## \$1,044,000 In Marijuana Seized

More than a million dollars in cultivated marijuana plants were seized by the Tishomingo Sheriff's Department Monday.

With the assistance of the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics, the sheriff's department found and pulled 1,045 plants in remote, but undisclosed, areas of the county, according to Sheriff David Smith.

Street value was estimated by MBN officers at about \$1,000 per plant, and the seized plants were from 4 to 10 feet tall.

Several other fields are still under surveillance, Smith said.

"We could use a four- to five-day mission," he said of the two-day mission, which utilized Bureau helicopters for air surveillance. "We have only just scratched the surface."

No arrests have been made, said Smith, who said the way they currently investigate such operations has its flaws.

"Since we are assisted by the air support of the Bureau, we have to do it to their regulations," Smith said, who also said limited manpower is sometimes a problem in such cases.

"We have to try to keep the plants from getting on the street, so we don't always have the time or men to sit and watch the different fields to see who is Monday afternoon


cultivating them after they are identified by air. At least we are keeping some off the street," Smith said.

Such was the case with a large seizure last summer, in which no arrests have been made

If anyone has any information

about this or other cases of marijuana cultivation, they are encouraged to call the sheriff's department at 423-6185.

The Alcorn County Sheriff's Department and Sheriff Jimmy Taylor were also very helpful in this operation, donating trucks and men to the effort.

About 30 households and much of Tishomingo State Park were affected by a break in a water line in Dennis Saturday morning of the busy 4th of July weekend.

The Dennis Water Association issued a boil order, asking people to boil their drinking water, as a precaution, until results are received from the State Health Department later this week.

Eugene Butler, operator for the Dennis Water Association, said he got his first call about 4 a.m. Saturday morning, July 5th.

As many as 100 people camping in Tishomingo State Park and more than 30 homes along Highland Road (County Road 87) to the water tower near Highway 30 were without water from early morning until about 1:30 p.m., Butler said.

"Thankfully we had no one in the group camp, and the part of the park near the lake still had water," said Tishomingo State Park Manager Bill Brekeen. "But we did have some complaints."

Apparently the break occurred behind the park at Dennis, near the railroad tracks, Butler reported.

Egg Safety And Ice Cream

June Dairy Month is past but, to me, July is ice cream month especially for the home-made kind. Apparently other folks think so too, for we had good response to the "ice cream reception" in the Alcorn County Extension Office last week. The Jacinto July celebration usually has homemade ice cream, as I recall, though I did not get to participate this year. Perhaps you are making some for your 4th of July week-end.

Good as it is, we need to remember food safety when mixing that concoction of eggs, milk, sugar and flavoring for

freezing. Summer temperatures that make iced foods such a treat also contribute to faster growth of bacteria that cause food-borne

Raw eggs have attracted food safety concerns in recent years and have been blamed for an increasing number of cases of illness. The good news is that proper storing, handling and cooking of eggs can prevent it happening.

According to the Poultry Division of USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, most eggborne illnesses are a result of leaving eggs out at room

temperature, pooling eggs and incomplete cooking.

Pooling eggs occurs most food in establishments where many eggs are cracked into one bowl for later use, and the bowl left out at room temperature for a long period of time. So if bacteria was present in one of the eggs it would have time to grow and multiply and contaminate the whole batch.

Although pooling occurs most in food service, consumers should be aware of risks associated with cracking several eggs into one bowl and be careful to keep them cold until cooking and then cook thoroughly.

At the store, always choose Grade A and AA eggs with clean, uncracked shells. But only refrigerated eggs - never those sitting out at room temperature. If the carton has a "Use by Date" printed on it, be sure it has not

Take the eggs directly home after purchase, don't leave them in a hot car while you do other errands. At home, put eggs into a 40 degree refrigerator as soon as possible. Leave them in the original carton and place it in a colder section of the refrigerator, not on the door.

When handling eggs, wash hands, utensils, equipment and work areas with hot, soapy water before and after they come in contact with eggs and raw egg rich foods. Avoid keeping eggs out of the refrigerator for more than two hours, including time for preparation and serving.

Many of our favorite recipes like homemade ice cream, mayonnaise and others - contain raw eggs and should not be considered safe. A similar recipe that incorporates a step where the eggs are cooked is better from the standpoint of safety.

Here is a recipe for frozen custard ice cream that is both safe and good: 6 eggs, 2 cups milk, 3/4 cup sugar; 2 to 3 tablespoons honey; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 2 cups whipping cream; 1 tablespoon vanilla.

In saucepan, beat together eggs, milk, sugar, honey and salt. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until mixture is thick enough to coat a metal spoon with a thin film and reaches at least 160

#### **Discrimination Against People with Disabilities**

Many employers are subject to the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), the federal law to help end job discrimination against people with disabilities and make public places more accessible to them.

Among other things, the ADA prevents employers from discriminating against people with disabilities in all job areas, including hiring, promotion, and salary. It also requires employers to make reasonable efforts to accommodate disabled workers, unless doing so creates an "undue burden."

People with disabilities who believe they have been discriminated against can seek legal help to enforce their rights under the ADA.

Seizures are the mor common neurological disorde affecting dogs, but they quite rare in cats. Although there are many causes seizures, the seizure disord most often diagnosed in dog is inherited epilepsy. Seizura if they occur, typically begin between the ages of 9 and 3







The Sheriff's Iuka City Board Department took ver dispatching responsibilities last ear, at the request of the city for an

mount of \$1,800 a month. At the end of April \$13,920 was still wed, and Deputy Steve Vatalaro, representing the sheriff, was at the meeting to request payment in

Mayor Nichols said that the city attorney recommended not paying the bill until a written agreement was finalized.

Apparently, at the time of the service switchover, the sheriff's department agreed to furnish a written document that would clearly identify the responsibilities of the city and the county dispatch service, who now does the dispatching for the Iuka Police Department. Such an agreement has not yet been received, said

Currently, persons wishing to contact Iuka City officers must go through the dispatching desk at the sheriff's office. This does allow for more centralized law enforcement dispatching, supporters have said.

The issue will be raised at the next board meeting.

The board authorized a budget revision of \$18,000 to the street project. The budget was exhausted, but not the money for recent street improvements, explained Nichols. This will cover

the work that has been done to date, and allow for striping of downtown and other miscellaneous work.






