Search Continues For Identification Of Found Bones

Authorities are still searching for clues that will hopefully lead to the identification of remains found in north Tishomingo County two weeks ago.

The remains, which were verified to be human bones, were found in a wooded area May 19th, and were sent to the crime lab at Jackson, said sheriff's department investigators. Some agencies have submitted dental records for comparison, but no breaks in the case have been announced.

Tishomingo County Coroner Dale White said that no cause of death has been determined, but that the bones have been sent to a forensic anthropologist.

"If there is anything to be found out about them, they will be able to tell us," White said.

The bones do not match descriptions of any known missing persons in Tishomingo or Alcorn Counties, the sheriff verified earlier.

B & J Celebrates 27th Anniversary This Weekend "Visions of Reality"

B & J Supermarket located on Hwy. 365 in Burnsville is celebrating their 27th anniversary this week. Ads in this issue give complete details of their celebration and their many food specials in honor of this birthday.

In 1970, B & J's Supermarket was originally founded by Billy Joe and Betty Lambert on a newly built Highway now known as Highway 365 with no houses or businesses on the isolated roadway. Some gave Mr. and Mrs. Lambert little chance for success. But as everyone in Burnsville, and the surrounding area, now knows, Mr. Lambert's vision of the future was very sound.

In 1975, Butch and Buddy Hatcher purchased the then small store from the Lamberts. With little or no knowledge of the grocery business, they spent the first couple of years learning the business. At that time they established fresh meat and produce departments. With the same visions as the Lamberts, they believed the area would continue to grow. And, grow it did!

As houses continued to be built along both sides of Highway, businesses grew with it. Through the next few years they absorbed the surrounding Beauty Shop, Fabric Shop, Barber Shop and private living quarters and turned them into more space.

In 1982 the supermarket was doubled in size again. Later, upstairs offices were established to make even more selling room. Now in 1997 they have joined forces with the Lamberts' oldest son, Joe, to enlarge again.

By combining Joe's Mini Mart (built next door to B & J's in 1986), and the already well-established supermarket, another glimpse of the future has come to the town of Burnsville. By combining the younger Lamberts' knowledge of convenience store operations and Hatcher's knowledge of supermarkets, they have now opened a much larger store with a full supermarket, an express entrance for convenience (with supermarket prices), gas pumps, a garden center, three food courts that offer dine-in or carry-out service, and a dining area that can also accommodate up to 60 people for parties or other gatherings.

The younger Lamberts and Hatcher still believe in the future of Burnsville and would like to invite everyone to join them June 4th through the 10th to help celebrate the 27th anniversary of Billy Joe and Betty Lambert's vision.

One Dies In Accident Tuesday Morning

An Iuka man was killed early Tuesday morning when his truck apparently went off a county road near the Tennessee Tombigbee Waterway.

Noonan Dwight Johnson, 64, of Pickwick Circle in Iuka, was dead inside his 1983 Chevrolet S10 pickup when authorities arrived at the scene on County Road 982 (Turnpike Mountain Road) about 6:30 Tuesday, according to Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department Investigator Steve Vatalaro.

The truck was about 60 feet from the road leaned up against some trees, and investigators said that he may have lost control coming down an hill into a curve, but that the accident was still under investigation.

A passerby notified the sheriff's department after seeing the truck where it was found in heavy brush.

Tishomingo County Coroner Dale White verified that Johnson had died that morning.

Services will be at 2 p.m. Thursday, June 5th for Noonan Dwight Johnson. Services will be at Forked Oak Baptist Church with Rev. Rickey Johnson and

Rev. Bobby Johnson officiating. Burial will be in Forked Oak Church Cemetery. Cutshall Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

Johnson was a member of Providence Baptist Church and an Army veteran.

He is survived by two sons, Rickey D. Johnson and Vick L. Johnson, both of Cairo; two sisters, Opal Holder and Cleo Bain, and one brother, Robert Johnson, and four grandchildren all of Cairo.

TCHS Graduate Suffers Injuries In 4-Wheeler Wreck

An Iuka youth received serious injuries and was hospitalized after a four-wheeler accident last Thursday.

Eric Booker, 18, of the Eastport community, was riding his four-wheel all terrain vehicle with friends last Thursday, May 29th, when he attempted to ride

up a hill that proved too steep, according to family members. The four-wheeler came back over backwards on top of him, and he suffered a broken nose, fractured jaw, lost some teeth and damaged the area around his eye, they said. He was still in North Mississippi Medical Center Tuesday, after surgery Friday. Family members said he could have further surgery on his eye at a later date.

Officials at NMMC listed Eric in "good" condition Tuesday afternoon and said he had suffered facial trauma and a fractured jaw.

Eric was scheduled to participate in graduation exercises at Tishomingo County High School last Friday night. He was recognized by classmates and officials during the ceremony.

Senior Art Projects Add Beauty & Culture to TCHS

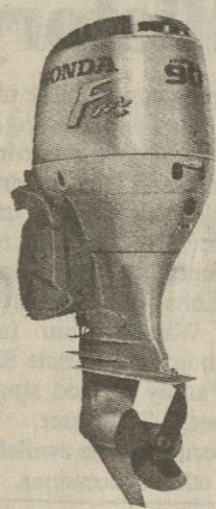

A Time To Talk And A Time To Listen

Corinth is well known for its interest in and support of cultural arts. Homemaker Volunteers of Alcorn County are equally supportive, and their accomplishments were recognized at MS State last week. An outstanding Cultural Arts exhibit was held during their annual conference and, of eight entries from Alcorn County, six placed in the top three with one winning Grand Champion in its class. Quite a record considering the competition!

Over 400 members of MS Homemaker Volunteers, Inc. attended the conference, whose theme is "Strengthening Families & Children." Members returned to their home counties renewed in spirit and commitment.

If you are interested in becoming a member of a Mississippi Homemaker Club, an organizational meeting for new members will be held June 3 at 4:00 p.m. in the Extension Conference Room, Alcorn County Courthouse. Or, contact your Extension Home Economist at 286-7756 or 423-7016 to organize in your community.

During the month of June, clubs in Tishomingo County will celebrate Dairy Month with a recipe contest and luncheon at Midway Community Center on June 7. Clubs in both counties are learning more about the role of "caregivers" in changing families, whether the change is brought about by a member with Alzheimer's or other debilitating condition, or from assuming care of grandchildren. Families, as mentioned above, do need strengthening, and preparation for changing roles can help.

In this context, Dr. Louise Davis, Extension Specialist in Child and Family Development, conducted a session for Alcorn and Tishomingo County MHV

program Leaders on "Coping With Family Changes." Her major message was that in every situation, especially one that is stressful and charged with emotion, the most important aspect is communication.

Learning to communicate is not easy, especially if one did not learn it as a child. But it is necessary in the workplace, in social situations, at church, at school, everywhere people are in contact. Nowhere is it more important than in the family.

Improving skills in interpersonal communication can improve the quality of our relationships with others, and all of us have room for improvement. According to Dr. Davis, successful communication involves: *respectfulness - is, being cognizant of the other person's feelings; *optimism - believing that a true exchange of ideas and feelings will occur and be beneficial; *flexibility - keeping an open mind and being willing to change yourself; *confidence - believing in yourself without being adamant; *persistence - not giving up; and *empathy - identifying with and relating to the other person's viewpoint and needs.

One of the most important skills of good interpersonal

communication is the ability to be a good listener. In communicating with others there is a time to talk and a time to listen. When you speak or try to express your ideas or feelings you are active and involved. When you listen or try to understand the feelings and thoughts of others, you should be just as involved and just as active. Some suggestions:

*Stop talking. You can't listen while you are talking.

*Look at the other person. The face, eyes, hands and body all convey messages. Smile, nod or respond as appropriate to indicate

that you are listening.

*Concentrate on the message. Focus your attention on the person's ideas and feelings related to the subject. Their attitudes and emotional reactions may express more than their words.

*Share responsibility for communications. You as listener have an important role and when you don't understand, ask for clarification.

*Avoid hasty judgments. Don't jump to conclusions. Wait

until the message is complete.

Remember that to improve interpersonal communication, you must first want to improve, and must be willing to put forth extra time and energy. Although it's easier than you might think, takes patience, concern, effort, practice, and courage. The results are worth the effort.

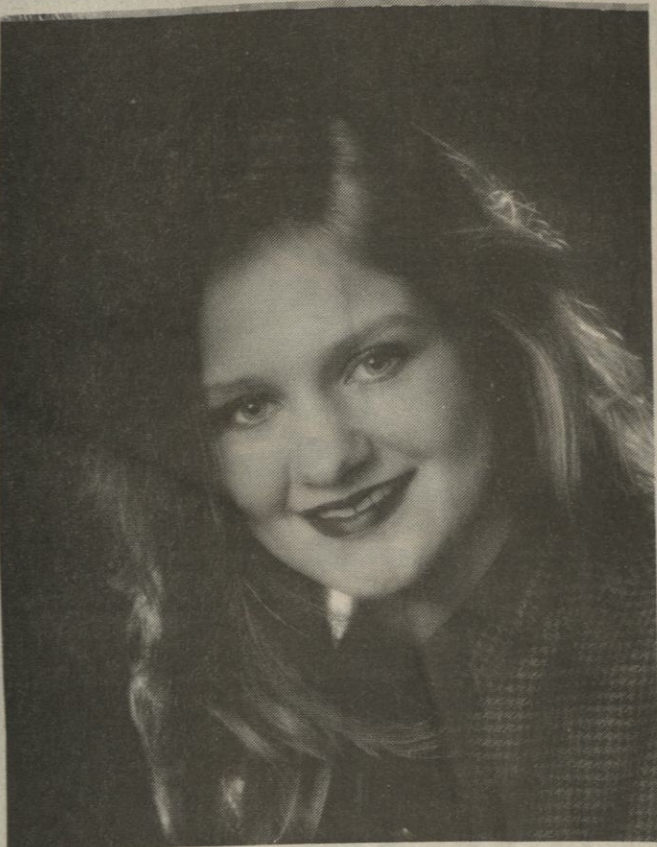


REFLECTION-FREE GLASSES

Oxygen Depletion In Some Ponds

I've received a few calls concerning fish coming to the top of the water as if they were gasping for air. Well, they are. The amount of oxygen is usually more concentrated near the surface. When they come to the top, they are gasping for air. There could be several reasons for this, but the most likely would be the weather that we've been having lately. Microscopic plants in the water produce oxygen. All plants need sunshine to grow and we haven't had a lot of that in the last few weeks. If you combine low oxygen with overpopulation, you will end up with dead fish and the largest ones go first because they need more oxygen. There is not much that can be done. If you have the resources, you can disturb the surface of the water. For example, you can run an outboard motor around the pond. This will expose more of the surfaces to the air and allow for more absorption of oxygen. What we really need is sunshine. There is just one more bad thing about this. Fish that don't die of oxygen depletion, now, may die later from the stress that it has caused. Just like livestock or even people, when your body is stressed, you are more susceptible to sickness. So we may see dead fish off and on all summer.

Growing Alfalfa

Can you grow alfalfa in Tishomingo County? Absolutely—if you have deep, well-drained soil and you use proper management. If your land is droughty, has restrictive layers

in the top 3 feet, or stays wet during the winter and spring then you should probably stay away from alfalfa. On good soils and proper management, stands can be maintained for several years. The pH needs to be 6.5 or above. Get a soil test and follow recommendations but if a test is

not available and no lime has been applied in the last few years then apply boron at planting. You can seed as early as September 1 but not later than October 15. Spring seeded alfalfa does not compete well with the weeds and fall weeds must be controlled. We have several information sheets here at

the Extension Office on establishment and management of alfalfa.

Sheriff Provides Insight On County Law Enforcement at Chamber Meeting

Annual Tishomingo Street Dance Scheduled For July 5th

At last Tuesday's Tishomingo Chamber of Commerce meeting, Sheriff David Smith provided a stimulating talk about the crime situation in the county, and the challenges of running an efficient law enforcement team on a budget.

Smith asked citizens not be afraid to pick up the phone and help the sheriff's department in their law enforcement efforts.

"There are things starting to happen here that everyone thinks only happen in big cities," said Smith to the more than 25 chamber members present at the Midway Restaurant.

"Don't be afraid to pick up the phone and call," he said. "Whether it is suspected child abuse, or an elderly person living alone who we [the sheriff's department] need to check on, we need the community's help to be aware of all the needs."

Cooperation with Adjoining Counties & States

With the Tishomingo County Jail at overloaded capacity, Smith has his hands full, and he gave credit for many of the recent arrests to a spirit of cooperation with local police departments, and sheriff departments in adjoining counties. This helps in patrolling and enforcing law in the long and narrow Tishomingo county, which enjoys extensive interaction with nearby cities and communities like the Tri-cities area in Alabama, Tennessee, Tupelo, and Corinth. The unique position of Tishomingo County makes it an easy target for the growing drug-use populations in the surrounding states and cities, making cooperation between law enforcers critical.

Currently, Smith has six full-time deputies and four part time, including staff at the Sheriff's Department that operates the 911 emergency system. Smith says he has people throughout the county

that can be called out at any time. "I could still hire four more, and keep them busy, if I had four more cars," he said.

A Full Jail & Growing Drug Problem

Just last Tuesday, there were 34 prisoners in the jail, which is built for 24, Smith said. Included in that number are seven or eight arrested for breaking and entering, three for child molesting, one for murder, and eight on drug-related charges. He said that often breaking and entering is drug-related, and that the department is looking for at least 24 more persons wanted on drug-related charges.

Smith described some of the challenges of catching perpetrators of what seems like an increasing amount of drug-related crime. He said that a prime example is the huge amount of marijuana confiscated by his department and burned last summer, the owners/cultivators of which have never been identified.

Land-owners should know that the sheriff's department is not going to take your land if you report that you think someone else is growing dope on it, said Smith. To the contrary, he needs the cooperation of landowners and other confidential informants to successfully investigate drug activity.

Juggling Budget

Budget problems caused by, for example, a great number of alleged prisoner medical problems and cost of prisoner meals cause the sheriff to constantly adjust and juggle his department budget which includes costs of personnel, vehicle maintenance, as well as upkeep of the only jail in the county.

He said he would rather be spending money on more personnel and vehicles than the prisoners, some of whom have been in the small jail for more than a year due to trial delays. He does get good support from the county su-

pervisors, he was quick to assure those gathered.

When asked by chamber member Margaret Underwood what the chamber could do to help, he said that they need more cars, and bullet-proof vests, which cost about \$450 each. Not exactly items that a small chamber of commerce can afford, but members did begin to discuss what they could do to help this worthy cause, including the possibility of cooperating with other chambers and civic organizations to maybe sponsor the department or individual deputies, so that they can be outfitted with all the necessary safety gear.

Street Dance July 5th

In other business, the annual Tishomingo Street Dance is scheduled for the night of July 5th, and the search is on for a band, hopefully the Stone Creek band that was so popular last year. Overall, it was agreed that the annual event is pretty successful as it is, with the only exception being the unbearable heat that accompanies every Fourth of July Street Dance in Tishomingo. Fortunately, it usually doesn't keep anyone from coming out for the fun. If anyone has any suggestions on how to control the weather, or any other suggestions for the street dance, please let a Chamber member know!

To promote town and area beautification, the Chamber will start the Yard of the Month again in June, so clean up your yard and start looking for who will get it this month!

More "Come Home to Tishomingo" t-shirts and hats have been ordered, and will be available, from the Chamber. Best place to get one is probably the banks, so get your and promote Tishomingo everywhere you go.

Next month the Chamber will meet at the Tishomingo State Park Lodge on June 24th. Be sure to come!

New Law Requires Boating Safety Course

The deadline is approaching for anyone born after June 30, 1980 to take the required Boater Safety course offered by the Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks. The law, which goes into effect July 1, 1997, was passed by the 1996 Legislature and requires the course to be successfully completed and the Certificate of Completion card to be on the vessel being operated.

Topics covered in the course include general information about boats, legal requirements, navigation rules, getting underway, accidents, and special topics. Although required of anyone born after June 30, 1980, it is open to all boaters in the State.

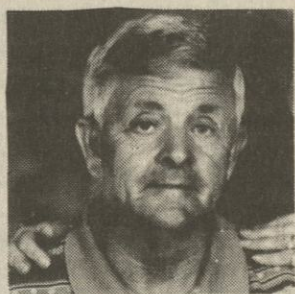

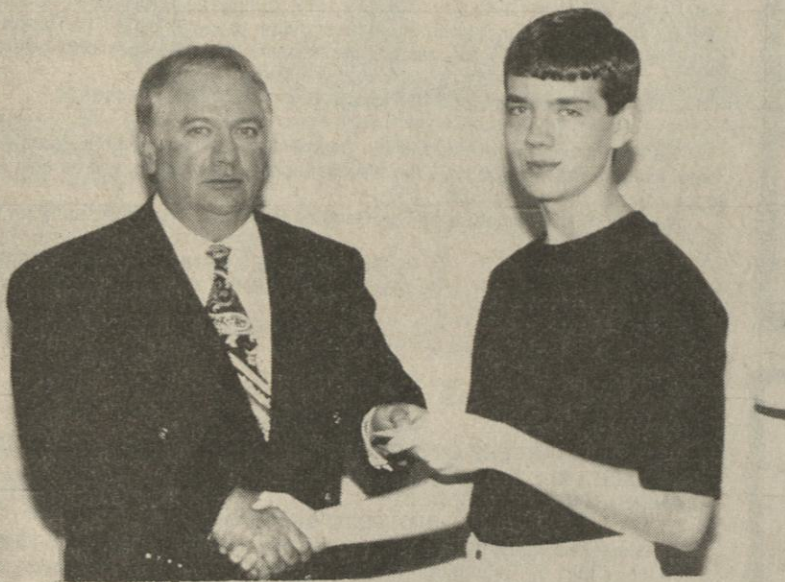

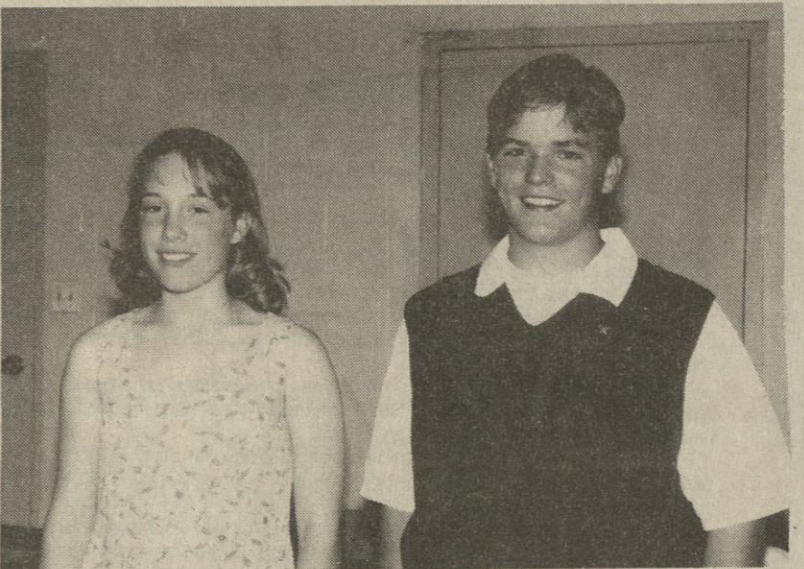
Ms. Hollingsworth has made successful careers in the fields of teaching and literature. Her love of literature and language enabled her to combine her job with her

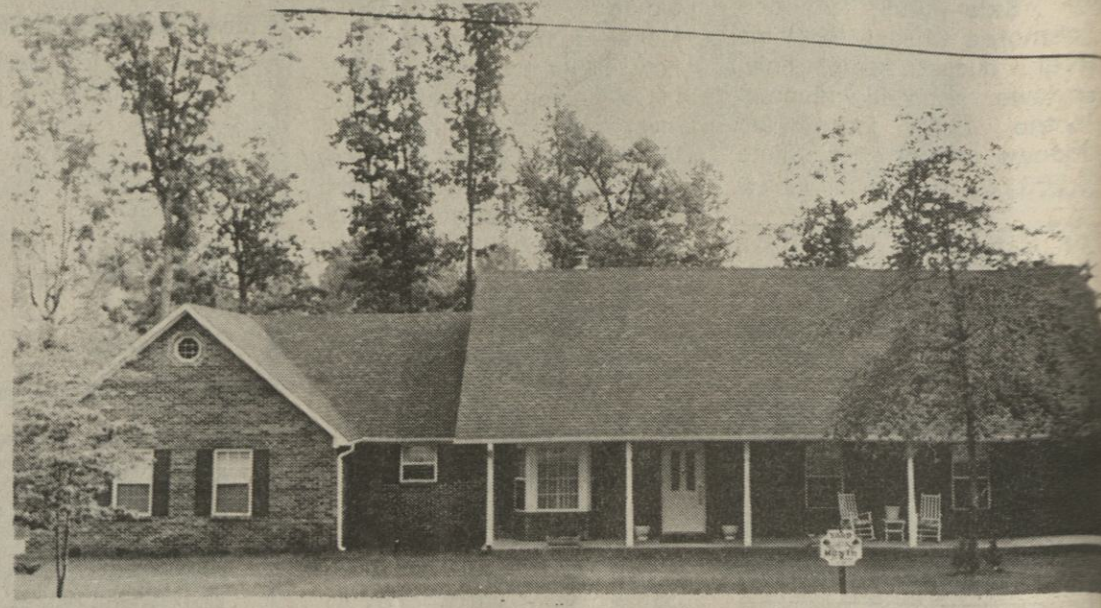

In the following article Mildred Ramsey tells of her battle against cancer, the effects it has had on her family, and her new outlook on life.

Cancer - Almost every family will be touched by cancer during their lifetime. How we face cancer can be the difference in Life or Death. Until September 1993, I thought, as many of you do, that I had the world in the palm of my hand. This was the month that I was told that I had Carcinoma of the Breast. Why me? What did I do? Will I live or will I die? I didn't understand. I had taken care of myself, had yearly exams including mammograms, did self breast exams, and exercised. Yet, here I was facing many difficult decisions. I turned to my Lord for guidance. I said, "Lord, it's too big for me, I'm in your hands. Help me to make the right decisions.

I decided to have a mastectomy with reconstructive surgery. I had many complications, and had to become totally dependent on Jack and my Mother to care for me for many months. I cried many, many tears along with my entire family and friends. It has by far been the toughest time of my life.

My pathology report revealed Poorly Differentiated Infiltrating Ductal Carcinoma, Grade III. Prognosis: poor.

After several weeks, I began

the long journey so many of you have made to the Cancer Center to begin chemotherapy. My family would go with me to take my treatments, they gave me encouragement, love, and support. The Lord gave me the strength and courage to endure the chemotherapy, which causes pain, sickness and tears. My oncologist told me that my attitude and staying positive would play a big part in my beating cancer. He said that if you ever give up, you will die.

I have tried to be positive and smile. Sometimes it has been hard to do. I don't have the assurance that my cancer will not metastasize, but I know that I am a survivor. I have had three years and nine months more than I ever thought when I was told I had this awful disease.

You see life so different. You thank the Lord for another day, when you awake in the morning. Everything in the world takes on a new look. You change, and so does your life. If you are fortunate enough not to have cancer - Count your blessings.

If you have cancer, fight it with all your have, stay positive, because I believe someday we will have a cure for cancer.

If you are a Survivor of Cancer, please join me and many others for the Survivors Walk at 5:30 P.M., June 13th at the Tishomingo County High School Track and Football Field during the RELAY FOR LIFE. We can make a difference - we must.
