by: Angela Lambert During a Monday morning neeting at the Tishomingo Courthouse, Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors voted to establish a new board which would work to

recruit industry and business into the county. The motion to create this

new group was made by third district supervisor Danny Ryan and was seconded by second district supervisor Arlie South.

Board of Supervisors President Dale Price, of the first district, confirmed that the vote to begin this new board was 4 to I-Ryan, South, Price, as well as fourth district supervisor David Sanders, voted in favor of the motion, while fifth district supervisor, Leon Cook, voted against it.

While specific details of this new board have not been ironed at by the Board of Supervisors, me did report that it will be made up of one or more persons from each supervisor's district. He also said that it would be county operated.

Presently, the county has our official organizations which deal directly with business and industry recruitment. These include the Tishomingo County Foundation, Development Tishomingo County Development the Tri-State Authority, Commerce Park Board and the Yellow Creek State Inland Port Authority.

Recruitment efforts are also undertaken by some individual cities' Chambers of Commerce throughout the county.

While the newly created board would be funded through the Board of Supervisors, Price said no specific details have been decided at this time. He said the Board hopes to make these decisions about the organization within the next month or so.

The Tishomingo County Supervisors, as well as several other local entities Foundation members presently funding the Tishomingo County Development Foundation and Authority.

When asked for a specific

reason for the creation of yet another recruitment organization within the county, Board members declined to comment. They also had no comment at this time on how the members of the new organization would be chosen.

of Tishomingo County's largest industrial sites are not under the marketing of county officials.

One industrial park, the 900plus acre industrial park, located along the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway in Burnsville is owned by the State of Mississippi and is presently being marketed to industry by the Yellow Creek State Inland Port Authority.

The approximately 4,000acre Tri-State Commerce Park (the former NASA site), is also state-owned and is under the marketing of the Mississippi Economic Development Foundation, as well as the local Tri-State Commerce Park Board

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### **Tishomingo County Is Among Miss. Counties Declared Eligible** For Federal Disaster Assistance

Agriculture has declared 27 Mississippi counties including Tishomingo County, eligible for disaster assistance resulting from damages sustained from weatherrelated events in 1997, Rep. Roger F. Wicker said Thursday.

The Congressman Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman approved the disaster declaration to cover losses sustained during periods of excessive rainfall and damaging hail, as well as extended periods of drought and excessive heat throughout calendar year 1997.

The counties cited as primary disaster areas include: Adams, Alcorn, Calhoun, Chickasaw, Choctaw, Franklin, George, Greene, Harrison, Itawamba, Jackson, Jefferson Davis, Lamar, Lincoln Lee. Montgomery, Newton, Pearl River, Pike, Pontotoc, Prentiss,

The U.S. Department of Stone, Tishomingo, Walthall and Wayne.

First Industry Announces Opening At Former NASA Site

### Yellow Creek Lodges, Inc. To **Build Recreational Vehicles At Tri-State Commerce Park**

A new tenant moving into the Tri-State Commerce Industrial Park at Yellow Creek (formerly known as the NASA site) will build a travel trailer which they hope will fill the needs of basically three types of cus-

These customers include those who want affordable seasonal/vacation housing, those who have a need for emergency housing or those who just need a home-away-from-home because of an out-of-town job or for any other reason.

Locally-owned Yellow Creek Lodges, Inc., who will construct high quality recreational vehicles, hopes to begin operations as early as mid-April and will hire between 10 to 30 people at its onset, according to the company's general manager Mike Singleton.

"We will be taking application at our location, site building 1032, beginning next Thursday," Singleton said. Applications will be taken between the hours of 8 a.m. and 12 noon.

Singleton said the company will be hiring as many local people as possible. He stressed that they are looking to hire topquality people.

Their product, which is transportable to the owners' site via any dual axle vehicle, will feature a rustic appearance on both the exterior and interior, according to Singleton.

"Our park models and lodges will feature log or cedar siding on the exterior and will be extra-large in size, as compared to most travel-type trailers," Singleton said. "They will have approximately 400-square-feet of living space, plus a loft."

Singleton explained that their product will be marketed primarily to licensed R.V. dealers throughout the Southeast and Southwest United States.

He said there are a couple of companies already manufacturing this type of small mobile home; however, these companies are not located nearby and do not market to the areas in which his company will be marketing.

Ownership of Yellow Creek Lodges, Inc. is shared by Singleton, Tommy Epperson of Epperson Trucking and Freddie Wilson of F.D. Wilson Trucking.

"This company is a team effort," Singleton said. Singleton, in addition to being the general manager, serves as the operating partner. Epperson is the company's president, while Wilson is its vice-president.

At the beginning of operations, Singleton said the company hopes to manufacture three products per week. He explained that the company will increase production as the business dictates. **Product Appearance** 

Rustic, yet luxurious. That is the phrase which would best describe the look of these unique travel trailers.

Models will be available in 10 ft. X 40 ft. or 12 ft. X 32 ft. sizes and will feature 101/2 ft. ceilings, with 8 ft. sidewalls, according to Singleton. In addition to one or two lofts or balconies which may be used for sleeping, the models will have a kitchen, bathroom, and one or two bed-

Such amenities as stairwells and entertainment centers will also be included in the models.

While the rustic-look will be the normal style, custom styling can be substituted upon request using vinyl siding of various colors. All trailers will include corrugated metal roofs. Singleton said that both fur-

nished and unfinished models will

He explained that one item to be included on all the models which he is excited about is a new

floating flooring known as Imagin. This is a durable, laminated flooring which comes in wood tones, marble and other styles. This will be installed throughout the trailers, except for the lofts, which will be carpeted, Singleton explained.

Cost for the trailers will range from \$16,000 to \$30,000 each, depending upon the features chosen, Singleton said.

These trailers are designed primarily to be moved to sites and parked for extended periods of time (hence the name, Park Models and Lodges), the spokesman

"This is not the kind of trailer you would pull, park one night and then hook it up and move it somewhere else the next night and so on," Singleton expressed. "However, it is a very economical way to, for instance, enjoy a season at the lake or on the beach. It would also be great for someone who was in need of emergency housing or who works away from home for extended pe-

Singleton said the company probably already gotten the first three weeks worth of products sold and anticipates that the business will begin to pick-up even more as the summer travel season approaches. He said the they will do extensive advertising and additionally, will have their own website on the Internet.

The key to establishing this industry at the Yellow Creek site, has been due to the help of those such as Jimmy Heidel of the Mississippi Dept. of Economic and Community Development, Jerry Wilemon of the Tri-State Commerce Park, Dr. Kelly Segars, and Jimmy Marlin of the Tri-State Commerce Park Board and Second District Supervisor Arlie South, Singleton said.

### Common Stock Commandments

Throughout history, certain "rules" have been recognized as basic for a suc-cessful, happy life - for example, "Do unto others as you would have others do

As with life in general, investing has a few proven rules, too. Following are some tried-and-true guidelines for com-

1. Invest in the strong. Most of the companies in your portfolio should be strong financially and have demonstrated consistent earnings and dividend growth over time. Companies with a leadership position in an industry offer many built-in advantages. They didn't get there unless they had a competitive edge such as management strengths or superior products or services. If a company does not command a leadership position, then it should offer other competitive strengths that would allow it to sustain long-term profitability.

2. Invest in companies that honor the shareholder. One way to measure whether management is shareholderfocused is to examine whether companies are able to earn an attractive (or improving) return on invested capital. Make sure that companies are not just earning high returns due to accounting gimmicks or leverage. Companies that have a strong franchise or a special niche often earn attractive returns on invested capital.

3. Pay attention to industries. The where the nature of the business is attractive. Companies that "swim with the tide" tend to perform very well over time. Examples of attractive industries include pharmaceuticals, technology, soft drinks, household products, food and financial services. Unattractive industries include those that are overly

4. Don't reach for yield. The highest-yielding stock in any industry is typically a poor investment. High yield often means high risk. Since a stock's yield is calculated by dividing dividends per share by price per share, a high-yielding stock can be the result of a declining stock price. A falling stock price is often a warning that the company's prospects have worsened and that a dividend cut may be pending.

5. Avoid the turnaround, for it

rarely turns in due time. Some investors search the list of "new 52week lows" for potential turnaround candidates. Many times these companies are victims of bad management. bad products, a weak balance sheet or some combination thereof. Sometimes they operate in an industry dominated by one or two companies with an insurmountable competitive edge. Or sometimes the business is marked by a pace of change that makes it difficult to keep up. Industries that require large capital investment or have a history of shaky labor relations may be doomed from the start. Ask yourself these questions before you invest: "What is the nature of the business I'm investing in? Am I starting out with the wind at my back, or with two strikes against me?"

These are just a few common stock commandments. They've earned a reputation as commandments because they've proven successful over time, and wise investors usually follow them.

### FLASHPOINT

#### WEEKLY LOOK AT THE IUKA FIRE DEPARTMENT

It's 3:00 a.m.; and an elderly man calls 911 complaining of severe chest pain. The fire truck rolls. 11:47 a.m.; there's a traffic accident with injuries on Constitution Drive. The fire truck rolls. 6:15 p.m.; a man is badly cut with a chainsaw. The fire truck rolls. Why, some may wonder, does the Fire Department respond to all these non-fire calls? Is it because the fireman on duty just wants to get out of those four walls? Does he have an insatiable curiosity to see what's going on; an innate desire to be part of the action? The truth is, the Iuka Fire Department doesn't just fight fires any more.

Within the past year, Iuka's firefighters have become certified Emergency Medical Responders, also known as First Responders. To obtain this certification, these men successfully completed a 40 hour First Responder Course.

To maintain the certification, they must have a minimum of 28 hours of continuing education within two years, as well as attend a 12 hour refresher course and have a current CPR card. Many of Iuka's volunteer firefighters and volunteers in other local volunteer fire departments have received the training as well.

The Iuka Fire Department's participation in the EMR program and their response to medical

emergencies are real assets to the ambulance service. Often, the fire department can arrive at a scene before the ambulance and have the patient ready to be transported. thus saving valuable time. Dale White, County Coroner and employee of the Iuka Hospital Ambulance Service says of the EMR program, "I think it's one of the greatest things that could happen in Emergency Medical Services. It's something smaller towns like Iuka are doing that bigger towns (already) do."

Members of the Iuka Police Department are also enthusiastic about the program. Iuka's Assistant Police Chief, Randy Stringer said, "They provide a valuable assistance to the police, but more so to the ambulance service and in aiding the accident victim. They relieve the police so they can work the accident and control traffic." He further added, "They also clean up debris afterward."

Although participating in the EMR program does bring the Iuka Fire Department up to date with other fire departments, this is not

the sole reason for the endeavor. "We are public servants and we want to serve our community in every way we possibly can." states Assistant Fire Chief Brian R. Grissom. "We want Iuka to have a fire department they're proud of."

Cheese is one of the best sources of calcium. Certain kinds of cheese, such as aged Cheddar, Swiss and Monterey Jack, even buffer the teeth against the acids that cause decay.

Aged cheddar cheese aids the remineralization of tooth surfaces and arrests the early development of cavities. Cheese eaten with a meal can help counter the effects of the acids produced by the bacteria in plaque; it may even be best to eat cheese at the end of the

Calcium builds strong jaw bones, decay-resistant teeth and healthy gums. The alveolar (jaw) bone depends heavily on calcium for its well-being. Scientific studies have linked low calcium intake over a long period of time with jawbone loss.

In addition to calcium, dairy foods contain magnesium, phosphorus and a number of vitamins, all important to dental and general health. People who don't have special weight or cholesterol problems may choose to consume wholemilk products in moderation. For calorie counters and those on lowcholesterol diets, nonfat and low fat dairy products are excellent

Overcoming Astigmatism With a normal eye, rays of light entering the cornea come to a single focal point on the retina, in the back of the eye. However, if the from surface of the eye tends to be oval than round, rays of light entering the cornea at one point may focus on the retina, but light rays entering the cornea at a different point may fall short of, or extend beyond, the retina. This is the most common form of the condition called astigmatism.

Astigmatism tends to be a problem first in childhood around the age of 12. Even slight degrees of uncorrected astigmatism may headaches, fatigue, and squinting. If it becomes progressively worse. astigmatism can blurred or distorted vision.

Millions of people correct their astigmatism by wearing spectacles. Because there are an infinite number of sizes shapes and curvatures to the eye, special care has to be taken to prescribe glasses for people with astigmatism.

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#### Cat's Itch May Be Food Allergy

If your cat is allergic to specific ingredient in his die that allergy will most likel gran show itself as itchy skin her food brui Clinical signs of hypersensitivity may include gastrointestinal upse or respiratory problems, bu the most common sign i

Food hypersensitivity is the Abu third most common allergit skin disease in cats. Some d the foods that have been reported to cause felim hypersensitivity include milk beef, mutton, pork, horsemea fish and eggs. Most cats (about 70 percent) who suffer food hypersensitivity have been eating the offending diet for longer than two years.

Laboratory tests have no proved very helpful diagnosing hypersensitivity and drus such as corticosteroids, only provide temporary relief for the patient. Changing from one commercial pet food # another is rarely effective because most commercial diets contain many of the same ingredients.

However, since the mai symptom of hypersensitivity is itching. best way to confirm diagnosis is to place to animal on a hypoallergent diet such as Prescription Di Feline d/d, then look for decrease in itching. generally takes two months more of feeding a prescribe R diet before a diagnosis can made.

If the results are favorable then it is likely the per problem was caused by specific food. Althou diagnosis of hypersensitivity can difficult and required feedi a hypoallergenic diet, once : offending ingredient has be eliminated, the outlook controlling the problem excellent.

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### **Notice Of Change In Collections** Of Past Due Accounts For TCFPA

Tishomingo County Electric's policy has always been to grant, subject to management approval, occasional extensions of time to pay electric bills Unfortunately, a number of individual consumers have abused this privilege and caused additional collection efforts and created chronic past due balances.

This abuse has caused the board of directors to establish a more rigid collection policy for past due balances:

1. Approximately 3 to 4 days after the due date of the bill, a past due notice will be mailed to the customer at the same address as stated on the bill. This past due notice will give a date after which service will be terminated. No additional notice will be given.

2. TCEPA's collector will be required to terminate service if the account has a past due balance when he arrives unless the total past due balance is paid to him.

3. Customers who have not received an extension of time to

pay within the preceding twelve (12) calendar months may be granted an extension subject to management approval. No more than one extension will be granted in any twelve month period.

4. This policy becomes effective April 3, 1998. All past due balances must be paid by this

5. Collections will continue in March under existing policy. TCÉPA provides following payment options:

1. An automatic draft service for customers who wish to pay electric bills without the worry of missing due dates.

2. Level payment plan for customers with approved credit

3. Due date change to the 5th of the month for customers on Social Security or once-a-month retirement benefits with approved credit history.

4. Drop box payment receptacles at the Iuka office and Belmont City Hall.

### National Child Abuse/Neglect Prevention Month

On behalf of the Tishomingo County Family and Children's Services Division of the Department of Human Services, I would like to invite everyone to join Mississippi's Blue Ribbon campaign. For the second year, Mississippians are joining together in a statewide effort to call attention to the problem of child abuse and neglect. The Mississippi Department of Human Services is spearheading this effort in support of April being es for designated National Child Abuse/Neglect Prevention Month. All across the state, groups are planning awareness campaigns in hopes of making other Mississippians understand the depth of this problem.

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Volunteers are spreading blue throughout their ribbons communities to show visible support for this cause. The blue ribbon became a symbol of child

abuse and neglect in Virginia in

1989. A Chesapeake grandmother sed one as a memorial for her 3 year old grandson, who was murdered by his mother's abusive boyfriend. Bonnie Finney, the grandmother, tied a blue ribbon on her own van as a reminder of the food bruises of child abuse. She then ruited friends, neighbors, and finally the local child abuse prevention agency to do the same. This campaign was officially accepted by the Virginia Child Prevention

Coalition in 1990, and has since spread across the country.






Effect Of Recent Cold On **Plants** 

weather cold experienced couple of weeks ago has damaged some landscaped plants. As a general rule, broadleaf evergreens are generally more sensitive to cold damage. Such plants include pyracantha, azalea, ligustrum, photinia, boxwood, and others. Generally, these plants are not damaged by seriously temperatures ranging from the low to mid 20 degree F range.

However, unseasonable mild temperatures through January and February, pushed many woody ornamental plants and orchard crops (peaches and plums) ahead of schedule. Consequently, the abrupt change to much lower temperatures

meant that these plants were more vulnerable to cold temperatures and accompanying cold winds. Thus, it's likely many plants which weren't provided cold temperature protection were darnaged. What can you do at this point in the season? The best rule of thumb is wait and see how much of your affected plantings greens up in early spring. At that time, dead twigs will be evident, and these can be removed by pruning. Also, damaged plants should be mulched. It's likely we'll experience hot and dry conditions during the summer. Cold damaged plants tend to suffer moisture stress, so mulching will help conserve moisture, and reduce soil temperatures - both of which will increase chances of plant survival. Avoid over-fertilizing shrubs which are under stress. A limited root system, or injured lower stem area, shouldn't be pushed with excessive fertilization Nitrogen (especially high

fertilizer), since this practice can create additional problems. Look for split bark on the trunk and branches. Then layers may curl, and peel back — this is a cold weather damage symptom. In many instances, plants exhibiting these type symptoms won't recover and replacement will be necessary. We can't control the weather, but there are a few tricks which will improve chances of plan survival from cold damage. Mulching at the appropriate time (after the first freeze in the fall), with pine straw, bark, or other materials will help, as will proper fertilization during the fall months to promote winter hardiness. According to horticulturists, a light application of muriate of potash at a rate of one teaspoonful per small plant and one tablespoonful per large plant (about five feet) will act as a good plant "anti-freeze." Avoid using high nitrogen fertilizers, such as ammonium nitrate, urea, or 13-13-13-, during the fall.

### Drug Charges Brought Against Iuka Resident

Tishomingo County authorities arrested an Iuka man Saturday on drug charges.

Ronald Erikson, 41, of 300 N. Main, Apt. B, Iuka, was arrested Saturday, March 21, and charged with possession of marijuana with intent to distribute, according to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith.

Smith explained that Iuka Police Officer Robert Till, who had been gathering evidence against Erikson, tipped off the Sheriff's Department of a drug pickup involving the suspect. At that time, the Sheriff and Officer Rodney Pannell waited for the subject to leave for work.

"With the information we had gotten, we stopped Erikson after he left for work," Smith explained. "When we asked him for consent to search his home, he then admitted having the illegal substance there.

Smith said a search of the home netted a quarter pound of marijuana found in several separate bags. Also confiscated during the search was a sawed-off shotgun and another automatic firearm, the Sheriff stated.

Erikson has been released from the Tishomingo County Jail on a \$5,000 bond, the Sheriff confirmed.

## **Belmont Police Recover Stolen Items and Make Arrests**

Policemen in Belmont have made several arrests recently in three burglaries and one drug sting.

Burglaries

In the first of the burglaries, Jason Darracott, 26, of Red Bay has been arrested in connection with the theft of several items taken from a vehicle parked at a Belmont apartment complex, according to Belmont Police Chief Donald Reno.

Reno explained that Darracott has been charged after he took items from the vehicle of Tony Hall at the Capital Apartments. Items totaling from \$700 to \$1,000 included four drills, a saw, miscellaneous tools, brief case, tool box, tool tray filled with tools and other items.

In a separate incident, a battery and stereo speakers were stolen from a Belmont resident. Chief Reno said these items, too, were recovered and returned to the owner. The individuals responsible were arrested, charged and processed through the Belmont court system, as well, according to Reno.

Drug Arrests

A month long drug sting has resulted in the arrest of six individuals on drug charges, Reno said.

Charges have been made for possession of marijuana, paraphernalia, possession of a controlled substance and possession of marijuana-more than an ounce. Three of those arrested have pleaded guilty in Belmont City Court, Reno said. He explained that the names of those involved are not being released at this time because of an ongoing investigation within the city.

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

Finch Scruggs died in Tishomingo County on August 8, 1863. According to the late Jobie Scruggs, a great-grandson who owned the old homeplace, Finch is buried in the Scruggs Family Cemetery located behind the Jobe Scruggs Home. Nancy died April 18, 1868 in Yalobusha County. She is buried in a family cemetery at the original homesite of her son Dr. Albert M. Scruggs in the Hardy Station Community near Water Valley. She once had a large monument over her grave, but timber cutters came through and demolished it. All that is left is the base of the monument which I saw in 1990. Preserving history even for prominent people is difficult enough. But history should be preserved for all




























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The Scruggs Family were among the earliest settlers in Tishomingo County. The name first appears on county land records in 1836, but other records indicate that they did not reside here until 1841. The majority of the Tishomingo County Scruggs' are descended from Finch but a few descend from his brother Allen of Lawrence County, Alabama. Finch Scruggs, my 3rd greatgrandfather, was born 13 July 1772 in Buckingham Co., Va. He was a son of James Scruggs, but his mother's name is unknown to me. Finch married Nancy Thomas in Cumberland Co., Va. on 19 July 1792. Nancy, a daughter of Jesse and Mary Thomas, was born 27 October 1773 in Powhatan County. They had eleven children - nine sons and two daughters. Of the nine to reach adulthood, two were doctors, one a judge, two farmers, and four were ministers in the Methodist Church. One of the minister sons was a missionary to the Cherokee Indians during the time Sequoyah was developing the Cherokee alphabet. Finch and Nancy were native Virginians. They were in Cumberland County in 1794 when their first child

Mary S. was born. From 1797 to 1803 they lived in Buckingham County. By 1803 they were in Williamson County, Tennessee. There Finch was found on many land records and was the executor of his father-in-law Jesse Thomas' estate. From 1806 to 1808 their records are found in Davidson County. From 1811 to 1820 they are back in Williamson County.

County, Alabama by 1821 just two years after Alabama attained statehood. There finch was active in the Canaan Methodist Church. He performed many marriages and preached the gospel to some of the first families of this recently formed


county. In 1837 he was appointed advising executor of his good friend Samuel Savage's estate. At that time Savage was reported to be the richest man in Lauderdale County, and his son George was in partnership in a general merchandise store with Finch's son Allen F. This business was on the site where Lamar Furniture Company is today.

By 1841 Finch and Nancy Scruggs are living in Tishomingo County. Although he is approaching old age, Fince is actively involved in the formation of this fledgling county. One of the items that showed his devotion to Nancy was a deed record dated June 1, 1848 in which the following sentiments are found: "...I, Finch Scruggs of the county of Tishomingo and State of Mississippi being desirous the better to provide for the maintenance and support of, and in consideration of the love and

affection which I have and bear for my dear wife Nancy Scruggs have and do hereby these presents give, grant and convey to her...to her sole and

In a letter dated January 23, 1855

Tommy gave it his all. When it
came to baseball this natural athlete found his sport.

"He was a dedicated athlete," says former Iuka High School Baseball Coach Bryson Mann, "You didn't have to say much to

him. You could just stand back and watch him play." Coach Mann saw early that Tommy was working for a dream. He came to practice early and after practice brother Scotty would hit balls out for him to catch. Tommy was a high school stand out. He made the all star teams and did well in the summer leagues. The scouts thought he was good recruiting material for the "big leagues".

After graduating in 1964, Tommy signed with the Dodger organization in that same year. He played in the Florida State League for the 1965 season. The next year he went up the trail to B-Ball playing in Albuquerque, New Mexico. There were a number of leagues to work through in those days and Tommy felt in his heart that his dedication would pay off. Baseball was still fun despite the long hot summers, the road trips and endless hours of practice.

Tommy was finally signed into the AA minors on a team in Spokane, Washington. This was a farm team for the Los Angeles Dodgers. Hall of Fame Dodger Manager Tommy LaSorta told a Dean family member years later how he went to Spokane to watch Tommy play. He called the home office and recommended the young shortstop had impressive hands and LaSorta called him up to play for the Dodgers.

Those talented hands landed him a spot in the Majors that lasted seven years. Tommy spent spring training with the Dodgers before being traded on opening day in a deal with the San Diego Padres. Tommy spent five good seasons with the Padres.

Tommy was faithful to his upbringing. He was a country boy and a Christian who didn't smoke or drink. He once told that when the team went into a restaurant that the Manager would order for the team. "Beer for everyone but that guy," and would point to Tommy. "He'll have a tall glass of

milk!" Yes, he was faithful to his family values and his religious values. He missed his family but stayed busy trying to be the best he could be.

When he did make it home, Tommy spent time with a beautiful young girl from home. Diane Phifer was a striking lady whose looks caught Tommy's eye, her voice caught his ear and her sweet personality and sense of humor caught his heart. She shared his values, hopes and dreams. Now it was time to meet the family. Tommy asked her to join him one Sunday with the Dean family at the Rocky Springs Methodist Church.

The first Sunday at Rocky Springs was a true test of their relationship. The congregation, made up of a lot of Tommy's kinfolk, got up to sing the first hymn. Diane has a strong, beautiful operatic voice that could be heard over the crowd. She unexpectedly started snickering and laughing as all heads turned. She had to sit down and compose herself. As Tommy told the story years later he grinned saying, "I had heard Diane sing but that was the first time she had heard me sing." Tommy snickered, "It says in the Bible to make a "joyful noise" and that is about all I could ever do. So with Diane singing beside me, I thought her lovely voice would drown me out." Diane was caught off guard when she heard Tommy sing and according to Tommy, "Right there in front of all my relatives and everybody at Rocky Springs, the girl

Things must have gone better after that. Eventually Diane Phifer became Mrs. Tommy Dean. They were blessed with a son, "little Tommy", as I always knew him and later a daughter, Ginger. They were the apples of their Daddy's eye. After marrying Diane and the kids came along, being out on the road anywhere always seemed like a long way from home. Tommy played three years with San Diego before retiring in 1971. He now had a family of his own to raise and wanted to do that back home.

He went to work at Hall's Printing, which is now World Color, in Corinth, Ms. The company prints *National Geographic* magazine. Tommy has worked for them almost twenty five years and likes his job.

Tommy and Diane are members of Iuka Baptist Church. The Deans are involved in many church activities. Diane attends Sunday School and sings in the choir. Tommy is a deacon and is active on several church committees and is a faithful member of the Pete Byrom Sunday School Class. He also is a member of the Men's Brotherhood and helps out with many other church programs and activities.

I really got to know Tommy this past year through the AWANA program sponsored by our church. I knew that his own children were raised in a loving Christian home and nurtured by their parents to live up to their full potential. I had no doubt that he would be a good leader and have a positive influence on these kids. I wasn't wrong either!

After one AWANA meeting, we stood outside waiting for the children to be picked up. Tommy and I began talking about the importance of helping these kids and serving the Lord. Tommy said even though he had always been active in church, one event in his life had drawn him closer to serv-

ing his Lord. Several years back his sister, Joan Dean Holly, was diagnosed with Cancer. She fought bravely and the family grew closer than they had ever been. Their parents had been together over sixty years and you are sort of prepared for them going. In this case, a younger sister's battle for each day made Tommy aware of his own mortality. Joan put all her fears in God's hands and let His will be done. Her faith inspired Tommy to look at himself and listen to what God wanted him to do in His service.

Tommy said he then became active in many church activities and felt that each door God had opened for him was another blessing. His son, now grown and living in Dallas, Texas, was involved with a group like AWANA and on a recent trip to visit, Tommy Sr. went with his son to a meeting. He saw first hand how many kids needed love and guidance in their lives and was under conviction to do something back home. When the call came out asking for AWANA leaders, Tommy volunteered. "These kids have really been a blessing to me," he says, "I can be dead tired and come to a meeting and these boys and girls will fill me with their energy and I leave each week with a blessing." I feel the same way as a leader in

I remember when Tommy spoke to the group about his base-ball career. He brought pictures of him playing against Earnie Banks and a bat signed by Cardinal Pitcher Stan Musual. Tommy had stories of playing against the legendary Willie Mays and had a

baseball signed by Micky Mantle. He told of a game in July 1969 that was paused when the Apollo spacecraft was about to land on the moon. Tommy recalled, "They counted down from 10 slowly, FIVE, FOUR, THREE, TWO . . ONE . Then that whole stadium in Atlanta got real quiet, everyone

was silent." Tommy smiled real big and told how the crowd came to their feet as if someone had hit a home run with the bases loaded in the ninth when the announcer said, "They made it!".

Tommy told the kids that the celebration he witnessed would be nothing compared to the day Christ returned. He ended his testimony by saying, "I am on the greatest team ever known, a team that is always victorious and if you are on that team you will never be defeated!"

Our community baseball field is named in honor of Tommy Dean. He never made a million dollars playing baseball. He will likely never get rich at World Color yet he has provided a good living for his family, gave them support and love which led them

to lead successful lives of their own. I believe his riches await him in Heaven for all his humble works faithfully done here.

Whether there is a crowd or not at church at any service, I can say I have a seat saved with Tommy Dean that comes with a firm handshake, a warm grin and a sincere "How are you doing?" Anytime you see Tommy Dean, on the field or off, he is a REAL HERO!

### Hayden Ables Speaks To UDC

The lovely home of Mildred Hill was the location of the March 17th meeting of the John Marshall Stone Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

The guest speaker was Mr. Hayden Ables, Chancery Clerk of Tishomingo County. After each lady introduced herself, Mr. Ables spoke to the group. He began with an interesting story. About 1855 or 1856, a little girl was born in the proximity of Waterloo, Alabama. Her father had died, leaving only her mother, one younger & one older sister in the family. He had been part owner of a store where he had worked. Two years later while her mother was working in the same store, she met a man named Glover. Mr. Glover was a widower with four children. They later were married Mary Snider, the little girl of the story and the combined family moved down river to settle on his home place in Habersham in about 1861. Their home was on a farm with crops, livestocks & more land to be cleared. Mary was living there with her sisters and her half brothers & sisters. One day soldiers came by the homeplace to buy livestock. A short time later on April 6, 1862 the family heard the rumble of distant thunder. They went out on the porch to check on the storm. The storm became louder & louder. They sky turned black. The little girl was very frightened. The father came in from the field and got the family together. For most of two days the storm raged. The screams of human & animals could be heard. The little girl was very afraid. After three days the storm seemed to have ceased except for the screaming of animals & weeping of humans. Soldiers in gray passed by the house unlike the soldiers in blue who had been there before. The soldiers in blue came. Her new Dad took his family to relatives in Enville, Tennessee. After about a year they were able to go back home. Their fences and all the livestock were gone. Most of the

house had been torn down and used for various shelters and other things. Years later the storm the little girl heard and saw became known as the Battle of Shiloh. Mary told this family story to her daughter. Each generation told their children this story, and its was passed on down to Mr. Ables.

The next topic was about graves. The United States set up a Bureau of Graves Registry after the War Between the States. They started going back over the battle sites trying to identify and locate burial sites of soldiers. General Grant's policy was to bury the soldiers where they fell. The time being the factor. This is what was done in all the major battles until the great outcry after the Battle of the Wilderness. There were leaves and under brush in the forest. The woods caught fire. The wounded were burnt alive. Families came seeking relatives that were in the battle. Seeing the shallow burial sites of the soldiers with their decomposing arms and hands sticking up out of the ground caused the outcry. The fate of Union soldiers was sell documented. Confederate soldiers that didn't return home presumed to have died in the War. There are still many mass graves in various places still unidentified.

After reading letters and diaries one understands that the dangers of dying from polluted water and unsanitary conditions in the War were greater than being killed by a bullet from the enemy.

In Union prison camps, the names were prisoners documented, where captured,

wounds or illnesses, date of death, place of burial and graves were marked in most instances.

### FIP Sign-Up Underway

There will be a sign-up opportunity for private, nonindustrial forest landowners in Mississippi for the USDA Forestry Incentives Program (FIP), March 23-27, 1998.

To be eligible for cost-share assistance under FIP, a landowner must own no more than 1,000 acres of eligible land and have land suitable for producing marketable timber crops.

The minimum acceptable

acreage for FIP is 10 acres and an annual cost-share payment limit of \$5,000 per person.

The Forestry Incentives Program is designed to share treeplanting and forest-management expenses with eligible, private landowners to prevent future shortages of sawtimber, plywood logs and quality hardwood logs. Practices available under FIP are tree planting, stand improvement of forest trees, and site preparation. Due to the limited amount of funding Mississippi has received with the FIP program, open field planting will receive first priority.

The Forestry Incentives Program was authorized by Congress in 1978 to share the costs of tree planting, timber stand improvement, and other related practices on private, nonindustrial forest lands. It was reauthorized under the 1996 Farm (Federal Agriculture Improvement and Reform Act of 1996).
