Several Fires In The Last Week **Kept County Firefighters Occupied**

Several homes and families were affected by fires in the past

Monday afternoon a fourbedroom home at 47 County Road 290 belonging to Arthur and Patricia Green was destroyed by fire. No one was hurt in the blaze, which was well underway when members of the Coleman Park Volunteer Fire Department and Harmony Central arrived on the scene, according to Jimmy Brown of the Coleman Park volunteers.

Patricia Green and two of the children had just left the dwelling to make some phone calls at Jackie's Restaurant about 10 minutes before the fire was reported.

Cause of the fire is undetermined, but is not under investigation, since the home was reportedly not insured, according to Brown and County Arson Investigator Thomas Walker.

Neighbors of the Greens have organized an effort to help the family, who lost everything.

Donations of clothing or funds can be made at the Casabella Trailer Park on County Road 989 or call 423-2936, according to Jackie Casabella. The Greens have a two girls, three years and six years, and a boy 2 years old. Murphy Fire Under

Investigation About 5 p.m. Monday night Paden and Tishomingo Volunteer Fire Departments managed to limit damage to a vacant home at 16 County Road 124. The house, which belonged to Glenda Murphy, was unoccupied and there was no electrical service, said Investigator Thomas Walker. The cause of the fire is under investigation, said Walker.

Woods Fire Near Indian Creek At about 2:30 p.m. Tuesday a grass fire spread into neighboring woods, causing some damage behind a house at 232 County Road 261 near Indian Creek, and then restarted about 7:30 p.m. that night. Homeowners were unaware the woods fire had restarted until someone driving by told them,

according to eyewitnesses at the

Walker said the early reckless fire was due to human factor. Apparently a fire cracker thrown out in the yard ignited the grass, and spread up a hill into the nearby woods that afternoon. The home was not significantly damaged, but several sheds behind the home were destroyed in the evening fire. Members of the Eastport-Mill Creek and First Volunteer Departments responded and were backed up by the Iuka Fire Department. Hay Fire Sunday

Approximately 50 large round bales of hay burned around noon last Sunday at Airport Road and U.S. Highway 72 near the home of H.L. "Trail" Nunley according to Iuka fireman Gene Gober, who responded along with volunteers from Snowdown Pleasant Hill.

Apparently the fire caught on from a burning brush pile about 20-30 feet away from the hay, said Gober. About 20 bales were saved.

County Schools Retain High 4.5 Accreditation

Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District received for the second year a 4.5 accreditation rating from the Mississippi State Department of Education and district officials are busy making sure the district got the score it deserved.

The highest possible score is 5.0, and seven other area districts received the "exceptional" rating. Several other area districts have resubmitted data and have had their originally reported ratings raised. Alcorn County was raised from a 4.9 to a 5.0 and New Albany was raised from a 3.9 to a

According to Tishomingo County School Superintendent Dr. Carl Weeden, there are three areas he and other district officials are reviewing to make sure the county received an accurate

Results are based on all 3,238 enrolled students in the district including the two high schools, four junior highs and four elementaries. There are 37 indicators on which the rating is based.

Graduation rate for the district was 73.8 percent, just a little below the 5.0 level requirement of 75 percent, according to Weeden. The calculation for determining the rate is based on accurate reporting, and that is what they are double-checking, said Assistant Superintendent Stanley

Another criteria in which the county scores were below the 5.0 requirement was the math scoring on the FLE (Functional Literacy Exam) that all 11th graders must pass before graduating. The 5.0 requirement is an average of 273.2 and Tishomingo County students average scoring was 271.9. Magill said that they are working to address the problem, which may be due in part to the fact that many junior level students have not had in the past three years the kind of math on the FLE, said Magill. They will be concentrating on refreshing students in the appropriate type of math before the next scheduled test, April 28-29, 1997, he said.

The third criteria in which county schools failed to meet the mark was due in part to possible student misinterpretation of a question on the ACT, said Weeden. Reportedly there is a question on the ACT registration form that asks students if they have taken ACT Core classes. Students have a choice of "have taken", "no, have not taken," or "may take" in response to the question and apparently rather than indicating they "may take" the course before their high school graduation, they are marking "no, have not taken." This could cause the report to indicate that the district does not offer ACT core classes, when in fact they do, said Magill. Action will be taken to make sure the students more fully understand the question, he said.

The scoring has improved in some areas, most notably in overall areas in the 4th, 5th, 7th and 9th grades, Magill reported. On the 9th grade integrated language arts criteria we exceeded the 467.9 required score with a 496.1, he said.

Work At Home?

Home-based Business and Entrepreneurship was a topic at the Farm and Home Technology Conference in Corinth last week that drew considerable interest. Several persons in attendance were already involved; others were exploring ideas.

One rather novel idea for this area is called "community supported agriculture" in which contracts are made between individual consumers and producers for fresh vegetables and fruits in season. This appears to be advantageous for both parties, and I trust we will see some trail runs.

One idea that was not discussed, perhaps because it has been around for awhile, is sewing as a business. Several years back a lot of women "took in sewing" as a way to make extra money while staying at home. It would seem that the opportunity is still there as more women have entered the work force and have less time to sew for their families.

A pertinent item in th this week was about a woman who had found a way to support her family baking muffins at home and selling them to local establishments. It was a way for her to get off Welfare until she encountered problems in meeting health regulations. Support from local citizenry gave an apparently happy ending to her difficulties but this illustrates the need to

investigate all aspects of a venture from its outset. Perhaps it also illustrates a need for more flexibility in laws and regulations, for we are beginning to realize that there may not be enough jobs in existing businesses for everyone scheduled to be removed from welfare rolls. Small and homebased business could be one

Anyone thinking of starting a home business, however, is urged to carefully analyze their reasons and the impact on family members before venturing. Some of the questions to consider prior to making that decision are:

*Do you have a marketable skill or product to sell? Think in terms of what people in your area

*Can you take responsibility? If you'd rather let someone else take charge and get the job done, perhpas you'd do better working for someone else.

*Are you a self-starter? Do you initiate things or do you need someone to get you going?

*How good an organizer are you? Having a plan before you start is important, but so is the ability to hang in there and set things straight if they get confused

*Can you make decisions? Being decisive is as important as being right, though you must also be flexible.

*How good is your health?

Being your own boss and running

a business takes a lot of energy. *Do you have the selfdiscipline to maintain a work schedule at home? Can you switch from home responsibilities to work under the same roof?

Is there adequate space in your home for your work? Will it interfere with family living?

Are you a risk-taker? Do you have the money to cover initial start-up and costs or can you borrow without jeopardizing your family's security?

Do you need the money? If making a profit is not important to you, perhaps you'd do better keeping your activity as a hobby.

The independence of being your own boss are advantages of a home-based business. But there are trade-offs, like the security of a regular paycheck and benefits.

The small specks or "bugs" that many people see moving in their field of vision are called floaters. They are frequently visible when looking at a plain background, such as a blank wall or blue sky. Floaters were described long ago in Roman times as "muscae volitantes" (flying flies).

Floaters are small clumps of gel that form in the vitreous, the clear jelly-like fluid that fills the inside cavity of the eye. Although they appear to be in front of the eye, they are usually floating in the fluid inside the eye and are seen as shadows by the retina (the light-

sensing inner layer of the eye. Seeing floaters, whether in the form of little dots, circles, lines or cobwebs, may cause concern. You can relax. They are usually of little importance, representing an aging process. The vitreous gel shrinks with time, pulls away from the retina and causes floaters. This is common in nearsighted people or after a cataract operation.

· being able to accept a second offer (called a "backup offer") so you can sell to someone else if the buyer does not perform;


• terms to protect you if you let the buyer finance the purchase by accepting some of the purchase price over time.

Why Are Dental X-Rays So Important?

Detection of caries (cavities) is probably the most frequent reason for taking dental radiographs (x-rays). It is in the diagnosis of interproximal decay that radiographs are most important. Interproximal (inbetween) caries are best seen on bite-wing radiographs. Proper dentistry cannot and should not be done without adequate diagnostic radiographs. In an adult patient not prone to caries, bitewing radiographs should be taken at least once a year. Caries susceptibility is a major factor when determining the time frame of recall radiographs.

Radiographs (x-rays) are essential in detecting diseases and for planning treatment. To view the whole mouth, a panoramic Xray is made to check a number of things: (1) for children, it is used to determine the progress and pattern of tooth eruption; (2) for teenagers and/or adults it is the prime diagnostic tool in locating and defining the position of an impacted tooth; (3) for adults, it can reveal bone loss, associated with peridontal disease, determine when an abcess is present, check for cyst. It is recommended for everyone to have a panorex every 3 years.

X-rays are an important part of a good dental checkup. The benefits are helpful to accomplish the best treatment.

The staff worked with me, closely monitored my heart rate, blood pressure and oxygen level and slowly, slowly I improved."

After two weeks I noticed I could do my everyday household chores without exhaustion. Soon, friends and neighbors began to notice the difference in my general health," said Hamilton.

"This is not just an exercise program - its a new way of life. I didn't get in this shape overnight and I know I have a long way to go to be well, but this program has given me hope.

Hamilton urges, "If you have breathing problems - talk with your doctor and get into rehabilitation. If you smoke, find someone or something more important to you than cigarettes. Stop smoking. It is never too late to take the first step to improve your health and life.'

The basic 18-week course is scheduled for Tuesday and Thursday of each week but is flexible to accommodate personal schedules. Family members are encouraged to participate because chronic lung disease affects the entire family.

WHEREAS, the Town of Burnsville, Mississippi (the "Town"), is authorized under the provisions of Miss. Code 1972 Ann. §21-27-23 and 21-27-41 through 21-27-69, as amended, to issue revenue bonds in such amounts as it may find necessary and proper in order to provide funds for the improvement of the combined water and sewer system of the Town consisting primarily of the improvement of the sewer facilities of said system of the Town; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen finds and determines that it is necessary and proper to improve the combined water and sewer system of the Town which improvements are to be done substantially in accordance with plans and specifications prepared by engineers employed by the Town and approved by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary, proper and economically feasible that the Town issue a Combined Water and Sewer System Revenue Bond, pursuant to Miss. Code 1972 Ann. §21-27-23 and 21-27-41 through 21-27-69, as amended, for the purposes herein stated and under the procedures hereinafter set forth and as provided by law.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF BURNSVILLE,

Section 1. That the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Burnsville, Mississippi (the "Town"), does hereby declare its intention to issue a Combined Water and Sewer System Revenue Bond of the town, in a total amount not to exceed One Hundred Forty Thousand Dollars (\$140,000) to raise money to pay the costs of improving the combined water and sewer system of the town consisting primarily of the improvements of the sewer facilities of said system of the Town and to pay the costs of issuing such revenue bond.

Section 2. If such protest and objection is filed on or before said date and hour, the question of the issuance of said revenue bond shall be submitted to an election to be held as provided in Miss. Code 1972 Ann., Section 21-27-43, as amended Section 4. This resolution shall be published once a week for at

least three consecutive weeks in the Tishomingo County News, a newspaper published in the City of luka, Mississippi and having a general circulation in the Town of Burnsville, Mississippi and qualified under the provisions of the laws of the State of Mississippi, and the last publication of this resolution shall be more than ten (10) days prior to the date hereinabove set forth as the deadline for the filing of any objection or protest. Section 5. The Town Clerk is hereby directed to procure from the

publisher of the aforesaid newspaper the customary proof of publication of this resolution and have the same before the Mayor and Board of Aldermen on the day and hour hereinabove specified.

Alderman Nixon seconded the motion to adopt the foregoing resolution, and the question being put to a roll call vote, the result was as follows:
