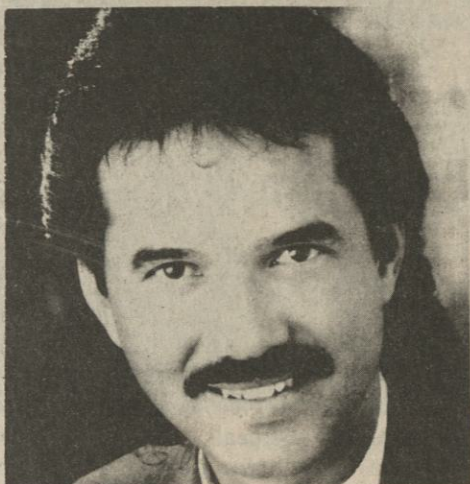

Genesco To Close Iuka Boot Plant

Genesco, Inc. announced plans Monday to exit the western boot business, resulting in the closure of the Laredo Boot plant in Iuka, officials said.

Ben T. Harris, president and chief executive officer of Genesco, based in Nashville, Tenn., said that the plant would be closed over the next several weeks.

Genesco opened its Iuka shoe manufacturing plant in 1955.

"We sincerely regret having

to make this decision because of the hardship it causes," Harris said. "The professionalism and dedication of our Iuka employees has been excellent in the face of greatly reduced demand in the western boot market."

Officials said that the Company would be working with county and state employment officials to gain whatever assistance is possible to help employees find other work. Area businesses also will be notified of the closing so

that Laredo employees may be considered for any openings they may have.

Each of the approximately 149 plant employees affected by the closing will soon meet with the Company's officials regarding their individual benefits.

Genesco, based in Nashville, markets and distributes branded footwear. The Company also operates the Volunteer Leather Company, a leather tanning and finishing business. Genesco's

owned and licensed footwear brands, sold through both wholesale and retail channels of distribution, include Johnston & Murphy, Dockers Footwear and Nautica Footwear. Genesco's products are sold at wholesale to more than 4,000 retailers, including the Company's own network of 576 footwear retail stores in the U.S., operated principally under the names Jarman, Journeys and Johnston & Murphy.

Shoe Factory to Close After 43 Years in Iuka

An announcement this week by Genesco, Inc. notified workers at the Tishomingo Shoe Company in Iuka that the plant will soon be closing permanently.

For many faithful employees, this will bring an end to their careers. For the city of Iuka and Tishomingo county, this signals the close of an era.

An article in the Oct. 6, 1955 *Vidette* announced the opening of a new factory in Iuka—a shoe manufacturing plant—which promised to bring wonderful employment opportunities for the people of the county. A 48,000 sq. ft. building, constructed as a result of a \$300,000 bond election in the First, Second and Third Districts of Tishomingo County, would house the new plant.

The articles over the next few weeks sang the praises of the facility which has come to be known over the years only as "the shoe factory."

The first plant superintendent, Brandon Edmondson, announced the company's plans to hire 50 men and women and produce at least 1,000 pairs of shoes

a day when operations got under way.

For many Tishomingo Countians, the plant did provide a very rewarding career for many years.

Since its opening 43 years ago, literally thousands of men and women from this county and surrounding areas have come and gone from the facility. There is probably not a single family in the area who has not had at least one family member who has worked at the shoe factory at one time or another.

For the majority of years, the plant manufactured casual and dress shoes. However about six years ago, the plant switched to boot manufacturing.

Tom Hollon, plant manager since 1981, said that in 1982 the plant was flourishing, employing about 625 people and producing about 7,200 pairs of shoes a day.

More recently, however, competition from foreign markets made it necessary for the change to boot manufacturing, according to Hollon.

"About six years ago, we began manufacturing boots for Laredo," Hollon said. "But with

the decrease in popularity of boots, the plant has been forced to downsize."

Hollon said that June of last year was the last drastic cutback of employees. Presently, only 150 workers remain at the plant. These workers, most of whom have many years of seniority, produce approximately 1,450 pairs of boots a day, Hollon said.

He explained that there have been many devoted employees who have remained at the facility for a long, long time. He said there is one employee who has been with the facility 42 years and several others who have 30 or more years of service.

"Obviously, these employees, as well as myself, are very sad about the closing," Hollon said. He explained that some of the management may have an opportunity to transfer to another Genesco owned facility, but the workers will not.

Genesco has not released the exact date when the Iuka plant will end operations; however, they estimate that it will be in the next several weeks.

Unemployment Rate Drops in State, Tish. County Ranked 50th

Mississippi's unemployment rate dropped to its lowest December figure since 1973 and the second-lowest December rate since monthly statistics began in 1970.

Tishomingo County ranked 50th within the state with an unemployment rate of 5.3 percent in December 1997, according to Jimmy Rowland, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service. This compares to 6.7 percent in November and 6.6 percent in December, 1996.

The civilian labor force for the county numbered 11,110, twenty more than November and 690 more than December one year ago. Approximately 10,520 Tishomingo county residents held jobs while 590 were unemployed.

Manufacturing jobs in the county numbered 4,310, one hundred ten more than November and 560 more than December of last year. Nonmanufacturing jobs numbered 3,280, ten more than November and 50 more than December, 1996.

According to the labor market information department of Mississippi Employment Security Commission (MESC), the state jobless rate is 4.1 percent—considerably lower than last December's 4.8 percent.

MESC labor market specialist attribute the low unemployment rate to holiday retail jobs. Total employment rose by 4,400 from November and increased more than 26,000 compared to December 1996.

Most counties registered moderate declines in unemployment from last month, but most agriculture areas rose in joblessness as harvest activities closed.

Layoffs and recalls caused some counties to deviate from the statewide trend. Forty-six counties posted rates of 5 percent or less, led by Lamar County at 1.5 percent.

Belmont Homes Merges With Cavalier Homes of Alabama

The new year has brought a change to Belmont Homes as the company has merged with Cavalier Homes of Alabama.

In a special New Year's Eve meeting of the two companies' stockholders the deal to merge the companies was overwhelmingly passed.

The value of the deal was \$76 million, according to reports from company officials.

Belmont Homes plant manager Keith Kennedy said the merger was something his father, Belmont Homes founder Jerold Kennedy, had been working on for a couple of years before his death in May of last year.

The deal received approval from the Federal Trade Commission in early October 1997 and from the Securities and Exchange Commission in early December, 1997 according to Cavalier's chief financial officer, Mike Murphy.

With the merger, Belmont Homes becomes a subsidiary of Cavalier, but will keep its headquarters in the town of Belmont.

Belmont Homes will retain two members on Cavalier's board of directors—Doug Jumper, former chairman of Belmont and its largest stockholder and Mike Kennedy, son of Belmont's

founder Jerold Kennedy and vice president of administration for Belmont.

Combined, the two companies operate 22 production facilities and in 1996 sold more than 25,000 single- and double-wide homes.

It is expected that there will be few changes in operations at Belmont Homes, with day-to-day operation remaining almost entirely the same, Keith Kennedy explained.

Probably the most significant change will be in the way homes are sold. Traditionally, Belmont has sold their homes through independent dealers, while Cavalier has sold mainly through independent exclusive dealers.

Kennedy said that one advantage for Belmont will be the access the company will have to marketing tools and the addition of factors such as in-house financing.

"We are really excited about the merger and all of the advantages it holds for both companies," Kennedy said. "Cavalier can offer us help in marketing, while we can assist them in home design and ways of manufacturing. This merger will certainly be beneficial to both organizations."

Home Economics Tips

Hot Water Settings

Because of safety concerns, most new water heaters are preset at 120 degrees F. This lower temperature settings protects young children, the elderly and other at-risk family members from the dangers of tap water scalding. This same concern for safety has prompted many owners of older water heaters to lower the temperature setting. Unfortunately, while lower water temperatures are indeed safer, the best cleaning results occur when the water heater is set at 140 degrees F. Because there may be times when it appears to be a trade off between safety and less effective cleaning results, here are some suggestions to maximize cleaning efficiency.

In the dishwasher, lower water temperatures affect the

detergent's ability to dissolve and activate. In addition, greasy food soils are more difficult to remove. Because the cycle times are set and the detergent dispensers hold a predetermined amount, additional detergent and increased wash time are not viable options to compensate for the effects of lower water temperature. Instead look for ways to keep the water temperature as high as possible. If the machine has water-heating options, be sure to use them. In addition, let the faucet nearest the sink run until the water is hot before starting the dishwasher. Avoid using hot water for other activities, such as laundry or showers, while the dishwasher is operating.

Because there is less residual heat in the dishwasher, a lower

water temperature may affect drying results. Utilize the "Heat Dry" options. Do not overload the dishwasher. Follow the appliance manufacturer's instructions for loading the dishes and utensils.

Hot Water And Your Dishwasher

Obtaining the best results from an automatic begins with the water that enters the appliance. Dishwasher detergent is designed to work best in hot (140 degrees F) water. Water that is hotter can lead to etching. Water that is cooler can cause hard water filming and poor cleaning results.

To check the water temperature, run water in the sink nearest the dishwasher until it's hot. Then use a candy thermometer to test the temperature of the running water. If the water temperature is too low, increase the water heater setting. Many newer dishwashers offer the option of heating the water in the dishwasher, which allows the house's main water heater to beset at a lower temperature. If the temperature is too high, lower the water heater setting and do not use the dishwasher's water heating option.

The hardness of the water will affect the amount of detergent to use. Water hardness can be determined in many ways. Check with the local utility or water company. If the hardness is 7 to 12 grains per gallon, use extra detergent. If water hardness is greater than 12 grains per gallon, consider installing a water softener.

A WEEKLY LOOK AT THE IUKA FIRE DEPARTMENT

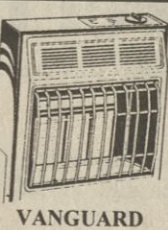
Recently, a firefighter went on an emergency medical call, followed by several onlookers who probably thought there was a fire. A policeman said later that he couldn't get to the scene to assist because of the traffic blockage. Of

course, in a case like this, an ambulance would have had the same trouble the policeman had.

When responding to a fire call, firefighters need to be able to proceed unhindered to the fire, and once there, they need room to stretch hoses, maneuver fire trucks into position, etc. Also, volunteers arriving after the fire truck need to be able to quickly gain admittance to the scene.

This is also true of car wrecks. Unless you are trained for such emergencies, the best thing you can do for the victim is to leave the scene, clearing the way for emergency vehicles and personnel.

We realize that most people are really concerned about the people involved in emergency situations, and that they just want to help. Please be aware that, in most cases, you're helping best when you stay out of the way.

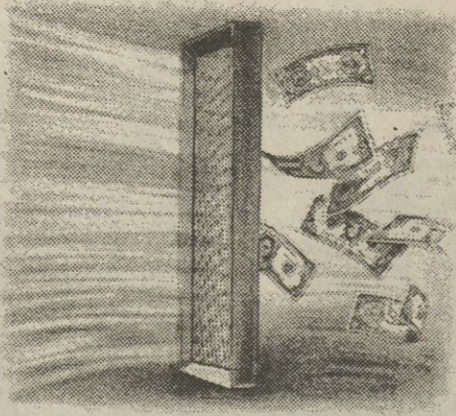

Report From Congress

Wicker Says IRS Changes Should Benefit Taxpayers

Just one day after President Clinton urged in his State of the Union address that the Senate pass Internal Revenue Service reform legislation, the new IRS Commissioner announced plans to restructure the agency to make it more "taxpayer friendly". This reorganization effort and the reform bill, already approved by the House of Representatives, offer immediate help for taxpayers, and that is a welcome development.

On January 28, IRS Commissioner Charles Rossotti announced his proposal to break the IRS into four separate operating units to serve taxpayers better. These major changes are a result of disturbing testimony last year before the Senate Finance Committee where current and former IRS employees presented evidence of widespread agency misconduct. Committee Chairman William Roth said the IRS "all too frequently acts as if it were above the law."

In presenting the plan at a Senate hearing, the Commissioner said the four divisions will allow the agency to offer "personal, helpful treatment" to taxpayer groups with similar needs. One unit will deal exclusively with individual taxpayers while another will handle only matters affecting businesses and the self-employed. A third division will serve large corporations and the fourth unit would work with pension plans and state and local governments. He also promised a greater emphasis on customer education

and service.

The Commissioner testified that the agency will shift the focus

from its own internal operations and "think about its job from the taxpayers' point of view." He said it was a "new day" at the IRS.

Another indication of our strong resolve to reform the IRS and make it more customer-oriented is the current legislative initiative before Congress.

The bill provides more

taxpayer protections and more accountability on agency. It establishes an oversight board, places the burden of proof on the IRS rather than taxpayer, and allows taxpayers sue the government for damages caused by the negligence of IRS employees.

There is still no consensus on the long-range of how to create a fairer, simpler tax system, but the issue remains one of my priorities. In meantime, the pending reorganization legislation and the proposed administrative action within agency should make the IRS more accountable in dealing with American taxpayer.

Multifocal Lenses

Standard, or normal, lenses provide a single vision correction. Bifocals can provide up to two optical powers for correcting distance and near vision in the same lens.

With straight top bifocals, one viewing area is separated from the other with a sharp line. The wearer has to contend with an image jump. The jump from near to distant viewing may cause adjustment problems for some wearers.

Trifocals afford the wear three distinct fields of vision: distance, intermediate, and near viewing. Adjusting to trifocals, however, may be difficult because the lens has two image jumps compared to a bifocal. the trifocal, too, may be considered unattractive because of the two visible lines across the lens.

There is also the progressive power lens that provides a full range of optical power, with a smooth transition from distance to intermediate to near viewing. There is no image jump and no lines.



Dog's First Heat

Dogs mature at a pace which is sometimes hard for humans to fully appreciate. The rule of thumb about a year of a dog's life being equal to six or seven human years goes out the window in talking about sexual maturation. The female puppy will come into "heat" or "season" as early as six months.

She can conceive during the first season so be extra careful never to let her out alone or come in contact with male dogs. The season will last for 2 or 3 weeks, and will occur twice a year.

One thing you can be sure of is that you will have visitors. The female odor is quite powerful in attracting male dogs. She should always be exercised on a leash, and all other times kept inside or closely confined. Don't rely on a three foot fence to do the job.

Of course, you may wish to have her spayed. The operation is best performed around six months of age. It will avoid the twice-yearly nuisance of her seasons and the possibility of unwanted puppies.

Beaver Control Seminar

There will be a beaver control seminar Thursday, February 12, 1998 at 6:30 p.m. at the City Hall in Belmont. Mr. Gary Law of the Animal Damage Control Unit of USDA/APHIS will be conducting the meeting. This program is designed for landowners as well as trappers. If you have beaver problems, this would be a good time to find out more information on their control.

Pecan Phylloxera

Did your pecan trees have knots or galls all over the leaves last year? This was caused by an insect called the pecan phylloxera. This is an insect that can seriously damage trees. Growers should begin a spray program in orchards where these insects have been found. Some pecan varieties are more susceptible to these pests than others. Timing is critical in controlling these pests. A spray schedule should be based on the development of the trees rather than the calendar. Application should be made at bud break and no later than one inch of new growth. Young crawlers need to

be killed after they hatch and before they enclose themselves within a gall. Any treatment applied after phylloxera are enclosed will not be effective. Several pesticides are available for control. Regardless of material used, adequate coverage is essential. Two applications may be necessary in some cases. Read labels before application.

The most important thing that a producer can do is to pick the proper variety for his operation. Factors such as maturity date, disease resistance and yield potential have to be considered. Let us know if we can help make the decision.

Included in this event will be the first ever BCIA Bull Sale held in this area, the annual replacement heifer sale, and a Northeast Ms. Angus Association Sale. Local Students To Attend Mississippi Science & Mathematics Tournament

Mississippi College in Clinton will become the center of academic competition on Thursday and Friday, February 5 and 6, as approximately 1500 of Mississippi's brightest students convene on campus for the 24th Annual Mississippi Science and Mathematics Tournament. Eight students from the local area will be among the participants. Those representing Tishomingo County High School will be: Brent Bonds, Adam Gray, Melissa Pounders,

Joey Beck, Justin Wilkins, Kelli King, Kristy O'Neal, and Miranda McGaughey.

Sponsored by the Departments of Biology, Chemistry, Physics and Mathematics and Computer Science at Mississippi College, the tournament recognizes students and their high schools for outstanding achievement in these fields of study. This year's competition is expected to draw students from more than 150 different public and private

schools throughout the state.

"There is more than just competition since a student can earn up to \$16,000 in academic scholarship to Mississippi College during the event. This is the oldest and largest science and mathematics competition in the state. During the twenty-three years of the tournament, more than 30,000 participants from 326 different high schools have taken part in the competition," said Dr. Jerry Cannon, professor of Chemistry at Mississippi College and Tournament coordinator.

The tournament features both individual and team competition. Individual participants take 45-minute written exams in math, biology, chemistry, physics and computer science. Each student is able to compete in two of the five areas. Students in the top one percent in each category receive a \$2,000 scholarship, while students in the top two percent receive a \$1500 scholarship and those placing in the top third percent receive \$1000 scholarships. Others placing in the top 10 percent and 20 percent of each division receive \$500 and \$300 per year, respectively. Each of the

scholarships is renewable provided the student maintains a high academic average after entering Mississippi College.

Team competitors will be vying for trophies, with teams divided into three divisions depending on the curriculum offered in science and math by the individual schools. Composed of four members each, teams compete in a quiz type format where questions are flashed on a screen and quick calculations and responses are required using only pencils and paper. Also during the afternoon, others from individual schools may compete in a computer programming event.

"It is really exciting to witness the enthusiasm and knowledge of these young students. Mississippi College is proud to be a leader in promoting academic competition so that students may win not only scholarships but also trophies for their schools," commented Cannon.

My Friend, My Hero, J.B. "Tobuck" King

Opening up a fresh can of coffee is a joy to the nose as well as the heart. It takes me back to the days when I was a stock boy at Piggly Wiggly. Ah, the aroma of various blends of coffee would fill the air as you walked down that aisle. On stock day you could pass by and smell fresh coffee as Mr. J.B. "Tobuck" King put it out on the shelf. I guess I have known Tobuck and his wife, Margaret, lovingly known to many of us as "Momma Dart". Most of my life, they have been a fixture in our community. From 1940 to 1958 he drove for Continental Trailways before going to work for Mr. Herman Gann. Tobuck worked for the Gann family for 35 years.

I can remember taking bottles to cash in back when you could get a nickel each. We would save bottles for a long time before we had enough to take in to Piggly Wiggly when it was in the current Fred's location in Elm shopping center. I remember Mr. King counting out the bottles and dividing the different sizes. He would then jot it all down on a

piece of paper and give us a total. He then gave us our bills and change. When the new store opened we went back to the check counter where Tobuck and Mrs. Helen Vaughn would be working the window. That was a fond boyhood memory.

I really got to know the Kings in church. Two of their children, Barbara Nell and Lucion had moved by that time. Their daughter, Sue, was here with her daughter, Pam. Pam was always doing things with her grandparents and moved in with them when Sue took a job in California while Pam was still at Northeast. She was a friend and we were in school and band together. She was a pretty girl with a big smile (even with braces!) I think she got that smile and friendly disposition honestly from her grandparents. Whenever there was a church youth activity, Mr. and Mrs. King were there. Tobuck was a deacon in the church where both the Kings were active.

I think Pam kept them young and in touch with people our age. She sure kept them hopping at an age when most folks wouldn't be able to. Even though they had five grandchildren of their own, I guess they were the adopted grandparents of our entire group in church and school. I felt I could always go to either of them if I ever needed to, I think they were like that to all the kids.

When I went to work at Piggly Wiggly at age 16, I got to know the business side of Tobuck. I remember him getting on to me for calling him "Mr. King" as I had always done prior to this. From now on, at the store anyway, it was "Tobuck". It was no nonsense when Tobuck was around. I guess he had worked full tilt giving 100% since he was old

enough to hold a job. He didn't abide in slackers! He shared Mr. Gann's philosophy of hard work for a day's pay. I guess that was from another era when folks wouldn't think of working any other way.

Tobuck drove a cream colored 1963 Ford Falcon to work every day and parked in the same place. I remember when they built a new building for what is now Superior Home Health, poor old Tobuck had to find a new parking spot. I bet he was made but never said a cross word about it. When you did get Tobuck riled up, Look Out! He pulled no punches when it came to what was expected of you. He despised cigarettes and I felt he thought smokers and slackers were one in the same cause they both wasted time.

I remember when a suggestion was made that all the male employees should wear ties

and button down collared shirts. There was an uproar with the stock boys and I among them was opposed to the idea. I remember Tobuck saying, "In my day you wore ties and button downs in a business like this. You worked with and for the customer and you looked the part and did as you were told! I'd have been fired in a heartbeat for griping, it just wasn't done!" We didn't get ties but always had collared shirts except when we got employee tee shirts. Tobuck didn't say anything about them but he looked mighty uncomfortable. Whether the shirt was too tight or he just didn't like it, he never really said. (and nobody was gonna ask either!).

I remember cold winter days of standing outside and loading groceries. I remember Tobuck brought me out a big cup of hot coffee on a few occasions or would come out and say, "Boys, come stand inside the door so you don't get sick!" I don't think I remember Tobuck missing a day while I was working there. He was sixty-five years old then but you would never know it. Though a little on the pudgy side he hustled like a man half his age. And like the energizer bunny he kept going and going and going! The same can be said for Mrs. Margaret. She worked till age 74 but Tobuck held off retirement until age 78.

I recall they remembered me

at graduation and sent cards while I was sick. I knew they were genuinely concerned. I'd see them in church when I came in from college and we'd try to stay caught up. I kept a scenic card at my desk at work where they were just sending me a note to say they were thinking of me and missed me. When I broke my back, Tobuck had recently had back surgery and told me, "You'll do fine, you're younger than me and you have young bones where all I have is old gristle!"

Last summer Tobuck and Mrs. Margaret traveled to visit daughters, Sue in California and Barbara Nell in Midway Georgia. Now with three children, five grandchildren and six great-grandchildren the Kings have been blessed with a wonderful family. Tobuck still suffers from back and other problems but tries to get out whenever possible. Some people you think will never get old then you miss seeing them as often. I call to check on Tobuck and Momma Dart occasionally but not near as much as I ought to. I went into Piggly Wiggly recently and passed down the coffee aisle and just closed my eyes a moment to remember a man who taught me the meaning of hard work and dedication. Tobuck can be described in two words...my HERO!

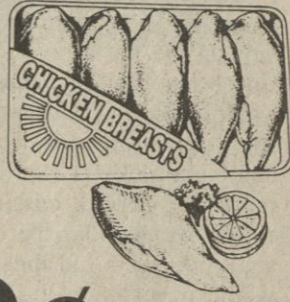

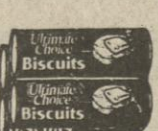

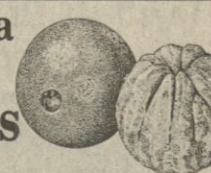

Bolton Gets Life In Shotgun Slaying

Despite expressions of sorrow and regret from his family members, Timothy Franklin Bolton was sentenced to life in prison Monday for the May 17 shooting death of Patra Eugene Robinson.

Robinson, 24, was killed by a single shotgun blast to the chest while he sat in his car outside the State Line One Stop liquor store on U.S. 72 in western Colbert County.

The Mississippi resident had assaulted the 36-year-old Bolton with a machete during an altercation at the same location earlier that day. Bolton, according to testimony, used racial slurs against Robinson and several friends before the assault occurred.

Bolton was indicted by a Colbert County grand jury on a capital murder charge but on January 19 after four hours of

deliberations, the jury hearing the case found Bolton guilty of the lesser charge of intentional murder.

The jury reportedly was 11-1 in favor of convicting Bolton of capital murder but later agreed to convict him on the lesser charge rather than letting the case end in a mistrial.

During a sentencing hearing Monday in front of presiding Circuit Judge Inge Johnson, Bolton's older sister, father and wife sought mercy from the judge.

Betty Johnson explained that both families have suffered losses as a result of the incident, which a representative of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People called a hate crime.

"I'm sorry on behalf of the Bolton family, but what's done is done," said Bolton's father, Billy Bolton. "I ask the court to have mercy."

Bolton's wife, Patricia,

tearfully asked the judge to consider the couple's two sons, who attended their father's sentencing hearing.

Bolton himself appeared in court wearing an orange jail-issue jumpsuit, a result of the judge's post-trial decision to place him in jail until his sentencing.

While he did not address the court himself, Bolton expressed his regrets through his attorney, Don Holt of Florence.

"It was something that got going and didn't stop," Holt said, describing the events of May 17.

Holt had asked for a 20-year sentence while District Attorney Gary Alverson sought the maximum sentence available, which in his words would send a message that this type of crime would not be tolerated in Colbert County.

"I think this was a hate crime," Alverson said. "It certainly started out as a hate

crime."

In the end, Johnson sentenced Bolton to life in prison and ordered him to pay the victim's family \$5,230 in restitution, most of which involved funeral expenses.

"I don't get any pleasure out of telling you this today," Johnson said to Bolton. "I wish I didn't have to do this sort of thing. I wish this case had never happened."

The judge went further, saying she could not believe this type of crime could occur in the United States in the 1990s.

Johnson told Bolton she believes he is an alcoholic and advised him to seek treatment for his problem while he is in prison. According to testimony, Bolton had drank four cans of beer the morning the incident occurred.

"You'll get out (of prison) and you're going to be around people who drink and people of other races," she advised Bolton. "You better not ever do anything

like this ever again."

Robinson's mother, Wanda

Southward, found it hard to express her feelings after the sentencing hearing.

Surrounded by a large group of friends and family members, Southward said she is pleased with the sentence but added that "life should be life" in prison.

She and other family members thanked the district attorney's office for its work on the case. Southward added that Johnson's decision gave her renewed faith in the judicial system.

"But it isn't going to bring back my baby," she said.

Sam Pendleton, president of the Tri-County branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, accompanied the family at the hearing. He said a report on the crime will be sent to the Southern Poverty Law Center, which monitors hate crimes nationwide.

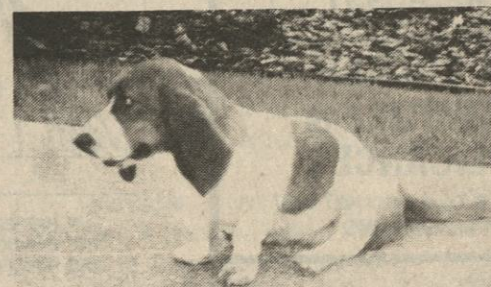
"The NAACP is very pleased

with the decision of the jury, with Gary Alverson and Judge Johnson," Pendleton said. "They have sent a message and hopefully people will get the message that hate crimes will not continue in Colbert County and other areas."

Female cats can be spayed (ovariohysterectomy) when they reach at least 2 1/2 pounds of weight. This is before they come into heat.

Female dogs need to be spayed (ovariohysterectomy) before 6 months of age. Some dogs will begin their heat cycle at 6 months of age.

Male cats need to be neutered (castrated) as early as 7 months of age.

Male dogs can be neutered (castrated) as early as 6 months of age.

Remember these ages are the earliest dogs and cats need to be neutered (castrated or ovariohysterectomy). After these ages surgery can be performed at anytime or ask your veterinarian what is best for your cat or dog.

Farm Bureau Commemorates Food Check-Out Day...

Food in America is affordable. In fact, between January 1 and February 9, the average American will have earned enough income to pay for his or her family's entire 1998 food supply, according to the Tishomingo County Farm Bureau.

As a result, the Tishomingo County Farm Bureau is celebrating February 9 as Farm Bureau's second annual Food Check-Out Day. Last year, Food Check-out Day fell on February 10.

According to the latest statistics compiled by the United States Department of Agriculture's Economic Research Service, American families and individuals spend, on average, 10.9 percent of their disposable personal income for food. That means the average household will have earned enough disposable income - that portion of income available for spending or saving - to pay for the annual food supply in just 40 days.

"The early occurrence of this date is noteworthy," said Kay Perkins, County Women's Chairman. "It speaks well of our nation's increasing standard of living, which would certainly be reduced without the affordable, domestic food supply produced by AMERICA'S FARMERS AND RANCHERS."

To mark the occasion, the Tishomingo County Farm Bureau will be donating food and/or supplies to the Ronald McDonald House in Jackson. The Ronald McDonald House provides a "home-away-from home" for the families of seriously ill children receiving medical treatment in Mississippi. The food will be used to help feed visiting families staying at the house.

In comparison to Food Check-Out Day, Tax Freedom Day, the day the average American had earned enough money to pay federal, state, and local taxes, was May 9 last year, according to the Tax Foundation.

"I find it amazing that people can pay for their yearly food supply three months earlier than it would take them to satisfy their

tax burden," Perkins said. "Rather than being an economic burden, food remains quite a bargain for shoppers. That's the way it should be."

Perkins hopes Americans will come to understand that affordable food is "a product of our successful food production and distribution system."

"This day should hold meaning for most Americans," she said. "As food producers, we are concerned that some Americans cannot afford to buy the food they need, but we are proud of the part Mississippi farmers play in making our food supply more affordable for all."

The percent of disposable personal income spent for food has declined over the last 25 years. In 1970, Food Check-Out Day would have been 11 days later - February 20. Food is more affordable today due to a widening gap between growth in per-capita incomes and the amount of money spent for food, according to USDA.

This overall decrease is made more notable by the fact that trends indicate Americans are buying more expensive convenience food items for preparation at home, as well as more food away from home.

The Agriculture Department's latest statistic, compiled for 1996, includes food and non-alcoholic beverages consumed at home and away from home. This includes food purchases from grocery stores and other retail outlets, including food purchases with food stamps and vouchers for the Women, Infants and Children's (WIC) program. The statistic also includes away-from-home meals and snacks purchased by families and individuals, as well as food furnished to employees.

"Food Check-Out Day tracks the amount of income needed by Americans to purchase food on an annual basis," Perkins said. "It should be useful over time to measure fluctuations in the affordability of food."

New Mississippi Tour Guide Now Available

The first annual Mississippi Tour Guide gives tourists a new resource to the sites and happenings in the Magnolia State. The guide, available to visitors at the 11 Welcome Centers strategically located throughout the state, provides essential information for travelers.

The Mississippi Tourism Association (MTA) produced the hand, 88-page, four-color, pocket-size book. Half a million guides - free to the public - were printed for distribution in 1998.

The guide offers a strong starting point for visitors to Mississippi. For convenience, the book is divided by distinct regions - the Delta, Heartland, Hills, River Cities and Coast. Each section lists cities by attractions, special events

and outdoor recreation activities. Hotels and restaurants that are members of MTA are listed as well.

The guide was published as a private venture by MTA. Advertising revenue was the source of income needed to finance the book.

"The tourism industry supported the Mississippi Tour Guide with their advertising, demonstrating that this guide was a needed product," Darlene Wilson, Executive Director of the MTA said.

The mission of the MTA, the voice of the Mississippi Tourism and Hospitality Industry, is to promote and advocate tourism, to educate the public and to provide services to its members that will result in increased economic vitality and a positive image for the state.

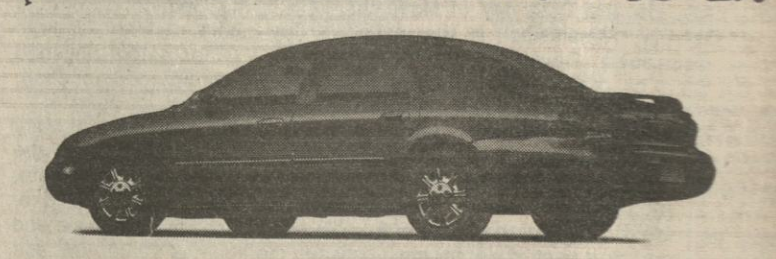
