Several 1996 Cases Settled By Plea In January Circuit Court

In the January term of Circuit Court in Tishomingo County, Judge Barry Ford heard several pleas involving some of the more noteworthy cases of last year.

Last Friday, Stephanie Jones, who previously was indicted on 15 counts by the grand jury, including uttering forgeries, embezzlement and forgery, pled guilty to two counts of embezzlement and one count each of forgery and uttering a forgery, all related to her previous employment at McNatt Ford in Iuka.

Sentencing for Jones was taken under advisement by the

court, and attorneys on both sides have agreed she will pay \$27,000 in restitution, according to Assistant District Attorney Arch Bullard.

Wilburn "Bud" Young, 52, of Iuka pled guilty January 17, 1997 to two counts of possession of a vehicle with mutilated vehicle identification numbers (VINs), according to the district attorney's office. Sentencing is deferred until May 5th.

Young was arrested and arraigned the week of September 16, 1996 on a four-count grand jury indictment including one count of owning and operating a chop shop, two counts of

possession of a vehicle with altered VINs, and one count of receiving stolen property. Young was previously employed by the Mississippi Employment Security Commission, for whom he managed the Iuka Job Service Office.

Also on Friday, Belmont pharmacist Michael E. Bonds pled guilty to one count sale of a controlled substance, and his sentence is also deferred until May 5th, Bullard reported.

The Mississippi Department of Corrections Probation Office is preparing a sentencing report on all three of the preceding cases, Bullard said.

In December circuit court, Quinacco Malone and Terris Robinson both pled guilty to one count each of possession of marijuana and were sentenced to one and a half years of supervision by the Mississippi Department of Corrections, Bullard reported. They also each have to pay court costs and must testify in a criminal case against Russell "Candy Man" Malone, 38, previously of Sheffield, Alabama.

Quinacco Malone, Robinson and Russell Malone were all allegedly in a vehicle involved in a high speed chase in Belmont on May 14, 1996, during which Belmont police officers were fired at from passengers in the car. Two pounds of marijuana and 33 rocks of crack cocaine were seized when the suspects were first taken into custody.

Russell Malone has been incarcerated in the Tishomingo County Jail since then, and his circuit court case was continued by request of his attorney last Friday.

January 15th, Tim Gilley, 28, of Tishomingo, was sentenced to the maximum sentence of 30 years in the Mississippi Department of Corrections, which was suspended to 15 years with three years of post-confinement supervision, Bullard said. He pled guilty to one count of sale of controlled substance. The sentence will run concurrent with time to be served in Alabama for parole violation. Gilley was arrested March 12, 1996 on three counts of sale of a controlled substance and one count of possession with intent to sell.

Also in circuit court, Richie Booker, of Iuka, pled guilty to possession of more than an ounce and less than a kilogram of marijuana. He received a sentence of three years with the Mississippi Department of Corrections, which was suspended with a \$2,500 fine and three years probation.

Stolen Van Recovered in Belmont; One Arrested After Fleeing Scene

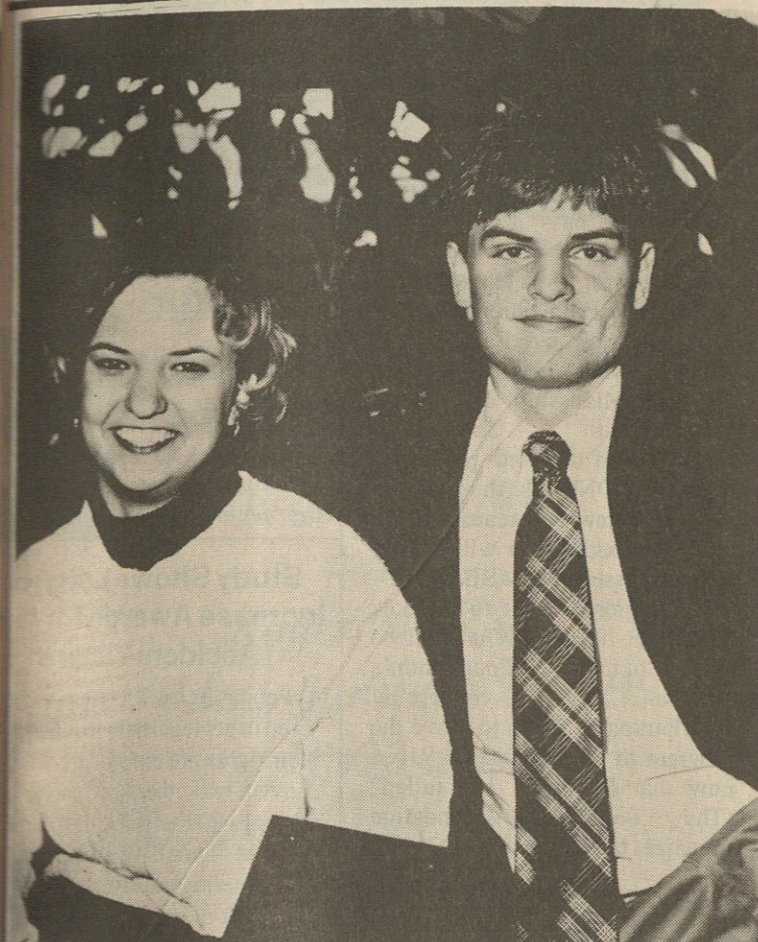

A Florida man is being held in the Tishomingo County Jail after attempting to escape while Belmont Police Chief Donald Reno was arresting him for allegedly possessing a stolen vehicle last Monday morning in Belmont.

According to Belmont Police Chief Donald Reno, Jason Thomas Hilton, 19, of Pasco, Florida was stopped near the intersection of Washington and Highway 25 around 11 a.m. for a switched tag on the 1996 green Dodge van he was driving. After determining the vehicle was likely stolen, Reno started to place him under arrest for allegedly possessing a stolen vehicle, at which point the suspect fled the scene, according to the chief.

After about 30 minutes, Reno found Pasco hiding behind Yarber Drugs in Belmont.

Pasco is being held pending a bond hearing on charges of possessing a stolen vehicle and resisting arrest. He is on probation in Florida for grand larceny and auto theft, Reno said. The van was stolen in Florida according to Reno.

"There's lots of business to do, so we need everyone to come and start a new Chamber year off right," said President Gary Walker.

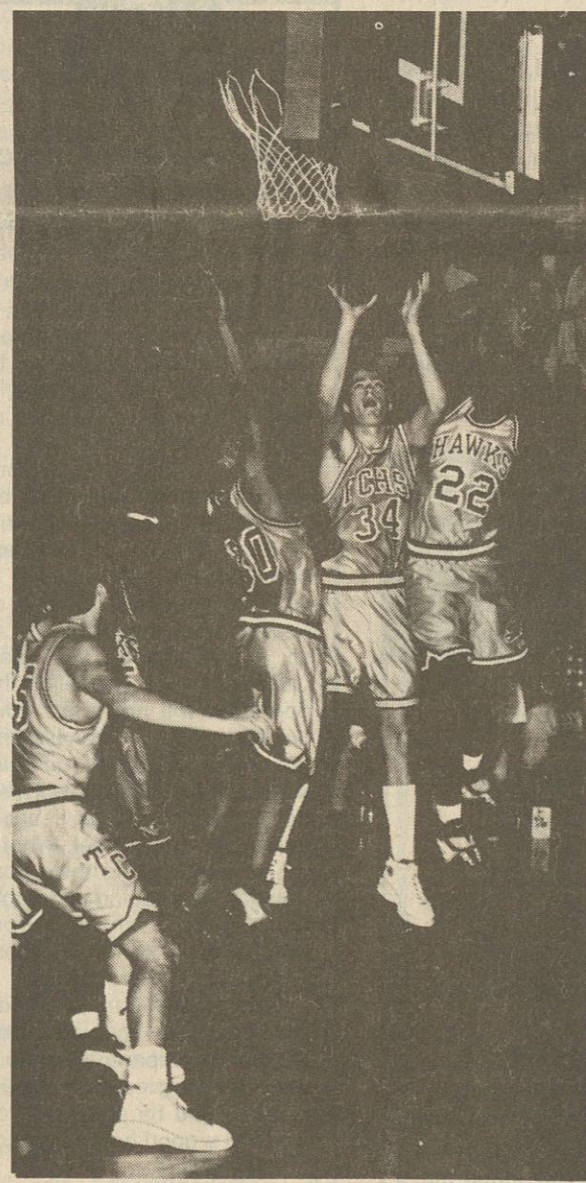
Adult Night Classes Offered At Vo-Tech

Sergers Alter Home Sewing

Are you a home sewer or a "wannabee"? If so, you may want to take advantage of a short course for beginners, starting January 27 in the Tishomingo County Courthouse. Basic techniques from choosing fabric and pattern, step by step through construction of a simple garment will be included. There will be no charge for instruction, but pre-enrollment is requested. Call 423-7016.

Home sewing declined for a decade or more, but the past two years has seen a resurgence of interest. The advantages are many: being able to design your own clothes to meet your personal needs from an almost infinite variety of fabrics and patterns available; custom fitting for your particular figure; saving money or having more clothes for the same amount of money; and personal satisfaction derived from your creativity and skill.

To be candid, there are disadvantages too. The major one, for me at least, is the time it takes to sew. This can be mitigated to some extent by choosing simple patterns and easy-to-handle fabrics. And, when you

reduce the sewing time by the time required for shopping, the difference may not be as great as one might think.

Another disadvantage is the equipment required and its cost. New sewing machines with all the technology and options now available can be quite expensive. Again, this cost can be managed through buying only the features you will use, perhaps starting with a used machine.

A recent addition to home sewing equipment is the serger. Just as the microwave oven has revolutionized home cooking, this multifunctional sewing machine has revolutionized home sewing. However, even though sergers perform many jobs, they cannot

replace the conventional sewing machine.

Consumers who have tried them seem to enjoy sergers, but many have not ventured to try the less familiar capabilities of the machine.

If you have one and love its potential, but have not embraced all the features yet, don't fret. This multifunctional machine has intimidated some of the best seamstresses. If this is true for you, simply use it more. Try

to master one new feature at a time, then graduate to another. Remember, practice makes perfect.

If threading or changing colors or types of threads on your serger is a job you dread, here are some tips to make it easier:

*Neatly clip the threads from the cone. Remove old cones and place new cones on the thread rods. Using a tight overhand knot, tie the new thread to the old thread it is to replace.

*Jot down current tension settings; then turn them all to "0" or no tension. Pull all thread through all paths. Do not pull the knot through the needle; instead clip and rethread the eye. Return all tension dials to the original settings. Minor adjustments may be needed for tensions, but they will be quicker by having a starting point from the earlier recorded settings.

Familiarizing yourself with all thread paths will help you recognize when a thread has been threaded off course. Keep the looper threader and tweezers handy.

"Wet Eye"

Overflowing Tears

Certain conditions can cause "wet eye", overflowing of tears. The tear gland may malfunction and make too many tears. This is extremely unusual. An infection or foreign body in the eye may cause the eye to overreact in trying to wash the abnormality out. When the position of the lid is not correct, tears that normally drain into small openings in the upper and lower lids will not drain into the tear ducts. For example, those with Bell's palsy, facial nerve paralysis, will not be able to blink normally and will not have the lid in the normal position. Patients with their lids turned in or out will have abnormal tearing because the tears are not flowing through the normal passageways.

The most common cause of wet eye in adults is progressive narrowing of the entire apparatus that drains tears from the puncta, little openings in the lids leading by a tube to the nose. Eye medications or infections may cause scarring in this area.

To prevent careless breeding, the best solution is to have your dog spayed or neutered between the ages of six months and one year. Contrary to popular belief, the operation will not make your dog fat and lazy. Exercise and the proper amount of food can control their weight. It will also not change the basic personality of your pet. What it will do is keep your male from roaming and getting into fights and your female from attracting all sorts of suitors and winding up pregnant.

On the other hand, if you do wish to breed your dog, you should be prepared to keep a family of puppies eight weeks or more and be sure that you can find a good home for each and every one.

Boll Weevil Eradication Referendum Fails

Another Boll Weevil Eradication Referendum failed to muster the required 66 2/3 majority needed for passage in our Region (Region 4 consists of East Mississippi). 224 voted for and 130 voted against Eradication with 64 negative votes coming from one county causing us to fall short by about 3%. Once again, Tishomingo County producers voted 100% for the Eradication Program. Region 3 (Central Mississippi) voted 81% in favor with 1149 for and 270 against. Region 2 (South Delta) voted 70.6% in favor with 338 for and 141 against. Total for all regions was 76% for Eradication but each region must pass it. Region 1, which is the North Delta, is scheduled for a referendum in March. The Eradication Program is designed to move East to West which leaves several questions facing the Mississippi Boll Weevil Management Corporation (organizer of the state program). NUMBER ONE - Is the program stopped statewide because of the failure in Region 4 or will Region 4 be by-passed? NUMBER TWO - WILL region 4 want to re-vote? NUMBER THREE - What will be the Southeast Foundation's attitude be, concerning contribution of funds to move the program to the Mississippi River, now that Region 4 has failed? (The Southeast Foundation organizes the National Eradication

Program) NUMBER FOUR - federal funds by-pass Mississippi and be moved to other states Arkansas and Louisiana states are ready to implement programs. The Board of the

Study Shows Lawyers Increase Awards for Accident Victims

People in car accidents advised to get legal help to make their rights are enforced. A study showed two other key reasons seeking legal help if you are in an accident—you have a better chance of recovering money, and you likely get more money.

The study was done by RAND Institute. It found that accident victims who use attorneys receive about 25% more money than those who do not, even after deducting costs. The study also found that using a lawyer significantly increases a car accident victim's chances of recovering money.

Glenn Boyd Williams, descendant of early settlers of Marietta, Prentiss County, Mississippi was born on May 27, 1912. His parents were Oscar Hiram and Lora Dell Alexander Williams. Glenn's great grandparents came over by wagon train from Habersham County, Georgia about 1842 and named the community Marietta.

From the time he was seventeen years old, Glenn has always been interested in education and being a teacher. He attended Freed Hardeman College in Henderson, TN, Murray State Teachers College in Murray, KY, Union University in Jackson, TN, and earned his master's degree from Mississippi State University in Starkville, MS. He served as a recruiter for Freed Hardeman College for several years.

Some of the schools he has taught include Blythe's Chapel, Zion's Rest, Marietta, Rienzi, Dennis, Belmont, Alva, Hatley, Hamilton, and Burnsville. From 1951 to 1956, he worked for the Mississippi State Department of Education where he had responsibilities for the north half of the state. While Glenn taught school and served as principal, he frequently coached the basketball teams. He was coach of the Girls State Championship Belmont Lady Cardinals in 1948.

Glenn has always taught a bible class for the Church of Christ wherever he and his family lived. He is a member of the order of the Red Rose and past president of the Tishomingo County Retired Teachers Association and a 32nd degree mason. In 1941, Glenn was sent to the Bermuda Islands

as part of a National Defense work with the Merchant Marines.

Travis and Sylvia have one son, James Taylor Rushing who lives in Kenosha, WI. Dale and Margie have one daughter, Holly Angela Williams Ramsey who has a daughter Rhiannon Melissa Ramsey. They all live in Iuka.

After Mary's passing, Glenn married Carlyn Crawford McHaffey of Iuka on Oct 15, 1994. Carlyn worked for the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association for 38 1/2 years and served as president of the North Mississippi Power Accountants Association in 1972 and 1980.

up by something some very famous person once said, "IT'S WONDERFUL TO BE FAMOUS AS LONG AS YOU REMAIN UNKNOWN".

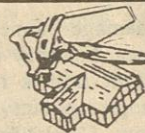

Secretary Of Agriculture To Host Civil Rights Listening Forum In Mississippi

Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman will conduct a state listening forum for farmers, especially minorities and females, to voice their concerns and problems with USDA services and program delivery. This forum will be held at the Humphreys County Courthouse, 102 Castleman Street, Bilzoni, Mississippi on Friday, January 24, 1997 starting at 10:00 a.m. with registration beginning at 9:00 a.m. In addition to the Secretary, the listening panel will be made up of top USDA officials, USDA agency representatives, legislators, and members of a newly formed USDA civil rights action team.

This is a statewide event, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture encourages minority farmers anywhere in Mississippi to attend and speak to these panels. Attending farmers will have an opportunity at registration to sign up for 5-minute blocks to address the panel. All comments will be recorded and taken back to Washington for review and action. Secretary Glickman's expectations for this forum are to improve the department's outreach and service, uncover new ways USDA can build partnerships and, ultimately, bring about an intensified effort to help minority farmers continue their family traditions and remain on the land.

Secretary Glickman has initiated other measures to correct uneven service by the department; namely, directing each USDA agency to establish outreach offices to work directly with minority constituents; calling for 13 listening forums around the country; requesting investigations into discrimination complaints and the level of minority participation in farm loan programs; and creating a civil rights action team to audit and recommend solutions to USDA civil rights issues inside and outside the department.

USDA is no stranger to civil rights progress. From targeted loan funds to retain minority farm ownership, to millions spent on outreach and training of minority farmers through community organizations and universities, USDA has made real progress as it strives to do better.

Secretary Glickman has made civil rights enforcement the responsibility of every USDA employee, and has affirmed that he is "committed to creating an environment in which every

customer who comes to our offices is treated fairly, efficiently and effectively."

In a ceremony produced by the Tishomingo County High School Brave annual staff last Wednesday, outstanding seniors and underclassmen were recognized for academic and extracurricular excellence.

Amy Patton introduced the theme of the Brave annual staff and explained the theme of the 1996-1997 annual, currently in production by the staff of 20 and their sponsor Linda Freeman. The theme, "Brave Reflections," means many things, but especially recalls the things that make TCHS our home away from home," Patton said.

Senior Anna Sanderson addressed her classmates in an outstanding speech that incorporated the Brave 1997 theme of Brave Reflections. She addressed first seniors and then underclassmen, recalling the memories that the class of 115 has already shared and urging them, and those who will follow, on to future excellence.

Prepare Now For Purple Martins

With the busy holiday season behind us, there is no better time than now to prepare for the arrival of purple martin scouts later this month, according to the Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks.

Purple martins are neotropical migratory birds that spend the winter in portions of South America. They return to the United States and Canada in late winter and early spring for breeding.

Martin scouts usually begin arriving on the Gulf Coast in late January and show up in central and northern Mississippi by early to mid-February.

In addition to providing proper habitat, erecting nest boxes in advance of martin scouts is important in attracting these

popular birds to a site.

Martin nest structures should be taken down now and cleaned out. Old bird nests and any wasp nests remaining from last year should be discarded.

Natural gourds make excellent nesting cavities for purple martins. The useful life of gourds as nest sites can be prolonged if a water seal is applied before they are put up.

Veteran birders say to maximize your chances of attracting purple martins to your property, place your nest boxes or gourds in the most open site possible and at least 12 feet high. Nest structures should be away from trees or shrubbery.

Purple martins are colonial nesting birds, and they nest in large groups.

Report From Congress

Public Private Sector Leaders Working Together To Develop Effective Welfare Program For Mississippi

Local, state, and federal government officials have been meeting throughout the state of Mississippi to discuss implementation of the state's new welfare reform plan. I attended a recent session in Tupelo and I was impressed with the commitment expressed by public and private sector leaders to develop a program which will move people from welfare to work.

Congress passed landmark legislation last year to transfer the direct responsibility for welfare programs to the individual states. The plan went into effect on October 1, 1996. Thanks to the leadership of Governor Kirk Fordice and members of the Mississippi Legislature, Mississippi was one of the first states to submit a proposal that will bring the decision-making on welfare matters closer to the people and away from Washington, DC.

Most of the plan has already been set up, but lawmakers and the Fordice Administration will fine-tune the original proposal during this session of the Mississippi Legislature. These regional meetings have provided information about job prospects, child care options, education, and transportation resources to ease the transition into the workforce.

Since a key component of this reform effort is providing employment opportunities, officials talked with business leaders about jobs and job training programs. Six Mississippi counties provide a unique insight into this process because they are

involved in a pilot program that helps welfare recipients find jobs. Under this "Work First" program, people are being moved from welfare to work four times faster than the rest of the state. The counties are Lee, Hinds, Adams, Jones, Harrison and Washington.

Child care is also an issue that will get more attention, since officials estimate that 30 percent of welfare recipients require day care services. Among the solutions discussed were utilizing churches and other family members as child care resources, as well as having employers provide day-care facilities.

Some changes may be made to the original plan, but the bedrock provision of this welfare reform remains firmly in place — a limit on the amount of time anyone can receive benefits. Able-bodied welfare recipients will be required to find employment after two years or lose benefits. The law also specifies a five year lifetime limit for welfare assistance.

The task facing Mississippi officials over the next few weeks is to give final approval to a program that will offer the best chance for people in our state to get off welfare and become productive members of society. Given the spirit of cooperation being shown by public and private sector officials, I have great confidence that goal can be accomplished.

All Mississippians, whose lives were spared in 1996 and early 1997 motor vehicle crashes by safety belts, child protective

devices, motorcycling helmets or air bags, are invited to apply for membership in the "Saved by the Belt," "Saved by the Helmet" or "Saved by the Air Bag" clubs.

Sponsored by the Governor's Office of Highway Safety to stress the advantages of using the occupant protection devices, these clubs honor their members with membership certificates and an annual luncheon.

Applications for membership may be obtained by contacting Becky Webster, the office's occupant protection coordinator, at Governor's Office of Highway Safety, Box 23039, Jackson 39225-3039, telephone 359-7880. Completed applications should be returned as soon as possible.

"These clubs, by honoring those who are alive today because of the occupant protection devices, strive to encourage others to emulate these important safety steps," said Donald O'Cain, governor's representative for highway safety.

Our studies indicate that as many as 325 of those killed could be saved every year by these devices," O'Cain said. "Their families and friends could have celebrated their decisions to use occupant protection devices rather than mourn their loss."

"Motorists should remember that even 'safe drivers' can be involved in motor vehicle crashes," he said, "but safety belts, child protective devices, motorcycling helmets and air bags can prevent the crashes from

resulting in death or serious injury to motor vehicle occupants."

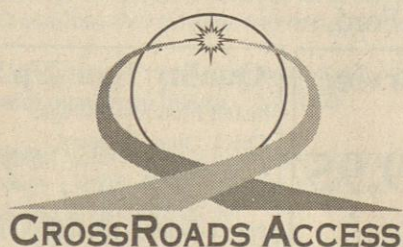
