Cherokee Residents Mourn Shocking Deaths of Harold Pugh & Son Joey

The Cherokee Community in northwest Alabama is mourning the shocking deaths of a father and son, who were apparently murdered.

Harold Pugh and his 11-year-old son Joey went fishing together Sunday afternoon, July 20, were feared missing by the family by late Sunday night, and were found dead in suspicious circumstances about 8:30 Monday night. Family, friends, law enforcement and rescue squads from all over the Cherokee, Alabama area cooperated in a search of creeks and the Tennessee River that lasted from about midnight Sunday to when the bodies of the father and son were found in Cane Creek Monday night.

Joint services are being handled by Morrison Funeral Home of Cherokee and will be at 2 p.m. Thursday at First Baptist Church in Barton with Rev. Jim McCrackin officiating. Burial will be in Mynot Cemetery. Visitation will also be at the church from 6-9 p.m. Wednesday evening.

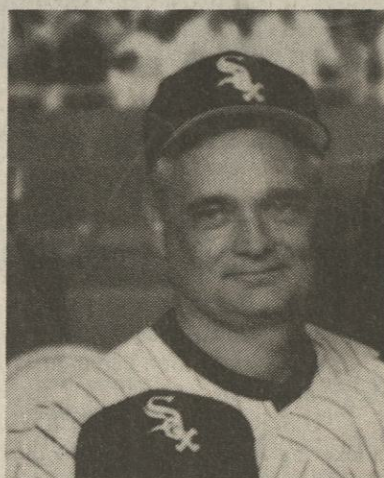
Harold Pugh, 41, loved hunting and fishing and had taken his son on an evening fishing trip; something they enjoyed doing often. They also enjoyed hunting deer and turkey and were members of the Sutton Hill Hunting Club.

"Joey was his life," friends said, and the two enjoyed a close relationship. Harold for many years was a baseball coach and was the coach of Joey's Dixie Youth Baseball Team this summer. Sports were a big part of their lives, and Joey played not only baseball, but also basketball, football and had made the All-Star Team this season.

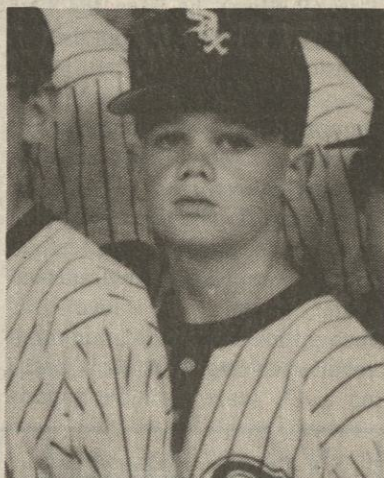
Harold is remembered as an all-around good person, liked by everyone and a good Christian man. Both he and Joey belonged to Barton First Baptist Church.

Harold Pugh is survived by his wife Iris Pugh, his father John Pugh of Cherokee; a brother Carlton Pugh of Tuscumbia; and a step daughter, LeAnne Greene of Tuscumbia. He was preceded in death by his mother, Christine Pugh.

Functional Literacy Scores Up for County Schools

Average Composite Score 20 Points Over State Average

Tishomingo County School District overall composite scores on the Functional Literacy Exam increased by 4.6 points last spring, according to district officials.

Assistant Superintendent Stanley Magill told the Tishomingo County Board in the regular meeting July 14, 1997. The juniors who took the test in April posted an average composite score of 826.0 compared to 821.4 the year before.

The FLE, taken each spring by Mississippi juniors is designed to measure students' understanding of very basic math and English skills needed to

function in everyday life. Passing the FLE is required for graduation, the school board said.

Skills measured in the FLE include: ability to select newspaper and telephone directory information, fill out a check, balance a check book, complete basic forms, and how to write a business letter.

The district tested 195 students and 99 percent of those passed the test. Students have more than one chance to pass the test, Magill said. The test will be administered to all current juniors on November 17-18, 1997 and a make up test will be given in the spring.

2 Men Wanted For Murders of Cherokee Man & Son, Robbery Of Deposit Guaranty National Bank in Belmont

Two suspects are wanted and still at large in connection with a Monday morning bank robbery in Belmont and the brutal murders of a Cherokee man and his 11-year-old son Sunday evening.

The shock of an armed bank robbery in the town of Belmont turned to horror and disbelief later in the day Monday when the investigation revealed a connection between the robbers' apparent escape vehicle and a missing father and son from the Cherokee, Alabama area.

The disappearance of Harold Pugh, 41, and his son, Joey, had been a mystery for Alabama authorities until they received a call from Tishomingo County officials on Monday reporting the burning of the Pugh truck and its connection with a bank robbery in Belmont. The search for the two then took a different direction; it was apparent that fowl play could be involved in their disappearance.

Harold and Joey Pugh had left together around 4 p.m. Sunday on a father-son fishing trip. They did not return at the expected time late Sunday evening, and the family notified the Colbert County Sheriff's Department, said Colbert County Sheriff Buddy Aldridge.

Sunday night through Monday afternoon, sheriff's deputies, the Cherokee Volunteer Fire Department, Cherokee Rescue Squad, Barton Volunteer Fire Department, Tishomingo County Rescue Squad and friends of the family were searching creeks and the banks of the Tennessee River for any sign of the Pughs, or their flat-bottom boat and boat trailer.

About 8:30 Monday evening, the bodies of Harold Pugh and his son Joey were found in the water in Cane Creek near the Colbert Steam Plant.

Rescue crews were dragging the creek, and the boy's body was found first, close to the surface said Joe Morrison, Colbert County Coroner. The father's body was found about 40 yards away. Both had been in the water several hours, Morrison said.

Both Harold and Joey Pugh

were shot more than once, in the head, at close range with a .38 caliber or .357 Magnum-caliber pistol, said Aldridge.

According to authorities, Pugh's 1996 black Chevrolet Z71 pickup was allegedly stolen and used as a get-away vehicle in the Monday morning armed robbery of Deposit Guaranty National

Bank in Belmont. The pickup was found burning on County Road 6 west of Belmont about 15 minutes after the robbery of the bank.

An Alabama license tag, registered to Pugh, was found a few feet from the truck said Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith. And the vehicle identification number traced the truck to Pugh.

There were some reports that witnesses may have seen the truck and trailer at the Cane Creek landing as late as 6:30 or 7 p.m. Sunday.

The boat or trailer had not been located as of Wednesday morning, but volunteers continue to search the Cane Creek area, and surrounding areas.

Deposit Guaranty Robbed

At 10:28 a.m. Monday, July 21st, the Tishomingo County Sheriff Department and Belmont Police received notification of the bank alarm going off at Deposit Guaranty National Bank, located on Highway 25 in the middle of Belmont.

Belmont Police Chief Donald Reno arrived within three minutes of the alarm, left an officer at the scene, and pursued a black pickup, after a teller told him which way it was seen leaving.

Two men clothed in Army fatigues, hoods, and wrap-around sunglasses entered the bank through the front doors, according to Smith. Armed with shotguns, they demanded, and took about \$40,000 from the tellers.

Due to the immediate mobilization of all area law enforcement, including the use of two airplanes to survey the area, the alleged getaway truck was found about fifteen minutes later said Smith, and it was just beginning to burn. The truck, apparently doused with gasoline,

was burned so thoroughly that it doesn't even look black anymore. How the suspects left the site of the burned pickup is still under investigation.

The two suspects were completely covered with clothing, and were reported to be about 5'10" and 5'6" tall, Smith said.

There were five or six tellers in the bank at the time of the robbery, said Smith, and no one was injured.

Smith said he hoped to be able to release pictures from bank security cameras soon, but doubted they would help to identify the suspects, since they were so thoroughly covered.

This was the first bank robbery in the county in recent memory, Smith said.

Officers and investigators with the FBI, Mississippi State Highway Patrol Bureau of Investigation, Belmont Police, Alabama Bureau of Investigation, numerous State Troopers and law enforcement from all neighboring counties are involved in the investigation.

Smith urged all local

residents and businesses to use extreme caution, as the suspects are considered armed and dangerous.

The bank robbery and suspected murders come just a little more than a week after two armed, masked men robbed the R&L Spirits Package store near the Tishomingo County/Alabama state line on July 19th. Smith said he could not say at this time whether the package store holdup was related to the other two incidents. The package store robbers are also still at large.

Home Economics Tips

Be Cognizant Of Change

No one changes more than our government — sometimes it seems capriciously, though sometimes with cause. After tempting our taste buds last week with visions of hamburgers grilled to perfect doneness just until the pink inside turns brown, this week I received word that the Food Safety and Inspection Service is recommending that consumers not rely on the internal color of the meat to determine doneness. They are advising use of a meat thermometer instead, especially when cooking hamburger, as new research indicates that some ground meat may turn prematurely brown before a safe internal temperature of 160 degrees F has been reached. We are pulling our publications from 1996 on Safe Food Handling until they can be revised — so if you already have a copy of any of these, be aware that they are no longer valid.

It is well to use strict sanitation, tempered with a modicum of common sense, when handling any food, but especially those that harbor microorganisms. This includes, but is not limited to, most animal proteins like meat and eggs. "When in doubt, throw it out" is a good rule to observe.

As some people who attended the demonstration in our offices last week learned, methods for preserving foods also have changed. As an example, we no longer recommend using the "open kettle" method for canning — not even for jellies and pickles, whose acid or sugar content is high enough to inhibit growth of microorganisms.

Jellies, after cooking and pouring into sterilized jars, should be processed in a hot water bath for 5 minutes to raise the temperature while expelling air and assuring a good vacuum seal. Paraffin is no longer recommend

as a sealant, as mold can grow under it.

Jelly-making is something I really enjoy doing. There is a feeling of satisfaction and value in the jewel-like color, texture and clarity of good jelly. Also, it is a delight to see the color change from fruit to juice. This was especially true of the plum jelly we made at the demonstration. Starting with rather drab-colored slightly under-ripe plums, the juice and resulting jelly was almost ruby red!

If you, too, are enticed by the array of luscious fruits now available into making jellies or preserves for a taste of summer next winter, we have excellent materials on "how-to" either with or without added pectin.

Pectin is the compound in fruits that is responsible for jelling (or not). If too little is present in the fruit, you may only get a thick syrup after cooking rather than a firm tender gel. For fruit that does not have enough natural pectin, either powdered or liquid pectin, such as Sure-Jel, can be added to the juice. Be aware that recipes do not allow interchanging the powdered and liquid forms, so if your recipe calls for liquid pectin, don't substitute the powdered

kind. While the use of commercial pectin simplifies the jelly making procedure and yields more jelly per volume or juice, jelly made without added pectin contains less sugar and has a fruitier taste.

For jelly-making without added pectin, use about 1/4 slightly under-ripe fruit and 3/4 just ripe fruit to prepare the juice. If you are adding pectin, you can use all ripe fruit. I use a Jelmeter to determine how much sugar to use with the juice.

To prepare the fruit, sort and wash, but do not remove skins or cores, since the pectin is more concentrated there. Most, with the possible exception of berries, should be cooked with a small amount of water until the fruit is tender.

Straining the juice through a damp jelly bag (or firm unbleached muslin), without pressing or squeezing, will result in the clearest jelly.

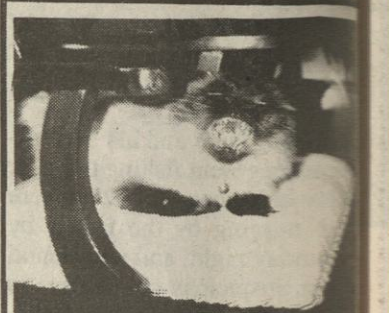
cum laude, 3.80; magna cum laude, 3.60; and cum laude, 3.40.

Pet Emergencies

It can be difficult to tell when a sick or injured pet needs emergency treatment. Nursing an injured pet at home can be frustrating, and have tragic results if needed urgent care is delayed.

When in doubt, the ONE-HOUR RULE is a good reference point. Unless it's obvious that a pet needs immediate care, evaluate the pet over a one-hour period. Its condition should improve rapidly and steadily, and a dog or cat should appear alert and able to walk and play. Pets that don't show signs of improvement, or get worse probably need additional help soon!

Poisonings, or presumed poisonings, are another common reason pets need emergency care. You can call the poison control center in your city for assistance, but if treatment is needed, it's usually needed quickly. Either: (a) you know for a fact your pet has consumed a poisonous substance, or (b) your pet becomes sick within minutes of consuming an unknown substance, take the pet to a veterinarian right away.

Other hints that your pet may need immediate treatment include:

- Sudden onset weakness or collapse
- Multiple seizures on a single day
- Sudden onset of persistent vomiting
- Spontaneous bleeding from anywhere

Today, many veterinarians rely on emergency practices for sick and injured animals in the evening. It's a good idea to have the phone numbers for both your own veterinarian and the closest veterinary emergency facility BEFORE you need them.

Why Myopia?

Myopia (nearsightedness) does not happen overnight. It comes on slowly and may go unnoticed until a student complains that he cannot see the blackboard or that his eyes tire easily. It appears to be caused by overworking the eye muscle to focus at near-point, since the open eye at rest is made for distant viewing.

The eye under constant stress tries to send warnings: burning, blurring, tiredness, pain. Instead of complaining, the diligent student simply presses on to the next page.

Eventually, the eye/brain grows accustomed to the strain, gives up sending messages, but grumbles when asked to see at the distance. After a long period of reading, there will be some blurring when shifting to a distance point. If the close-point stress continues, the eye muscles eventually lock into place; the pressure too great to resist. The eyeball lengthens and the image comes to a focus ahead of the retina rather than on it. Hello, myopia.

You've Got Hay! How Good Is It?

When producers are asked this question, their usual response is "It doesn't matter. The cows will have to eat it anyway!" But during the winter, livestock usually don't do well on hay alone and the AMOUNT of supplemental feed can be expensive. This is why you need to have your hay tested. If you have good hay, then you won't have to supplement as much. If you have poor quality hay, then you are faced with harder decisions. You may want to establish a winter pasture or you may possibly need to reduce the size of your herd. Regardless, you can make a more knowledgeable decision if you know quality of your hay. You may have enough quantity but most producers were not able to cut their hay on time because of the rains in June. When grass starts to produce seed, the quality of the hay decreases and we had a lot of hay cut when it was over mature. Please call me at 423-7016 if you would like me to take hay samples and have

them tested.

Is This Spring Water Safe To Drink?

Every now and then we get calls concerning the safety of water coming from old wells or springs. Someone will bring in a sample and request that it be tested for drinking safety. The problem is that the Mississippi State Chemical Lab (MSCL) cannot guarantee that ANY water is safe to drink. It can only test for whatever problems might exist! MSCL charges \$150 for a P&C (physical and chemical analysis) but a household in Mississippi gets \$100 free testing each year. MSCL offers a limited P&C for \$100 which means there is no charge since you get the first \$100 free. With the limited P&C analysis you get the pH, dissolved solids, hardness, sodium and iron, but not lead and nitrates. The benefit of a P&C is that it may give you a clue as to any possible problems. MSCL can perform a bacterial test, but if you think that you may have a problem with bacteria, it would be best if you contacted the health department and asked for their assistance.

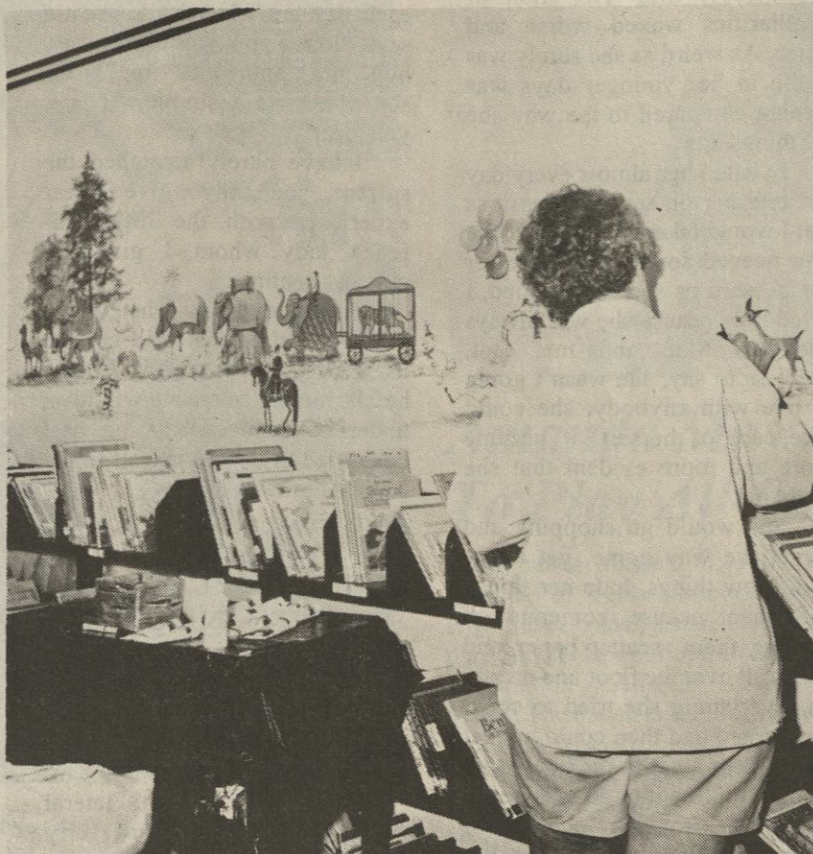
Children's Area At The Iuka Library Getting New Look

"Our goal is for children to want to come to the library," said Fredda Sanderson. The funds are



designed to help families and child care workers equip very young children with skills and knowledge that will help them learn to read.

The Mississippi Library Commission received funding for the grants under the Library Services and Construction Act, the Federal funding program for the nation's public libraries.

April Burns Attends Citizenship Washington Focus Program

A Tishomingo County 4-H member was among 44 Mississippi delegates attending Citizenship Washington Focus, June 28-July 5, 1997, at the National 4-H Center in Chevy Chase, MD.

During the week, the



objective was for the delegates to learn the basic functions of national government, gain an understanding of the international aspects of citizenship, and strengthen their commitment to democratic principles.

Cochran Bill Funds U.S. Department Of Agriculture

The Senate Appropriations Committee today approved a bill authored by Senator Thad Cochran (R-MS) to provide \$50.5 billion in funding for programs and activities of the U.S. Department of Agriculture and related agencies for fiscal year 1998.

"This bill contains funds for many programs which support U.S. agriculture, conserve and protect soil and water resources, and provide access to a safe and abundant supply of food," said Cochran.

The bill provides \$1.6 billion in funding for agriculture research, some of which will be performed at federal laboratories and on college and university campuses in the State of Mississippi.

"These research funds are a very important investment and will help maintain our technological edge in the agriculture sector, so that we can continue to produce the finest quality food and fiber and compete successfully in the world market," Cochran said. "They also contribute to the growth of our State's economy and create jobs."

The bill provides funding for rural economic and community development programs, including \$568 million for loans and grants for rural water and sewer facilities and \$3.5 billion for rural housing loan programs.

Other funds appropriated in this bill will be used to carry out the activities of the Food and Drug Administration, and the Commodity Futures Trading Commission for Fiscal Year 1998, which begins on October 1.

The bill will now be considered by the full membership of the U.S. Senate.

Alzheimers

Before and After

1. Before Alzheimers

Now that I am fifty plus years old; my memory kicks in of the visits my sister, Mae, and I had with our dear Little Auntie and Uncle Heck in Huntsville, Alabama. Though her full name is Mary Elizabeth, I have always called her "Little Auntie".

I lived in Decatur, Alabama with my Mom, Dad, little brother, Billy, and my sister, Mae. Every summer, with our parents permission, Little Auntie would come to pick up Mae and me for our two or three week visit with her. Little Auntie and Uncle Heck had no children, so Mae and I adopted ourselves to them. We loved going to Huntsville, but to two pre-teenage girls who rarely left the route from our home to school, we thought we were being transported to the other side of the world.

Little Auntie and Uncle Heck owned a huge two-story house with fifteen or more bedrooms, which they rented to tourist. Being used to a small three bedroom

house, you can imagine how we felt locking ourselves in an upstairs bedroom for tourists. Even though the room had two beds in it, we slept together. The room was directly over Little Auntie's room so that we could bang on the floor for help if a monster came out from under the other bed after us. We wondered if Little Auntie could get to us in time to help us if this happened.

We would lie there and talk, until we fell asleep, about the quaint, soft-spoken, petite lady we called Little Auntie. To us, like all young sprouts, we thought grown-ups were old fogey, weird - you know, just a little bit off.

We also thought that

everyone should see how to clean a house: Little Auntie style. We started to work at six o'clock in the morning and finished around two or three o'clock in the afternoon. It was only an eight hour shift, if everything met Little Auntie's inspection. Believe me it took some doing to get all those

beds just right, from the bed pad to the spreads. The spread had to have the same amount hanging down on each side, but not touching the floor. All the rugs had to be vacuumed and the furniture dusted every day. We'd joke about which one of us was going to do the white glove test. All of the six full baths and three half baths had to be scoured daily, then checked by Little Auntie to see if they were spotless.

I have always thought that Little Auntie was excessively finicky, but a very tidy little lady. She could drive one crazy with the fanatical ways she had about germs. She always boiled water to rinse her dishes. And it was a eye-opener the way she scrubbed a chicken with ivory soap and soda. Then she would rinse and rinse and rinse it some more. Why? "To kill the germs". When she finally got it washed and fried it tasted scrumptious.

I told Mae on several occasions that some day a big old germ was going to jump on little Auntie and eat her up! It was only a mischievous comment.

2. After Alzheimers: I Fell and I Can't Get Up

Time has a way of marching on. Uncle Heck passed away; Little Auntie sold the Tourist Home and moved to Iuka,

Mississippi. I married, raised my family, and after a series of events moved to Iuka also. Mae had established her home and family in Greenville, Mississippi and had taken our aged daddy to live with her. Little Auntie had aged quite considerably also. Her train of peculiarities waxed worse and worse. As weird as she surely was to me in her younger days was nothing compared to the way she did things now.

I visited her almost every day and told her on several occasions that I would take care of her if she ever needed someone to care for her. Absurd as she still seemed, I loved her because she was always good to Mae and me. But, needless to say, she wasn't going to live with anybody; she could take care of herself. It became more and more evident that she could not.

She would go shopping and forget the way home, get angry and throw things, hide her things and then accuse someone of stealing them, scatter paper and books all over the floor and on and on. Everything she tried to cook, she burned and then could not eat it. She kept a cat in the house and wouldn't allow it to go outside, so you can imagine the odor. Everything I've said about her cleanliness before, was now a complete about face.

On January 17, 1992, my birthday by the way, dear Little Auntie called and said those chilling words that no one ever wants to hear: "I fell and I can't get up". My judgment was confirmed at the hospital, a broken hip. During her hospital stay she was also diagnosed with Alzheimers. The surgeon said that she would either have to go to a nursing home or lie with someone who would take care of her. That someone was going to be me.

I prepared a room for her complete with a hospital bed. Having no knowledge of Alzheimers, I checked out library books and began reading like I was studying for a history exam.

Little Auntie has been with me for five years now. She will be ninety four in five months. We've

come a long, hard road together and I could not have made it without the help of the wonderful Home Health Nurses. With all the help from whatever source though, there's still nothing like hands on experience.

For the last two years Little Auntie has been bed ridden. She has a feeder tube, is incontinent and some of the time does not know who I am. Alzheimers is a cruel, demeaning disease and has

no respect of persons. There is no cure, but mega doses of love and understanding go a long way in dealing with it. No matter what the victim says or does; it is not them but the disease responsible for their seeming antics.

The sweetest words that I hear each day are when Little Auntie says, "I love you, you're so sweet, hug me and kiss me". Or sometimes its a simple, "Thank you, dear".

I have barely scratched the surface on my five year experience with the little old-fogey lady whom I give my utmost attention.

We never know when, or if, this dreadful disease will capture us. I only hope that if it ever befalls me that someone will love, understand and care for me as I have tried to devote myself to my Little Auntie.

Gaming Commission Denies New License to Amvets 350

The Mississippi Gaming Commission refused Monday to renew the charitable bingo license of Amvets 350 Bingo in Iuka.

The bingo operation on Constitution Drive will likely continue to operate under a temporary restraining order filed after last June's Commission recommendation that its license be revoked.

Amvets 350 was not represented at the meeting, said Eddie Bays, Gaming Commission Bingo Division Director, though they were notified of the Monday Commission meeting and its intention to deny Amvet's application for relicensure.

It will just be up to the local court to decide how long they will continue to operate, said Bays.

Amvets 350 has joined Vietnow bingo of Tupelo motion in Lee County Circuit Court, and both are operating under the temporary restraining order on the Commission revocation order, pending judicial review by Judge Frank Russell. The review is still under way.

Amvets 350 was fined

\$48,500 in the June 1996 and the Gaming Commission hearing examiner Larry Stroud charged that Amvets 350 should be closed down and cited: "At the core of the more serious complaints dealing with falsifying documents, including the deliberate falsification of the membership rolls in a clumsy attempt to hide the participation of the commercial lessor as a member of the charity, lies an organization that will falsify, sign other people's names to checks and other documents, transfer bingo paper (which can be viewed as money) with no record keeping and no approval from the Mississippi Gaming Commission, and in general ignore, or treat as trivial the statutes and regulations for the conduct of the playing of charitable bingo."

The report recommended revocation at that time and further charged, "nothing in the pattern of conduct of the business of the playing of bingo for money at Amvets shows any ability, willingness or desire to conduct charitable bingo according to law."

Superintendent Discusses New Policy Concerning Balloons And Other Gifts To Students

The School Board has the responsibility to adopt policies that enhance the safety and learning environment for all students. The Administration and Board have determined that accepting balloons and other gifts for students at school campuses is a hindrance to the educational program. The safety of students as they transport these balloons from school is a great concern. Also, the self-esteem of many students who do not receive gifts at school may be adversely affected. Therefore, the Board adopts the following policy:

In an effort to provide the best educational environment for all students, the Tishomingo Special Municipal Separate School District does not allow balloons and other gifts to be delivered to the schools. This policy becomes effective at the beginning of the 1997-1998 school year.

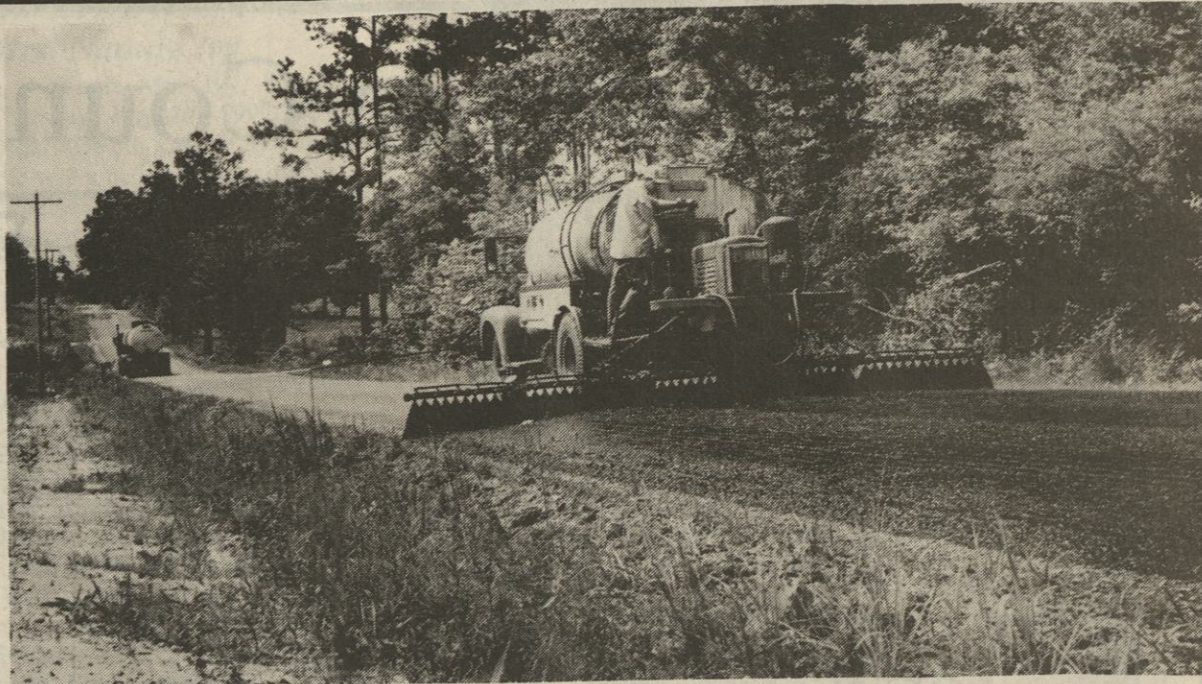

New Equipment Gives Third District Better Roads; Cuts Overhead Costs

The Tishomingo County Third District crews are making use of some new equipment and Third District residents are reaping the benefits with newly paved roads.

Supervisor Danny Ryan said that the Third District has bought some used paving equipment that

will help them maintain the many rural county roads of the district in the center of Tishomingo County. At a cost of \$35,000, the district is now able to put down DBST (double bituminous surface treatment) on county roads. Essentially it is a tar and gravel treatment, commonly known as

BellSouth Asks Mississippi PSC For Long Distance Approval

BellSouth announced today that it is formally asking the Mississippi Public Service Commission (MPSC) to start the approval process to allow BellSouth to full compete in the long distance market in Mississippi.

The Telecommunications Act of 1996 ordered each state's local telephone markets opened to competition from long distance companies and other competitors. Once the local market is deemed open, BellSouth can enter the long distance business. BellSouth's markets can be proved "open" either through competitors offering business and residential local telephone service through their own facilities, or by BellSouth making general terms and conditions available so that any competitor wishing to enter the market can do so quickly. Competitors can then obtain the types of services they require from BellSouth in order to offer local service to customers.

BellSouth's filing with the MPSC shows that the local telecommunications market in Mississippi is fully opened to competition, because the company has met the 14-point federal checklist of terms and conditions specified for the Bell companies by Congress in the Telecommunications Act of 1996. BellSouth's filing demonstrates that it is in the public interest to allow it to compete in the long distance market.

In today's filing at the MPSC, BellSouth submitted a statement of terms and conditions for competitive interconnection and access to the local telephone network. As intended by Congress, these terms and conditions will be available to any competitor certified by the Mississippi PSC without the necessity of a potentially lengthy negotiation and arbitration process.

"The MPSC has prudently crafted a procedure to implement the transition to a competitive local telecommunications marketplace," said Kelly Allgood, President of BellSouth's Mississippi Operations. "We believe they will find that BellSouth is open for competition in Mississippi, and will recommend that we be approved to enter the long distance business." He said the Telecommunications Act provides state commissions with the authority to certify Bell companies' compliance with the Act's checklist of terms and conditions.

As an aside, he said, 10

competitors have interconnection agreements with BellSouth and have been approved by the MPSC to operate in Mississippi, with some already providing local service to business and residential customers.

"After the MPSC approves our filing, we will then petition the Federal Communications Commission for entry into the long distance business in Mississippi, the final step in the Act's requirements for entering long distance.

"Our terms and conditions meet the law's 14-point checklist, and they contain provisions which are consistent with the FCC's rules for Local Interconnection. Based on our negotiations with our largest competitors, the MPSC has arbitrated the most difficult contractual issues. The rules are set, the local exchange is open for competition and only one barrier to full competition remains in place in Mississippi," Allgood said.

He said Mississippians will benefit when BellSouth begins offering long-distance service. "Our customers have told us they want the simplicity and economy of being able to select BellSouth as the single provider for all of their communications services."

BellSouth is a \$19 billion communications services company. It provides telecommunications, wireless communications, directory advertising and publishing and other information services to more than 27 million customers in 18 countries worldwide. Its telephone operations provide service over one of the most modern telecommunications networks in the world for approximately 22 million telephone lines in a nine-state region that includes Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina and Tennessee.

Tishomingo's Court Troubles Not Over Yet; Appeal Expected In Alley Case

The U.S. Fifth Circuit Court threw out an appeal of a case against the Town of Tishomingo filed by a former police officer. But Tishomingo's court troubles are not over yet; an extra thirty days was granted in Tishomingo County Chancery Court Tuesday for an appeal on a case involving the town's alleys.

In the case of *Timothy Dwight Lucius vs. the Town of Tishomingo*, U.S. Fifth Circuit Court Judges Jones, DeMoss, and Parker issued on July 18th an affirmation of the summary judgment granted in favor of the Town in December of 1996. Lucius, a former policeman in the Town was seeking compensatory damages alleging that his termination was in violation of the free speech and freedom of association under the first amendment of the U.S. Constitution, according to Town Attorney James Belue.

Locally, in the Chancery Court case of *Town of Tishomingo vs. Freida E. Sipes and James H. Sipes*, Judge John C. Ross, Jr. granted the request of the Sipes' attorney for an extra thirty days to file an appeal on his decision of May 28, 1997. In that decision, the Town was ensured that an alley adjoining the Sipes' property, where the Sipes' had constructed a storage shed on a concrete slab, is indeed public property.

Tuesday, the Sipes' attorney filed a motion to stay the judgment until the appeal is decided, which Town attorney Richard Bowen, said Ross was inclined to grant. It would allow the Sipes to keep the building in the alley.

"The stay is conditional and requires the Sipes to post a bond that would be used to pay the court and attorney fees for the Town in the event the Sipes are unsuccessful in their appeal," Bowen said.

So far the case has cost Tishomingo at least \$5,000 in attorney and court fees, said Bowen and Mayor James Tennyson, both at court on Tuesday.

An appeal could cost both parties \$10,000, said Bowen. The cost of the building is considered to be less than \$2,000.

Workshop For Environmental Quality Incentives Program

The Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District will conduct an educational workshop on July 28, 1997 at the Tishomingo County Fairgrounds in Iuka, for those farmers, producers and landowners interested in applying for the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP), as well as for those who have already applied. The workshop will begin with registration at 7 p.m.

EQIP, a cost-share program administered by the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and the Farm Services Agency (FSA), encourages farmers to use conservation practices by offering financial assistance for practices associated with animal waste management, water quality and quantity, excessive erosion, grazing lands and reforestation on limited resource farms. Unlike previous NRCS-administered programs, EQIP is administered on a competitive bid basis. This means that farmers who apply for EQIP will compete with other farmers for financial assistance based on a point system assigned to specific conservation practices. These practices, as well as their desired results and environmental benefits, will be explained at this workshop.

Presenting the program will be resource professionals from cooperating state and federal agencies including the Mississippi Soil and Water Conservation Commission, the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service, NRCS, and the Farm Services Agency.

Funding For National Parks & Forestry

The Senate Interior Appropriations Subcommittee has approved a bill containing over \$19.1 million for national parks and forestry projects in Mississippi. Senator Thad Cochran (R-MS) announced today.

The legislation provides \$2.6 million for the Vicksburg National Military Park and \$8 million Natchez Trace Parkway construction.

"I am pleased the Subcommittee approved the funding in this bill," Cochran said. "It will help protect our State's natural and historical resources and increase tourism."

The bill includes \$6.98 million for National Wildlife Refuges and \$8.6 million for forestry projects in Mississippi.

The Subcommittee also committed funds to a study of the impact of duck hunting season extensions on migratory waterfowl populations.

"I remain concerned about the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's reluctance to lengthen the duck hunting season. This study is an important step to deal with that issue," Cochran said.

The Senate Appropriations Committee expected to act on the bill early next week. Cochran serves on the Appropriations Subcommittee on Interior and is the second ranking Republican on the 28 member full Appropriations Committee.

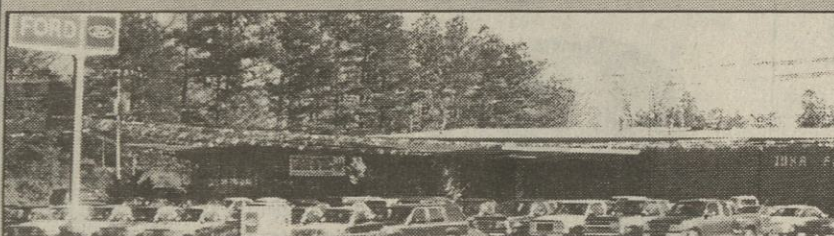
