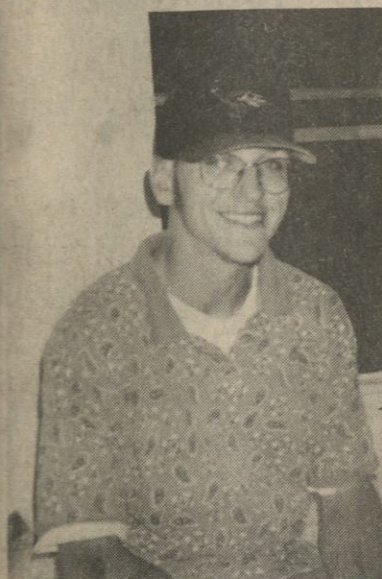

Former Iuka Resident Killed In Ala. Wreck

A former Iuka resident was killed recently in an automobile accident in Alabama, according to Alabama State Trooper reports.

Phillip Joe McGuff, 20, died Wednesday, March 4, 1998 in Parrish, AL as the result of an automobile accident.

Reports stated that McGuff was traveling alone in his 1986 Chevrolet on Pisgah Highway, between Pisgah and Cordova, Ala. at approximately 1:30 a.m. when the accident occurred. The cause of the accident is unknown; however, it is suspected that he went to sleep while driving.

When McGuff was younger he had lived and attended school in Iuka.

Services for Phillip Joe McGuff, Parrish, AL, were Friday, March 6, 1998, at Collins Burke Funeral Home in Jasper, Ala. with the Rev. Robert Dale Smith officiating. Burial was in Walker Memory Garden in Jasper.

Labor Shortage On Coast Has Shipbuilder Eyeing Tishomingo County Site

2,500 Applications Taken In Labor Force Survey

Despite the lack of official word from any government officials, Ingalls Shipbuilding is reportedly looking at Tishomingo County's Tri-State Commerce Park as a potential site for future operations.

Officials have remained closed-mouthed when asked to confirm that the Pascagoula-based shipbuilder is considering the Yellow Creek site, however some area newspapers, including *The Northeast Mississippi Daily Journal*, *The Daily Corinthian* and the *Mississippi Business Journal* have all reported that the shipbuilder is eyeing the Tishomingo County site.

Public relations representative for Ingalls, Den Knecht, did confirm that his company is having a hard time finding an adequate work force on the Mississippi Gulf Coast, and that they are definitely looking at options to alleviate that situation. However, he would not say if the local site topped their list of options.

The Mississippi Department of Economic and Community Development, headed by Jimmy Heidel, is reportedly the agency conducting talks with Ingalls to help them find an area in which they could locate. Heidel had not

returned calls at press time to the *Tishomingo County News* concerning Ingalls or any other potential tenants for the 4,200-acre Yellow Creek site.

Reports have indicated that if Ingalls opened a new facility at the Tri-State Commerce Park, it would be used to build ship components which could then be floated down the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway to Pascagoula to be assembled. It has been rumored that Fulton may also be under consideration by Ingalls.

Tremendous Response By Job Applicants

Tishomingo County officials did conduct a survey of the area labor force last week which Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors President Dale Price confirmed was done to benefit ANY industry which may be looking to locate within the county.

"We did the survey for the County's information on our available work force," Price said. "We can't say at this time which specific industries may be coming."

The labor survey, to which 2,500 persons responded from Tishomingo County and surrounding counties in Mississippi, Alabama and

Tennessee, asked for welders, fitters and pipe welders.

Price said that approximately 700 of the 2,500 applicants had sufficient experience in the areas advertised. Others filling out applications were applying for jobs in other fields, Price said.

Ingalls Bombarded By Calls

Mississippi Rep. Ricky Cummings said Tuesday that a leak of information about the possible location of Ingalls Shipbuilding at the Tri-State Commerce Park may possibly cause problems for Tishomingo County.

This leak of information has caused the company to be bombarded by calls from other facilities in the state and in adjoining states who want to be considered as possible sites. He said it was Ingalls intention to gather information about our area quietly. He said Ingalls is very displeased with all of the publicity their efforts have gotten in the last couple of weeks.

"Whoever leaked this information has really done Tishomingo County a disservice," Cummings said. "Now the county has a lot more competition for the shipbuilder than it previously did."

This Saturday, March 14, is the date for the second annual awards banquet for the Tishomingo County Historical and Genealogical Society.

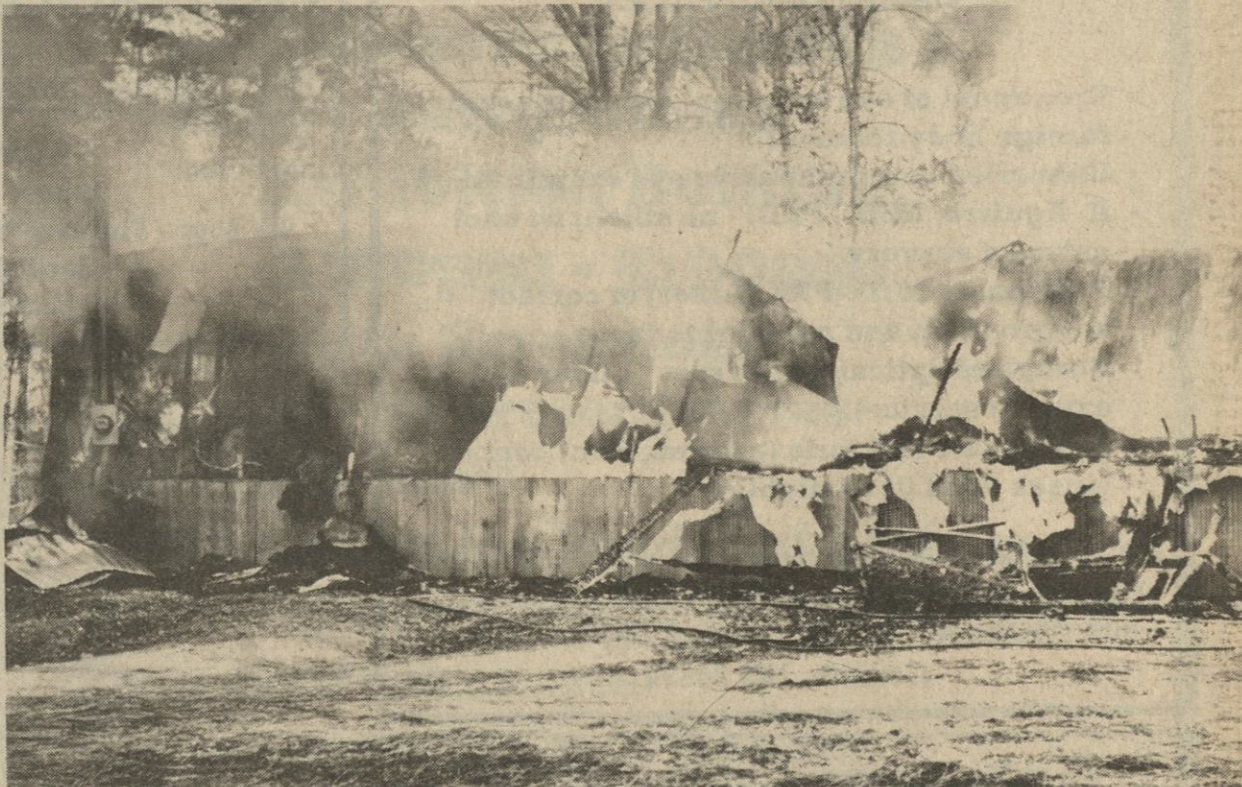
The event, which will begin at 6:30 p.m. at the Southern Style Restaurant, will include a slide

An early morning fire Tuesday has totally destroyed the home of a Tishomingo County resident.

The home of Tim Steele, located about ¾ mile outside the Iuka City limits at 401 County Road 172, caught fire just before 6 a.m. Tuesday, according to

Fireman Brian Grissom of the Iuka Fire Department.

The cause of the blaze was undetermined at the scene, Grissom said. It did appear that it started near the center of the house trailer, in the living room area. Steele was at work at the time of the fire.

Grissom said the Iuka

department gave mutual aid to the Harmony Central Volunteer Fire Department. He explained that when the fire departments reached the scene, the dwelling was on fire from one end to the other.

The fire was brought under control by approximately 6:25 a.m., the fireman confirmed.

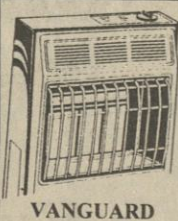


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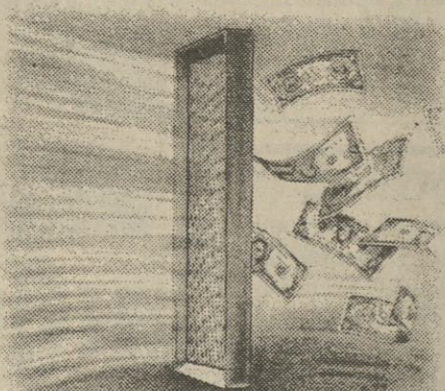

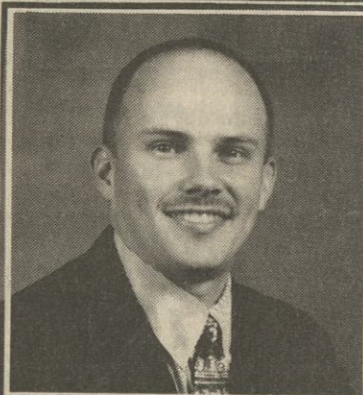


Therapy For Crossed-Eyes

Crossed-eyes, also known as strabismus, is a vision condition in which the two eyes are not properly aligned. There are many causes, but most cases result from some type of poor eye muscle control. A person must learn to use both eyes together. Some do not learn to use their eyes as a team and crossed eyes can result.

Aside from the physical appearance problem, a person with crossed-eyes sees different images with each eye which may result in double vision. To compensate, the brain often ignores the images seen by one eye, thus eliminating double vision. For practical purposes, even though both eyes are open, only one is being used. The disuse of this eye is a condition known as lazy eye or amblyopia.

All optometrists are trained and qualified to detect crossed-eyes; but for treatment, some patients may be referred to an ophthalmologist for medical treatment or an optometrist specializing in vision therapy.

Adults Need Fluoride, Too

Cavities are not exclusive to school children. We remain susceptible to decay as long as we have teeth. Adults need fluoride protection as much as youngsters do.

Little more than a decade ago, dental researchers thought fluoride exerted its positive influences solely during childhood. We now know that fluoride is a potent, versatile decay-fighter for people of all ages.

Plaque, the major culprit in gum disease, also plays a leading role in the development of cavities. The bacteria in plaque combine with sugars and starches to form acids that attack tooth enamel. When repeated acid attacks break through the enamel, decay begins.

In children's teeth, fluoride combines readily with enamel, increasing tooth resistance to acid attack and decay. Be throughout life, fluoride also mixes with plaque and saliva, impairing plaque's ability to produce acid.

Fluoride can even help reverse early decay by increasing enamel uptake of calcium and phosphorus to repair weakened spots in the process called remineralization. Fluoride inhibits the development of cavities on these surfaces as well, a benefit especially important for adults. Fluoride also helps fight decay around the margins of dental fillings.

Fluoridated water is the most efficient and effective source of fluoride whether you're 6 or 72. Even if you're not among the 130 million Americans currently living in a fluoridated water community, however, you have access to fluoride in over-the-counter mouthrinses, toothpastes and gels.

The American Dental Association specifically recommends that everyone brush daily with an ADA-accepted fluoride toothpaste. Research suggests that decay remains a threat even into old age and that the incidence of decay will continue to increase as the baby boom generation ages.

The elderly population in America is growing in size, and as more people keep their natural teeth for longer periods of time, decay will remain a significant health problem. of the woods. Now, there are a number of wildlife in this area. It's not very unusual to see a red fox come out of the woods, look around a few minutes, and disappear again. We have ground hogs, opossums, rabbits, owls (both hoot and screech), two huge golden tail hawks, armadillos that dig holes in the yard, a bob cat, and even wild turkeys at one time in the past. But never has there been a hen.

Mrs. Bonds was afraid some predator would kill the hen roosting out in the woods, so she made a bed of straw for the hen on her front porch, next to the box Hutch (the dog) sleeps in. The hen has roosted there ever since.

Now, Mrs. Bonds owned a flock of hens when she lived at the old home place. When she noticed that the hen's comb was turning a dark red, she suspected she would soon start laying eggs. So, Mrs. Bonds borrowed some of Hutch's straw and made the hen a nest at

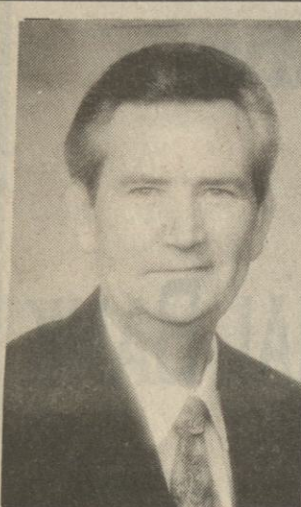

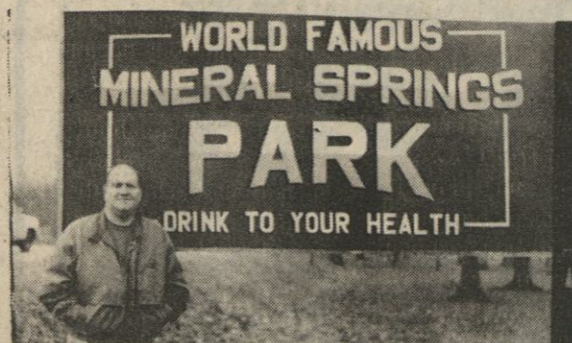

My Friend, My Hero, Mrs. Evelyn Parker Nixon

A Series Of Articles By
Christian Evans



As I walked through the Oak Grove Cemetery one evening I passed by the grave of a teacher I had many years ago. She was Evelyn Parker Nixon, a fourth grade teacher who taught me science as well as a few other lessons I have carried in life. I paused to remember some of the characteristics that made Mrs. Nixon unique.

She was probably one of the last teachers still teaching while I was in school who had actually taught in a one room school house. I remember her telling us how she began teaching as a teenager. This was common in the early part of the twentieth century. Mrs. Nixon was a devoted Christian who tried to show her faith in everything she did. Her first husband was a Reverend Parker whom she had married quite young. He had passed away quite young and left his Evelyn a young widow. She had no children of her own which I felt a great irony considering she had dedicated her life to teaching children.

Mr. Minor Nixon was a local widower with two grown children, Douglas and Bullah Ann, at the time he and the soon to be Mrs. Nixon began courting. They adored one another and eventually married. I remember her salt and pepper hair, her horn rimmed glasses and a sweet grandmother type smile. I remember her being interesting for many reasons, one of which was her strong faith.

For example, Mrs. Nixon refused to have a Halloween party in her class because she considered it a pagan and unholy holiday. That is a prerogative held

by many fundamentalist Christians even today. All it really meant to the kids was that it knocked them out of having a Halloween party at school. Leave it to Mrs. Nixon to instigate a clever solution.

She had a fascination with Eleanor Roosevelt and her work with the United Nations. She decided her class would honor the anniversary of the United Nations which was chartered in 1945. She thought it would be an opportunity to promote geography and Social Studies. The students draped flags of many nations along the walls of our wing. (A picture of the flags in the hall accompanies our class pictures in the 1974 Iuka Chieftain Annual.) The students were "appointed" ambassadors of their prospective countries and gave reports on various subjects of information on or about the country during the week. The highlight of the U.N. party (coinciding with the Halloween party in the other classrooms) were decorations and costumes from various countries. Food was prepared to represent the diverse cultures. Pretty heavy stuff for fourth graders!

I remember how she told us about Christmas when she was a little girl. She might get a homemade doll, fruit or "jawbreaker" candy was about all she says St. Nicolas could bring. She always knew that any gift given was given with love. That is something she remembered and practiced her entire life. There were gifts of coats, food and all sorts of other things she gave to the poor and needy that were given by someone known only as "A friend" because all thanks was to the Lord, not the individual.

I remember another big holiday for Mrs. Nixon was St. Patrick's Day. She proudly wore the green of her Irish heritage. She told us of

her ancestors coming from Ireland. She recalls Cornbeef and cabbage and planting Irish potatoes on St. Patrick's day for good luck. She also taught us a little song or "Ditty" and a little dance or "Jig" that went with it. I still recall the song. It went, "Me Mither and Fither are Irish, Me Mither and Fither are Irish, Me Mither and Fither are Irish and I am Irish too! We have us a pig in the parlor, we have us a pig in the parlor and he is Irish too! We have potatoes in the garden, We have potatoes in the garden and they are Irish too!"

She explained that "Mither" and "Fither" were "Gaelic", an Irish language, which were "Mother" and "Father". Mrs. Nixon also told us a "pig" was kept in the house sometimes like a pet because they were a prized possession. They may keep them there till they were taken to be butchered on a special occasion. She told us how St. Patrick drove the snakes out of Ireland. Whether fact or myth, we listened to her stories and traditions, sang our "ditty" and danced a little "jig" with Mrs. Nixon singing, smiling and clapping with us.

Always a teacher and lover of books, she promoted a Saturday reading time where the good readers were asked to read a short kids story on our local radio station. This was an honor for you not only had to be a good reader but a good student of high standards and character with her. She never made an issue of race or status with any child. She encouraged virtues such as self respect and fostered confidence among her students. She was also a writer and was published under a pen name, that was until Mr. Nixon found out!

Mrs. Nixon opened our minds to science. She was proud of her stepson, Douglas, who was a scientist for NASA. He had worked on major projects from the early Apollo missions to the moon, Skylab and the early shuttle program. The last I heard from him, Douglas was working on the ground base station for the Hubble telescope. Mrs. Nixon invited me over a number of times to visit with Douglas when he was in town. I was in awe of Douglas Nixon because in that era of moon shots and space races, he took time to let a kid ask him all about it and took time to explain it as best he could to a ten year old! Somewhere in our house is a cut-away poster of the space shuttle as it appeared in 1974 which he had gotten signed for me by legendary pioneer rocket scientist Warner Von Braun. (Mom, where is that poster again?)

I never knew Ann Nixon (Kay) but I have heard she was a beautiful young woman and an accomplished pianist and music teacher. Mr. Minor Nixon taught business classes at Burnsville school and worked for Iuka Guaranty Bank before retirement. He was also a kind and goodhearted Christian man from those I have talked to and what I recall of him.

I remember several times that I visited where Mrs. Nixon had mint tea or lemonade and cookies. Ah, she had a sweet laugh and even for an informal snack she asked us to bow our head in a prayer. I thought it was a bit eccentric back then but I relish the memory now. I appreciate anyone who has the courage to pray, the gift to teach and the patience to love a child unconditionally such as Mrs. Nixon did.

When I see a CNN special report on the anniversary of the United Nations, a country we studied or when anything is going on in the world, I think of Mrs.

Nixon. I think of her on Christmas when I see a homemade doll or eat a jawbreaker. I hum a ditty on St. Patrick's day and pause for a prayer before I eat my cornbeef and cabbage.

When I see a rocket or shuttle go up, I think of Mrs. Nixon. I wonder what she would have thought of Hale-Bopp, Bosnia,

discovering the Titanic or the Internet? She faced challenges with a smile, a prayer and divine guidance.

Mrs. Nixon had a wonder and excitement about change and taught us not to fear it but to embrace the wonders God has given us in this age of miracles. She made a believer out of me many times and in many ways! As I gathered some wildflowers to put on the graves where Mr. and Mrs. Nixon rest, I said a little prayer thanking God for letting this lady be a part of my childhood memories. To me, she will always be a HERO!

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Weston Moss Wins Tishomingo Elementary School Geography Bee

Weston Moss, a sixth grade student at Tishomingo Elementary School, won the school-level competition of the National Geography Bee and a chance at a \$25,000 college scholarship. The school-level Bee, at which students answered oral questions on geography, was the first round in the tenth annual National Geography Bee. The Bee is sponsored by the National Geographic Society, First American National Bank - Tishomingo Branch, and Sylvan Learning Centers, the nation's leading provider of supplemental education services to students at all skill levels.

The kick-off for this year's Bee was the week of Dec. 1, with thousands of schools around the United States and in the five U.S. territories participating. The school winners, including Weston, will now take a written test; up to 100 of the top scorers in each state and territory will be eligible to compete in their state Bee April 3.

The National Geographic Society will provide and all-expenses-paid trip to Washington, D.C., for state champions and their teacher-escorts to participate in the National Geography Bee national championship on May 19 and 20. The first-place national winner will receive a \$25,000 college scholarship.

Alex Trebek, host of "Jeopardy!", will moderate the national finals on May 20. The

program will be produced by Maryland Public Television and will air on PBS stations. Check local listings for dates and times.

The National Geographic Society developed the National Geography Bee in response to a growing concern about the lack of geographic knowledge among young people in the United States. A 10-country Gallup survey conducted for the Society in 1988 and 1989 found that people in the U.S. ages 18-24—the youngest group surveyed—knew less about geography than young people in any of the other countries in the survey.

The National Geographic Society, with 9 million members, has as its mission the "increase and diffusion of geographic knowledge." In addition to the National Geography Bee, the Society sponsors a number of other geography education initiative, including summer institutes for teachers and the Geographic alliance Network, which is currently working in every state, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and Canada.

Growing Tomorrows

Farmers and ranchers represent less than two percent of the United States population so why should the rest of us want to celebrate National Agriculture Week, March 15-21? Actually, a better question should be "Why wouldn't we want to celebrate it?"

World population is expected to reach 7.9 billion by the year 2020 and about 10 billion by the end of the next century. In addition, many of the 5.5 billion people who currently populate the world will be coming into new wealth. We'll not only be feeding new mouths, but we'll also be feeding those who can afford to improve their diets.

Today's farmer is meeting the challenges of world needs now and in the future with progressive tools like precision farming and biotechnology.

Through precision farming, producers can precisely control the amount of crop protection products they put on their fields, which helps them to achieve the greatest output per acre, per amount of input.

Through sophisticated satellite technology, farmers can map a field and log data on everything from soil conditions to weed density. With that data, which is fed into an electronic grid of their field, they can determine the exact amount of chemical that needs to be applied in any specific cropping location.

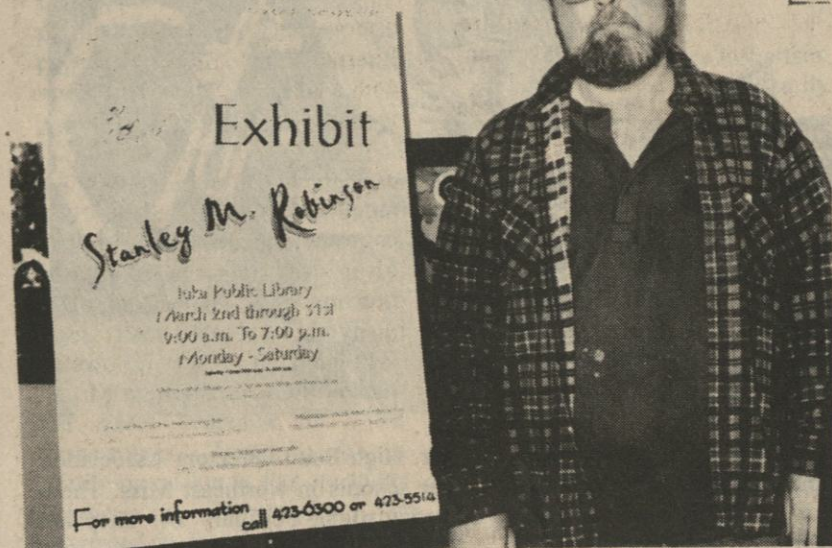
In the process, both of these approaches allow the farmer to put less stress on the environment.

Biogenetics is another emerging technology in crop production. Some of these biotech products encourage the use of different herbicide programs, while others replicate some advantages of crop protection products.

The bottom line is, today's farmers and ranchers are getting better at what they do so they can meet world needs today and in the future. Let's celebrate their efforts during National Agricultural Week, March 15-21.

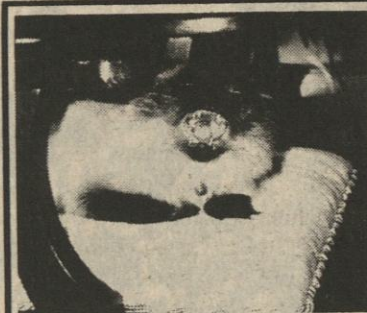

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Caring For Your Pet's Teeth And Gums...Is As Important As Caring For Your Own

The following information can help you identify both the signs of a healthy mouth and the symptoms of moderate and advanced periodontal disease.

Healthy Mouths will almost always exhibit the following characteristics:

- <White Teeth
- <Breath which has an acceptable odor
- <Properly colored gum tissue (coral pink)
- <Firm gum tissue which evenly and tightly encircles the tooth.

Helping your dog or cat maintain optimum oral health aids in tooth retention, ensures the ability to continue good nutrition throughout life, and contributes greatly to overall health and well being.

Moderate gingivitis and early periodontitis: inflammation of the gums or gingivitis (the first stage of periodontal disease) begins when a sufficient amount of plaque and calculus are allowed to develop. A mouth in this stage of disease will usually show the following symptoms:

- <Yellowing of the teeth
- <Bad Breath
- <Reddening of the coral pink gum tissue
- <slight softening and lossening of the gum tissue encircling the tooth.

If the gingivitis goes untreated over a period of time, the pet may begin to suffer from a painful inflammation of the gums that leads to a profound and irreversible separation of the gum tissue from the tooth. This separation is a visual indication of the shrinking bone mass and loss of ligament support of the tooth.

Advanced Periodontal disease is the foremost cause of premature tooth loss in pets today. This stage of the disease involves a combination of the following:

- <Soreness of gums (often evidenced in the pet's inability to eat)
- <Yellowed teeth (sometimes loose teeth in advanced stages of periodontitis)
- <Extremely bad breath
- <Red, swollen gum tissue with areas of ulceration
- <Softening of gum tissue and separation of that tissue from the neck of the tooth, loss of bone support and probable loss of teeth.

Happily, proper treatment may arrest gingivitis before the pet ever experiences advanced periodontitis or separation of gum tissue from the tooth.

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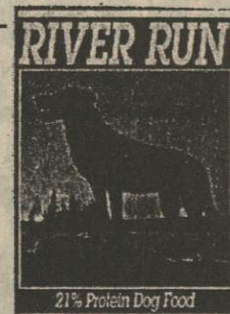

Unemployment Rate Lowest In More Than Two Decades in State

Mississippi recorded its lowest annual unemployment in two decades in 1997 averaging a 5.7 percent unemployment rate, according to the Mississippi Employment Security commission (MESC).

MESC Executive Director Thomas E. Lord announced Thursday that the 1997 rate was the lowest in the state since 1974 when the rate stood at 4.6 percent.

Tishomingo County unemployment rates reported for January 1998 was 8.9 percent.

Lafayette County in Mississippi led the state in employment in 1997 recording an annual unemployment rate of 2.3 percent, while Jefferson County had the highest annual unemployment rate of 15.5 percent, records showed.

Lord said the state unemployment rate still remained above the national average for 1997 which was 4.9 percent.

In January, the unemployment rate rose slightly from the previous month, but still remained below the January, 1997 rate.

The January increase was due to seasonal layoffs in agriculture and retail trade following the holiday season, according to MESC labor market Analyst Bill McNeece. Also contributing to the increase, he said, was the fact that inclement weather curtailed outdoor work such as forestry, agriculture and construction during January.

such as ryegrass, small grains and fescue. Don't let these crops get off to a poor start. Since the main production time for forages is approaching, producers need to pay special attention. If a good

stand of forage has established, they should be attuned to grazing management, nitrogen fertilization and weed control. 1. Grazing management: make sure livestock don't overgraze forages. At least 2 to 3 inches of growth with some green leaves should remain below the grazing height. Overgrazing in cold weather can damage young grasses, thus stunting growth. 2. Nitrogen fertilization: February through early March is an appropriate time to apply nitrogen to cool-season forages. If a good stand of clover is grown with the grasses, nitrogen can be reduced. (This depends on how much nitrogen the clovers supply). 3. Weed control: Late winter is also a good time for weed problems to arise. Weeds such as buttercup, dock and wild mustard can be easily controlled with specific herbicides. If not controlled, they often will reduce forage growth.

HOT TIP FOR FIRE BLIGHT CONTROL

Continued wet weather could trigger another fire blight outbreak this spring. This bacterial disease was active in many home orchards last year and also caused extensive damage to Bradford pears in home landscapes. Since fire blight tends to carry over from season-to-season and is most destructive in wet weather, this spring could be another of these times when fire blight causes widespread problems. Fire blight is a descriptive name for the problem, since disease symptoms include black, scorched appearing branches, twigs, and foliage. The most common symptom of fire blight is a shoot blight, which occurs when the entire end of the branch is killed by the disease. To

Pesticide Applicators Certification Training

There will be a Pesticide Applicators Certification Training held Wednesday morning, March 25, 1998 at 9:00 a.m. at the Holcut Office of the Department of Wildlife, Fisheries, and Parks located on Hwy. 364 west of Midway. This training is for Agriculture Producers who need to be able to purchase Restricted Use Pesticides for use on their own farms. After the training, a test will be given. Tests will be sent to Mississippi State University where Personnel from the Bureau of Plant Industry will grade them. Producers must pass before a license is granted. The Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service provides educational opportunities to the public on an equal opportunity basis and will make every reasonable effort to accommodate individuals with disabilities which would interfere with their ability to receive the educational information being provided. If you have a disability or impairment which would interfere with your opportunity to participate in this program contact Danny Owen at 423-7016 before the start of the program.

PLAN BETTER FORAGES

This is a good time for cattle producers to get the most from their cool-season grazing crops

reduce the incidence and severity of fire blight, a variety of disease management measures have to be followed. One of the best ways to "turn down the heat" on fire blight is to apply an antibiotic spray during the bloom period for susceptible apples and pears in orchards and Bradford pears in the home landscape. Fire blight spray is available under several trade names, so check with your local garden supply store. Look for a product which contain streptomycin sulfate (the antibiotic) as the active ingredient. This information is located on the product label to obtain best control of fire blight with fire blight spray, the first applications should be made at the start of the bloom period, and every fire to seven days thereafter. Generally, one level tablespoon of this materials should be mixed with two and one-half gallons of water for the spray mixture. Read and follow other label instructions for obtaining best fire blight control results. A fire blight spraying program should be followed with a pruning program to remove cankers from infected twigs, branches, and shoots. But there's a "right way" and a "wrong way" to remove fire blight cankers. If you're not familiar with the pruning procedure, check with us at the County Extension Office.

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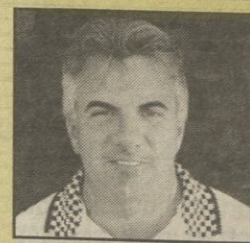

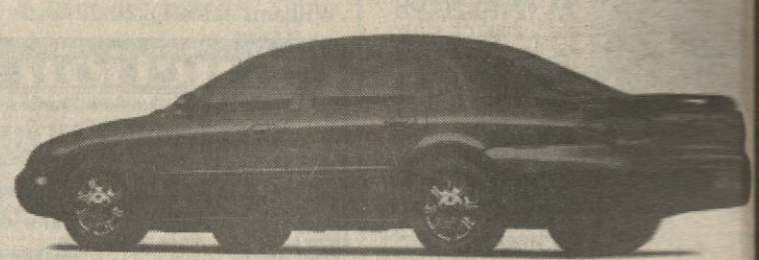

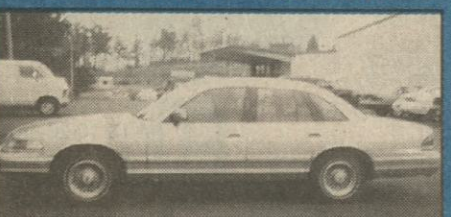
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
