Local Law Enforcement Officer Honored For Combating DUIs

A Mississippi Highway 'atrol Officer from Tishomingo lounty was one of fifty-one law enforcement officers in the state inducted into the 100-400 Clubs at an April 17 awards ceremony and luncheon for combating Mississippi's most serious roadway safety problem, driving under the influence (DUI) of alcohol and other drugs, during

The club was established by the Mississippi Division of Public Safety Planning in 1983 to honor officers who issued 100 or more DUI citations during the previous year. The individuals honored for 1997 made a total of 8,132 DUI arrests, an average of 159 per

MHSP Sgt. Rickie Marlar of Iuka was inducted into the 100 Club based on his 111 DUI arrests during the past year.

"Gaining membership in the 100-400 Clubs is not only about numbers," Public Safety Planning's executive director Ron Sennett said. "By removing more than 8,000 impaired drivers from our state roadways, these officers likely have saved many lives, those of the drivers arrested as well as other motorists. Every year alcohol is involved in more than 300 traffic fatalities."

Sandra Moffett, 100-400 Clubs coordinator, noted that "because the behavior of impaired motorists is not easy to predict, apprehending these individuals often is difficult and sometimes extremely dangerous. officers honored by the clubs, and other officers who apprehend impaired drivers, deserve the appreciation of every person who drives on Mississippi roadways."

New Stretch Of 4-Laned 72 To Be Opened Thursday

According to Northern District Transportation Commissioner Zack Stewart, twoway traffic on Highway 72 in Benton County will be switched to a recently completed stretch of four-lane highway Thursday at 2 p.m., weather permitting.

"The new four-lane section of Highway 72, which is approximately 8.5 miles in length, lies between the Marshall/Benton County Line and Highway 5," Stewart said. "Barricades on Highway 72 will be removed to allow drivers onto the roadway if the weather cooperates. If the weather is bad, the switch will be performed as soon as possible."

According to Jackie Harris, Mississippi Department of Transportation (MDOT) project engineer, drivers on Highway 72 are asked to pay close attention at the intersections of Highway 5 and Highway 7 and to read and follow all new traffic signs.

"Motorists sometimes tend to drive from habit; however, due to the recent construction, traffic patterns have changed," Harris said. "Motorists traveling through the area are encouraged to use extreme caution when accessing the four-lane highway from local crossroads.

"We added two new lanes parallel to the existing Highway 72," Harris said. rehabilitated the existing lanes."

Harris asks motorists to drive slowly and carefully through the area, as incidental work will be going on for the next three

Lehman-Roberts Co., of Memphis, Tenn., was awarded the contract to pave this section of highway with a low bid of \$10.6 million.

Stewart said this project is part of the 1987 Four-Lane Highway Program, a massive legislative act to four-lane 1,086 miles of roadway in Mississippi.

"I am very pleased this much-needed work is being accomplished for the people of Benton County. A good highway system always fosters economic traveling public," Stewart said.

Mix sand with the seeds before broadcasting to help spread them more easily and evenly and then rake around the area to make sure there is good contact with the soil. Wildflowers require little water, fertilizer, and pest control. Because of their wide range of colors, they often attract butterflies and seed-eating birds.

The Best Sunglasses

Sunglasses are designed to meet two basic needs: comfort and protection from bright sunlight and the glare from snow, glass, chromium, asphalt, and other lightreflecting materials. They are also important in protecting your eyes from ultra-violet (UV) radiation. There are two kinds: UV-A and UV-B. UV-A has been shown to cause serious damage to the delicate vision mechanism inside the eye. Whereas exposure to UV-B over a period of many years can cause cataracts and damage the eye's retina.

Standard, tinted sunglasses will meet most people's needs. A good choice of tint is medium to dark gray because it will not affect your ability to see colors. Sunglasses that are polarized will reduce reflected glare. Some sunglasses photochromic or lightsensitive. They will darken or lighten depending on the amount of light.

If you want help in selecting a good pair of sunglasses, discuss it with your doctor of optometry.

My Friend, My Hero, My Librarians

A Series Of Articles By Christian Evans

"This is my favorite book." Forest Gump says as he holds a copy of "Curious George". "Mine too!" his son Forest Jr. says. This is a special book to me because it was the first book I ever checked out of the Iuka Elementary Li-

It was 1971 at the beginning of the school year when we first walked up the steps to the school library. Over twenty five years later. I can still remember my beautiful red-haired first grade teacher, Miss Linda Evans, introducing our class to Mrs. Lila Francis Foote. Mrs. Foote was the librarian who first introduced me to the new worlds of books I would visit throughout my life in the

When she was through speaking to us, we were free to look around to pick out a book. My parents made sure I had plenty of little books at home to read, well, at least look at the pictures and have read to me anyway. The whole concept of picking out any book I wanted, looking at it and returning it was pretty exciting! This meant that I had a RESPON-SIBILITY to borrow the book and take care of it before I returned it.

As I looked through the many shelves of books, I guess one in particular caught my eye. It was a big faded yellow book with two firemen walking with a monkey between them. "This looks good," I must have thought, "I like monkeys". He was a cute little fellow named CURIOUS GEORGE. That was also the title of the book by H.A. Rey but I couldn't read that well yet. I liked the pictures so I got in line to check out at the desk. Miss Evans helped us write out our names on the card while Mrs. Foote took the return date stamper and blotted some ink from the ink pad and stamped the card she kept and the little envelope inside the

books. "Oh, I think you'll like this one!" Mrs. Foote said as she checked me out. "Take care of it Chris and have it back in a week."

I looked at the pictures in the book when I got home that afternoon. At bedtime. Mom or Dad would always read us a story. That night my brother John and I were treated to the tales of Curious George meeting the Man In the Yellow Hat. They sailed on a ship from Africa and George fell overboard and was rescued. He later dialed the fire department after seeing someone use the phone. This set off a false alarm. George had been left alone in the house. George was in trouble so when he was caught by the firemen, he was put in jail. He later escaped then caused a stir when he grabbed some balloons and floated off. Poor George was rescued by the Man In the Yellow Hat who paid the vender for the balloons and took George to his new home at the zoo.

It was an action packed story! When it came time to return the book, I did so reluctantly. "You can check this book out anytime you want Chris," Mrs. Foote told me, "but there are a lot more to read and enjoy." Eventually, I could read the books myself. I would check out "Curious George" and Mrs. Foote made sure she had other books in the "Curious George" series. I also enjoyed (and literally wore out) books on the presidents and the Civil War Mrs. Foote had for us

in the library. (Thank you Mrs. Foote!)

When we moved into the new Iuka Elementary School Building in 1974, we had a brand new library and a librarian of our own. Mrs. Carolyn McVay was wonderful in helping us learn about how to use the library. She helped us to broaden our horizons through books and other media. This was before the era of VCR's and computers. She showed us films on little frame by frame

projectors. The record or cassette tape would "ding" every time we were to change the frame. Many of us remember "The Legend of Sleepy Hollow" with the headless horseman and Ichabod Craine and "Paul Bunyan" with Babe the Blue

My favorite books from this era were books on history and space. There is no telling how many times I checked out " P.T. 109" or the biography "John F. Kennedy". I also recall such books as "Race to the Moon". I recalled stories of John Glenn, First American in Space, and Neil Armstrong, the first man to step on the moon. (I got to meet both men together in a chance encounter some years later.) I was first introduced to these and many other heroes through books.

The same could be said of my introduction to President Harry Truman. Like me, young Harry had poor eyesight yet he had read every book in the Independence, Missouri Library by the time he was 10 years old. He later in life memorized the eye chart so he could sneak into the army to fight in WW I.

I also remember fun books like "How to Eat Fried Worms" and the 1975 edition of the Guinness Book of World Records. (I always wondered what the world record for eating fried worms was and the name of the idiot who set this mark of lifetime achievement.) None the less, I got a lot from these years. (Thank you Mrs. Mc-

The Iuka Public Library is another place I spent a lot of my time in those formative years. Mrs. Freda Sanderson has helped me through many years of research and curiosity about many subjects. I recall many summer days working on Boy Scout Merit Badges from a set of booklets in the library while working toward my Eagle Scout Award. I also remember meeting friends like Sarah Ruth Walker and Tom

Wilemon to study or work at the library which was then, is now and always will be a safe place for kids to "hang out and have some quiet visits!"

Sims helping as a receptionist at the library when I was young. Ms. Nora Welch has also worked with the public library for a number of years as has Ms. Joanie Lambert. All the library workers are courteous and helpful. They are all ready to lend a helping hand with big smiles whenever help is needed. (To Mrs. Sanderson and all the staff and supporters of the Iuka Public Library, thank you!)

High school is a difficult time for anyone. We learn to research, do reports and start spending more and more time reading on our own. Our high school library, oddly enough, had been moved to include the room where Miss Evans' first grade classroom had been. Our librarian was a special person to me, Mrs. Nancy Daniel. From her, I learned the Dewey Decimal system that helped me locate any book, periodical or other reference material I was looking for. We also learned how to use the card catalogue. I spent many study hall hours in this

One of the most memorable

days we spent in the library was a roomful of us crowded around an old T.V. on a rolling cart watching the dramatic events surrounding the first inauguration of President Ronald Reagan. We saw the final hours of the tormented Carter presidency try desperately to claim a final victory in winning last minute release of the hostages held captive in Iran. This turned out to be a first victory for Reagan as they were released moments after President Reagan took office and Carter was on a plane home to Georgia. Unlike the Kennedy assassination or the moon landings, we watched this day in history unfold in the library.

I took a speech class under Mrs. Daniel my senior year. We had a great class and did all kinds of things from hearing Melissa Murrah demonstrate how to cut up a chicken to videotaping an anti drug program with Micheal Puckett and an anti crime piece with Cynthia Underwood. We also did commercials, (I did a used car commercial where I sold my best friend's RX 7 that I thought was pretty good! I WON"T LIE TO YOU!). We also did speeches on subjects such as current events, health issues and politics. The class helped some overcome shyness or nervousness while many of us learned how to focus ourselves when speaking in front of a group. Sometimes this was tough even for me. I remember having to give one on a topic we had to reach into a cup and pull out on a piece of paper. Mine was titled "My First Kiss". (I should say that this is one of the shortest, indescript, embarrassing and boring speeches anyone ever gave in that class!) Now I know what she was trying to prepare us for after seeing the President give several small speeches denying a kiss . . . and a few other things. (And back then I wanted to be president! Oh how times change!) I am grateful for the skills I learned in this class and for the other lessons I learned from Mrs. Nancy Daniel. (Thank you Mrs. Daniel!)

From these humble shelves and card catalogues I went on to study in several state university and law libraries at Mississippi State University, The University of Mississippi, Georgetown University, American University and a number of museums and archives. I even earned a certificate for a course in using the Congressional Record Service Computer Research Service from the Library of Congress while I worked in Washington D.C. in 1985. I am sure that advanced computers have changed this system like they have every other library records system in the world.

Even the Iuka Elementary School Library has changed. Ac-

cording to Mrs. Pam Cutshall, who has been school librarian since 1979, computers have replaced the use of card catalogues entirely. (The old heavy wooden box sits unused as an antique reminder from the past.). Computers have also increased the research capabilities of the children through the Internet and other media programs and visual aids. Despite these advancements, Mrs. Cutshall is the first to tell you that there is no substitute for a child reading a book. (Thank you Mrs. Cutshall!)

In observance of National Library Week, April 20-25, I gathered a few young friends at the Iuka Public Library one evening. There is a large plush Curious George in the children's section of the library. We sat on his lap while several of my former librarians and library friends looked on . I read from my first library book "Curious George."

I am proud of our libraries and am proud to be a member of the "Friends of the Iuka Public Library". If you have a child you love, share the gift of reading with them. Help them help themselves by teaching them to read and working with their teachers in furthering their reading. You can help by encouraging the child to learn to use the libraries available to them.

There is a whole world inside every book and a library is a universe filled with many worlds to conquer. To all of the librarians who helped guide me through the worlds in the vast written universe of the library, I thank you for you are all my friends and will always be my HEROES!

Old Tishomingo Traces

Spring is a time of rejuvenation, planting and rebirth for most people, but for me it is the season for reminiscence. When I see a fragile violet timidly peeking from a cluster of vibrant green leaves, or a yard dotted with yellow dandelion blooms, magically I'm transformed into a flaxen-haired, freckled, barefoot country girl. Once again I am the carefree five year old who played leap-frog with her older brothers, made friends with the birds and butterflies, and liked to eat the wild delicacies Mother found and prepared in the springtime. During the midthorny to put in my Mason jar bouquet 1940's the countryside around our home in Happy Hollow was filled with other wild flowers. with luscious dandelion greens and tender shoots of poke sallet could be found on the burned-off ditch banks

surrounding our fields. From the front yard of our old homeplace I can clearly "see" Mother as she emerges through the screen door. Her face flushed from the intense heat of the Warm Morning stove where she has been laboring all morning. First, there was breakfast to cook and dishes to wash; now, she must have dinner ready by twelve noon. Under her left arm is a blue and white graniteware dishpan containing a butcher knife. She is dressed in a faded blue and white checked, gingham dress covered with an apron made from white flour sacks. She grabs an old, patched brown bonnet from its resting place on a rusty nail just inside the door. Mother told me that the bonnet originally belonged to Grandma Mary Bullard who had been badly burned as a young woman. Her black hair had been completely singed to the scalp, and until her death, she would not be seen without her bonnet. This story soon passed from my mind as I wondered where Mother was

As mother walked across the rough-hewn planks of the front porch, I asked her where she was going. In the background I could hear Ernest Tubb singing, "I'm walkin' the floor over you..." My sister Florine sang along as his voice "twanged" from our battery-operated radio.

As her eyes surveyed the yard's edge and the wooded area across the road by the hog lot, Mother told me that she was going to get us a mess of fresh sallet greens for dinner. I eagerly asked her if I could go as I jumped up and down causing little whirlwinds of dust to burst from between by bare toes. She told me I could help her find the dandelion greens, but I must hurry because Papa and my brothers would be home for dinner in a "shake of a lamb's tail." I begged Mother to let me take Baby Snooks, my pet Banty hen who was scratching contentedly

Clutching Snooks securely I followed Mother across the front yard which was scraped clean of grass and people didn't allow grass to grow in front of their homes. That was a sign of laziness. I skipped along behind Mother down the high steps that had been dug out in the red clay bank and covered with wide planks secured with wooden stobs. As we walked down the gravel road Mother named the untouchable weeds such as poison ivy, stinging nettle and cow itch vine. She pointed out the beautiful flowering plants with unusual names like Johnny-jump-up, sweet William

and black-eyed Susan. The brilliant pink blooms of the wild rose looked as pretty as they

smelled. The entire hillside seemed to be engulfed in their fragrance as they blossomed proudly along the red clay roadside. The wild roses were especially abundant just below our house on the left side of the road where they nearly filled a deep gully and climbed over the russet banks outshining all other vegetation in the area. There the fragrant plants bloomed profusely around my playhouse under a scraggly pine tree. The roses were my "pretend" flower garden. Quickly I learned that they were flowers to look at but not touch because the prickly stems were too

We were near the hog lot when Mother pointed toward a vibrant patch of green as she took the butcher knife from its resting place inside the dishpan. While she cut the tender dandelion leaves, she asked me if I knew how dandelion got its name. As I looked questioningly at her, she went on the leaves that did, indeed, resemble a lion's tooth, at least to the imaginative eyes of a child. A sticky, white fluid oozed from the cut end of the leaves. My inquisitive nature led me to ask Mother about the dandelion's milk. She quickly explained that was where all the vitamins were stored. The juicy greens would help one to grow strong, but I shouldn't eat too much, especially at suppertime, because they might cause me to wet the bed. I thought that my Mother was the smartest woman in the whole, wide world and that she knew everything. That was the "teacher" in her. Her father Sam Littlejohn was a school teacher and I guess she inherited this trait from him.

After the dishpan was filled with greens, we went back to the house and set the pan down by the well on the front porch. Mother drew a bucket of cool water and poured it over the dandelions. I put Snooks down to scratch with the other chickens and followed Mother to the garden at the foot of the hill below the house. (Today, our old garden site is Ruth and Hershel McDuffey's front yard). She gathered some mustard greens and a few green onions to mix with the dandelions.

As we came back into our yard, we walked underneath the bird boxes which Papa had built and erected on tall wooden poles. The purple martins who had claimed these boxes for homes darted down at us as we approached their territory. Screaming and swatting at the ferocious birds, I headed for the front porch. After mother washed and dried the dandelions, mustard and onions, she took our morning's harvest inside to the kitchen where she quickly chopped them into a salad.

As I sat on the bench behind the table covered with red and white checked oil cloth, I closely observed as she fried strips of fat until they were brown and crisp. All the while she was happily singing,

"Amazing grace, how sweet the sound..." That was her favorite song and to this day I cannot hear that song

without crying. My tears are not tears of sadness but tears of happy remembrances of my Mother and her goodness, not only to her children, but to all her friends and neighbors. When all the bacon was fried, Mother crumbled it, "accidentally" dropping a piece on the table for me to sample, and sprinkled it over the greens. She pushed the iron skillet of grease drippings to the back of the cook stove to keep them hot to pour over the dandelion sallet immediately before

Soon our large family was sitting around the dinner table laden with a delectable array of steaming pinto beans seasoned with fatback, a crusty pone of yellow cornbread, a bowl of fresh-churned butter, a gallon jug of buttermilk, and a tasty wilted sallet of dandelion greens smothered in hot


Mother's wonderful cooking skills is stilled remembered by all who was fortunate enough to have sampled a taste of them. A few years back, I visited my first cousin Strawberry Arnold at North Crossroads. He was terminally ill with cancer. He said he would give anything to have a bowl of dandelion greens like Aunt Irene fixed

them. I came back home and tried to find some young dandelions but they were all too tough to make into a salad. I bought some spinach and prepared it the way Mother did the dandelions. I took it to Strawberry. His wife Betty said he really enjoyed

Today, it has been 28 springtimes since I tasted my precious Mother's cooking. I think I'll go out and find some dandelions! ********

Yesterday, I received a letter from one of my double cousins Billie Bonds who lives in the Hubbard-Salem Community. She is preparing a story on the Hog College that used to exist in that area of the county. I never heard of it before but it sounds very







Mississippi House of Representatives News by State Rep. Ricky A. Cummings—District 1

Laws dealing with issues concerning our young people, domestic violence, the death penalty, highway work zones, frivolous lawsuits brought by inmates and toughening bad check penalties were all passed during the 1998 Legislative session.

The following is an overview of some of these laws:

One issue concerning our young people is teenage pregnancy, a major crisis in Mississippi. The state leads the nation in the number of children born out of wedlock. The legislature voted to make it the crime of statutory rape if someone of 17 years of age or older has sexual relations with another person of at least 14 years old, but under 16. Also, anyone who has sex with a child under the age of 14 can be convicted of statutory rape.

Additionally, a task force composed of several state leaders, including the governor and two appointees of House Speaker Tim Ford, was created to study the overall problem of teenage preg-

Another of the important bills we passed was one to allow a private company to construct a juvenile correction facility in Walnut Grove in Leake County. For too long, youthful offenders have had to share prison space with older, hardened criminals. This proposed facility will alleviate that, and others are planned if they become necessary.

Tallahatchie County. A private company will contract with the state to hold its prisoners, and also will be able to attract out-of-state prisoners and federal inmates. The project is viewed as a major economic development tool for Tallahatchie County, which has an unemployment rate above 17

Another new law makes domestic violence a crime. Cases of this type have sky-rocketed in recent years and we passed this legislation in hopes of deterring it.

One of the most important bills we passed was one to require the use of safety seats and seat belts by children of a certain age, regardless of what seat in which they were riding. The law includes enhanced fines for drivers who do not require children to use the safety devices. An average of 27 Mississippi children under the age of 8 lose their lives annually in automobile accidents, and more than 1,000 are injured. Out seat belt usage is the lowest in the country. We hope that by passage of this law, many young lives will

Another issue concerning young people was tackled by the legislature. A bill was passed which would lower the legal blood alcohol content for minors from .08 percent to .02 percent, in effect providing for "zero tolerance" for kids driving while intoxicated. This, too, will hopefully save the lives of many of Mississippi's

The way in which the penalty is carried out was cha by a recent bill. Death seme will now be carried out by injection and will occur at 6 rather than at the tradition of midnight.

The Peoples Holding Company Reaches Milestone

Net income for first quarter 1998 was \$2,854,725 (unaudited), or \$.49 per share compared to \$2,601,166, or \$.44 per share for first quarter 1997. Net interest income increased 5.38% and noninterest income grew 18.99% compared to 4.24% a year ago.

The holding company reached a milestone during first quarter by exceeding \$1 billion in assets. Total assets at first-quarter end were \$1,017,888,255, up 10.90% from \$917,808,757 a year ago. Return on average assets was 1.16%, matching the performance of first quarter 1997.

Total deposits at the end of first quarter were \$878,942,123 compared to \$789,524,278 for the same period 1997, an increase of 11.33%. Total loans were \$628,181,893, up 10.02% from \$570,958,308 at the close of first quarter 1997.

The company's shareholders of record of January 1, 1998, received a three-for-two stock split effected in the form of a 50% stock dividend issued January 20, 1998. On January 2, a quarterly cash dividend of twenty-two (\$.22) cents per share (prior to the stock split) was paid to shareholders of record December 31, 1997.

On March 10, the board of directors of the company declared an increase in the quarterly cash dividend for the twelfth consecutive year. The dividend was increased from fourteen and two-thirds (\$.1467) cents per share on a split-adjusted basis to seventeen and a half (\$.1750) cents and paid April 1 to shareholders of record March 23. Dividends for the first quarter 1998 were up 31% to \$1,025,413 compared to \$781,335 for the same period in 1997.

Listening to Mississippians

I can always count on my travels throughout Mississippi to give me not only break from the Washington scene, but a refreshing perspective on the w government should function, and how it should relate to the hard-working peop who make our nation tick. My time in the state during the Senate's recent East recess is a good example of this positive reinforcement. In the coming month will work to make sure the good suggestions I heard will become much more the simply theory, but real policy for real people.

I attended a number of Mississippi events, listening to a variety professionals, from small business owners to realtors, district attorneys, Boy Son executives and citizens in Centreville. They were a good cross-section Mississippians who gave me face-to-face feedback on how the bold tax policies a new Congressional leadership are benefiting our local and national economic They know tax cuts are a good thing, and wasted no time telling me even me sweeping changes are needed for our tax system. Input from those commu leaders indicated new initiatives like capital gains tax cuts, the \$500,000 to exemption on home sales and the Roth IRA are not only market stimulators, proof that the Senate leadership is headed down the right road.

However, the journey is far from over. There are growing concerns about a educational system, violence and stifling government mandates. I hear the concerns loud and clear. In fact, the Senate is currently taking on the education issue by considering the Coverdell A+ accounts measure. This bill will all parents to set up special tax-sheltered accounts for their child's public, or privi education. The financial independence provided to families in this bill will a long way toward addressing those educational concerns expressed to me.

Violence in schools, and on the streets, is also being seriously pondered in Senate. I believe our current juvenile justice system should be scrapped a replaced with one that can stand toe-to-toe with the violent nature of today juvenile crime. The current system is simply out of its league. It first protects violent offender's chances of rehabilitation, while putting justice second. system's priorities need to be reversed in order to minimize violent acts. Government mandates are also finally being questioned in Washington

Probably the most encompassing mandate is our cumbersome 40,000 page tax of We often forget, and some people many not even know, that our nation exis without an income tax until the early years of this century. Based on what I have heard, people in Mississippi want, and deserve, to again be free of excessive intrusive taxation. For example, after speaking to a group on the Gulf Coast A 14, I conducted an informal vote asking those gathered which tax they prefer consumption taxes, like those on sales, or the flat income tax, in which ever would pay the same percentage of income.

They choose the consumption tax by a 34-to-16 margin. Obviously! overwhelming two-to-one endorsement of the consumption tax carried no off weight like decisions on Capitol Hill, but my colleagues in the Senate shoulds

It was the reason for this informal vote's outcome which I found to be m interesting. This group did not choose the consumption tax because of its faire but because it would put the Internal Revenue Service out of business. consumption taxes as the primary financing mechanism for government, thell would be obsolete. Taxes would be paid immediately as we consume services. There would be no more tax forms, tax deadlines, or IRS audits. The something to think about, especially since we are seeing evidence that some it IRS are abusing their power.

Only time will tell if the IRS will be abolished, but I am glad we are talk about it in Mississippi. I will work toward bringing this dialogue to Washing as well. (4/20/98)

WEEKLY LOOK AT THE IUKA FIRE DEPARTMENT

It is 2:00 in the morning and you are awakened by the sound of your smoke alarm. Your sleepinduced stupor quickly fades as you realize what the sound means. Your house is on fire. After a frantic call to 911, you are outside, wringing your hands and fervently wishing the fire department would arrive. But you wait, it seems, for an eternity. Flames are now visible at the back of the house and heavy smoke is pouring through the gable vents.

You are joined in your heartpounding vigil by a police officer and a passer-by. Two or three volunteer firefighters come skidding into the drive, but they are powerless without their apparatus, which is on its way. The fire department is not a mile away, but it is an all-volunteer department. Someone had to receive the call, get out of bed, get dressed and then drive to the station to respond with the truck. All this is taking valuable time, but that's the way it has to be. You live in a small town lacking the funds to hire a full-time crew.

You are sleeping soundly when the tone on your fire radio goes off. Any tone wakes you up, but this is the one that summons your volunteer department. You

are wide-awake in seconds, grabbing anything you can find to wear, running out the door to your car. You are the volunteer closest in proximity to the fire department, so you radio the

others and tell them you are going to get the fire truck. Another volunteer arrives at the department just as you do, and he leaves before you in the mini-pumper. When you arrive on the scene,

the mini-pumper has already been emptied of the 320 gallons it holds. The house is rapidly being engulfed, with smoke billowing from the windows and doors and flames flickering above the roofline. The closest fire hydrant is several hundred yards away. You drive the truck to the hydrant, and after attaching a hose, drive slowly back to the fire scene, laying a line. You can't help but think that the house might have been saved if only you could've been here sooner.

The above scenario is based on a real incident, and it is not at all uncommon. Ninety-nine percent of fire departments in Tishomingo County are volunteer departments. Small cities and towns simply do not have the budget needed to hire full-time

firefighters. Volunteers bear thé burden of fire protection in these areas. They are dedicated and hardworking, doing their best with what they have to work with. Many times they are over-worked and under-appreciated, but they continue to give of their time and energy to the communities they serve. The next time you see a volunteer firefighter, tell him or her that you appreciate all they do - it might just make their day.
