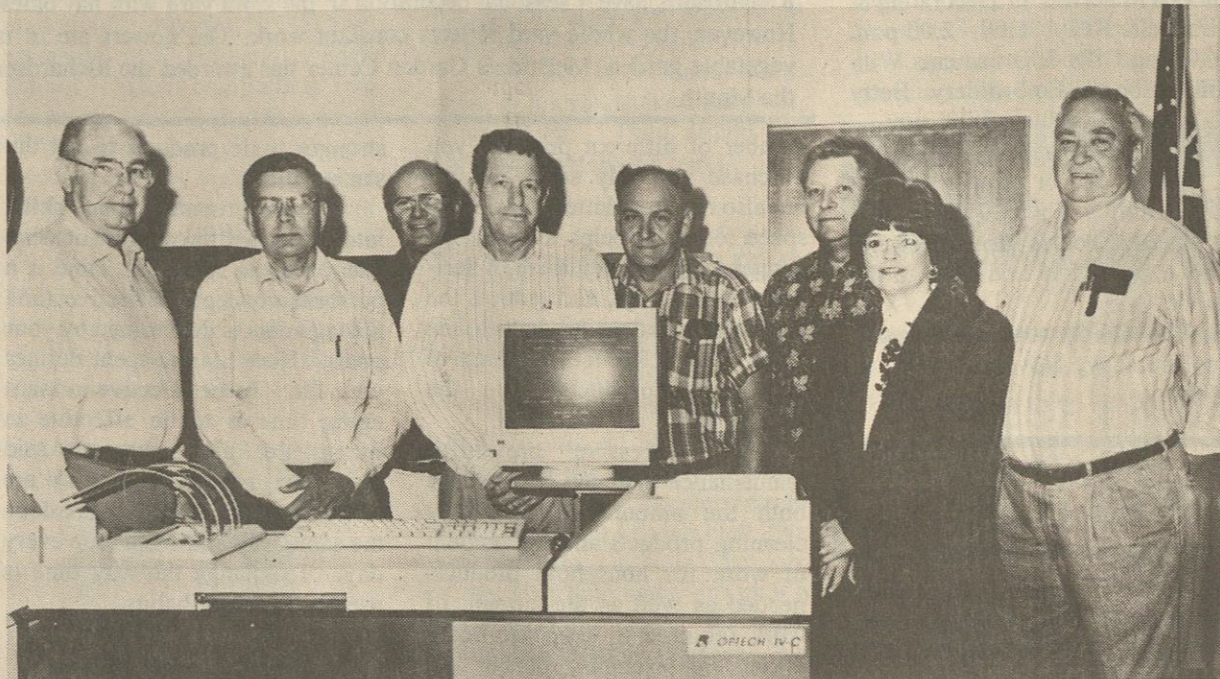

Election Officials Ready For General Election Next Tuesday With New Counting Machine

Tishomingo County election officials are ready for the general election next Tuesday with a new ballot-counting machine that will ensure a quicker and more accurate counting process, according to Tishomingo County Circuit Court Clerk Donna Henry Dill.

In the last general election four of the five counting machines broke down during the vote-counting process, according to Chairman of the Election Commission David Rushing. The breakdown was attributed to the age of the 13-year-old machines, and the circuit court clerk, election commissioners, and Tishomingo County Democratic and Republican Committees decided to start looking into a new system.

"We started looking into the different systems available and decided to go with this one central

system," explained David Bonds, Chairman of the Tishomingo County Democratic Committee. "The less the people holding the election handle the ballots, the better, in the public view," said Bonds.

With this new OpTech IV C machine and system, when the ballot boxes leave the courthouse they will be sealed and locked, explained Rushing. They will never be opened at the precinct sites; the ballots will be under lock and key until the ballot boxes are opened in the main courtroom at the Tishomingo County Courthouse to be immediately inserted into the counting machine, in plain view of anyone who cares to come observe from the courtroom seating area, which will be open to the public, said Circuit Court Clerk Donna Henry Dill.

"It can count up to 200 ballots a minute," said Rushing. It can

read the ballots exactly as they are piled into it, they need not be facing all the same way. The ballots go through the machine and will then be immediately put back under lock and key in plain view of observers, assured Rushing.

Surrounding counties have similar machines, but not near as nice, said Rushing. The counter will save money because less people will be necessary to run the central counting system and it will pay for itself in two to three years. It will also be an asset to have the machine to prepare for future voter population growth, election officials agreed.

Test ballots will be run on the machine in public view Saturday and also right before counting of the official ballots begins, Rushing announced. The machine will then be "zeroed out" before the official counting begins.

All Tishomingo County voters are urged to get out and vote this Tuesday, November 5, in the general election.

In addition to the well-publicized national election for President, congressional and senate offices, as well as county and state positions will be on the ballot Tuesday, making this a very important election.

A copy of the full ballot listing candidates for each of the Tishomingo county election districts is published on page 22 for your reference.

Tishomingo County Circuit Clerk Donna Henry Dill says that all 19 of the counties election precincts will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Tuesday, November 5th for regular voting.

Absentee Voting

Absentee votes can be cast in the Circuit Clerk's office through November 2nd, and the office will be open on Saturday from 8 a.m. to noon. Mailed absentee ballots will be accepted until 5 p.m. November 4th for the general election, and until 5 p.m. November 5th for the presidential election, said Dill.

The Races

U.S. Senator Thad Cochran's seat is up for reelection, and he faces nominal opposition from Democrat James "Bootie" Hunt, and Independent Ted C. Weill.

U.S. Representative Roger F. Wicker is defending his seat against challengers Henry Boyd, Jr. (Dem.), John A. Rouse (Libertarian), and Natural Law Party candidate Luke Lundemo.

Locally, county election commissioners will be elected in each of the five districts.

In the first and fifth districts, voters will elect new school board members from candidates that do not have to declare a political party.

In another non-partisan election, incumbent Justice Mike Mills is challenged by Judge Thomas J. Gardner III for the District 3 (Northern), Position Number Three State Supreme Court seat.

\$500,000 Going Toward Current Iuka Street Resurfacing Plan

The most noticeable part of a major Iuka street improvement project is underway, as anyone who has driven on Business Highway 25 south of the traffic light can tell.

A left turn lane is being created in front of the businesses along Battleground Drive to ease traffic congestion in the area, according to Mayor David Nichols.

The street was recently resurfaced, taking in some of the parking lots of the adjoining businesses, and is scheduled to be painted this week, weather

permitting, said Nichols.

"It is important to keep this commercial area easily accessible so people will continue to support the local businesses," said Nichols.

Many other streets in the city are scheduled to be resurfaced and several have already been done in the ongoing street improvement project according to Nichols.

"The current tax levy will remain in place and there will be no tax increase as a result of the new street improvements," said Nichols, when asked how the approximately \$500,000 in improvements would be paid for.

Use Preventive Measures First

Time management, especially when it comes to house cleaning and maintenance chores, is becoming more and more important to all of us. Demands on our time seem to proliferate, and this will be even more true as we move into the busy holiday season.

Homemaker Clubs in Tishomingo County will consider the problem of better time management at their November meetings. As I have been working on materi-

als for their programs, the variety of products that claim to make household chores easier and faster has claimed my attention.

Contrary to popular belief, it is not essential to purchase special formulas to clean sinks, tubs and every different item in the home. There are many products that are adequate for several different cleaning tasks.

When purchasing household products, choose simple, single ingredient products that can clean a variety of items. Reducing the

number of different products you purchase not only saves money, but also reduces clutter and storage space required, helps to eliminate danger to family members of accidental poisonings, and reduces the threat of hazardous products to the environment. Reduces the threat of hazardous products to the environment.

An aggressive preventive maintenance plan can help reduce both the amount of hazardous cleaning products and the amount of work for household products needed as well as the amount of work required to keep the home clean. For example, roaches and other insects are discouraged by good housekeeping practices, particularly where there is food, thus eliminating the need for insecticides.

In this regard, other hints include the following:

- *Store food in sealed containers.

- *Wipe up spills immediately.

- *Bathe pets frequently to eliminate fleas (and soiling).

- *Put a piece of screen over drains to catch food particles or hair.

- *Wipe out ovens and burner trays after each use or use liners to catch spills and avoid baking-on-stains.

- *Air out the house occasionally to avoid the use of chemical air fresheners.

Consider the trade-off of time and convenience in choice and use of cleaning products. Extra effort may be required to get the desired results when using less-toxic products. However, if you are willing to do such things as immediately wiping up spills with soap and water, you may avoid use of

stronger toxic products to get the same results.

Turning management skills into habits will take time-but what better way to spend it. Time is a personal concept. Effective time management is determined by your goals. How time is spent defines your life. To be effective in managing time is to be effective in living. Yet, this can be easier said than done, mostly because we are creatures of habit. Things are done the same way and same time every day. To change the way time is used is to change habits.

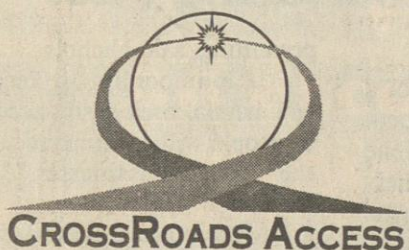

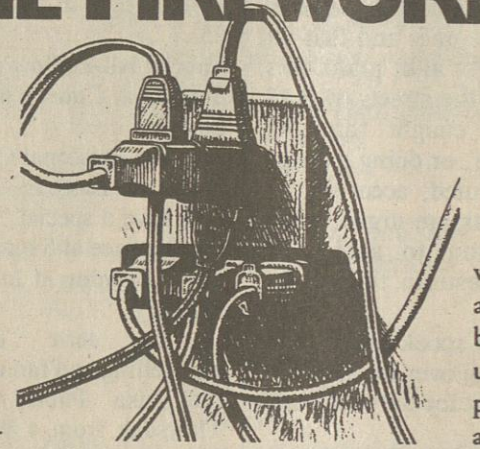

Diabetes Retinopathy

Diabetes is the leading cause of new cases of blindness in the U.S.A. Some 12 million Americans have diabetes and they should know that this disease can affect their eyes. One of the milder effects of diabetes is a change in focusing power. Eyeglasses might suddenly seem to strong or weak. Abrupt changes in vision when no other cause can be found may be the first sign of diabetes.

The most common and important visual impairment in diabetes is diabetes retinopathy, a deterioration of the small blood vessels that nourish the retina. When these blood vessels become damaged by diabetes, they can no longer supply all the oxygen and nutrients the retina needs to stay healthy. There are few early symptoms of diabetic retinopathy. Because the diabetic who may have this vision problem may not be aware of it, diabetics should have an annual eye examination. Regular eye examinations are particularly important for people who have had diabetes for more than five years.

This is regarding the class photo submitted by Virginia Merrill Bongrisco and run in the Oct. 17 edition.

It is of the 1st grade class of 1937-38 and was taken on the east side steps of the old school building. The window on the upper right rear was to the small room where Miss Celia Fulkerson taught piano. I do not recall the class being that large but I only went half days and it was probably split in two sections. "Miss Louise" Johnson was the teacher and I believe "Miss Ruby" Campbell was the elementary (grammar) school principal.

The girl with the white on the left of the 2nd row was Lima Jean Watson, the girl 3rd from left on the first row was Aletha Jane Oaks, and the boy 3rd from right on the 3rd row was J. T. Borden. Jimmy Traylor is probably in the picture but he died a year or two later from a playground accident when hit in the head by a baseball

bat and I don't recall what he looked like.

I am not in the picture (had the measles) and neither is Jackie Roane who missed the entire year from a shattered right elbow from falling from a tree in Mr. J. C. Jourdan's back yard. Letter To The Editor

Since my last Article appeared in the paper two weeks ago, I have come across some more information which I believe the voters, in the City of Iuka, should know about.

If you recall, I told you about how the police officers on the night shift still have to drive an old police car with approximately 140,000 (one hundred forty thousand) miles on the odometer, while a new police car sits at another officers home every night. We can't blame this officer because he is simply doing what he is told. According to one of the other officers, the Mayor of Iuka told him that this certain squad car was supposed to "look good." It is supposed to "look good" for the city officials, (the mayor and board of aldermen), when they use it on city business trips. When will I ever learn? I thought that city police cars were to be used to protect and serve the people of Iuka. After all, they pay for them!

So if you're ever in need of police assistance and they are slow in responding, it could be because their old car won't crank, or had to be jumped off or maybe it just quit running altogether.

The Mayor also stated to one of the officers that he, (David Nichols), and the board of aldermen had no control over Chief Amos Bates. I called the Training and Standards Board in Jackson, Mississippi on Monday. They had no record of Chief Bates being certified in any law enforcement training. This was dating back to the time when he was sheriff.

I also called the Department of Public Safety and talked to a gentleman in the Implied Consent Office, he could find no record of Chief Bates being certified on the Breathalyzer/Intoxifier Machine. After about four phone calls to different sections in the Department of Public Safety, I could not find any evidence of Chief Bates being certified on the radar equipment ei-

ther. In my opinion this would make him sort of a legalized vigilante. He can do most anything he wants. Only you the voters of Iuka can change this situation.

The Chief of Police should set an example not only for the officers under him but for the citizens as well. According to a set of rules that were given to the police officers, Chief Bates doesn't even do that.

Part "A" of the rules state that an officer assigned to a vehicle should report any damage or defects to his superior, which would be Chief Bates. Some of the officers told me that they had done this but that Chief Bates simply ignored their complaints. Therefore they feel that they are driving unsafe vehicles. This could endanger you, the public.

Part "D" of the rules states that no person except a bonafide police officer and his prisoners are to ride in the squad cars. We have one prominent businessman who must get arrested nearly every week day morning at around 6:30 a.m. be-

of Iuka are buying that car and furnishing the gas; how many of you really believe that the trip was police business?

Part "J" states that the officers must have Amos Bates approval before they can have outside em-

ployment. In a town the size of Iuka, I would assume that most of the officers would have to supplement their income. As long as they show up for work on time and do their job, what is the problem?

Part "M" states that no officer shall sign or circulate any petition as a member of the Iuka City Police Department, unless it is given the O.K. by Chief Bates. Does the Chief think we're not going to recognize those officers when they pull off that uniform? And what gives him the right to determine what they should and shouldn't sign?

Part "O" says that only Chief Bates or his representatives may impart, (that last word looked like one some professor came up with), news to the media. That's an easy way to muffle something that you don't want told.

Part "P" states that internal, departmental gossip inside and outside of the department is prohibited; as well as conferring with the Mayor and /or city council members concerning the internal affairs of the department.

Now think about this for a moment. The Mayor and the board hire and fire the police officers. If the officers can't take their problems to them, who do they go to? Certainly not Chief Bates, especially if the problem concerns him. They're hanged if they do and hanged if they don't.

Doesn't it seem peculiar to you people at the number of officers that quit as soon as they can find a better job? And you wouldn't believe how many of the present ones who wouldn't like a change.

Oh, just one more thing before I close. I want to say to Alderwoman Young and Mayor Nichols that it's been months since they lied to me at a board meeting and I want to know when are they really going to put up the kids basketball goals again ???

Bugs*Blights*Blazes Enemies Of Tishomingo County's

Every year without fail three enemies come to visit the forest of Tishomingo County. Two of them slip in without being seen -- silent and swift. The other one comes just as swiftly, but with the flicker of little blazes or even the crackle and flash of roaring flames. All three of them feed upon Tishomingo County's forest - trees that provide a cash crop, furnish homes for wildlife and guard our water supplies. When these enemies have gone on they leave behind them girdled trees, trees stripped of leaves, trees vulnerable to disease...or charred wood, ash and smoke. In every sense of the term, they leave us with a dead loss.

These enemies of our woodland are insects, disease of the forest, but today they are costing us thousands of dollars. These ancient enemies are called BUGS, BLIGHT, AND BLAZES. The emphasis placed on blazes is primarily in the sense that these open the way for bugs and blights. The time has come to recognize bugs and blights are fully as destructive to your trees as blazes.

Fire still demands all the vigilance we can bring to defeating it. But the truth is that bugs and blights take as great a toll on Tishomingo County's forests as fire does. It is time that bugs and blights were placed in their proper perspective as seriously destructive; very active, year-in year-out enemies of your forest!

Now for just a moment, think about how bugs and blights act to

destroy your forest and rob you of money that would have been yours. As for blazes, they need no introduction. There are few forest landowners in Tishomingo County today who haven't been plagued by fire or by the fear of fire in their forest.

BUGS

In Tishomingo County, the pine bark beetle, which include the southern pine beetle, Ips engraver and the black turpentine beetle, continue to cause major losses in our pine forest. Research has shown bark beetle problems are directly related to forest conditions.

Good forest management offers the cheapest, most practical and longest lasting means of prevention and control of these pest.

Another important insect of pine forest is the pales weevil. This reproductive weevil can kill up to 60% of the pine seedlings planted in cut-over areas without proper management. Other insects that affect pine stands include pine tip moth and pine sawflies. Generally, these insects reduce tree growth but don't cause mortality.

BLIGHTS

Attacks by blights, just as with attacks by bugs, result from forces of nature or are sometimes aided by man-made conditions. We find fire, flood, drought, ice and wind preparing the way for trouble. In our southern forest, some of the most dangerous blights are fusiform rust, root rot,

little leaf disease, and hardwood heartrot. Fusiform rust is considered by many to be the number one disease among pine forests. When fusiform rust strikes, it stunts, deforms, weakens, and makes pine susceptible to windthrown. Unlike fusiform rust, both root rot and little leaf disease primarily kill its host. The hardwood heart-rot ruins more hardwood in Mississippi and the south than any other known disease. Heart-rot fungus enters a tree that has wood exposed by fire or mechanical injury and reduces the high value butt log into a cull.

BLAZES

Wildfire is a bitter enemy of the southern forest. In Tishomingo County and in the south, wood arson is the number one cause of wildfire. A debris burning fire that escapes is another major cause. You, the landowner, have a strong obligation to yourself as well as other Tishomingo Countians to do all within your power to reduce the number and the severity of uncontrolled wildfires. Forest landowners are in the best position to influence neighbors, support local organizations, and activities of the fire protection agencies.

Every year, these three enemies move into Tishomingo County's forests. Neither bugs, nor blights, nor blazes respect property lines. By continuing to educate the public in the preventing of uncontrolled fire, insects, and disease prevention and control, you protect your forest and those of other forest landowners.

The simple need for education along these lines grows greater as the demand for wood, for lumber, fiber and wood products increase. To meet these needs, we must do more than ever to reduce insect out-breaks, disease and loss from uncontrolled wildfire.

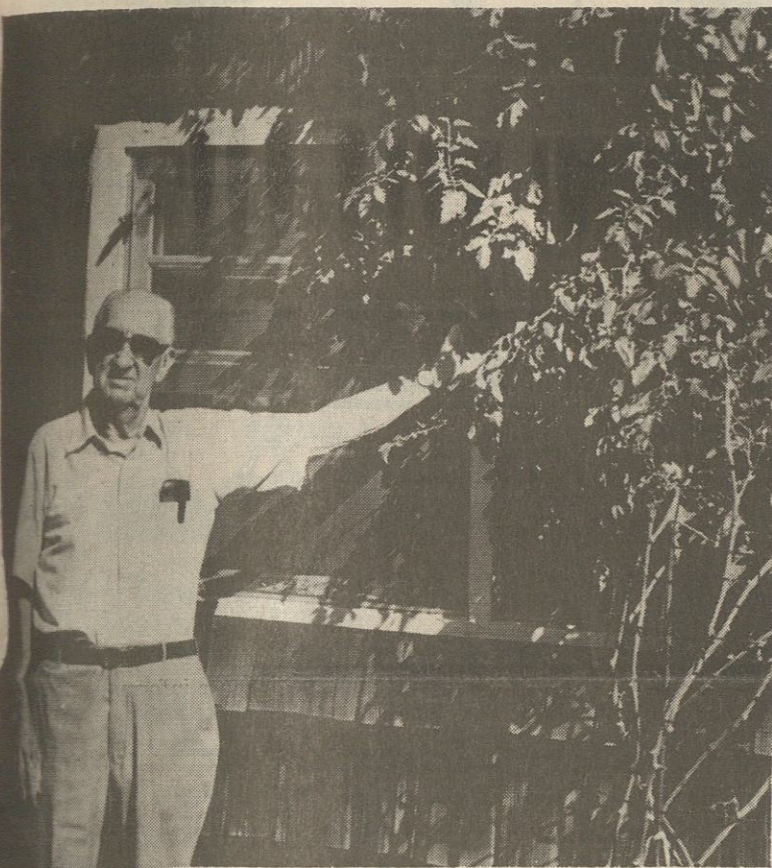

A delicious dinner will be served and there will be lots of door prizes, as well as a spiritually refreshing program that will minister especially to women.

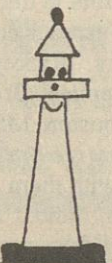

REDEMPTION: Bonds maturing after December 1, 2003, are subject to redemption prior to their respective maturities at the election of the Municipality on and after December 1, 2003, either in whole on any date, or in part on any interest payment date, with the maturities and principal amounts thereof to be determined by the Municipality, at the principal amount thereof together with accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption. Notice of each such redemption shall be mailed, postage prepaid, not less than

thirty (30) days prior to the redemption date, to all Registered owners of the Bonds to be redeemed at their addresses as appear on the registration books of the Municipality kept by the Paying Agent. If less than all of the outstanding Bonds of a maturity are to be redeemed, the particular Bonds to be redeemed shall be selected by the Municipality by lot or random selection in such manner as the Municipality shall deem fair and proper. The Municipality may provide for the selection of portions of the principal of the Bonds (in integral multiples of \$5,000), and all purposes of the Bond Resolution, all provisions relating to redemption of the Bonds shall relate, in the case of any redeemed or to be redeemed only in part, to the portion or principal of such Bond which has been or is to be redeemed.

AUTHORITY AND SECURITY: The Bonds will be issued pursuant to the provisions of Sections 21-33-301 through 21-33-329, Mississippi Code of 1972 (the "Act"), and shall be general obligations of the Municipality payable as to principal and interest out of the secured by an irrevocable pledge of the avails of a direct continuing tax to be levied annually without limitation as to or amount upon the taxable property within the geographical limits of the Municipality. To the extent other moneys are not available, the Municipality will levy annually a direct and continuing upon all taxable property within the geographical limits of the Municipality, which tax, together with any other moneys available for such purpose, shall be adequate and sufficient to provide the payment of the principal of and the interest on the Bonds at the same falls due.

PURPOSE: The Bonds are being issued to provide funds for purpose of constructing, improving and paving streets purchasing land therefor.

No Bond shall bear more than one (1) rate of interest; each Bond shall bear interest from its date to its stated maturity date at the interest rate specified in the bid; all Bonds of the same maturity shall bear the same rate of interest from date to maturity; and the interest rate specified shall not be less than seventy percent (70%) of the highest interest rate specified. GOOD FAITH DEPOSIT: Each bid must be accompanied by a cashier's check, certified check, or exchange, issued or cashed by a bank located in the State of Mississippi, payable to the order of the Board of Aldermen of the City of luka, Mississippi, in the amount of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) as a guaranty that the bidder will carry out its contract and purchase the Bonds if its bid be accepted. All checks of unsuccessful bidders will be returned immediately on award of the Bonds. If the successful bidder fails to purchase the Bonds pursuant to its bid contract, then the amount of such good faith check shall be retained by the Municipality as liquidated damages for its failure. No interest will be allowed on the amount of the good faith deposit.

AWARD OF BONDS: The award, if any, will be made to the bidder complying with the terms of sale and offering to purchase the Bonds at the lowest net interest cost to the Municipality which shall be determined by computing the aggregate interest on the Bonds for the life of the issue at the rate or rates of interest specified by the bidder, less premium offered, if any. It is requested that the bid be accompanied by a statement of the net interest (computed to six decimal places), but such statement will not be considered a part of the bid. All bids shall remain firm for a period of (3) hours after the time specified for the opening of bids, and award of the Bonds, or rejection of bids, will be made by the Governing Body within said period of time.

RIGHT OF REJECTION, CANCELLATION: The Governing Body reserves the right to reject any or all bids submitted, as well as to reject any irregularity or informality in any bid. The successful bidder shall have the right, at its option, to cancel its agreement to purchase the Bonds if the Bonds are not tendered for sale within sixty (60) days from the date of sale thereof, and in event the Governing Body shall return to said bidder its good faith deposit. The Governing Body shall have the right, at its option, to cancel its agreement to sell the Bonds if within five (5) days after the tender of the Bonds for delivery the successful bidder shall not have accepted delivery of and paid for the Bonds. In such event the Governing Body shall retain the successful bidder's good faith deposit as liquidated damages as hereinabove provided.

PAYING AGENT, TRANSFER AGENT, AND REGISTRAR: The successful bidder may designate a bank or trust company located within the State of Mississippi to serve as paying agent (the "Paying Agent") for the Bonds within forty-eight (48) hours of the date of sale of the Bonds, subject to the approval of the Governing Body. The Governing Body's approval of the Paying Agent shall be contingent upon a determination as to the willingness and ability of the Paying Agent to perform the duties of registrar and transfer agent and the satisfactory negotiation of service fees. The Paying Agent shall be subject to change by order of the Governing Body under conditions and in the manner provided in the Bond Resolution in which the Bonds are issued. Both principal of and interest on the Bonds will be payable by check or draft mailed to and registered on the Bonds as of the 15th day of the month preceding the maturity date for such principal or interest payment. The transfer agent appearing in the registration records of the Municipality maintained by the Paying Agent. The Bonds will be transferred only upon the books of the Paying Agent, and payment of principal at maturity shall be conditioned on the proper presentation and surrender of the Bonds to the Paying Agent.

DELIVERY: The successful bidder must designate within the (30) days of the date of sale, or at such other later date as may be designated by the Governing Body, the names and addresses of the registered owners of the Bonds and the denominations in which the Bonds of each maturity are to be issued. If the successful bidder fails to submit such information within the required time, one may be issued for each maturity in the full amount maturing on the date registered in the name of the successful bidder. The Bonds will be delivered at a place to be designated by the purchaser without cost to the purchaser, and payment therefor shall be made in immediately available funds.

CUSIP NUMBERS: It is anticipated that CUSIP identification numbers will be printed on the Bonds unless specifically declined by the purchaser, but neither the failure to print such numbers on any bond nor any error with respect thereto shall constitute cause for a failure or refusal by the purchaser thereof to accept delivery of and pay for the Bonds in accordance with the terms of the purchase contract. All expenses in relation to the printing of CUSIP numbers on the Bonds shall be paid by the Municipality. CUSIP Service Bureau charge for the assignment of said numbers shall be the responsibility of and shall be paid for by the purchaser.

LEGAL OPINION; CLOSING DOCUMENTS: The Bonds are offered subject to the unqualified approval of the legality thereof by Watkins Ludlum & Stennis, P.A., Jackson, Mississippi. Bond Counsel. In the opinion of Watkins Ludlum & Stennis, P.A., interest on the Bonds is exempt from federal and Mississippi income taxes under existing laws, regulations, rulings and judicial decisions, and such exceptions as shall be described in the Information Statement for the Bonds.

A copy of the opinion of Bond Counsel, which shall be printed on the back of each Bond, together with the closing papers, including a non-litigation certificate dated the date of delivery of the Bonds, evidencing that no litigation pending in any way affecting the legality of the Bonds or the tax to be levied for the payment of the principal thereof and interest thereon, and a transcript of the proceedings relating to the Bonds will be delivered to the successful bidder without charge. The Municipality will pay for all legal fees and will pay for the printing and validation of the Bonds.

INFORMATION FROM PURCHASER: The purchaser must certify to the Municipality the initial offering price to the public (excluding bond houses, brokers and other intermediaries) of each maturity of the Bonds at which a substantial amount of Bonds of that maturity were sold, to enable the Municipality to compute the yield on the Bonds for federal arbitrage law purposes.

FURTHER INFORMATION: The Municipality has prepared an Information Statement relating to the Bonds which the Municipality deems to be final and complete as of this date. The Bonds, being an aggregate principal amount of less than \$1,000,000, will be exempt from the disclosure requirements set forth in Rule 15c of the Securities and Exchange Commission. The Municipality will furnish up to 25 copies of the Information Statement to the successful bidder of the Bonds without charge within seven business days after the award of the bid. The successful bidder must notify the City Clerk of the Municipality in writing within five (5) business days of the award of the bid if the bidder requires additional copies of the Information Statement to be made with applicable regulations. The cost for such additional copies will be paid by the successful bidder requesting such copies. A copy of the Information Statement including the bid form may be obtained from the Office of the City Clerk, City Hall, luka, Mississippi 38852.

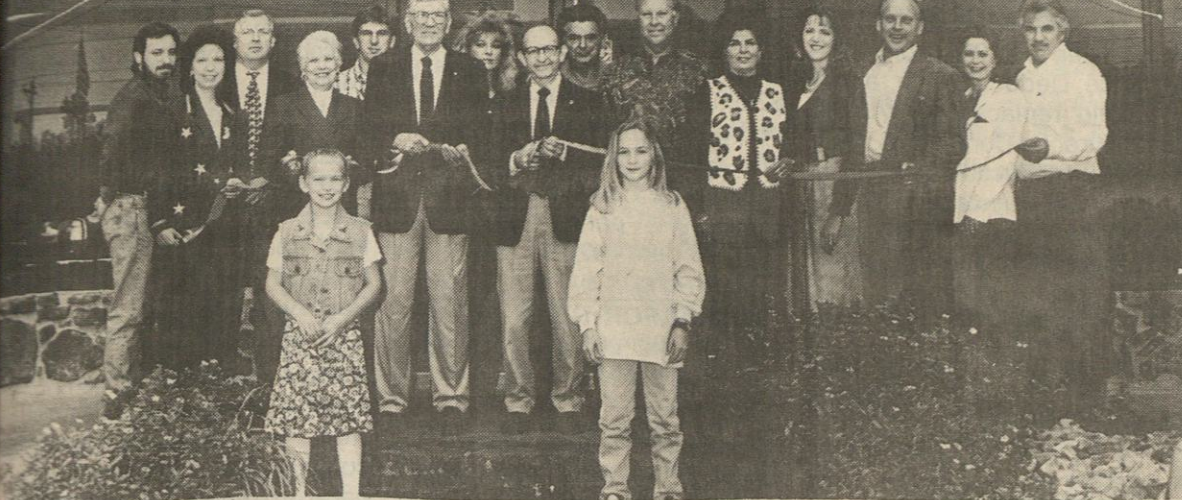

We have to many un-appreciative persons, some realize the risks involved, others don't care. I would like for each one of you to think about something that most take for granted.

The volunteer Fire Departments in this county have several dedicated persons representing their respective communities. Giving more than they will ever receive back. They leave jobs, when they are called to a fire, traffic wreck, or to help search for a lost child or adult, or numerous other emergencies. It actually costs them to be a fireman. They take time off from work, home, families, and doing for themselves to give to their communities and persons in need, when called. Anytime of the day or night, broiling sun, freezing rain, snow, sleet, or severe weather. They drop everything to go assist. It's not after dinner, or in the morning, or when they get the time, it's the instance they are called they come running.

It's no job for the physically or emotionally fragile. Fire fighters may become overtaken by smoke, heat, or just emotional stress. They have to wear heavy protective equipment, haul heavy hoses, and sometimes axes, pokes, or heavy rescue tools just to get to the danger that they will face and try and defeat. Risking personal danger and even their lives for you someone they know or never met. They have to take time to train and get schooling to use this equipment which means more time away from

their personal lives and needs. Along with the time for fund raisers trying to raise money for the much needed equipment.

Sometimes when a fire has claimed a victim, or have to recover a body from a wreck, drowning, or whatever. These type things will haunt a fireman's memory for a lifetime. Wishing that they could have saved them or done more. Some have even taken their own life due to the stress and depression from these events.

Anyone who has ever seen their house catch fire, and see these volunteers show up fast enough to save it is grateful, or any homeowner to see a grass fire, or brush fire sweeping toward their house and have only a thin line of firefighters manning hoses, water tanks, and what ever is necessary, between their home and the oncoming flames are grateful, anyone who has been in a traffic accident, in pain and pinned inside the tangled wreckage, watching firefighters pull, cut and pry twisted metal, working their way toward removing the victim, for medical attention is grateful, or any parent who has ever seen them search for a missing child is grateful. All of the rest of us should be grateful also knowing these men and women are here serving us.

Then we have the people that criticize everything these volunteers do and confront them with anger because things didn't go just right or because something might have inconvenienced them or a

mistake was made. When these volunteers are confronted like this they wonder why they take this abuse for nothing. They have families that wish they would quit so they would not have to worry about their loved ones facing these dangers that could take their life someday.

We need to think very seriously about this. What if these volunteers were not here? What if you called for help and no one showed up?

So let's all join together and give these silent hero's the thanks, respect and support they need to help better serve their respected communities.

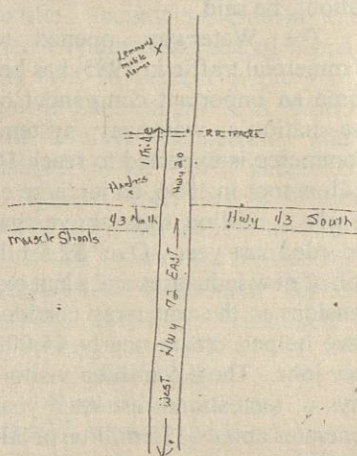

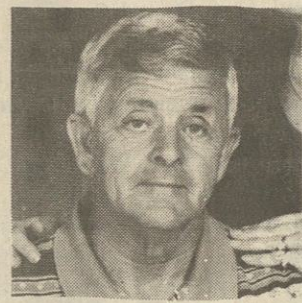

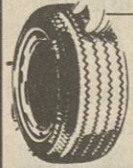

Iuka Man Deeds 25 Acres Industrial Land to City of Iuka

The City of Iuka has received 25 acres of prime industrial land from Iuka developer George H. Craddock, according to city officials.

The 25 acres is located off Seago Road near the city-owned Iuka Industrial Park, which is currently being looked at by several industrial prospects, according to officials.

Iuka Mayor David Nichols announced the deed transfer Monday, though he said it still must be finalized by the Iuka Board of Aldermen. He said the city has no immediate plans for developing the property, but stated that the city's first priority was to get the land surveyed and have the lines identified.

The close proximity to the Iuka Industrial Park will be especially valuable because the Norfolk-Southern Railroad line runs through the property.

"This will allow rail access for the industrial park, as well as making the 25 acre site attractive to any industry that would require

rail access," said Tishomingo County Development Foundation Executive Director Mack Wadkins. "It will be good to have."

Mr. Craddock, who was raised in Iuka, said he just wanted to do something to help the community.

"I grew up and was raised in Iuka and I love this town," said Craddock, who graduated from Iuka High School in 1924. "I want to help my community prosper and grow by making a contribution of importance," he said.

Craddock moved back to the Iuka area in 1986 with his wife, Margaret, and has been active in real estate development in the county, including Woodbury Mountain Estates, among other projects. He still owns much of the property surrounding the new 25 acre site, he said.

Iuka City water or sewer lines are not currently extend to the property, though service does to Seago Road.
