Dennis Water Association Gets \$1,463,000 in Federal Loans, Grants **To Make System Improvements**

The Dennis Water Association was one of eight water associations in Northeast Mississippi that have been approved for grants and loans from the United States Department of Agriculture, according to a release from U.S. Congressman Roger Wicker.

Dennis Water Association, which currently serves 1,268 customers in the southern part of Tishomingo County, will receive a loan of \$1.1 million and a grant of \$363,000 from USDA Rural Development that will allow for the renovation of the existing treatment plant, installation of a new treatment plant, three new wells and an improved hydraulic system, as verified by Kelly Tidwell, president of the Dennis Water Association.

said. The old (current) system was designed for about 500 customers, almost 23 years ago, and a well or two has been added since then, he continued.

Cost-wise, the effect will be that all Dennis Water Association customers will now pay \$13.50 monthly, for up to 4,000 gallons, as many customers already were.

"This is still one of the cheapest rates in the state," said

international contacts of both Fluor-Daniel and North American Realty. Fluor-Daniel, with 38,000 employees and worth \$9 billion, is one of the leading site location and helps consultants communities around the world attract businesses, according to Pittman.

They start this week, with a trip to Mississippi State Wednesday to analyze data that the university has collected on the site, and then on to Yellow Creek to begin investigating the situation, Pittman reported.

Pittman said they would rely heavily on Dean McRae's knowledge of the site, with engineers that were involved in the design and construction of the current infrastructure of the site on both the Lockheed and Thiokol projects. Lockwood Greene also has extensive experience with the site, since they worked as a subcontractor to Thiokol, who was supposed to build a space shuttle nozzle-manufacturing facility.

Another study on the site, which has already had \$3 billion in federal money poured into it, is necessary because the site is now being targeted for private industry, rather than government use. Pittman said one of their priorities is to help the State place dependable private industry there that will provide good, highpaying jobs for now and in the future.

When questioned about current prospects that have expressed interest in the site, Pittman said there are some

Safe Storage Of **Unused Pesticides**

Over the course of the growing season, purchases of fungicides, insecticides, and other pesticide products can represent a sizable expense for fruit and vegetable producers. Since left-over products can generally be carried over and used the following year, taking the time to store pesticide products in a safe manner makes good sense. Pesticide labels have

a section that covers proper storage practices for the specific product. Look for information about storage temperatures and other factors which may need to be taken into consideration in selection of the storage site.

All pesticides should be kept out of the reach of children, pets, livestock, and people unfamiliar with their intended purpose, in a locked storage area. Pesticides should not be stored with or near

will not perform in a satisfactory manner the following gardening season if this occurs. In fact, crop injury may result from application of such pesticides. Producers who may have larger pesticide storage areas should be alert for ceiling moisture drips which may cause prob-

lems if granular, wettable powder or similar pesticide formulations are to be stored. Plastic sheeting should be used as a shield to provide drip protection, and products placed on pallets to protect from floor moisture.

Remember - pesticides are potentially dangerous materials, so be careful! You can never be too cautious when it come to protecting yourself, your family, workers, customers, and the environment.

excess of frosted grass to carry their cattle well into the winter. Some also let their cattle glean row crop fields to utilize crop residues and frosted grass left in these fields. Where this is done, caution should be taken with cattle grazing plants of the sorghum family which have been frozen by frost. These include johnsongrass, sudangrass, sorghum-sudangrass hybrids, grain sorghum, silage sorghum, and sweet sorghum for syrup. When the cells of these plants are ruptured by frost, prussic acid may be released, which can be very toxic to cattle. After the plants are cured out, they can be safely consumed by cattle.

Are You Accident Prone, Or What?

Do You or someone you know always seem to be hurting themselves? I can certainly answer yes to this question. It seems every time I visit my mother she has a new injury -fortunately, not too serious thus far, but this has been going on as long as I can remember. A bruise here or there, a scrape, a cut, from stepping on a stick or mishandling a tool or slipping on a wet surface. Accidents just seem to happen to her.

Scientists who study these things think there are reasons that some people have more than their share of injuries. These reasons vary, of course, but often result from being preoccupied with other things and not paying attention to what we are doing at the time.

Paying attention may not help if you enjoy some of life's more risky sports or hobbies. Dangerous activities increase the chance of injury. Football players or skiers will probably end up with more injuries than golfers or gardeners.

Other activities that are not particularly risky can cause injuries, especially when the body is not prepared for them. The coordination and responsiveness. Many surveys indicate that alcohol is the leading factor in adult injuries.

This latter I know is not the cause with my mother; the only possible explanation of those given would be inattention. Most of us could improve on this and avoid some accidents.

It seems to be, however, that some accidents defy explanation. Some of us may just be unlucky.

Strabismus or crossed eyes, can seriously impair the learning process if uncorrected before age six. Although strabismus is often obvious, it is frequently impossible to spot with the naked eye. All the same, it is no more possible to be a little bit cross-eyed than it is to be a little bit pregnant. Any degree of strabismus will have the same visual effect. Whether it is a slight or major deviation, the damage done to vision is the same

Strabismus is damaging because the brain is constantly given an unacceptable visual message and that interferes with the development of visual skills. Use of the two eyes together (binocular vision) is impossible since they are both viewing different things. Never having the change to receive two similar messages, the brain is unable to learn to assemble a three dimensional image. Without this learned skill, the individual will never have normal depth perception.

Anything that produces stress can make people more vulnerable to injury. It contributes to preoccupation and inattention as well.

Kids usually have accidents for different reasons. Many times

Some children fail to fully grasp the rules for safety in specific situations. Some young children are more aggressive, adventurous or active than others, and are therefore more prone to injury





Christmas Trees Growers Prepare For The Season

Mississippi Christmas trees have thrived under unusually good growing conditions this year, and the trees are ready to be harvested by spirited holiday enthusiasts.

Dr. Stephen Dicke, extension forestry specialist in Raymond, said Mississippi's trees have weathered well this year and are looking good. Growers are facing only a few problems, such as needlecast, in some areas of the state.

Starkville grower Jeffrey Krans said needlecast is a disease that causes needles to fall out and affects tree density. Needlecast is a problem for the Virginia pines every year, but this year's dry fall helped lessen the disease.

Another problem growers must control each year is bark aphids. Grower Carolyn Swedenburg of Columbus said although these insects actually do not hurt the trees, they can be a problem for the customer when left uncontrolled. Untreated trees are a means for the unwanted aphids to hitch a ride into homes.

"Overall, this year has been better for us than the past couple of years," said grower Michael May of Chunky. "Growing conditions turned out well, especially the weather."

Mississippi's production of Christmas trees has slowly crept up in the past few years. An estimated 250,000 trees were pro-

grower sell-out about five years ago, enabled many retailers to purchase trees below production cost while choose-and-cut farms sold fresh trees at slightly higher prices. This year, retail prices are expected to return to a level similar to choose-and-cut trees. Prices for the Mississippi trees, which are available only at choose-and-cut farm operations, have remained steady for the past few years. Retail competition has taken

NMMC Home Health Agency Celebrates 30 Years Of Service

Thirty years ago, North Mississippi Medical Center began preparing for the 21st century. Leaders of the 650-bed hospital, located in Tupelo, realized there was a growing need for medical care in the home and worked to fill that need for it patients.

Health Agency nurse clinicians have developed and implemented a specialization program that prepares each registered nurse on staff to be a specialist rather than a generalist. These home care nurses are specialized in the areas of rehabilitation, wound, diabetes, pulmonary, cardiac, intravenous therapy, geriatric, pediatric and psychiatric care. This specialization al-

lows NMMC Home Health Agency to make the most of each visit by matching a specially prepared nurse with the specific diagnosis

"Because we are a hospitalbased agency, we have the support needed to offer this range of specialized services. We provide indepth and thorough care, and the length of time of each patient visit is individualized depending on the patient's needs," she said.

Another way NMMC Home Health Agency has striven to better serve its patients is through a home volunteer program. To date, it is the only program of its kind in the state and one of only two similar programs in the nation. NMMC Home Health Agency volunteers act as a liaison between the homebound patients, their caregivers and the professional staff. Each volunteer completes an in-depth orientation before being assigned to a patient.

Their duties consist of such tasks as running errands/shopping, light household chores, meal preparation/delivery, providing companionship, reading to patients, writing letters for them and other tasks. The volunteers have no clinical duties. Volunteers are an integral part of the agency's multidisciplinary approach to patient care

In addition to these home care services, NMMC Home Health Agency also offers a Hospice program. This specialized program of care emphasizes the management of pain and other symptoms (including psychological, emotional, social and spiritual needs) associated with terminal illness.

A few of the services available through Hospice are nursing care as often as necessary, family counseling, pastoral care for spiritual support, and bereavement care for up to 13 months following the patient's death. Members of the Hospice patient care team are chaplains, dietitians, pharmacists,

physicians, registered nurses, social workers, aides, therapists and volunteers.

Another service offered through all 12 offices is Lifeline, a 24-hour personal response system to enable individuals to receive help any time of the day or night at the press of a button. Lifeline's personal help button signals caring professionals who will contact patients immediately to see how they may help them. 



Future Of Federal Role In Education Will Be Key Issue In New Congress

Last week I had an interesting discussion with a group of school board members and school administrators from north Mississippi. As you might expect, our conversation centered around the question of what role the federal government should play in setting education policy.

Both sides in the recent presidential debate offered sweeping education proposals, yet education has always been primarily a state and local matter. In fact, only six percent of funding for education programs comes from the federal government.

If the United States is to be successful in the global economy of the next century, we will need a more educated workforce. Competing with engineers from India, China, Japan, and Europe, for example, dictates that education policy be debated to some extent at the national level. However, the 10th Amendment to the Constitution states that powers not delegated to the federal government by the Constitution are reserved to the states. So, what role should the federal government have in education as we prepare for the year 2000 and beyond? That will certainly be one of the important questions under discussion when Congress convenes next January. The American public commendably places education high on their list of concerns. In exit polling from the election last Tuesday, education ranked among the top three issues of importance, along with the economy and Medicare.

Education.

Republicans talked about school choice options, increased competition, and opportunity scholarships at the primary and secondary levels.

Congress and the President should look long and hard before deciding to impose more education requirements and guidelines from Washington. In the immediate future, our goal should be to make sure the federal money appropriated for education goes to the students and the schools and not to the Washington education bureaucracy.

Local school boards and administrators know what works. They should have the flexibility to decide which polices and standards are best suited for their individual communities.

Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act Authorizes Designation of Tishomingo County To Receive FSA Disaster Loan Applications.

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers, and operators are available through the Tishomingo County Office of the Farm Service Agency, Harold Mills, FSA Agriculture Credit Manager, said today

Mr. Mills said this authority is pursuant to Secretary Glickman's declaration on October 8, 1996, of a major disaster in Mississippi, caused by an ice storm and a week long freeze that occurred from March 7 through March 13, 1996. As a result of this major disaster, Tishomingo County, as a contiguous county in Mississippi, is named as an area eligible for Federal Disaster assistance pursuant to Section 321(a) of the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act. Applications for assistance in the disaster-stricken county will

be accepted by FSA through June 9, 1997.

Farmers qualifying for emergency loans may borrow up to 80 percent of their actual production loss, or the amount needed to restore their operation to it pre-disaster condition, which ever is less. The new emergency loan and the outstanding principal balance of any existing emergency loan and the outstanding principal balance of any existing emergency loan owed by the applicant or an individual member of an entity cannot exceed \$500.00.




