### **Four Face Drug Charges After Labor Day Sting**

Four people were arrested on drug related charges after a sting operation came to a conclusion Labor Day weekend.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, three people were charged with possession of more than one ounce of marijuana with intent to sell within 1,500 feet of a school.

Amy Fath, 21, Rene Goodwill, 22, and Charles Childers, 41, all of 936 Highway 15 in Red Bay, Alabama, were all arrested late Sunday at a house in Belmont after a sting operation that included the Belmont Police Department, Smith said.

Also arrested in Belmont on Monday was Steve A. Pitt, 36, whose address was listed as Old 25 in Belmont. He was charged with possession of less than an ounce of marijuana and with one count of sale of marijuana, after allegedly selling to an undercover sheriff's department official, Smith said.

Fath, Goodwill and Childers are each being held at the Tishomingo County Jail on a \$10,000 bond each. No bond has been set on Pitt, sheriff's officials

### **Supervisors Proposing Property Tax Increase**

The Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors will hold a hearing next Monday on a proposed property tax increase.

The hearing will be held at 10 a.m. September 8th and the public is invited to attend.

According to Dale Price, President of the Board of Supervisors (and First District Supervisor), the proposed increased of one mill will go toward a general increase in costs to operate county offices and agencies, and to protect the county from lawsuits. **Mandated Salary Increases** 

Some of the cost increase is due to salary increases mandated by the Mississippi Legislature for most county offices, like sheriffs, supervisors, tax assessors, tax collectors, court clerks and the like, said Price. Chancery Court Clerks are not included due to a 1992 House bill freezing Chancery Clerk salaries until the year 2000, stated Hayden Ables, Chancery Clerk.

The increase will also be used for administrative cost increases in county offices, like contractual services and equipment.

Rising Law Enforcement Costs Law enforcement cost increases will be another area that

would benefit from the proposed "There are some things you

can't budget for, like how many

prisoners you are going to have," explained Price.

The Tishomingo County Jail,

which has exceeded its 24-inmate capacity for at least a year now, is already over last year's budgeted allotment by \$12,000 for prisoners' food costs alone. Medical costs for prisoners are already \$3,000 over budget, as well, according to Deputy Chancery Clerk Lynn McBride.

Some pending litigation against the county is also in the consideration for the need for increased funds.

This year's proposed budget will exceed the one mill proposed increase, said Price. Exact figures on the proposed budget were not

Last year's published total budget for the county was \$12,530,785. Only a small amount, of the total revenue of \$5,958,685 is raised by tax levy, McBride said. Last year's budget published \$1,641,585 as the total amount estimated to be raised by tax levy. First County-Wide Millage Increase for County in 3 Years

This is the first time in three years the county has asked for a county-wide millage increase for the county budget, Price said.

An extra mill for Districts 1, 2, and 3 was announced in 1996. It goes toward a bond for Iuka

Airport improvements.

The county gets \$62,000 per mill, and the average rate is about 69 mills in the northern three districts and 68 mills in the fourth and fifth districts, Price said. The county should be seeing \$76,000 from each mill, but homestead exemption complications and failure to pay takes up some of the expected revenue.

Since 1992-93 fiscal year, all other millage increases have been for increases in the education budget, both for the local Tishomingo County schools and for Northeast Mississippi Community College. Approximately 60 percent of the total county millage, about \$2.5 million in the budget, goes to Tishomingo County Schools, said Ables.

In addition to the countyproposed one mill increase, the schools are requesting one-and-ahalf mills, Ables verified.

Average Cost Per Homestead For example, the average \$60,000 home which is taxed at the 10 percent rate, will see an increase of about \$6 to its annual tax bill, Price said.

For businesses, and rentals, which are taxed at about 15 percent, the increase will be a bit

The final, approved budget is scheduled for publication the 15th of September, Price said.

## TCEPA Announces Increase In

Tishomingo County Electric Power Association's rates will increase by 5.5 percent on October 1, 1997, due to a pass-thru of TVA's wholesale rate increase that was approved by the TVA board at its August board meeting. Retail rates will increase an additional 3 percent if a pending rate request by TCEPA is approved by TVA.

"This is the first wholesale rate increase by TVA since 1986," said TCEPA Manager Robert Grisham. "And TCEPA's second increase in the same eleven year

TVA's rate increase is part of a ten-year business plan to cut outstanding debt in half and to achieve a wholesale power cost of 3.5 cents per Kwh by the year 2007. TVA has stopped its nuclear plant construction, capped its debt, reduced its employment levels by over 50 percent and improved operations at all of its generating facilities. "TVA's ten-year plan is an

aggressive move to keep TVA competitive and one of the best utilities in the world," stated Grisham.

TCEPA's rate request follows a slightly over 2 percent increase adopted in June, 1995, to repay indebtedness incurred to make repairs after the Ice Storm '94 and

build new substations at North Crossroads and Iuka. With the completion of the planned conversion to 161 kV of Belmont Substation in spring, 1998, TCEPA will have spent over eleven million dollars in a seven-year period to meet the increased power requirements for the next twenty years according to Grisham.

"TCEPA's requirement for additional revenue has become necessary to keep debt levels as low as possible and to replace revenues lost by the closure of Vulcan Materials at Midway and abandonment of the Yellow Creek site by Morton Thiokol," stated Grisham.

Children & Summer Stains

Summer seems to be the worst season for stains - especially on children's clothes now with school activities and family outings crammed into waning summer weekends. Those juicy watermelons, dripping ice-cream cones, suntan oil, and who-knowswhat-else can be a frustrating sight if they stain a favorite piece of clothing, both for children and adults.

Fortunately, with the proper treatment, many stains can be removed. To help keep clothing stain-free, here are several suggestions from the stain removal guide published by the Cooperative Extension Service at MSU. For a free copy, listing pecific treatment for about 50 different stains, contact your county extension office and ask for Publication 1400.

The first step toward successful removal is to determine the type of stain you're dealing with. Fortunately, all stains fit into one of five cleaning categories wet, dry, combination, special, or unknown. Each type needs a different treatment.

Statistics from Rit brand dye and fabric treatments indicate that stains which most commonly send garments to the trash heap are grease or oil stains, color bleeding, ink, rust, blood, grass, and food stains from tomato sauce, ketchup and mustard.

To prevent this, first determine whether the garment should be washed or dry cleaned. If it can be washed, decide which type of stain it has, and treat accordingly. If the garment must

be dry cleaned, identify the stain for your cleaner and have the garment cleaned promptly.

Wet stains are water-based and can be dissolved in cool water, especially if the stain is fresh. For washable clothing, loosen the wet stain with liquid detergent or a paste of powdered detergent and water, then launder as usual. Wet stains include fruit juices, soft drinks, iced tea, beer, and light

Dry stains include cooking oil, suntan oil and motor oil. Oilbased stains usually require some type of dry cleaning solvent for successful removal. Dry-cleaning solvent can be found in most grocery and hardware stores. Thoroughly rinse and air dry garments treated with dry cleaning fluid before laundering.

Combination stains such as meat gravy, ice cream and ketchup need twice the treatment since they contain both oil and water. Treat combination stains first as a dry stain to remove the grease, and then as a wet stain. Combination stains containing protein, such as blood, collar soils and salad dressing usually need treatment with an enzyme-based product.

Stain sticks and gels are some of the newest enzyme products. They are kind to most fabrics and colors and can be left on tough stains for up to a week without damaging the fabric. Treat grass stains, another combination stain, with enzyme stain sticks or gel.

Special stains come from unusual substances and require individual treatment. Mildew is a common special summer stain. It is best removed with chlorine

bleach for bleachable fabrics. for non-bleachable fabrics, sponge the mildew stain with hydrogen peroxide, and then launder or soak in an all-fabric bleach solution for 30 minutes or more.

Unknown stains that you can't identify by feel, smell, or location, should be treated as a dry stain first, and then as a wet stain if needed.

Test stain removal products on an inconspicuous area of a garment before using. Follow the product's directions and work carefully and patiently. Apply stain remover to the underside of the stain, with the garment placed face down on a clean paper towel or white cloth. Air dry the garment until you are sure the stain has been completely removed. Retreat if the stain is still visible.



Why Are My Teeth Discolored?

Just as people have different skin and hair color, people also have different tooth color. Some teeth are more yellow, and others yellow with aging. Natural tooth color can be discolored by a number of causes. The surface of the teeth can be stained by tobacco, certain foods and beverages such as coffee, tea and berries and by deposits of calculus, or tartar. Discoloration of the tooth internally can result from aging, injury, excessive fluoride, certain illnesses and taking the antibiotic tetracycline during early childhood. Although bleaching successfully lightens most discolorations, certain types (those caused by tetracycline) are more difficult to remove. **Procedures** 

There are two types of bleaching procedures. Bleaching may be done completely in the dental office (known as chairside bleaching) or a system may be dispensed by the dentist for the patient to use at home (nightguard

bleaching).

The procedure that is done in the dental office takes from 30 minutes to one hour per visit. It is not uncommon for the teeth to become slightly sensitive following bleaching treatments.

To protect the mouth, a gellike substance is applied to the gums and a rubber "shield" is placed around the necks of the teeth. A chemical solution, the oxidizing agent, is then "painted" on the teeth. A special light may be used at five-minute intervals to help activate the agent.

With nightguard bleaching, the dentist makes an impression for a model of your teeth, fabricates a custom-fitted mouthguard and prescribes a bleaching agent that comes in the form of a bleaching gel. The gel is placed in a mouthguard and worn up to two hours daily or at night for about two weeks. The amount of time the nightguard is worn and the duration may vary according to your needs and your dentist's recommendations.

#### Your Rights In An Accident

If Glasses Sliding Down

Ill-fitting or loose frames that slide down your nose or sit askew on your face will not allow you to get the best benefits of your prescription, since the optical center of the lens must be directly in front of your pupil. This is why a careful and conscientious eye care professional will spend what may seem like an excessive amount of time adjusting your frames. If you drop your glasses or the screws in the hinges become loose, or the frames get bent, you should have them readjusted and repaired so alignment is again perfect. If you have wire frames, you should have the alignment checked periodically, since this type of frame is particularly prone to bending.

Do not continue to wear glasses that are askew. Do not attempt to repair them with paper clips or bits of wire. In most cases, the eye professional from whom you bought your glasses will make these repairs or adjustments free, but in any case, the charge will be nominal and definitely worth



Children & Summer Stains

Summer seems to be the worst season for stains - especially on children's clothes now with school activities and family outings crammed into waning summer weekends. Those juicy watermelons, dripping ice-cream cones, suntan oil, and who-knows-what-else can be a frustrating sight if they stain a favorite piece of clothing, both for children and adults.

Fortunately, with the proper treatment, many stains can be removed. To help keep clothing stain-free, here are several suggestions from the stain removal guide published by the Cooperative Extension Service at MSU. For a free copy, listing specific treatment for about 50 different stains, contact your county extension office and ask for Publication 1400.

The first step toward successful removal is to determine the type of stain you're dealing with. Fortunately, all stains fit into one of five cleaning categories — wet, dry, combination, special, or unknown. Each type needs a different reatment.

Statistics from Rit brand dye and fabric treatments indicate that stains which most commonly send

garments to the trash heap are grease or oil stains, color bleeding, ink, rust, blood, grass, and food stains from tomato sauce, ketchup and mustard.

To prevent this, first determine whether the garment should be washed or dry cleaned. If it can be washed, decide which type of stain it has, and treat accordingly. If the garment must be dry cleaned, identify the stain

for your cleaner and have the garment cleaned promptly.

Wet stains are water-based

Wet stains are water-based and can be dissolved in cool water, especially if the stain is fresh. For washable clothing, loosen the wet stain with liquid detergent or a paste of powdered detergent and water, then launder as usual. Wet stains include fruit juices, soft drinks, iced tea, beer, and light mud.

Dry stains include cooking oil, suntan oil and motor oil. Oilbased stains usually require some type of dry cleaning solvent for successful removal. Dry-cleaning solvent can be found in most grocery and hardware stores. Thoroughly rinse and air dry garments treated with dry cleaning fluid before laundering.

Combination stains such as meat gravy, ice cream and ketchup

need twice the treatment since they contain both oil and water. Treat combination stains first as a dry stain to remove the grease, and then as a wet stain. Combination stains containing protein, such as blood, collar soils and salad dressing usually need treatment with an enzyme-based product.

Stain sticks and gels are some of the newest enzyme products. They are kind to most fabrics and colors and can be left on tough stains for up to a week without damaging the fabric. Treat grass stains, another combination stain, with enzyme stain sticks or gel.

Special stains come from unusual substances and require individual treatment. Mildew is a common special summer stain. It is best removed with chlorine

bleach for bleachable fabrics. for non-bleachable fabrics, sponge the mildew stain with hydrogen peroxide, and then launder or soak in an all-fabric bleach solution for 30 minutes or more.

Unknown stains that you can't identify by feel, smell, or location, should be treated as a dry stain first, and then as a wet stain if needed.

Test stain removal products on an inconspicuous area of a garment before using. Follow the product's directions and work carefully and patiently. Apply stain remover to the underside of the stain, with the garment placed face down on a clean paper towel or white cloth. Air dry the garment until you are sure the stain has been completely removed. Retreat if the stain is still visible.



Why Are My Teeth Discolored?

Just as people have different skin and hair color, people also have different tooth color. Some teeth are more yellow, and others yellow with aging. Natural tooth color can be discolored by a number of causes. The surface of the teeth can be stained by tobacco, certain foods and beverages such as coffee, tea and berries and by deposits of calculus, or tartar. Discoloration of the tooth internally can result from aging, injury, excessive fluoride, certain illnesses and taking the antibiotic tetracycline during early childhood. Although bleaching successfully lightens most discolorations, certain types (those caused by tetracycline) are more difficult to remove.

Procedures

There are two types of bleaching procedures. Bleaching may be done completely in the dental office (known as chairside bleaching) or a system may be dispensed by the dentist for the patient to use at home (nightguard bleaching).

The procedure that is done in the dental office takes from 30 minutes to one hour per visit. It is not uncommon for the teeth to become slightly sensitive following bleaching treatments.

To protect the mouth, a gellike substance is applied to the gums and a rubber "shield" is placed around the necks of the teeth. A chemical solution, the oxidizing agent, is then "painted" on the teeth. A special light may be used at five-minute intervals to help activate the agent.

With nightguard bleaching, the dentist makes an impression for a model of your teeth, fabricates a custom-fitted mouthguard and prescribes a bleaching agent that comes in the form of a bleaching gel. The gel is placed in a mouthguard and worn up to two hours daily or at night for about two weeks. The amount of time the nightguard is worn and the duration may vary according to your needs and your dentist's recommendations.

#### Your Rights In An Accident

If Glasses Sliding Down

Ill-fitting or loose frames that slide down your nose or sit askew on your face will not allow you to get the best benefits of your prescription, since the optical center of the lens must be directly in front of your pupil. This is why a careful and conscientious eye care professional will spend what may seem like an excessive amount of time adjusting your frames. If you drop your glasses or the screws in the hinges become loose, or the frames get bent, you should have them readjusted and repaired so alignment is again perfect. If you have wire frames, you should have the alignment checked periodically, since this type of frame is particularly prone to bending.

Do not continue to wear glasses that are askew. Do not attempt to repair them with paper clips or bits of wire. In most cases, the eye professional from whom you bought your glasses will make these repairs or adjustments free, but in any case, the charge will be nominal and definitely worth it.

**Toxoplasmosis In Cats** Toxoplasmosis is one of the small number of diseases affecting domestic cats that can actually be transmitted to Although humans. transmission of this parasite (a protozoan) from the cat to the human is extremely rare...the consequences of a pregnant woman being infected are serious because severe birth defects may result. Women who are pregnant can still have pet cats at home without risk of infection. Consult a veterinarian or obstetrician for additional information.

Cats can become infected with Toxoplasmosis and they can transmit the infection to humans through the feces. However, cats only pass the eggs in the feces for a short time (10 to 14 days) in their life! Therefore, the risk of human exposure is extremely low. When working in soil where cats might defecate or when cleaning a litter box it's always a good idea to wear gloves and wash your hands well afterwards.

Although pet cats are able to shed the eggs of the Toxoplamosis organism in their feces, it is the consumption or handling of rare and/or raw meat that is the single most common source of human infection. The meats most likely to be involved are lamb, poor, and mutton. Beef is an unlikely source of human infection with Toxoplasmosis.


Cats can be tested for Toxoplasmosis. If an examination of a sick cat suggests that Toxoplasmosis might be the diagnosis, a blood sample can be evaluated. Only one laboratory in the US (Colorado State University, College of Veterinary Medicine) can currently test a cat's blood for the infection.







### Letter To The Editor

Histories for only three of Mississippi's 100-plus Civil War regiments have been written. I am attempting to document the exploits of the 43rd Regiment. Mississippi Infantry Volunteers. CSA, several of whose eleven companies were raised in counties immediately south and southwest of luka. This regiment was known as the "Camel Regiment" and fought at luka, Corinth. Vicksburg. Atlanta, Franklin, Nashville, and Bentonville, surrendering with Gen. Joseph Johnston in North Carolina in 1865. This brave band of brothers marched literally thousands of miles and suffered untold hardships in trying to forge a new Southern nation. As with many CSA Magnolia State units. only scant documentation remains for the 43rd. Some seventeenhundred and six men from northeast Mississippi served in this unit, and their current-day progeny in the area (including many who have migrated to Tishomingo County) must surely number in the tens of thousands. I would be honored and humbled if kind readers of the The Tishomingo County News who descend from these noble sires and who have letters, diaries, photos of the men at any age (whether or not in family documents, newspaper clippings, original equipment, etc., would please contact me at their earliest convenience in order that I might utilize their precious memories and mementos in creating a history of the 43rd truly worthy of the heroes

who filled its ranks. Please help me honor the valiant "Boys in Gray" of northeast Mississippi by kindly sharing with me any information you may have regarding the 43rd Regiment, Mississippi Infantry Volunteers, CSA. Deo Vindice! (God Vindicates.)

Mushrooms Can Be Dangerous

Mississippi wild mushrooms pop up just about any time in yards, woodlands, pasture areas, and other locations, following rainy weather and cooler than normal temperatures. Mushrooms, often called "toadstools," are actually specialized types of fungi, and can be admired for their beauty and the fantastic variety of form, color, and texture. They grow in a variety of habitats, and generally are important as decay microorganisms, aiding in the breakdown of logs, leaves, fallen branches, and other organic debris. When mushrooms are found in lawn areas, many homeowners want to know if they're causing damage. It's important to realize these fungi are not parasitic on turfgrasses and won't cause any disease problems. Mushrooms samples are frequently sent to the Plant Pathology Laboratory at Mississippi State University with a request for identification. Invariably, the sender wants to

know "Will it be o.k. to eat this mushroom?" mushrooms specimens generally reach our laboratory in deteriorated condition, we are not always able to provide a positive identification. While there are

some choice wild mushrooms which are edible, we always remind clientele that some species - the various Amanita species, for example - are deadly poisonous to humans. If consumed, even in small amounts, these types could cause fatal results. A few of the poisonous ones are so potent that near-fatal liver damage has already occurred by the time the person realizes they've been poisoned. Is there a simple way to tell poisonous species from nonpoisonous ones? Absolutely not! You must identify a mushroom correctly to the species level in order to know if it is safe to eat. Anyone interested in collecting wild mushrooms for consumption should obtain a copy of one or more books or publications on the subject and become VERY PROFICIENT in mushroom identification. Remember this rule should you spot what appears to be a choice specimen and you're not quite sure about its identity: Don't experiment admire it, BUT DON't EAT IT! A wrong guess could be fatal. There is an old saying, "There are old mushroom hunters, and bold mushroom hunters, but there are no old, bold mushroom hunters."

As part of a strategy field study class, the master of business administration candidates usually consult with area business firms when the course is offered in spring and fall.

"The shorter semester and daily class schedules make it difficult for students to handle field projects in the summer,' explained teacher Barbara A. Spencer. "Driving to sites in Houston or even Columbus can be pretty tough given our tight schedule."

So, the management professor decided to have most of the students work departments on campus, as well as one nearby company, and "provide a service to the university while learning."

Four teams of students were assigned to work with different departments in the Division of Business Affairs. A fifth team worked with Southwire, a Starkville company, where they gathered information to promote a new type of wire product.

At Mississippi State, business affairs is involved in a program to improve the quality of its services and the students were able to provide assistance and benefits from the experience within the academic time frame.

The students' on-campus efforts were focused in four offices:

Information Systems and User Support. The division will open an information desk this fall, so the MBA team surveyed students to determine which computer services technologies they prefer.

Dining Services. Discussions were held with all Dining Services employees to gain insights on how the area can improve its

Comptroller and Treasurer. Students studied the range of services offered and put together a questionnaire for the department to use in measuring customer satisfaction.

Procuremen and Contracts. The students helped develop a process to implement a bar code system for tracking inventory that will result in major changes for the office's operations.

Feedback from both students and university employees has been so promising that future classes will most likely conduct their field studies at the university instead of "on the road".

As one student participant explained, "The project helps to integrate all the skills learned in the MBA program and put them to use in the real world.'

University personnel echo student's satisfaction. Assistant Vice President for Business Affairs Wayne Reed praised the students' "enthusiasm for the project." Comptroller Wayne Balnd went even further: "I'd like to hire all four of the students who worked here.'

DAMAGE FROM DRUGS

Wonder drugs aren't so wonderful when they damage hearing and balance. The hearing loss caused by ototoxic (poisonous to the ear) drugs is almost always of the sensorineural, or inner ear, type. Usually, the higher pitches are affected first and the loss can be permanent. Tinnitus (noises in the ear) frequently is a side effect.

Certain antibiotics given to control serious infections can cause varying degrees of permanent hearing loss. Cisplatin, used to treat cancer, is also ototoxic. Aspirin, in large doses, can damage hearing, but that loss is usu-ally temporary. Hearing will return to previous levels within 72 hours after the drug is stopped.

If ototoxic drugs must be used, audiometric testing can be used to monitor hearing. If a loss has occurred, aural rehabilitation can help the person cope with the loss. This includes training in lipreading and the evaluation and fitting of a hearing aid or other listening device. Brought to you as a community service by ...

Beware: Encephalitis Mississippi State Department of Health has confirmed 1997's first animal of eastern encephalitis, a disease that can spread to humans through mosquito bites.

Three horses in Jackson County, another near Jasper and Smith Counties, and one emu near Lauderdale and Simpson Counties have died of eastern equine encephalititis, or EEE.

Mississippi has confirmed no EEE among humans this year.

"People can get several kinds of encephalitis from mosquito bites, but the disease is not transmitted from horses, emus, or other people," said State Epidemiologist Mary Currier, MD, MPH. "The only way to avoid eastern equine encephalitis is to avoid mosquito bites."

EEE usually reappears when mosquitos become the most active - usually in the mid to late summer months within southeastern Mississippi.

Disease symptoms can include headache, fever, chills, nausea, and vomiting. Mental confusion and sleepiness occur within a few days.

Severe cases can cause coma or even death. Typically, more than 30 percent of those who develop symptoms die.

EEE is carried to people by mosquitos, usually a saltwater marsh mosquito or a freshwater swamp species.

"These are primarily nighttime biting mosquitos," said State Entomologist Jerome Goddard, PhD. "Controlling the diseases they spread depends on both community mosquito control programs and personal protective measures."

To protect against mosquitoborne disease, Mississippi can:

\*Empty outside water containers to eliminate mosquito breeding areas.

\*Put screens on windows and doors. Patch any holes.

\*Avoid mosquitos when they feed usually around sunset and

\*Wear long sleeves and pants when outside after dark.

\*Use bed-netting when

camping.

When used properly, repellents can usually keep mosquitos from biting. Repellents containing as little as 35 percent of the ingredient DEET can keep

### School's Open -Drive Carefully

The Key To Safety Is Practicing What You Know

"It's time for the 1997-98 school year to begin," said Danon Jones, Director of Public and Government Relations for AAA Mississippi, "time to launch our annual School's Open - Drive Carefully campaign, time to remind everyone that traffice crashes are the number one threat to our children's lives. In fact, traffic crashes lead all causes of death and injury among children up to age 14.

The best way to address this threat to our children's lives is behavior consistent knowledge," Jones continued. "At this time of year, drivers know that it's more important than ever to watch out for children hurrying to school or bus stops who might not remember to watch out for cars, but knowing isn't enough. Drivers need to actually slow down in all residential areas, not just in in school zones, so they get that extra time to react to the unexpected child who darts into the road without looking.'

"Children need to develop a clear understanding of safety behaviors to carry them safely to school and back home. Not only do children need to learn to be safe pedestrians, but they also need to learn how to protect themselves as passengers" in motor vehicles. Once they learn how, they need to practice these behaviors on a daily basis to stay safe. Children aged 12 and under should always ride properly restrained in the back seat of the vehicle unless there is virtually no alternative. This is the safest place in the car, even in cars not equipped with air bags."

The only exception to this would be for cars and trucks that don't have back seats, when there are four children passengers (too many to sit in just the back seat), or for certain medical conditions which require the child to be under constant observation even while in a vehicle. Even under these conditions, a rear-facing child

safety seat should never be installed in the front seat of a vehicle that is equipped with a passenger-side air bag. Car safety dangerously close to the air bag when it deploys.

"Parents, and other adults who drive children to and from school, need to know that the number one safety behavior for you and the children you transport is to buckle up," Jones concluded. "You are the role model for your children and others who ride with you. The best reinforcement to teaching children safe behavior is to see you practice it. Remember, the key to safety is practicing what you know."

#### Chromium Picolinate And Diabetes

Chromium picolinate is a trace element that has received much publicity lately concerning its effects on weight loss and diabetes. It is a widely available over-the-counter nutritional supplement that has been

advertised as the latest "wonder drug" in health food and nutrition publications and by the media. Some advocates of chromium have touted its beneficial effects in diabetes, weight loss, energy, and many others. However, most of these claims are simply NOT supported by clinical studies. Chromium has been proven to be effective in helping to manage some forms of diabetes, and some people may see benefit from taking chromium picolinate.

Glucose, or blood sugar, is the fuel that provides the body with energy for everything it does. Glucose is transported in the blood to all the cells of the body where it enters the cell and gives it energy. People with diabetes have too much glucose in their blood. There are two types of diabetes. Approximately 10% of people with diabetes have Type I diabetes, which is also known as Insulin Dependent Diabetes Mellitus (IDDM). The other 90% of diabetics have Type II diabetes, or Non-Insulin Dependent Diabetes Mellitus (NIDDM). It is the people with the Type II diabetes that may benefit from chromium picolinate. Type II diabetes is sometimes difficult to understand, so perhaps the following analogy will help to Imagine that your body is a

city. The streets that run throughout the city represent your bloodstream, and the houses along the streets represent your body's cells. There are trucks that drive along the streets and deliver food to each house, which is what your blood cells do when they deliver glucose to the cells. However, for the trucks to deliver the food to the houses, they need keys to get in the door. That key is the insulin your body produces that allows glucose to go into the cells. In a normal person, everything in the city works fine. But in a diabetic

patient, the delivery truck either has too few keys, which is type 1 or insulin dependent diabetes, or the locks are rusty and the keys won't turn, which is Type II or non-insulin dependent diabetes,

Chromium appears to help Type II diabetics by improving insulin sensitivity at the cells. Another way of saying this to match the above analogy is to say that it acts like oil at the door locks so that the key works. It does not drastically reduce blood sugar levels in diabetic patients, but appears to help people that do not respond completely to standard medical therapy. It is associated with very few side effects, most of which include mild insomnia and stomach upset. This supplement is not intended to replace any medicinal therapy, but to act as a supplement to a well-balanced diet and exercise regimen along with standard medical therapy for diabetes. It is not recommended that anyone take this or any other supplement or herbal product without first consulting their physician or pharmacist.

Under the FCC's "Do-Not-Call" rules, a person or entity (a business telling consumers about their rights for example) placing live telephone solicitation calls to your home must maintain a record of your request not to receive future telephone The free brochure also tells solicitations from them.
