Masked, Armed Men Rob Alabama Package Store

Two men are still at large after they held four persons at gunpoint while robbing a Colbert County package store last Saturday night.

According to Colbert County Alabama Sheriff Buddy Aldridge, two masked men armed with handguns robbed the R & L Spirits package store (formerly Alfred's) about 9:15 p.m. Saturday. They forced a customer who was outside the store to go in with them, and then demanded cash from the two cashiers and

was hurt during the incident. By the time the Colbert

County Sheriff's Department received the call from one of the robbery victims at R & L, the two had already left the establishment in a light-colored car, thought to be a early 1980s model Chevrolet, and were headed west on U.S. Highway 72.

The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department was dispatched to the scene and alerted to watch for the gunmen, but they were not sighted again.

They took an undetermined another R & L employee. No one amount of cash and an individual's wallet, said Aldridge.

The identification of the men is unknown, Aldridge said. The two white males were both more than 6 feet tall, and were both armed with handguns. One wore a ski mask during the incident, and the other a bandana over his face

Aldridge asked that anyone with any information regarding the incident or the identification of the two men to call the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department at 423-6185 or the Colbert County Sheriff's Department at (205)383-0741.

Man Arrested; 184 Plants Seized by **Sheriff Dept** by Pamela McRae

A Burnsville man is in custody and 184 marijuana plants were confiscated after a law enforcement team raided his Burnsville home Tuesday evening, according to Tishomingo County Sheriff

men posing as home improvement professionals entered the couple's home in downtown Cherokee to gather information on home improvements.

The men did not specify employment with any company, and both appeared to be between the ages of 35 and 40. One was dressed professionally, in a black suit, Norman said, and they may have been driving a dark green van.

One man took the couple into the bedroom, to measure the walls, while the other man took about \$2,000 from the woman's purse in the living room, Norman said.

The couple was promised an estimate for the improvements by mail in a few days.

Norman said this was the only such incident that had been reported, and that the investigation was continuing.

Law enforcement officials say these kind of scams primarily prey on the elderly, who often are trusting and don't thoroughly question door.

"Don't let in people you don't know," advises Smith. "Look for official identification in the form of company logos on vehicles, or uniforms. People who are legitimate should immediately offer official identification prior to being admitted to your home," said Smith.

Lance Heavener, 34, of 15 Ruby Lane in Burnsville, was charged with possession of marijuana with intent to distribute and manufacturing marijuana. His initial hearing was scheduled for Wednesday morning.

The 6 p.m. raid resulted in 184 marijuana plants being confiscated from a field about 50 yards from Heavener's house, some as tall as four feet. Street value of each plant is estimated to be from \$1,000 to \$2,000, said Smith.

Other items confiscated included marijuana paraphernalia, and a misdemeanor amount of marijuana inside the house.

The sheriff's department was aided in the operation by the Burnsville police, Mississippi State Troopers, and the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics.

"Once again, cooperation between agencies was critical to the success of this investigation," said Sheriff David Smith.

An Easy Way To Protect Cucumbers And Cantaloupes From Belly Rot

Having problems with fruit rot in your cucumber and cantaloupes? It's no wonder. given our wetter than usual gardening conditions this season, a lot of otherwise edible cucumbers and cantaloupes have been lost to belly rot. And, this disease doesn't take long to ruin otherwise good quality cucumbers and cantaloupes. Belly rot is a fungus problem which shows up when moisture collects on the "belly" of the fruit, and is most often a problem following rainy periods, so anything that will keep the bottom-side of cucumber and cantaloupe fruits dry will help reduce the rot problem. One approach that has been used successfully of placement discarded egg crating or fruit material crating beneath cucumbers or cantaloupes. Crating material can be cut down to the appropriate size and placed under the fruit while they're still small and less susceptible to infection by the belly rot fungus. The crating should be placed so that fruits are cradled, thus insuring faster drying following rainfall. Plastic foam crating will also work, but remember to remove these following the gardening season, since Mother Nature won't break down this material. Other materials can be used, just as long as they provide a barrier to promote a little "breathing room" beneath the bottom of fruits and the soil. What about chemicals for control of the problem? Fungicides don't work too well, so give soil barriers a try. And, keep your fingers crossed for weather conditions more favorable for home vegetable gardening.

Pumpkins

When to plant? Larger varieties take longer to mature so check the maturity date. On a 120 day variety you will need to plant NOW. Where to plant? Select a site that receives full sun, has rich, well-drained soil with a ph around 6.0, is close to a water source, is free of serious weed problems, and is away from squash that may be a



source of insects or diseases. Give each plant plenty of space, and treat regularly with a fungicide and insecticide. At no time should the soil be allowed to become completely dry but be careful not to over-water and drown the

plants. Water early in the morning and keep water off the leaves to prevent diseases. It is possible for a growing pumpkin to gain 20 pounds a day and that is mostly water. Fertilization? Using a water soluble fertilizer can prevent overfertilization foliage and root burns. Compost and composted manure will improve the soil and give stronger vines. Large pumpkins are subject to sunburn and cooking in the hot summer sun when they stick up above the leaves. This causes them to collapse. Consider placing some type of sun screen or shade over the pumpkin but not the vines.

"Making the transition from high school to college can be a traumatic experience, and we will attempt to ease the strain through our orientation program.








Huge Rattle Snake Killed - Last Thursday night, Odle Davis killed this 56-inch rattlesnake near his Hubbard Salem home.

56-Inch Long Rattlesnake Killed; Watch for Snakes

A 56-inch long rattlesnake that weighed 22 pounds, and was as big around as a man's leg was was shot and killed about ten feet from the front door of a home in the Hubbard Salem area.

Mr. Odle Davis killed the rattlesnake last Thursday night with his .22 caliber rifle, after an afternoon of hunting on his fourwheeler for the snakes that seem particularly numerous this year in the Hubbard Salem area, which is near the former NASA site at Yellow Creek. The snake measured 10 inches around, Davis said, and he shot it in his driveway.

Davis had just that afternoon returned from neighbor Gerald Grisham's home, where Grisham had also killed a rattler that day, not to mention another Grisham had killed in his garden not two weeks earlier.

Nearby, Mrs. Billie Bonds also had a close encounter recently with a rattler sporting at least a dozen "rattles," who chose her front porch as a fine place to nap. She called the nearby One Stop Grocery for assistance, and a man from there and her daughter

Sissy assisted the snake on to its final resting place, reported Davis.

Another Hubbard Salem resident, Rev. Oneal Davis, also killed a 53-inch long rattler that was sighted by his wife Fairy and grandson Zack Crum. The Hubbard Salem and

Coleman Park areas are well known for their snake populations, and over the years this paper has received many reports and pictures of the snakes that folks kill up there. In fact, more than 30 years ago, the County News ran a photo of Odle's father, the late Lee Belle Davis, with a sizable rattler. Odle says his father used to say that the snakes have a den in Caney Hollow, which is about 1/2 mile from his home, which is the old Davis homeplace, where he grew up

Step carefully and be on the lookout for these deadly creatures, Davis said. Whether the wet summer weather is responsible for the seemingly large snake population this year is unknown, but whatever the reason, caution is urged when in any wilderness environment.

Area Students Named To Dean's List At Auburn University

Auburn University students who meet specific scholastic requirements each quarter are placed on a list for the dean of the student's school or college for recognition of outstanding academic achievement.

To qualify for the dean's list, students must be enrolled for 15 or more graded credit hours, pass all courses attempted for the quarter and earn a grade point average of at least 3.4. Report From Congress By: U.S. Rep. Roger F. Wicker

Rep. Wicker Vows To Fight For **TVA After House Panel Votes To Eliminate Funding**

U.S. Rep. Roger Wicker today vowed to fight an action by a House panel which would eliminate all federal appropriations for the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA).

The House Appropriations Subcommittee on Energy and Water Development directed TVA to continue operating its nonpower programs such as flood control, navigation, and economic development, but instructed the agency to use electric power revenues in order the fund these programs.

"This is an unprecedented action and something I plan to vigorously fight. It is unfair to the people of Mississippi and the entire Tennessee Valley area," Wicker said.

"Program such as flood control and navigation are multistate, and are properly the responsibility of the federal government. It simply is not fair to put the costs of these programs on the backs of ratepayers."

Rep. Wicker said a major concern is the effect this action could have on commercial and residential power rates in north Mississippi. If TVA is forced to use funds generated from power sales to fund non-power activities, it could result in an increase in utility rates in the TVA region.

"Any hike in electricity rates would have an adverse effect on the climate of economic growth which has been so positive in our

region," he said. Another reason to proceed cautiously is the uncertainty surrounding federal power deregulation. "It would be a

mistake to take such a radical step with a program which has worked so well for more than 60 years, especially at a time when major industry-wide changes are being considered in Congress," he said.

Earlier this year, TVA board chairman Craven Crowell proposed a plan to phase out appropriations for TVA within two years. Several working groups have been meeting to discuss the orderly transfer of TVA nonpower programs to other federal agencies, such as the Army Corps of Engineers.

"We have begun a very constructive and responsible debate about the future of TVA," Wicker said. "But this goes much, much too far."

The Senate spending panel voted to provide \$86 million for TVA's non-power programs for Fiscal Year 1998. Differences between the bills will ultimately be worked out by a conference committee this fall.




