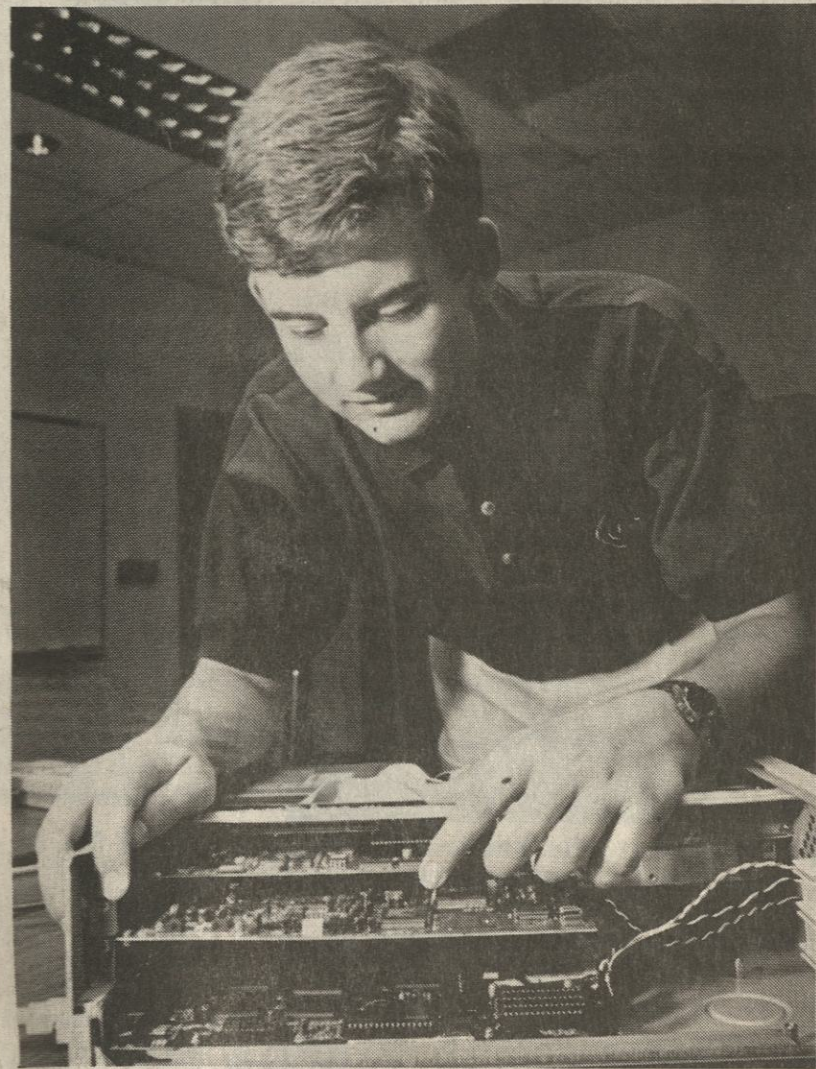

## Belmont Teen In Nat'l Computer Construction Competition In D. C.

### Tishomingo County "computer kid" likes to tear 'em up

A Belmont sophomore is in Washington, D.C. this week constructing a computer in a national competition sponsored by the U.S. Department of Education's Technology Student Association.

Dusty Brandon, son of Danny and Teresa Brandon, recently finished first in a computer construction event sponsored by the Mississippi State Department of Education's Office of Vocational and Technical Education, which secured his place at the 1997 Computer Construction and Application Competition June 21-26 in Washington.

"We basically had to put a computer together," Brandon explained. Given various components like a motherboard and disk drives, competitors had to put them all together, load a program and write a four-page brochure - all within a one-hour time limit.

Dusty has been taking apart and rebuilding computers since he was given one about four years ago. He also received some additional training recently at Mississippi State University's Research and Curriculum Unit, where he shadowed media specialist Lemond Irvin to learn more about networking and networking cards while Irvin maintained a 21-station computer laboratory and a facility with full videoconferencing capabilities.

Irvin, Dusty's uncle, said his nephew should do well in the national competition, noting that he is "extremely mechanically inclined."

His partner in the state competition, 15-year-old Lesly Adams, also a Belmont student, was also eligible to attend the national competition, but couldn't this year. He hopes to be able to attend next year.

## Grand Jury to Get Case of Man Charged With Capital Rape

A Tishomingo County man charged with capital rape of a 12-year-old girl was bound over for action by the grand jury last Wednesday in a justice court session.

Merlin Hill, 35, is in the Tishomingo County Jail after being charged with capital rape April 22, 1997. The special setting of the preliminary hearing last Wednesday afternoon was obtained at the request of his attorney, Justice Court Judge J.R. Blakney, bound Hill over for action by the grand jury, according to justice court records. Usually Justice Court

sessions are held the first and third Tuesday of each month.

Hill has been held in the Tishomingo County Jail since sheriff's department deputies arrested him in April at his home on Highway 25 north of Tishomingo. Previous requests for reduction of Hill's \$1 million bond were denied by Judge Blakney.

Federal authorities are assisting the sheriff's department in the ongoing investigation.

Hill moved to the area in about 1991, and was employed with the ASRM project at Yellow Creek.

## Update: Bones Are From A 40-45 Year Old Person

The latest developments in the case of some human remains found in the north part of the county several weeks ago include findings that the bones are probably from a person that was 40 to 45 years of age, according to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith.

The bones are still being tested at the forensic lab in Jackson to determine how long they have been there, or if the subject was male or female. Dental records could prove vital to

final identification.

The bones were found in a heavily-wooded area in the northwest part of the county by someone running his dogs Monday, May 19th.

Cause of death is still unknown. A red and white striped cotton shirt, was found near the bones. It could have been a man or woman's shirt, Smith has said.

The remains do not match descriptions of any known missing persons in Tishomingo or Alcorn counties, Smith has said previously.

## Court Decision: If Town Of Tishomingo Opens Alley, Building Must Be Moved

*Divisive Town Issue Settled In Tishomingo County Chancery Court*

A judge has ruled that an alley in Tishomingo is indeed public property, and that a building built in the alley may have to be moved in the future if the Town wishes to utilize the alley.

In court on May 28th, Chancellor John C. Ross, Jr. heard arguments from both parties in the *Town of Tishomingo vs. Freida E. Sipes and James H. Sipes*, a case in which the board of aldermen of Tishomingo, acting on behalf of the town, charged that the Sipeses had built a storage building on land in an alley that has been owned by the town since its incorporation in 1908.

Aldermen for the town at the time of the hearing were Brenda Sue Cain, Merle Trimm, Mary J. Guest, Mike Hale and Jimmy Burns, and all but Hale were present at the hearing.

In the decision issued last

week, Chancellor Ross found the alley to be public property, properly dedicated and accepted. The decision said the alley is identified on the 1906 plat of the Town of Tishomingo, which was formally accepted by the direct reference to the dedicated properties through metes and bounds description in the Proclamation of the Town of Tishomingo in 1908.

If the town decides to open the alley officially, they must give Mr. and Mrs. Sipes reasonable notice to remove their building, the decision stated. All other relief requested by any party, including expenses and attorney fees, was specifically denied in the decision.

The Sipeses and their attorney, John Farrell, argued that the town had never "opened" or officially "dedicated" the alley, which runs beside the home the Sipeses built in 1985 on lots that were originally intended as commercial

lots within the city limits, according to the 1906 map (plat). The attorney for the defendant proposed that the 1906 map was not an official document, so the alleys identified on it were never dedicated for town use.

During the hearing, Alderman Jimmy Burns testified, in response to a question by the town's attorney Richard Bowen, that he could not recall that the town ever "closed" the alley.

Judge Ross concurred with this point, and in the decision stated that while the town was not incorporated until 1908, the 1906 map is valid by its use as a reference for buying and selling of lots in Tishomingo for more than ninety years. The Sipes property was given as an example.

Burns also testified that there were probably utility (water) lines in the alley, and under the building, which could make repair of any leaks difficult, since the Sipeses built the building on a concrete slab.

The Sipeses also claimed, as stated in the decision, that even if there was an acceptance of the alleyway by the town, maintenance of utilities in the alleyway was not sufficient to negate abandonment; the Sipes' attorney argued that since it was not being used to drive on, it was not being used by the town.

The decision also referred to the minutes of a July 14, 1987 meeting of the board, which reflected a discussion about the Sipeses locating a building in the alleyway on the condition that if the Town needed to open the alley, the Sipeses would be required to remove the building.

In 1996, after litigation over this matter began, Brenda Middleton, doing business as Krista's drive-in, requested the Town to open the alleyway in question.

## Rain, Cool Temps Set Area Crops Back A Few Weeks

Well, apparently the weather finally remembered, the last week in June, that this is Mississippi. The long awaited steamy, hot days finally arrived, but their late arrival could prove detrimental to county farmers.

There was a short time in April when it was warm enough to plant, and fields weren't too flooded to work, said County Extension Agent Danny Owen on a tour of farm plots in the southern end of the county last Tuesday. "But since then it has been raining."

### Cotton Hurt By Cool Temps

The 800 or so acres of cotton planted in the county earlier this year are doing well, as far as the plants go, Owen said, but farmers can't get into the fields to fertilize, spray for pests or cultivate the fields.

"The cool temperatures in May hurt the cotton crop more than anything," he explained. "We are probably three weeks

behind in the growing process."

### Adjusting Soybean Strategy

As for soybeans, only about 10 percent of the usual crop in Tishomingo County is planted, and now it is getting pretty late to plant. Farmers are going to have to adjust their strategy to make up for late planting, keeping in mind the later harvest date could put them in risk of an early frost, or, more likely, the late fall rains could impact harvesting.

### Corn Status Varied

Corn planted in well-drained or higher areas is doing well, but you can see the damage done in soggy areas, where the corn is stunted and yellowish, Owen said.

### Hay Cutters Missed One

Hay farmers have probably missed the first cutting, and now will have a crop that could be of lesser quality due to the maturity of the grass when it is cut. They could only get two cuttings of hay this year, where they would normally get three or four, Owen said.

If the sun keeps shining, and temperatures remain in the 90s as they are predicted to for the rest of this week, farmers may be able to get into the fields to start cultivating, spraying, or plowing under an already hopeless crop.

### Economic Impact

That is where the economic impact is at this time, Owen explained. The farmer who has already invested in seed for a cotton crop that isn't doing well will have to make another investment if he will replant.

Only time will tell what the prices will be come harvest time, Owen said, and that will be the true assessment of economic impact.

An additional expense that farmers may not expect will be having to purchase different kinds of herbicides for weeds that they normally do not have to worry about. Insects are expected to be bad this year too, agricultural experts have said.

## Reckless Driver Resists Arrest & Damages Belmont Patrol Car

A Dennis man who ran a stop sign in Dennis and led officers on a pursuit through Belmont Monday was charged with multiple crimes including destruction of city property, simple assault on a police officer and resisting arrest.

Wayne Robinson, 55, of Dennis was seen by Tishomingo County Chief Deputy Neil Edmondson as he failed to stop for the stop sign at Highway 4 and Highway 25, around noon June 23rd, according to the sheriff's office. After he failed to stop for the flashing blue lights, Edmondson pursued the 1972 black pickup truck, which he observed driving recklessly.

Belmont Chief of Police Donald Reno joined the pursuit in Belmont, and the truck finally

stopped when it hit a ditch, on Old Hwy. 25 south of Green Street in Belmont, said Edmondson. Robinson resisted arrest and was charged with: reckless driving, two counts of failure to stop at a stop sign, failure to stop for blue lights, resisting arrest, simple assault on a police officer, destruction of city property, public profanity, driving under the influence and refusing to take the test #4, driving while license was suspended for DUI, no tag on the truck, and burglary.

Reno had reportedly been waiting on a warrant to arrest Robinson for an alleged burglary around 8:30 Monday morning.

Neither Reno nor Edmondson were seriously hurt, but the glass in the Belmont police car was kicked out by Robinson.

#### Animal Intruders Lead To Problems

Inspiration for column topics come from many sources — this week it is birds in my chimney. Two other people to whom I've mentioned this have a similar problem. In Mississippi and other

rural/suburban settings, residents often find small intruders wanting to share their homes, sometimes becoming invaders or, at least, unwelcome guests.

Many people deal with problems caused by wild animals at some point, and our office has

frequent inquiries about moles, voles, squirrels and rabbits causing damage in lawns and gardens. But problems inside houses can be the most disturbing and damaging. The best way to handle animal invasions is to prevent them and quickly resolve any problems that develop. "Squirrels, raccoons, bats and birds will occasionally come into homes that have unsecured vents, chimneys or other small openings," said Phil Mastrangelo, state director of Animal Damage Control. Tree squirrels often enter attics through opening on the roof, such as the eaves, gables or vents, he said.

Dr. Frances Graham, extension housing specialist at Mississippi State University, recommended preventing climbing animals from coming inside by trimming trees away from walls. She further recommended that all openings be secured with heavy screens.

Mastrangelo said several control methods used simultaneously are often more successful than a single control. The first step is to determine how the animals enter the house; once they are in, use live traps to catch them unharmed. "Poisons are not generally recommended to eliminate animals from houses because they may result in undesirable odors if they die in out-of-way places," Mastrangelo said. My reaction is that they also have a right to life and are simply trying to find the best possible environment in which to live.

For squirrels in attics, try to drive them out or wait until they leave to find food. Then make repairs to prevent them from re-entering. One or more baited traps are important for catching any squirrel accidentally closed in because locked-in squirrels may cause damage when they try to chew their way out.

Raccoons can also become a nuisance and cause damage when they enter attics or chimneys. Mastrangelo said raccoons are learning that uncapped chimneys substitute well for more traditional hollow trees as denning sites. "Raccoons frequently use uncapped chimneys as dens, raising the young on the smoke shelf or the top of the fireplace

box," he said. He warned homeowners trying to remove home invaders in the spring and summer that baby animals may be present.

Graham recommended securely fastening a commercial sheet metal cap and heavy screen over the top of chimneys to prevent raccoon access. This also prevents birds from nesting in chimneys.

Various chimney caps are available at moderate cost with relatively simple installation. Upon inquiry of a local building supplier I found one called a "draft-master" that has an expanding base to fit inside chimneys of different sizes. It has a top cover with screens on the sides and serves not only to keep out birds but diverts rain as well.

Now, if I can just get the birds out and find someone to climb up and install the cover....

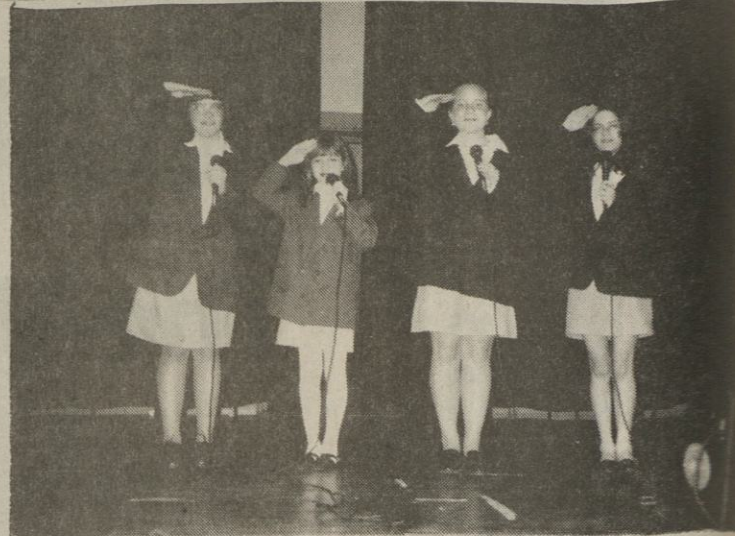

#### False Pregnancies

Dogs and cats normally reach sexual maturity at about 6 months of age. That's about the time they first come in heat. But after that, there's little similarity between dogs and cats.

In dogs, heat cycles last from 1 to 15 days. The average is about 9 days. They occur from one to three times per year and are generally equally spaced. True heat (called estrus) is the only time a female will accept a male.

Cats, on the other hand, are seasonally polyestrous. When they do come into heat, they may demonstrate unusual behavior, including swishing, rolling and profuse vocalization. They typically cycle into and out of heat several times over a period of 1-2 months. After 3 to 4 months, the cycle repeats. Normally, there is discharge from the vulva.

During the week prior to true heat (called proestrus), female dogs will discharge red, bloody, discharge. During true heat, the discharge is white and the female will demonstrate a willingness to accept the male.

If a female dog becomes pregnant, the duration of pregnancy (called gestation) averages 63 days. Pregnancy can be diagnosed as early as 21 days by abdominal palpation (by some experienced in abdominal palpation). Ultrasound examination permits early diagnosis.

False Pregnancy is a relatively common phenomenon that occurs in female dogs about two months following a heat cycle. Treatment is not recommended, although spaying is the most permanent means of eliminating the problem.

#### Good Vision And VDTs

If you spend a lot of your time at work sitting in front of a video display terminal (VDT), this can cause vision problems to develop or aggravate existing vision anomalies.

Headaches, blurred or double vision, flickering sensations, eyes that itch and burn by the end of the day are some of the symptoms that may occur.

Tension and eye fatigue can result from poor eye focusing and deficient eye coordination. You may be having difficulty in seeing clearly, in changing your focus from the VDT to objects at a distance. Only an eye examination can determine what may be causing problems. For example, if you are farsighted you may have to work harder to maintain a clear focus when viewing your VDT.

Or it could be some other vision problem, such as astigmatism or nearsightedness, that needs correction. Discuss your symptoms with your eye doctor.

### Gaming Commission Already Ruled To Revoke License Last Summer

One of the two bingo halls in Tishomingo County has asked a judge to continue to allow them to operate, even if the Mississippi Gaming Commission refuses to renew their licenses in a Thursday hearing.

Amvets 350 Bingo, which operates in the former Sunflower building on Constitution Drive in Iuka, has joined with a Tupelo establishment, Vietnow Bingo, in an appeal to the Lee County Circuit Court, where they have filed a motion saying they anticipate the Gaming Commission will deny their annual renewal petitions. The Amvets 350 license expires July 21st, and the Vietnow license expired June 14th.

The clubs are already fighting the Commission's order to revoke their licenses and are operating under a temporary restraining order issued by Lee County Circuit Court Judge Frank Russell last fall in response to the

club's appeal of the commission's revocation order.

Judge Russell has said he is unsure when he would issue a ruling on the clubs' latest motions, which state that "the clubs reasonably believe and allege that the Gaming Commission intends not to renew their licenses based upon the same alleged conduct of the (clubs) which led the commission to seek license revocation and monetary penalties in the first instance," Jackson attorney Peter Doran said in the motion. If the Commission is permitted to deny license renewal, the intent of the court's restraining order "will be thwarted, and the court's power to fashion equitable remedies rendered meaningless. . .," Doran argued.

Warren Strain, of the Gaming Commission public relations office, said that the licenses must be renewed every other year, and that last summer Special Gaming Commission hearing examiner

Larry Stroud ruled that the licenses for both organizations be revoked after his investigation and four days of hearings. He also ordered Amvets 350 to pay \$48,000 in fines for violating numerous Commission regulations, including falsifying records, illegally transferring bingo paper - cards - to another bingo operator, and failure to maintain proper supervision of operations and finances.

Vietnow, of Tupelo, was ordered to pay \$10,000 in fines. Amvets reported an after-prize income of more than \$600,000 on total revenues of about \$3.3 million. Most of the after-prize income went to building lessors and material suppliers. Gaming Commission officials contend that little had gone toward true charitable causes.

The Commission is scheduled to consider the license renewals in a hearing at 9 a.m. Thursday.

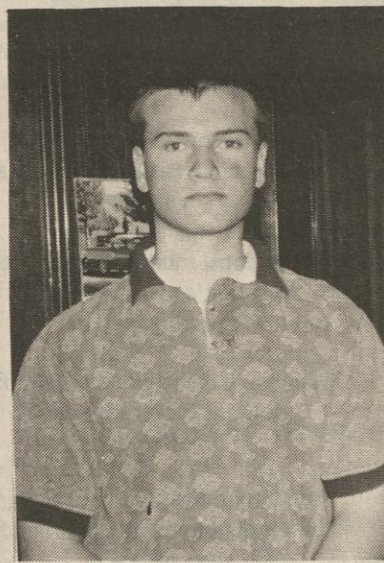

### Hunting Meets Strong Enforcement On Parkway

Illegal hunting activities along the Natchez Trace Parkway met stiff enforcement during the 1996-1997 season. From January, 1996, through May, 1997, Parkway rangers investigated twenty-four wildlife protection incidents. These incidents include night hunting, spotlighting, hunting by aid of motor vehicle, and illegal taking, or killing, of wildlife. Of these, ten arrests leading to convictions were made in state and federal courts. Depending on the severity of the offense and the offender's previous record, penalties for illegal hunting included fines and court costs of over \$2000, incarceration, banishment from the Parkway, loss of state hunting privileges for up to five years, forfeiture of weapons, vehicles, and other personal property involved, and restitution of up to \$1000 per incident to the Natchez Trace Wildlife Protection Fund.

"We take poaching on the Natchez Trace Parkway seriously," said Assistant Chief Ranger Tim Francis. "The mission of the National Park Service includes preserving and protecting the wildlife, as well as the cultural and natural resources, for this and future generations. Hunting activities and possession of firearms are prohibited within Parkway boundaries." Firearms that are being transported and are unloaded, cased, and stored in a manner that they are unavailable for use are excepted.

Francis stated that cooperation between the Parkway and state game and fish agencies, in addition to information provided by visitors, responsible sportsmen, and adjacent landowners, led to these convictions. Travelers on the Parkway can report illegal activities by calling the Natchez Trace Parkway toll-free, 24-hour, emergency line - 1-800-300-PARK (7275).

## Report From Congress

By: U.S. Rep. Roger F. Wicker

### Wicker Working For New Interstate Through Mississippi

When Congress adopted the National Highway System bill in 1995, an important component of the legislation was the inclusion of plans to study building a north/south highway, linking American cities from Detroit to Houston. This highway, designated I-69, represents a sound investment for the country and offers the potential of significant economic benefits for underdeveloped areas along the corridor.

The project can be viewed in two ways: 1) the economic benefits and transportation improvement it will produce for the nation as a whole, and 2) its impact on local communities in the eight states of the corridor running from Michigan through the Mid-South to Texas.

In the "big picture," completion of this 1,800-mile highway will stimulate international trade by connecting Canada and Mexico with the population-rich Northeast section of the country and the growing manufacturing base in the South.

Closer to home, transportation officials, community development executives, and local leaders are already mapping out plans to take advantage of this route on a local and regional level.

History tells us that when an interstate highway is built, increased economic activity is soon to follow. As many as 40,000 jobs are expected to be created by the year 2025 along the highway route. New business opportunities and other spinoff economic benefits from I-69 will boost tourism and help raise the standard of living throughout the region.

I am encouraged by the development potential I-69 could bring to Mississippi. Because an efficient transportation system is a key factor in business expansion and relocation decisions, I-69 will give our state more opportunities to compete.

Firms looking for a new "home" will like what they find in Mississippi. Our state has a very positive, business-friendly atmosphere including low energy costs, an abundant water supply, a willing workforce, and a favorable tax policy. While economic development officials might offer such a sales pitch, impartial observers have reached the same conclusion.

The Whirlpool Corporation has ranked Mississippi first in business climate among the 23 states which have major appliance manufacturing plants. Whirlpool cited factors including health care, wages, education, low crime statistics, and low taxes.

The business magazine, Plants Sites and Parks, placed Mississippi in the top 10 in the nation for new plant locations. The magazine said, "Word of southern hospitality in Mississippi is spreading, especially among small to medium sized manufacturers. Economic development officials go out of their way to make smaller manufacturers feel important and wanted."

Planners project I-69 could generate \$40 million in business revenues and create more than 1,300 jobs in Mississippi over a 10 year period. An interstate highway will also improve the quality of

life by providing better access to health care facilities, schools, cultural, and recreational opportunities.

Initial studies have demonstrated the feasibility of this project. Further study is being given to defining specific route locations within the more broad corridor area. Ultimately, however, the task of moving this project forward will fall upon those of us in Congress who strongly support completion of I-69, as we seek necessary authorization and funding legislation.

## NARFE News

The Mississippi Federation of Chapters Convention 1997 was held 18-20 May 1997 at the Ramada Plaza Hotel in Jackson, MS.

The Jacinto Chapter was represented by Mrs. Helen M. Nixon, President; Mrs. Mildred N. Hill, Secretary - Treasurer; Mr. and Mrs. Ray M. Sartor, Past Federation President and Secretary for 1996.

A memorial service was held Sunday evening for 97 members who passed away during the past year. Ninety-seven white carnations were displayed to represent these members. The one deceased member from Jacinto Chapter was Mr. William M. Sanders, Blue Mountain, MS.

On Monday morning Congressman Bennie G. Thompson, U.S. House of Representatives, 2nd District, gave the opening address. Rep. Thompson reported that the present federal budget calls for no delay in COLA benefits. CPI remains on the same formula and health benefits remain intact at this time. He did, however, urge NARFE members to remain vigilant as it was possible that amendments may be offered that would impact negatively on federal retiree benefits. He emphasized the importance of hand-written messages, even a postcard when contacting our Congressmen and Senators. He gave two 800 numbers (toll free) to

Bess T. Jansen, NARFE National Secretary, gave the keynote address in which she too reported that retiree benefits have been protected to date. She noted that NARFE Board of Directors has decided to sell the present NARFE building near Dupont Circle in the District and relocate to Olde Town, Alexandria, VA. She urged greater effort on securing new members and retaining present members.

Dave Myers, outgoing

Federation President, presented his annual report and noted the following points:

Support Christmas Card Sales for the building fund; Must get Statewide NARFE Net up and running to keep up with developments; Must contact Congressmen several times per year; Need to place more emphasis on membership recruitment and retention; Individual Chapters need to issue a Newsletter for their members; If the CPI needs adjusting, it should be done by economists-not politicians; The Federation actual had a net loss of 135 members last year and this must be turned around; Chapters need a "Caring" network; Each chapter needs an e-mail address for immediate communications.

Jack Thomas, Membership Chairman, reported that there was

a potential of 22,000 NARFE members in Mississippi. However, only 3600 are NARFE National members and of this number only 2700 are Chapter members.
