington Street (Corinth) and Rock of Ages (Tishomingo) senior centers.

How we are when we are younger influences our health in later years. Many chronic diseases older people experience, such as osteoporosis, are influenced by eating habits and exercise patterns in our youth.

In addition to osteoporosis, chronic diseases common among the older-age group include obesity, high blood pressure, heart disease, certain cancers, gastrointestinal problems, chronic malnutrition, arthritis and dental diseases.

But good nutrition in later life can lessen the severity of Chronic disease and improve the quality of life. On the other hand, poor nutrition can prolong recovery from illness, increase severity of chronic disease and increase medical expenses.

Here are some guidelines for eating well as we get older:

Read food labels for both ingredient and nutritive information. If you are on a special diet, make sure that the ingredients suit your diet. Purchase a small magnifying

glass to help you read the print on the food label.

Roast, bake, broil, steam or poach foods rather than fry them. This helps reduce the amount of saturated fat and calories.

Use low-fat or nonfat dairy products. If you have trouble digesting milk, talk to your doctor about dairy alternatives.

Use salt sparingly. Try different seasonings, such as herbs, spices, lemon juice, onion and garlic, for added taste. Homemakers club members have been learning to do this, so ask for some of their recipes if you are not a member.

Eat whole-grain foods daily, such as brown rice, bran muffins, oatmeal, whole-grain cereals and whole-wheat breads. Read the labels to ensure that a product is really whole grain. If it is, a whole-grain (such as wheat or oats) will be listed as the first ingredient.

Choose several kinds of vegetables and fruits every day. Canned and cooked fruits and vegetables may be a better choice than raw if you have trouble chewing.

If you are on a special diet and have trouble following it, call your doctor and/or talk to a registered dietitian at your local Health Department.

For weight control, avoid second helpings of high-calorie foods and cut back on portion size.

Sparkling water with a touch of lime is a good substitute for a alcoholic beverage.

If you are underweight, have little appetite, eat small meals more often. Try to eat snacks during the day, choose nutritious, high-calorie foods. Select foods that look and taste appealing. Choose new seasonings or use more seasonings to stimulate your appetite.

Eat lunch with others. Find out when and where your local senior center serves meals. You can meet new friends, enjoy a delicious, inexpensive meal away from home and someone else will do the cooking!

Besides these eating tips, physical activity is part of promoting healthy aging. Any regular physical activity, from riding a stationary bike to walking, to gardening, is beneficial.

Which Vaccinations Are Required?

Your veterinarian will have a list of recommended vaccines, which may be changed to meet your pet's needs. Some factors the veterinarian will consider before beginning a vaccination program are:

Age...Most vaccines have limited effectiveness until puppy is weaned, because the maternal antibodies neutralize the vaccine.


Over all health...Poorly nourished or sick animals, those on some medications may not respond well to vaccinations. That's why a physical exam is required.

Need for diagnostic tests...An animal with parasites (like worms or fleas) or one infected with a disease may not respond to vaccination.

Risk of exposure...vaccination against some diseases may not be necessary if the risk of getting them is low.

Helping Your Child Succeed In School

Parental Involvement in children's education is very important. The American Association of School Administrators publication Parents Can help Students Achieve offer some suggestion that every parent can use to assist their children succeed in the classroom.

After more than 20 years of research, the link between parental involvement and student achievement is undeniable. For children to succeed, parents must take an active role. Researcher Anne C. Henderson found this to be true when she examined more than 50 studies of parent involvement and summarized the results in the 1987 book, The Evidence Continues To Grow: parental Involvement Improves Student Achievement. The conclusion is: Children whose parents help them at home and stay in touch with the school score higher than children of similar aptitude and family background whose parents are not involved. Schools where children are failing improve dramatically when parents are called to help.

Between birth and age 18 children spend just 9 percent of their time in school. That's why the home environment is so important. Some of the suggestions may help your children learn during the hours they are at home.

*Establish routines from your child. Children thrive on orderliness. Keep a fairly regular schedule for meals, play, and work time. Set a regular bedtime. When a child is used to a routine at home, they can adapt to classroom rules more easily.

*Spend time every day talking with your child about his/her interest, hobbies, friends. Children learn language at home - and spoken language gives children the foundation for better reading and writing. As children grow older, they need daily conversations as a way to develop values, test ideas, and share their thoughts.

*Make sure you have plenty of reading material in your home. Library visits can provide a constant supply of books. Newspapers and magazines can also catch a child's interest. Consider giving your child a subscription to a children's magazine. Set a good example by reading instead of watching TV.

*Talk about school everyday. ask specific questions - what was the funniest thing that happened today? What was the hardest thing you did today?

*Praise your child's efforts as well as his/her accomplishments.

*Ask your children, "what do you think?" Then really listen to the answer.

*Be aware of your expectations.

*Make homework a priority. Provide a quiet, well-lit place for your child

to study.

By showing your interest in your child's learning, and by holding high expectations for your child, you can develop attitudes that lead to school success.

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
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
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
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
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After 100 Years, Mary Palmer Says She Has Nothing To Complain About

Loved Ones Plan 100th Birthday Celebration Sunday

For her birthday next Monday, Mary Palmer of Tishomingo has received several new dresses, some pansies planted by a neighbor, a special "house-call" birthday singing and cake from her church's Lads to Leaders/Leaderettes, and, finally, a big birthday celebration this next Sunday at the Paden Community Center.

Why all the fuss? Well, this will be the one hundredth time she has had a birthday.

Mary Lillie Hunt Palmer was born seventh of thirteen children on October 28, 1896 near the Allen Line Community in southern Tishomingo County. Friends and relatives are hosting a special celebration for her at the Paden Community Center this Sunday afternoon from 1:30 until 4:30 about which she is very excited.

Talking with her Monday afternoon, she enthusiastically told about the plans for the party. She said her daughter, Clara Sutton, and granddaughter Cora Taylor have bought her several lovely new dresses to choose from for the occasion and how some of her kinfolk from Georgia and Alabama are coming.

Changes

It is hard to fathom all the

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changes a person would see in one hundred years of life.

"I've seen more changes than I ever thought would be," Mary said.

She said probably the biggest change was crime. When she was young, she said, her brothers would come in from working in the fields and would just grab a

quilt and sleep out on the porch.

"You'd be afraid someone would come along and kill you nowadays," she said.

She never learned to drive, recalling that when she was of an age to learn, they couldn't have afforded a car. Her oldest boy, Henry, bought an A-Model, but that back then you could pretty much walk anywhere faster than the cars would go.

"Back then, the womenfolk never went to town," she said, "just the men went, and they just caught a ride with someone else to Tishomingo or Dennis." She still rides with friends and neighbors who take her to Tishomingo to shop.

Her family bought most of their grocery necessities from traveling peddler wagons, since they lived "way back in the country". The wagons sold everything from flour and meal to fabric. As she fingered the beautiful quilt she is currently piecing, she recalled one in particular, Mark Tidwell, who always had pretty fabric.

She said there were "never any telephones in the country" when she was young, and that when someone told her that she could view someone on a television who was actually many miles away, she said, "It'll never happen!"

Entertainment in the Country

For entertainment when she was young she said they would go to parties at people's homes where the young people would sometimes have candy-breakin's with "bought stick candy."

She also said that ever

popular were the "singins", when her whole family, and sometimes others, would all gather round to sing "mostly country music." She had several brothers (she was the only sister who lived past childhood) who played violin, banjo, Jew's harp, and guitars. Her brother Charlie even played and recorded some country music. They made quite a band, she said, smiling.

Mary's daddy got her an organ and even got her a teacher for a while, she recalled. She learned to read music, and also learned to play accordion. A few years ago she bought herself a brand-new accordion, which, after just a little prompting, she retrieved and played for us on Monday afternoon!

Work and Marriage

The first place away from home she ever went, she told, was Tupelo, where she worked in a cotton mill making thread. She said she rode a bus there, and stayed with friends in Tupelo. She later went north to Chicago where she worked a while keeping a house, and she met her future husband, Frank J. Palmer on the train coming home to Mississippi. They later married on Christmas Eve, 1920. She was 24 and he was nine years her senior.

Their first home was at Jourdan Hill, she said, and they quickly had their six children in the following ten years. Frank worked two jobs at a sawmill "until it played out during the Depression" about 1933. He then went north again to find work, and planned to send for Mary and the six children when he had enough money. He worked several different positions, most notably a

newsstand sales job, according to their daughter Nellie Taylor, of Tishomingo.

Later some of the older boys also went north to work. In 1958, the youngest son, James, was making arrangements to move his father, who was in ailing health, into his own lodgings in the Chicago area when he found his father dead of a heart attack, Nellie said.

She moved to her current home on Highway 25 near Tishomingo in about 1978, because of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway construction.

Daily Activities

Her daily routine consists of getting up and reading the paper, which her neighbor Ruby Wilson brings her after she reads it. "That takes me till its time to cook dinner," she joked. Later in the day, she hands the paper on down to her daughter Nellie Taylor.

Mary cooks all her own meals and does her own washing, living mostly in her den and kitchen, she said. Though she suffers from back trouble, she does daily exercises with a chair to keep up her strength, and she walks to the mailbox almost daily.

She hardly ever misses a Sunday morning service at Tishomingo Church of Christ, where she has been a member for 18 years, "since moving from the country" she said. Before that she belonged to New Bethel Church of Christ for 32 years.

She spends much of her time piecing quilts, showing one in the "Jacob's Coat of Many Colors" pattern that she says she will later hire out to be quilted by someone

else. Christmas time recipients of her handiwork are usually her many children, 17 grandchildren, 34 great-grandchildren, or 13 great-great-grandchildren.

Until this year she has planted and maintained a garden, "every year since I started gardening" and her hard work shows around her lovely home. She has a vegetable garden and numerous planters filled with flowers and houseplants all around. "My neighbor comes and waters them for me now," she explained. Ruby Wilson and her other neighbor Inez Sappington come and check on her daily.

Mary is in excellent health, aside from just having a lot of miles on her, as Dr. Howell told her. She only takes high-blood pressure medicine daily, and has survived gall stone surgery, at which time they also found colon cancer and removed part of her colon. She has had no problem with cancer since.

She has outlived her husband and one daughter, Edna, but says she is proud to have all her other children living. Her oldest, Henry is in Tuscaloosa, Alabama; Nellie Palmer Taylor lives in Tishomingo also; Russell and his wife Johnny live nearby in Moulton, Alabama; James lives in Sheffield and her youngest, Clara Palmer Sutton, lives in Huntsville. Never Did Any Good To Complain

Alvis McRae, who traded with her for about 20 years at his grocery store in Tishomingo said he most remembers that Mary never complained.

She smiled at the complement and said she never did see no need in that. (Though she did say it was some trouble for her to have to find her way around a new store when he shut down in 1988.)

It's easy to see that this lively lady is satisfied with the life God gave her and makes every effort to live to the fullest each day.

All friends and relations are invited to the celebration at the Paden Community Center this Sunday from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m. Mrs. Palmer says that your love and friendship is enough, and that she has all she needs, so no gifts are necessary.

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




Lads to Leaders/Leaderettes Art On Display at the Tishomingo Library

The Mississippi Arts Commission will grant more than \$1.3 million in fiscal year 1997. According to Bradley, the Commission is an important catalyst for growth in the arts in Mississippi.
