Local Marijuana Conspiracy Case Earns "1997 Case of the Year" From Miss. Bureau of Narcotics

A year after a New Year's all-night stakeout netted six arrests in a marijuana distribution conspiracy investigation, the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office is receiving rewards and recognition for their hard work.

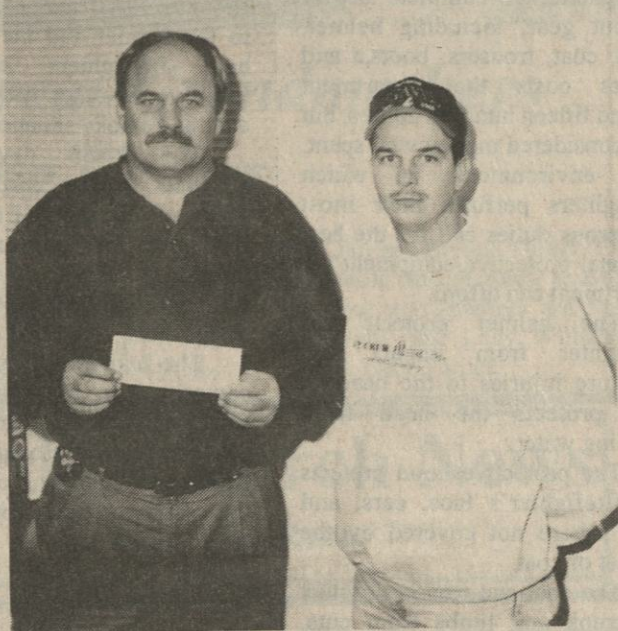
The county sheriff's department headed up the investigation that went on during most of 1996. It resulted a total of nine arrests, one seized vehicle, 20 pounds of marijuana seized, and more than \$14,000 in cash seized. Assisting the county in the investigation was the Alcorn County Sheriff's Department and the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics.

The case was awarded the recognition of "Case of the Year" in the entire state of Mississippi for the year 1997 by the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics (MBN). This week, the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department received a check for \$11,832, for their share (80 percent) of the cash seized in the New Years night raid where the main players in the conspiracy were apprehended.

A year ago, Sheriff David Smith described the case as "the biggest drug ring ever busted" in the county and the prosecution phase of the case is complete except for some sentencing, and the arraignment of the one suspect officials have called the head of the whole operation, Pedro Sandoval.

Sandoval failed to show for his initial arraignment, breaking a \$250,000 professional bond, and is scheduled for arraignment this Friday, January 16th. He is thought to be in the McAllen, Texas area.

All but Sandoval have plead

in circuit court, but some have yet to be sentenced, because they "plead open," leaving the sentencing up to the judge.

Though complete details have not been released, since some prosecution is still in process, the conspiracy is thought to have connections to a Texas-Mexico border town, McAllen, Texas. The local arrests were made in the Burnsville area.

Ferrous Metal Processing Announces New Steel Coil Slitting Operation To Locate At Yellow Creek Port Authority Company and Port Officials Estimate 30 Jobs in First Year

A Cleveland, Ohio metal processor announced this week that it will be opening a new steel coil slitting operation at the Yellow Creek State Inland Port Authority complex this summer.

Ed Gonzalez, president of Ferrous Metal Processing of Cleveland, Ohio announced that his company is building the first phase of a \$15-million steel processing plant at the Port in the far northeast corner of the county, on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway.

This "first phase" will consist of a steel slitting operation that will be housed in a 40,000-square-foot facility that will be built at the Port by the Port Authority, according to officials from Ferrous and the Port. Ferrous will lease the facility.

In the second phase of the new operation, Ferrous will bring on a 1/2-inch by 72-inch cut-to-length line and a 3/8-inch by 36-inch CTL line. Ferrous also will expand its building to 116,000 square feet to accommodate additional equipment.

"I expect those pieces will be

running by mid-1999," Gonzalez said. "If, however, the market demands it, we may temporarily install the CTL lines in a nearby facility until the building expansions are completed."

30 Local Jobs In First Year

Ferrous Executive Vice-President Reed McGivney said that an estimated 30 jobs will result in the first year, and that most will be filled by local people. McGivney said they have had some contact with Northeast Mississippi Community College in Booneville, and hopes to utilize training and recruiting programs and services the college has offered.

The operation is scheduled to begin sometime this summer following the estimated mid-summer completion of the \$1.5 million facility.

Ferrous selected the Iuka location due to its proximity to steelmakers like Decatur, Alabama's Trico, and steel users like LTV Pipe in Counce, Tennessee.

McGivney said that the expansion will allow Ferrous to be nearer to the growing steel

industry in the South. The Iuka location is viewed as a favorable location to not only Decatur facilities, but a growing number of service centers and manufacturers in the Mid- and Deep South states.

The Slitting Process

In this heavy-gauge steel slitting process, as explained by McGivney, large steel coils come from steel mills in traditional widths of 72 inches, in thicknesses of 0.0538-to-0.500-inch, and weigh more than can be transported by truck. Local users have to make arrangements to have the coils slit to the width they desire for their individual uses. This slitter operation will give local users more opportunities to buy from local mills like Trico, said Eugene Bishop, executive director of the Yellow Creek Port Authority.

"We are thrilled that this processor is locating here, not only for the 30 or more possible jobs, and the revenues to be gained from the lease," said Bishop, "But the main thing is it increases the amount of tonnage we will be handling across our dock."

Ferrous has been looking at locating at the Port for a number of years said McGivney.

Gonzalez said the cooperation of the Yellow Creek State Inland Port Authority was especially helpful in the final decision. "I really want to thank Eugene Bishop and Archie Riley for their hard work in helping us put this together," he said. Riley, of Mantachie, serves as the president of the Port Authority Board, which is appointed by various state and county entities.

"The efforts of Mr. Bishop and Mr. Riley convinced us that the Port, the community of Iuka and the state of Mississippi really wanted to host Ferrous Metal Processing's entry into the dynamic southern steel industry," Gonzalez said.

Except for the Port Authority constructing the facility that will house the first phase, no grants or financial assistance have been awarded. All capital outlay will be by Ferrous.

Driver's License Office in Courthouse

This week the supervisors and the sheriff made arrangements to offer a room in the courthouse to the Mississippi Department of Public Safety, for the purpose of issuing driver's licenses.

After meeting with a representative of the Department of Public Safety Tuesday, Sheriff David Smith announced that the department will soon be coming on Mondays and Tuesdays to Iuka and will operate out of the conference room downstairs in the county courthouse.

Advertisements will be made when the Department is ready to resume its Tishomingo County services. Some phone and computer arrangements still need to be made, said Smith.

The driver's license service will have to work around other uses of the conference room, which is used during grand jury, or by justice court officials when circuit or chancery court is in session.

The Department operated two days a week out of Iuka City Hall prior to an August fire. Since then Tishomingo Countians have had to travel to a neighboring county to get their licenses.

Supervisors Head to Jackson to Fight for Bridge Funds

The Tishomingo County Supervisors headed to Jackson Monday for the Mid-Winter Conference of County Supervisors.

One of the main priorities of the trip will be for supervisors to meet with state legislators to promote issues from their districts. Tishomingo County's supervisors will be fighting for a fifth and final year of state bridge replacement funds to complete a five-year program that has provided several state-funded bridges throughout the county. Bridge Program Funding in Jeopardy

This county has received approximately \$272,000 each year of the program, explained Dale Price, president of the board of supervisors, and supervisor for the first district. The amount prorated for each county is based on the size and need of the individual county.

State Representative Ricky Cummings reported to the supervisors in their regular 10 a.m. Monday meeting that the bill funding the bridge program for a fifth and final year had about 80 signatures at this time, but that there is a chance it may not pass.

Some bridges that have been completed under the program include the Pike Street Bridge

over Indian Creek near Mineral Springs Park in Iuka (first district), a bridge on Old Highway 25 in the third district, one on Jackson Camp Road in the fourth district, one bridge that was replaced with a box culvert on County Road 29 west of Dennis (fifth district), and one in the second district on Bud Whirley Road (CR 214) that is currently under construction.

If the funding fails to pass, at least two bridges planned for construction in the final year of the program will not be built. This includes one in the third and fourth districts on County Road 155 and one in the first district on Chicken Run Road (CR 241), said supervisors.

Senate Bill 2500 (SB2500) has been introduced by Senator Travis Little in the 1998 regular session and has at least 20 co-signers. It has been sent to the Highways and Transportation, and Appropriations Committees, according to the Mississippi Legislature Internet Web site Tuesday. The web site did not show a similar bill has been introduced in the House.

In addition to meeting with legislators, the supervisors will attend classes and seminars. They plan to be back in the county before the end of the week.

Money Scams Lurk Behind Instant Winner Notices

It never ceases to amaze me that almost everyday in mailboxes across the country there are award notifications that sound too good to be true. They seem to mean big bucks for someone, but probably not for the person receiving the notice. Sweepstakes companies

are racking up on hopeful people who dream of winning a free ticket out of these tough financial times.

If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. People hear that all the time, but sometimes they get so caught up in the thrill of winning something, they may not be logical.

What company can stay in

business by giving something for nothing; there's got to be a catch.

The most common money scams come in the form of direct mailing, telemarketing and fraudulent classified advertisements.

Post cards and letters notify would-be winners of cash awards and various prizes, which usually include an automobile, cash, television, jewelry or trips. Some states require the odds of winning to be on the notification, which often can be as high as 1 in 1 million.

Mail notifications use words and phrases to entice response that should serve as warning signs of a potential scam. Some of those words include official, guaranteed prize, final notice and limited time offer.

Just because some of these words are on the notification does not automatically make it a scam, but the more that are used, the more suspicious consumers should be. Also watch out for mention of a processing fee, requests for money orders rather than personal checks and for requests for credit card numbers.

Telemarketing fraud costs American consumers \$10 billion

annually. If the consumer initiates the call to a reputable, established company, it probably will be safe to give a credit card number to a telephone solicitor.

If you are contacted by telephone with a special offer, request the solicitor send the information in writing before making a commitment. If they say it is a limited time offer, then decline. Don't be rushed into making a decision.

A growing method of defrauding people is by advance-fee loan scams, which are actually found in classified advertisements in magazines and newspapers.

These can be spotted by promises of loans regardless of credit records. Whenever an offer sounds suspicious, consumers should contact the Better Business Bureau or the attorney general's office to find out if any complaints have been filed against that company.

Protect Your Rights After Any Accident

Here are some key things to do after almost any kind of accident to help maximize your settlement:

- See a doctor, even if you think you suffered only minor injuries. Some injuries take a long time to develop.
- Take notes on the accident, and save any evidence.
- Get the names, addresses and phone numbers of witnesses.
- Take photos of the scene, items and people involved in the accident.
- Don't discuss the accident with anyone at the scene.
- Consult your lawyer promptly to find out about your rights. The time right after an accident can be crucial in making your claim.

A WEEKLY LOOK AT THE IUKA FIRE DEPARTMENT

One of the most important things a firefighter takes with him to the scene of a fire is his personal protective equipment. Having good quality equipment and knowing how to use it greatly reduces and prevents injuries.

The Iuka Fire Department provides its personnel with equipment that is NFPA (National Fire Protection Association) approved. Much thought and consideration has gone into the selection and purchase of the protective clothing to ensure the best possible protection for the firefighters. A complete set of turnout gear, including helmet, hood, coat, trousers, boots, a and gloves costs the department around fifteen hundred dollars, but it is considered money well spent. The environment in which firefighters perform their most dangerous duties call for the best personal protective equipment the department can afford.

The helmet protects the firefighter from impact and puncture injuries to the head. It also protects the head from scalding water.

The protective hood protects the firefighter's face, ears, and neck where not covered by the helmet or coat.

The coat and trousers protect the trunk and limbs from cuts, abrasions, and burn injuries, and provide some protection from corrosive liquids.

The gloves protect the firefighter's hands from cuts, wounds, and burn injuries.

The bunker boots protect the

feet from burn injuries and puncture wounds.

Other items which a firefighter wears during entry of a burning house include SCBA (Self Contained Breathing Apparatus), a "Lite Tracker," and a PASS (Personal Alert Safety System) device.

The SCBA protects the vulnerable lungs and respiratory tract against injury from super-heated air, smoke, and toxic gases, providing the wearer with clean air to breathe.

The "Lite Tracker" is a bright flashing visual indicator attached to the helmet and the SCBA to help firefighters know the locations of other firefighters in dark and smoky situations.

The PASS device, also attached to the SCBA, alerts others of a downed or disoriented firefighter by emitting a loud pulsating shriek when that firefighter has been motionless for 25 seconds.

The Iuka Fire Department is committed to the safety of its firefighters. By using good quality personal protective equipment, the department believes it can provide the citizens of Iuka with the best service possible.

INSIGHT INTO EYESIGHT

How We See

Our eyes do not actually see objects. What they see is the light that objects give off or reflect. The light enters the eye through a transparent dome called the cornea. The cornea bends or refracts the light rays toward a focal point on the retina - the interior surface on the back of the eye.

The amount of light that enters the eye is regulated by the pupil. It dilates to let more light in at night time or in dark places, and be constructing in bright light to let less light in.

The light rays then enter the crystalline lens of the eye which continues the refracting, or bending process begun by the cornea. After the rays pass through the lens, they arrive at a point of focus on the retina. The retina is made up of light sensitive cells called rods and cones. These cells absorb the light rays and convert them to electrical images which are sent to the brain via the optic nerve where they are interpreted as visual images.

Dental Disease

Halitosis...perhaps best known as dog breath...it's an all too familiar problem for people who own dogs...and/or cats. But unlike shedding, drooling, and licking, a pet's halitosis isn't just one of those annoying little things that you have to put up with to own a pet. It's really a sign...a very early sign...of dental disease.

Left untreated, and statistics suggest that it usually is, a pet's dental disease typically gets worse with time. The bacteria in the mouth that cause halitosis can capable of infecting the gums and the delicate periodontal tissues that maintain the health of the teeth.

Once the gums and periodontium become infected, halitosis can become unbearable as teeth begin to loosen and fall out. A pet can actually suffer life threatening consequences associated with having a raging bacterial infection in it's mouth.

However, the health risks...to say nothing of the cost, can be dramatically reduced (or eliminated) by following a few simple recommendations:

- Regular use of dry pet food does a better job of cleaning teeth than diets consisting exclusively of canned or semi-moist food. This is true in dogs as well as cats.
- For dogs, rawhide chew sticks greatly facilitate removal of harmful, disease-producing plaque (bacteria). Puppies as well as adult dogs should be encouraged to use these inexpensive products.
- Physically massaging your dog's gums with a moist wash cloth even if it's only done once a week, is an excellent way to keep teeth healthy. Because cat's teeth are sharp this is technique best left for use in dogs.

It's important to understand that these methods, if used regularly, will significantly sustain a pet's dental health and it will save unnecessary costs associated with treating dental disease. However, the methods outlined will not always reverse existing dental disease. If your pet does have persistent, offensive halitosis, it should be examined by a veterinarian.

Donating Appreciated Securities Can Eliminate Capital Gains Tax

(Editor's note: Following is an update of one of our most popular columns.)

Many people have stocks or other securities that they have owned for a long time. Over the years, additional shares may have been acquired through stock splits, dividend reinvestment or mergers. The current value of the security may be much more than the original cost. If the security is sold, the investor receives a sizable capital gain. Many investors in this situation feel they can't afford to sell their securities.

However, they may be able to afford to donate the security or securities to a charitable organization such as a college or church. That organization may then sell the security and use the proceeds, or hold it for income and future appreciation.

If the donor chooses to sell the security and then donate the proceeds, he or she still has to pay taxes on the capital gain. By donating the security directly, the donor not only avoids capital gains tax but also gets a tax deduction for the security's fair market value at the time

of the donation (assuming the donor held the security for more than 18 months).

Donations of appreciated securities to charitable organizations are an important way to help improve our communities. In "The Gospel of Wealth," Andrew Carnegie observed, "Those who would administer wisely must, indeed, be wise, for one of the serious obstacles to the improvement of our race is indiscriminate charity." Carnegie rarely, if ever, gave money directly to individuals. He invested in institutions that he believed would administer his gifts to the community "far better than it could or would have done for itself."

Carnegie gave away more than \$300 million in his lifetime. Much of this was done through gifts of appreciated securities.

You may not have Carnegie's resources, but if you think you might benefit from making a charitable donation, ask your tax professional or investment representative.

Tishomingo Board Taking Steps to Improve Town Financial Operations

The Board of Aldermen of the Town of Tishomingo took two actions in the January board meeting toward their ongoing goal of improving the day to day financial management of town business.

Bank Accounts Consolidated

The town has consolidated its more than sixteen bank accounts into one that will pay interest on any town funds in the account, according to Mayor James Tennyson.

The service was bid by the two local banks, explained Tennyson, and First American National Bank in Tishomingo bid the higher rate of 4.51 percent for the interest-paying checking account. The next highest interest rate bid was 4.18 percent bid by Bank of Mississippi, Tishomingo Branch, said Tennyson.

This will not only allow all the town banking to be simplified by utilizing one financial institution, but will pay interest on the taxpayers' money that stays in the bank, said Tennyson. The lack of regular reconciliation of each of the numerous bank accounts was one item identified as deficient in a recent audit.

New Policy for Claims Docket

The board also approved a new policy on expenditures and the claims docket procedure, said Tennyson. From now on, all invoices to the town for a particular month must be submitted before the end of that month to be considered for payment at the regular board meeting that routinely follows on the first Tuesday of the following month.

Fluoride in Water Cancelled

In other business at the January 6th meeting of the board of aldermen, the board voted to

discontinue use of fluoride in the drinking water.

The decision was made for cost reasons, officials explained.

The decision was supported by the state Department of Health, and most other local

water systems no longer provide fluoridated water, Tennyson said.

The cost per year for the supply of fluoride was about \$1,000 per year, in addition to the cost of maintenance, and the extensive regular testing fluoridation requires.

Census 2000 Chairman Appointed

The board appointed Jane Johnson committee chairman for Tishomingo's Municipal 2000 Census Correct committee. The committee will have more members later, and will be responsible for cooperating with the Census department to ensure an accurate count of Tishomingo in the 2000 census.

Falcon Franchise Fee Refused

In December, the board refused a request from Falcon Cable television to increase their franchise fee an additional 3 percent above the current 3 percent franchise fee. Though this would only be an additional cost of about \$10 per year per customer, the board felt any additional cost to the taxpayers was unwarranted.

Apparently the fee was allowed by the Federal Communications Commission, if the local client (the town in this case,) approved it. Many other local Falcon customers have also refused to allow the new fee, said Tennyson.

Also in December, the board voted to send the police officers to a free training seminar in Corinth about law enforcement procedures regarding gangs and cults.

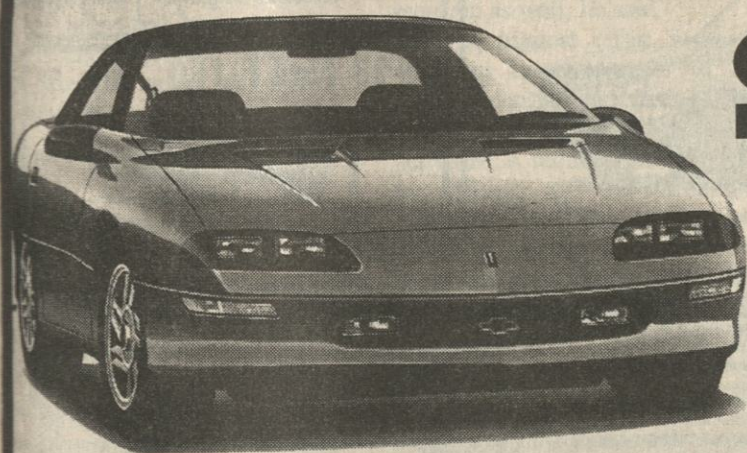

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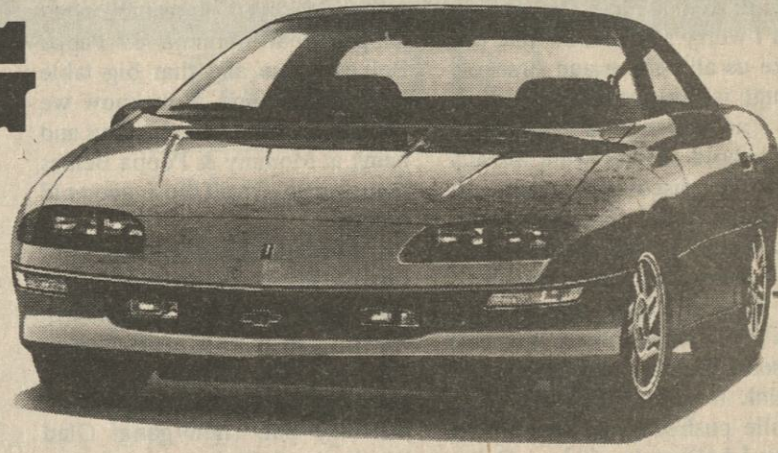

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Audit Providing Tishomingo With Road Map For Improvement In Business Management

A recently received audit of the Town of Tishomingo is providing city officials with some guidelines that will help bring the town's business practices into the next century.

The audit is for the fiscal year between October 1, 1995 and September 30, 1996 and was required, in accordance with state statute, because the town had a federal money source in excess of \$100,000 in the form of a grants and monies, explained Mayor James Tennyson. It was performed by David L. Nichols & Company, of Iuka.

In fact, the town has another audit pending at this time for the next fiscal year (96-97), since it has an outstanding loan balance to Rural Development (formerly Farmer's Home Administration) in excess of \$300,000.

"The audit shows our strengths, and weaknesses as a town," said Tennyson. "And it has come in at a good time, at the beginning of a new administration."

Though the audit doesn't show any amount of missing money, or anything frightening like that, it does reveal a significant lack of internal control structures when it comes to the day-to-day and month-to-month business transactions of the executive branch, which consists of the management structure, like the mayor, and town clerks.

During the audit period, the auditors found several discrepancies including the following:

- Town bank accounts, there were about sixteen at the time in various banks, were not reconciled to the penny every month.

- The Town does not maintain a general fixed asset ledger as required by state statute. Re-posting of the books by the auditor was necessary, and differences in the actual amounts that should have been in individual budgets varied by as much as \$29,000, for example, in the gas account. This was because expenses and revenues/deposits to the individual accounts were not properly recorded. This did not mean the money was lost or missing, it was just not in the

right place.

The actual words of the finding were "The Town exceeded and failed to timely amend its budget. Management should adhere to budgetary constraints and should timely amend its budget when appropriate."

"Keep in mind that government accounting is much more difficult than personal or even business accounting, due to the number of governmental regulations that you must follow," said Tennyson.

For example, state law requires that the board of aldermen must officially approve the ad valorem tax rolls each December, before the clerks start accepting payments. In December of 1995, the board did not authorize the ad valorem taxes prior to the collection of taxes.

State law also requires adherence to strict procurement procedures in accordance with the Mississippi Municipal Purchasing Guidelines. The guidelines require two competitive quotes for goods and services provided to the town if the estimated cost of the goods or service is less than \$1,500; for items between \$1,500 and \$5,000 two competitive written bids are required; and for contracts in excess of \$5,000 must be advertised and sealed bids accepted. The audit found that the procedures were not followed in every instance.

Some actions the administration is already taking to correct the situation (and save money) include the submission of a claims docket to the board of aldermen for approval at the monthly meeting, and regular adjustment of the budgeted vs. actual amounts each month as well, said Tennyson.

The various bank accounts have been consolidated into one account, and collection of \$6,000 in uncollected court fines and \$3,000 in uncollected utility bills is in process. More than \$1,000 in annual insurance costs has been eliminated by canceling overlapping liability coverage on some city vehicles. Procurement procedures have been amended as required as well, he said.

The biggest effort is being made in improvements to the internal control structures of the management of day-to-day activities. A requirement of this is to educate all the necessary personnel on what their jobs should be and how they should do them in accordance with any applicable state regulations.

"The day-to-day management falls to the executive branch [mayor, clerks], but we are not

just improving that area, but soliciting the opinions and input of the aldermen," said Tennyson.

"This is going to take the cooperation of the entire administration to get us up to par with other municipalities in the state," he said.

Valley Grove VFD Holds Damage to Minimum in Tuesday Fire

The residence of Tim Rosser at 852 County Road 993 suffered little damage in a fire that began shortly before 10:30 a.m. Tuesday, said Valley Grove Volunteer Fire Department Chief Jeff Daniel.

The fire was reported by neighbor and relative Kathy Rosser, and was thought to have been started by electrical causes. The attic suffered some damage, but the interior suffered only water damage, said Daniel.
