Special Election To Be Held For Office Tishomingo County Tax Assessor

Donna H. Dill, Circuit Clerk, is that due to the resignation of Tax Assessor, Jimmy T. Bell, there will be a Special Election held on Tuesday, November 3, 1998.

This election will be held on a regular General Election day. If necessary, a run-off election will be held two weeks later on Friday, November 17, 1998.

According to Dill, all candidates will run in the November Special Election as Independent Candidates.

To qualify as an Independent Candidate, each candidate will be required to collect on petition a minimum of fifty (50) signatures of registered voters in Tishomingo

County petitioning that the candidate's name be placed upon the ballot of the November 3, 1998, Special Election as a candidate for the Office of Tax Assessor. This petition may be picked up at the Circuit Clerk's Office when the candidate comes to qualify for this office.

Anyone wishing to run for the Office of Tax Assessor should qualify to run on or before Friday, September 4, 1998, at 5:00 p.m.

Iuka Woman Rescued By Postal Worker

Lettie O'Bryant, who lives on Quitman Street in Iuka, probably never thought of her mail deliverer, Dorothy Honeycutt, as a hero until she came to her rescue last Monday in a crisis situation.

Mrs. O'Bryant, who has severe arthritis, had gone out into her yard to feed her cats and fell. She tried, unsuccessfully, to get up, and began calling for help.

According to Mrs. O'Bryant's daughter, Martha Thweat, her mother had gone out a little after 8 a.m. and then fell. She had apparently lain in the yard for about two hours calling for help when Dorothy Honeycutt came by on her mail route and heard her.

Dorothy stopped and went to Mrs. O'Bryant's neighbors, W.T. and Betty Dexter, to get help.

"We are so thankful that Ms. Honeycutt heard mother and took the time to stop and get help," Martha stated. "We are really grateful to her."

Mrs. O'Bryant's niece, Amanda Mobley stated that she goes by to check on her aunt every day. However, it is usually around 5 p.m. when she goes by.

"If Dorothy had not found her, she could have possibly lain there all day, until I came by," Amanda said.

Dorothy said she was just very thankful that Mrs. O'Bryant was all right. She said the O'Bryant house is the second stop on her 66 mile route (route 6) which includes 485 customers.

Two Unrelated Drug Arrests Made By The Tish. Co. Sheriff's Department

An Alcorn County man and a Tishomingo County man have been arrested recently in two unrelated drug busts at the Victorian Inn in Iuka.

Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith said that his department received information from Alcorn County officials last week concerning the possible drug activity of an Alcorn County man who was staying at the Victorian Inn in Iuka.

Smith said after obtaining a consent to search order, Sheriff's Department Officers entered the room of Jerry E. King, 53, of Corinth and found drugs and drug-related paraphernalia in his possession.

"Mr. King had in his possession a couple of rocks of crack (a form of cocaine), other crack melted in a spoon, 12 hypodermic needles and a pipe used to smoke the drug," Smith

said.

King was arrested and taken to the Tishomingo County Jail where he was later freed on \$5,000 bond.

In an unrelated case, surveillance at another room of the Victorian Inn Monday night has led to the arrest of Iuka resident James R. Southward, 38, on charges of possession of crack cocaine, drug-related paraphernalia and possession of marijuana and beer.

Smith explained that Southward will not be eligible for release on bond because he was on probation at the time of his arrest. Since these charges are a violation of his parole agreement, the suspect has had a hold placed on him by the Mississippi Department of Corrections. Southward's prior conviction also stemmed from possession of drugs, Smith confirmed.

June Circuit Court Ends Returning Guilty Verdicts and Several Pleading Guilty

The June term of Circuit Court in Tishomingo County ended last week with the jury in one trial finding the defendant guilty and also with several others pleading guilty to charges against them.

In a trial which lasted three days, Douglas "Doug" Gray, 25, of Belmont was found guilty on the charge of grand larceny.

According to assistant district attorney Arch Bullard, after just 45 minutes of deliberation, the jury found Gray guilty of the theft of a bull dozer, a Mac dump truck and a low boy trailer from a construction site on Highway 4. The equipment was owned by Collier and Windham Construction, Inc. of Belmont.

Gray was sentenced Friday, June 12, by Judge Frank Russell to five years, which was suspended (pending good behavior and that no further laws are violated by the defendant), and 5 years supervised probation. He was also required to pay costs of \$3,388, a fine of \$1,000 and restitution. This trial had originally been set for a term of circuit court in 1996, according to Bullard.

Among the several guilty pleas entered in Circuit Court last week were the following:

Ronald Michael Montgomery pleaded guilty to conspiracy to sell marijuana, more than one ounce. He was sentenced to a term of five years, suspended pending good behavior and no further violations of the law. The sentence will run concurrent with a previous sentence. He was ordered to pay court costs of \$248 and a 2 percent bond fee of \$200.

Charles E. Walker, Jr. pleaded guilty to count one-burglary and larceny of a dwelling and count two-burglary and larceny of a dwelling. In count one, the defendant received a 10 year suspended sentence and five years supervised probation. He was also required to pay court costs of \$248 and \$400 for a 2 percent bond fee. On count two, he was sentenced to a ten year suspended sentence, to run concurrent with count one.

Terris Robinson, originally sentenced to probation for the possession of marijuana, more than an ounce, less than a kilogram on December 17, 1996, violated the terms of his original probation and had his probation revoked. The court document stated that Robinson failed to 1. report to supervising field officer, 2. to pay monthly supervision fees and 3. to pay court costs. He was sentenced to complete the Regimented Inmate Discipline Program. If he successfully completes this program, he will then be placed on five years supervised probation. If he does not successfully complete the program, he will then have to serve three years in custody. Robinson was also ordered to pay \$248 in court costs and a 2 percent bond fee of \$200. He was also ordered to pay all supervision fees up to this date.

Anthony Lambert, 3190 Fulton Rd., Iuka, pleaded guilty to charges of possession of LSD, a schedule I controlled substance. He received a three year sentence and was placed on the Intensive Supervision Program/House Arrest. He was also ordered to pay a fine of \$1,000, plus \$110 to the Tupelo crime lab, \$248 court costs and a 2 percent bond fee of \$100.

Christopher Moore pleaded guilty to possession of marijuana more than an ounce, but less than one kilogram. He was sentenced to three years on the Intensive Supervision Program/House Arrest. He was fined \$1,000, ordered to pay the Tupelo Crime

Lab \$110, court costs of \$248 and a 2 percent bond fee of \$100. Following the ISP, the defendant will be placed on two years supervised probation.

Donald J. Peek, Jr., AKA J.R. pleaded guilty to burglary of a dwelling and was sentenced to complete the Regimented Inmate Discipline Program. If he does not successfully complete this program, he will have to serve 15 years. If the program is completed, he will then be put on probation for the remainder of the original sentence or until the court alters the sentence. He was ordered to pay fines of \$248 and restitution of \$830. This sentence will run concurrent with two other sentences.

David J. Peek, Jr., AKA J.R. pleaded guilty to burglary of a dwelling. He was again sentenced to 15 years suspended upon completion of the Regimented Inmate Program. This sentence will run concurrent with the previous sentence. He was ordered to pay \$248 in court costs and \$229 in restitution.

David J. Peek, Jr., AKA J.R. pleaded guilty to burglary of a non-dwelling building and was sentenced to five years probation pending good behavior. The sentence will run concurrent with the previously mentioned sentences. He was ordered to pay court costs of \$248 and \$990 in restitution.

Basil Smith pleaded guilty to burglary of a dwelling house and was sentenced to five years which were suspended and three years probation. He was ordered to pay restitution of \$1,724, a \$250 fine, \$248 in court costs and a 2 percent bond fee of \$100.

Anthony Lambert, Fulton St., Iuka, pleaded guilty to possession of marijuana, more than an ounce. He was sentenced to a three year suspended sentence provided he successfully completes the Intensive Supervision Program/House Arrest as sentenced in the previous case. This sentence will run consecutive with the sentence in that case. The defendant was ordered to pay \$248 in court costs, a 2 percent bond fee of \$100, a fine of \$1,000 and \$110 restitution to the Tupelo Crime Lab.

Stolen Watercraft Returned To Owner By Tish. Co. Authorities

Tishomingo County officials have recovered a stolen personal watercraft and trailer and have issued a warrant for a Crossroads man in connection with the theft.

A 1998 Sea-Doo personal watercraft and accompanying trailer belonging to John Wells was taken from his home in the Island area June 1 while he was at work, according to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith.

Smith said that an 18-year-suspect from the North Crossroads area is presently being

sought for the crime.

"We have evidence that the suspect took the stolen vehicle out on the lake recently and actually had an accident with another watercraft," Smith explained. "When the Tennessee officer wrote out the ticket, the suspect gave him some false information, but he did give his correct name. This is what helped lead us to him."

Smith went on to say that the McNairy County Tennessee authorities contacted him and with the help of serial numbers from the owner, he was able to identify the vehicle.

Heartworms Are Malignant Canine Danger

All Dogs (yes, housedogs) that are not on a heartworm preventive medication are in danger of getting heartworms.

Heartworms are parasites carried by mosquitoes from dog-to-dog. They mature in unprotected dog's heart, large blood vessels, reaching a length of 14 inches and a diameter of a pencil lead when full grown.

Heavy infestation of heartworms — or even heartworms over a long period of time — impair the blood throughout the body, causing damage only to the heart, but also to the lungs, liver and kidneys. Heartworms can cause a slow, painful death.

If discovered in early stages, the disease can be treated effectively and little or no permanent damage to the animal. In its later stages, however, the disease becomes more difficult to cure and frequently causes permanent damage to the animal's health.

No vaccine currently available to immunize a dog against canine heart disease.

Effective preventive medication, however, is available in liquid, tablet, or chewable forms. The medication — which prevents larvae of immature heartworms from reaching adulthood — is given monthly to provide continuous protection for the dog.

If given to a dog infected with heartworms, some forms of preventive medication can cause illness and even death. Therefore, to have a pet checked for heartworms prior to beginning a preventive program.

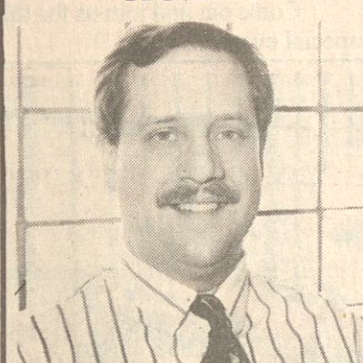
Eye Complication Diabetes

Diabetes is a disease that prevents the body from making or using the necessary insulin to break down sugar in the blood. This disease can cause complications in many parts of the body. For example, diabetes can cause changes in nearsightedness, presbyopia (the ability to focus on close objects), and blue/yellow color defects. It can also cause glaucoma and decrease sensitivity.

There are certain symptoms associated with diabetes, including fluctuating or blurring of vision, occasional double vision, and floaters within the field of vision. These are among the signs of diabetes and should be detected first in a physical examination by a doctor or optometrist.

If you have diabetes, it is vital that you follow your physician's instructions regarding diet, exercise, and medication. Regular examination by an eye specialist is also important to protect your vision.

New Treatment For Gum Disease

A new delivery system for tetracycline, an antibiotic useful in the treatment of some forms of gum disease, has just been approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration. Soon the drug will be available for administration by dentists.

Gum disease is an infection caused by certain types of bacteria. These bacteria create toxins that irritate the gums, resulting in a breakdown of gum tissue. As the tissue detaches from the teeth, pockets form.

The new treatment provides a direct assault on these bacteria by placing fibers impregnated with the bacteria-killing drug, tetracycline, directly into the periodontal pocket. Although the fibers cannot be used to treat all forms of gum disease, the procedure will provide a new dimension for treating the disease.

The best defense against gum disease is a good offense. Practice good oral health habits by brushing twice a day, cleaning between the teeth daily with floss or interdental cleaners and seeking regular dental care.

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How do you know a good value when you see it? In the grocery store, finding value may mean buying plain-label items that are the same quality as those with brand names. When car buying, looking for value means conducting thorough research and comparison shopping.

But what about when you're buying stocks? Finding a good stock means choosing solid companies that consistently make profits for their shareholders — while paying a reasonable price compared to the stock's earnings. That's the price-to-earnings ratio, or P/E.

For example, a stock selling at \$60 and earning \$4 per share has a P/E of 15 ($60 \div 4 = 15$). Another one selling at \$60 but earning \$2.40 per share has a P/E of 25 ($60 \div 2.40 = 25$). If the overall stock market has an average P/E of 20, the first stock has a low P/E and the second has a high P/E compared to the average.

However, the P/E alone is not enough to base your decision on. A stock may have a higher P/E but also may be a more solid company. But if you were comparing two companies with the same fundamentals — a long history of solid growth, profits and dividends, among others — and one had a higher P/E, the stock with the lower P/E may be a better value.

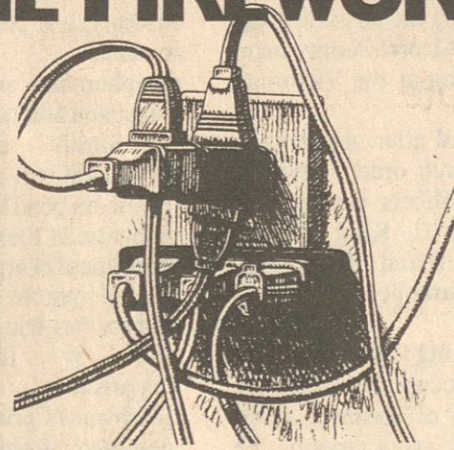
A recent study found that low P/E stocks have often outperformed high P/E stocks. Conducted by economist and portfolio manager Dr. Michael A. Berry and published by the financial research firms Ibbotson and Sinquefeld, the study tracked New York Stock Exchange stocks during different market climates. It found that low P/E stocks performed considerably better than high P/E stocks in nine out of the 12 market declines of 20 percent or more from 1937 to 1995. In fact, the low P/E stocks actually beat the market in eight of the 12 declines. The study also found that low P/E stocks outperformed high P/E stocks during seven out of 12 recovery periods following the market declines.

This is not to say you should always buy low P/E stocks and never buy those with high P/E's. With the popularity of stocks today, some of the most solid companies are selling at prices that are high relative to earnings.

However, a stock's P/E factor can be a significant consideration in your overall evaluation. A high P/E may be an indication of a company that doesn't have the earnings and growth potential to justify its market value. The lesson here is to do your homework and weigh all factors before you decide to buy.

STICK AROUND FOR THE FIREWORKS.

Here's an accident waiting to happen. A standard wall outlet designed for two plugs, totally overloaded. It's an all too-common occurrence. Overloading can result in electrical shorts, power outages, fires and personal injury. All of



which are easily avoidable. The best rule is to use only one plug per outlet, and a little common sense. And remember that with every additional plug, you're increasing your chance of an accident. Or at least some fireworks.

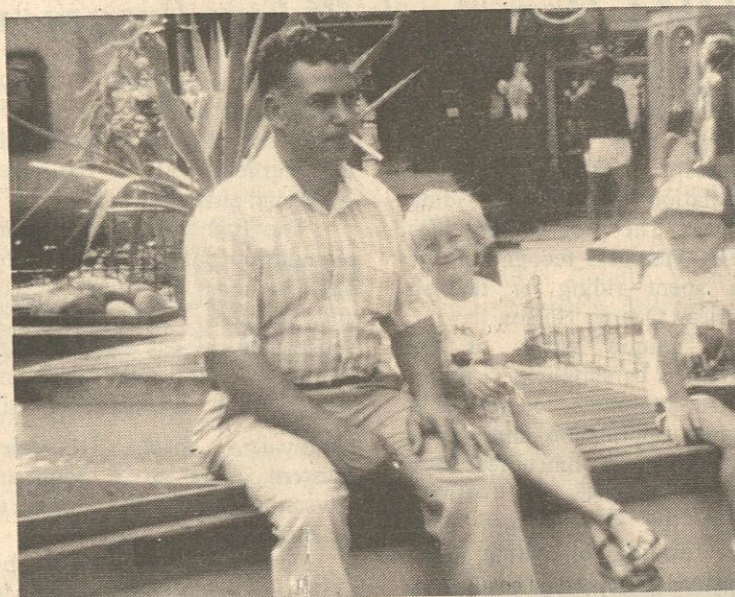

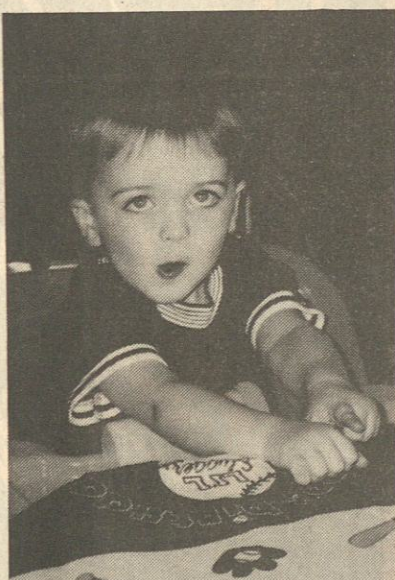

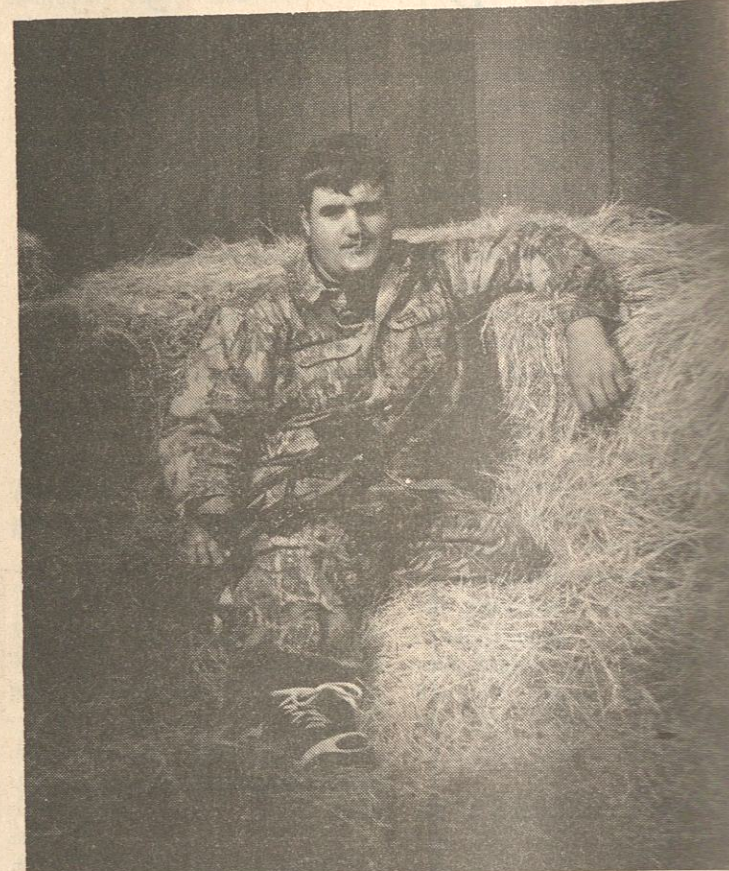

Old Tishomingo Traces

I'm Florence White - birthday 16, 1918.

I remember walking to Hog College I lived close to Hubbard. Mr. Pearl Grisham and Willow were my girlfriends. We went to Mr. Will Browns house. He had a garden around his yard and a big turkey. Mr. Burt would come up to the fence and scare us, water was running across the roads in lots of places our school house was made of wood and long with a fire place at one end. We had big logs smooth on top of benches, can't remember how old they were around 7 years old I guess. We wrote some poems to say, I would get up and sing mine, go up to teacher turn around and go back, saying mine. I was posed to stand in front of teacher and say it seems like the teacher was

Mary Smith. My sister, Mattie Grisham, walked with me to school. I guess Dora and Pearl Grisham the Brown boys, Willow and Tennie Bugg all of us walked together. It was a long way to walk.

Florence White also wrote, Ms. Billie Writes that part of the poem was "I have a little Shadow" also that she used to remember her poem and Pearl's too. Both are Ms. Billie's Aunts.

Mr. Burt Bugg tells me that the first school was taught in Hubbard Salem Church. It burned.

Mr. Bert said the Hog College started in the year 1924 & 25. He explains that the school from his house was on this path for him. Bert and brother and sisters and other children would leave his home go

down to the branch bottom, turn left. There was water running over rocks coming out of the hills and it was called spring water. Bert recalls certain places there would be a dipper on tree limb that you'd get a drink of water from if you needed too.

Mr. Bert said there would be other children ahead or behind walking to school. He would pass the Will Brown home place. (being Ms. Billie Bonds great-grandpaw) walk on toward Mrs. Eunice Guinn old home place called "The Gardners" then would go to right then would work until first left and turn. These were wagon roads. They would continue to walk past the Reynolds place. He explained they had a Hog Farm. Mr. Bert said the hogs were on both sides of the wagon road. (Mrs. Lula was his first cousin) He continued to walk toward the "Anna Fall" This being Mrs. Anna Bugg Brown - Mrs. Billie's great-grandmother. Ms. Anna owned land there and the water fall was and still is today famous. Folks come for miles and gather on top of waterfall and below in their boats. Now the Pickwick River has been let out so, the bottom lands are filled with water. Bert explained that the bottom

land was used for farming, up until Pickwick River got out.

Mr. Bert said that the Hogs were on both sides of the wagon road. They had rail wood fences all up and down on both sides of road. The hogs would have their pens on the inside of the rail fences. That led all the way to the school house. The kids named the school Hog "College".

Mr. Bert said school started in late fall after crops were gotten in. They only went 4 or 5 months of the year. School let out early spring in order to get fields ready to plant.

Mr. Bert recalls two teachers and a substitute teacher Mrs. Mary Smith. Mr. Author Hitchcock and Mentie Bugg Bullard, Sub teacher. (Mr. Berts 1st

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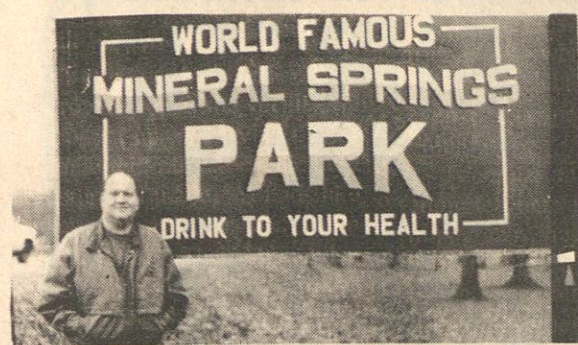


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Luka's Mineral Springs Park is a wonderful place to walk through on a warm summer evening. This place has seen a lot of history since the days of Chief Luka and the wandering Chickasaws. One lady in particular says she has enjoyed living across the street from the park for over fifty-five years. Her name is Mrs. E.N. Allen. She says I can call her "Zelma" or "Grandma" or "Mamaw" like her own grandchildren (and great-grandchildren) do. I dropped in recently to visit and look through some old family scrapbooks.

"Could I get you a glass of tea or something?" she asks sweetly before I even sit down. We get comfortable as I open my notebook. Stepping into this home brings back so many good memories of the friendships I have made with each member of this close, loving family. I grew up with most of Mrs. Allen's grandchildren. I remember playing in the park with my friends, including Mrs. Allen's grandchildren. I have a picture of my eighth birthday across the street at the Youth Center with her grandsons Jimmy Curtis and Jeff Lyles among my "best buddies". "It has been a long while since you have been to see me," she reminds me, gently interrupting my daydreams from childhood. "I know, Mrs. Allen," I replied, "TOO LONG."

We started with a little family history. Mrs. Allen was born and raised in Calhoun County, Mississippi to Mr. and Mrs. L. Z. Sprayberry in 1915. "My father always told us, 'If you ever meet a Sprayberry anywhere, be they a thief or a horse trader, you are likely kin to them,'" Mrs. Allen laughs. Her mother was Violet Orr before marrying into the Sprayberry family. "My mother had an ancestor who fought in the Civil War as a Confederate General," she says proudly. "My grandfather, George Washington Sprayberry joined the Rebel Army at age fifteen," Mrs. Allen said. "He was under Gen. 'Fightin' Joe' Wheeler of Alabama." (Both Wheeler's command and that of Gen. Orr were engaged in some of the bloodiest conflicts of the war. By my research, they were both in Gen. Robert E. Lee's Army of Northern Virginia at Gettysburg.)

"All of us worked hard when I was growing up," she recalls, "I was brought up in a loving Christian home with three brothers and five sisters." I joked, "Sounds like you had enough for your own baseball team." Then Mrs. Allen laughed, "We sure did! We all got a game of baseball and basketball up after the chores were done. We were always competitive." We

then got on the subject of school. "I went through the eighth grade in Calhoun County, no buses in those days, we went back and forth in a mule drawn wagon, hot or cold and rain or shine," she said with a smile. "Then what about high school?" I inquired. Mrs. Allen gestured with a long sweep of her arm. "We had to go ALL the way over into Webster County for high school. That was clear over to the next county."

Young Zelma excelled in her classwork and sports. She played basketball all through school and loved all the sports. "I liked basketball so much, I fell in love with my senior year coach!" she blushes. "I went on to marry him, you see, that was my husband, Ellett. "Mr. Ellett (pronounced ELL, as in SHELL and ETT as in GET.) Allen graduated from State College with a degree in agriculture. There were few jobs when he got his degree due to the depression so he got a teaching credential and was hired in his home county. "We were looking out the classroom window at the new crop of men teachers as they drove up. Without even knowing his name, I watched Ellett get out of the car and pointed as I said to my girlfriends who were crowded around the window, "That fat one's mine even if I never get him!" but, in time, I did get him."

There has always been a policy about teachers and students fraternizing as is the policy today. "We went to church and he came over to the house but we didn't go out till I had graduated," Mrs. Allen explained. "We were married a year later on May 12, 1934. I was

nineteen and Ellett was four years older at twenty-three." Two years later, their first daughter, Nan, was born. Annette, followed a few years later. Mr. Allen taught school at \$45 a month through the late thirties. He finally got on with the agriculture department and was assigned to serve in Tishomingo County in 1941. He had to leave his two young daughters and wife with their third child on the way, to stay with her family in Calhoun County while he was in Luka. In those days, there was not a house to be found for rent or sale anywhere in the area. Mr. Allen boarded with an Luka family but longed for his own to be with him.

Mr. Allen was determined to get his family to Luka sooner than later. He went to then Mayor Robert Carter to see if he could help find a place for all of them. Being sympathetic to his cause, Mr. Carter helped in the search. Mr. Carter went as far as to ask his

own sister, Mrs. Nathan Pack, if she would rent part of her large home to the couple and their children. She consented and on September 19, 1941 the family was reunited in a place of their own in Luka. "We had to learn to share one bathroom, you had to walk through Mrs. Pack's living room to get to it," Mrs. Allen recalled fondly. "The girls (Nan and Annette) were not used to sharing another's home like we were then," she laughs. "The girls would play in front of the house and would pick the flowers out of Mrs. Pack's yard and give them to anyone who passed by. I like to have never broken them of that habit!"

It would be two years before the Allens found a house in Luka. "Buddy Ware moved in late 1942. We were really needing a place now that Ellett Jr. had come along," she said. On January 1, 1943, the Allen family moved to the Ware house on Aberdeen Street across from Mineral Springs Park. "It was like moving into heaven!" Mrs. Allen said of the little white house right there at the park. She told of the many wonderful neighbors they had known over the years and had

many fond memories of the park. "I could take the kids across the street and they would play as long as I would let them," she recalled.

Mrs. Allen stayed home with her children until they had all gotten in high school. (She later worked for Mr. Harmon "Pete" Byrom at the Western Auto Store and later at a local hosiery mill.) The Allens had a full schedule with three children keeping them on the run. In 1948, then seven year old Ellett Jr. fell ill with what the doctor first thought was a cold. "In those days a parents' worst fear was to have a child come down with Polio," Mrs. Allen said as the smile left her face, "it was only two days after I had taken him to the doctor that Ellett Jr. woke up really sick, he had a fever and I thought he was going to choke." Showing her mother's intuition, she looked at her son and noticed one of his shoulders looked strange. "It was kind of sunk in like those Polio children you saw in the newsreels so I called Dr. Bostick to come out." She frowned as she recalled their ordeal with a deadly disease. Ellett Allen Jr. did have Polio. His condition deteriorated and by Friday he couldn't move his arm and his legs were twisted," she recalled with great anguish in her face. "Ellett Sr. was away at a meeting and couldn't come home. The doctor put the girls under quarantine," she said, "I could only go out to get groceries."

This lasted for six weeks. Ellett Jr. was sent to a special hospital for children with Polio in Vicksburg. "We could only go to visit him on Sunday, that was only from 1 to 3," she recalled tearfully. It took six months of intense therapy for Ellett Jr. to regain use of his arm and legs, but eventually he got back to being a normal little boy. "I worked with him 30 minutes every day just like the doctor said and he eventually grew stronger." Ellett Jr's loving mother remembered gratefully, "The good Lord really blessed us then but he has always looked over us in good and bad times."

The Allens were very active in their church and community over the years. As faithful members of Luka Baptist Church, Mr. Allen served in a number of varied capacities including being elected deacon. Mrs. Allen was the nursery coordinator for twenty-five years. "I really loved working with the babies," she remarks. I, like many, can still recall Mr. Allen shouting a hearty "AMEN!" from his end seat on the far right section of the sanctuary. "When he felt the Lord speaking to him through the preaching, he never hesitated to show how he felt," recalled his adoring wife.

"We were involved in every club there was in Luka," says the still active 83 year old. "Ellett was a Mason and we were both active in the Eastern Star. "I have a meeting at the lodge tonight," she said, "I still go as long as I am able" she noted. The Allens worked tirelessly in a number of other organizations. "Ellett was a charter member of the Lions Club," Mrs. Allen said proudly. For several years the Lions Club had a snow-cone concession in Mineral Springs Park during the summer. The money raised from the stand was used to purchase trees for the park as well as a number of other park improvements over the years. The Allens, now with teenage daughters of their own, served as chaperones for a number of youth dances and other activities doing their part for the 20th Century Club's 1949-50 "Build a Better Community" project. The Allens joined the crowd of over 8,000 people in the park on Luka Day when the club accepted the National Kroger Award. "I remember

Rod Brasfield and the Jordanairs singing in the park," Mrs. Allen fondly thought back. "The governor spoke and we were all so proud to be there that day." There are a number of pictures of the Centennial Celebration of the town of Luka in 1957. "Daddy grew a little mustache for the Centennial like many other men in town," recalls daughter Nan. "It grew out solid white in color so he darkened it with mascara." She added, "On the day of the Centennial Celebration, Mom was in an old timey dress and Dad, with his little black mustache, wore a derby with his outfit. They were so cute!" I later saw a picture of the couple and will have to agree.

Mr. Allen was also a charter member of the Rotary Club where he served as president. The seemingly tireless Allens were also active in the Sportsmen's Club as well as active supporters of the Luka High School Athletic Boosters for many years. He was also instrumental in furthering the Dixie Youth Baseball League in Luka. This in addition to a number of professional associations connected to Mr. Allen's work. "He loved to go out and eat," Mrs. Allen recalls. "Ellett really enjoyed the dinner meetings especially after the children were old enough where I could go with him," she happily reminisces. While serving as Lions Club president, Mr. Allen went out of his way to sponsor a young woman suffering from kidney failure. Merriam Holt found out about her problem through a kidney disease scanning program started by Dr. Harry Cosby and supported through the Lions Club. Allen was instrumental in getting help for the young lady. He went as far as to drive her to Tupelo for dialysis treatments when another ride was not available. Mr. Allen pushed for helping Holt obtain a kidney transplant. It was a successful operation. No one was more thrilled with Merriam's triumph than Mr. and Mrs. Allen. Community service knows no greater reward than to save a human life. Humbly, Mr. Allen thanked God for this opportunity to serve his fellow man.

After thirty-four years with the A.S.C.S. Office in Luka, Mr. Allen retired. He stayed active in the community by coordinating the daily senior citizens activities at the Youth Center. The Allens remained active in community activities while they enjoyed supporting their grandchildren's various endeavors in school, sports and community. Nan and husband John Lyles have three sons, Steve, Allen and Jeff. Annette married Ray Curtis and their children are Lori, Becky, Melinda and Jimmy (a friend and classmate of mine, who passed away in 1984). William "Bill" Allen is the son of Ellett Jr. and wife Barbara. All of

the members of this extended family, the children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren share a common thread of love for each other and reach out to other their community with that love a multitude of ways. I feel that has been passed on as a tradition through this family.

I have been privileged to work with Jeff Lyles in the A.S.C.S. program sponsored by our community this past year. He reminds me much of his grandfather, age 80, hesitating to lend a hand, a heart felt prayer or echo his grandfather's hearty "Amen" in church as the spirit moves him. One day while I was visiting at Luka Elementary School, I was talking with a teacher in the hall, two arms hugged me under my arm. I looked down and Jeff Lyles' little six year old boy was grinning up at me. The fellow then gently grabbed my heart when he said, "You are Daddy's friend and I love you" because my Daddy loves you and only all children could share a gift passed through this family over four generations is the gift of love.

Mr. Allen would have been proud of the great-grandchildren he never got to know. He was away in 1978. Mrs. Allen has busy through her family and activities yet not a moment by when Ellett, the love of her life, is not gently stirring her thoughts. She says she has about children these days, the temptation in the work children were growing up and prays for their parents and parents who have tried to them in loving Christian and who have taught the most important lessons through fine example.

I see Mrs. Allen at church bump into her at the store always has a smile and word. She even looks a lot like her own grandmother whom I miss. I should make a point to see her more often. If there was a term that describes Mrs. Allen, her late husband, Allen and their entire family I mean the whole lot of them would have to be that the "MY HEROES!"

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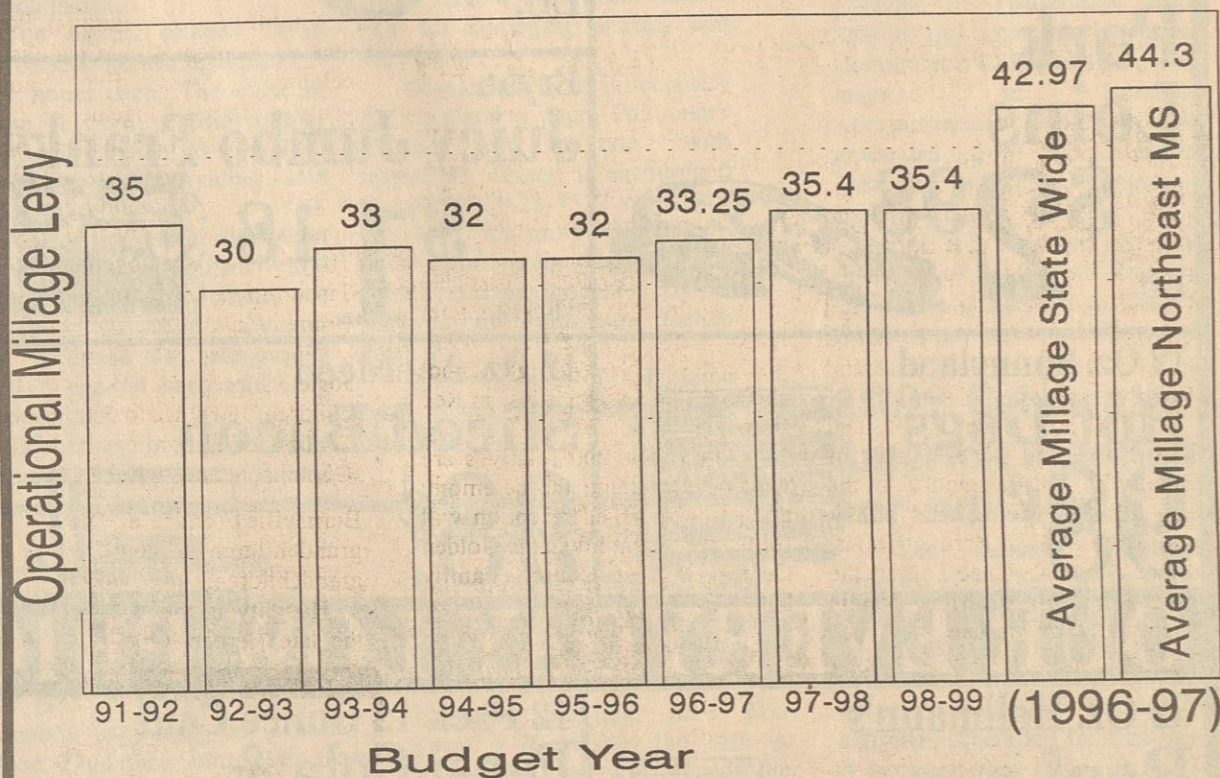

Arnold, Others Breathe Easier With Iuka Hospital Pulmonary Rehab Program

For some people, exercise comes naturally...like breathing. But for those with pulmonary problems, exercise and even breathing can be quite difficult.

Mary Arnold, 65, of Iuka was diagnosed with chronic bronchitis almost eight years ago. A registered nurse, Arnold had worked at Iuka Hospital for 20 years before going to work for a home health agency and then a nursing home. She retired five years ago.

"On top of the chronic bronchitis, I am terribly allergic to a certain mold," Arnold said. "Last summer I started having respiratory problems and by Christmas I was in bad shape. The day after Christmas I went to the emergency department in severe respiratory distress." Arnold was hospitalized three times after that episode. And, after 50 years of smoking, she gave it up Jan. 6.

"My doctor recommended that I start Pulmonary Rehabilitation at Iuka Hospital," Arnold said. "It has really helped me both physically and emotionally. Their motivation helps me to realize that I am progressing, even though sometimes it's slow."

Arnold says she can definitely see improvement in not only her breathing, but also her stamina. "I have never been very active, and when I first started Pulmonary Rehab, I was using a portable oxygen tank through the whole session. Now I don't need the oxygen while I exercise, and at

home I only have to use it at night," she said. "My granddaughter recently asked me to go on a school trip with her to The Pyramid in Memphis. We did a lot of walking that day, and I could really tell that Pulmonary Rehab was working for me."

Dana Walker, RN, director of Iuka Hospital's Cardio-Pulmonary Rehab program, explained, "In Pulmonary Rehab, we strive to help people with respiratory disorders live their lives as normally as possible, so that the quality of their lives is improved. Pulmonary Rehab is beneficial for those with chronic bronchitis, emphysema, asthma and other respiratory problems."

Each Pulmonary Rehab patient undergoes a team assessment, which allows input from doctors, nurses, pharmacists, respiratory therapists, and dietitians. Then an individual program is designed specifically for each patient.

The patient attends 24-36 exercise sessions lasting an hour to 1 1/2 hours each. The exercise regime involves cardiovascular conditioning, such as treadmill walking or bicycle riding, and light weight training.

"These exercises strengthen the upper extremities and respiratory muscles, which are utilized in breathing," Walker said. "Exercise also improves a person's general heart and lung conditioning."

Education is another key component of Pulmonary Rehab.

"The main complaint my patients have is that they are short of breath and have trouble breathing," Walker said. "Retraining them to breathe properly and conserve their energy usually reduces their symptoms a great deal."

Patients are also taught bronchial hygiene (how to cough effectively and clear the lungs), proper nutrition, and appropriate use of medications. Walker teaches them about their disease and how to detect the warning signs of infection. Most importantly, she trains the patient to relax and control the panic caused when he can't catch his breath.

Pulmonary Rehab stresses the importance of support from family and friends. "Spouses and family members are encouraged to attend exercise sessions, too," Walker said. "Coping with pulmonary disease is much easier with support from those who care about you." Patients can also receive help for managing anxiety and depression.

Physician referral is necessary for a patient to begin Pulmonary Rehab, but anyone with respiratory disease is encouraged to call (601)423-4522 or 1-800-843-3375 for more information about the program. Medicare and most insurance companies pay the majority of Pulmonary Rehab costs.

Tishomingo County To Receive \$54,757 In State Fire Funds

Mississippi Insurance Commissioner George Dale today announced the distribution of a \$54,757 award to Tishomingo County for improvements in firefighting equipment and training. This year, during which \$5.9 million will be distributed to qualifying counties, marks the 25th anniversary of the distribution of state fire funds to counties.

State fire funds, which are derived from the 3 percent premium tax levied on all insurance products sold in Mississippi, must be spent for capital improvements, equipment and training for fire departments. In order to receive the funds, counties and their fire service providers must meet certain reporting requirements and have county arson investigators and county fire coordinators in place. Tishomingo County's fire Coordinator, Jerry Bonds, is responsible for seeing that the necessary requirements are met.

"These funds, while critical, actually represent about a third of what is needed in order to adequately support rural fire protection," Dale said. "The balance of the monies needed to fully fund a rural fire department must come from ad valorem taxes levied by the county as well as from private donations, including voluntary contributions offered through water and electrical utilities in some parts of the

state."

Dale has called for greater funding for rural fire protection throughout his six terms as Mississippi's insurance Commissioner.

"Many Mississippians have given generously of their time and money to the worthwhile cause of rural fire protection," he said.

Throughout his tenure, Dale has sought to lower Mississippians' insurance premiums by meeting the requirements for improved insurance ratings in rural areas. Dale pointed out that while a rural fire department typically has minimum operating needs of \$15,000 per year, the average rural fire department in Mississippi only receives half that.

"Right now, the state is putting up \$4.80 for every Mississippiian living outside a municipality," Dale said. "In order to have reliable fire protection, you need to be able to spend somewhere in the neighborhood of \$12 to \$15 per person per year."

In addition to the 5.9 million distributed among qualifying counties, an equal amount is distributed among qualifying municipalities. State lawmakers fire authorized municipal fire funds in 1971. The Mississippi Insurance Department was assigned responsibility for the state fire fund program in 1988.

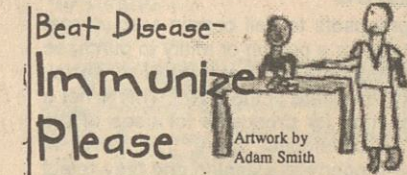

UDC Memorial Service Held At Oak Grove Cemetery

The United Daughters of the Confederacy observed the 125th Anniversary Memorial Day on June 15, 1998 at the grave of John Marshall Stone in the Oak Grove Cemetery.

Margueta Mathis, president, presided at the service. The Pledge of Allegiance and The Lord's Prayer were said in unison.

Mrs. Mathis described the life of John Marshall Stone. This leader was born in Gibson County, TN, on April 30, 1830. As a young man he was a teacher, a clerk, and a station agent. On June 6, 1861, Company K, Iuka was organized. It was one of the first companies to muster into the state militia. John Marshall Stone was elected captain. On April 12, 1862 he was elected Colonel of the regiment. The men of Iuka forming Company K of the 2nd MS

Regiment fought in many battles before the end of the war. Most of the men were either wounded, killed, or captured. Colonel Stone was wounded several times. While returning from military leave, Colonel Stone was captured at Salisbury, NC. He was sent to Johnson's Island where he remained prisoner until July 25, 1865.

After his release, Colonel Stone returned to Iuka and resumed his position as station agent. In 1869, he was elected to the state senate and served throughout the Reconstruction period. On May 2, 1872, he married Mary Coman. He was later elected governor of Mississippi.

When his last term as governor ended in 1896, he became president of the Merchant's Bank of Jackson.

Upon the resignation of Stephen D. Lee, he was then elected president of the A & M college, now MS State University. He served only one year and was then forced to retire due to declining health. He moved to Holly Springs, where he died on March 26, 1900. John Marshall Stone and his family are buried in Oak Grove Cemetery.

Governor Stone was an outstanding leader and was much

loved and appreciated by the residents of Mississippi. As United Daughters of the Confederacy, we are proud and honored to be the John Marshall Stone Chapter #394.

A wreath was placed on Governor Stone's grave in memory of all Confederate soldiers. These men are forever a part of American and Tishomingo County history.

Vickie Durham, of the nominating committee, read the names of officers for the next two years. Mary Ellen Ahlstrom, first vice president, moved that we accept the slate as nominated.

The members were delighted to have Helen Borden and Emilie Page Sheffield attend the service. The other attending members were Wanda Walker, Ruth Wynn, Mildred Hill, Karen Bryant, Marguerite Nixon, and Jeanie McKee.

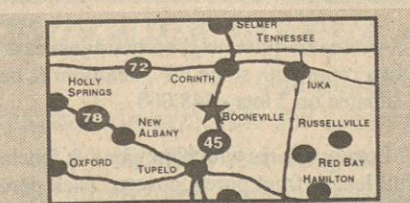

Home Economics Tips

Taking The Mystery Out Of Meringues

Making a meringue to cover a pie (called a soft meringue) does not have to be difficult. A meringue should be soft, fine-textured and tender, but not sticky.

Meringues should cut easily without tearing, not show leakage (called weeping) where the meringue and the filling meet, or amber-colored droplets on top of the meringue (called beading).

Here are some tips to help take the mystery out of meringue making for you:

Select a bright, sunny day for making it. Meringues are greatly affected by humidity. Because of their high sugar content, meringues tend to absorb moisture from the air on very humid days, making them limp and sticky.

A general recipe for making a soft meringue is 2 tablespoons of sugar to each egg white. A 3-egg white meringue (which would include 6 tablespoons of sugar) will cover a 9-inch pie and stand about 1 inch in height.

When separating the yolks from the whites, be careful not to break the yolks, as egg whites must be entirely free of any egg yolk to form a foam. (It is easier to separate the yolks and whites when eggs are still cold.) Also be sure there is no trace of fat on either the bowl or the beaters, because fat inhibits foam

formation.

Avoid the use of plastic bowls, as they tend to absorb fat. Use either glass or metal bowls. You can mix with either an electric mixer or by hand with either a hand mixer or a wire whip.

Egg whites can be beaten faster and to a larger volume if

they are brought to room temperature before beating. However, because of food safety concerns, leave them at room temperature for no longer than 30 minutes, or set the egg white container in a bowl of warm water while assembling other ingredients.

It is important that egg whites be neither under-beaten nor over-beaten. Too much beating makes them dry and even lumpy, resulting in a low-volume, unstable foam. Too little beating may not allow the sugar to dissolve, resulting in a grainy-textured meringue. For best results, beat egg whites only until they stand up in glossy peaks and bend slightly at the tips.

Begin the meringue by beating the egg whites until slightly foamy. Then add the sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, spreading it over the surface of the egg whites. Continue beating until the sugar is dissolved and soft peaks form.

Once egg whites are beaten,

use the meringue immediately. Otherwise it will begin to dry and become liquid again.

It is important that the filling be hot when the meringue is spooned over it. This helps to minimize leakage ("weeping") between the meringue and the filling.

Be sure to spread the meringue all the way around the crust around the edge of the pie. This helps to minimize meringue shrinkage during baking.

Heat the meringue to 170 degrees F to kill an bacteria in egg white meringue (called hot filling) would be adequately at 350 degrees minutes. If you are using a meringue containing egg whites or one that is piled on top, it may not be sufficiently cooked this time and temperature check temperature.

Remove the thermometer into the center of the meringue immediately after removing pie from oven. Finally, after removing pie from oven, let it cool a few drafts to help prevent shrinkage. Store the pie in the refrigerator until serving.

Putting out fires is a basic and important part of a firefighter's job. Most firemen enjoy conquering the formidable and unpredictable enemy. However, when there are no fires to extinguish, firefighters are relieved that there are no lives in danger and no property at risk.

The Iuka Fire Department has not been called to respond to any structure fires within the city limits of Iuka this year. This speaks well of the citizens of the city who have apparently been employing fire safety and prevention precautions. One might argue that the departure of the heating season has caused the decline in structure fires, but the credit cannot all be given to the changing of the seasons. People are simply being more careful when dealing with fire and things that could cause fire.

Although the lack of fires to fight may make the firefighter's job seem superfluous or unnecessary, this is the way Iuka's firemen prefer things to be. Not

having fires to fight may be to them unexciting and dull, but it also means that no one is getting hurt or being placed in a dangerous position. For citizens and fire personnel alike, this can only be good news.

Sometimes fires will occur in spite of the best efforts and precautions people can make. Fires can be started by lightning or unseen electrical problems. No person can take credit for the fact that fires of this nature have not occurred lately. We can only be thankful that God has seen fit to spare us from these things that are beyond our control.

Although the Iuka Fire Department has seen little action outside of vehicle fires and emergency medical calls in the past few months, they are always prepared to face whatever emergency may arise. No one can tell where or when a fire might break out and it's good to know that there are fully trained personnel on hand to do what must be done.

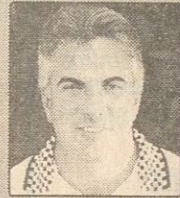

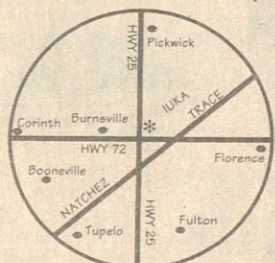
