1989 Nissan Pickup Occupied By Deonna and Joshua Jacobsen

5-Year-Old Killed In Early Morning Accident

A Monday morning accident near Midway has brought tragedy with the death of a young Belmont resident.

Five-year-old Joshua Jacobsen of Belmont was killed Monday at approximately 8:30 a.m. in an automobile accident on Miss. Hwy. 25, according to Mississippi Highway Patrolman Ralph Montgomery.

Apparently, Joshua was a passenger in a 1989 Nissan pickup truck driven by his mother, Deonna Jacobsen, 30. They were traveling north on Hwy. 25 when a Prentiss County dump truck, driven by Jimmy C. Wren, 58, of Biltz, attempted to make a left hand turn onto the highway from Rock Crusher Road (CR 957).

The patrolman explained that the vehicles' point of impact was in the northbound lane.

Joshua James Jacobsen, 5, of Belmont, died Monday, Feb. 16, 1998 as the result of injuries received in an automobile accident.

Services were at 10 a.m. Wednesday, Feb. 18, 1998 at Calvary Baptist Church in Belmont with the Rev. Ray Kirk officiating. Burial was in Dennis Memory Gardens. Deaton Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Survivors include his mother, Deonna Jacobsen of Tishomingo; his father, Greg Jacobsen of Dennis; his grandparents, E.E. Jacobsen of Brookhaven, Holley McNeley, Dan McNeley and John Hoerter, all of Dallas, Texas; and great-grandmother, Mildred Jacobsen of Brookhaven.

Pallbearers were Sparky Bailey, Chris Faulkner, Ricky Stidham and Steven Webb.

Tishomingo County "Create" Task Force Meeting Held

The Tishomingo County Task Force, working with data gathered by the Commission on the Future of Northeast Mississippi, met recently in a "State of the County" meeting to establish five year goals for the future of Tishomingo County. The Task Force was sponsored by Create Foundation and funded with a grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission.

The task force Co-chaired by Martha Segars and Ted Day, appointed committee chairs which in turn established their committees and worked toward specific goals:

PUBLIC SAFETY:

Chairman David Smith, along with Neil Edmondson, Bobby Flynt and Rodney Pannell, established the goals to 1-increase the intensity of the "War on Drugs" through increased cooperation between citizens and local, state, and federal agencies. 2-organize and support a neighborhood watch program for elderly and shut-ins throughout Tishomingo County with the aid of the Sheriff's department and the local police and fire departments. 3-to encourage and motivate County Government to supply proper funding to supply the proper protection with advanced training and modern equipment. 4-to provide assistance to victims of crimes.

INFRASTRUCTURE:

Chairman Eugene Bishop, along with Dale Price, Robert Grisham, Arlie South, and Leon Cook, established the following goals: 1-to improve and market the Northeast Mississippi Waterway Industrial Park, by constructing a barge terminal notch and construct a railroad spur into the Park. 2-continue with

expansion projects of the Yellow Creek State Inland Port to increase tonnage. 3-work to obtain funds for county bridge replacements. 4-encourage the Mississippi Department of Economic and Community Development to provide funding to make necessary road improvements to the Tri-State Commerce Park. 5-apply for grants to build, upgrade, improve and maintain roads for industrial parks in the county. 6-seek support for additional four lane highways and provide turn lanes where needed. 7-to continue to improve Indian Creek water flow to prevent flooding in Iuka. 8- hold electric rates below national average, and continue to upgrade distribution circuits to the industrial parks. 9-explore the possibilities of a central utility district to provide water, sewer, gas, etc. 10- monitor the growth and expand the services to meet the demands of trash collection and disposal.

HEALTH COMMITTEE:

Chairperson Cheryl Clark, along with Edna Earl Cook, Joan Jones, and Essie Conway, established the goals to reduce the low birthweight index, high infant mortality and low percent prenatal care/first trimester among child bearing population. They plan to do this by educating the public on the issues of: improved nutrition, decreased smoking, decreased drug and alcohol use, increase public awareness of STD's, and decrease teen pregnancy. The committee plans to prepare a "display" for each medical clinic regarding programs available to women and children with the Public Health Department. Host

New Resort Lodge Now Under Construction At J.P. Coleman St. Park

By this time next year, visitors at J.P. Coleman State Park, near Iuka, will be able to stay in a room at the park's new resort lodge or hold meetings in the new convention center, according to a park official.

Renovation of the park's existing lodge is presently underway at the park and construction of two new buildings is slated to begin in the near future, according to Park Manager Glenn Ray Harris.

The new facility, which will overlook Indian Creek/Pickwick Lake, will contain approximately 18,000 sq. ft. of heated space when completed, according to job superintendent Dana Posey of Johnson Contractors, Inc., general contractors of the project.

The three-story existing building will be renovated to include four hotel rooms on the top floor. The middle and lower levels will be constructed as three townhouses.

"The townhouses will have bedrooms downstairs and a kitchen on the middle level," Harris stated. "The hotel rooms will each have two queen-size beds, color televisions with cable, a phone and a kitchenette."

The two new buildings will be constructed to the north of the existing building. Nearest to this

building will be a two-story structure containing 19 hotel rooms with the same amenities as those in the existing building. Two handicap accessible rooms will be located in this building, according to Harris.

The third structure will be a one-story building containing a 200 capacity meeting room, along with banquet/kitchen services, park offices and public restrooms.

While no official plans have been made for a restaurant at the facility, Harris explained that there is a possibility that buffet style meals may be served on Saturdays and Sundays once the facility is completed.

According to Posey, construction at the site is scheduled to be completed by December 31, 1998 or possibly earlier, if the weather cooperates. Harris said he anticipates use of the facility soon after that time.

"We hope to kick off operations in early 1999," Harris said. "We will have meeting rooms where we will be able to host wedding receptions, reunions, meetings and various types of parties. Our county needs a facility to accommodate large gatherings such as this."

"Too often, in the past, we have lost many gatherings to facilities in the Tennessee area because we didn't have a place

which would hold enough people," Harris continued. "Hopefully, that will no longer be a problem when this facility is complete."

Money for the project was approved during the 1996 legislative session under House Bill no. 1673, according to Harris.

Costs for repair, renovation and new construction at the site are estimated to be \$2.2 million, Harris said. Another \$200,000 will be used to furnish the facility.

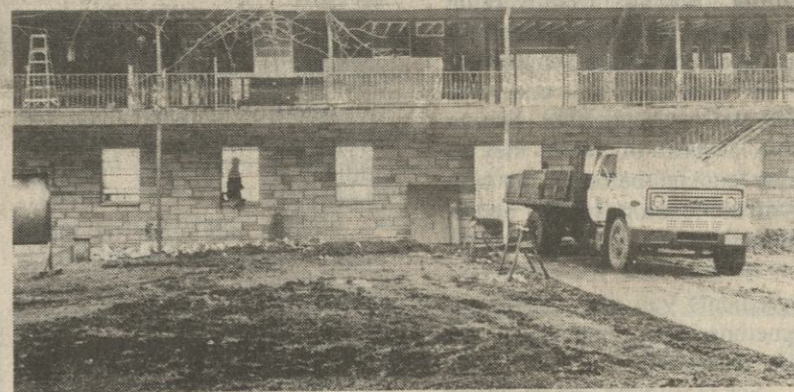
Harris explained that the state's 27 parks divided approximately \$40 million for projects. This gave J.P. Coleman Park just over \$5 million to make improvements or for new construction. The money for the

resort lodge is coming out of this money, he said.

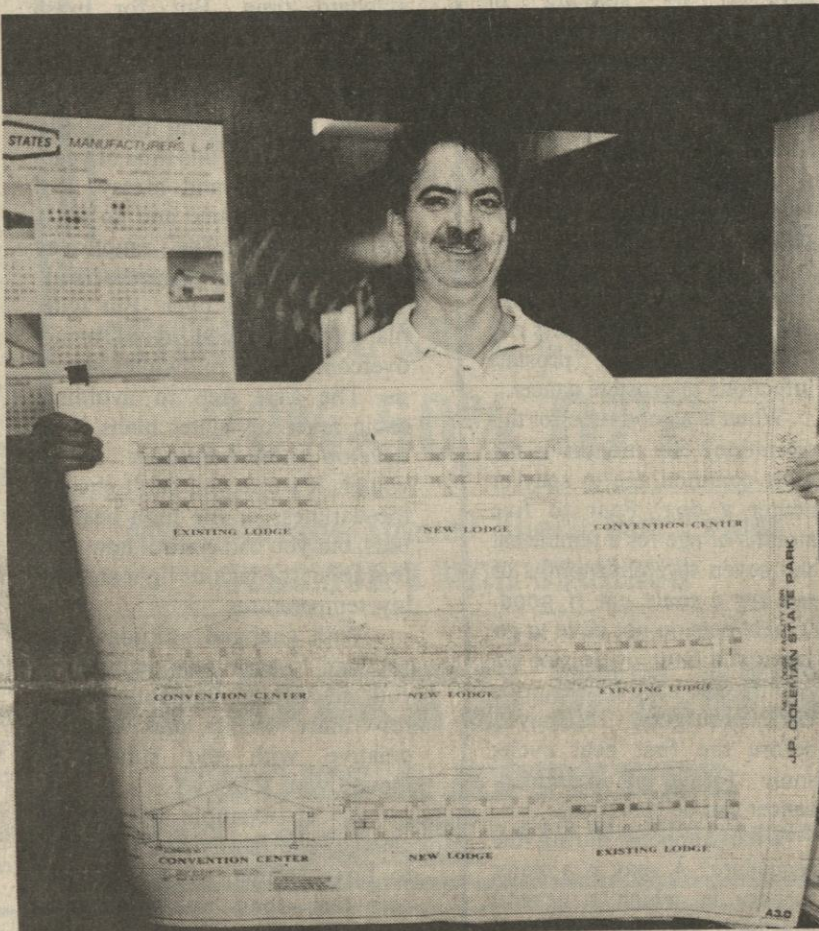
Several other improvements have been made to the park with monies appropriated through this bill, Harris said.

"We have already used some of the money for several infrastructure improvements at the park," Harris said. "We have put in a treatment plant, paved roads, upgraded our campground, ran new electric and water lines, built a new dock, added 14 new boat slips and built the rock part of the breaker wall. We also hope to have a pump-out station for the marina completed by spring."

Accommodations at the park presently include 20 cabins, Harris confirmed. The new lodge will bring that total to 46.

Economic Condition Of County Continues To Look Good, Despite Plant Closings

The recent announcements of plant closings in Tishomingo County have dealt a severe blow to many workers. These shut-downs will effect the workers, their families, and the businesses of Tishomingo County as many family incomes are cut sharply by these losses of weekly pay checks.

The over-all economic picture for Tishomingo County has looked brighter in recent years and the Tishomingo County Development Foundation is optimistic about the continued climb of the county's progress, inspite of the recent closings.

Figures released recently concerning the employment and unemployment of Tishomingo County shows a good, steady work force in the county. According to the December, 1997 employment figures, Tishomingo county had 580 more people employed than during peak employment in 1993 when NASA was present. Employment at that time was 9,940. In December of '97 the employment report showed 10,520 Tishomingo Countians working, an unemployment rate of 5.3%.

No doubt, unemployment figures are expected to rise in the coming months when more laid-off workers

from these shut-down plants are reflected in the statistics. However, the Development Foundation is working to fill these voids and put people back to work as soon as possible.

Since the announcement of the closing of the Tishomingo Shoe Company, the company is working diligently with the Development Foundation to find another boot manufacturer to occupy the building. If this is unsuccessful, then another industry will be recruited for the building.

Also, the recent announcements of new plants and expansions of existing industries in the county should provide more jobs than the total unemployment figures (590) shown in December. Encouraging to the perspective work force is the announcement of the opening of 250 jobs for the Belmont Bauhaus plant; an additional 35 job openings at the Iuka Bauhaus plant; a proposed 300 new jobs at the Wild Rose plant; 35 additional job openings at the Schadig plant; and 30 to be employed at Ferrous Metals.

The pending announcements of several plants considering locating at the Tri-State Commerce Park

(old NASA site at Yellow Creek) is also an indication that many new jobs for the area could come in the near future.

Another evidence of the improvements in the county's economy in recent years is reflected in the per capita income figures. In 1990 the per capita income was \$8,884.00. In December, 1997, per capita income stood at \$14,937.00. This is a \$6,000 increase in pay for the average worker in the county - a good indicator of the upward trend in economic conditions Tishomingo County has experienced.

So, despite the shock and sadness of the recent closings, the future of Tishomingo County continues to look bright. But to continue this upward trend and hope of a brighter future, people need to realize that one of the factors new industry looks for in a community is unity. A unity which is evident in both the rough times and the prosperous times. A unity among the people, working together for the betterment of Tishomingo County - working together with our elected officials and our Development Foundation to promote Tishomingo County as it deserves to be promoted.

Spaying/Neutering Pets
What is a spay? A spay (ovariohysterectomy) is an operation to remove the ovaries and uterus from a female dog or cat. This is a permanent form of birth control for female pets. Once a pet is spayed, heat cycles and pregnancy can no longer occur.

What is a neuter? Neutering (castration) is the surgical removal of both testicles of male dogs or cats. It is the primary method of sterilizing male pets.

Should I have my pet spayed or neutered? Mating instincts of unneutered pets are very strong. You may be responsible for unwanted litters if your pet is given freedom to wander. Pet overpopulation is the number one reason millions of animals are euthanized each year. Spaying and neutering can help control the pet population and reduce the numbers of animals that are abandoned or must be destroyed.

There are certain health benefits to spaying or neutering your pet. An unspayed female may develop infections of the uterus or mammary (breast) cancer. Mammary cancer affects nearly on in ten female pets who are not spayed, but it is rare in spayed females.

A neutered male is less likely to roam and fight other animals. There is also less risk of developing prostate infections or prostate cancer.

When is a good time for this operation? Six months is the most common age to spay or neuter a dog. Four to five months of age for a female cat and seven to eight months of age for a male cat if good. Female pets do not have to go through a heat cycle not do they need to have a litter prior to the surgery. If spayed before the first heat cycle, some forms of mammary cancer can be prevented.

What happens during the procedure? A spay is a major surgery in which a general anesthetic and sterile surgical technique is used. There may be mild discomfort for one or two days after the surgery; however, most pets will recover quickly.

Neutering also involves the use of general anesthetic and sterile surgical techniques, and recovery is usually uneventful.

Is the surgery dangerous? Although there is always risk in any anesthetic or surgical procedure, the risk is extremely low on a young, healthy pet. Higher risks certainly occur in the older patient if infection or cancer exist.

Will this change my pet's personality? Sexually altered pets become more docile, affectionate and responsive to obedience training.

In males, the sex hormone testosterone increases aggressive behavior. The lower level of testosterone following the neutering procedure will reduce the pet's aggressive tendencies toward other animals.

Home Economics Tips

Overcome The Mid-Winter Blahs

The midwinter blahs are as inevitable as spring fever, but not nearly as much fun. For some people, the blahs hit with the first frost or on the first day of early darkness after the fall return to standard time. But for most people, the blahs strike in March after three months of winter and winter storm pending.

It's not surprising that people have a letdown at this time of year. It's dark, cold and messy. It's harder to get around and go for a walk outside. The emotional build-up that started with Thanksgiving is over. But with planning, you can avoid being overcome by the midwinter blahs.

The first step to avoiding cabin fever or winter blahs is to develop new attitudes about winter. It's true you can't change the darkness or the high heating bills, but you can control how you feel about the lack of light and the low temperatures.

With changed attitudes, it's not hard to plan new activities - you can develop high anticipation for future events and can be creative with the substances around you.

As an example of attitude change, one family had a "Learn to Love Winter" party. All the activities, food and beverages focused on people keeping warm and having fun in the winter. They planned an afternoon of outdoor games for kids and adults and indoor activities such as frying doughnuts, pulling taffy and playing games.

For drinks, they served Russian tea, mulled cider and cocoa. The supper highlighted foods to keep your hands warm - corn on the cob and baked chicken legs - and food to warm your gut - hot chili and fresh-from-the-oven corn bread. Even the dessert - flaming plum pudding - was hot.

Your own attitudes about darkness and cold might be more positive if you could plan a spur-of-the-moment neighborhood party with a bonfire. Just putting up a bird feeding station could help you change your feelings about winter.

Once people start feeding birds, they often get interested in building feeders, providing an assortment of food, watching the territorial actions of various birds and identifying different species.

Another way to lessen the effects of winter blahs is to get involved in group activities. For some, this may mean trading child care with another parent for a half

a day so you can get out of the house. For others, it may be getting involved in church activities, volunteer work, 4-H meetings or extension homemaker groups. In the dead of winter, it's important to have something to look forward to.

Start planning early for any reason to have a party. Figure out who you'll invite to your party, what food or beverage you'll serve, how you'll decorate, and what games or activities you'll have for entertainment.

Some people look forward to winter. They anticipate brisk weather, picturesque snow scenes, sun gleaming off icicles, and winter sports. Look around and find beauty in even the darkest of days. Try photographing or painting the stark oak trees against the dark clouds or catch the last rays of the sun setting over a wintry landscape.

Winter is a good time for indoor hobbies. Don't forget reading, sewing, woodworking and horticulture. The cold months are a good time to learn a new skill or to hone an old one. For example, some families like to serve a meal of foods they've never cooked before. This plan involves reading recipe books, planning a menu, shopping for

ingredients you don't have, and sometimes even planning a special table setting.

For those who like to garden indoors, winter is a good time to try new bulbs or start vegetables from seeds.

Almost everyone gets a case of winter blahs. So, when they hit, realize you're not alone. And the best way to get over them is to plan ahead and think positively. Before you let the blues get you

down, get active, get involved with other people and plan interesting, creative activities so that you have something to anticipate.

A Reminder About Crop Insurance Sales Closing Dates

The closing dates for 1998 crop insurance is February 28, 1998 for cotton, soybeans, corn, peanuts, rice, blueberries, grapes, peaches and grain sorghum and September 30, 1998 for wheat. Sales closing dates are significant because signing up for insurance providers, must be done prior to the announced day.

For most producers, obtaining crop insurance is essential to building a comprehensive risk management plan. Producers should make it a point to consider all their crop insurance options, while there is still time to sign up.

To ensure that all producers are served, insurance companies are required to insure all eligible crops, and provide all levels of coverage in the states in which they operate. Producers are encouraged to contact their agent for assistance during this period of transition.

Waivers of administrative fees for producers who qualify as limited resource farmers are available from all crop insurance companies. Private agents are willing and prepared to assist those qualifying producers with determining eligibility for waivers. A listing of crop insurance agents may be found in all local Farm Service Agency offices.

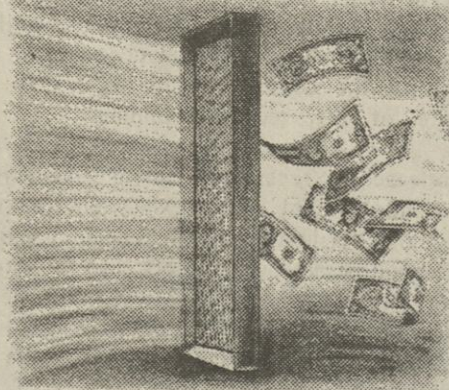

Old Tishomingo Traces

Dutch Coleman was a fire-and-brimstone preacher from the Tupelo area. He was also a talented signer and guitar picker, who could be heard on Radio Station WELO in Tupelo, Mississippi back in the 1940's and 50's. My mother looked forward to Saturdays when she could sit by our battery-operated, Silvertone radio and listen to the many singers and preachers who used the airways to spread the gospel. Brother Dutch was quite a "star" to our family back in Happy Hollow. He was heard on the same radio station as the Lone Ranger and Tonto, so he rated up there with the best! He certainly was not someone we expected to see in our part of Tishomingo County.

On an ordinary weekday back in 1944 mother had just about finished washing down at the creek (Cole's Mill), and my sister Florine and I had hung the clothes on the barb wire fence that surrounded our pasture. My youngest brother Ronnie came running down the path through our hog lot to tell mother that Papa had returned from Iuka, and Brother Dutch Coleman was with him. Brother Dutch had been preaching in Jay Bird Park, and Papa had stepped up to shake hands with him. They conversed for awhile when Papa saw Mr. Jim McDuffy whom he had hitched a ride to Iuka with. Being congenial Papa asked Brother Dutch to come visit sometime. Dutch said, "I believe I'll go home with you now, Brother Bullard."

When Mother heard the news, she looked at Florine and with desperation in her voice said, "Today of all days we need a visitor! The beds are not made, breakfast dishes are waiting to be washed, and the good Lord only knows what I'll cook for supper." After the dirty water was emptied and the tubs rinsed, we started up the hill to the house to meet our visitor.

Dutch Coleman was dressed in a navy blue suit with a white shirt and red, white and blue striped necktie. He was quite a contrast to mother and the rest of us. Mother's blue patched dress and once white apron were streaked with mud. Perspiration dripped from wisps of hair which hung down over her forehead. She was embarrassed about her predicament, but she extended a friendly hand to our visitor as she pushed her damp hair back from her face with her left hand. She gave Papa a "how could you do this?" look as she went to build a fire in the wood cook stove in the kitchen.

Mother and Florine prepared a delicious supper of hot biscuits, fried fat back with gravy, green beans and a cobbler made from a half gallon jar of home-canned peaches. After everyone finished eating, Mother and Florine cleared the table and washed the dishes, while the men retired to the front room to talk with our visitor. After the kitchen was cleaned, Mother put sheets on the beds and turned the covers back for bedtime.

By now Dutch's supper was digested and he was in a singing and preaching mood. Everyone, especially Mother and Florine, was ready for bed, but he was just getting wound up. Papa wouldn't let anyone go to bed because he

thought that would be impolite to our visitor. After we listened wearily to several hours of singing and fiery preaching, Papa was about to get religion. Dutch said, "Brother Bullard, kneel with me and I'll pray for you." Papa demanded that we all get down on our knees. I had never done that before strangers so I hesitated in a state of embarrassment. Papa said forcefully, "Billie June, get down on your knees!" I finally knelt rather reluctantly, and by the time Dutch finished his long prayer, I felt like I had been glued to the bare wood floor. Papa cried and wiped tears. I was really scared because this was a strange and new experience for me.

Brother Dutch Coleman stayed several days with us. Papa was getting restless because he didn't seem to have any intention of leaving, and it was also putting Papa under strain because to impress the preacher, he pretended to be better than he really was. Since the well was dry, water had to be hauled from the creek. Florine heated the water on the cook stove and filled the wash tub for Dutch's bath each morning, while he headed to the bushes with Bible in hand. About the third or fourth morning after preparing his bath, Florine told Mother that she was going to put hot pepper in his water. Of course, she didn't, but that statement expressed her feelings about all the extra work our uninvited guest was creating for the family.

After the fifth night Brother Dutch had been with us, it started to rain. The next morning Papa told him if the creek kept rising, water would soon be over the road and he would be trapped until the water receded. This didn't faze Brother Dutch. It was about fifteen

miles to Iuka and that was a long way for him to walk. Papa was getting ready to tell him to leave when he saw Arthur Dill, who had married his niece, Gladys Bullard, coming down the hill in his car. He ran out and flagged him down. Papa, in his aggravation over the unwanted visitor's reluctance to leave, had just about lost his newly-found religion. He told Arthur, "I'll give you five dollars to take that s.o.b. to Iuka!" Arthur agreed. Papa rushed back to the house to tell Brother Dutch that he had a ride into town. He looked surprised, but said nothing as he

gathered up his Bible and guitar. We never saw him again. Mother listened to the Saturday preaching and occasionally heard him sing, "Precious Memories."

Assistant Fire Chief Brian R. Grissom would like to urge everyone to be extra careful while burning anything outdoors. The next two months are likely to be

If you are burning any of these and the fire seems to be out of control, call 911. Do not wait until you are sure it's out of control. The fire department would rather respond to unintentional false-alarms than fires that have been allowed to

rage unhindered, placing people and property at risk.

People living within the city limits of Iuka still have the option of having the Street Department come by and pick up piles of yard debris, but it must be placed beside the street. If anyone has a pile they would like to have picked up, they should call 423-9879 or 423-3781.

401(k)

Some things can't be repeated too often - for example, don't let the IRS take a double dip from your 401(k) plan distributions.

How you decide to receive your 401(k) money has significant tax consequences. If your distributions are too early, too late or too small, you may owe penalty taxes on top of ordinary income taxes. Here are some suggestions to help you avoid penalties.

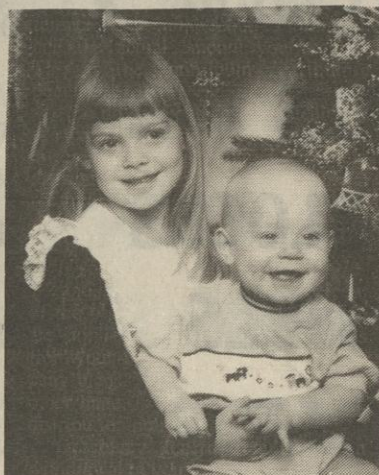
Too Early: Generally, before age 59-1/2, distributions from your 401(k) are subject to a 10 percent penalty tax in addition to regular income taxes. This is the "early withdrawal penalty."

There are exceptions to this rule, however. For example, if you're 55 or older in the year you retire, you can begin taking distributions without paying a penalty. If you leave your job, you may begin receiving "substantially equal period payments" regardless of your age, and you will not owe the extra penalty. Once you start, however, you must continue receiving the payments until age 59-1/2, or for five years, whichever is longer.

Too Late or Too Little: When you reach age 70-1/2, you must begin receiving a minimum amount from your retirement accounts each year, based on

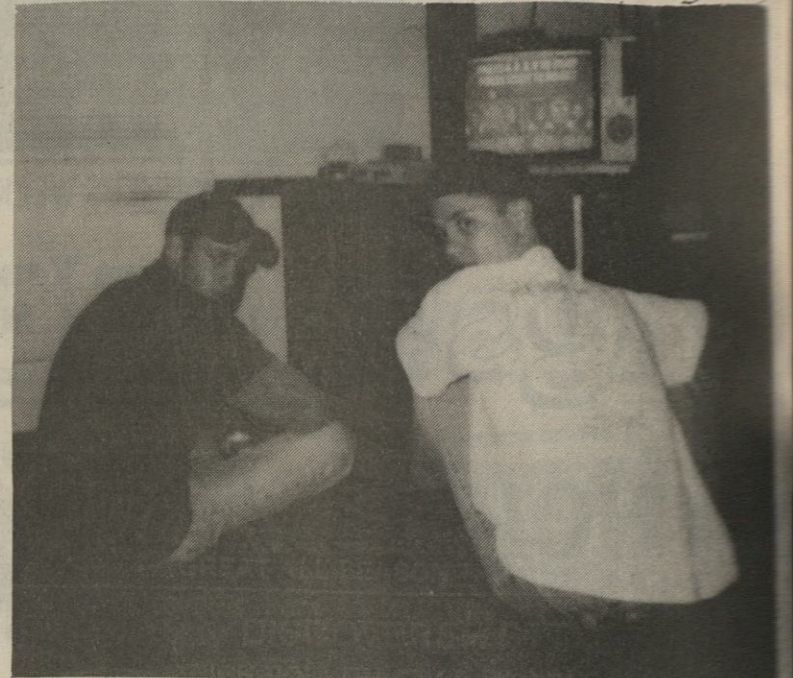

Internet Training Scheduled At NEMCC

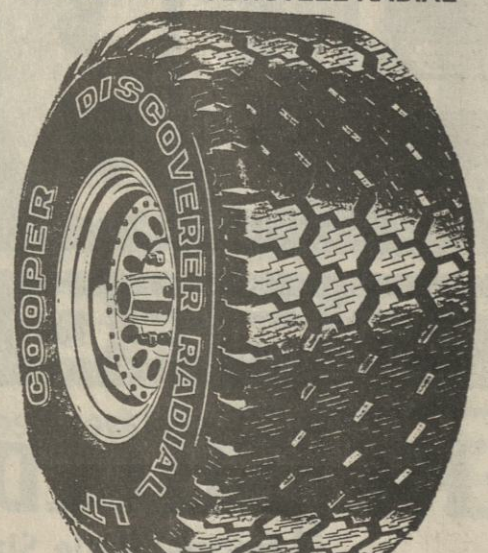

Samaritan Food Pantry Offers Assistance For Those In Need

Cuts in social services and social security benefits, closings of area factories and emergency situations all add up to genuine needs for many Tishomingo Countians. The Samaritan Food Pantry, begun by the Tishomingo County Ministerial Association, decided to do something about that need.

"Our aim is to help anyone in the county who needs food," Sr. Dolores Partsch, C.S.J., of St. Mary Catholic Church in Iuka, explained. She said the food pantry grew out of a concern several area churches had for people in our area who had an economic hardship or an emergency situation which made it hard for them to feed themselves and/or their family.

Food will be available for families, single households, and the elderly on a need basis. Normally, help will only be given once every three months, according to Partsch.

"Presently, we can only offer help with food," Partsch said.

The Rev. Jimmy Curtis, pastor of the First United Methodist Church in Iuka is one of the ministers who is working with the pantry. He explained that the aim of the pantry is to fill in the gaps not addressed by other agencies.

"We know that many times—especially for the elderly—the monthly assistance checks they receive does not go far enough," Curtis said. "We are encouraging these people to let us help them with their food needs."

"Many elderly and disabled people have phenomenal medical expenses each month. This often leaves little for groceries," Sr. Partsch said.

The Samaritan Food pantry is located at 119 Eastport St. in Iuka, just down the street from the Episcopal and Catholic Churches. Partsch stressed that anyone in the county who has a need is urged to

come by and talk with them.

"We will have volunteers here on Monday's from 11 a.m. until 1 p.m. and on Thursdays from 4 p.m. until 6 p.m. to assist those who would like to come by," Partsch stated.

"We have been very fortunate to have many volunteers from area churches and businesses," Partsch said.

She explained that the pantry does not receive any government funding, but accepts donations for all of its food and equipment.

"We are very thankful for several area grocers who have donated food, area businesses who have donated appliances and to the city of Iuka for the donation of a desk," Curtis said. He stated that they were very grateful to Maxey South, who constructed the shelves for the pantry.

Students from Tishomingo County High School have also

been instrumental in this effort by providing food and manpower, according to Partsch.

The response, so far, to the food pantry has been good. Partsch and Curtis explained. A diverse group has been in for assistance from all over the county.

"We would like to let everyone know that the food pantry is not just for people from the Iuka area, but is for everyone throughout the county," Curtis said.

Both Partsch and Curtis said they would like to issue an invitation to all area churches who are not presently involved with the Tishomingo Ministerial Association to participate.

The pantry needs constant donations of food, paper products and also money from anyone or any organization wanting to help. Volunteers are also needed for food distribution.

The Tishomingo County Ministerial Association meets every second Thursday of the month at 10 a.m. at St. Mary's. Anyone wanting information may call 423-9358.

"information" booths in conjunction with Iuka Hospital's community health fair. To co-sponsor the Homestead project and Department of Health and Human Services public forum on "Parenting Skills". Also, to make available a program on "Decreasing Teen Pregnancy."

EDUCATION COMMITTEE:

Chairman Carl Weeden, along with members Gary Taylor, Stanley Magill, Charles Evans, and John B. Moore, established a five year plan for the following goals: graduation rate, percent of population of 25 and older with a high school diploma, average expenditure per student, ACT average, average class size and accreditation levels.

The five goals are to develop district wide parental involvement guidelines to include two parent/teacher conferences per year. Increase job skill training through MSCPAS, school-to-work, work place learning and technology. To have a minimum of 2 computers per classroom, a fully training staff, utilize technology for improving reading, language arts, math, and communication.

SOCIAL ENVIRONMENT:

Chairperson Shelia Castleberry, along with members Linda Cruver and Jill Long established the goals on social environment regarding the number of births to single teens, AFCD & Food Stamp payments per household, number of divorces, number of divorces involving children, and foster care payments per household. The task force believes that an emphasis on education, family values and community involvement with families at risk, will reduce each of these problems.

ECONOMIC:

Chairperson Mack Lloyd Wadkins, along with Eugene Bishop, Ted Day, Martha Segars, and Roger Clark, set the economic goals to raise per capita income, increase median family income, increase net-new businesses, reduce the unemployment rate, reduce the number of households with family income less than \$15,000 and decrease the debt per \$1,000 of income. They plan to do

this by the continued promotion of all the industrial parks in the county, encourage the coordination of all development agencies working in the County, and to lobby the Board of Supervisors for additional assistance in promoting economic development in the County.

HOUSING:

Chairperson Dianne Ables, along with Scotty Skinner and Grace Long set five year goals to: 1-increase the percent of owner occupied homes to 80% 2-to decrease the percent of renter occupied housing to 20%. 3- to increase the median home value to \$58,000.

They plan to do this by: 1- expanding advertising of the County's many points of interest such as state parks, resort areas, etc. to national magazines to entice tourists and retirees. 2- better utilize the quality home brochure currently published by local Realtors. Add more information (calendar of events), and include anything that would be of interest to visitors to the area. Distribute the brochures to more locations. 3- encourage more publicity about the County's Eagle Tours and fall foliage cruises. 4- work more closely with the tourism commission.

The meeting was held at the Tishomingo County Vo-Tech Complex, with a delicious meal prepared by Mrs. Carson and her students. The next meeting will be held in January, 1999, with the evaluation of achievement of goals, and to set a new five year goal. 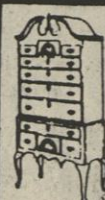

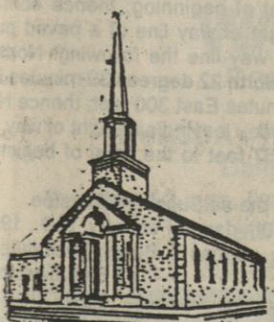

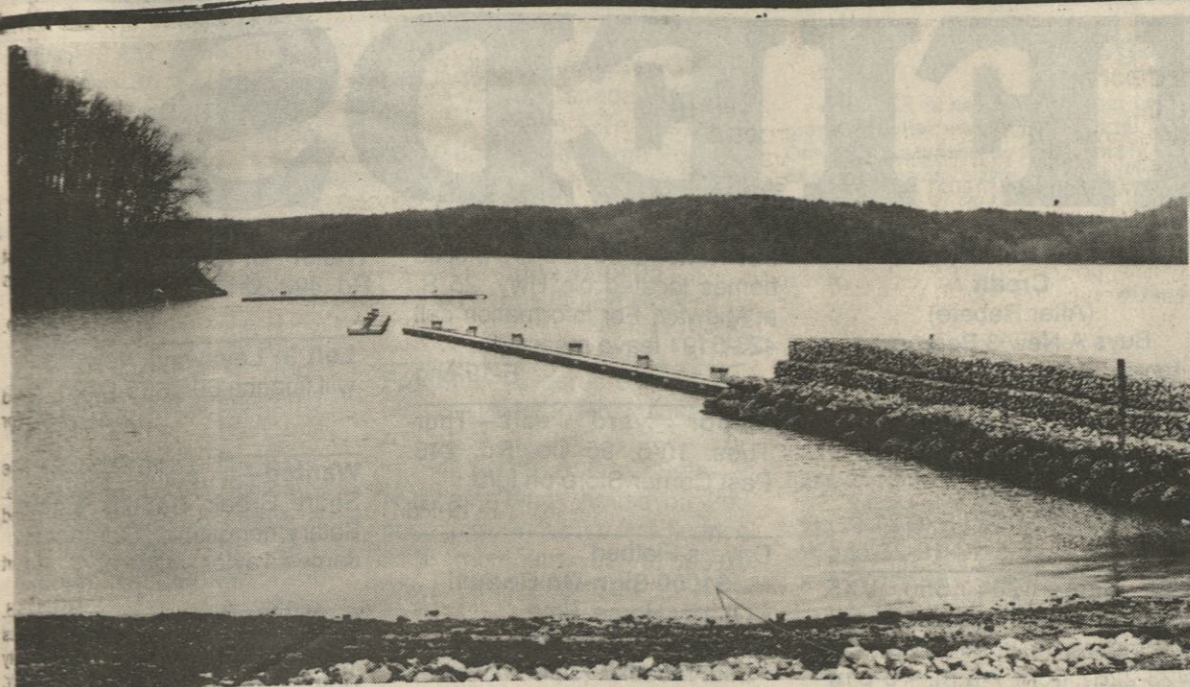

Wind, Waves Damage Break Wall At J.P. Coleman Park

A Sunday night storm swept through the county causing damage to the break wall and at least two boats at J.P. Coleman State Park's marina.

Park Manager Glenn Ray Harris explained that as the winds picked up speed, waves of up to six feet began topping the wall.

The purpose of the wall, which is anchored by cables to concrete pillars within the water, is to protect the boats in the marina from damaging waves.

In Sunday's storm, waves

coming down the river picked up enough speed due to strong winds to break loose the two end pieces of the wall, allowing waves into the marina area.

Damage was done to at least two boats at the marina—a pontoon and a houseboat, Harris said. He estimates that total costs of damage to the two crafts could run between \$6,000-\$8,000.

Harris said that this is about the seventh time the break wall has been damaged by winds or storm conditions since his employment at the park.

"The last time it collapsed, the cost of repairing it was approximately \$50,000," Harris remarked.

He explained that one end of the break wall has been restructured using a gabion wall (wire baskets filled with rocks and stacked together) which is much more efficient in taking the force of the waves. He said he hopes that in the future, funding will be made available to restructure the entire wall using this method. He said this would put an end to this reoccurring problem.

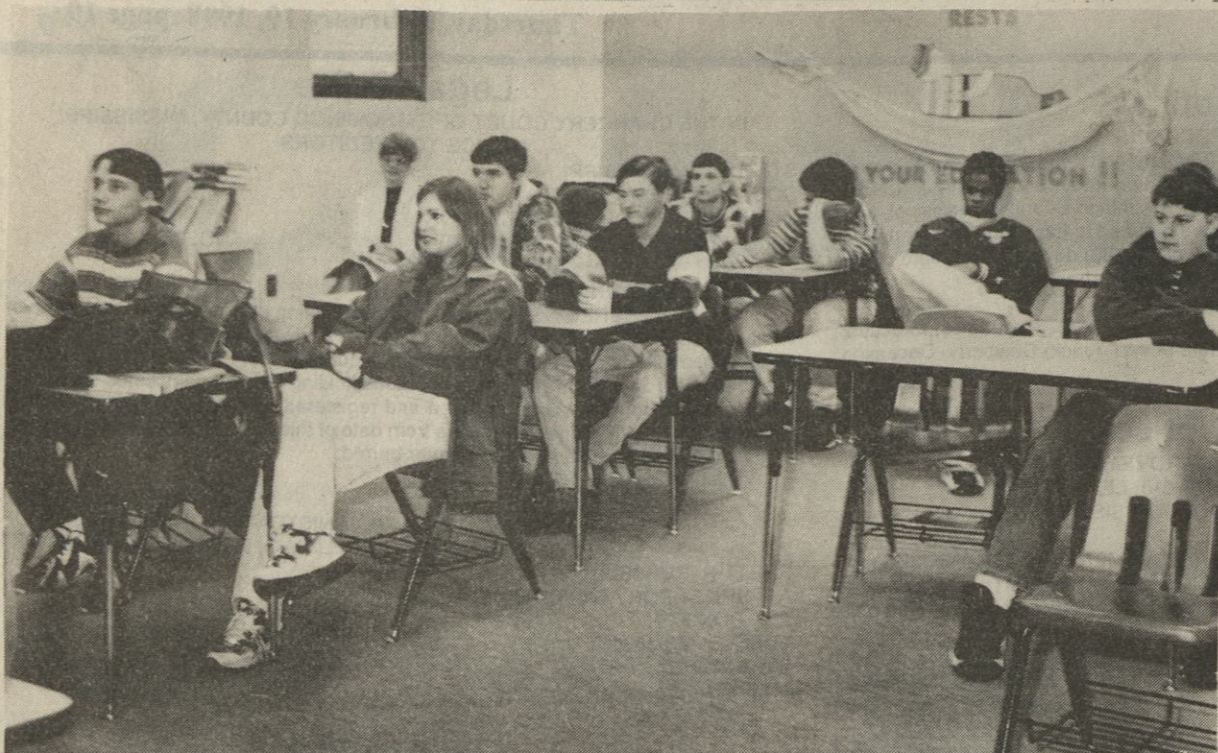

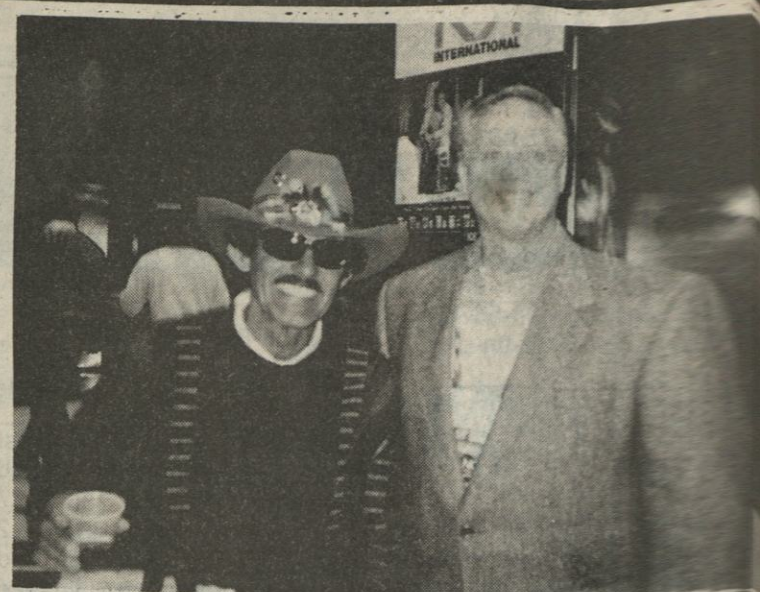

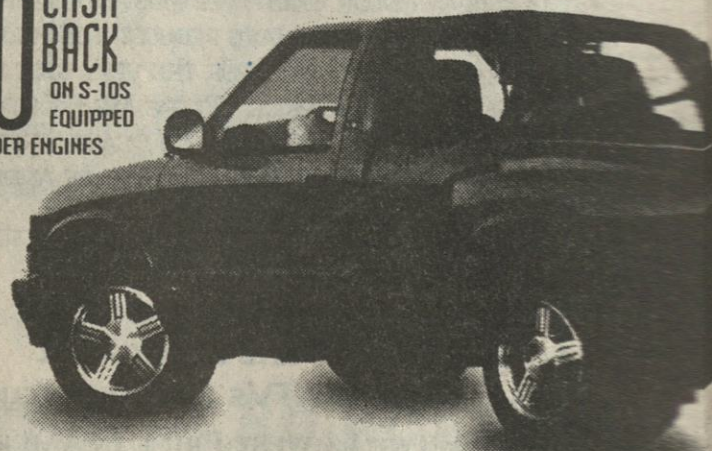
