Call 911 Only For Emergencies!

911 System In Tishomingo County Being Abused

Tishomingo County 911 officials are asking residents to think before they call 911.

The only three reasons to dial for 911, say operators, are to report a fire, to call an ambulance for a medical emergency, or emergency law enforcement - in cases where an officer is needed at that moment.

Abuse of the 911 system has been reported as a major problem in large metropolitan areas, but even in Tishomingo County, there seems to be a problem that could prove fatal if a caller with a true emergency could not get through.

"Many of the calls we receive on 911 are not emergencies," said 911 Coordinator Jerry Bonds in a recent interview.

People call just wanting information, wanting to talk to a police officer or deputy, to ask when or where driver's license exams are being given, or to ask for phone numbers of other law enforcement agencies, Bonds said.

Each of these types of calls take from five to fifteen minutes, which is five to fifteen minutes that could prove crucial, or even a matter of life or death for someone with a true emergency who can't get through, explained Bonds.

Additionally, the 911 operators are required to fill out paperwork on every call as if each was an emergency. This puts a strain on the operators, who also handle five lines for the sheriff's department at the county jail facility where 911 is located.

"Accidental calls are understandable," said Bonds, "as long as we can get back in touch with them immediately to make sure there is not an emergency."

For each and every 911 call that comes in, the name, address and phone number of the caller is displayed on a computer screen, so they know exactly who calls, Bonds explained. They are obligated to send a deputy out to check on your situation and ensure your safety unless you tell them otherwise, which is a waste of manpower if you or your child just called accidentally, and you are too embarrassed to say so.

In such situations, just tell the operator the truth, said Bonds. Stay on the line to let them know it is not an emergency.

The biggest problem is people wanting to talk to a law officer "just for a minute," say operators. People also call 911 to talk about an investigation, or to give information to law officers. People with information pertaining to an investigation are urged to call the regular sheriff's department number, or police department number, Bonds stressed.

Midway-Pleasant Hill Water Association Members Asking Iuka To Buy System

Board To Decide August 5th on Holding Referendum in Iuka

If the board of aldermen approves, Iuka will soon be having a referendum election to decide on buying the Midway-Pleasant Hill Water System.

On May 2nd, members who attended a special meeting of the Midway-Pleasant Hill Water Association at the Tishomingo County Courthouse voted 112 to 11 to petition the city of Iuka to buy the water system that serves more than 800 households and businesses in the center of the county.

The membership has spoken, now the ball is in the court of the city, said Leslie Blaylock, chairman of the Midway-Pleasant Hill Water Association (MPHWA) Board.

Next Tuesday, in its regular monthly meeting, the Iuka Board of Aldermen will vote whether or not to let Iuka citizens have a chance to voice their opinion by vote on the issue of whether the city should buy the system. By law, the purchase of a water works or utility system of this type has to be approved by a referendum (issue election) of Iuka voters, said Iuka Mayor David Nichols.

Why MPHWA Customers Want to Change to Iuka Water

If the acquisition goes through, the 800 or more customers of the MPHWA will switch over from their current wells to use Iuka's, which has dug new wells in the past four to eight years, said Nichols.

This would seemingly resolve the problem of poor water quality that historically has been characteristic for Midway-Pleasant Hill,

and is seen as the main reason the membership is asking Iuka to take over.

"Iuka has a brand new, fully automated water treatment plant," said Nichols. "But we are fortunate that the water that comes from our ground aquifer requires very little treatment and is some of the best in north Mississippi."

Nichols said that the only treatment necessary for Iuka's water is a little lime, fluoride and chlorine.

Midway-Pleasant Hill water has been found to have high contents of iron and manganese which requires a lot of chemical treatment, said Nichols. **\$150,000 of Work Done On MPHWA System To Fix It**

However, Blaylock explained, that since a new 5-member board took over the association about two years ago, about \$150,000 has been spent on the Midway-Pleasant Hill system, which had been neglected for years, and poorly operated, which was the reason for the poor water.

"We have straightened it all out," said Blaylock. New filter medium, plant repairs and leak repairs have resulted in an almost all-new plant that produces water that beats all standards, and tests as good as any other around here, Blaylock said.

Why Iuka Would Want MPHWA

MPHWA is financially healthy, in fact it is now making money, Blaylock verified.

Nichols said the city can run it more efficiently for even less cost with the current Iuka maintenance staff.

Plus, about 20 percent of the MPH system lies within the corporate limits of Iuka, said Nichols.

Iuka's plant has a maximum production capacity of four million gallons a day, and is currently only using one million a day.

"We are only operating at 25 percent capacity right now, and with Midway, we would only move up to about 30 percent capacity," said Nichols.

Current water rates for Iuka citizens would not be affected, he ensured.

Downsides?

Some customers of the Midway-Pleasant Hill who are outside the Iuka corporate limits have voiced concerns on the level of service they would receive from City of Iuka maintenance crews.

Nichols was quick to say that all customers of a system owned by the City of Iuka would receive the same service as city residents. He pointed to the example of other utilities, like natural gas, outside the city limits that are served satisfactorily by city crews now.

If the city raised rates on system customers, those outside the city would not have direct control on those who run the water system, (Iuka's board of aldermen) by vote, but they would have the right to go file a grievance with the Public Service Commission.

Three Florence Men Charged With July 21st Belmont Bank Robbery

Three Florence men have been taken into custody and charged in connection with a July 21st bank robbery in Belmont.

The three were arrested and charged with federal charges of conspiracy to commit carjacking, interstate transportation of a stolen motor vehicle, and bank robbery, according to Joseph Lewis, FBI Special Agent in Charge.

Benjamin Alan Armstrong, 20, Jeffery Wayne Best, 19, and Shawn Gregory South, 19, were arrested Tuesday evening in Florence. None have prior criminal records authorities have said.

The suspects are also being questioned and investigated in connection with the shooting deaths of a Cherokee man, Harold Pugh, and his 11-year-old son, Joey, according to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith.

Pugh's black 1996 Chevrolet pickup truck was used as a getaway vehicle in the robbery, according to authorities. The truck was found burning on County Road 6 west of Belmont about 15 minutes after the 10:30 a.m. armed robbery of Deposit Guaranty National Bank in Belmont.

Two of the suspects were taken into custody at the Stonehurst Apartments off Helton Drive in Florence about 7:30 p.m. and a third was taken into custody outside a Florence movie theater.

Reports indicate there may be a fourth person involved.

Smith said that they could not release details of the investigation at this time, but that the composite sketch of a possible suspect that was widely circulated this past week was an aid in identifying those taken into custody. The suspects were later positively identified in a lineup, he said.

Tuesday night the suspects were questioned at the federal building in Florence, Alabama and transferred to the Madison County Jail in Huntsville where they are being held in federal custody and are scheduled to be arraigned Wednesday.

All the suspects secured the services of attorneys early in the questioning process Tuesday night, said Smith.

At the apartment where the suspects were taken into custody, law enforcement search teams worked into the night, confiscating many items, including a green BMW automobile.

Smith said they are optimistic about finding something to link the suspects to the murders of Harold and Joey Pugh.

A Sigh of Relief

Many Tishomingo Countians and members of the Cherokee community that have been scared and concerned for their safety since the bank robbery and murders just over a week ago can begin to feel some relief at the arrests.

But the feelings of relief are almost overshadowed by the confusion of how such events happened in such a rural and mostly peaceful setting.

Many are asking how the alleged robbers/murderers knew the area well enough to find the Pughs at the comparatively remote Cane Creek murder scene, not to mention how or why they chose Belmont's Deposit Guaranty to rob. The extremely remote location of the abandoned, burning truck after the robbery made many fear local residents were involved.

Hopefully, the answers to these and many more questions will be released by officials as the investigation continues.

Success Due to Teamwork

A multi-agency task force that was formed immediately after the robbery was the biggest help in making progress on the case, said Sheriff Smith.

"In the county, deputies and sheriff department dispatchers worked around the clock, above and beyond the usual call of duty," said a grateful Smith. "The efforts of the state investigators, Department of Fish and Wildlife agents, Chief Donald Reno and the Belmont Police as well as Colbert County Sheriff's department, the Florence Police, the FBI and Alabama Bureau of Investigation officers are what resulted in the quick identification and arrest of these suspects."

Home Economics Tips

You and the Sun

Sun Sense, a new leaflet from our Extension Health Specialist, is packed with information that makes a lot of common sense. Now that the rains have become less frequent, the sun is beating down, and the temperature and humidity are soaring, we need to be alert to their effects.

The risk of heat illnesses is present when the heat index is 100 degrees F or more. This happens when the temperature is above 90 and the humidity is above 60 percent - and we have had a lot of those days lately.

When the heat index is this high, several illnesses such as heat stroke, heat cramps, or heat exhaustion are possible with prolonged exposure or physical activity. The heat may overcome the body's ability to regulate internal body temperature at a safe level.

Some of the signs of heat illness include nausea, weakness, fainting, and pale, clammy skin. Prompt action can prevent the most serious heat illness - heat stroke - which is often fatal.

To provide first aid: stop activity, improve air circulation with a fan or air conditioner, and sponge the body with cool water.

Heat illness is an emergency situation and requires medical care.

When the weather is as hot as it has been recently, there are several things you can do, short of staying inside under air conditioning, that can prevent heat illness.

*Avoid heavy physical exertion in a middle of the day.

*Exercise less intensely.

*Wear light-colored, freshly laundered cotton clothing to reflect heat and allow air to circulate around the body.

* Drink at least 8 ounces of water or diluted fruit juice each hour. Alcohol and beverages with caffeine don't count.

Wear a broad-brimmed hat in the sun.

*When in a closed space such as a car or building without air conditioning, open windows for ventilation.

Remember, too, that it is not only heat that can cause health

problems. Some of the worst sunburns can occur in a combination of wind and water that keep the body cool.

For a number of years now, scientists have been warning us about exposure to the sun. The price of exposure to the sun's ultraviolet light may be skin cancer, cataracts, premature aging, and less immunity to illness.

The culprit actually is a form of radiation, the UVA and UVB rays contained in full-spectrum sunlight, which cause tanning and burning of the skin. Don't think you can escape damage and still have that healthy-looking tan by using a tanning bed, either. While the salon light is primarily UVA, it carries the same risks as other types of ultraviolet light, and may actually go deeper beneath the skin without apparent effects until damage is done.

Generally, if sun causes any redness or discomfort, it is too much exposure. Even though persons with fair complexions are at greater risk, excessive

ultraviolet light can cause problems in all skin types depending on the degree of exposure.

Persons who have a family member with cataracts or skin cancer are considered to be at risk for those conditions. Be aware,

What To Do If You've Been Wrongfully Fired

If you've been wrongfully fired, you may be able to get your job back. You may also be able to get lost wages and benefits.

How do you know if you were wrongfully fired? If your employer promised that you'd be fired only for good cause (and you weren't), or if your employer did not follow its own warning procedures before firing you, then you may have a valid claim. You may also have a valid claim if your employer fired you for an unlawful reason, such as a firing based on your sex, age, race, color, religion or national origin.

If you think you were wrongfully fired, seek legal help promptly to find out about your rights.

Spectacle Blur

If you are a contact lense wearer, sometimes you like to give your eyes a rest and wear your glasses. If this is your case, have you ever noticed blurry vision while wearing eyeglasses after your remove your contact lenses? This is a condition called spectacle blur.

It most cases, this situation occurs with hard lenses and is due to corneal molding. The cornea is pliable and its shape is changed slightly by the contact lens, much as your finger becomes indented by a ring. Just as the indentation on your finger disappears after the ring is removed, your cornea gradually reassumes its original shape. In the meantime, you have an irregularly curved cornea causing a kind of "induced astigmatism," for which your spectacles were not ground to correct.

As a result of this temporary and artificial refractive error, your vision is slightly blurry when you switch to spectacles. This situation may last from a few minutes to a few hours.

Piri Piri Bringing International Flavor to Iuka's Restaurant Scene

Discriminating diners in Iuka have a delicious new choice for excellent food with a European flavor at "Piri Piri", the five-

month-old restaurant venture of Fernando and Karen Remedios.

Located on Quitman Street across from the old hospital, Piri Piri (pronounced petee petee),

which means "hot" or "spicy" in Portuguese, Fernando Remedios explained, offers diners an alternative to the common with mouth-watering dishes that have European flavors with a Mediterranean influence.

The casual, but stylish, newly remodeled restaurant is proving a favorite to everyone who visits Piri Piri during its busy lunch or dinner serving times.

Despite the name, "not everything is hot and spicy," Fernando and his wife and co-owner Karen, are quick to point out.

The menu offerings include a variety of dishes that range from pasta combinations and salads, to grilled Cornish hens and pita pocket sandwiches. It is a welcome alternative when you are looking for something more tasty (and healthy) than fried or fast food. An added plus is the comfortable, attractively remodeled dining area decorated in a Mediterranean theme, where diners can enjoy full table service, but don't have to drive far, or be dressed up to do it.

"Try it, you'll like it" seems to be the idea here, and the owners say that repeat customers are helping build the business. Frequent visitors to the area, like summer visitors to the lake, are also finding out about the newest Iuka dining jewel.

"We had a couple from Memphis who came in both Friday and Sunday this weekend," said Karen Remedios, who cheerfully greets diners and serves as hostess.

Other regular visitors are ladies' bridge clubs, and many others who learned of Piri Piri by word of mouth enjoy the full-service, yet casual atmosphere of Piri Piri.

In addition to a flair for preparing a variety of delicious entrees, Fernando Remedios brings a history of professionalism in fine dining he learned as a dining room manager on a cruise ship. As a maitre'd on board, he worked with some of the best executive chefs from Europe and all over the world.

He and Karen met while working on cruise ships in the Caribbean, where Karen was a hostess and assistant cruise director.

They decided to settle down and make Iuka their home about three years ago, Fernando explained, since they like the area so much, and Karen's parents (Mr. & Mrs. George Craddock) live here.

"Iuka needs more good restaurants," Fernando said. He said he felt people here needed a different choice, and is determined to provide his customers with the best by constantly adjusting the menu to accommodate the tastes and preferences of his clientele, while maintaining his vision of providing a taste of European and international cuisines.

For example, he says has learned that folks here don't love spicy-hot foods like the Jamaican "jerk" (grilled) chicken that was originally going to be a featured menu item. Jerked chicken is enormously popular in the Caribbean, where people pack the restaurants that serve it, Fernando said.

Though Iuka may be missing out on that, the rest of the menu has plenty of "spice," a variety of wonderful new flavors, and even a grilled hamburger for the occasional hopelessly timid palate.

Popular dishes include a chef's pasta tossed with diced, grilled chicken, and a seafood pasta with a rich white sauce.

Chicken Parmigiana, a chicken breast lightly breaded and baked with cheddar and mozzarella cheese served over spaghetti, is another favorite, Fernando said.

Ruth Wynn To Retire After 48 Years With The Welfare Department

Reception Planned For Friday, August 1st

In the summer of 1949 downtown Iuka was alive and well. On Saturdays the streets were filled with people who came to town to buy supplies, tend to business at the Courthouse, and visit with friends. The Majestic theater, a popular attraction, kept activity going until the night show was over and the crowd left for home.

At the Courthouse, couples flocked from other states to get married; J.C. Jourdan, Jr. performed the duties of Chancery Clerk; while Sheriff, Clarence Pace, and his Deputies were busy locating whiskey stills and keeping order over the county.

On the south side of town, Pruitt's Gin was being readied for

the wagons of cotton that would soon be rolling in. Farmers gathered at the big block building near the railroad tracks where E.N. Allen and the Extension Staff provided services to rural families.

The Welfare Office, located in a small space behind McGill's Grocery (later the shoe repair shop), was staffed by Verna Wood, Agent, Dewey Mae Skinner and Monroe Pannell - Home Visitors. They were ably assisted by Mary Wallace, Clerk, who had worked with W.A. Lambert, former Agent. The office was sparsely furnished. Old men drifted in off the street to talk and rest in straight chairs or on a long wooden bench. There was no telephone. An occasional call was

received at the cab stand next door.

It was in this setting that Mary Ruth Wynn reported to work as Junior Stenographer on August 1, 1949. The Northeast Mississippi Junior College had opened its doors the fall before. She had attended the first year with plans to return but with this appointment, further education was put on hold. One of her first duties was sitting for hours taking shorthand dictation from the Visitors as they gave an account of their visits to the homes. This was followed by more hours typing the narratives on a sluggish manual typewriter.

Her shorthand skills were put to the real test as she took dictation for state hearings. The Hearing Officer would return to Jackson leaving everything behind in the Stenographer's full notebook. On one occasion, she traveled with Evelyn Gandy, then Hearing Officer, to the south end of the county where the hearing was held in the client's bedroom filled with neighbors who had come to witness. Years later, speaking at the State Clerical Conference in Jackson, Miss Gandy recalled this incident of the County Clerk sitting on a wooden box by the client's bed taking shorthand notes of a hearing which changed the Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled policy in Mississippi. Later as recording machines made shorthand no longer necessary, the job title was changed to Clerk-Typist.

In 1980 at the State Clerical Conference, Ruth Wynn was named Clerical Worker of the Year. During its existence, she actively participated for over a decade in the State Conference, serving as President in 1984. In performing duties of the Conference, she worked closely with State Office Personnel and

Clerical Workers all over the state. Before they became separate offices, she served as bookkeeper for Social Services and Child

Support. She is now Senior Clerk for the Department of Human Services, Economic Assistance, Margaret W. Riley, County Director.

With love and appreciation to her extended Welfare/Human Services Family and Courthouse Staff, with pleasant memories of the countless people who have come through the doors for help, on August 1, 1997, Ruth Wynn is calling it quits. It is not that she is tired of the job, but needs time to do other things - things that include renovating a 100 year old house (the home of three generations of the Wynn family), writing more memories, working on already extensive family records, and perhaps travel if that can be arranged with Patches, the 14 year old feist, who rules the household.

"Ruth has been an asset to our agency, and I have never known a more dedicated, loyal employee," states Margaret June Riley, Director, "we will truly miss her and appreciate her many years of service to this agency and to the people of Tishomingo County."

The Tishomingo County DHS staff will be hosting a reception for Ruth on August 1, from 2:00 to 4:00 in the Tishomingo County Courthouse Conference Room. The public is invited.
