

Two Homes Damaged In Monday Night Fires

Two homes were damaged Monday night in fires; one of which was caused by a lightning strike during the unseasonal thunderstorms that covered the state.

At about 7 p.m. the Iuka Fire Department responded to a fire at ne fin a vacant house at 1539 W. Ash. The house is owned by Guy Barnes and was one-third involved in flames when firefighters arrived, according to Mike Thomas of the Iuka Fire Department. The fire was put out within minutes and though there is little visual damage outside, the interior was badly damaged, said Thomas. Cause of the fire is under investigation.

At about 10:15 p.m. Monday night, firefighters from the Midway volunteer unit responded to a fire at the home of Ruby Rast at 310 County Road 957, according to Thomas Walker, of the Midway Volunteer Fire Department. The fire was apparently caused by a lightning strike and the home suffered minimal damage, mostly from where firefighters had to remove siding from the exterior to get to the fire,

Eastport-Mill Creek volunteers responded to requests for back up to the early fire, and Snowdown-Pleasant Hill volunteers backed up the Midway fire officials reported.

Grand Jury Report Calls For New Jail, Cleanup and Repairs At Courthouse

The grand jury has recommended in their semi-annual report that county supervisors should consider building a new iail, and make improvements in the cleanliness and maintenance of the county courthouse.

In addition to the annual inspection report, the grand jury returned 27 indictments, which the sheriff's department and district attorney's office will take action upon in the next few weeks and months.

Sheriff Supports New Jail

Sheriff David Smith supports the recommendation for a new or remodeled jail. At this time, Smith said, the jail is almost full, with about 20 inmates in the facility that can hold as many as 24 men and women. Some have been incarcerated as long as ten months at this time.

The facility was built in 1972, Smith said. "It was built to meet the demands of the time, without looking 20 years down the road

and the needs we have now." Smith said as long as we keep getting more and more people, there's going to be more and more crime, and he would like to see any new facility built with that in

In nearby Alcorn County, where the crime rate and the rate of violent crimes especially, is much higher according to district attorney office representatives, they recently received a federal recommendation for about a 50 or 60 bed facility. The facility currently in use there holds about 28 and was built in 1974. The federal government has a court order on the Alcorn County facility, as well as several other jails in the state, that they only hold a certain number of inmates at one time.

According to Smith, several of the surrounding counties have jails that have been either built or remodeled in the past few years.

Maintenance is a problem, Smith said. General cleaning is done by jail trustees, who, as any visitor will notice, are not professionals in the janitorial arts, or lack the motivation to clean,

perhaps. There is a contract, which Smith says has already been paid, to replace and fix some of the dilapidated light fixtures cited by the grand jury. Supervisor Dale Price verified that the

Courthouse Repairs And Cleanup In Work

Actions are being taken to make minor repairs in the Tishomingo County Courthouse, as were recently cited in a grand jury report of the facility.

After a representative of the Iuka Fire Department went over some areas cited in the report, it was determined that the sprinkler system, fire alarms and fire extinguishers throughout the building are indeed in working order, and in fact, were serviced and in-

spected as late as September 1996, which fire department spokesmen say is in line with annual inspection requirements. Rooms cited as "fire hazards" were reported by fire inspectors to be just untidy, which has already been remedied, said the spokesman.

Most other areas of the report will be addressed in the next month or so, if they have not already been fixed, said Dale Price, President of the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors.

Tishomingo Phone Customers Finally Have Choice In Long Distance Service

Local telephone customers in Tishomingo will finally have a choice of long-distance service carriers, according to officials from Frontier Communications of Mississippi, Inc., who have issued about 6,000 customers equal access ballots by mail in the past


According to Bill White, vice-president and general manager of Frontier in Rienzi, 6,000 customers in Tishomingo, Rienzi, Guntown, and Houlka, Mississippi will have a choice of about a dozen long distance carriers, which are listed on an equal access ballot that customers are required to send back to the company by February 21, 1997.

Service by the newly chosen carriers will begin the second week of April, said White: About \$500,000 worth of new equipment is scheduled to be installed by

Previous to this action, most all Frontier customers received their long distance service and rates from AT&T, and were unable to switch to any different carrier

Frontier Communications took over Mid-South Telephone in Tishomingo about 1990, though no changes were obvious to customers until about 1992, when the billings officially began coming from Frontier, White said.

Comes now the Grand Jury of signs need lightbulbs. The latcher on Tishomingo County, Mississippi, being duly empaneled on the 17th day of December, 1996 for the January, 1997 Term of the Circuit Court of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, and

Courthouse

We found the Courthouse to be structurally sound, but not being sufficiently maintained or kept clean. In particular, we recommend that the large patched spot over the Judge's Bench be repaired. The building should either be designated as a nonsmoking facility or certain areas designated as smoking locations. There are insufficient and outdated fire alarms and extinguishers throughout the building. The Appraiser's Office is hazardous with electrical cords everywhere. Additionally, that office needs a telephone on the counter. All of the air condition grates need cleaning and the filters need replacing. The Exit

the power boxes have still not been fixed. Storage room 205 needs to be cleaned. Hazardous materials should be labeled and held behind locked doors. Room 103 is a fire hazard. The County Cooperative Agent's kitchen is deplorable. There is a broken window in the Tax Collector's Office. All of the bathrooms should be kept in better order.

We believe that the Board of Supervisors should consider building a new jail. In the meantime, the lights in the cells need proper safety covers. Wiring should be properly covered. The commode in the last cell is broken. All of the water pipes are rusted. The shower curtains need replacing or hung with something other than coat hanger wire. Several windows are broken and should be replaced. A general cleaning is recommended.

Now having submitted this report, we ask to be discharged subject to recall at a later date as circumstances may be required upon further Order of this Court

How Is Your Property Held?

Several people have stopped by our office in the courthouse recently on their way to pay property taxes. It is that time of

None of us relish paying taxes, but most of us don't take the time to become well-enough informed about tax laws and regulations to minimize that tax bite, or even to protect our families. Now, with property taxes due, would be a good time to check on titles to any property you own and see how it is written. While this may not affect your taxes now, it can hold some surprises if you decide to sell the property or bequeath it to your

Title is the way in which property is owned, and can affect how your property is transferred, who will get it, and the eventual costs of estate settlement and taxes. There are three basic types of property ownership in Mississippi, with each ownership method having its own advantages

and disadvantages.

There are also two basic types of property - real and personal. Real property is land and whatever is growing on or affixed to it; personal property is any asset with ownership through physical possession or documents showing ownership, such as a bank

Forms of property ownership are typically either sole ownership, joint tenancy, or in common. Each ownership method has its advantages and disadvantages and

must be weighed in light of one's situation and specific estate management goals.

Sole ownership of property is characterized by a single owner who may generally do as she pleases with the property during his or her lifetime, excepting for some legal restraints. A sole owner may designate its disposition after his/her death, but solely owned real and personal property will be included in the gross estate and may be subject to estate taxes and to probate to clear

Tenancy in common and joint tenancy are both forms of coownership, but are very different. With tenancy in common, two or more persons hold undivided interests in the same property with no right of survivorship for the surviving tenant(s). Each tenant in common has the right to transfer his proportional share by selling it, giving it away, or by transferring it to persons of his choice at his death by means of a will.

If the title to real estate is held by persons as tenants in common, all co-tenants have equal rights to manage and live on the property. Upon the death of one, that tenant's interest passes to his or her heirs according to state law or that tenant's will. This can make it difficult to transfer a clear title, especially in the case of minor or lost heirs.

Joint tenancy is one of the most popular and least understood means of owning property. After a couple marries they generally place property in joint tenancy. but this type of title is not limited to husband and wife. It may be brother/sister, mother/daughter or unrelated individuals.

Joint tenancy with right of survivorship in which two or more tenants own the same property is subject to the co-owner's right. In general, when a joint tenant dies, economic interest automatically passes to any surviving joint tenant. This can be good in some circumstances, but not all. For example, if two brothers own land as joint tenants with right of survivorship and one of them dies, the surviving brother becomes sole owner, and the deceased brother's wife and children would not have any legal claim to he property.

AFFECTS EYES

Swimming can affect your eyes. Excessive chlorination in a swimming pool or abnormal pH (acidity) will cause the death of superficial cells of the cornea. The resulting gritty sensation in the eyes takes about 24 hours to heal. Redness, watering and blurry vision may occur. This is preventable by wearing swimming goggles.

In "swimming pool" conjunctivitis, only one agent - adenovirus - is known to be the cause. In lakes, however, conjunctivitis can be caused by a variety of organisms including fungus. Goggles in swimming can prevent this infection.

Is salt water more harmful to the eyes than fresh water? Just the opposite. Fresh waster is hypotonic, that is, it contains less salt than the normal cornea. Prolonged immersion in fresh water will cause the cornea to swell (corneal edema) and cause you to see halos around lights and have blurred vision. Salt water more nearly simulates tears; it is a more natural environment for the eyes.

wean her slowly Zenobia Grantham met my dad, Jess Oaks, in 1936, when he was in the Army, stationed at Ft. Benning, Ga. Dad accompanied an Army buddy on a visit to his home near Ozark, Ala. The friend arranged a date with the sister of his girl friend. The date was with Zenobia.

They married in Ozark in September, 1937, and after a one day honeymoon in Montgomery, came to Tishomingo County where Dad had returned to farm after my grandfather, Dock Oaks, died in April of the same year.

Although she was only eighteen when she moved to the Midway community in 1937, Mother soon became involved in community activities.

"About the only things outside of housekeeping for me in those days were the Midway Home Demonstration Club and the Methodist Women at Spring Hill," she said. "in 1940 I was able to go to Washington to the National Home Demonstration Convention. That was my first long trip alone and it was quite a thrill. I left from Iuka and rode the Tennesseean. We went in the fall and I remember how beautiful the sights were through Tennessee and Virginia."

"Jess had joined the Farm Bureau the first year we married," she said. "But my first work with Farm Bureau was in the early "40s when Jess was selling charter policies for Farm Bureau when the life insurance company was first formed. He worked in Tishomingo and Itawamba counties. This was just something he did as county Farm Bureau President. He did the selling and I would fill out the paper work on the applications."

Then came the World War II years. This period defined the future for both my parents and changed their outlook and expectations.

"Jess was on a trip to Chicago to the American Farm Bureau Convention in December, 1941, when Pearl Harbor was attacked," she said. "He and Will Cresap had sold the most memberships in Tishomingo County, and part of their expenses for the trip were paid."

Dad was 32 at the time and probably would not have been drafted, but in early 1943 he went back into the Army. Like many women in those years, Mother took on additional responsibilities that hastened her maturity as a young woman. The war experience also convinced Dad that he wanted to do something other than farm the rest of his life. I think the old World War I song, "How you going to keep'em down on the farm, after they've seen Parie?" fit my Dad perfectly. Although he continued to farm after the war ended, he was looking for another way to make a

In 1954, the opportunity came when Mississippi Farm Bureau Insurance needed an agent for Tishomingo County.

"We were running a store at Midway at that time," Mother said. "When Jess became the

agent, I was elected Tishomingo County Farm Bureau secretary that same year."

For the next 42 years she proudly filled that position.

"That first year I started working at the Farm Bureau office in Iuka about three days each week. Our first office was in the old Co-op building. First we were upstairs, then we moved downstairs toward the back, and finally we moved the office to the front northeast corner. We were there when the building burned in 1977. Then we built the building that we presently use."

"When I started we had less than 100 members in the county,' she said. "Now we have one of the, largest memberships in the state, more than 3,000."

"I've seen lots of changes. For years we processed all the membership by hand. Now most all that work is done by computer. We used to do all our correspondence with the home office in Jackson by mail. We had to wait three or four days for a reply. Now we get information back by fax or e-mail within the

One thing that has not changed is her regard for the people she served.

"In the last few years I have been dealing with children, and often grandchildren, of people that we insured in the early days," she said. "But dealing with people was the part I like best, and that is one thing that has stayed the same. I always tried to treat everyone who came in the office with respect and dignity. I worked hard, but I enjoyed every minute of it."

After my Dad retired as an agent in 1975, Mother continued to work as secretary, first with Carlos Ginn and Mackie Wade, and last with Billy Rainey, Kenny Phifer and James Crowell. She also helped train Debbie Woodruff, Donna McAnally and Theresa Dexter as Farm Bureau secretaries.

"I'm just crazy about all of them," she said. "I don't know how to best put my love for them into words.

It was easy to tell by the reactions of those who came to the Tishomingo County Farm Bureau office on January 19 that the love flowed both ways.





The books to be evaluated for sideration of this award, went ough some rigorous testing. blishers selected and sent the oks to five review teams in fferent regions of the United ates. Each team consisted of a hildren's literature specialist plus one or more classroom teachers who in turn worked with other teachers, school brarians, and 2,000 children. broughout the school year the ks were in classrooms, being read to or by children. Letter To The Editor

I thought that the last letter that I wrote to the editor would awaken the citizens of Iuka and especially the elected officials who were committing or permitting illegal practices in the City of Iuka. But I was wrong. Things have gotten worse and some of our elected officials are behind it all.

Approximately two months ago I wrote an article telling the people how Police Chief Amos Bates was using and letting his officers use illegal radar in the City of Iuka and especially on the four lane (Highway 72). As far as I can tell he did nothing to correct the situation, except to state in a paper that he didn't have to follow the same rules as the other Iuka Police Officers. I am still trying to find out where he took an alleged 3 week training course for newly elected Chiefs of Police.

Anyway on December the 29, 1996, Officer J.C. Ledgewood wrote a speeding ticket to Nim Wilson. Nim is the son of Charles Wilson of Iuka.

After he got the ticket Nim

called me at home and asked me about the radar and did I think it was still being used in an illegal manner. I told him that I thought it was. I also told him to call Officer Ledgewood at home and ask him flat out if he could legally write speeding tickets. Nim hung up and then called back a few minutes later. He said that Officer Ledgewood had told him that he wasn't certified on radar but that he had a radar machine in his car.

A few days later I saw Nim and he told me that Chief Amos Bates had told him to give him a few days and he would see what he could do about the ticket. I assumed that Amos would void the ticket because it was illegally written. Nothing else was said about the ticket until the day of

I called city hall and talked to the clerk who helps with the

docket during city court. I asked her what the fine was for doing 20 MpH over the limit and she said it would be \$53.50. I told her that it would be \$107.00 for Nim because for that much we could appeal it to the circuit court and get a fair judge and jury. I said that all we'd get for \$53.50 was a "kangaroo court". As you will see,

I was right!

At about 5:55 p.m. on court day, I received a phone call from a friend of mine. He stated that an Iuka Police Officer had just called him and said that if he could talk me out of going to court that the ticket against Nim Wilson would be taken care of (if you know what

Charles Wilson, (Nim's father), and I figure that Chief Bates and the others that I am about to name, didn't want me to show up in a public court and tell the people about the Iuka Police Department using radar that wasn't fully authorized.

After my phone call I started over to Charles Wilson's home to pick up his son. He stopped me in the road and said that he had received 3 phone calls within the last ten minutes.

The one you people should be interested in came from Alderman Herbert Doyle Booker. Charles daughter answered the phone and told Charles who it was. (By the way, Charles Wilson has a speaker on his phone.) Charles told me that Alderman Booker said in effect, that if he could talk me out of showing up in court, that he, (Booker), and Chief Bates would have the ticket taken care of, as had been promised weeks before.

Charles told Mr. Booker that I was a grown man and that he couldn't stop me from going anywhere. That pretty much ended the conversation.

Nim and I showed up in court at around 6:25 p.m. He was the last one to be called. But I had already seen that coming. City Judge Steve Jackson asked Nim how he would plead and Nim said "Not guilty". Then the judge let Nim ask questions to Officer Ledgewood.

I had written a list of questions for Nim to ask because I wanted to see how Officer Ledgeweood would respond. When asked one specific question about the radar equipment and log sheets, Officer Ledgewood stated that "we're (Iuka Police) not the Highway Patrol, we don't have to go by those rules", or words to that effect.

After Officer Ledgewood had testified about not knowing the last time that the radar machines had been calibrated and then looking over to Chief Bates as if seeking help, (which he didn't get because Chief Bates probably didn't know the answer

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either), the city judge looked at Nim and said that he was guilty and that the fine would be \$100.00! It had gone up \$46.50

since that afternoon; why? I spoke to the prosecuting attorney for the city and he said that if someone contested their case, that they should be told to

come back later and be tried in his

presence.

Yet Judge Jackson sent a man home who allegedly had four D.U.I's and another who allegedly abused his wife. He sent a good many home except for Nim Wilson. And why in the world would he raise Nim's fine just because he contested his case? This procedure will make innocent people not want to speak up for fear of a larger fine. Also, in my opinion, Nim should have never been found guilty without the city prosecutor present.

As for Officer Ledgewood, according to my source at the Attorney General's office, he didn't tell the truth on the witness stand. The man at the A.G's office said that I could inform people that the next time they got a speeding ticket from an officer with the Iuka Police Department that they could file charges against that officer, if the conditions for using radar aren't brought up to

As for any of you people who want to try and tell me that Amos Bates, Herbert Booker and Officer Ledgewood don't appear to be lying; Mr. Charles Wilson

said to feel free to stop by his house at 1240 Ash Street in Iuka and he'll tell you what happened while looking you in the eye.

Mr. Wilson also asked me to say that Chief Bates, Alderman Booker and Officer Ledgewood are in his opinion lower than a snakes tracks and he doesn't wish to see any of them until his son's circuit court date this year.

To all you fine, honest citizens of Iuka, it is time to end what I believe to be corruption in our city. The election is in May of this year. Let's fix what's broke.

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

Producers in the county might have questions about seeding forages in spring. As a general rule, cool-season forages are best seeded in the fall and warmseason forages are best seeded in the spring. But some forages can be seeded at any time. Tall fescue, white clover and red clover are suitable for fall seeding. If they are planted in early spring and have ideal growing weather, they can be

The main problem in planting cool-season forages in spring comes from its competition with annual summer weeds. Weed control in this instance is "crucial" and a chore that some producers won't want to tackle.

Warm-season forages can better handle weed problems. Some choices producers have include sorghum-sundangrass or bermudagrass.



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

Many Mississippians On Hand For Historic Inaugural Ceremonies

More than 100 Mississippians from the First Congressional district came to Washington, D.C., to observe and participate in the presidential inaugural activities on January 20. They joined a crowd of a 250,000 people on the west from of the U.S. Capitol to witness the swearing-in ceremony that represents the orderly transfer of power in our great democracy.

Instead of shifting the power of the presidency from one party to another, this event marked the first time a Democrat had been sworn-in for a second term since 1937. But on this day, there were no Republicans or Democrats on hand to watch Bill Clinton take the oath of office - only Americans. No matter our party affiliation, all Americans should be proud of this process that has endured for more than two centuries as one of the foundations of our political

Few would argue with that sentiment and there is, in fact, much on which Mr. Clinton and this Congress can agree. He said each of us must assume personal responsibility, not only for ourselves and our families, but for our neighbors and our nation. He also spoke of the need to balance the budget, improve our education system, and ensure a solvent retirement and health care system for our senior citizens.

The Challenges of the New Congress

For the first time in 68 years, the American people have returned a Republican majority to Congress. While this means most Americans agree with our agenda for reducing the size of the federal government and returning power to the local level, it also means we have many challenges before us.

The 104th Congress was often marked by acrimonious debates between Congressional leaders and the White House. Consequently, gridlock was a frequent result. This pattern dominated much of the past two years, but we were able to break through the gridlock during the end of the last Congress and deliver some very important reforms. I am proud of the work we were able to accomplish at the end of the 104th Congress and believe the American people expect nothing less from this

Perhaps even more challenges face this Congress than its predecessor. In keeping with tradition we in Congress are willing to give the President the "first at-bat." In other words, we are going to let him present his agenda and outline where he would like to lead the country. But, regardless of what agenda the President submits, there are several items which are clamoring for attention and must be addressed.

Last year we passed a welfare reform law which marks the first major change in this country's approach to public assistance in over 50 years. This new Congress must now be vigilant in protecting that welfare

Of course, a top priority for this Congress is getting our country moving in the right direction economically. This means passing an economic growth package which would include tax relief for working families. The package would also seek to free individuals and businesses from the burden of over-regulation.

At the heart of any economic stimulus package will be the continuing efforts to pass a Balanced Budget Amendment to the Constitution which will keep your federal government on the straight-and-narrow when it comes to spending. This is imperative for ensuring our country's future financial stability and that of our children and grandchildren. We simply cannot continue spending more money than we take in, and a Balanced Budget Amendment would take that option away from the government.

Another subject which will be tackled by this Congress is the ongoing problem with the country's tax system. I want to have a dialogue with the American people concerning the tax code, and to open hearings with two fundamental questions: Is this system broken? Can we come up with a better system? We not have the answers yet, but it is something which must be considered.

Congress is also likely to be active in the area of campaign reform during this term. Notice I did not say campaign "finance" reform. That is because I believe the problem is much larger than just the financial structuring of political campaigns. To begin, I plan to request hearings on campaign reform and open a discussion of what can be done to improve the situation. The Senate also has a responsibility to look into allegations of what appears to be wrongdoing in the just-completed campaign, but that will not be the primary focus of this Congress.

The 104th Congress ended with the highest approval ratings of any Congress in a decade. We managed to work for the American people and pass real reforms in order to rein-in government. Nothing less will be acceptable for this new Congress. (1/27/97)

War Recollections

The following article is taken from The Vidette May 2, 1912 by A. T. Scruggs and sent in to the Tishomingo County News by Mrs.

Grace W. Coker. Our last article was concerning incidents occuring in me as and around Leesburg, where we spent the winter of 1861-62. It was h dayd a very cold winter but we were comfortably situated in a good county and had plenty to eat. Early in March 1862 we broke camp and marched to South Crossing the D. DRAG Rappahamcock River on a bridge. IUKAn We were accompanied by a large convoy of beef cattle and a big wagon train of wheat. When we came to the Rapidan there was no bridge and we had to ford it, the wagons also safely forded it. The F SALE stream was about as large as Bear Creek, we camped near this ford for a week and four inches of snow fell while we were there. While ust is the lere we got our 1st news of the battle of Shiloh. Several recruits nancer came to us at this place. I remember the following who came Rae den to our County; Henry Flynt, John T. Mid Cantrell, James Bumpuss, Jasper holdes Lankford, Squire Hellums and others. When we left this place it was with orders to march to Counce Courthouse. Then we boarded a train to Richmond. From Richmond over the York River

> some cabins that were filled with Varmints. This was our 1st introduction to that great pest of camps - the body louse - which had been left here by thousands. We stayed here about a week, the Yankees shelling us every day. There were no casualities in our immediate command but some were killed and wounded in other commands. One day after it had been raining it cleared off and we

mentioned, at Yorktown, when the Confederate battery got ready to fire, the base on one of the guns did not ignite promptly, and when it did make a noise about like a Flobert, Joslyn was nearby and jumped up exclaiming. "Now - I reckon you see a cannon does snap." At the end of about a week we were moved back on a line of battle and put to work throwing up trenches. We were here about 10 days. Skirmishing between our pickets and the enemy's was going on most of the time. On the 10th night orders were sent around whispering to the sentinels to fall back to where the command had been, it having already fallen back, when we reached the place every man was ordered to open his knife and slit the tents into tatters, completely destroying them. This was because they were afraid to burn them, because this would give the Yankees notice we were retreating. Having destroyed the tents we followed the brigade as rear guard. The rain was falling and the roads were awful muddy. It was dark as Egypt and it was a terrible march. We reached the old town of Williamsburg about daylight and bathed in the surburbs and laydown to sleep, at least I did. We slept an hour, I suppose when an alarm was raised that the enemy was on us. I got up and rubbed by eyes and sure enough here came a reg of Pennsylvania calvary, called the Bucktails. We were ordered to fire on them as they came in columns of fours and did so, killing many horses and men. The survivors fled. Then we marched through the town. Just outside we met Longstreet a division of Infantry. Countermarching to meet the enemy. In about 2 hours we heard heavy firing in the rear and knew that Longstreet's men were

him. He had been joked a good

deal about this and on the day

marched about 4 miles by this time and halted. Wounded Confederates came in great numbers. There were more slightly wounded men than I ever

saw in any battle. The loss on both sides were heavy. The Yankees were driven back and many pieces of fine artillery captured. The Richmond Horvitzers, the artillery

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attached to our brigade, had, inferior guns. They chopped down their carriages, spiked their guns and hitched their teams to the captured artillery. For about 3 weeks we marched and countermarched between West Point and Richmond but did no fighting except picket fighting.

The Vidette - June 13, 1912 By A.T. Scruggs

Next morning we moved out across Spring Creek and marched west to the top of the hill about a mile west of Tuscumbia where we dismounted and formed line of battle. The enemy were already in motion and in sight formed in single line with Calvary flankers. We had not more than got in line before a sharp skirmish began and the bullets were soon whistling around our heads. We held our ground about a half hour when the Yankees commenced coming around our left flank, which their large force easily enabled them to do. We had several men wounded here. Then we fell back, mounted our horses and marched back through town and took the road toward Leighton we marched about 3 miles, unmolested by the enemy, till we reached a point near the Shines Place. The Brigade halted here and formed a line across the road. Our right wing was in a woodlot and our left in an open field. Lieut. Sam Dean took a squad of 5 men which he carried north of our right wing to look for a flanking movement. According to my recollections, the men in this Scout consisted of myself, Col. Bullard, Jack Morris, G.W. Hutton, and Mack Ross. Three of

us are still living, and the other 3

including Lt. Dean have passed over the river. We had not gone over 1/4 mile through the dense timber until we ran into a Yankee scouting party of about the same number as our force. Lt. Dean was the first to discover them and drawing his pistol, fired at them and we followed suit. They fled at once, but we did not go any further as we could see the line of battle by this time. Besides their battery began throwing shells into the woods and we returned to the command. Here our command stood its ground and skirmished for perhaps 2 hours. We had several, Archie Thompson, and I think, Jack Gurley wounded in this skirmish. From here we fell back to a farm near Leighton, the enemy pressing us fiercely as we fell back. Here we met Edmondson's, Tenn. Cav. reg. of Forrest's Command to which was formed dismounted behind a fence on the right. The Yankees were right behind a fence on the right. The Yankees were right behind us in a charge. Edmondson's men waited until they got within musket shot, when they let loose a volley which stopped the enemy's advance and sent the survivors flying to the rear. We continued on until we crossed Town Creek, a rapid mountain stream, where we stopped to rest. All of Forrest's Command were congregated here or soon reached here. Skirmishing soon began with the enemy and continued that evening. The Yankees made no serious attempt to cross the creek but contented themselves with skirmishing at

long range. In their rear the smoke of burning houses was seen ascending as they literally applied the torch to nearly every building in their course. Gen. Forrest soon become convinced that the Yankees were only trying to hold him engaged while Straight's raid got away in the direction of Moulton. In fact his scouts brought

in news to the effect that Straights

men were already several miles on their way toward Moulton and he began making preparations to

follow. The first thing was to select such men only as were well mounted, all who had crippled or worn out horses were left in the wagon train. Double rounds of ammunition were issued to each man who could go

War Recollection Of J.C. Morris

I was about 16 years old when I enlisted in the 7th Alabama Calvary, Captain John Browns Company at Dickson, Ala. in May 1862. Stayed camped there about 1 month and went from there to Corinth, where our Company joined the regiment. Only stayed a few days when the whole of Roddy's Brigade, of which our reg formed a part, was orded to No. Alabama. Soon afterward we troops, who had been sent foreward to cover the great raid of Gen. Straight. This raid was made by a picked force of about 1800 men which had loaded at Eastport and which was intended to go to Rome, Ga., and destroy the Confederate factories and iron workers. Our skirmishing with Dodge's forces began soon after they had crossed Bear Creek at Stemini Ferry, and continued on to Town Creek, Ala. Gen. Forrest was in command of our brigade and had brought 2 other brigades of Calvary to our help. Gen. Straights forces had already started on their raid and Gen. Forrest found this out from his scouts. He prepared to follow Straight as quickly as possible. In a few hours we were in the saddle and struck out toward Moulton,



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

contractor has not satisfactorily completed the promised work.

Costs are very high to have someone come in to make repairs,

or clean, Smith said. Additionally, the inmates often abuse the facility, and have occasionally broken out lights that were allegedly shining in their eyes, Smith said. There are no lights in the individual cells, only long uncovered florescent fixtures in the halls.

Most Recent Improvements Court Ordered

The last major improvement to the Tishomingo County jail took place recently, as a result of a July 1995 circuit court verdict that required the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors make improvements in the ventilation system.

In Billy M. Cruse vs. (then) sheriff Johnny Nunley, and the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors, findings signed by special circuit judge Joe Pigott stated that "the jail by design and construction fails to meet bare minimum standard for housing human beings and to hold prisoners in such a jail without any air movement during the summer heat above ninety degrees Fahrenheit is cruel and unusual punishment in violation of the Eighth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution and Section 28 of the Mississippi Constitution.'

As a result of this case, the supervisors installed a new \$12,000 air conditioning system that feeds adequate air and ventilation into the two halls of the county and state prisoner

areas, as was cited to be a problem in the case.

Additionally, the cell areas were all repainted last year, according to Dale Price, president of the board of supervisors. **Juvenile Offenders Transported**

Juveniles, according to state laws, cannot be detained in the sight or hearing of adult prisoners. and so the sheriff has to utilize juvenile detention centers in nearby counties, tying up a deputy for about 3 to 4 hours transporting juvenile prisoners to the Pontotoc or Lee County facilities. The newly completed Alcorn County iuvenile detention center will help this situation, Smith said, and take up less time and manpower. "However, we have to pay \$75 a night for each juvenile, and cannot transport them until they see a judge," he said.

Since crime fighting doesn't always happen during normal business hours, this has sometimes meant a deputy staying up all night at the courthouse

where they can hold juvenile detainees in a locked room there, Smith said.

Layout of the Jail

The jail, which is in the same building as the sheriff's office and the 911 dispatching operation, is separated into four different areas for county offenders, state offenders, women's quarters and trustees' quarters. In addition, there is a "drunk tank", which is about 10 by 12 feet, with no windows, one toilet, and a mattress on the floor.

The women's and trustees' areas are each one large room, with four bunk beds in each area, a shower with a curtain, and a toilet which is open to the whole

In the state and county areas, there are four cells each with four bunks and a toilet in each, and a common "day" room, which has a sho ./er and a toilet, along with a long table, chairs and a small television. The cells on each of the two state and county halls stay open most of the day, so the prisoners are free to roam the two separated areas.

This plan makes it difficult to keep some prisoners separated, Smith said. In a conspiracy case it is often necessary to keep inmates from discussing cases. Sometimes they even transport suspects to Alcorn County to keep them separate.

Between the two state and county halls is a 2 or 3 foot wide maintenance space that could only be described as disgusting, with cobwebs and dirt in an area filled up with piping and conduit, that is understandably difficult to clean. Smith said that in fact, a person almost got stuck in there recently while trying to change lightbulbs. A lack of storage areas in the building has caused this narrow area to be used for storage of partially-filled paint cans and old

Sheriff Office Area

More people than ever are now employed in the sheriff's department/jail building, Smith said. In addition to sheriff's department personnel, the 911 dispatching office is there.

There is no suspect detaining room, or interrogation area, and the facility lacks adequate storage as evidenced by piles of supplies and equipment piled in any available corner, and even in a bathtub in the bathroom. There are only two other offices in addition to the sheriff's, a bathroom, the front 911 dispatching and reception area, and a central kitchen area. Fortunately, the nature of the department's work doesn't call for the dozen or so persons employed by the department to share the limited office space.

New Jail Possibilities

According to Supervisor Dale Price, a new jail along the lines of what is desired would cost about \$1.5 million to build. Since grant money for building new jails is limited at this time, Price said, another option would be a tax/millage increase that over ten years would probably cost the average county taxpayer about \$35 to \$40 a year.

"Until then we will just have to patch what we can," Price.

Female cats can be spayed (ovariohysterectomy) when they reach at least 2 1/2 pounds of weight. This is before they come into heat. Female dogs need to be spayed (ovariohysterectomy) before 6 months of age. Some dogs will begin their heat cycle at 6 months of age.

Male cats need to be neutered (castrated) as early as 7 months of age. Male dogs can be neutered (castrated) as early as 6 months of age. Just remember to be a responsible pet owner and not allow unwanted animals to be brought into the world.
