Trooper Sgt. Rick Marlar Honored By Highway Patrol For Most DUI Arrests

Mississippi State Trooper Sergeant Rick Marlar of Iuka was recently honored as one of the outstanding state troopers in the state by the Mississippi Highway Safety Patrol.

In the statewide awards ceremony on June 2nd at the Department of Public Safety Headquarters Building in Jackson, Marlar received recognition for the Most DUI Arrests for his troop, along with eight other troopers from throughout the

Marlar had 126 DUI arrests, and also led his Troop F with fourteen felony arrests, and the most cocaine seized, 56 grams this year. Troop F is comprised of nine counties. He also tied with several other officers for most recovered stolen vehicles.

This is nothing new for Marlar, 42, who has been a member of the Hundred Club for the past twelve years. Members of the Hundred Club, established by the governor, must make at least

100 DUI arrests each year. "The problem we see most in this county," Marlar said, "is people not having a sober driver." He said that a designated driver must be completely sober, free of

alcohol altogether.

"Nothing makes me happier than recognizing the accomplishments of our employees," said Col. Tom Ward, Highway Patrol director. "Law enforcement is a thankless profession. For that reason, I think it is important to honor those who have excelled. By recognizing our civilian personnel and sworn officials it gives them an incentive to continue to do better."

Marlar has been a state trooper for seventeen years, and is married to Judy Marlar. He is also the son of Mrs. Ottie Sue (Polly) Harris and the late E.C. Marlar.

Circuit Court Jury Finds Bonds Not Guilty in 1993 Tigner Death

After almost four years, a grand jury indictment, and now a trial by a jury of his peers, Tim Bonds has been found not guilty of manslaughter by culpable negligence in the death of Frankie Tigner, a young Iuka mother who was killed when Bonds' truck left County Road 321 shortly after midnight on October 1, 1993.

The trial, which began with jury selection all morning Monday, lasted until the final closing arguments ended at noon Tuesday. Jurors deliberated about two and a half hours to come to a unanimous verdict of not guilty.

Before the jury entered the courtroom. Circuit Court Judge Barry Ford warned that anyone making any type of outburst when the verdict was read would immediately be jailed, but when the clerk read "not guilty", the many family members present from both sides could hardly restrain themselves, though they were quickly hushed.

Assistant District Attorney Jim Pounds, in closing arguments, held that the physical evidence demonstrated the excessive speed that contributed to the seriousness of the wreck, and that Bonds, by driving at such speeds and in an intoxicated state, while the Tigners shouted and begged him to slow down, displayed a "total disregard for human life."

Defense attorney John White argued that there was a conflict of evidence and in the testimonies of Randy Tigner, Frankie's husband who was also a passenger with Bonds and Frankie in Bonds' truck, and Keith Whipple and Barry McWilliams, who were both in the truck that was following Bonds when the accident occurred. All three testified to being intoxicated, after an evening party at Coleman Park, and then a few hours at the Harbor, a bar just over the Tennessee line. That they were all intoxicated, the fact that the accident was four years ago, and the number of opportunities the witnesses have had to discuss the events of that night were all cited as reasons to doubt the accuracy of the witnesses' testimony.

White also pointed out that no one testified that they knew the cause of the wreck and no witness said that it was a willful act, which is part of the "manslaughter by culpable negligence" indict-

Also vital was the testimony of Chief Deputy Neil Edmondson, then a patrol officer who worked the wreck. Edmondson testified that a tire was blown out on the truck when he saw it that night, and reported seeing a gouge in the road, the cause of which was not described. But its presence estab-

lished that there could have been a different cause of the wreck than the speed of travel, which was estimated at anywhere from 90 to 110 miles per hour by different

Regardless of the possible sympathies jury members could feel for the families, White warned the jury that they were "not here to send a message, they are here to judge this case by the facts."

According to testimony, Bonds' Chevy Silverado stepside truck landed 219 feet from where it left the road, topping off a sweet gum tree 8 feet above the ground. Found fifty feet from the truck was Frankie Tigner, who was pronounced dead at the scene by the coroner. Bonds was found near the truck and only later, after some searching was Randy Tigner found 36 feet from the opposite side of the truck. Bonds and Randy were also seriously injured in the wreck.

The cause of the accident, which occurred past a long straight bottom road heading into a sharp curve shortly before some railroad tracks, was listed on the accident report as "speed too fast for conditions."

At the time of her death, Frankie Tigner was 25. She was the mother of three children, now ages twelve, eight, and five years.

bond. Ronnie Calton, 24, of Iuka, Shane Kennedy, 19 of Burnsville. and Brian Black, 19, of Iuka, were each indicted on one count of breaking and entering of a

dwelling, and one count of

attempted burglary of an occupied dwelling at night in connection to two February 14th burglaries near Burnsville. All three are still in custody with a bail of \$5,000 each.

Robert E. Robinson, was indicted on one count of driving a motor vehicle under the influence of alcohol (DUI), third offense. He was released on \$5,000 bond.

Jeffery A. Hudson, was indicted on one count of DUI third offense. He was released on \$5,000 bond.

Larry Dale Turner, was indicted one one count of DUI third offense, and one count of simple assault on a police officer. He was released on \$5,000 bond.

Charles Ricky Blankenship, 35, of luka, was indicted on four counts of aggravated assault related to the March 8th non-fatal shooting of Jeff Hobbs, 33 of Iuka. Blankenship is out on \$50,000

Lisa L. Gooding, was indicted on one count of forgery, one count of uttering a forgery, and was released on \$5,000 bond.

Pedro Delarossa was indicted on one count of sale of marijuana, and one count of conspiracy to sell marijuana, and is still in custody.

Daniel Armadariz, was indicted on one count of sale of marijuana, and one count of conspiracy to sell marijuana, and was released on bond.

Nancy Mae Smith, Jimmy Grimes, Noah Thomason, and Phillip Thomason were all indicted on one count each of conspiracy to sell marijuana.

E.L. McNatt, former owner of McNatt Ford, was present for the sentencing, and said, "I'm satisfied."

Young Sentenced to RID Wilburn "Bud" Young, 52,

has pled guilty to two counts of possession of a vehicle with mutilated vehicle identification numbers.

Young was sentenced to ten years with the Mississippi Department of Corrections (Parchman), and was ordered to the RID program. The judge reserved the right of judicial review of the case for 360 days, and if Young successfully completes the RID program at Parchman, he could then be released to serve one year on probation, according to the district attorney's office. Golden Pharmacist Sentenced

Michael Edward Bonds, of Golden, pled guilty to one count of sale of Schedule II narcotics, was sentenced to ten years with the Mississippi Department of Corrections (Parchman), and was ordered to the RID program.

Regarding the RID, or Regimented Inmate Discipline Program, Assistant District Attorney Arch Bullard explained it as a boot camp-type situation at Parchman that involves some group counseling, too. If inmates successfully complete the RID program, they can often be released on probation, but if they fail to comply they are transferred directly into the general population at Parchman.

Bullard said this Circuit Court term was successful, and that with the support and cooperation of the Tishomingo County Circuit Clerk's Office and the Sheriff's Department, they managed to get many cases off the

June Is Dairy Month

Tishomingo County Homemakers are promoting both health and use of agricultural products this month. A 'sampling" luncheon at Midway Community Center Saturday featured dishes made from dairy products - and there was quite a variety! Using recipes from a number of sources, some with personal interpretation, they put together a booklet from the entries, available from Homemaker Volunteer or from the Cooperative Extension Office.

Their interest is not just in testing recipes — they are equally interested in good nutrition. "It is very difficult to get the calcium we need in a day without dairy products," said Dr. Barbara McLaurin, extension human nutrition specialist at Mississippi State University.

"One real advantage of getting your calcium from milk or milk products is that you get all those other nutrients, which help calcium do its job. That can't be said about calcium supplements, which only provide calcium," McLaurin said.

In addition to calcium, milk and dairy products provide phosphorus, magnesium, potassium, riboflavin, vitamins A and D, vitamin B12 and protein that the human body needs to stay healthy. It is a by-now-familiar principle that many nutrients depend on one another for their effectiveness. People who try to outguess nature by taking single vitamins in pill form seldom hit on winning combinations.

This principle is the reason

vitamin D is added to milk. Even though vitamin D is manufactured by the body by exposure to sunlight, some people do not always get the thirty minutes or more (dark-skinned people may require 3 hours) needed for a full day's supply of vitamin D. This has decided implications for elderly persons or chose who are confined inside much of the time.

The deficiency diseases of rickets in children and osteomalacia in adults are well known, both resulting from an inadequate supply of calcium and vitamin D. When not enough of both are taken in, or absorbed into the blood, calcium is withdrawn from the bones, causing them to become porous, weak and brittle. Less well known is that a similar condition can happen to the tiny ear bones that transmit sound to the brain, causing deafness.

Other important relationships

between calcium, phosphorus, vitamin C and lactose, resulting in varying levels of calcium absorption. Hormone imbalances or conditions like diarrhea may also interfere with absorption and cause a deficiency. The good news is that the body, when functioning properly, serves as its own "bank", regulating withdrawals and deposits as needed.

The body's ability to maintain blood calcium levels as needed does not minimize the need to eat calcium-rich foods every day. Children need to drink milk because they are growing. Adults, however, often switch to beverages they think are more appropriate to their age: coffee, tea, or soft drinks. They tend to think that, since their bones have stopped growing, they no longer need the calcium milk provides. Nothing could be further from the

Although there are alternative sources for calcium other than dairy products, the obvious way to meet calcium needs is to include these foods in the diet daily. The difficulty of doing it any other way can be illustrated by listing amounts of other foods you would have to consume instead: 6 heads of lettuce, 10 cups of cooked green beans, 12 oranges, 20 cups

A recent case is a reminder that employees who are discriminated against because of their age should seek legal help, as they may be able to bring a successful claim against their employer.

Ann H., a 47-year-old secretary, got a new boss. The new boss made Ann reapply for her job and take typing and other skills tests. He then assigned Ann to a lesser job and later fired her. Ann sued, claiming the typing and other tests were just an excuse for the new boss to fire her, and that the real reason she was fired was to hire younger workers. A court ruled for Ann and awarded her a large sum of money.



of strawberries. And remember that some foods, notably dark green leafy vegetables that have great amounts of the mineral, may contain binders that prevent its absorption.

Next week we will consider alternatives for people who are milk intolerant or simply do not like milk. Meanwhile, remember that if your diet lacks calcium, you will pay a price - perhaps not today, but years from now - in the weakening of your bones.



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



At The Grave Site of William T. Wilson - Mary Sue Wright and Billy West at the grave site of their great-great-grandfather in Nancy, Kentucky. The stone was set April 10 and was visited by Mary Sue and Billy on Memorial Day 1997. In 1910 a slab of marble was placed on the mound where the Confederate shoulders were buried, it read:

Beneath this mound rest in sleep that knows no waking,

More than one hundred Confederate soldiers from Tennessee,

Mississippi and Alabama,

Who were killed in the Battle of Fishing Creek January 19, 1862. We know not who they were, but the world knows what they were.

These died far from their homes.

But they lie in heroes graves, and glory keeps ceaseless watch about their tomb.

Confederate Dead Get Gravestones 135 Years After Battle In Kentucky

For 135 years, Sgt. William Thomas Wilson and more than 140 Confederate comrades lay in obscurity in a mass grave on the battlefield where they fell. Just down the road, their Union foes rested beneath orderly rows of marble headstones in the Mill Springs National Cemetery in Nancy Kentucky.

Mary Sue Wright of Iuka, had searched 20 years for the grave of her great-great-grandfather, who died January 19, 1862, at age 45. On Monday, Memorial Day, she finally had a place to come and remember him.

"I was so glad the Lord didn't let me find it until now, because I would have missed so much," she said as she and several hundred others gathered to honor the Southern dead from a battle that is considered the North's first decisive victory of the Civil War.

cisive victory of the Civil War.
"It finally puts my mind at ease

that he was somebody and he stood up for what he believed in."

Descendants of the dead came from as far away as Texas to help dedicate the cemetery at Zollicoffer Park, named for the Confederate general who died at the battle. Rows of white Veteran's Administration headstones, paid for by the Sons of Confederate Veterans, now stand in rows near the mass grave in the order in which the Alabama, Mississippi, and Tennessee units marched into battle.

The ceremony capped nearly a century of work to revive the memory of the Confederates who

died at the battle of Mill Springs, which the South knew as the Battle of Fishing Creek.

Gen. Felix Zollicoffer of Tennessee decided to surprise Union forces on the morning of January 19 and ended up in a foggy, muddy mess. Zollicoffer rode ahead to ensure that his

troops were not firing on each other.

Zollicoffer encountered a Union officer in the road, and neither recognized that the other was the enemy. When Zollicoffer's aide shouted to warn him, a skirmish broke out and Zollicoffer was cut down.

When the battle ended later that day, more than 140 Confederates and 39 Union soldiers were dead or mortally wounded. The Northerners were buried in what would later become one of the first 12 national cemeteries created by Congress; the Southerners were left to the locals to bury.

In 1902, a 10-year-old girl named Dorotha Burton decided it was a shame that the Southern dead in her community were not honored. So on Memorial Day, she gathered flowers and decorated the white oak under which Zollicoffer died — the Zollie Tree.

On Monday, her great-great-granddaughter decorated the stump of the old tree, which blew down in a storm two years ago. And Confederate re-enactors gathered to salute the dead.

Confederate battle flags and banners encircled the rail fence that surrounds the stones.

Descendants of three of the soldiers sprinkled dirt from their

home states around their headstones.

"These men can't be buried in their home states, but at least we can bring a little bit of their home states to them now," said Ron

Nicholas, administrator of the Mill Springs Battlefield Association. There is a stone for Zollicoffer, although his body was taken back

to Tennessee.

Apparently Margaret died in
childbirth and Samuel was raised
by her sister Arabella Pickens and
her husband Daniel Brown.

William Thomas Wilson was previously married, his wife apparently died also. The 1860 census of Tishomingo County states that a grandmother Saiah Lambert, age 93, living with William Thomas and his new wife Margaret and two sons, William and Elijah Houston, ages 11 and 4. After the death of Margaret, William and the grandmother, all three boys were separated, going to three different homes.

Young William was killed on

the railroad in Colbert County.

Elijah Houston Wilson married
Nancy Gattis, they lived on the
Riverton Rose Trail in Colbert
County, Ala. They raised a large
family. From this family we find
the late Whit Wilson, a Sheriff of
Tishomingo County, and Gerald
Parsons, former 2nd District

Supervisor and Tish. County Circuit Court Clerk as descendants.

Samuel Thomas Wilson married Hannah Jane Kennedy. They raised 4 sons and 1 daughter. Mary Sue Wright and Billy West are grandchildren of Thomas

Wilson (a twin) and the children of Rosie Wilson West McDougal.

KILL LTHE DEATH TAX

Too many farm families have to sell all or part of their farms because of the current punitive federal estate tax laws.

Many members of Congress now agree that farmers and ranchers need estate tax relief. But more support is needed for the bills now pending in Washington.

County to Receive FSA Disaster Loan Applications

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers, and operators are available through the Alcorn County Office of the Farm Service Agency, Harold Mills, FSA Agriculture Credit Manager, said

Mr. Mills said this authority is pursuant to President Clinton's declaration on April 4, 1997, of a major disaster in Tennessee, caused by tornadoes, flooding, hail, and high winds, that occurred February 28, 1997, and continuing. As a result of this major disaster, Tishomingo County, as a contiguous county in Mississippi, is named as an area eligible for Federal disaster assistance pursuant to Section 321 (a) of the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act.

Applications for assistance in the disaster-stricklen county will be accepted by FSA through December 4, 1997, for physical and production losses.

Farmers qualifying for emergency loans may borrow up to 80 percent of the their actual production loss, not to exceed a maximum of \$500,000 or that actually needed, whichever is less.

We get calls every year concerning worms invading the carport, basement, inside the house, etc. These are actually millipedes and they congregate in large numbers that you would not believe unless you've experience it yourself. They are about one to 1.5 iches long with a hard covering that makes a distinct "crunch" when you step on them. Millipedes feed on decaying plant materials. Movement and feeding occur at night because they must conserve water. They are susceptible to water loss if they are not in a moist environment. Movement toward homes may be a result of heat that is released from concrete foundations, sidewalks, carports, etc. If you are close to a wooded area, had long periods of standing water, or there has been a population increase of these insects, then you can have a problem. Unfortunately, we are having extremely wet weather. There are several pesticides that are effective but Seven seems to do a better job. Use liquid Seven or at least the 10% Seven dust. Warning! You may kill all of them now, but in a couple of days find as many or more back again. There is not much that can be done except "retreat" (as in "run" or reapply pesticides) or let them die out naturally. Hot, dry weather should help.

Calibration Of Spray Equipment

Every farmer has his own method of calibrating his spray equipment. What usually happens is you change equipment, you change nozzles,

you change band width, or you iust change anything and you're in a hurry so instead of recalibrating you just GUESS. Sometimes this works and sometimes it doesn't. If you put out too much pesticide, it costs money and it could injure the crop. If you put out too little, you get poor control and this costs money. Either way, poor

calibration costs money. If you need help, please call me.

This year I have seen several cases of early blight in potatoes. This disease is normally seen in tomatoes but, generally speaking, any disease affecting tomatoes can also affect potatoes. Lower leaves of plants will start dying and falling off. the disease will move up the plan until all foliage is gone and then the plant will die. If the potatoes are mature enough, then it doesn't matter. But if you have young plants then you will need to apply a fungicide to protect them.

Chlorothalonil "trade name Daconil for example" will work well against early blight. Be on the lookout for other diseases in your lawn and garden. Current weather conditions are ideal for disease development.
