More Arrest In Alleged Conspiracy

Another Iuka man was arrested in connection with the alleged marijuana distribution conspiracy ring currently being investigated by the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department.

Leon N. Thompson, 58, of Iuka has been charged with conspiracy to distribute marijuana. He was released on \$10,000 bail, according to Sheriff David Smith.

This investigation is continuing, with further arrests expected, Smith said.

Tishomingo County Hit With Snow & Ice Last Friday; Cold Temps Allow Snow To Linger Schools Closed Early Friday, & All Day Monday

Cold temperatures from Friday through Wednesday kept a snowy blanket on most of Tishomingo County all weekend, and it also kept many side streets and rural roads icy enough to keep the schools closed on Monday.

Ice and freezing rain occurred sporadically throughout last week, threatening county residents who are justifiably fearful about a possible repeat of the great ice storm of 1994.

Then finally a beautiful snow started falling about noon on Friday, and by 1:30 p.m. Tishomingo County Schools were let out. The snow fell heavily, and in a short time, covered the less traveled streets. Banks closed at about 3 p.m., though grocery stores, of course, did a great business with everyone preparing to retreat in their warm houses for the weekend.

Freezing temperatures that night resulted in icy roads, and patchy ice remained on shady spots in many roads. The sun shone all weekend, but temperatures remained below freezing with highs of only 23, 28 and 31 degrees on Saturday, Sunday and Monday, respectively, not counting the wind chill factor.

In the county, several accidents were reported on Friday but none resulted in any injuries, according to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith. Witnesses said several accidents occurred at and near Tishomingo County High School, mostly from inexperienced drivers in the poor weather conditions. In Iuka, several drivers slid their cars into ditches, but no collisions or injuries were reported, according to Iuka Police Chief Amos Bates.

Iuka Plans for Improvements to Streets, Utilities and Industrial Park

The city of Iuka is making progress in several areas that will provide residents with improvements in infrastructure and more potential employment opportunities.

Street Improvements Phase II

According to Mayor David Nichols, a purchase order was placed in December to continue the street improvements started last summer. The most noticeable result of "Phase I" was the left-turn lane added to Battleground Drive from the intersection of Highway 172 south past the Piggy Wiggly shopping center.

"That turn lane is tremendously popular," said Nichols. He said he has heard from many, many people about the turn lane, and hopes for similar positive re-

sponse to the "Phase II" plan, which includes continuing the turn lane south past the Wal-Mart shopping center to Graham Road.

Also included in the \$250,000 Phase II plan is the resurfacing of Eastport Street from Constitution Drive through town, Nichols said, and several other side streets.

The purchase order for the work has already been issued back in December, Nichols said. They (the Bonds Company) are just waiting on the weather to be suitable for the work to be done.

Industrial Park Improvements

At the city board meeting January 7th, the board of aldermen voted unanimously to award a contract to the local civil engineering firm, Dean McRae Engineering, Inc., to make improve-

ments to the Iuka Industrial Park to accommodate a projected tenant at the as-yet undeveloped park on Seago Road west of town.

The contract, which covers engineering services related to the site preparation for prospective tenant Environmental Process Systems, Inc., will have Dean McRae developing the plans and then later acting as the city's supervisory agent during the actual site work, according to Nichols. "Plans and specifications for the project are in work and the engineers say we should be able to advertise for a subcontractor in February," Nichols said. Details and price of the contract are still being negotiated.

Sewer Service to Everyone In Town

The city has received some very positive feedback from the USDA Rural Development agency regarding an application for grant/loan funding for a sewer project that would provide sewer service to everyone in the Iuka city limits, Nichols reported.

Director of Rural Development Kevin Sweeney in Booneville, said they determined from a preliminary "pre-application" filed in November 1996 that the planned sewer system extension in Iuka deserved further review, and in fact it received one of the highest ratings of any such project in the area. "The probability of attaining funding is very high," he said. Funding would not actually come to the city until fiscal year 1998, Sweeney said. That begins October 1, 1997.

The projected total cost of the project is about \$2 million, Nichols said. It would provide sewer services to residents on Pleasant Hill Road south to the city limits, Fulton Road, Airport Road, North Pearl Street and Constitution Drive north to the city limits, as well as some other isolated areas.

Nichols said, "This would satisfy one of my goals of providing every Iuka resident with full utility service. Sewer service is the most difficult and most expensive to provide."

No Suspects In Pair Of Vehicle Thefts In Iuka

Chief Bates Stresses Importance of Removing Keys and Locking Parked Cars

Two vehicles have been stolen recently from two different business locations in Iuka. Both vehicles were later recovered, but the Iuka Police have no leads on the cases, according to Chief Amos Bates.

On December 27, 1996, a van owned by Lloyd McBride was stolen from in front of his business, McBride's Meat Market, on Constitution Drive in Iuka, according to Mr. McBride. The van was found about two hours later with an empty gas tank, but otherwise undamaged, within the city limits on Barrett Road, McBride said.

On January 4th, between 7:55 and 8 a.m., a 1988 Chrysler New Yorker belonging to Betty Helton, of Iuka, was stolen from in front of Bet's Restaurant in Iuka. The car was later recovered when Waynesboro, Tennessee law enforcement officials reported to the Tishomingo County Sheriff

the abandoned car found off Highway 64 near Waynesboro. Helton was called by the Tishomingo County Sheriff Department with an address in Waynesboro where she could go pick it up, she said.

Helton's car suffered water damage from a window left opened, according to Helton, and a camera with film including her family's holiday celebration was missing.

Both owners said they were just glad to get their vehicle back. "I just want people to know what's going on," Helton said. Both vehicles were left unlocked, and with the keys in them.

Chief Bates said he has been in contact with the Waynesboro police to see if any witnesses emerge regarding the Helton car theft. He stressed the importance of locking parked vehicles and removing keys from them as a security precaution.

Notice to Mobile Home Owners: Taxes Due Now

This is to remind all mobile home owners in Tishomingo County that the 1997 taxes on mobile homes are now due and should be paid in the Tishomingo County Tax Collector's office. If you own a mobile home, located in Tishomingo County, and it is not homesteaded, then taxes are due. If you have a question about whether or not you owe mobile home taxes, please contact our office at 423-7048.

The law now mandates that the tax collector file a notice of tax lien with the circuit clerk. It

provides the manner in which such liens may be enforced by authorizing a warrant directed to the sheriff to seize and sell the mobile home for its taxes. To ensure that this action is not taken, it is very important that all mobile home taxes are paid.

Unemployment In County Drops

According to Jimmy Rowland, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, unemployment in Tishomingo County dropped to 7.4 percent in mid-November. This compares to 9.6 percent in October and 6.2 percent in November, 1995.

The civilian labor force for the county numbered 10,400, 10 less than October and 240 less than November of last year. Approximately 9,630 Tishomingo County residents held jobs in November while 770 were unemployed.

Manufacturing jobs in the county numbered 3,730, 80 more than October but 170 less than November, 1995. Nonmanufacturing jobs numbered 3,230, 10 less than October and 100 less than Nov. one year ago.

From Holidays Back To Reality

Making the transition from the holidays into a new year can be challenging! Tempting, high-calorie foods are so much a part of our American holiday traditions that most of us over-indulge. I, for one, did, and have gained five pounds over the past month!

The no. 1 resolution I am hearing from co-workers and others is getting back on track to a healthier lifestyle and losing some of that unwanted weight.

The key to accomplishing this is to set realistic goals. Here are some suggestions:

1. Begin by cleaning out the refrigerator and cupboard of any rich, tempting foods (like those tins of left-over Christmas cookies and fruitcake!). Make a menu and grocery list consisting of a variety of healthy foods. Refer to the food guide pyramid for guidelines on number of servings for each food group.

2. Begin substituting fruits and vegetables for holiday sweets and snacks (two to four servings of fruit and three to five servings of vegetables).

3. Start regulating your sleeping, eating and exercise pattern as soon as possible. Design

a schedule that suits your lifestyle and stick to it. The more regular your sleeping, eating, and exercise program is, the better you will feel.

Of course, any stringent diet or exercise program should be preceded by checking with your doctor. However, if you are in good health, minor common-sense changes can often accomplish

your goals. Remember to be patient and give yourself encouragement. Don't jump on the scale every day; once every week or two is often enough. Choose a form of exercise you enjoy, and start small. A few minutes of low-impact exercise or a 10-minute walk at least three times a week can burn calories and begin building stamina.

Facts About Nearsightedness?

Nearsighted people, without glasses, are able to see well close-up by see poorly at a distance. This is also called myopia. Although the cause is unknown, nearsightedness may be associated with premature birth. It is frequently seen in groups of people who work up-close (such as students). Some children are born nearsighted, although nearsightedness is unusual in newborns of during the first few years of life.

Nearsightedness, in some developing countries, is related to poor diet. Moderate degrees of nearsightedness are inherited; extreme degrees are not.

The average nearsighted child is diagnosed at age six, seven, or eight and the condition almost always progresses until the late teenage years. In recent years (perhaps because people have been continuing school longer), nearsightedness frequently progresses into the mid twenties. After that, it is unusual for it to change.

Son Of Iuka Woman Serves Onboard Navy Destroyer...

Destroyers have traditionally been the workhorses of the U.S. Navy, defending battlegroups against threats from land, sea, and air. In today's Navy, destroyers continue to perform a wide range of duties ranging from the detection and engagement of enemy submarines to serving as platforms for shore bombardments, and are capable of acting in support of diverse tasks such as amphibious assaults and blockades.

The heart and soul of these powerful vessels are the Sailors who continue the proud traditions of sacrifice and service to maintain and operate them. One such sailor is Navy Petty Officer 2nd Class

James Yancey, son of Mary Holland, of Iuka, MS (38852). Yancey is an electronics technician assigned to USS Caron, a destroyer based at naval Station Norfolk, Va.

As an electronics technician, Yancey is responsible for the maintenance and operation of all electronic equipment onboard his ship — equipment that's used to send and receive messages, detect enemy planes and ships, and determine distance of targets.

"When underway, I'm part of a primary mission. My work enables my ship to see any aircraft with air search radar. I also operate equipment that can help our aircraft locate a ship from a range of over 200 miles without the use of radar."

Yancey, a 1988 graduate of Memphis' Kirby High School, enlisted in the Navy in January of 1989 to travel. Since his enlistment, travel has been an integral part of his sea service career. "I've visited more than a dozen countries covering Europe, Asia and Africa" said Yancey. "Visiting other countries is the most exciting part of being in the Navy. Places I've visited include England, Bahrain, Spain, Italy, Denmark, and South Africa, and, took a safari-type tour of Kenya."

Yancey's ship, USS Caron, is a versatile, multi-mission ship, fully able to operate with equal effectiveness alone, or with a large carrier task force. Caron was designed primarily for anti-submarine warfare and has some of the most advanced underwater detection and fire control systems ever developed.

The armament onboard Caron consists of as many as 90

Tomahawk missiles which are rapidly launched, each hitting targets hundreds of miles away. The ship also has harpoon missiles and the Weapons System, a Gatling gun, capable of firing more than 3,000 rounds a minute in defense against a ship or aircraft.

According to Yancey, enlistment in the Navy is an opportunity to gain experience and knowledge in any field of interest. "The Navy has almost everything," he said, "getting job experience, knowledge of electronics, flexibility and patience, easily found anywhere in the Navy. I am also learning to reach a level of maturity I doubt I would have otherwise."

Yancey says his plan is to remain in the sea service until retirement. "After I retire, to continue working for the government, possibly with the FAA as a representative."

Tate County Family Honored By Mississippi Dept. of Agriculture

The Bowen descendants of one of Tate County's earliest settlers have been awarded Centennial Farm Family Certificates by the Mississippi Department of Agriculture and Commerce. Joe B. Hardy, Jr., Director of the Bureau of Regulatory Services, presented the certificates in Senatobia on behalf of Commissioner Lester Spell, Jr., the Governor's Office and the Mississippi Farm Bureau Federation.

The Bowen farms are located three miles north of Wyatt and are owned and operated by the great-great-grandchildren of the founder, William A. Hancock, who bought a section of land in 1837, a year after the first land sale in the area by the Chickasaws, following the Treaty of Pontotoc in 1832. The land was in Marshall County at that time.

His descendants are Barbara Bowen Hamilton of Iuka and Cecile Bowen Meek of Senatobia, co-owners of the H.W. Bowen Farm and Robert P. Bowen and David R. Bowen of Wyatt, co-owners of the Bowen-Hancock Farm.

Ann Eliza Hancock, one of Hancock's two daughters among eleven children, married Dr. Robert Bowen of Chulahoma in 1852. He had fought in the Mexican War and was wounded at

the Battle of Monterrey. He died of pneumonia in 1859, and his widow moved to the Hancock farm and raised three sons.

David Reece Bowen, grandfather of the present owners, was born in 1855 and died in 1925. His oldest son, Hubbard W. Bowen (1890-1955), was the father of Barbara Hamilton and Cecile Meek, and his youngest son, David Reece Bowen, Jr. (1898 - 1990), was the father of

David and Bob Bowen. Barbara Hamilton's son is Dr. William C. Hamilton, Jr. of Columbus, Georgia and Cecile Meek's daughter is Cameron Leigh Meek of Atlanta.

The H.W. Bowen Farm now consists of 220 acres and the Bowen-Hancock Farm of 575 acres. On adjoining land now owned by Bob and Sheryl Bowen, the founder, William A. "Spludger" Hancock, is buried in the Richardson Cemetery, along with his wife, brother, and two of his sons.

Among other Tate County great-great-grandchildren of "Spludger" Hancock is Jean Hancock Walker, postmistress at Independence.

The Centennial Farm Program was started in 1976, the bicentennial year of the nation, by the Mississippi Department of

Agriculture and Commerce in cooperation with the Bicentennial Commission, the Governor's Office and the Mississippi Farm Bureau Federation. "Because of strong ongoing interest in the program, it has been continued," said the Agriculture Department's Hardy.

"The purpose of the program is to recognize and honor Mississippi families who have continuously owned and operated a farm or ranch in the state for 100 years or more," he added.

The Bowen certificates are the 183rd and 184th to be awarded in the state and the 4th and 5th in Tate County.

At the ceremony, David Bowen, a former U.S. Congressman from Mississippi's Second District, commended the outstanding work of the Tate County Genealogical and Historical Society for their assistance and also Chancery

Clerk John R. Price for help with the land records in his office.

He served as a recruiter for Freed Hardeman College for several years.

Some of the schools he has taught include Blythe's Chapel, Zion's Rest, Marietta, Rienzi, Dennis, Belmont, Alva, Hatley, Hamilton, and Burnsville. From 1951 to 1956, he worked for the Mississippi State Department of Education where he had responsibilities for the north half of the state. While Glenn taught school and served as principal, he frequently coached the basketball teams. He was coach of the Girls State Championship Belmont Lady Cardinals in 1948.

When Divorce Is Near

Many couples get a divorce when they discover that their marriage is not working. Divorce is a legal declaration that ends the marriage.

All states now permit *no fault* divorces. In a no fault divorce, a spouse only has to show the marriage has failed — he or she need not prove that a marital wrong (such as adultery) occurred.

To get a divorce, one must file a complaint (or petition) in the proper court. If the divorce is not contested, the parties settle property and support issues. If they cannot agree, a court decides.

Due to emotions and complex issues, each spouse should seek legal help in getting a divorce.

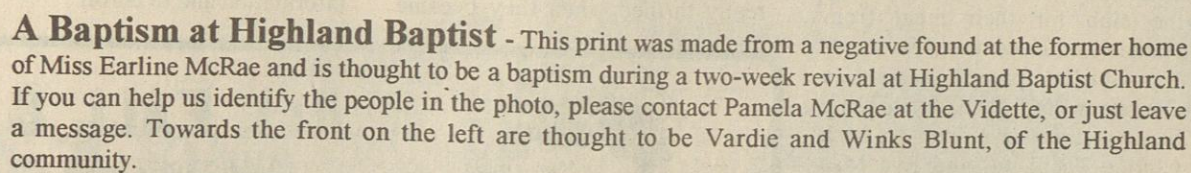

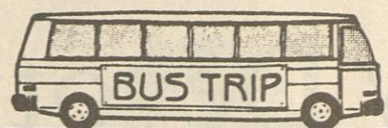

Smokehouse Boys and Two High String Band Thrill Paden Crowd Last Saturday Night With Outstanding Bluegrass Performances

The eighty or so enthusiastic bluegrass fans who braved icy roads last Saturday night to attend the bluegrass show at Paden were well-rewarded with a great show by truly talented musicians and singers.

The show, organized by banjo and guitar player David Luttrell of Paden featured the Two High String Band from Boston, with a bonus performance by Corinth favorites, The Smokehouse Boys.

The show ran smoothly from 6 to about 10 p.m., with hardly a break in the entertainment. The Paden Community Center staff volunteers, headed up by Mayor Hughie Bates, provided great refreshments from the concession stand, and the atmosphere was warm and comfortable, with candlelit tables and plenty of seating.

Luttrell promised to do his best to bring more quality music to Paden, and hopes to start up the shows again in the spring, when the weather won't threaten to keep anyone away. The crowd there Saturday night ranged in age from college kids to some of the finest seniors from Paden and Tishomingo; the snow and ice didn't seem to be much of a deterrent to the 80 or so die hard bluegrass fans!

The Smokehouse Boys opened the show with a mix of bluegrass standards interspersed with some original material. The local crowd, as well as several folks from Corinth and Booneville, were entertained with their fine vocal performance as well as their instrumental performances with Dan McIntire on guitar, Bill Morris on mandolin, Earnie Welch on banjo, Steve Butler on fiddle and a strong, distinctive bass guitar from Neal Byrd.

The Smokehouse Boys have been together 19 years. They started after seeing Luttrell play

while he was with the Tennessee Gentlemen years ago. Luttrell often picks with them when he is in the area, he said, and they recorded a record in 1984 and are occasionally heard on Mississippi Public Radio's (FM89.5) Grass Roots bluegrass show on Saturday nights, and appeared on Tupelo's The Morning Show a few months ago.

Ernie Welch, who played guitar, is married to the former Tracey Marsh of Iuka.

As an added treat, Luttrell and his mother, Mrs. Jean Luttrell warmed up the crowd before the bands, harmonizing together on some beautiful gospel tunes for which they are well-known for locally, though few get to hear them sing together often.

Headlining the evening was the Two High String Band, five energetic and very talented musicians whose band is based in Boston, though the individual members hail from many different hometowns across the country. Luttrell, who has been playing with the band since meeting them in a Florida club some time ago, complemented the group with his vocal and banjo performances, making for an act that was exciting and altogether very entertaining.

Excelling on old favorites like "In the Pines," "Sally Good'un", and "Salty Dog" as well as some impressive original tunes, the band also performed soulful renditions of gospel tunes like "Get in Line Brother", with the added treat of a bass solo part by washboard player Skye Snider. That washboard came alive under the spoons of this young man, who while remaining in the background, really added to the bluegrass sound with his innovative playing.

It seemed their musical expertise would never end as the talents of each musician were featured during different numbers.

Playing (and effortlessly maneuvering) the standup bass was the diminutive Ms. Bryn Davies, whose beautiful voice added to almost every song, but from whom the audience never heard a solo. She was truly amazing to watch as her fingers flew, producing much more than background rhythm.

From The Office Of The Lt. Governor....

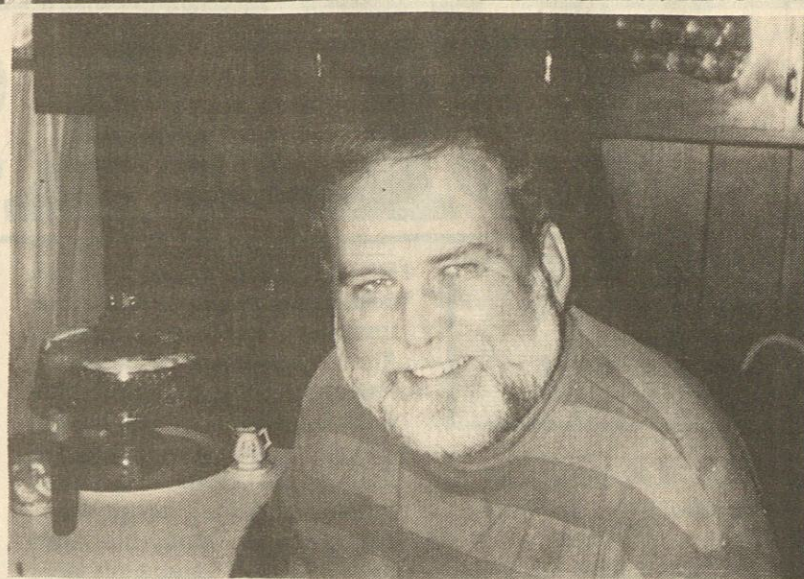
As the first week of the 1997 Legislative Session comes to an end, we can say without reservation the Mississippi State Senate has hit the ground running. Already, we have passed the first hurdle in our effort to reduce the tax burden on Mississippi families.

On the Second Day of this session, the full senate passed legislation designed to eliminate the out-dated inequity in our income tax system by equalizing the deduction our married couples may take with that of individuals. We believe this phased-in tax reduction will put more than \$45 million back into the pockets of Mississippi families when it is fully implemented.

Yes, we are on our way to lowering taxes, but I believe we are doing much more. It's really easy to talk about the importance of families to our state, to our communities, and to our children. But, it's much more difficult to translate that firm conviction into action. Removing an economic deterrent to marriage is a very straight-forward approach to strengthening our families and a very direct statement of the Mississippi State Senate's commitment to doing more than just talking about family values.

Before the session began, we spoke of the importance of cooperation in the Mississippi legislature and its impact on the

creation of the Joint Legislative Budget Committee report. We set priorities for spending in our state,

and we made one of those priorities reducing taxes for married Mississippians.

Cooperation in the state Senate brought about quick passage of this bill. That spirit of cooperation will make this session unique in its approach to focusing on solutions, not politics as usual. This is about more than partisan politics; this is about what's best for all of us who call Mississippi home.

The Senate Judiciary Committee acted promptly this week as well allowing the full Senate to consider a measure which more clearly defines our state's policy on who may marry. The Mississippi Senate passed a bill on Friday banning marriages in our state between individuals who are members of the same sex and establishing a policy of not recognizing such marriages performed in other states. We view this action as further evidence of our commitment to acting in the interest of Mississippi

families.

With timely consideration of both these measures by the Mississippi House of Representatives, we hope to have these bills on the governor's desk for his signature in short order. The Second Week of the legislative session will, we believe, prove to be as productive as the first, and we are looking forward to the Governor's State of the State address which is set for Tuesday, January 14th.
