Tishomingo County Free Clinic Now Offering Immunizations & Flu Shots For Qualified Patients

The Tishomingo County
Free Clinic is now prepared to
offer an immunization program
to help prevent childhood
diseases.

"We now can give immunizations for diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, measles, mumps, hepatitis A and B," said Dr. Thomas Goyer, Medical Director of the clinic. The shots are for children and infants who need to participate in a complete immunization program before entering school.

Tetanus shots and now flu shots are available for adults, as well, said Dr. Goyer.

The Clinic is located on the Burnsville School campus, in the old home economics building, and opened May 19th to offer primary health care to Tishomingo County citizens who

are either unemployed or are not covered by an employer insurance policy.

Local doctors and nurses volunteer their time to see patients on Tuesday evenings, so that people don't have to try to see a doctor during working hours. The after-hours appointments will be convenient for getting children immunizations, as well, pointed out officials.

Sometimes it is difficult to get to the health department before they close, especially if you can't easily take time off from your job.

The Free Clinic is looking forward to filling this gap for the working needy in the preventative health care, especially since an immunization program is so beneficial for infants and toddlers.

In order to qualify to see a doctor at the free clinic, please call on Mondays from 2-6 p.m. or on Tuesdays from 2-5 p.m.

Applicants need to be able to prove they are working or temporarily laid off, and that they don't receive employer-subsidized insurance, all of which can be done with a copy of the most recent pay check stub. A pay stub will also indicate that the applicant does not earn sufficient income to allow them to pay for their own insurance.

Applicants also need to bring social security cards on everyone in the family, and proof of residence in Tishomingo County, such as a driver's license, power bill or voter registration.

Call 427-8333 on Monday or Tuesday afternoons for information on receiving treatment at the clinic.

Two Suspects Sought For Saturday Morning Break-In at Tishomingo Co. Jail

Authorities are searching for two men who allegedly broke into an evidence storage trailer at the Tishomingo County Jail early Saturday morning.

About 3 a.m. last Saturday, a trustee performing laundry duty at the jail reported to the sheriff's dispatcher that he heard a noise that turned out to be two men taking some VCRs, computer equipment and other evidence items that had been stored in a trailer outside the jail building, according to Sheriff David Smith.

Iuka Police Officer Robert Till was nearby and intercepted the suspects in the stolen Cadillac they were driving as they ran a stop sign on their way to Highway 172 west. The Sheriff was nearby as well, and the two officers pursued the suspects, west onto Highway 172, where the suspects then pulled into a driveway just past the city limits and abandoned the car. The two suspects ran into the woods, said the sheriff.

Dogs brought to the scene eventually lost the trail, said Smith, but the suspects were positively identified.

Authorities are searching for Raymond Hester and Ricky Dale Hall in connection with the burglary. Both have previous felony convictions for burglaries and are thought to have last resided in Red Bay or the Shoals area. The sheriff urged anyone with knowledge of the

whereabouts of these two men to immediately call 423-6185.

All items taken from the trailer were still in the recovered car, which had been stolen from the Shoals area, said Smith. Although many of the items stored in the trailer are from recent crime investigations, the suspects were not stealing anything in particular, said Smith.

Smith said this incident and a previous attempted break in to the sheriff's office itself, demonstrates the need for improvements at the county jail that will make it a more secure facility, such as a fence, or more sophisticated evidence storage than the sheriff's office or a trailer.

Amount of Uncollected Taxes Reduced By 61 Percent, Whitlock Reports to Board

Board, Organizations, Receive Offer of Free Earthmoving for Community Projects

More than \$12,000 in uncollected taxes were reported to the Tishomingo County Supervisors in their regular meeting Monday, October 6th.

The insolvency listings, provided to the Board by Tax Collector Paul Whitlock's office represented taxes that were unpaid in fiscal year 1997 on mobile homes and personal property, according to Whitlock. The tax collector is required by law to present the Board with the list and have it entered on the minutes, so that the Board knows what tax money was not collected for the past year.

The total combined amount of insolvencies was listed as \$12,261.38, which is down 61 percent from the 1995-96 insolvency report, which was \$31,411.11. Whitlock credits this to legislative mandates, more efficient practices of collection and notification of those who owe the taxes.

Personal property includes the inventory of a business, like its computers and equipment, Whitlock explained, as opposed to real property, which is your building, home or land. The total amount of personal property tax that was uncollected in the 1996-97 fiscal year was \$6,096.47, though, since many of the businesses have closed down and moved on, only about \$2,899.66 is actually still collectable, Whitlock explained.

Uncollected mobile home taxes as of September 30th were \$6,164.91. Even though the fiscal year is over, those who owe on mobile homes can pay up to the end of the 1997 calendar year, December 31st, Whitlock said. An additional amount is added each month after the original February due date, Whitlock said, but they are still collecting mobile home taxes each day, and are optimistic about eventually

collecting at least two-thirds of the \$6,164.91 amount.

Since, by definition, mobile homes can and are often moved to a different place during the year, the location of the delinquent owner/taxpayer has long been a challenge for tax collection. Recent state legislation is an aid in collecting mobile home taxes. According to the new law, mobile homes are treated more like real property, now; meaning that at the end of the year, Whitlock's office can get a tax lien in circuit court against those unpaid mobile omes that authorizes him to seize them and sell them for the amount of the unpaid taxes.

In other business, a new street light for the southwest side of the county jail building was authorized at an approximate cost of \$4 a month. The request was made by the sheriff, in response to the Saturday morning break in of an evidence storage trailer on that side of the county jail.

Sheriff David Smith also reported that he has hired a new jailor, Benny Phifer, of Highway 365

A new lease for a new copier at the jail was also approved, after assurances were made by Lynn McBride that it was the most economical way to get a new copier and the associated equipment and inevitable service. The lease is similar to ones set up for other county offices, McBride said. The lease on the old copier was expired.

Electricity Problems in

Courthouse Margaret

Margaret June Riley, head of the Tishomingo County Economic Assistance department, made a report to the supervisors of an electrical overload that seriously damaged some computers and printers in her office. Apparently, 220 volts went through a 110 volt line when a dedicated line for a copier was being added. Along with the damaged equipment, the office now smells like burning wire, Riley reported.

Riley said that the equipment had to be fixed, but left it up to the supervisors to see if the electrician's insurance would pay for it, or if the county would, in which case some possible federal matching funds would be available.

Offer of Help

The board received an offer of assistance from Randy Norris, who is training administrator at Southern Apprenticeship and Training Fund, located at the Tri-State Commerce Park.

Norris' organization conducts training and provides certification in operation of heavy machinery like bulldozers, scrapers, cranes and other earthmoving equipment. The men and women attending the classes need handson training and experience, which makes them and their equipment available for all kinds of earth work projects, which Norris was offering to the supervisors.

One of their current projects is the Tishomingo Dixie Youth Little League field just east of the Tishomingo School, where they have done about \$100,000 of earth moving to make two ball fields. The work has been done at no cost to the little league association, and Norris said it is a way of giving back to the community.

Several supervisors expressed

enthusiasm about utilizing Norris' students and equipment in projects in their districts, like the creation of some ditches before the rainy season starts.

Norris said they had already

done some work for First District Supervisor Dale Price, and at the Coleman State Park.



New Car Tags Issued



A number of states have been looking recently at automobile accidents as the number one killer of our youth, and are beginning to take some steps toward


prevention. Florida, for example, has passed legislation restricting drivers under 16 to daytime driving and then only if accompanied by a licensed driver over 21. Other restrictions on time apply to other drivers under 18 based on findings that most fatal accidents involving teen drivers occur during evening and nighttime hours.

Whatever the answers - and there are more than one - we need to be trying them. Consider these sobering statistics: *In one year, drivers 19 and under were involved in close to 3 million motor vehicle accidents: *5,000 teens die each year from auto accidents: *25% of all teen accidents involve speeding; * alcohol is responsible for almost half of all teen motor vehicle deaths; *half of all teenage traffic fatalities occur between 6:00 p.m. Friday and 3:00 a.m. Monday.

What can we do — or what do



1. Drive defensively. If we focus on what we are doing, and assume that we must watch out for other arivers, we will instinctively be more cautious.

2. Do not speed. Even some legal limits are too fast for road and traffic conditions. Besides. when we speed, we have less time to react, to make the right

3. Never drink and drive, and don't allow friends to do so either. Alcohol can seriously impair decision-making skills and reaction time.

4. Learn and practice the rules of the road. Questions on the drivers' exam are there for a purpose - to make us learn safe practices. Adults can set an example for their own teens by practicing safe driving habits.

Safe driving is everyone's responsibility. To not do so can be expensive - in more ways that one.

Independence day for many people is now starting with a dog. A group called PAWS WITH A CAUSE is placing specially trained dogs with hearing impaired and disabled people. The result is an independence many people thought they would never have!

PAWS dogs are trained to meet the specific needs of their new owners, whether it be reacting to alarms for those who can't hear, or a steady support for someone who has difficulty walking. Training a service or hearing dog is not easy. It takes almost a year of intensive work with both the dog and his new owner to get a working team.

For the recipients of a PAWS service or hearing dog, the results are a miracle. PAWS dogs are able to act in a crisis, respond to alarms, assist owners who have fallen, and most of all, promote self-

These dogs don't come cheap. Even though many of the dogs come from animal shelters, intensive training takes time and money. A hearing dog costs \$5,000, and a service dog is \$8,500. There are no local, state, or federal programs to support organizations like this, so money is raised through fund raising projects and donations.

Fund raising is definitely a labor of love, but worth every minute. Just ask the recipient who receives not just a new dog, but a new-found dignity.



This week, October 5-11, is National Fire Prevention Week. This we always a very busy one for the members of the Iuka Fire Department B end of this week, every class from the Fourth Grade down through Day 0 in the City of Iuka will have been visited by the Department. If you h child in the Fourth Grade or below, ask him what he learned when the truck came to school He may know something you don't, and if so, following will help you and your child practice fire safety and preve together.

It is important to have an evacuation route planned for your house in of a fire. Draw a simple floor plan of your house and draw a way out. devise an alternate route to use if the first one is blocked. Designate an outside your house where everyone can meet after exiting the burning h and appoint someone to make sure everyone has arrived. Never re-en burning house for any reason. make sure each family member understand plan and practice it periodically. your kids will think it's fun and it may their lives in the future.

Your child should also know to Stop, Drop, and Roll if his clothes st catch fire; to crawl low under smoke; and to never play with lighter

In addition to learning all of the above, children are given the opport to climb in the fire truck and blow the horn and siren.

You can practice fire safety and prevention by installing smoke alarm your home, and by making sure the batteries are always fresh. Regularly your fire extinguishers to make sure they are charged, and turn them up down and shake them to redisperse the powder into the liquid. If you unsure about how to check your extinguishers, call or come by the Department, and someone will be glad to assist you. Also, instead of but your leaves and yard rubbish, pile them up beside the street, and call the Department, at 423-9879. They will pick it up if you let them know it's

After early positions as principal at Okolona and then Amory, he answered the call to preach, and attended the prestigious Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville, Kentucky, where he earned his master of divinity

With a young man's assurance that the training at Southern would be the ticket to prestigious preaching positions, or perhaps lead to the fulfillment of a perceived call to be a foreign missionary, Tennison was somewhat surprised when he was asked to become pastor at Tishomingo Baptist in the fall of 1956, he explained.

Before heading back to Kentucky for the fall 1956 semester, Bro. Tennison preached one Sunday at Tishomingo Baptist Church, where the average attendance was then 25-30 people and the weekly offering was about \$25. After preaching, a deacon came up and asked him to step outside, while the church called itself into business meeting and voted to call him to become pastor

He declined the offer and went on back to Kentucky, where after chapel one morning the Lord laid on his heart to take the Tishomingo call. He finished his last two years at Southern driving eight hours between Louisville and Tishomingo to preach two Sundays a month.

Tishomingo Baptist and the extensive family he has there has been and still is his greatest love, after the Lord, he says.

"The most gratifying thing has been that the best years of my life were spent at Tishomingo Baptist," said Bro. Gene.







Mississippi Building Roads At Record Pace

It's hard to travel anywhere in Mississippi today without encountering bulldozers and road crews building new highways.

It's the result of an ambitious four-lane program enacted by the 1987 Mississippi Legislature. In addition, areas with casinos are getting special help with roads to ease traffic problems. The casino roads are financed by gaming

The four-lane program is divided into four phases. And the reason you see so much activity is that the state is currently at the peak of phase three. Phase four begins in July 2001. Every contractor who wants work can find work, plus the activity has attracted the attention of out-ofstate builders.

The first three phases include 1,086 miles of four-lane, and phase four has 619 miles for a total of 1,705 miles.

Currently 440.8 miles are

open to traffic. Another 307.3 miles are under contract, and 338.2 miles remain to be let in the first three phases. The state has also contracted for reconstruction of 143 miles using federal funds and replaced or constructed 115

And the good thing is that the program has been financed on a pay-as-you-go basis. Some legislators, however, are calling for the department to issue shortterm bonds to give even more speed to the construction.

The one fly in the ointment is the casino roads. The Legislature designated the roads to be built but put more on than the revenue stream can support. The projected revenue through the year 2012 is Projected million. disbursements are \$1,030 million — a shortfall of \$421 million.

Gaming receipts through June 1997 were \$69 million with disbursements of \$102.1 million or a funding shortfall of \$33.1 million.

That is causing a lot of frustration particularly on the Gulf Coast where the urban setting construction skyrocket.

But regardless, Mississippi's ambitious four-lane program has national attention, especially since it is being done without saddling future generations with a large debt.

USDA Announces New Voluntary Program To Develop Wildlife Habitat

Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman today announced a new program that will help farmers, ranchers, and other landowners protect critically important wildlife habitat. USDA's Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program (WHIP) is a land management rather than a land retirement program.

WHIP provides both technical assistance and cost-share payments to landowners to help establish and improve fish and wildlife habitat. In addition, if the landowner agrees, cooperating state wildlife agencies and nonprofit or private organizations may provide expertise or additional funding to help

landowners complete a project.

"WHIP will help the nation's landowners voluntarily develop habitat for wildlife on private lands that comprise over 70 percent of the land in this country," Glickman said. "WHIP also offers farmers and ranchers an opportunity to meet their production needs in ways that are compatible with providing fish and wildlife habitat."

A number of habitat types are rapidly disappearing from the landscape. These include many of the native grasslands, savannas, and barrens, as well as certain types of forest lands. Other habitats such as wetlands, riparian forests, rivers, and streams have suffered a serious decline in quality and/or quantity. Habitat loss is the number one reason for the decline in fish and wildlife populations. WHIP offers landowners the opportunity to put back some of these precious habitats.

Under the 1996 Farm Bill, WHIP provides cost-share assistance up to 75 percent of the cost of installing wildlife habitat practices. Cost-share payments may be used to establish new practices or replace practices that fail for reasons beyond the landowner's control. The total cost-share amount cannot exceed \$10,000 per agreement.

"Under the program," Glickman said, "landowners may restore aquatic habitat as well as adjacent streambanks, wetlands, and uplands. The goal is to provide the best habitat possible for the species of fish and wildlife the landowner is trying to help. Beyond that," Glickman added, "WHIP is just one component of

"WHIP is just one component of the conservation improvements a farmer might want to make, and we encourage them to work with us to see how all of USDA's conservation improvements a farmer might want to make, and we encourage them to work with us to see how all of USDA's conservation programs can help on their operations."

To participate in WHIP, individuals who own or control land agree to prepare and implement a wildlife habitat development plan, with assistance from USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and the local conservation district. The plan describes the landowner's goals for improving wildlife habitat, includes a list of practices and a schedule for installing them, and details the steps necessary to maintain the habitat for the life of the agreement. Agreements generally last from 5 to 10 years.

Land is ineligible for WHIP if it is currently in the Conservation Reserve Program, Wetlands Reserve Program, or Water Bank Program, or is subject to an Emergency Watershed Protection Program flooding plain easement.

WHIP is currently budgeted for \$50 million total through the year 2002. Funds will be distributed to states based on state wildlife priorities which may include wildlife habitat areas, targeted species and their habitats, and specific practices. State priorities are developed through a locally led process that identifies wildlife resource needs and finalized in consultation with the State Technical Committee. WHIP applications will be ranked at the county level and those that provide the greatest wildlife benefits will be funded.

Mississippi To Participate In First "America Recycles Day"

On November 15, 1997, Mississippi will join millions of other Americans as the nation celebrates the first "America Recycles Day." The theme of "America Recycles Day" is "Keep Working: Recycling Recycled", and will encourage residents not only to recycle items in their homes, but consciously purchase items manufactured from recycled or recyclable materials. By purchasing these items, Americans will create the demand for more recycled goods. And, in turn, increase the demand for projects. recycling Mississippi Recycling Coalition, a nonprofit organization, will help Mississippi's coordinate involvement with "America Recycles Day."

"It's important that we all realize the need to take one more step to keep recycling working and that is buying recycled products," said Larry Joe Daughtry, chairman of the Mississippi Recycling Coalition. "Recycling does not end when we drop off our recyclables at the curb or collection point."

Americans generate approximately 208 million tons of trash per year, and the amount of materials being recycled has increased from 11 percent in 1987 to 25 percent today. This proves that Americans do see the need for recycling because it saves energy, resources, and landfill space.

Mississippians can use this opportunity to educate themselves

on which products are made from recycled products by requesting an "American Recycles Day" pledge card or poster. Residents who fill-in the information on the card and return it to the address provided by November 15, 1997

will be eligible to win a new mountain bike that has been donated to the state by the Steel Recycling Institute.

After the state drawing, the cards will be sent to Washington, D.C., where a national drawing will be held for an "American Dream Green House." This

environmentally safe house will be built from materials made from recycled products and is sponsored by the Steel Recycling Institute, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, VFI, The Home Depot, Union Camp, and the U.S. Postal Service. Entrants must be at least 18 years old to be eligible to win the house.

Mississippi residents may call their local recycling coordinator or 1-800-545-3764 to get information on obtaining the pledge cards and posters.
