Booneville Man Found Drowned Near Goat Island Tuesday Night

A Booneville man was found drowned near Goat Island on Pickwick Lake Tuesday evening, according to authorities.

Robert W. Dawson, 40, was found in the water by two fishermen between the Goat Island boat ramp and the Island about 7:45 p.m. on July 1st, said Tishomingo County Deputy Medical Examiner Investigator Mack Wilemon.

The cause of death was ruled accidental drowning, Wilemon

Dawson had been visiting with friends in a nearby cabin, and had gone out to ride a wave runner approximately 45 minutes before he was found. He did have on a life jacket, and was found about 300 yards from shore, his wave runner about 40 yards away, Wilemon said. No one witnessed his fall.

Funeral arrangements are being handled by McMillan Funeral Home of Booneville and were incomplete at presstime.

Dawson served in the military and was a Gulf War Veteran. He is survived by his wife and two children, his mother, and his sister, Mrs. Lana Harrelson, a teacher at Tishomingo County High School.

Welfare Law Changes Emphasize Getting People Back to Work

Welfare reform legislation is making some changes in the state and here in Tishomingo County.

"We are requiring ablebodied adults to work," explained state Representative Ricky Cummings in a recent speaking engagement at the Tishomingo Chamber of Commerce, where he outlined welfare reform legislation passed in the last term of the Mississippi State Legislature. "We are putting more money towards job training than for traditional welfare," Cummings said.

Though many of the reforms affecting Tishomingo County actually started in October of 1996, several policies go into effect July

Lifetime Limits

In one of the bills that passed the legislature, recipients are limited to no more than five years total, in a lifetime, on economic assistance, and able-bodied adults are limited to only 24 months total, in a lifetime, and then they are no longer eligible for assistance.

No one without children is eligible for the state-administered federal block grant money, and the only exceptions for the lifetime five- or two-year limits are for some handicapped people.

Per the federal welfare changes, able-bodied persons without children can get food stamps for only three out of 36 months.

"The language of the legisla-

tion is pretty strong," said Margaret June Riley, the Tishomingo County Director of the Economic Assistance Division of the Department of Human Services. "It is time for welfare reform, and a reduction in dependence on gov-

Though many have been critical of the potential impacts of the changes to children, Riley feels that it will give the children a sense of pride to see their parents working, and improving themselves with job training. **Details of the Changes**

The monetary assistance that may have been known as a "welfare check" in the past would have been part of the Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC), which is now abolished, according to Riley.

Now the aid, which is limited to families with children, comes under the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program, Riley explained.

Now people who come in to the economic assistance office are referred to a case manager, and the TANF Work Program, which sends parents (no one without children is eligible), out to get a job, begin a job training program that focuses on preparation for employment, not a long-drawnout education program.

While on the TANF program monetary payments are only \$60 a month for one person, \$96 a month for two people, and \$120

for three, Riley explained.

If a person refuses to comply with the training or working requirements, sanctions will begin, and they will lose their monetary assistance and food stamps, Riley said. Another regulation that kicked in July 1 is that recipients must cooperate with the Division of Child Support in their efforts to obtain child support monies from absent parents.

Riley said there are no TANF cases in Tishomingo County with two able-bodied parents in the

The 24-month limit started in October of last year, Riley explained.

One of Lowest Case Loads

Contrary to some popularly held beliefs, Tishomingo County has one of the lowest case loads in the state, Riley said.

For example, not more than 50 cases have been referred to the TANF work program, she said. There are some cases, where the recipient is disabled, that are in the TANF program, but not in the TANF work program. Total number of cases on the TANF program as of May 1 was 84 families.

There are 727 families receiving food stamps in Tishomingo County and 293 cases that receive Medicaid, Riley said. The Medicaid cases Riley reports are pregnant women and children, and each case could mean a family.

Amvets Bingo License **Renewal Moved** To July Agenda

An Iuka bingo operation has a temporary reprieve from a potential loss of license after the Mississippi Gaming Commission chose not to act on its license renewal request at a meeting last

Amvets 350 in Iuka is one of two bingo operations that Commission investigators have recommended revocation of license, after they allegedly violated numerous Commission regulations. It is operating under a temporary restraining order to continue operations pending judicial review of the revocation order. Gaming Commission Bingo Division Director Eddie Bays said that the Amvets 350 issue will be on the agenda of the next meeting, scheduled tentatively for July 24th. Amvets' license expires July 21st.

In last Thursday's meeting, the Commission refused to renew the license of Tupelo's Vietnow bingo operation, but that hall will also most likely continue to operate until Lee County Circuit Judge Frank Russell completes a review of a motion filed by the attorney representing both Vietnow and Amvets 350 recently.

The motion argues that by refusing to renew the licenses, the Commission is simply trying to accomplish license revocation through another process, since the court is still reviewing the initial appeal the bingo operators filed concerning the revocation order.

Time For A New Coat Of Paint?

While driving about and observing, I have become aware of house painting needs and difficulties this Spring. It is that time of year again when homeowners need to take a close look at their house and determine what it needs with respect to

painting and repairs.

Keeping your home protecting with quality paints can save money in repair and maintenance costs over a period of years. A well-painted house reflects not only pride of ownership, but increases property values for all concerned.

Because the labor costs represent more than 90 percent of

the total painting cost, you may want to do the job yourself. Recognize, however, that there is good reason for the labor cost; a lot of time and work is required!

Normally, houses need painting about every five years, depending on the quality of the paint used and the environmental conditions. If you let a house go too long, the old paint will be a poor base and require more preparation work. If you paint too often, you could end up with a thick crust that will eventually crack and peel.

Whether you plan to do the work yourself or hire a contractor you should be aware of problems with the condition of the surfaces to be painted. The more you know, the

better able you will be to choose methods and materials for good results and to evaluate cost.

Some of the more common paint problems include peeling, alligatoring, checking, blistering, bleeding nail stain, mildew and chalking. A short explanation of each follows:

Peeling is caused by moisture from inside or from long periods of exposure to rain or other moisture.

Alligatoring, checking and blistering result from several different mistakes. One cause is when several coats are applied without sufficient drying time between coats. Another cause is having an undercoat that is not compatible with the finished coat. Other causes include using too much thinner or a poor grade of

Bleeding is simply sap and pitch working out of the wood and is usually more noticeable on newer homes.

Mildew occurs from a combination of moisture, inadequate ventilation, or high humidity and high temperature which stimulates fungus growth.

Chalking happens after inadequate preparation of the surface when the paint was applied or from the formulation of the paint used.


Proper preparation of the surface is all-important to a good paint job. Even if the surfaces are free of defects, make sure they are also completely dry and clean. All loose dirt should be brushed off, and washed with detergent if necessary. If grease or oil stains remain, try a solvent such as turpentine.

Defective paint should be cleaned off using a scraper, wire brush or steel wool. For mildewed surfaces, wash the area thoroughly with an alkaline cleaning solution such as a chlorine bleach. Caulk all holes and cracks and clean rust from all metal areas. Sink exposed nail heads with a nail set, prime with rust inhibitor and fill hole with putty.

New wood, surfaces from which defective paint has been cleaned, and metal surfaces should be coated with a primer suited to the surface and to the finish coat to be used. For best results, use the same type of paint, either oil base

*Rabies vaccine. Shots for kittens are typically combined with their first examination at 9 weeks of age. Follow up shots are given just three weeks later at 12 weeks of age, then annually. Veterinarians

recommend vaccinations depending on the incidence of disease in your area and the particular risks your cat faces. Feline Leukemia is particularly important for kittens and cats that are in contact with other cats or that spend time outdoors where the risk of exposure to infected cats is

high.

Rabies vaccination i important. In the U.S., there are more rabies cases reported each year in cats than dogs. Rabies shots for cats usually begin at 3 to 4 months of age After the first dose, regardless of the cats age, a booster must be given 1 year later. Subsequently, cats vaccinated against rabies either one time each year or once every three years. depending on your state's regulations.

Other vaccines you may want to ask your veterinarian about, but are usually reserved for cats that have specific risk, include: *Feline chlamydia *Feline Infectious Peritonitis *Ringworm.

For example, a Mississippi family with an income of \$35,000 and two children would have its federal income taxes cut by 40 percent, thanks to the \$500 perchild tax credit. If one of those children is a college student, the family would qualify for an additional \$1,500 credit in education tax incentives, which would reduce their tax liability by a total of 78 percent.

A Mississippi family with two children and \$50,000 in annual income would have its tax liability reduced by 27 percent. If the family also qualified for the college tax credit, its taxes would be cut in half.

Despite the familiar and tired claims by opponents that cutting the capital gains tax rate would benefit the rich, Internal Revenue Service records show that 56 percent of all families reporting capital gains make less than \$50,000. Many Mississippians have delayed selling assets such as timber, farm land, or a small business because of the high capital gains tax rate.

Cutting the rate on capital gains to 10 percent for a family with income below \$41,000, and 20 percent for income above that income level would boost the Mississippi economy and create more job opportunities.

This bill provides some peace of mind for families affected by the estate tax by raising the exemption rate from \$600,000 to \$1 million. The estate tax is a disincentive to work and investment. Parents should not be penalized for working hard and accumulating assets with the intention of passing them on to the next generation, yet that is the effect of the estate tax. Family members should not be forced to sell off the assets they inherit to pay the death tax.

In years past, news that Congress was working on a tax bill meant a tax increase and more money being sent to Washington. this time, for the first time in nearly a generation, that trend has been reversed.





The History Of Holcut School

Approximately 1893, in a wooded area, stood a small one room school named Lebanon. It was located in Tishomingo County about one-half mile from the Prentiss County line, on the Jacinto and Paden road.

Rodford Tynes, Edd Timbes, Joe Clark and Ora Nixon, were among the first teachers that taught there.

Each year brought new pupils, until it was decided they needed another room. In the year 1900, W.A. Nixon gave some land, approximately one mile North East, where they built a two room elementary school, and called it the "Nixon School". In a hollow near this site, was a spring. The larger boys and girls would bring water in buckets up the hill, for the younger ones. It was a real treat to pass to the fourth grade, so they could go down the hill for a refreshing drink. This school had a boys basketball team second to none. For a period of two or three years they won every game they played. Some of the teachers that taught at this school, were Effie Syble Loveless, McAnally

Woodruff Savage, Alta Hill South, Ward Glascow and Edith Nagles. There could have been others that I didn't learn about.

About 1915, it was necessary to enlarge this school, for the had enrollment tremendously. When the Trustees and Parents met, it was decided again to move and build a fourroom building. They called it "Holcut", which had been named for the land owners, John Holder and Eli Callicutt. They put the first three letters of Holder H-O-L and the last three letters of Callicut C-U-T, there by making it "Holcut."

Some of the teachers that taught at this school were Vincent Smith, Ruth Holder, George Bacon, Frank Rhodes, Ena

Browning, Jenny Chase, Lydia Wren Holder, Susie Burns, Beatrice Holder, Thelma Ross Gray, Artie Timbes, and Will Lambert.

In 1928, approximately seventeen pupils graduated from the eight grade. Mr. Lambert told us if we would come back the next year, they would add the nineth

grade, and when the regular short term school ended, he would teach us another month for a small donation, in order to get credit for our work. By this time a bond issue had passed for a new High School to be built just North of the plank building. The new brick building was finished by late 1930. With the help of the one room schools, and the High School pupils from Midway, Rowland Mills, and Clausel Hill and Sardis, we continued to grow, with a good staff of teachers. The students were capable of competing with students from other schools, in academics and

sports. I will name the principles,

as many as I can remember: (1)

H.A. Burch, (2) Clarence Chase,

(3) L.G. Phillips, (4) S.W. Downs,

and (5) O.T. Eaton. In 1932,

After months of feeling alone, I finally overcame my grief to discover myself again. Except the person I discovered had a determination to help others overcome their own grief through education. My first step was making people of all ages aware that grief affects everyone, whether young or old, at some point in their lives. I knew in order to help children deal with grief, I had to educate adults. That meant speaking at meetings, churches, and social events. I emphasized to my audiences, "If you are old enough to love, you are old enough to grieve."

My second step was to design program filled with songs, stories, and puppets that would easily define grief for young people. I "magically" became Pocahontas, Jasmine and the Little Mermaid only to intrigue thousands of children with my unique message about grief. I let them know they should never suppress their feelings of grief, but express them to teachers, parents,

and even friends like me.

In the end, my Prince Charming may be gone, but he left me with a personal understanding about grief. That understanding is related to adults and young people alike through my grief program. We will all experience grief at some point in out lives. We just don't have to experience it alone.

Grief counseling for the youth is not only needed in my area, but other areas. By making people aware of the need for grief programs, I will have successfully completed only one chapter of my

Until then, my fairy tale will continue and eventually end, with a "happily ever after."



Be Safe Over July 4th Weekend

The Mississippi Highway Safety Patrol will be utilizing all of its available resources over the Fourth of July weekend to ensure the safety and protection of the motoring public.

Troopers and the Air Operations Division of the MHSP will join enforcement efforts to detect and deter drivers who are driving under the influence, speeding, or driving reckless.

help stranded motorists and to offer any other needed assistance. "We will have extra radar details and road blocks throughout the state looking for various traffic violations, unsafe vehicles, impaired drivers, felons, and any other illegal activity," Col. Tom Ward, MHSP director said. "MHSP aircraft will be used extensively during peak travel times beginning Thursday through Sunday to assist ground operations."

Major traffic arteries throughout the state will have an additional 75 troopers assigned to work "call back" details. This is a federally funded program that pays troopers to work these details when they would ordinarily be off

Mississippi Highway Patrol Criminal Investigation Bureau personnel will be working throughout the Holiday weekend to respond to any criminal activity that occurs on state and federal highways. They will be working jointly with the uniform division and other law enforcement agencies. The Traveling Criminal Apprehension officers will be utilized in making drug interdiction stops; locating fugitives, illegal aliens, missing and exploited children, stolen automobiles heavy and equipment.

Lt. Col. Marvin Curtis, MHSP assistant director said, "Drivers with cellular phones who have emergencies should dial *HP (*47) for assistance from the nearest MHSP Troop." Curtis encourages all motorists to report any accidents or traffic problems, especially drivers who may be intoxicated. Drivers and occupants are encouraged to use seat belts and take other safety precautions while in their vehicles over the holidays.

According to statistics during the 1996 Fourth of July observance, four people were killed in motor vehicle accidents. Troopers arrested 310 drivers under the influence of alcohol and drugs with a total of 8,929 citations.

The Fourth of July Holiday officially begins at 6 p.m. on Thursday, July 3 and ends at midnight on Sunday, July 6.






